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SUMMARY OF ACTION TAKEN ON ARTICLES IN

1979 TOWN WARRANT

The meeting was called to order by Moderator Robert A. Johnson at 10:10 A.M. Mr. Keith Lidback, Chairman of Board of Selectmen interrupted the opening to make a presentation of an engraved gavel to Robert A. Johnson, who today marks his 40th year as our Town Moderator. Mr. Lidback read a poem by Cecil Temple, written to mark the occasion. Mr. Johnson expressed his appreciation for the gift and the tribute. Then Mr. Johnson read the 52 articles of today's warrant.

ARTICLE 1 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Mr. Donald Post read the Budget Committee's recommendation as he says he will do for each article, but he will not make the motions this year. Mr. Herbert Sherman moved the sum of \$116,295.95 to defray town charges. Article passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 2 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for interest on same.

Mr. Herron moved the sum of \$1,500.00 for interest; V. Post seconded. Mr. Robert Low amended the article to read \$2,500.00 because of a need to borrow more this year. Mr. Lidback seconded. Mrs. Herron feels they should have known this earlier. Both the amendment and the main motion were adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 3 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,800.00 for the Northwood Public Libraries.

Mrs. Theresa Herron moved the sum of \$5,800.00 for the Public Libraries and Mrs. V. Post seconded. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 4 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,400.00 for Parks and Playgrounds.

Mr. Perry Richardson moved the article. Mr. V. Bane seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 5 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$550.00 for the care of Cemeteries.

Mr. Herbert Sherman moved the article. Perry Richardson seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 6 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Highways.

Mr. Robert Bailey moved the sum of \$51,575.00 (Summer \$25,300, Winter \$23,500, General Highway Expenses \$2,775.) be raised and appropriated for Town Highways. Mr. Allan Clark seconded. Motion was passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 7 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the purpose of Street Lighting.

Mr. Herbert Sherman moved the article; seconded. Motion was adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 8 To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,339.88 for the purpose of Town Road Aid, the State's share to be \$4,643.37 and the Town's share to be \$696.51.

Eleanor Pinkham moved the article. Motion was adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 9 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00 to be used to complete the reconstruction of that part of the Ridge Road between the residence of David White and Gerald Poling.

Mr. Robert Bailey moved the article. V. Bane seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 10 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,200.00 for new construction on Harmony Road (Route 4 to Allard's driveway and DeWitt's to Wallman's corner), Green Street, Cross Street (Murray Small's to Gerald Poling's), Ridge Road (Route 4 to Caverly's) and West Street. The \$22,200.00 is comprised of \$14,967.19 tax monies and \$7,232.81 special highway subsidy.

Mr. Robert Bailey moved the article; Mr. Allan Clark seconded. Eleanor Pinkham moved to amend the article and delete Green Street. Mrs. D. Graves seconded. Mr. Perry Richardson explained Green Street was more in the nature of improvements. Mr. R. Bailey broke down the cost: Harmony Road, \$12,500, Green Street, \$3,500, Cross Street, \$1,200, Ridge Road to Caverly's \$4,000, West Street, \$1,000. Mr. Charles Frary, James Barnes, John Newman, Randall DeTrude, Mrs. M. Thurber, Mrs. M. Metcalf all spoke on the issue of why those roads chosen over others more highly populated, speed on Green Street, hearings before proceedings for residents of these roads, etc.

We adjourned for a lunch break, reconvened at 1:15 P.M. After much debate, Mrs. Pinkham and Mrs. Graves withdrew their amendment. Mr. Charles Frary amended the motion to read: strike out Route 4 on Harmony to Allard's driveway and adding after West Street and Harvey Lake Road, so-called from Route 4 to the end of the "Town meeting accepted" section. Mr. Ahlgren seconded. Mrs. Slade asked about Ridge section near her house. Mr. Low says State had promised to correct this. Mr. Frary read a prepared statement giving 3 reasons for his amendment: (1) to validate the right of Town Meeting to approve and authorize before the work begins, (2) to decide if Town wants to keep rural character of the Town, (3) to see if Town Meeting supports the decision of the Selectmen that no more Class V roads be accepted until all existing Town roads are up to the same standards. Mr. Frary's amendment was defeated by a show of hands - 34 to 70.

Mr. Richardson amended motion to read \$24,200. and to add after West Street, the gravel section of Bennett Road immediately East of Bennett Bridge 250 feet more or less. Mr. H. Sherman seconded. Mr. Norman Dodge questioned whether this is not making Class VI into Class V. Mr. Richardson's amendment carried 53-25. So the main motion now reads \$24,200.00 and the town share of tax money from \$14,967.19 to \$16,967.19.

Mr. John Newman amended motion to add a section of Lower Deerfield Road from Route 43 to driveway of Roland Thompson, 3/4 mile. Frances Newman seconded. Amendment defeated 25 yes, 47 no. Main motion carried 78 yes, 30 no.

ARTICLE 11 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,770.00 for Ambulance Service, to be paid to the Center Barnstead Fire Department.

Mr. Herbert Sherman moved the article, Mr. Robert Bailey seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 12 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,956.50 for the Town's per capita share of the Rural District Health Council, Inc.

Mrs. Theresa Herron moved the article, Mrs. V. Post seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 13 To see if the Town will vote to transfer \$1,500.00 from the revenue of the Municipal Court to the Highway Safety Equipment Capital Reserve Fund.

John Lane moved the article. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 14 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,500.00 for the maintenance of the Town Dump.

Mr. Perry Richardson moved the article; Herbert Sherman seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 15 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,660.00 for the Northwood Rescue Squad.

Mr. Vincent Bane moved the article; James Small seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 16 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to pay the salary and expense of the Supervisor of the Summer Program for Economically Disadvantaged Youths. (SPEDY)

Mr. V. Bane moved the article; Randall DeTrude seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 17 To see if the Town will vote to receive and spend up to \$10,000.00 from Rockingham-Strafford Manpower Administration for the SPEDY program.

John Lane moved the article; V. Post seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 18 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,490.00 for Planning Board and Board of Adjustment expenses.

Robert Bailey moved the article; Tom Recce seconded. Dorothy Powell asked for an explanation. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 19 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$235.00 for Northwood Conservation Commission expenses.

Mr. Robert Herron moved the article; seconded. Adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 20 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Northwood Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1978 appropriation (\$91.19) said funds to be placed in the Northwood Conservation Fund in accordance with R.S.A. 36-A:5.

Mr. R. Herron moved, Mrs. P. Hammond seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 21 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be placed in the Northwood Conservation Fund in accordance with R.S.A. 36-A:5.

Charles Johnson moved the article, Randall DeTrude seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 22 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the supervisor's salary and expenses for the Conservation Commission's CETA project, Title VI.

Robert Herron moved the article, Charles Frary seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 23 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to support the Family Center and Children's Village. (By Petition)

Mrs. Herron moved the article, V. Bane seconded. Motion accepted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 24 To see if the Town will vote to empower the Selectmen to hire an executive secretary to be paid no less than the current minimum wage and no more than \$5.00 per hour, and extra secretarial/clerkial help as needed, to be paid no less than minimum wage and no more than \$3.50 per hour. (Recommendation of Administrative Study Committee)

Eleanor Pinkham reported for Administrative Study Committee. Mrs. Herron moved the article, James Small seconded. Motion was adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 25 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire personnel in the range of \$2.50 - \$5.00 per hour instead of the maximum of \$3.00 per hour presently in effect, such authorization to become effective April 1, 1979. (Selectmen's recommendation for all other personnel)

Mr. Robert Herron moved the article, Mr. H. Sherman seconded. Mr. Low explained the need. Richard Chandler spoke about tightening our belts. Motion adopted by show of hands, 39 yes, 26 no.

ARTICLE 26 To see if the Town will vote to provide workers' compensation coverage for eligible employees by participating in the New Hampshire Municipal Association Self-Funded Workers' Compensation Program commencing April 1, 1979, and to authorize the Selectmen to take such action as furtherance of this vote as may be necessary.

Mr. V. Bane moved, Mr. Robert Bailey seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 27 To see if the Town will vote to spend \$20,188.00 on a Town Ambulance, \$7,500.00 to be received from Federal Funds and the remainder, \$12,688.00 to be raised and appropriated. (Submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee)

Mrs. T. Herron moved the article, Mr. Beaulieu seconded. Mr. MacCord spoke of reasons needed, nearer than Barnstead, for our town only, lessen shock, etc. We now have 13 qualified attendants, 12 taking the course. The motion was adopted by a ballot - 105 yes - 40 no.

ARTICLE 28 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 in support of the Seacoast Regional Counseling Center.

Mrs. T. Herron moved, Robert Herron seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 29 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 in support of the Newmarket Health Center.

Mrs. T. Herron moved the article, Mr. Herron seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 30 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$224.00 in support of the Rockingham Child and Family Services.

Mrs. T. Herron moved, Mr. Herron seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 31 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,229.00 as its 1979 share of the capital costs with interest for the construction of an incinerator and energy recovery facilities as set forth under the Agreement For Formation of the Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative, and to take such other actions as may be necessary as shall be in the best interest of all members of the Cooperative, and to allow the Selectmen to accept Federal or State and other grants that may be available to the Town in providing its share in the project.

Mr. Herron moved, Mrs. Herron seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

Mr. Sherman moved we adjourn to March 24th at 10 A.M. Mr. James Small seconded. Mr. Robert Johnson asked all to study town road maps. ADJOURNED.

ADJOURNED TOWN MEETING - March 24, 1979 - 10 A.M.

After a conference with the Selectmen, Moderator Robert A. Johnson opened the meeting, amid a surprise birthday serenade to himself. Mr. Johnson reminded the audience that only legal voters should attempt to vote, but all taxpayers were welcome to the meeting.

ARTICLE 32 To see if the Town will vote to receive and spend up to \$23,500.00 from Rockingham-Strafford Manpower Administration for the CETA Program (Town Plan - Title VI).

Mrs. Herron moved the article, Mr. W. Fiander seconded. Mr. Lidback explained the article. Many discussed the fact that there weren't enough copies of the Town Plan made to give to each. Someone explained that when it is complete is time to have that done. Mr. Robert Johnson asked how the plan will be implemented - answer - by ordinance, by State regulations, or by vote of town. Town Plan is a collection of the findings of all those committees that have been working all year. Motion adopted by show of hands, 65 yes, 8 no.

ARTICLE 33 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$10,718.05 for the purpose of purchasing additional equipment and dry hydrants for the Fire Department and authorize the withdrawal of \$10,718.05 for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Mrs. V. Post moved the article, Mrs. T. Herron seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 34 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$9,675.00 for the purpose of constructing driveways to the Town Garage, Police Station, and the purchase of new office equipment and authorize the withdrawal of \$9,675.00 for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Charles Johnson moved, Jean G. Johnson seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 35 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,560.00 to employ a full-time police chief, the above amount includes the necessary insurance involved. (Submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee)

Mrs. Herron moved we indefinitely postpone article; Mr. V. Bane seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 36 To see if the Town will vote to close the following Class VI roads, subject to gates and bars, per recommendation of the Highway Advisory Committee:

- a. Upper Deerfield Road from Dagenais' driveway northerly to Marsten's driveway.



- b. Bow Street from Charles Varney's driveway westerly to Reckard's driveway.
- c. Upper Deerfield Road from Weinhold's driveway southerly to the Deerfield line.
- d. Mountain Road from David Behm's driveway to the Winding Hill Road.
- e. Winding Hill Road from Tanja Winter's driveway to the Deerfield line.
- f. Bennett Road from Gaviat Green Development's easterly driveway in a westerly direction to Gaviat Green Development's westerly driveway.
- g. Canterbury Road from Helen Moak's corner to the Epsom line.
- h. Old Pittsfield Road from Silvana Cenci's driveway to the Epsom line.

Mrs. Eleanor Pinkham moved we indefinitely postpone this article. Mr. John Newman seconded. Much, much discussion of Class VI and what subject to gates and bars means, how to ever reopen re reclassify.

Finally recessed meeting to 1 P.M. Meeting opened at 1:10 P.M.

The motion to indefinitely postpone Article 36 prevailed by a ballot vote 65 yes - 39 no.

ARTICLE 37 To see if the Town will vote to reclassify from Class Six to Class Five that portion of the Upper Deerfield Road, approximately 1000 feet between the present end of its Class Five and the driveway to the permanent residence of Leo W. and Doris M. Degenais. (By Petition)

Mr. Herron moved the article, Mrs. Post seconded. Mr. Robert Bailey amended the article to read at the end of the article - "the extent of improvements on this section of highway as a Class Five highway to be made within any sum appropriated in a subsequent article in this warrant or any other highway funds available. The motion was adopted by a show of hands, 89 Yes, 14 No. Then vote on main motion by Yes and No ballot - 93 yes, 9 No.

ARTICLE 38 To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000. to improve that section of Upper Deerfield Road, approximately 1000 feet between the present end of its Class Five and the driveway leading to the permanent residence of Leo W. and Doris M. Dagenais. (By Petition) (Submitted without the recommendation of the Budget Committee)

Mr. Charles B. Johnson moved the article, Mr. R. Bailey seconded. Mr. Post amended article to read after the \$5,000. to use any surplus highway funds from any other highway project. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 39 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property of the Town acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds as a result of Tax Sale.

Mrs. T. Herron moved the article, Mrs. V. Post seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 40 To see if the Town will vote to accept and maintain year-round Bigelow Road, beginning at so-called Lower Deerfield Road and continuing to the southeast corner of Big Buck Road.

(By Petition)

Mr. Herron moved article, Mr. John Newman seconded. Mr. Lidback read that the Selectmen cannot legally layout a road by order of townspeople. Much discussion. Mrs. Herron said purpose of government is to serve people not penalize them. Mr. Post suggested the Selectmen make a list of all things needed when people put in a petition about roads. Mr. Frary showed five things on State T.R.A. standards - Mr. Frary's point of his presentation was that the town is requiring higher standards than needed for the traffic on some of our town roads. Mr. R. Bailey explained why road committee felt the town should not accept any new roads unless tarred. Ballot vote - motion adopted - 61 yes 46 no.

men and the Town Meeting on policies and standards concerning all matters having to do with public and private ways within the Town, to present an annual report to the Annual Town Meeting, said report to be published in the Annual Town Report, or take any other action relative thereto. (By Petition)

Mr. Charles Frary moved the article, Mrs. DeMaggio seconded. Mrs. D. Powell amended the article to read ELECTED instead of appointed. Mr. Post further amended that all 6 appointees be for one year then in March 1980 they be elected as in the article. Mrs. Frances Newman seconded. Mr. Frary accepted the amendment. Motion adopted by voice vote.

persons under Section 8 of the U. S. Housing Act of 1937 as amended, for the following accommodations; existing standard housing, five dwelling units.

Mr. Perry Richardson moved the article, Mr. Post seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 50 To see if the Town of Northwood will allow the sale of single grave sites in the Pine Grove Cemetery, the price to be \$85.00 - \$35.00 for the lot and \$50.00 for perpetual care.

Mrs. Post moved the article, Mr. Post seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 51 To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the sale of 1/4 lots in the Pine Grove Cemetery.

Mr. Post moved the article, Mrs. Post seconded. Passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 52 To transact any other business that legally may come before said meeting.

"WHEREAS, this Town Meeting has had to struggle with numerous regular Articles and Articles by petition concerning Town Roads, and

WHEREAS, such information or explanation of plans was not previously available or was not made available or published by Town officers or Committees having the information, prior to Town Meeting,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, and it hereby is resolved:

That the permanent Town Roads Committee created under Article 44 of the 1979 Northwood Town Warrant shall annually prepare recommendations to the Selectmen and to the Town Meeting covering plans, costs and priorities for highway construction, reconstruction and repair on Class V highways for each year, and plans and priorities for two years in advance thereof, following a public hearing or hearings on the same, sufficiently in advance of Annual Budget Committee meetings so that said Budget Committee and the public may have input and a clear idea of town highway construction plans, costs and objectives before any necessary voting thereon may be required, and, further,

That said Town Roads Committee shall also recommend to the Selectmen and to the Town Meeting, in said reports annually covering plans and objectives, those parts of town ways, or entire ways, within the town that shall be given protection and minimum alterations in any public works programs, that their scenic-type character may be preserved, in accordance with Northwood Town Plan recommendations."

Passed by voice vote.

Mr. Donald Post made the following motion:

"I move that the Selectmen be instructed to prepare instructions which delineate the total and correct procedures that town citizens must comply with in order to:

- A. Enter a petition for consideration in the Town Warrant
- B. Upgrade a road from one standard to another
- C. Effect a repair to a road
- D. Have a private road accepted as a town road
- E. Other subjects which arouse controversy and when such instructions would benefit the citizens

Where applicable the instructions shall include application forms, samples of format and any other data which the citizen is required to comply with in any of the above situations. Copy of which to be presented to citizens on request."

Passed by voice vote.

Mr. Newman asked Mr. Lidback if there would be legal loopholes again this year. Mr. Lidback said "Yes, there'll be legal problems." Mr. Newman asked that they give some preference to the vote of the town.

Mrs. Bailey asked Mr. Chesley, the new Selectman, what he intends to do about it. Mr. Chesley said his sympathy is for these people who showed today their desires, but cannot say what the law will allow him to do.

Mr. Robert Bailey moved to adjourn the meeting. Adjourned at 6:25 P.M.

## REPORT OF THE NORTHWOOD HIGHWAY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The following is a summary of the work that was accomplished on Town roads in 1979.

1. Graded and raked all gravel roads, including Bryant Road and Newman Road.
2. Regraveled Robert Merrill Road.
3. Shimmed all rough or broken areas on Jenness Pond Road.
4. Rebuilt Ridge Road from Route 4 to Caverly's trailer. Put new asphalt surface on Ridge Road from Route 4 to intersection of Sky Farm Road.
5. Rebuilt Ridge Road from White Farm to intersection of Tasker Hill Road. This was a relocated stretch of road 1,000 feet long.
6. Shimmed and put new asphalt surface on Cross Road from Polings to Murray Small's.
7. Shimmed corner at Bennett Road and rebuilt gravel portion of Bennett Road to Abbott Development.
8. New asphalt surface on Upper Bow Street - Joe Lovely's to end of road.
9. New asphalt surface on Lower Bow Street.
10. Shimmed and put asphalt surface on 341 feet of East end of Green Street. Reshaped Green Street Extension.
11. Shimmed deteriorated areas on Lucas Pond Road and Mountain Road.
12. Rebuilt and upgraded from Class 6 to Class 5 460 feet from Grondin driveway North.
13. Improved section of Upper Deerfield Road from Mountain Road to Route 43, by removing rocks, installing one culvert and graveling.
14. Widened and regraveled section from Upper Deerfield Road to Carl Welsh residence.
15. Reset culvert on Bow Lake Road.
16. Reset culvert on Pender Hill Road.
17. Shimmed deteriorated areas on Blake's Hill Road.
18. Prepared Town Hall drive for new hot top surface.
19. Graveled police station driveway.

The Committee recommends that the following road improvements be scheduled for 1980.

1. Rebuild and surface 792 feet on Gulf Road from existing surface to first intersection. (End of Town Road)
2. Surface entrance from Harvey Lake Estates to Route 4. Approximately 30 feet long.
3. Surface new road from White Farm to Poling. 3,000 feet.
4. New asphalt surface from existing surface on Mountain Road to Route 43, 4,750 feet long.
5. Improve sections of Harmony Road from Rte. 4 to Allard driveway.
6. Improve sections of Harmony Road from Blake's Hill Road to Thomas residence.
7. Improve Lower Deerfield Road.
8. Replace 3' x 10' culvert West Street.
9. Surface (tar) Jeffrey Drive. 792 feet.
10. Resurface Ridge Road from Sky Farm Road intersection to White's Farm. 2,640 feet.
11. Resurface Blake's Hill Road from Rte. 4 to Wallman's Corner. 9,240 feet.
12. Mix 1,000 cu. yds. patch.
13. Shim and surface Gulf Road from Town Line to gravel section, 4,488 feet.

Over 21,000 items from the James E. Bryant Library in Northwood Narrows and the Chesley Memorial Library, East Northwood have been borrowed by the residents of Northwood in 1979. There have been 927 new titles added to the collections through purchase and donation.

The librarian, Miss Gladys Gardner, scheduled 22 children's film programs which attracted more than 400 individuals to the libraries. There have been 45 programs of craft instruction for children at the Bryant Library with an average attendance of 15 at each session. Miss Gardner also arranged a variety of exhibits at the libraries throughout the year.

Physical improvements to the buildings include a steel bulkhead at the Bryant Library and the installation of insulation in the ceiling of the Bryant Library. These improvements were made possible through the income from the Freemont Swain Fund and the James E. Bryant Fund. Sheet plastic was installed over the basement windows of both libraries.

Miss Gardner attended six professional meetings or workshops during the year. Members of the Board of Trustees attended the State Library Trustee Association meetings and two Library Public Relations Workshops.

## 1979 CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

Soils survey maps of the Town were completed and the Town now has a fairly complete set of Land Use and Resource maps that will aid the Town Officials and the Planning Board in their work of supplying information on building sites to prospective builders. Charles Frary spent many hours on this project and obtained help from a UNH Senior, Ann Sales, and the Strafford Regional Planning Commission.

The Commission sponsored a meeting with speakers on the importance of retaining Agricultural Land in Northwood and in the State. There is an increasing awareness that, before the turn of the Century, Northwood and the State will have to provide a greater share of the food for its population.

The Commission has been in contact with the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission relative to surveys of the Lakes in Northwood concerning their ecological status and has been informed that funds have been obtained and appropriated for a 1980 survey of at least one lake.

An Arbor Day was sponsored and held on May 8, 1979, under the direction of Nancy Villamil, Eleanor Byrne and Nathalie Wall. A "Copper Maple", provided through a donation from the Harvey Lake Woman's Club, was set in the open area in front of the Northwood Elementary School by Grades 1 - 5, with the assistance of Paul Colby - Northwood Fire Warden, and Charles Frary.

This tree was a replacement for a memorial evergreen planted about 1964 in the same general area in the name of Alfred Parsons, an Elementary School student who succumbed to cancer. He was the son of Dale Parsons and grandson of Alfred Bartlett. The earlier tree had been badly damaged by snow and broken, and had been removed.

A program of future plantings, based on the shrubs attractive to birds that now stand, well developed, in the school tree nursery after three years growth, is being planned by Mr. John Bresnahan, Science teacher, and Mr. Stanley Knowles, Rockingham County Forester, NHCES, Brentwood, together with the help of the Northwood Conservation Commission and interested persons. Additional assistance to the school nature program, with emphasis on the Nature Trail, is also being offered. A list of plants and trees along the trail is being prepared as a first step in this plan, which will also receive assistance from NHCES.

A poster contest in grades 1 - 5, arranged by Eleanor Byrne and Nathalie Wall, of the Conservation Commission, preceded the Arbor Day program.

The Commission is pursuing the possibility of State and Federal Aid to develop Town owned land for greater use by the citizens of Northwood.

# RURAL DISTRICT HEALTH COUNCIL, INC.

## ANNUAL REPORT

1979

During the past year the Rural District Health Council has continued to provide Home Health Care for the sick, and preventive medicine to the youth of today who will be healthier leaders tomorrow.

The Rural District Health Council continues to qualify as a certified Home Health Agency, implementing procedures to continue to provide quality care.

The priority service is the care of the sick program which provides nursing care in the home by the professional nurses. This year the Agency has negotiated contracts to provide occupational and speech therapy as well as physical therapy to its member towns. Also included in this program is the home health aide services through the contract with the Strafford County Homemaker, Home Health Aide Association, covering Strafford County, and the Portsmouth Area Homemaker, Home Health Aide Association, covering Rockingham County. The Council also employs two part time home health aides, Gail LaRosa and Rene' Wormell. This enables the Council to better utilize the professional staff while continuing to provide quality care.

The care of the sick program has provided 4,989 combined visits to its member towns from January, 1979 - October 31, 1979.

The agency's staff also conducts Elderly Health Screening Programs on Wednesday. Adults from the member towns are welcome to attend any of these screenings. They are held on Wednesdays.

The first and third Wednesdays it is held in Farmington and the second in Northwood, while the fourth is in Milton. This program is provided with no charge to the patient and includes blood pressure checks, diabetes and anemia screenings, nutrition counseling for special diets and weight control. The program has provided services to 601 patients with 77 new patients enrolled and 41 referrals made.

The Child Health Program is an active program with 821 children enrolled. Arlene Thorne, R.N., coordinator of the program, and Paula Davis, R.N., clinic nurse, have conducted 54 clinics from January 1979 - October 31, 1979. This program is offered to all children from any of the member towns, and includes physical examinations, immunizations, teaching and counseling for ages 0 - 6 years.

A Dental Program is held for children ages 3 - 6 years which includes cleaning and fluoride treatments twice a year with referrals to local Dentists for follow-up care when needed. It is funded by the Division of Public Health, Bureau of Pre-School Dental services. The program provided service to 420 children.



The Child Health Program has provided 126 visits to new born babies, and 891 home visits to assure continuity of care. School children are always welcomed for immunization. The program is funded in part by the U.S. Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare, N.H. Division of Public Health, Bureau of Maternal & Child Health grant, and the Rural District Health Council.

A space within the Rural District Health Council office is provided for the distribution of vouchers from the Supplemental Food and Nutrition Education Program for Women, Infants, and Children. (WIC) in conjunction with the Strafford County Pre-natal Family Planning Program, Inc. The program provided service to 216 children from ages 0 -5 years. The foods supplied are formula, dairy products, fruit juices and cereals.

The Rural District Health Council with the cooperation of Frisbie Memorial Hospital provides a discharge referral coordinator who assists the Social Service Dept. at the hospital and the patients physician to continue care when needed from the hospital to the patient's home. The hospital funds this program in part with the Council. 175 referrals have been made.

The strength of the Council lies with the dedicated staff who are; Mary Timmons, R.N., Supervisor, Arlene Thorne, R.N., Maternal and Child Health Coordinator, Paula Davis, R.N., clinic nurse for the Child Health Program and Coordinator for the Elderly Screening Program, Jean Germer, R.N., B.A., Referral Coordinator. Staff nurses are: Barbara Drew, R.N., Betty Coons, R.N., Myrtle Walsh, R.N., and Alice Ziegra, R.N., BSN. This year the agency hired Joan Menez, LPN. Gail LaRosa and Renee' Wormell are Home Health Aides. Carl Scholl is Registered Physical Therapist, Susan Emerson, Occupational Therapy, and Ruth Cullinane, Speech Therapist. Eleanor Eaton and Junellen Chase efficiently handle the office duties.

The Agency this past year has experienced a decrease in the full payment visit. Because of this the service fee income has shown a marked decline and has placed the agency in a financial bind. In order for the Council to continue to provide these many services to its member towns it will be necessary to increase the per capita to \$3.20.

Good health is a basic ingredient of a satisfactory life for all people. For older Americans this goal is more difficult to attain and maintain than for the remainder of the population.

During the past year the Council has made for your town 231 skilled nursing visits, 63 home health aide visits, 209 therapy visits, 74 child health home visits, and 159 children have attended the Child Health Program.

# NEWMARKET REGIONAL HEALTH CENTER

## TOWN REPORT

1979

The Newmarket Regional Health Center has made great strides in 1979 towards improving services for the residents of Northwood. The number of people utilizing the services offered by the Center continues to grow at a rapid rate. Over 20,000 rides were provided by the Senior Citizen Transportation Service in 1979, an increase of 5,000 rides over the previous year. Following our move to a new and expanded facility, our utilization of medical services has increased 38% over the 1978 utilization level. In addition to the medical services provided by the Center, there has also been a significant increase in preventive and community health services.

In November of 1978, the Center moved its base of operations from its crowded second floor location on Main Street to a newly-renovated building on 14 Elm Street. The building is ideal, being centrally located with ample parking space for patients and staff. All of the Center's services are located on the first floor, and are easily accessible to handicapped individuals through the use of a wheelchair ramp. The medical clinic has expanded to include four fully-equipped examination rooms (three adult and one pediatric), separate laboratory facilities, a counseling room, receptionist's station, and extra waiting room space.

The Center's medical services are provided by Sarah Oxnard, M.D., Mr. Michael Lewis, a Registered Physician's Assistant, and Ann Morgan, a Nurse Practitioner. The medical team also includes a nurse and a Health Aide who performs the bulk of laboratory procedures at the Center, both of whom assist the physician and physician's assistant. The Center's Community Health Workers work closely with the Medical Staff to ensure the appropriate continuity of care for its diverse patient population. In addition, they coordinate preventive screening clinics to detect potential health hazards, hold information workshops open to the public, and act as a liason between the medical provider and the patient. To make a medical appointment, call the Center at 659-3106 or toll-free at 1-800-582-7279.

The Senior Citizen Transportation Service provides regularly scheduled bus service for the elderly of Northwood and other area communities. Transportation to medical and dental care, social services, food and clothes shopping, and day-long excursions to social events are but a few of the many activities available to seniors. LAMPREY REGIONAL SOLID WASTE COOPERATIVE  
PROGRESS REPORT  
1979-80

Since our report to you at the time of your 1979 Town Meeting, the Cooperative, through the strong efforts of its representative members from each town, has made outstanding progress.

In May of 1979 the Cooperative obtained bids from pre-qualified suppliers of incinerator-energy recovery systems for the design, manufacture, and installation of three 36-ton-per-day incinerators and two integrated boiler systems for the production of steam to be sold to the University of New Hampshire, to supply a portion of their steam requirements in lieu of the conventional oil-produced heating medium. Consumat Systems, Inc., of Richmond, Virginia, was awarded the contract for the complete incineration-energy recovery portion of the project. This company is the largest and most advanced one of its kind known to us in the United States, with an excellent record of quality and performance. Their contract calls for a step or a phased schedule of delivery and installation towards a start-up date scheduled for late spring of 1980. They have continuously maintained the established timetable and we anticipate no problem in meeting start-up dates, weather and acts beyond their control permitting.

In mid-summer, upon completion of a major contract involving the relocation of the entire University of New Hampshire Power Supply & Transformer System to make way for the Cooperative's plant, a contract was awarded to Griffin Construction Company, Inc., for the site development and building construction portion of the project. This contract was developed in close coordination and for integration with Consumat's work to the end that all elements of both projects be completed as required to place the plan in operation efficiently and economically in the best interest of the Cooperative. Although the site development contract was delayed approximately three weeks by serious unanticipated foundation problems, every effort by the contracting party and the Cooperative's management is expected to effect sufficient completion of the project to meet the scheduled start-up operation.

Although every effort was made by the Cooperative to anticipate the overall costs of the project, a number of events have occurred which have increased the capital costs of the project since the original estimates were made in late '77 and early '78. Two towns joined the Cooperative (Epping and Rollinsford), giving us an increased tonnage of waste to be handled. To provide the capacity to accept the estimated refuse generated by the 12 towns, to build in a growth reserve capacity, and at the same time maintain a safety stand-by incinerator for maintenance and emergency purposes, the Cooperative specified three 36-ton-per-day incinerators rather than the three 25-ton units on which the original estimates were based. With bids taken on all elements of the project during mid-year 1979, virtually at the height of the national inflationary spiral, all costs have substantially increased. As a result, the estimated capital cost of all elements of the project is now estimated to be approximately 3.3 million dollars. Despite this major increase in capital costs, the Cooperative, through judicious management and investment of available funds,

has been able to move ahead on its scheduled plan for construction of the plant, with only the additional bonding of \$450,000. This additional capital investment, which the Town of Durham is being asked to loan the Cooperative, as in the case of the initial bond issue, has been offset completely by the increase in the price of fuel oil and the resulting estimated increase in revenues returned from the sale of steam, such that no increase in the tipping fee is projected. In fact, with reasonable control on the operating costs of the plant, any increase in the price of oil could improve the tipping fee (cost per ton of refuse handled) for each town. While a \$10 per ton tipping fee has been used in projecting your town's share for budgeting purposes for the last six months of 1980, when we expect to be burning your refuse, the Cooperative does not expect any increase in this cost per ton if oil prices stay as they are, or increase.

Continuing inspections are being made of the facilities being produced by Consumat, and we are confident that the units which we have selected will perform in accordance with our planned production program. Although our system is designed to handle all types of residential waste, including glass, the Cooperative members voted unanimously to encourage the removal of glass at its source, either through recycling or local disposal as land fill. Glass is nonproductive as a source of heat and in fact does detract from the heat quality of the refuse burned, and it is estimated that there may be a net savings to all of the communities in the Cooperative to remove the glass and dispose of it locally rather than to transport it to the Cooperative's plant, process it as a part of the tonnage cost, and then dispose of it. The Cooperative's staff is working with the member towns to assist in such a program wherever possible.

The Directors of the Cooperative wish to express their deep appreciation for the assistance given its efforts by the officers and staff of the University System, and the University of New Hampshire, as well as the officers and staff of all the cooperating towns. Every effort will be made through continuing correspondence and news releases to keep all of the residents of the twelve towns informed of the progress in the development of their solid waste disposal and energy recovery plant.

## REPORT OF THE NORTHWOOD PLANNING BOARD

During 1979 the Northwood Planning Board issued 106 building permits for requests ranging from new house construction to chicken coops. Five hearings were held on requests for subdivisions within the Town and under the provisions of R.S.A. 31:63a, three hearings were held concerning new ordinances for the Town of Northwood.

The first ordinance proposed is to control the dumping of hazardous waste within the Town limits and the second would authorize the Northwood Building Inspector to issue building permits. The requirement for a Building Inspector became apparent upon receipt of the New Hampshire Energy Code, effective in August 1979, concerning energy conservation in new building construction and requiring approval of the Governor's Energy Council. With a Building Inspector assuming the duty of issuing building permits, the Planning Board can concentrate on town planning and implementation of the Town Plan.

The third ordinance, proposed jointly by the Planning Board and Conservation Commission, is to insure proper utilization of wetlands within the Town of Northwood.

During development of the Town Plan, citizens of Northwood indicated a desire for restrictions on the number and location of mobile homes. Without appropriate ordinances the Planning Board is limited in the actions it can take. During 1979, 20 building permits concerning installation of mobile homes in Northwood were processed.

After appropriate hearings, the Planning Board adopted on March 22, 1979, comprehensive subdivision regulations for the Town. Application of these regulations will guide development and utilization of Northwood's land resources in a reasonable and responsible manner.

Half-way through the year the Planning Board lost their CETA Town Planner and her assistant. Their daily attention to the business of Town Planning is sorely missed.

## NORTHWOOD FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The year 1979 was an extremely busy year for the Northwood Fire Department with both the number of calls and the number of major structural fires continuing to increase. In 1979, the Department responded to a total of 157 fire calls as compared to 107 in 1978 and 73 in 1977. The Fire Department donated over 4,730 man hours of actual firefighting during 1979 which does not include hours spent training, or maintaining equipment, or upkeep of the stations.

The number of structural fires increased from 12 in 1978 to 16 for 1979 and a dangerous trend of wood stove related fires appears to be taking place. A number of the major structural fires could have resulted in serious loss of life.

The recent trend of burning wood is potentially hazardous and extreme care should be utilized if you burn wood. It is important that you keep your chimney clean and inspect your installations carefully.

A serious major fire at Lake Shore Farm resulted in the safe, efficient handling of a situation that could have been a major catastrophe. The evacuation of the Resort and control of a crowd of 3,000 spectators without any injuries is a testimony to your Fire Department as was the fact guests were able to stay at the Resort the night of the fire.

The benefits of the Capitol Area Mutual Aid Fire Compact system of dispatching and mutual aid were truly proven in 1979. We received mutual aid 69 times and gave mutual aid 39 times during 1979.

The Fire Department is made of 25 of your neighbors who donate their time out of dedication and service to helping all. It should be noted that none of the Fire Department members receive any money nor reimbursement for expenses. In addition to the 4,730 hours spent fighting fires additional time was spent on training and maintenance of equipment.

The Fire Department has continued their program of improving the fire protection for the community. The Department placed in service 1,000 feet of 4 inch hose which serves as a "water main" in the event of major fires. The training program has continued to be aggressive with monthly and special training sessions. In 1979, we continued to send more firefighters than ever to fire school.

The Army Reserves have improved three fire ponds in town and installed a new dry hydrant on Route 107. We intended to install two additional dry hydrants but were unable to complete the project due to the unusually wet Fall.

The increased number of calls has taken its toll on our equipment. We have lost a 1952 tanker therefore placing a tremendous strain on our 1962 tanker. The Department has spent considerable hours preparing specifications for a new fire engine. The purchase of a new engine is vital if the Department is to be able to provide the fire protection that the people of Northwood deserve.

I would like to thank the officers and firefighters of the Fire Department who have given so unselfishly of their time. I thank the wives and families of the Fire Department for their support and understanding. I also thank the people of Northwood who have continually supported us both financially and morally.

REPORT TO TOWNS

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Prevention and control of forest fires is handled through a cooperative effort between town/city fire organizations and the State Forest Fire Service.

Since 1903, when the first forest fire laws were passed by our Legislature, the State Forester has appointed someone in each municipality as a Forest Fire Warden and charged him with the responsibility of forest fire prevention and control within his town/city. This person may ask the State Forester to appoint as many Deputy Forest Fire Wardens as may be necessary to efficiently carry out his charge.

The State Forester has divided the State into ten forest fire districts with a full time District Forest Fire Chief in each district. The State organization is charged with assisting the municipal forest fire organization in any way possible.

State personnel conduct fire training schools, assist with forest fire suppression, fire cause investigation, prosecution of fire law violators and forest fire prevention programs. Forest fire suppression equipment is purchased through State bulk purchasing ability and sold to local forest fire organizations at one-half cost. Excess military property is obtained and turned over to town/city fire departments at no cost to local departments for conversion into fire suppression units. This cooperative arrangement between State and municipality has resulted in one of the best forest fire records in the United States with less than one-half acre of woodland burned in each fire reported.

1979 SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING REPORT  
March 10, 1979

The annual School District meeting was called to order at 1:20 P.M. at the Northwood Elementary School, by Moderator Robert Johnson. The warrant was read by Mr. Johnson, and then Mr. James Bennett, Chairman of the School Board, introduced Mr. Bernard Davis, Assistant Superintendent of Schools.

ARTICLE 1 To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto. Mr. Bennett moved that this article be accepted. Mr. Andrew J. Lane seconded and it was voted on and passed.

ARTICLE 2 To choose agents and committess in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. Mr. Donald Post, Chairman of the Budget Committee, moved that Article 2 be indefinitely postponed. This was voted on and passed.

ARTICLE 3 To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

Mr. Post had stated that the School Board had done an excellent job in presenting the budget to the Committee, and it was felt that it would be accepted in full by the Budget Committee. He was asked to present each line item, separately.

Line items: 100-Administration, passed, 200-Instruction, passed, 300-Attendance Services, passed, 400-Health Services, passed, 500-Pupil Transportation, passed, 600-Operation of Plant, (Salaries of \$9,500.00 be combined with \$400.00, Contracted Services, totaling \$9,900.00), 700-Maintenance of Plant was increased \$400.00 to \$11,591.00, 850-Fixed Charges was reduced \$9,017.00 to \$24,229.00 for employee retirement and F.I.C.A., 900-Lunch and Special Milk Program, passed, 1000-Student Body Activities, 1100-Community Activities, 1200-Capital Outlay, 1300-Debt Service, all passed. 1477-Outgoing Transfer Accounts in State Tuition, Mr. Robert Bailey asked for a breakdown. Mr. Bennett explained the State average per pupil, last year, \$1344.00. After much discussion, Joann Bailey asked for an accounting from Coe-Brown Academy. Mr. Robert Bailey moved "we limit the tuition per pupil, at Coe-Brown Academy to a 7% increase over last year, so that the tuition \$1438.00 per pupil". This was seconded by Joann Bailey. Mr. Robert Johnson wished to speak on this subject, so stepped down, as Moderator, and appointed Andrew John Lane to chair the meeting on this article. Mr. Johnson explained, briefly some of the increases, such as an increase in teachers' salaries. Joann Bailey asked Mr. Johnson, "where did the funds come from for repairs of the old house?" Robert Johnson explained "from our endowment fund." Robert Bailey called for Yes No ballots. Mr. Bennett wanted to amend the amendment by including all schools (for a 7% limited increase). Joann Bailey stated, "Why do we drag other schools into this, we want promises kept by Coe-Brown." After much discussion, Mr. Bennett withdrew his motion, but asked for Coe-Brown Academy accounting be made public, not just for the School Board. A YES NO ballot vote was taken on the amendment to limit Coe-Brown to \$1438.00 per pupil. 41 votes were cast 26 YES 15 NO. Amendment passed.

A vote on the main motion for \$202,404.00 for tuition was passed with a verbal Yes vote. Mr. Bennett asked for \$18,450.00 for transportation, this was approved.

ARTICLE 4 To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive and expend in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or state agencies; private agencies and/or other sources. Mr. Bennett asked that Article 4 be tabled and that we take up Article 6, and go back to Article 5.

ARTICLE 6 To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand eight hundred fifty dollars (\$5,850.00) for a contingency fund as provided by the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 198:46. A motion was made by Mr. Bennett that we accept this article as read. Seconded. Voted and accepted.

ARTICLE 5 To see if the District will vote to appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five thousand (\$5,000.00) from the unencumbered balance at the end of the 1978-79 fiscal year. Said sum of money is to be deposited in a Capital reserve fund in accordance with the provisions of R.S.A. 35 for the purpose of financing all or part of the cost of new construction for the School District. A motion was made that this article be accepted as read by Mr. Bennett. Seconded by Jean Johnson. Mr. Lane asked how much is in the fund now. Mr. Bennett said that there is about \$10,000.00. A verbal vote was taken and the article was passed.

ARTICLE 7 To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to appoint a planning committee to explore the possibility of entering into a long term tuition contract for the seventh and eighth grade pupils with a Cooperative School District in the event such a district is formed by surrounding communities. Said committee to report to the District at the next School District Meeting. Mr. Post moved to amend this article "to include the possibility of the 9th grade." "The Northwood members be instructed to encourage the inclusion of some of the committees of the other towns." Mrs. Behm asked if we could have a study committee for "keeping our children in town". She made this a motion. This was a verbal vote and accepted. Now, we will vote on the amendment of Mr. Post. A verbal vote was taken and passed. Mrs. Marion Knox asked if we were going to take up Article 4 which was tabled.

ARTICLE 4 A verbal vote was taken and the Article was passed.

ARTICLE 8 To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting. It was voted to adjourn the meeting at 4:15 P.M. Mr. Johnson praised Mr. Tom Conway, Principal for his dedication to the School and children and for his guidance of the Elementary School children.

As was stated in this report last year, School Administrative Unit #44 has as one of its priorities the implementation of the New Hampshire Accountability Plan. The purpose of this Plan is to review the educational programs of all districts in order to insure that the current curriculum, teaching techniques and testing procedures are providing an acceptable curriculum for our children. Faculty curriculum efforts in the areas of Social Studies and Science from throughout School Administrative Unit #44 were revised and consolidated this past summer by an Accountability Curriculum Committee composed of teachers from the various school districts. Eleanor Loewer and Barbara Fraser served on this Committee as the teacher representatives from the Northwood School District. With the completion of the Science and Social Studies elements we have completed a standard core curriculum in the basic subject matter areas for use throughout the entire School Administrative Unit. The presence of a core curriculum should assist our beginning teachers and increase the ability of all teachers to focus on the development of basic skills in all of our pupils.

Special Education continues to be a course of concern as Federal and State law continue to mandate the development of programs while leaving the bulk of the responsibility for financing such programs on the local property tax. Northwood should be commended for the progress and financial effort that it has demonstrated during the past several years to provide for children with special needs. While I am very aware and sensitive to the needs of children with special needs and the importance to provide adequate classroom space and instructional programs, the local property tax can no longer be expected to bear the full weight of the burden. I would strongly recommend that Northwood citizens encourage their representatives to seek passage of legislation at the State level which would place the burden of financing these programs on the State through the passage of a property "tax cap". As I stated above, if the Federal and State governments are going to mandate these programs they should provide local school districts with sufficient funds with which to finance such programs.

As I view the coming school year I see the following as major needs of the system: 1) continued study concerning the feasibility of some form of regional high school arrangement; 2) additional space for such support programs as reading and special education and 3) expansion of the part-time art program.

In addition to such normal responsibilities and functions as providing assistance and support in the areas of curriculum development, teacher selection and supervision, and preparing Federal and State reports, this Office has been working closely with your School Board to initiate the new school financial accounting system referred to as Financial Account Classification Handbook II Revised which is required by the State effective July 1, 1980. The Superintendent's Office has also been active in attempting to obtain Federal funds under the National Energy Act for the specific purpose of enabling the School Board to institute energy efficient measures in the schools.

In summary, we wish to express our appreciation to the members of the School Board, the teachers, pupils and citizens for the cooperation exhibited during the past year. We look forward to a long and productive relationship in which our mutual goals will continue to be the best possible education for our young people.

## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Northwood School Board and Citizens of Northwood:

The main thrust of our program for the past year has been to establish a set curriculum for all subjects in grades 1 thru 8.

The idea behind this movement is to tie together the accountability program for Union #44 with our own curriculum. Students will be evaluated on this curriculum each year, and hopefully this will be a means for our being sure all students reach the goals that have been established for the accountability model.

Along with this approach, we have instituted a Remedial Reading program. This is a program that we have needed to help our students who have difficulty in the area of Reading. Mrs. Jane Weiland is our Remedial Reading teacher.

Enrollment at the school has increased dramatically this year. Last year at this time, we had 275 pupils. At the present time, the enrollment is 312 students as follows:

This indicates that we have some serious scheduling problems coming up next year. We feel that next year, the enrollment will be in the 326-335 range.

Presently we have on the staff 13 classroom teachers; 2 full-time specialists: Reading and Special Education; 3 part-time specialists: Speech, Music, and Art; 2 Aides; 1 Title I Reading Aide; and 1 School Nurse.

New teachers to our system this year are:

Miss Jory Sivin, Grade 4  
Mrs. Linda Bouchard, Art  
Mr. George Loper, Music  
Mrs. Marjorie Morrison, Title I Reading Aide

One area of concern over the past few years has been the handwriting of the students, and one of our goals for this year was to have all teachers work on improving the students' handwriting. We have contracted the Rinehart Handwriting Systems to come to school every six weeks to instruct not only the students but the teachers in their program. We have been very pleased with the rapid improvement of our students.

The results of our S.R.A. achievement tests showed that again our youngsters are working well above the national norms and also

are one of the leaders in our Union #44. We are very satisfied with these results. These tests are used to pinpoint areas where more concentration should be stressed. One area that has been very high in the past few years has been our math scores. Since we returned to the basics in our math program, these results have changed dramatically.

Our extra curricular programs have been very successful. Over 100 students were involved in our fall Soccer program for grades 3 thru 8. Again our boys and girls were outstanding in their league play. The boys' teams were undefeated, and our girls lost only two games. The students have a great deal of pride in their school, and they have always made us proud of them whether they win or lose. Our basketball program is now underway, and again we have a large number of boys and girls involved.

The music program is still very active. Our new Director, Mr. Loper, has added new classes and updated the music which the students really enjoy.

Because of space problems, we have been forced to curtail our mini-courses. The students miss these programs and we hope to be able to institute them again in the near future.

In closing, I would like to thank the citizens of Northwood on behalf of the staff at the school as well as myself for their continued support of all of our programs. These programs cannot be successful unless the home and school work together as a team to provide quality education for the students of Northwood. Also, I would like to express my thanks to the Supervisory Union for their continued support. Mr. Barry Clough, Superintendent of Schools, and Mr. Bernard Davis, Assistant Superintendent, are always available for help and guidance when needed. Finally, a special thanks to the Northwood School Board who are always supportive of the school, and their time and dedication is many times overlooked.

## SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES - 1978-1979

### DENTAL PROGRAMS

Ten students received dental care through Northwood Matching Funds. This money was made available through very generous contributions from the Harvey Lake Women's Club, Saddleback Mountain Lions Club and many local organizations. Dr. David Gruette was the participating dentist. Through a program sponsored by the N. H. Bureau of Dental Health, all students in grades 1 thru 5 were given the opportunity to participate in a daily dry brushing program and weekly fluoride rinse program. One hundred and twenty students participated in the dental cleaning and fluoride clinic held in September.

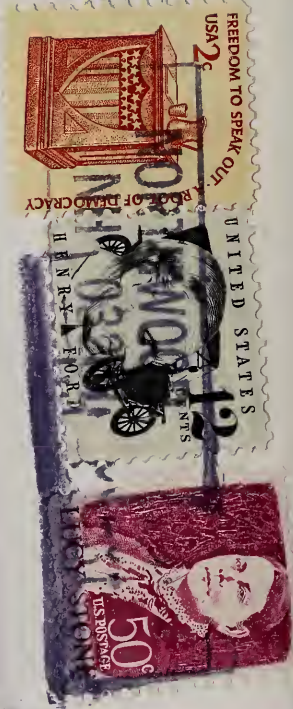
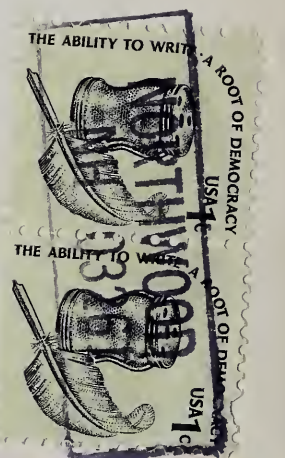








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
