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## PAMPHLET LAWS OF 1885.

### CHAPTER 21.

SECTION I. It shall be the duty of the county commissioners of each county to publish attested copies of the proceedings of the county convention, with the printed reports of the county officers, for the year in which such proceedings shall have occurred.

Approved July 29, 1885.

STATE HOUSE, CONCORD, N. H., Jan. 14, 1891.

Agreeably to the requirements of the statutes of the State of New Hampshire, the Merrimack county representatives met in convention, in room No. 5, after the adjournment of the morning session, for organization.

Convention called to order by Herman W. Greene, of Hopkinton.

On motion of Mr. Davis, of Warner, Herman W. Greene was elected chairman for the ensuing two years. Chas. W. Stone, of Andover, was elected clerk for the ensuing two years.

It was moved by Mr. Davis, of Warner, that a committee of five be appointed by the chair to examine recommendations, and report. Carried.

Chair appointed Davis of Warner, Tennant of Epsom, Head of Hooksett, Richardson of Concord, and Judkins of Franklin.

It was voted to accept the invitation of the county commissioners to visit the county farm, Thursday, Jan. 22, and further voted to instruct the chair to also extend an invitation to the chairmen of all the other county delegations.

On motion of Mr. Richardson, the delegation adjourned.

STATE HOUSE, CONCORD, N. H., March 4, 1891.

Pursuant to call of chairman, the county delegation met in room No. 5. Report of the committee appointed at the previous meeting was called for. The following unanimous report was submitted by the chairman, Mr. Davis, of Warner:  
*To the Merrimack County Convention:*

The sub-committee appointed to consider and report upon the estimates submitted by the commissioners of the county, to defray the necessary expenses of the county for the two fiscal



years ending April 30, 1893, having considered the matters assigned them, report as follows:

They advise an appropriation of \$73,800 for the estimated expenses of the year 1892, and \$73,500 for the year 1893, in accordance with the estimates of the commissioners, and for the several purposes stated in the estimates.

We also advise that a new barn be built at the county farm, at an expense not exceeding \$4,000, and that the commissioners be instructed to complete the work of indexing the records at the office of register of deeds, and put in a suitable iron door to the safe in that office, and that they be authorized to borrow \$4,500, for the expense of building the barn, indexing the records, and putting in the iron door aforesaid.

We also recommend that the commissioners be authorized to expend a sum of money not exceeding \$1,500, for repairs upon the county jail.

The estimates of the county commissioners are hereto appended as a part of this report.

Report accepted and adopted.

After discussing the condition of the barn, the drainage, and the heating of the county jail, Mr. Davis, of Warner, offered the following resolutions, which were passed :

*Resolved*, That the sum of \$73,800 be appropriated to defray county expenses for the year ending April 30, 1892, and that the sum of \$73,500 be appropriated for the same expense for the year ending April 30, 1893.

*Resolved*, That the commissioners be authorized to build a new barn at the county farm, at an expense not exceeding \$4,000, and to repair the county jail, at an expense not exceeding \$1,500, and to put in a new iron door in the safe in the register of deeds office, and to complete the indexing of the records in that office, with authority to issue bonds of the county for so much of said sums as may be necessary.

J. B. Tennant, of Epsom, and C. W. Stone, of Andover, were elected as auditors for the ensuing two years.

Convention adjourned, subject to call.

## INDIGENT SOLDIERS' ACCOUNT.

The amount paid for aid to indigent soldiers and their families shows an increase of \$1,969.12 over last year. As the law of 1885 was repealed by the last legislature, we would call the attention of selectmen and overseers to the law passed relating to this account :

AN ACT in relation to aid furnished indigent soldiers, and providing for entrance to the soldiers' home, in certain cases.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened :*

SECTION 1. Chapter 41 of the session laws of 1885, entitled "An act for the relief of poor persons who have served in the army or navy of the United States, and their dependent families," and chapter 45 of the session laws of 1887, in amendment of said act, are hereby repealed.

SEC. 2. Whenever any person resident in this state, who enlisted in the quota of this state, and was reckoned and served as a soldier or sailor from New Hampshire in the army or navy of the United States in the war of the rebellion, and who received an honorable discharge, not being under guardianship or legal restraint, shall become poor and unable to provide maintenance for himself and dependent family, such person, his wife, widow, or minor children, or such of said children as are unable to maintain themselves, shall be supported at the public expense in the town or city of their abode, at their own home or such place other than a town or county almshouse as the overseers of the poor or the county commissioners shall deem right and proper,—*provided*, that no per-



son shall receive aid under the provisions of this act unless he has resided in this state three years or more before making application for such aid ; and *provided*, that any person applying for such aid, shall, when requested, furnish to the county commissioners or the overseers of the poor the certificate of a reputable physician, resident in the county in which he lives, that he is incapacitated to perform manual labor ; and *provided*, that no person shall, while receiving aid under the provisions of this act, use intoxicating liquors to an extent which will render him incapable of working at his usual occupation ; and *provided*, that any person receiving aid under the provisions of this act, who receives a pension from the United States government, shall, while receiving such aid, apply such pension to the support of himself and dependent family, and shall, when requested, furnish to the overseers of the poor or the county commissioners satisfactory proof that such pension has been so applied ; and *provided*, that no person receiving aid under the provisions of this act shall sell any articles furnished him, nor exchange them for intoxicating liquors, nor share any such aid with any persons other than those above named as being entitled to the benefit of this act. Neglect by any person applying for or receiving aid under the provisions of this act to comply with the foregoing provisions and conditions, shall relieve the town or county liable for such person's support from the provisions of this act so far as such person is concerned, and such person may be supported at the town or county almshouse.

SEC. 3. The county commissioners, or the overseers of the poor of any town, may require any person applying for aid under the provisions of this act, who is eligible for admission, to make application for admission to the New Hampshire Soldiers' Home, in case he has no family or settled place of abode, whenever in their discretion they deem it best ; and if such person refuses to make such application, or, if admitted, refuses to go to said soldiers' home, the county or the town shall be relieved from the provisions of this act so far as such person is concerned, and he may be supported at the county or town almshouse.

SEC. 4. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed, and this act shall take effect upon its passage.

Approved April 7, 1891.

PAUPERS AWAY FROM FARM.

The expense under this account is about the same as that of the preceding year. Our county has been quite reasonable with this class. Many of them are aged persons, and have lived for years in the town of their abode, and would go destitute rather than go to the farm, where they could be better cared for. Another class are those with families, who through sickness or other causes are obliged to call for temporary relief. We do not think the county farm the proper place for children, and therefore relieve them, if surrounded by good influences, at their homes. We desire that in all cases where the county is to bear any expense, that the overseers of the poor shall notify the commissioners promptly, as in many cases expense may be saved by so doing.

FARM.

The number of inmates, and expense per week, will be found in the superintendent's report. Mr. and Mrs. Tasker have been in charge during the past four years, and to them and their assistants we wish to return thanks for the care given to the large number under their charge. The care of an institution of this kind requires kindness and patience on the part of the management, and we believe that those who are unfortunate find it here. As will be seen, by reference to the proceedings of the county convention, the building of a barn was authorized. This work is in progress, and when completed the county farm buildings will all be as good as could be desired. Residents of the county are invited to visit the farm.

*To the Commissioners of Merrimack County:*

During the past year there has been more sickness at the jail than in the preceding years of my service. A few of the prisoners were quite sick,—so sick as to forcibly remind me that there are no appropriate accommodations in this institution for the proper care and treatment of those suffering from disease.

Certainly, a cold, damp, gloomy stone cell is not an aid in the treatment of a tuberculous lung, nor a source of benefit to a shattered constitution. We cannot expect good results from drugs in the presence of such surroundings. I would, therefore, earnestly recommend that you devise some means whereby



the sick may receive all necessary attention. One ward of the division now reserved for the women might be furnished with an additional bed, and utilized for this purpose. This, I think, would be practicable and sufficient for all ordinary requirements.

I am highly pleased with the commendable improvements now being made. Stoves have long since outlived their usefulness here, the bath-tub fills a much needed want, and the brightness of the newly-whitened walls and ceilings relieves the gloomy aspect of the darkened interior.

Such radical changes bespeak the humane kindness with which you guard the penal institutions under your charge.
