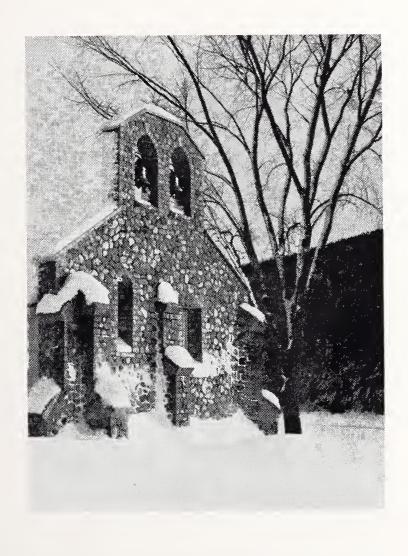

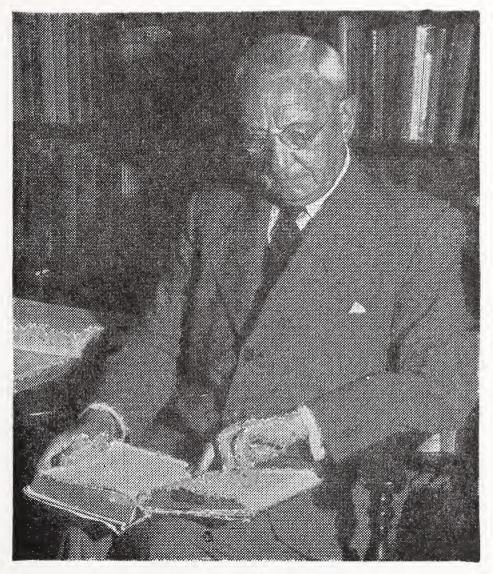

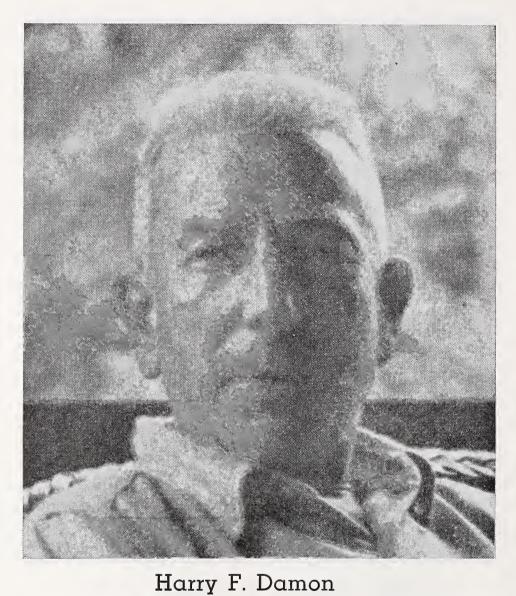
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The Rev. Herbert W. Prince, D. D. Dec. 11, 1878 to Dec. 18, 1968

- Article 1. To elect all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- II. The meeting will reconvene at 7 P. M. in said hool house to see what sums of money the Town will asse and appropriate for the following purposes and to transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

To see if the town will vote to raise \$25 to be expended in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Commission for the opening and maintaining of trails and old roads for forest fire protection. The New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Commission to provide a matching sum not in excess of \$25.00 for this purpose.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for Tax Maps. Meaning to enlarge the eighteen sections of the Tamworth Town Property Map from the present scale of 1'' = 1000' to 1'' = 400'.

Recommended by the Tamworth Planning Board.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to accept a gift of the Harry Damon property in Tamworth Village, if the same is offered to the Town by his estate or his family. The building to be used as a municipal building or if not used for that purpose to be torn down and land used for a town park.

Article 21. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for perambulating town lines.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to continue plowing driveways.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 for the purchase of a grader, \$10,000 to be raised at this meeting, the remainder to be financed as follows:

and appropriate the sum of \$600 to paint the interior of the Town Hall.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000 to widen the Gilman Road on both sides and removal of some trees to make this road wide enough for winter plowing and for summer maintenance.

Article 31. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$2000 to tar a section of Fowler's Mills Road, starting from Myrtle Walkers' and working towards Wonalancet Foa!

Article 36. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for care of trees and to control White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to adopt subdivision regulations, according to RSA Chap. 36, section 19, et seq.

Most of the surrounding Towns have minimum subdivision regulations, pending adaptation of an overall Town Plan. The Planning Board feels that, in self-protection, Tamworth should adopt similar regulations. Otherwise, we are open to any type of development, which might not only ruin the Town's character, but its pocket book as well. No regulations will be adopted without the requisite Public Hearing. This is not Zoning.

Article 38. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000 for the purchase of land for new dump if found necessary. To authorize the selectmen to appoint a committee of five, consisting of one selectman, road agent and health officer and two others, to investigate the various methods of dump operation that will comply with RSA 125:80 and to locate a possible site if necessary and to hold a public hearing concerning the results of their study.

Money not to be spent until after hearing.

Article 39. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 to be spent on Water Holes and Dry Hydrants, said sum of money to be matched by the Tamworth Firemen's Club.

Not acted on by Finance Committee.

Article 40. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$800 to complete the fence at Riverside Cemetery.

Not acted on by Finance Committee.

Article 41. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 42. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any property acquired through tax collectors deeds.

Article 43. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

A town's expenses are often determined by things other than town meeting, 1968 has not been an exception. As we are all aware snow arrived to stay early in November. Obviously snow coming a month earlier than usual can upset the best plans of our selectmen or the Finance Committee. On a happier note, we raised \$2000 for fighting forest fires and, thanks to the weather, we spent almost nothing. In spite of disasters such as winter highway the overall financial picture was good and the town ended with a substantial surplus.

Serious thought should be given to the question of plowing driveways. While the town adds nothing to the miles of highway plowed, it does add many driveways each year. Four years ago driveway plowing amounted to 50% of our winter budget, now a check shows driveways amount to over 70%. We may expect continued increases in the number of driveways in the years to come, for this reason an article pertaining to driveways has been included in the warrant for your consideration.

Time is running out for our dump. The state's air pollution laws will soon prevent our operating our dump by the present method and the selectmen feel that rather than wait until the last minute to do something about it, we should consider the matter now - hence the article for land acquisition and a loader.

We remind you that the profound increase in the school budget closely approaches the price of either the grader or the loader.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

New Hampshire is the fastest growing state in the northeast in terms of population increase. It is also an industrialized state and this growth is likely to continue, all of which means more families and homes. Our growing summer population is scattered throughout the state with a phenomenal increase in vacation homes.

Many new homes and practically all cottages are being located in woodlands and abandoned fields and forests crowd into the back yards of our village streets. In a state where the forests cover 86% of the land surface, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow until the snow comes again, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help:

- 1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
- 2. To NEVER discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn
 - a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for ALL debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal brasiers in your own back yard is permitted on notification of the warden.

- b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on GRASS by householders between 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P.M.
- c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire BEFORE you light the match.
- 4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save your tax dollars for useful purposes.

THE PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board scheduled a regular monthly meeting for the last Wednesday of every month at 7:30 p. m. at the Town House. All meetings were open to anyone wishing to attend.

The Board held thirteen meetings in the past year. One special meeting was held. Local organizations were invited to offer suggestions to be incorporated in a Comprehensive Plan. These suggestions were presented to the Department of Resources and Economic Development for evaluation and use in the Plan.

The federal government has withheld funds from the state thereby delaying the Comprehensive Plan for Tamworth. It is hoped that money for these plans will again be funded so they can be activated.

It is felt by the Planning Board that while we are waiting for the Comprehensive Plan, ordinances should be placed in the warrant for consideration by the voters.

In the past, money appropriated for use by the Planning Board and not used by it was reverted to the General Fund. Permission has been granted by the Tax Commission office for money appropriated by the town to be used for the Comprehensive Plan be kept in a separate account. If an additional amount is needed, it will be requested at a town meeting.

Two members of the Board have completed their appointed tenures. Two new members will be appointed by the selectmen. It is recommended that another woman member be appointed.

The Board wishes to thank Mrs. Nystedt for her excellent cooperation as secretary. It was with regret that her resignation was accepted.

It is urgently hoped that all residents are interested in the general welfare of the community and will give careful consideration to its problems, that they will voice opinions that will enable the Board to seek and plan ways and means for making Tamworth a better place to live.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT FOR THE TOWN WARRANT OF 1969

The Tamworth Conservation Commission has continued to meet once a month throughout 1968 with the exception of a stormy Sunday night this past December. There was also one special meeting.

It is with sadness that we report the death of Joseph Dawson of Whittier. He was one of the first concerned residents to urge that the Town establish a Conservation Commission and he then became one of the original members of this Commission when it was voted in at Town Meeting on March 8th, 1966.

Conversely we feel ourselves most fortunate to have Percy Olton now filling out Joe's unexpired term and we hope that he will continue to serve on the Commission for many years to come.

At last year's Town Meeting the Town appropriated \$100 for the planting of trees. Maples from Joe Dawson's property were donated by him but due to the rainy June and inclement weather on the dates chosen to plant them this past autumn, they were never put in. The Commission would like to know the feelings of the residents of Tamworth in regard to a long range planting program which is a recommendation of the landscape architect who made the Visual Study for the Town. Because we are awaiting the response to this Study we are not asking for an appropriation from the Town for tree planting at the 1969 Town Meeting.

We have obtained an option to purchase part of the waterfront around Jackman Pond and are hoping through arrangements with the other owners of shorefront to protect this little body of water in its unspoiled state so that one small pond may remain unviolated and thus can be enjoyed by those townspeople who are nature lovers as well as by future generations. As we are one of the Commissions in New Hampshire without operating funds appropriated by the Town, we have solicited money from property owners who live in the general vicinity of Jackman Pond in order to raise money for purchasing the waterfront. The response has been wonderfully heartwarming.

However, this might be the appropriate place to state that we do not believe we can go on much longer and be effective in protecting threatened wild areas without a land acquisition fund. At least ten towns in New Hampshire have voted money to their Conservation Commissions primarily for land acquisition funds.

Very few questionnaires that the Commission drew up and sent out with the town warrant a year ago at this time were filled in and returned to us. This was most disappointing but we learned that this type of questionnaire was probably too technical. We have gratefully and carefully perused the ones that were mailed back to the Commission.

Representatives from the Conservation Commission have attended with keen interest the Chocorua Lake Association meetings to which we have been invited. We are in agreement with the purposes of the Association and salute the summer residents from around the Lake for their initiative. They have embarked on a farsighted venture without precedent, and to have them shouldering the responsibility for the future of our most renowned scenic attraction is a boon which we never anticipated.

Our Commission chairman, Betty Steele, was chosen by the planning board to form a committee to work with the landscape architect (whose salary was paid by the Spaulding-Potter Charitable Trusts) on

the Visual Study of the Town for the purpose of improving the appearance of Tamworth. The date has been set for a public meeting to show slides taken throughout the Town in connection with this Study and hear the report of the committee.

On July 27th an attractive rustic sign was posted on the land managed as a natural area by the Commission formerly known as the Rowe property through which runs the outlet of Jackman Pond. Mrs. Madeline Whiting of South Tamworth made the sign and presented it as a gift to the Commission.

All the Commission members were present at a special meeting on September 17th for the sole purpose of discussing the proposed New Hampshire Highway Department plan for a truck lane on Heavenly Hill adjacent to "the famous view" of the Lake and the Mountain. At the public hearing on September 19th the Commission strongly urged that Route No. 16, eastern New Hampshire's main highway, bypass the Chocorua Lake area and that immediate action be taken to facilitate its re-location.

The Commission is developing a conservation plan in relation to natural resources realizing that our findings will be evaluated and made part of the landuse portion of the Town Plan. This conservation plan will be developed with the advice and cooperation of all the organizations in Tamworth who have concerns and responsibilities effecting the use of natural resources.

As required by the State when Tamworth applied for Federal Funds for its comprehensive Town Plan, the Commission also submitted a written statement to the planning board explaining why its members felt a town plan was important in relation to conservation purposes.

Three Conservation Commission members attended a meeting at the Town House on the Bearcamp Watershed Flood project on November 2nd. We are of the opinion that a dam should not be built on Swift River.

One member of the Commission traveled to Concord for a gathering of conservation commission members from all over New Hampshire on December 7th. The purpose of the meeting was to exchange ideas.

Commission members have gone on one field trip since our last report. Four members began locating specimens of interest to be marked on the nature trail we are preparing to lay out in the Hemenway State Forest. This trip was on November 3rd in the tract of over one hundred acres a permit for which will be given to the Commission by the State of New Hampshire for management as a natural area.

Betty Steele, Chairman, has also attended two meetings called by Jean Hennessey appointed by Governor King as the chairman of the "Chocorua Basin Advisory Committee". This committee has drawn up proposed legislation to establish scenic landmarks throughout New Hampshire of which the Chocorua Basin would be one. These meetings pertained to the future of the Chocorua Basin and specifically to the State's responsibilities and commitments in regard to this scenic attraction.

Our chairman also reported the activities of the Commission at "Summer Town Meeting" on August 12th.

COOK MEMORIAL LIBRARY

During the past year 285 people borrowed books from your library and 150 of these were Juniors which would seem to indicate that library use will increase in the years ahead. This is our hope. Circulation has continued to grow reaching 4,483 in 1968 an increase of 67 percent in a period of five years.

At the request of the director of the Summer Enrichment Program your librarian with the cooperation of the State Library provided a collection of science books for the use of the children involved in the program. Those same books were later loaned to the Kenneth E. Brett School Library.

New books are available at the library because of the continued financial help of the Tamworth Foundation and the generosity of citizens who donate books. We borrowed 1057 books from the Bookmobile on its quarterly rounds.

This year for the first time we subscribed to the sightsaving edition of the Readers' Digest. Its large print provides reading for those who have very poor eyesight. Old copies are being given to the county home in Ossipee.

Long playing records given to the library by RCA have proved very popular, particularly with our young people. As we would like to add to our collection donations of long-playing records in good condition would be welcomed.

Another innovation was a weekly story hour during the summer for the very young which was organized by our young mothers. We hope that interest in this activity will continue.

The Garden Club provided a beautiful Christmas wreath and window box decorations appropriate for

the changing seasons.

The Friends of the Library gave us several fire extinguishers and a badly needed file cabinet. At Christmas they gladdened our hearts with an outdoor, lighted tree, an indoor tree and a lollypop tree for the youngsters. During the summer months they arranged for ten exhibits including oils and water-colors, silver, pewter, bird carving, rugs, enamel, dolls and pottery.

The cataloguing committee has spent hundreds of hours in the last three years and is still working one morning a week - a monumental undertaking.

During the summer months when there was an increase in library use Rayetta Streeter and Linda Plummer served as aides.

To all who have helped to make your library better able to serve the people of Tamworth we say "Thank you."

COOK MEMORIAL LIBRARY

The cost of books has been rising steadily. Last year's book cost was more than 40% higher than two years ago when the last request for a higher appropriation was made. Further increase in book cost are anticipated.

Salary expense has increased approximately \$300. over the past two years and our librarians' salaries are still below the State standards. Social security costs have increased and will continue to do so under the latest revisions of the Social Security Act.

Use of the library has been increasing and we are giving greater services such as keeping open Wednesday evenings for the school children.

All other categories of expense such as supplies and light, heat and power continue to climb.

For all these reasons the Trustees of Cook Memorial Library respectfully request that the appropriation be increased to \$1500. this year.

REPORT OF SPECIAL HEALTH OFFICER

Year 1968

During the year, 24 Tamworth property owners were assisted in the design and construction of septic sewage disposal systems. Of these, 10 systems required approval by the N. H. Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission. In each case but one, I prepared the application and obtained construction approval. In all cases, I performed final inspection on behalf of the State. The other 14 systems were designed and constructed according to State specifications, but on account of their locations more than 1,000 feet from State waters, State approval was not required.

These activities involved many visits to the sites and travel amounted to about 1,500 miles total. Office and field work and travel time consumed about 200 hours.

TAMWORTH SUMMER ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

During the early months of 1968 a group of interested Tamworth citizens met to discuss the possibilities of a Summer Program for the children. This program could offer opportunities to participate actively in Sports and the Arts.

A committee was formed consisting of members of existing local organizations. Mrs. Joyce Perkins, a former playground director and teacher at the elementary school was advisor to the committee.

It was decided to submit an article in the Town Warrant requesting matching funds up to \$1000.00. This article was approved by the selectmen and duly passed in Town Meeting on March 12th.

On May 28th the new organization was Incorporated as the Tamworth Summer Enrichment Program. Mr. Charles T. Gallagher undertook the necessary steps and we acknowledge his help with gratitude.

From early March until July 1st the necessary matching funds of \$1000.00 were raised. The generosity of organizations and individuals, combined with the fund raising efforts of participating groups made this possible. Towards the end of August pleased parents, unsolicited, gave generous contributions which left the committee with a favorable balance of over \$500.00.

By late May, the leaders had been selected. The Program was extremely fortunate in the dedication and enthusiasm of the directors.

Supervising director - Dana Steele, experienced as a camp counsellor and tennis coach.

Assistant director - Belle Swenson, neighborhood leader and Chairman, Swiftwater Girl Scouts

Council. Playground mother and crafts instructor.

Assistant director - Patricia Thomson, instructor in crafts and sports.

The staff attended recreation workshops in Lancaster, in June. The Carroll County Extension Service provided a training session for Junior Leaders.

On July 1st the Program was formally opened. Hours 9 A.M. to 4 P.M., Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, July 1st to August 23rd.

Registration 110 Average daily attendance 80 Year round residents 75% Summer residents 25%

During the month of July the Enrichment Program was co-ordinated with the swimming program. Children were picked up and brought back to the school by the swim-bus. Activities were planned to last half a day.

Opportunities in sports: Baseball, softball, soccer, volley ball, tennis, fetter ball, touch football. Tennis coaching took place at the Steele Courts until the opening of the Town Courts.

Art Opportunities: Sketching, charcoal drawing, clay pictures, modelling, papier mache, string pictures, mosaics, weaving and spool weaving.

A generous supply of "beautiful junk," given by the community gave opportunities to the children to create "something out of nothing." Egg carton beasts, cave men hangings, plastic piggy banks were among the items produced.

In August whole days were available so that more ambitious and longer projects could be undertaken.

Drama - Creation and performance.

Puppetry - making of puppets and their costumes and performance.

It was understood from the outset that contributions from organizations were on a one-time basis, to help the program off to a good start. The committee feels that the program was a great success for an initial effort and hopes that the Town will raise the balance needed for a similar program in 1969.

The school custodian, Chester Davis, merits the special thanks of the staff and the Committee. His cheerful assistance in times of need, his tolerant na-

ture and human concern for the coming generation, contributed in great measure to the success of the program.

The following lines taken from the report of one of the directors need no comment. "I thoroughly enjoyed working with the children. They have a lot of hidden appreciation stored up within themselves. I enjoyed helping them to release as much of it as possible. They taught me a great deal and I hope I gave them at least half of what I received from them."

any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 8. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

ARTICLE 9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The school year 1968-69 got underway with two different staffing ideas being tried. We have a teacher, Mrs. Ingrid Bickford, who works for us in the afternoons teaching science, some physical education and a class in independent reading. This enables the classroom teachers, in grades 3, 4, and 5, to independently work with small groups of students with special reading techniques. This program seems to be giving us the results we had hoped for in regard to helping directly with individual differences in reading.

The other different idea was a Title I district wide project for teacher aides. At Tamworth we have Mrs. Ramona Stafford serving as our teacher aide. Her duties include morning bus duty, recess and noon supervision on the playgrounds, preparing teaching materials, and direct assistance in grades one and two. Her work in grades one and two has enabled the classroom teachers to more effectively teach reading on an individual basis.

Our professional and non-professional staff is about the same this year as last and is handling the assigned duties in an efficient manner. The only new person on the staff is Mrs. Alice White who teaches English to grades six, seven, and eight and also teaches girls physical education.

The use of the school plant has extended, as it should, so that there are few times during the entire year when the building is not occupied. The Summer Enrichment Program, Girl Scouts, Brownies, Arts Council, basketball and baseball teams are examples of the types of extra activities taking place here. We hope all groups, with a need for this facility, will feel free to call the principal and make the necessary arrangements.

Again I would like to close my report by saying that the staff, the School Board, the Supervisory Union staff, and the townspeople seem to be doing a good job of trying constantly to give quality education in Tamworth.
