RUTH M. LORING

This year we are pleased to dedicate the town report to Ruth M. Loring whose work as teacher, historian, and civic leader, has helped to enrich the lives of Ossipee citizens.

Ruth Mitchell was born in Campton, New Hampshire, and after attending Plymouth State College, accepted her first teaching job in a one room schoolhouse in Colebrook, N.H. in 1937. As she will tell anyone who inquires about those days, it was quite an introduction to the teaching profession with 38 students that first year!

Ruth accepted a teaching position in Ossipee for the school year of 1938-39, and taught at the old Ossipee Central School for four years. It was during these years that she became active in her church and many other organizations to which she still gives her time and energy.

In 1940, Ruth married Robert Loring. They had two children, Rusty and Helen. There are seven grandchildren. Rob died in 1971.

In 1942 Ruth put her teaching career on hold and became the local clerk of the ration board during the war effort. She held this position until 1946; and, although she did not immediately return

to teaching, Ruth was a reliable substitute for several years in both Ossipee and Freedom.

Ruth has long been associated with the Moultonville Methodist Church where she was superintendent and teacher of the Sunday School for more than twenty five years. Each election day the church has a bake sale at town hall. Ruth is always there tempting you to buy another cupcake or two.

Among the other organizations Ruth has been active in the Center Ossipee Women's Club, the Ossipee Lake Grange, and the 4-H. Ruth's work in 4-H covered just about everything from livestock, gardening and canning, to crafts. She once received special recognition as having taught over 100 girls to sew.

The Ossipee Historical Society has had an active and dedicated member in Ruth, who has held every office in the society (possibly more than once!). She is currently treasurer and curator. Ruth's interest and numerous activities in the historical society have resulted in her recognition as the leading authority on the history of Ossipee. But here, as always, Ruth is primarily a teacher: "History is a living thing. I want children to understand what history means and to understand their place in it," she says. Ruth has provided invaluable assistance to the writing of several books on local history. She is recognized by her peers throughout the state, and is currently president of the Association of New Hampshire Historical Societies, and president of the New Hampshire Old Graveyards Association.

In addition to the historical society, Ruth has long worked to promote the Ossipee Public Library. She has been a trustee of the library since 1979, and has played a key role in proposing the current library expansion plan.

In 1961 Ruth returned to teaching full time in Freedom. In 1964 she returned as a teacher at the Ossipee Central School and remained there until her retirement in 1983. It must be quickly added, however, that Ruth is not actually retired. Surely, no one could imagine it. Her interests and charitable work keep her as busy as ever. In fact, in recent years she even discovered a pleasant new career -- that of grandmother.

Ruth, on behalf of the townspeople, thank you for all of the many things you have done -- and continue to do -- to make Ossipee a better place. Keep teaching us.

Pastor John Aron lead us in prayer and our Moderator in the Salute to the Flag.

The Moderator asked non-voters to stand and be recognized. He also asked for a motion to allow our Town Manager, Town Council, Chief of Police and Joan Rogers to have permission to speak if desired during the meeting, approved.

Article 2. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the ensuing year the following sums of money for the purposes of:

The above was read by the moderator and opened to discussion item by item.

Ivan Burnell inquired as to why Town Officers Expenses showed a 25-30% increase. This was Town Manager salary.

Town Officer Expense \$120,963.00

PASSED AS READ

Gerard Bergeron wanted to know why no sum was put in for building inspector. He then made a motion to put in \$10,000.00 for this. Douglas Meader said that this was out of order as we do not have any codes to enforce yet. The Town Manager spoke on the need for a Code Enforcement Officer. Mr. Meader quoted RSA's and said an Ordinance is not what is being presented, therefore, we cannot hire a Code Enforcement Officer. David Stevens asked why do we not make provision now for this instead of waiting? Atty. Grossman said we could not do this tonight we are only to consider the \$10,000.00 vote for code officer at this time. Richard Cogswell stressed the urgent need for enforcement of the codes. Atty. Grossman explained that we have certain elements that we could enforce now and that penalties would be not in effect immediately. The Town Mgr. explained that the Selectmen wanted to allow the time for the town to adjust to the new codes so they decided against charging penalties for the first year. Richard Morgan asked if the Fire Departments didn't cover the inspections of buildings now and at no compensation? David Helme explained that he as a Budget Committee Member voted against this position as he felt the original budget would have caused a 70% increase and this budget will have a 20% increase if this goes as read. Johannah Light asked who controlled what now? Town Mgr. said that we only have State Fire Codes to enforce at this time. She advised that the Code Enforcement Officers position is a revenue producing position and supported this article. General discussion continued for some time. The first vote taken by the ballot clerks was found to be inconsistent, therefore, a second vote was taken. Vote was 106 in favor and 125 not in favor. Motion to add \$10,000.00 was defeated.

Richard Morgan, member of our Police Department, spoke on the hazards and dangers within our town and that we cannot feel as safe as in the past. He requested that we add \$2,500.00 to the Police budget to provide our men with 6 bullet proof vests and for cameras needed. Motion was made and seconded to amend to increase the Police budget by \$2,500.00. Ivan Burnell asked what accounted for the increases in the Budget this year and Barry Rollins, Budget Committee Chmn., read the budget item by item. Call for vote showed a unanimous vote to add \$2,500.00 to the Police budget. Amendment Passed.

Eileen Leavitt, Trustee of the Library said that the State had suggested it be by a Warrant Article and that this money was raised in 1984.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,650.00 (one thousand six hundred and fifty dollars) to assist the Family Health Center. Submitted by Petition. (not recommended by the Budget Committee)

Elizabeth Rouner said that this program was supported by the Carroll County Mental Health Department and that it covered prenatal and postnatal care. This was a program for high risk mothers and asked for the towns support. Ivan Burnell asked why the Budget Committee did not approve this? The Budget Committees response was "this was another place that they felt they could cut and the town could decide what they wished to do." Motion made was voted on and it was passed.

ARTICLE 3 PASSED AS READ

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$550.00 (five hundred and fifty dollars) in support of Carroll County against Domestic Violence and Rape. (not recommended by the Budget Committee)

Rick Morgan and Mr. Cogswell commented on their concerns regarding domestic violence. Vote was taken.

ARTICLE 4 PASSED AS READ

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to establish a capital reserve fund under the provisions of RSA:35:1 for the purpose of purchasing a Police Cruiser and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 (seven thousand dollars) to be placed in this fund. (not recommended by the Budget Committee)

Gerard Powers said that he wished to amend this article to change purchase to lease. He said the County has gone to a lease program has found it to be a beneficial move. Douglas Meader advised this is the reason the Budget Committee didn't approve this article. Question was asked about the disposition of the old cruiser. The Town Manager felt that another Dept. may use it, namely the Code Enforcement Officer if elected. Concern over the value of a high mileage car surfaced. Douglas Meader moved that we amend this article to read \$3,500.00, it was seconded. Ralph Vacca moved that we pass as amended. Brief discussions followed. Atty. Grossman approved the amendment to change the amount from \$7,000.00 to \$3,500.00 and change the wording from purchase to lease. Vote to pass as amended passed.

ARTICLE 5 PASSED AS AMENDED

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000.00 (nine thousand dollars) for a revision of the preliminary closure plan for the Town Solid Waste Disposal Site to include; interim operations strategy and a new survey to be in compliance with current state regulations. (recommended by the Budget Committee)

Christopher Templeton, Chm. Board of Selectmen, made a motion to pass this as read as the State has mandated for us to do so. Motion seconded. Warren Witherell asked if the state has agreed that we can bury our ash. Have rules changed? Town Manager stated that the state has requested us to pass this and the budget committee is in agreement. Vote passed.

ARTICLE 6 PASSED AS READ

Article 7A. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 (five thousand dollars) to be added to the Rescue Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. (\$3,500.00 recommended by the Budget Committee)

Wayne Aleska moved to see if the town would support a long term plan. Peter Slusky wanted to know if waiting to do this would hurt and Wayne said he felt it would. Vote taken, passed.

ARTICLE 7A PASSED AS READ

Article 7B. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 (for thousand dollars) for Rescue Squad cardiac defibrillator, to be placed in Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. (recommended by the Budget Committee)

Wayne Aleska made a motion to amend this article to read: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the Rescue Squad Cardiac Defibrillator and to see if the town will further authorize the total expenditure of \$8,000.00, \$4,000.00 currently in Capital Reserve funds, plus the \$4,000.00 appropriation herein for the purchase of the Cardiac Defibrillator. Vote passed as amended.

ARTICLE 7B PASSED AS AMENDED

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00 (eight thousand dollars) for computer system enhancement. (not recommended by the Budget Committee)

Town Manager, Terese Clifford explained this enhancement would be for the present system. She anticipates future needs for two printers, two new terminals, a tiger link, multi sort capabilities and other items to improve our system. There is a 24-84 month finance plan available. Douglas Meader asked if the training cost of \$1,000.00 was included in this figure. Believe it was included with the new plans. Ivan Burnell then suggested that we deduct \$1,000.00 from the \$8,000.00 and amend the article to read \$7,000.00. Rick Cogswell favored the amendment. Peter Billings asked why we had decided to stay with Contel Systems after all the problems we have had in the past. Terese felt that we have been given new reassurance from Contel that the past problems will be resolved. Vote on Article as amended passed.

ARTICLE 8 PASSED AS AMENDED

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$98,000.00 for the purchase of (2) Dump Trucks for the

Highway Department, \$20,000.00 of said sum to be appropriated by current year taxation and the remaining \$78,000.00 over a five year period. (recommended by the Budget Committee)

Motion made and seconded to accept as read. Warren Witherell asked if we needed a bond issue. Council reassured us we did not, the article was proper. Many people asked questions as to the need of two vehicles. The Selectmen were asked to express their individual feelings on this article. Ralph Eldridge was in favor of purchasing two trucks, Christopher Templeton, Natalie Hall and the Town Manager were in favor of purchasing only one. Vote passed.

ARTICLE 9 PASSED AS READ

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,019.00 (eleven thousand and nineteen dollars) for energy improvements to be made to town buildings, \$5,510.00 (five thousand five hundred and ten dollars) to be secured from matching funds supplied by the state of New Hampshire. (recommended by the Budget Committee)

Gerard Bergeron wanted to know if the fire station in his precinct was included in these figures. Terese said no that his building was included in the audit but he would have had to apply in order to qualify for matching funds. Wayne Aleska asked what type of improvements were considered and it was explained that insulation, energy saving light bulbs etc. Rick Cogswell expressed support for this article. Vote was taken in favor.

ARTICLE 10 PASSED AS READ

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to rescind adoption of the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act. (originally voted in 1952, amended 1985) (submitted by petition)

Motion was made to move to indefinitely pass over by Warren Witherell. He expressed concern of eliminating the budget committee and wants to hold on to our committee. Vote was taken to indefinitely pass over.

ARTICLE 11 PASSED OVER INDEFINITELY

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to amend the By-laws regarding landfills as adopted March Town Meeting 1975, to the extent that said by-laws shall not apply to any landfill operated by the town of Ossipee.

Douglas Meader expressed concern of adding Effingham's'

trash to our incinerator as it may burden our system. He made a motion to amend to limit only Effingham. The Town Manager mentioned that this could possibly mean \$50,000.00 in revenue to us. Many questions were raised and opinions heard on this issue. The motion to amend to include Effingham only was voted 90 in favor and 20 opposed. Vote to see if the Town will vote on article as amended, to include Effingham, was defeated.

ARTICLE 12 AS AMENDED WAS DEFEATED

Article 13. To see if the Town of Ossipee will vote to elect the seven members to the Planning Board pursuant to RSA: 673:2 Paragraph II (b). (submitted by petition)

Harry Chick conveyed it was his understanding that the original survey stated that the town wanted an elected board. Bruce Bennett, Chm. of the Board said that is was difficult enough now getting members to serve and that other towns have found that they can't get people to run for office when it is an elected position. He also stated the importance of having a board that is compatible. He invited any interested parties to come and volunteer their services - they would be welcomed. Numerous other comments were made for and against the issue. A paper vote was completed on this article and the vote was 69 in favor and 91 not in favor.

ARTICLE 13 WAS DEFEATED

Condict Billings made a motion to adjourn until 7:30 pm tomorrow night. Debate over what night to meet was discussed as some felt that there was not proper notice and some had prior commitments. An amendment on adjournment to change to March 17th instead of March 9th was defeated. Vote to adjourn to March 9th, 1988 at 7:30 pm was passed.

Meeting adjourned at 11:30 and the Ballot Clerks began counting ballots completing this at 1:55 am.

The Meeting resumed at 7:30 pm March 9, 1988.

Attorney Douglas Gray and Chief Bradley Loomis, non-residents, were given permission to speak.

Article 14. Petition to see if the Town of Ossipee will vote to accept the roads of Blueberry Estates, and to provide maintenance and upkeep for these roads thereon. (submitted by petition)

Judy Stevens remarked that these roads were used by others

to pass through and that they have tried for seven years to have these roads repaired by the town. She felt that if the Town does not want to do this that they should consider a tax reduction on their property. General discussion of privately owned roads once again was reviewed. Vote was called and it was defeated.

ARTICLE 14 DEFEATED

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize expenditure of \$7,860.00 (seven thousand eight hundred and sixty dollars) for a preliminary architectural plan for Library expansion projects to included site plan, survey and other attendant costs, said funds to be transferred from library fund balance.

The question of the right to use these funds arose. Town Mgr. again explained that these monies were presently in the hands of the Library and they had every right to use them and legal council has been consulted on this. Ruth Loring asked for support on this article. Vote was taken and it was approved.

ARTICLE 15 PASSED AS READ

Article 16. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA:82:1-C which authorizes any city or town to elect not to assess, levy or collect a resident tax.

John Sanders addressed this issue confirming this tax to be very costly to collect and motion to amend to read RSA:72:1-C was made and seconded vote passed this article.

ARTICLE 16 PASSED AS AMENDED

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize adoption of RSA:36A:2 Conservation Commission revision, to provide for proper utilization and protection of natural resources and the protection of watershed resources in said city or town.

Request to amend to delete :2 and insert Chapter in front of 36A. Atty. Gray said that this would bring in line to effect all (about 7 chapters) not just one. This way we could amend future problems. Randy Lyman, former Conservation Committee member, felt that these were adopted previously by the original committee. Vote was taken and passed the article as amended.

ARTICLE 17 PASSED AS AMENDED

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to dedicate the following town owned parcels to the Conservation Commission in accordance with RSA:36/A:4.

He believed the town could be challenged. The Town Manger asked that we keep these in the conservation district and the deeds are withstanding. These deeds will not be challenged or changed - this just preserves. Atty. Gray said that a vote to accept this article does not transfer land to anyone other than the present owners. This just prevents a sale without a vote to sell. Ken Leavitt said that he was the one who did work on the maps and these lots are remnant pieces. Douglas Meader said that the Town of Ossipee does indeed stand to be sued as he knows of someone right now that will do so if it passes. Dan Weeden stated that when he researched these maps and lot numbers some of them were not Town owned property. Vote to pass over.

Town Manager stated that we have free services from the Extension Service although they had been consulting Forest Management now to review tree cuts etc.

(two thirds paper ballot Necessary.)

Doug Meader moved to amend the article to read:

"To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety-eight Thousand and no/100 (\$98,000.00) Dollars for the purchase of two (2) dump trucks and equipment for the Highway Department; Twenty Thousand and no/100 (\$20,000.00) Dollars to be appropriated by current year taxation and the remaining Seventy eight thousand and no/100 (\$78,000.00) Dollars to be financed (in compliance with Chapter 33, Municipal Finance Act.) over a 5 year period. (Two thirds paper ballot necessary.)

Dan Weeden seconded the amendment.

Polls opened at 7:06 P.M.

Voting in progress - Moderator asked if there were any objections to discussing and voting on the other two articles. No one objected.

Article II was read:

"To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six thousand and no/100 (\$6,000.00) Dollars to conduct an engineering study to determine what repairs are needed for the Moultonville Dam."

Doug Meader moved the article, Barry Rollins seconded.

The Moderator asked for some discussion on the article, and Natalie Hall explained that \$6,000.00 was for a study on what was needed to repair the dam. Natalie stated that the dam is not com-

pleted and that there are certain requirements the State needs to be done before November 1, 1988.

Natalie then commended certain individuals for their volunteer work on the dam.

The following is a list of the volunteers:

Emile LeGendre, Stanley Eldridge, Busky Berry, Wayne Eldridge, Gordon Berry, Roland Stockbridge, Ossipee Highway Dept. and several local children.

Ralph Eldridge then explained that the \$6,000.00 was only for engineering costs for the study. The town has spent close to \$2900 to help the volunteers complete the repairs. Estimate of \$7,000.00 to complete.

Some question was brought up about the \$6,000.00 being only for the study, or if it was for repairs also by Roland Stockbridge. Roland wanted to know if the article could be amended to cover the repairs. Ralph Eldridge stated that its just for the study, and that the article can't be amended because the article is written the way it was presented to Superior Court.

Doug Meader stated that money raised by this article can only be changed by a new article at Town Meeting next year.

Bernard Stiff questioned about liability for the town and if the state was inspecting the dam.

Ralph Eldridge stated that the State has already inspected the work so far and they will continue to do so.

Stanley Brothers asked if more engineering needed to be done on the dam.

Ralph Eldridge said yes.

Roland Stockbridge asked if its possible to raise the money for repairs right away?

Ralph said maybe by petitioning the court.

The Moderator asked if there was anymore discussion at this time.

There was no more discussion and a vote was taken.

Ayes have it, only 1 nay.

Article II passed as read.

Article III was read:

“To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the addi-

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

1988

Much progress was made in 1988 toward organizing the library, cataloging the books, providing interesting programs for adults and children, offering children's summer reading programs and story hours, getting people to know how a library can help them, and showing the need to expand the present library.

In the past year volunteers Isabella Clark and Eleanor Bassett have donated hours to typing catalog cards for old and new books.

Another activity of the library is offering children's story hours. Last summer a total of 70 children enjoyed stories and crafts offered each week. Volunteers who read to the children included Ruth Loring, Eileen Leavitt, Ann Baldwin, Dianne Applin and Sylvia Witherell. Weekly story hours are now held with volunteers Lindalee Lambert and Marianne Pilkovski doing the planning and reading. An average of 8 children attend each week. All children ages 3-6 are welcome.

During the school year, children from the 5th and sixth grades come to the library on a school day and choose books for themselves. Also, for older children, for eight weeks, a summer reading program with a special theme is held. Last summer 34 children took part and read a total of 190 books. The program was "Dig for Dinosaurs".

In 1988 several programs were offered: The Science Center of New Hampshire showed NH animals to 89 adults and children in July, (outside performance was necessary.) In August, 60 children were treated to The Little Red Wagon/Caravan from UNH; singer Purley Gates sang folk tales and familiar songs to 20 children; and The Starbird Puppet Theatre presented "The Lost Nation Revue" at the school since the Ossipee Public Library was not large enough. Also, author Elizabeth Yates talked to children at the library about her books. This was arranged by the Reading Department and Eileen Leavitt. One other program was a talk on the Moose Herd and Hunt by Kris Klein from the NH Fish and Game Department.

Many interested people from the area have supported the library's building expansion fund-raising efforts. This has kept many supporters very busy.

Ossipee Public Library urges everyone to consider the many services the library offers them and their families from babies to toddlers to school children to young adults to retirees to summer

visitors and our older residents. After your careful consideration of the many benefits you receive from a library, please make your decision to vote March 14, 1989 for the bond issue for the Ossipee Public Library's expansion and make a good thing even better!

The librarian wishes to thank the following volunteers whose help has been so welcome and necessary for carrying out our programs: Betty Kennard, Isabella Clark, Lesley Jorgensen, Ken Perry, Ann Baldwin, our trustees, Cathy Ziegler, Ruth Loring, and Eileen Leavitt and all the members of the Building Expansion Fund Committee. Thanks also to Georgina Leland, the other member of the staff.

The support and encouragement of Ossipee citizens, town officials, and library trustees are much appreciated by the librarian and staff of Ossipee Public Library.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE OSSIPEE PUBLIC LIBRARY TRUSTEES

1988 has been a year of meetings, decisions, significant growth, questions, gratifying responses, frustration - all with the improvement of library services foremost in our minds.

By April our library policy document was submitted to the Statewide Library Development System, library hours were increased to 22 hours per week, and all other requirements concerning personnel, materials and services were met. As a result, Ossipee Public Library has now met the minimum standards for

Associate Libraries, thereby qualifying us for the New Hampshire State Library programs, materials available, and annual State Library aid.

Children's programs and events easily dominated the summer scene - young readers turned archeologists, enjoyed performances of a folk musician and UNH's Little Red Wagon troupe, and were thankful that weather cooperated when 90 listeners appeared for a Science Center of New Hampshire presentation.

The Meet Your Town Officials reception in May elicited many positive comments and suggestions that this become an annual event. Bruce Bedford's photographic skills were on display during June. Kris Klein's program on the New Hampshire moose herd brought forth an interested audience, despite record high temperatures.

Every program offering and carton of new books waiting to be shelved demonstrates the crucial need for additional space. The library staff must process all materials and answer the needs of more than 1400 borrowers in the same space that was considered adequate 50 years ago when the total population of the town numbered 1400!

The twenty members of the Building Expansion Committee continue their tireless efforts toward making the proposed addition to our 50 year old building a reality. Fundraising projects have been many and varied - the letter drive with mailings to all property owners; an exciting Book It footrace when 60 entrants ran for the library; the Book and Author Luncheon held at Sunny Villa, featuring three area authors; a raffle of Portland Symphony concert tickets; the donation of thrift shop proceeds by the First Congregational Church; the ongoing sale of Ossipee Remembers calendars, library T-shirts, and notepapers. The enthusiastic response of the community to these endeavors has been gratifying; the current total of \$16,500 raised is displayed on the thermometer growing on the library lawn.

Librarian Ruby Pearson continues to be the most essential aspect of library operations. She is ably assisted by Library Aides Gene Leland and Betty Kennard, as well as several valuable volunteers.

At the town meeting on March 14, we are asking that Ossipee voters approve a \$375,000 bond issue to build an addition of 3604 square feet to the present library building. The preliminary design plans include a meeting room available for public use, a children's area, additional shelf space, a workroom for library

staff, an audio visual room, space for quiet reading and study, and handicapped accessibility.

The library staff, trustees, members of the Building Expansion Committee, and many concerned patrons have made a commitment to establishing a vital public library which can be an integral part of our expanding community.

REPORT OF OSSIPEE POLICE DEPARTMENT Annual Report 1988

This was a very busy year. The Ossipee PD answered over 1800 calls for service, the cruisers travelled over 80,000 miles using over 6,000 gallons of gas, accidents were up 50% over last year and reported crimes were up 30%.

There were 8 felony indictments brought against people by the Ossipee PD. Also, over the last 4 months there have been 21 felony indictments against 11 people and 4 search warrants for private residences as result of joint drug investigations with Ossipee PD and the Carroll County Sheriffs office. I would especially like to commend Sgt. Richard Morgan of the Ossipee PD and Sgt. Guy Eldridge of the Sheriffs office for the hours of hard work they put in on these drug investigations.

We added two new officers to the Dept. this year. Officer Alexander Puopolo is the new full time officer. Officer Archie Thibault is the new part-time officer.

I would like to close by thanking the people of Ossipee for their continued support. I also like to thank all of our officers for their support and efforts over the past year. Any public service agency is only as good as the personnel within the agency.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

While 1988 saw continued growth in Ossipee, the town hall met the challenge with a major reorganization of facilities. On December 31, 1988, the Ossipee District Court moved from the town hall to the county complex. While we would have liked the court to have stayed on, our own space needs took priority.

As a result of the court move, the long overcrowded office of the town clerk/tax collector got relief by removing a wall and annexing the old planning board room. The planning board, in turn, moved upstairs to what had been the judges chambers. The courtroom itself, which has long been used for selectmen's meetings and various public hearings, is now for the exclusive use of the town. In addition, both the selectmen's office and the town clerk/tax collector's office have received bright new counter space which has resulted in an increased capacity to swiftly and efficiently serve the public.

To mark the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution, on June 21, 1988, Ossipee's new recreation area was officially named **LONG SANDS CONSTITUTION PARK**. A contest was held among the children at Ossipee Central school (including Effingham children who also attend the school) to name the park. The theme was the U.S. Constitution. "Long Sands" and "Constitution" were both judged to be winning entries and the following three children were declared winners: Jennifer Pratt, Brian Bergeron, and Darlene Waniel. Our special thanks to OSC principal, Ken Perry, who organized this event.

The first baseball game at the new park was also held on June 21, 1988. The ballpark was dedicated to the memory of Chris Powers who was active in supporting the teams. A bronze plaque marking the dedication was set in the base of the park's new flagpole.

OSSIPEE, NEW HAMPSHIRE 1785-1985: A HISTORY, VOLUME ONE, by Edward M. Cook Jr., will be published in June 1989. Mr. Cook is Associate Professor of History at the University of Chicago, and a summer resident of Ossipee. Assisting with the history were Edward M. Cook Sr., and Ruth Loring. Many thanks to Ted and his father for this history which will enable all of us to better appreciate our locale and heritage. Special thanks, also, to our local historian, Ruth Loring. Individual chapters of the history can be read at the library in typed manuscript form. This meticulously researched and comprehensive study is a tremendous contribution to the history of our area.

In August the Community Action Program began providing a person for two hours a week to assist the selectmen's office with the ever increasing welfare applications. Marge Vacca immediately increased the two hours per week by volunteering an additional two. Marge interviews welfare applicants at the town hall two afternoons a week explaining town and state welfare guidelines, providing budget counselling, and referring individuals to proper service agencies where they may receive assistance. Since August Marge has saved the town thousands of dollars which would have otherwise come out of the taxpayers pockets.

1988 saw the selectmen and a beach committee, headed by Richard Cogswell, continue their efforts to secure a town beach on Ossipee Lake, The town presently has a lease on a 22 acre parcel adjoining Hodgdon Shore. Since this parcel is land-locked it is necessary to secure a right-of-way or purchase of private property for access. The town is attempting to get the state to consent to an exchange of property which would give abutting property owners a parcel of frontage on the lake, and would give the Town an access over backlands to the beach. This is intended to be an exchange of property with no money involved. Once the properties are exchanged, the Town can then go forward with the building of a suitable road to the beach.

The Library Building Committee has also been busy this year in drafting a proposed expansion plan which will come before the townspeople on March 14th. The selectmen support the expansion

proposal. Aside from the obvious functions, a library also reflects the cultural and educational commitment of a community. We should all be pleased, therefore, that this group of dedicated individuals have worked not only to make needed improvements to the library but to enhance the image of our town.

To the Ossipee Selectmen and Residents of Ossipee:

Community Action Program (C.A.P.) is a non-profit agency providing a needed service to Ossipee, primarily in the area of Outreach-Fuel Assistance - Weatherization - FEMA - Headstart - GED & ATP and Senior Meals: This assistance goes a long way in providing service and assisting with Ossipee's welfare problem; without C.A.P. assistance Ossipee's welfare budget could in all likelihood increase by thousands dollars.

OUTREACH: Assist residents with information for needed service, we fill out application for Vet's; S.S.; S.S.I.; A.F.D.C., we make phone calls, we pay electric disconnects & rent to stop evictions as money is available. This year Ossipee Office has been working with the Carol E. Duchesne scholarship foundation, setting up a seminar for **TEENAGE DATING VIOLENCE**. This seminar will be held Thursday, April 20, 1989 at K.R.H.S., anyone interested is welcome to attend. C.A.P. is represented at regular monthly network meeting of Carroll County Social Service Agencies, working closely with all those Agencies on behalf of Ossipee residents. Outreach is a never ending project, changing daily by the needs of area residents.

FUEL ASSISTANCE: The year 1988 Fuel Assistance was provided to households, many were Elderly residents enabling them to stay in their homes.

WEATHERIZATION: C.A.P. weatherization was started several years ago to provide homes with needed insulation and storm windows etc., therefore making it possible to lower heating bills; also repair or replace heating systems, this year \$26,711.85 was spent in Ossipee for this service.

FEMA: Ossipee received \$4,754.47 from these funds, this figure is over 50% of the total amount received by the Ossipee Office of C.A.P. It is an asset to the town of Ossipee to have a C.A.P. in their Town.

HEADSTART: Ossipee Headstart Program has 19 students this year, this program has just received the New England Award for Program Excellence.

GED & ATP: C.A.P. continues to provide the Adult Education and Adult Tutorial Program for Carroll County. This program is a much needed service that continues to grow.

NORTH COUNTRY SENIOR MEALS & WHEELS is another department of C.A.P. which supports Ossipee Senior Meals Program (Ossipee Concerned Citizens) with funds in the form of per meal reimbursement; anyone interested in the exact figures can call 1-752-3010.

CHRISTMAS BASKETS: This year C.A.P. provided USDA food for the annual community Christmas baskets, also hand knit hats & mittens.

This past year Ossipee C.A.P. has provided a new service to the town. Because Ossipee is growing, so is it's welfare problems; C.A.P. felt it could be of assistance to Ossipee and has provided a person 4 hours a week to interview all welfare applications referring clients to other services available and making recommendations to the selectmen; also attending executive sessions and fair hearings on behalf of the town of Ossipee.

Our thanks to the residents and voters of Ossipee for their support during the past year.

**REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY OF:
THE LAKES REGION ASSOCIATION**

July 1, 1987 to June 30, 1988

The Cooperative Advertising and Mailing program of the Association is our major program each year. This past year we had four Chambers of Commerce and the Lakes Region Attractions working cooperatively, raising \$16,667.00, which was matched with a Matching Grant from the State for \$16,667.00 giving us a total advertising budget of \$33,334.00. This is an increase over the previous year.

This amount made it possible to purchase \$20,000.00 in magazine advertising, using 19 different media, and \$13,334.00 in newspapers, using 18 different locations. This brought us in 49,443 individual requests for literature at an over-all cost of 66 cents each. An out-standing value.

The Lakes Region Attractions did not use Television this past year, but did insert their Map/Guide in four Eastern Massachusetts newspapers. They printed over 926,000 copies of the Map/Guide and all were distributed.

We continue to publish and distribute the WHERE TO Book annually, as well as distribute several navigational charts of our lakes.

We are currently working on a survey of two thousand, which is one out of each 22 requests we received for information on the Region. This brought us in over 400 questionnaires or over 20% replies. From this we learned that our literature was most helpful, and that most people contacted came to the Lakes Region, one-third had been here previously, they utilized all types of accommodations; they stayed an average of 7.1 days (which is above the national travel figures), and they spent an average of \$108.00 per day per person. Most plan to return again. Predominantly they were from New York/New Jersey and Massachusetts, and they came during eleven months of the year. All proving that our vacation travel business is healthy.

We strive to preserve the quality of life in the Region and to preserve the National Resources of our lakes, our fields and our forests, so that they can be enjoyed not only by our residents and visitors, but for those that are to come after us.

The Lakes Region Association is pledged to work in concert with our communities for mutual goals.

REPORT OF THE OSS�PEE PLANNING BOARD

During 1988 the planning board had 84 business and/or workshop meetings. The first portion of the year was spent updating the draft of the Subdivision Regulations. The board anticipates the first public hearing on the revisions to these regulations before the middle of 1989. The revised subdivision regulations should improve the service to the applicants and expedite the review process while preserving the character and quality of our Town.

Subdivision activity in 1988 increased to reflect the growth that the Town is experiencing. The planning board processed 20 applications comprising of approvals of 11 subdivisions totaling 67 lots, approved 4 boundary line adjustments, denied 1 subdivision of 2 lots and processed 4 Earth Excavation/Restoration applications for gravel pits. As of January 1989 there are 12 applications in front of the planning board, totaling 121 lots, still going through the subdivision process. To put this in perspective, during 1987 the planning board approved 12 subdivisions totaling 31 lots.

Rewriting the Zoning Ordinance involved months of workshops, meetings with various groups of residents and businesses and 5 public hearings to formulate an ordinance that was accepted in November at a Special Town Meeting by a vote of 762 for - 665 against.

The planning board wrote the Goals and Objectives section to add to the Master Plan and, after a public hearing in October, adopted the section as part of the Master Plan.

With the assistance of a grant that the planning board applied for and received the board and Lakes Region Planning Commission developed a Water Resource Management and Protection Plan for the Town. This Plan is an extensive compilation of data concerning our surface and groundwater resources. It identifies potential treats, assesses growth in demand for water, provides an analysis of the infrastructure and existing programs and includes 12 tables and 8 maps with recommendations for new and/or revised policies and programs. This Plan should be incorporated in the Master Plan after a public hearing.

To stay better informed the planning board had a number of meetings with various technicians and consultants during the year to discuss development impacts, affordable housing, wetlands and watershed mapping and high intensity soils surveys.

We would like to thank Ann MacGregor and Karen Weeden

who worked as secretary during the year and welcome Eleanor Bourque our current secretary. We would also like to extend our sincere thanks and appreciation to Margie Vacca, whose term expired this year, and to Leon Taylor and Susan Morrison, who resigned for personal reasons, all who gave so unselfishly of their time and for their dedicated work in helping us plan for the future of Ossipee. We welcome new members Richard Cogswell, Irene Kalinuk and Tom Cooney.

The planning board continues to meet every week and all meetings are open the public and visitors are welcome. We encourage you to become involved. We thank all those people who have helped and given us support this year.

The Visiting Nurse Association of Wolfeboro and Vicinity provide services to residents of eight towns. The Agency is both Medicare Certified and State Licensed and employs a staff of fourteen including Registered Nurses, a Registered Physical Therapist and Certified Home Health Aides.

The staff made a total of 8,010 home visits. All services are provided under the orders of each clients personal physician. Nursing services are available seven days a week; other home care services are available Monday through Friday.

1988 has continued our tradition of growth and satisfactory achievements through our diverse programs aimed at improving the quality of life for Ossipee residents.

Twenty-thousand seven-hundred seventy-five (20775.) home delivered meals were served to 81 clients residing in the towns of Ossipee, Effingham, Tamworth and Freedom. 60 of these meals were served to residents of Ossipee.

The Ossipee Congregate Meal served Four thousand twenty-one (4021) meals. These Congregate Meals are held on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursdays at noon in the Senior Center on Dore Street. The Tamworth Congregate meal served an additional one thousand seventy-six (1076) meals at the noon time meal held on Mondays at the Town House. These Congregate Meals are open to Seniors age 60 and over, no reservations are required and client payment is by donation only.

The OCC Carroll County WIC Program continues to provide services to an average of 750 clients per month. This program funded through the USDA offers nutrition counseling, health screening and food vouchers to qualifying women, infants and children who reside in Carroll County. 256 WIC Clients reside in Ossipee.

To all of you who helped throughout the year with delivering meals, working at the July Fair, Christmas Fair, Christmas Toy Project or by just generally showing your support, we offer a humble thank-you. Ossipee Concerned Citizens could not exist without the continued support of the residents of the town.

To Stanley Eldridge and David White, a special thank-you for providing for the safety of our clients and drivers through your exceptional maintenance of our parking area and walkway.

Although unforeseen financial expenses and other minor problems have prevented our expansion program from progressing as rapidly as hoped, we are optimistically moving forward with the plans.

The year of 1988 has been a time of growth new services, houses and businesses services provided to the customer.

In March, the voters passed a \$104,000 W/S budget which required a rate increase. In April, we processed the increases in both Water and Sewer charges. These increases were very necessary and we thank you for support in allowing them.

Water/Sewer bills are now paid in the Department office Mon. - Fri. 8:00 - 12:00 and other times when the Dept. office is open.

The first months of this year were helpful in that freeze ups and problems of winter were few and minor.



We are pleased to report that over the last seven years improvements and scheduling has now gained us a fine inventory of Water/Sewer material supplies, thus allowing more prompt repairs and service rendered.

The Department remains the same in employees -- one full time Supt. and two part time people. However, the Department is asking for another full time operator laborer in May or June 1989.

This year 1989 will have two major pipe jobs proposed, one on Dore St. and one on Valley Road to replace an old main line. Also, several contractors are proposing line extensions for 1989.



In closing 1988 has been a productive year as it passes. The Supt. says thank you to other Departments and employees for their assistance during 1988.

The Department has been able to assist in the Health Department and Mill Pond project often this year.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE DEPARTMENT 1988 ANNUAL REPORT

During 1988 this department has unfortunately had the chance to put its fire fighting skills to work. This has been the Department's busiest fire year to date.

25 Ossipee Firefighters were called to Moultonboro to help fight and control the Red Hill fire. A fire that destroyed 316 acres and turned out to be the worst fire in the State of New Hampshire in over 40 years.

Fires in Ossipee were up 300% from last year. All could have been prevented. They were started by carelessness, discarded cigarettes, faulty All Terrain Vehicle mufflers, or just poor judgement. This means we can change these fire facts by just thinking before we act.

The year was not all fire fighting. Town wardens took part in State forest fire training, conducted a town wide fire training program, and hosted two State Basic Forest Fire Control courses.

Prevention programs were continued. This year working with commercial campgrounds in Ossipee

Brad Eldridge of West Ossipee and Herbert Pendarvis of Ossipee Corner have joined this Department as Deputy Wardens, their experience is a great asset to the community.

I thank my Deputy Wardens for their valuable assistance. To Town officials, department heads, and the citizens of Ossipee, thank you for your help during a fire, but more importantly the help before, to prevent the fire.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1987 and June 1988, we experienced more fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with **your** help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217, or local Forest Ranger.

On January 1, 1989, the Deceptive Forestry Business Practices Law (RSA 224:54) goes into effect. This law, in summary, states that a person is guilty of a misdemeanor if, in the course of buying or selling a forest product, uses a false weight or measure for falsely determining any quality or quantity of a forest product.
