TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stark in the County of Coos in the said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Stark on Tuesday, the Ninth (9) day of March next at 9 o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for same.

3. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise for Highways to be expended by Road Agents.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote for Snow Removal.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote for maintenance.

6. To see if the Town will accept State Aid for T. R. A. and appropriate (\$270.00) and set aside for this purpose.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Current Expenses.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Town Relief.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Old Age Assistance.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will raise to meet interest charges for the ensuing year.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Public Library purposes.

12. To see if the Town will vote for a scale of Discounts for the payments of taxes on the Basis of Three Per Cent if paid by Aug. 31st, Two Per cent if paid by Sept. 30th, and One Per Cent if paid by Oct. 31st, 1943.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year and pay such debts from tax money when received.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to renew the emergency note issued under the provision of Chapter 63 of the 1933 Law amended by Chapter 39 of the 1935 Session Law, in part or whole from time to time as might be necessary during ensuing year.

15. To see what action the Town will take in regard to real estate taken over by the Town for non-payment of Taxes.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$300.00 to tar the Town's maintained Section of Tarred road, beginning at the Scott Bridge and extending one-half mile to the State Highway.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30.00 to the White Mountains Region Association.

18. To see if the Town will vote to purchase 1000 feet of Snow Fence at an approximate cost of \$150.00.

19. To see what action the Town will take in regards to Town Officers' Salaries.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Repairs on the Public Library.

21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for upkeep of the Cemeteries.

22. To see if the Town will vote to sell the Brooks House at private sale or public auction, and give the Selectmen the authority to do the same.

23. To see what action the Town will take in regard to plowing driveways.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1000.00 to pay on the Emergency Note, State of New Hampshire.

25. To see if the Town will vote to have Street lights in Stark and Percy and appropriate money for same.

26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for wiring the Stark Village School for electric lights.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the Stark School Board:

I hereby submit for your consideration my ninth annual report of the Stark schools.

At the close of the school year 1941-1942, we lost three of our teachers, viz: Virginia Littlefield who is teaching in the Bristol schools, Helene Dowse who planned to be married, and Ruth C. Ingals who took a school nearer her home. The vacancies were filled as follows: Mrs. Lena J. Rich for the Crystal school, June Reynolds for the Village Primary and Mrs. Everleen H. Newell for the Percy school. Miss Reynolds became dissatisfied with the location after a short time and resigned her position. Mrs. Harriette M. Potter was secured to take her place.

The following nine pupils completed the work of the eighth grade last June, viz.: Elwin Henry Hopps, Edward Wilfred Oakes, Leonard Ralph Johnson, Leo Fred Frizzell, Eula Mae Lavigne, Blanche Mae Hand, Winnifred Belle Hand, Gloria Lucy Hopps and John Robert Vachon. I think all but three entered some high school in the fall.

The following twenty pupils had a perfect record for the year 1941-1942, that is, they were not absent or tardy during the year: Lorraine Bickford, Donald Vachon, John Vachon, Marcia Gadwah, Blanche Hand, Winnifred Hand, Dorothy Hand, James Hand, Darriel Hodgkins, Winston Gadwah, Norman Hickey, Harvey Hickey, Leon Hickey, Rich-

ard Hickey, Doris Martin, Claude Martin, Eula Lavigne, Robert Lavigne, Beverly Miles and Glen Miles, Jr.

The school census taken last September found 81 pupils in town between the ages of five and sixteen. Of this number, 70 were reported in school. There were five children between five and eight reported not in school and six between fourteen and sixteen. One handicapped child was reported who is over sixteen years of age. We have fifteen pupils registered in high school this year. Thirteen in Groveton and two in Lancaster. Two pupils are attending elementary schools outside of the district.

From the report of the medical examination made by Miss Florence Wheeler, R. N., we get the following data: Defective Vision 6, Anemia 1, Defective Teeth 30, Diseased Tonsils 15, Defective Breathing 3, and Enlarged Glands 4. Three children were found unvaccinated. I have not a record yet of the corrective work that was done during the summer.

The main repairs, during the summer, were made on the village school building by putting the spare room into habitable condition and moving the pupils of the Blake school to the village. This combination made it possible to regrade the schools so now we have grades one to four in one room and five to eight in the other. This makes possible for more efficient teaching and improved conditions for the pupils, with no extra cost beyond the repairs.

The transportation routes are the same as last year, viz: R. J. Emerson from the Emerson and Blake districts to the village, and George K. Nelson transports one pupil to Groveton elementary school.

From last year's registers, we gleaned the following data: Total number of different pupils registered

in town, 73; per cent of attendance was 95.51—this is .43 less than the previous year; tardy marks, 77—an increase of 58 over the last record and is due largely from the children of two families; school board members made two visits to schools; the superintendent was credited with 125 visits; citizens with 38 visits; 8 school board meetings were held; and 17 pupils were transported at the expense of the district.

The superintendent rendered assistance to the teachers largely at time of his visits by personal conferences.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank all citizens for their hearty cooperation in making a successful school year possible.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

As the tempo of America's war effort mounts, demands upon its citizens for service become more numerous and exacting. To some comes the call to arms; others to public service and still others to defense industries and organizations. No one can possibly escape if he would. All must bear a proportionate share of the burden and the sacrifice. Strong first line fronts on land, sea and in the air are needed and can be developed and maintained only if there is unity of purpose and common determination behind the home front.

As men are drawn into service the burden of carrying on rests more heavily upon those forced to remain at home. Here, team work becomes increasingly important because of constantly diminishing manpower. A general breakdown in essential local activities and law observance can only be prevented by whole hearted cooperation between citizens and leaders.

There is no field of endeavor where cooperation and compliance with law and regulation are more needed than that of forest fire control. The most effective and economical effort in this field of activity is that of prevention. The old adage "an ounce of prevention" being "worth a pound of cure" was never more aptly applied than to forest fire control.

The forest fire warden is, by law, the designated local leader in forest fire matters. He exercises his prerogatives and discharges his duties as such under the direction of the State Forester. There was never a time when the warden needed each citizen's good

will and cooperation more than he does now. With manpower waning, fire prevention, through efficient preparation, care with fire and compliance with necessary regulations becomes a vital duty of citizenship.

For years efforts have been made to improve the usual bad Spring and Fall fire record. It was not until this year, however, that this problem was, to a great extent solved when permit burning was more rigidly restricted. Forest fire wardens were instructed not to issue permits except when it was raining and during the wet period immediately following rains. This plan worked out so well it has been decided to make it the established policy governing legal burning.

Everyone is well acquainted with the several civilian defense groups. Many of our fellow townsmen are serving in one or other of them. It is only recently, however, that the Office of Civilian Defense, recognizing the threat forest fires are to our timber facilities and resources and the possible disruption of war activities in critical areas, established the "Forest Fire Fighters Service." Its purpose is to provide fire fighters, equipped and trained, to strengthen the hand of the local forest fire warden; to acquaint the people in the area with their responsibility in fire prevention and suppression and to provide an opportunity for people in and near forested areas to participate in the war effort. The State Forester is the State Coordinator; the District Fire Chiefs are District Coordinators and the Warden is the Local Coordinator. The Forest Fire Fighters Service personnel will be registered under the direction of the Office of Civilian Defense; it will be trained by the local warden and his assistants, aided by the District Chief. Individual citizens are urged to join this service group by applying to their local forest fire

warden. By becoming a part of this organization locally, individuals can contribute their share toward the protection of our forest resources which are so vital to the war job.

During this critical period it is more than ever the part of good and prudent citizenship to remember:

1. That permission to burn in or near woodland or where fire may be communicated to woodland must be secured from the forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow.

2. To be careful when smoking in or near the woods and not to throw lighted cigars, cigarettes or matches from moving vehicles.

3. To notify your local warden promptly of any fires you see.

4. That fire prevention is the best and cheapest fire insurance.

5. To be fire-minded; be careful; be cooperative and thus help your warden prevent forest fires. This is patriotism at work.
