MADBURY.

This name was given to a part of Dover as early as March 19, 1693-4. According to the late John Elwyn of Portsmouth the name Madbury was derived from Madbury in Devonshire, Eng., the seat for centuries of the Champernowne family to which belonged Capt. Francis Champernowne of the Dover Combination of 1640. He acquired a large tract of land on the eastern side of Great Bay, part of which fell within the limits of ancient Dover.

Madbury was made a separate parish with town privileges May 31, 1755, and a township May 26, 1768.

Madbury Meeting House is often mentioned in the records of the last century. It stood near the brick schoolhouse, (Center District,) a short distance from Hicks' hill. It was conveyed to the inhabitants of the western side of Dover township for a meeting house Sept. 6, 1759. A plan of this old fashioned meeting house, with its interior gallery round three sides, is to be found in the Madbury records. It was taken down within the recollection of some of our citizens.

MADBURY GARRISONS.

- I—Clark's Garrison.—This garrison stood on Clark's plains near the border of Dover and Madbury where Mr. Biederman's house now is. It was built by Abraham Clark, who owned land in this vicinity. It was taken down about the year 1836.
- 2-Daniel's Garrison stood near the present summer residence of Charles W. Hayes.
- 3—Demeritt's Garrison.—This garrison was built by Eli Demeritt, Jr., about 1720. It stood where is now the home of Mr. James Demeritt, his direct descendent, and was taken down in the spring of 1836.
- 4—Gerrish's Garrison stood on the first hill west of Gerrish mill, near the homestead of B. F. Hayes. It was built by Capt. Paul Gerrish, who erected the first mill at the neighboring falls in the Bellamy river.
- 5—Meserve's Garrison.—Traces of this garrison are still to be seen on Harvey's hill, that formed part of the old Meserve lands.
- 6—Tasker Garrison.—This garrison was at the foot of Moharimete hill, now Hick's hill, on the south side, where stands the house of Major John Demerritt. The Taskers were attacked by the Indians in 1693, but made their escape to Woodman's garrison. As their home was in a defenceless condition the garrison was erected soon after. It was taken down 1820 by Eben T. Demeritt.
- 7—Twombley's Garrison.—This garrison stood a few rods above the house of Lewis H. Young. It was no doubt built by William Twombly, who acquired land near the Saplings, April, 1734. It was taken down in the spring of 1842 by Nathaniel Twombly, and some of its timbers, then one hundred years old, were used in framing the barn now owned by Judge Frost at the corner of Locust and Nelson streets, Dover.
