# **TOWN WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 8:00 A.M. TO 7:00 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Wakefield in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Paul School in said Wakefield on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, 1997, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, numbered I through 28:

ARTICLE I: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 40:13 to allow official ballot voting on all issues before the Town? (3/5 majority vote required)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Paul School in said Wakefield on Saturday, the fifteenth day of March, 1997, at seven o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,500) for the purchase of a highway sander. (RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMEN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for the purchase and repair of a used grader. (RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMEN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for the purchase of computers, software and related equipment. (RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMEN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to add to the existing Capital Reserve Fund for the Landfill. (RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMEN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) to add to the existing Capital Reserve Fund for a transfer station/recycling facility. (RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMEN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) to add to the existing Capital Reserve Fund for the future purchase of a highway truck. (RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMEN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to add to the existing Capital Reserve Fund for the construction of a town recreational ballfield. (RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMEN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to add to the existing Capital Reserve Fund for



future bridge construction. (RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMEN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to add to the existing Capital Reserve Fund for the future purchase of a fire truck. (RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMEN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of constructing a new central fire station and to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) to be placed in this fund and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend. (RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMEN, NOT RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$28,000 (Twenty-eight thousand Dollars) to fulfill the Town's matching obligation for a Community Development Block Grant to be used to make the Wakefield Town Hall handicapped accessible; and to further authorize the Board of Selectmen to expend \$ 13,000 (Thirteen Thousand Dollars) previously appropriated (1996 Annual Town Meeting for construction of a Town Hall access ramp) to fulfill this matching obligation. (RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMEN, NOT RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept the conditional donation of property from David & Beverly Stevens; said property located on High St. adjacent to the Garvin Building, identified as Tax map 0031 lot 0042 and to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to design, construct, and landscape a municipal parking lot on the parcel. (RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMEN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for the purpose of design and construction of a public boat ramp and docking facility on Lovell Lake. (RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMEN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), such sum to be placed in trust with the Lovell Lake Cemetery Association Inc., the interest earned thereon to be used for the purpose of maintenance of two Town owned burial lots within said cemetery. (RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMEN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to direct the Planning Board to formulate and seek voter approval of an addition to the Wakefield Zoning Ordinance regulating the disposal of biosolids and organic sludge within the Town of Wakefield. (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000), such sum to be used as the required Town share of a grant from the NH Department of Transportation to design and construct sidewalks in the Sanbornville area of Lovell Lake, and to further authorize the Board of Selectmen to take all necessary actions to apply for and receive such grant. (RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMEN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 19: To see if the Town will vote to include a Detailed Statement of Payments from appropriated funds in the Annual Town report. (By petition.)



ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will vote to prohibit the processing, storage and landspreading of waste water treatment sludge/biosolids, including but not limited to sewage, paper and pulp mill sludge, whether it be wet, dry, composted, pelletized, mixed with other materials or injected on or into the land in the Town of Wakefield, except that this prohibition shall not apply to the waste water facility of the Town of Wakefield and its agreement with the Town of Brookfield, and the disposition of any wastes therefrom. (By petition.)

ARTICLE 21: Shall the Selectmen of the Town of Wakefield reduce the total number of employees of the Wakefield Police Department to 5? (By petition.)

ARTICLE 22: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 202 A:4-d authorizing the library trustees to accept gifts of personal property, other than money, which may be offered to the library for any public purpose, provided, however, that the trustees shall conduct a public hearing prior to accepting gifts in excess of \$500 in value and that no acceptance of personal property by the library trustees shall be deemed to bind the Town or the library trustees to raise, appropriate or expend any public funds for the operation, maintenance, repair or replacement of such personal property. (RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMEN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to have published in the Annual Town Report a complete listing of total salaries paid to each employee, and a complete listing of all vendors and the total money paid to each. (By petition.)

ARTICLE 24: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Recreation Revolving Fund for the Parks and Recreation Commission pursuant to RSA 35-B:2,II. The money in the Fund shall be in the custody of the Town Treasurer, and shall be allowed to accumulate from year to year. Such funds may be expended only upon order of the Parks and Recreation Commission, with approval of the Board of Selectmen, and only for purposes of furthering public recreation and parks in Wakefield. (RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMEN) (BUDGET COMMITTEE—NO POSITION) (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 25: Shall we modify the elderly exemptions from property tax in the Town of Wakefield, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$15,000.00; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$20,000.00; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$25,000.00. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$20,000.00 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$25,000.00; and own net assets not in excess of \$40,000.00, excluding the value of the person's residence. (RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMAN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (By paper ballot.) (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 26: To see if the Town will vote to adopt an exemption for the Totally and Permanently Disabled as set forth in RSA 72:37-b. (By petition.) (By paper ballot.) (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 27: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Million Six Hundred Thirty-Seven Thousand Three Dollars (\$1,637,003), inclusive of previously approved individual warrant articles, to defray town charges as submitted by the Budget Committee. (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 28: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## SELECTMEN'S REPORT 1996

1996 was, just as 1995, a year of change—many accomplishments and continuing challenges. Foremost in this summary report, we want to recognize Selectman Denise Roy-Palmer for her two years of selfless service and to thank her for her many hours of commitment to the governance of the Town of Wakefield. Selectman Roy-Palmer served for two years as the Wakefield Overseer of the Poor, which, in addition to usual Selectman's duties, required a great deal of added time and effort, often under times of hectic circumstances.

The newly constituted ad-hoc Solid Waste Advisory Committee has completed their research on the Solid Waste Transfer Station, and an engineering contract for the design of the Transfer Station has been awarded. This Committee has spent many hours of time in doing a complete study of the Town's future solid waste needs—and how best to meet these needs. The Board of Selectmen is grateful for all of this volunteer time and greatly appreciates the efforts of all concerned.

Several changes have occurred at our 101-year-old Town Hall. An up-to-date, state-of-the-art telephone system is now in place. Messages may be left on "voice mail" for each party you are attempting to reach should that person be away from their office. A new storage area has been created in the basement area. The jail cells in the basement are being readied for secure storage of older Town records, with shelving already in place. Future plans include improvements to the computer system. The Assessors' functions are to be modernized and consolidated with enhanced computer assistance, including graphics. All of this effort is designed to improve efficiency, maintain up-to-date data, and to offer our citizens whatever information they require in an instantaneous manner. Our overall plan for the Town Hall is to organize the work flow at your Town Offices to maximize convenience to the public. Our employees are undergoing training to accomplish these goals. In this area 1997 promises to be an exciting and challenging year.

Our concern in maintaining a first-class Fire Department is a major goal. Currently the Fire Commissioners are researching the advisability of rehabilitation of the present Central Fire Station or the complete replacement of the facility with a structure which would satisfy present building codes. The Selectmen recommended a sum of \$25,000 be raised and appropriated (Article 12) for the purpose of future Central Fire Station needs. The Budget Committee did not recommend this expenditure. Future Fire Service needs must be anticipated, and the Board of Selectmen believe we must begin now.

We have all heard a great deal about handicap access to your Town Hall. The Americans with Disability Act pretty much spells out the need for your Town Hall to be handicap accessible. The Selectmen have applied for a Community Development Block Grant to be used with funds already encumbered. The Selectmen are recommending a limited access—limited use lift which would access all three floors of your Town Hall—our thinking being governed by the current regulations and by the idea that if we do it, let's do it right.

As many of you know, Donald R. Jutton, the president of Municipal Resources, Inc., is serving as our interim Town Administrator. Mr. Jutton joins us in recognizing our dedicated employees, volunteers, the members of various and sundry boards, ad-hoc committees, and the citizens who freely participate in any activity which is for the betterment of the Town. Our strength comes from the

participation of all. We endeavor to improve the communication and dissemination of information to our citizens during the coming year while steadfastly planning for the future of our Town.

The Trustees of the Trust Funds are responsible for the investment of: (a) individual trust funds placed with the Town for the maintenance of cemeteries and (b) capital reserve funds as established at Town Meetings.

The investment vehicles Trustees are allowed to participate in are strictly regulated by the State of New Hampshire. The primary focus is safety of principal.

The cemetery trust funds and some capital reserve funds are managed by Charter Trust Investment Company. Their reports are reviewed by the Trustees quarterly. Their annual report is included in the Town of Wakefield Annual Report.

In 1996 the Trustees established three new capital reserve funds as directed at the 1996 Town Meeting. The funds were place in the New Hampshire Public Deposit Investment Pool. This pool is administered by the Municipal Investors Service Corporation. Their annual report is also included.

The Trustees will evaluate both investment companies in 1997 as to type of investments used and rate of return for the Town of Wakefield.

## **WAKEFIELD AREA AMBULANCE 1996 AMBULANCE REPORT**

The Wakefield Area Ambulance responded to 306 calls during 1996. These calls included 40 motor vehicle and water accidents, 215 home and sudden illness calls, and 5 fire calls. A total of 193 patients were transported to the hospital. Twenty-one responses were for mutual aid to other communities, and 18 were for mutual aid to Wakefield when attendants were not available.

We currently have 14 members of which 11 are emergency medical technicians (EMT) and 3 are licensed as first responders. Of the 11 EMTs, 8 are qualified for defibrillation, 2 are qualified for intravenous treatment, and 2 are qualified for limited drug treatment.

During 1996 the Corps logged over 2,500 hours of voluntary calls and training with no compensation other than personal pride and satisfaction of help to others in need.

Statistics show that more requests for assistance were on Sundays and Thursdays and that April, July, and August were the busiest months.

The Wakefield Ambulance Association, made up of Corps members and interested townspeople, donated over \$2,500.00 for equipment and training films from memorial and regular donations.

With the reduced number of members available for medical assistance from previous years, the Corps would welcome any person interested in being trained in medical aid. Please contact any Corps members to express this desire.

Please remember the Corps still holds a free monthly blood pressure clinic the first Wednesday of each month at the Branch River Commons from 10:00 am until noon. Anyone interested is welcome to come and have their blood pressure checked free of charge.

## ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER'S REPORT 1996

This year has passed with no change in the ongoing duties of Animal Control. Dog owners have licensed their pets to the top number of 600. In cases of lost dogs, this is always a help in being able to return their pets in a timely and less costly manner. Dogs **must wear** collar with license attached.

It is still very sad to see unwanted animals left to stray or to starve. Many thanks to different animal lovers in town who have come to the rescue of many of these former pets. A special one in mind was picked up after ten days by a young lady who came with a new collar and leash. The dog is doing well in its new home.

Wakefield Police Department again opened its doors for the Clinic in town. Dr. Flood of Acton, Maine gave us a successful day again. His services will be called for again in the spring for dogs and cats to have their rabies shots. Licenses will be available also.

A total of 34 dogs were boarded over the year for a total of 134 days. When collars with tags on dogs are used, these days can be cut. When your pet is found in another town, it helps in the return of pets also.

This year had 1939.6 miles logged, 523 incoming calls related to Animal Control. The breakdown which follows does not include barking or loose dogs, lost and found dogs and cats, or the calls that have been cared for on regular police time.

## WAKEFIELD ECONOMIC RESOURCE COMMITTEE

Appointed by the Selectmen in 1991, the Wakefield Economic Resource Committee (WERC) was organized to help expand local businesses and coordinate economic development while retaining the Town's rural character. Our work plan and vision was developed through the Community Stewardship Program. Each year we have worked to expedite changes which support local businesses and which become a foundation for our economic future.

This year many of our programs were directed to support business in the "Villages of Wakefield." We designed, printed and distributed two brochures promoting the area and various businesses and events. In conjunction with the Chamber of Commerce, we held a series of breakfast programs on topics of interest to the business community. We worked with the regional task force for the Route 16 Corridor Study to distribute a survey in Wakefield that would assure our input in the long-range planning of this important north/south roadway.

Our efforts in coordinating and organizing local artists and craftsmen as a marketing group were successful, and the "Wakefield Marketplace" became a reality. On summer weekends more than \$35,000 of goods were sold from the tent on the corner of Route 16 and Route 109. The participants were pleased with their success and are planning expansion in 1997.

We received a \$3,000 grant from the Lakes Region Charitable Trust and placed a computer and modem in the Gafney Library, which allows residents access to NHWORKS, an electronic bulletin board for employers and employees. This easy to use program enables job openings statewide to be posted and a person looking for work to search and post resumes without leaving Wakefield.

For the second year, WERC obtained a \$12,000 grant to sponsor a summer youth employment program. This year the teenagers helped prepare a section of the Garvin Building, cleaned up the beach at Province Lake, the Town Pound and Turntable Park, as well as acting as junior counselors for the Parks & Recreation Department's field trips. The program received an 'A' rating from NH Job Training Council.

We continue to work for the physical enhancement of Wakefield. Having been awarded \$82,500 in 1994 for the development of a sidewalk from Turntable Park to the Town Beach, we are now working with the DOT in the design and engineering phase. If approved at Town Meeting, construction should begin in September 1997.

Our support of the Heritage Commission continues as we administer the \$42,750 grant we secured for the Interpretive Center in the Garvin Building. This Center will become a museum and tourist center.

We also continue to work toward the development of our recreational resources, i.e., snowmobiling and cross-country skiing as winter sports that represent economic opportunities for Wakefield.

Over the past five years we've built a strong foundation for economic growth based on the Community Stewardship Program. The next several years will be spent directing this growth without compromising Wakefield's quality of life.

In addition to snow removal, regular maintenance and road repair, 1996 was a year of steady progress and accomplishments. Road projects were as follows:

1. Canal Road - Rebuilt and paved .4 miles; shimmed and overlaid .4 miles.
2. Stoneham Road - Reclaimed, ditched, and paved 1.1 miles; shimmed and overlaid .6 miles.
3. Witchtrot Road - Reclaimed, ditched, and paved .4 miles; shimmed and overlaid .6 miles.
4. Access Road - Paved 1,725'.
5. Leighton Corner - Ditched and rebuilt 1,000'.
6. Old Stage Road - Ditched and rebuilt 825'.
7. Pray Hill Road - Paved 2,400'.
8. Whippoorwill Road - Rebuilt lower approach.

At the request of the Wakefield School Board and in agreement with the Selectmen, the Wakefield Highway Department took over the winter maintenance of the Wakefield Schools. This includes the Paul School in the village of Sanbornville and the Union School in the village of Union.

We vote on most contracts over \$2,500 to outside agencies, individuals and municipalities, also major permits to use state waters. 267 unclassified positions as Commissioners and Directors within the Executive Branch of State Government, and the entire Judicial Branch of NH State Government is voted in by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Executive Council. We also vote on gubernatorial nominations of hundreds of citizens to various boards and commissions as prescribed by NH Law.

Anyone desiring further information should write or call our State House Office (listed below).

Citizens in the region should be attentive to several projects:

1) The statewide Health Care Council's 18-month planning project will be coming to conclusion in December of 1997. There are three very active Councils in this District. Information can be obtained by calling Commissioner Terry Morton, Department of Health and Human Services, at 1-800-852-3345.

2) The ten-year highway planning process will be underway this coming summer and fall. I will be conducting at least three hearings in this district to ascertain regional needs. Information on this project can be obtained by calling Commissioner Leon Kenison, Department of Transportation, at 271-3735.

3) The NH Joint Tourist Promotional Program will, I expect, be funded at least with \$500,000 to be matched by local Chamber of Commerce and tourists groups to promote your region. Information on this program is available from Commissioner Robb Thomson, Department of Resources and Economic Development, at 271-2411.

4) There is approximately \$172,000 waiting to be matched by local economic development promotion dollars from local groups. Information can be obtained on this program from Director Norman Storrs, Economic Development, at 271-2341.

5) There is about 10 million dollars waiting for applications from local governments for Community Development Block Grants to improve your local town and area. Information on how to apply can be obtained by calling Director Jeff Taylor, Office of State Planning, at 271-2155.

6) Local towns, cities, counties and eligible organizations should be aware of the large Federal and State Surplus Distribution Programs (the state surplus distribution center is open to the public at White Farm on Clinton Street in Concord, NH on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays). Further information may be obtained by calling Supervisor Art Haeussler, Surplus Distribution, at 271-2602.

7) Citizens and groups concerned with disabilities should be aware of the large number of services available from the Developmental Disabilities Council by calling Director Alan Robichaud at 271-3236.

8) The Department of Environmental Services, covering water, sewers, air, lakes, and rivers, has available information and financial resources by calling Commissioner Robert Varney or Assistant Commissioner Dana Bisbee at 271-3503.

9) The Department of Health and Human Services, including elderly, mental health, human services, public health, drug and alcohol abuse are all under Commissioner Terry Morton at 1-800-852-3345.

## CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Wakefield Conservation Commission was established in March 1988 by Town vote (RSA-36A), consisting of five members appointed by the Selectmen.

Meetings are held the second Monday of each month at 12:30 PM at Town Hall, and the public is welcome to attend.

The purpose of the Commission is to research the use of local land and water areas and establish an index of open space and wetland areas as part of public information. We also review requests that are sent to the State Bureau for filling, dredging, and dock construction. We do not have decision making powers, but make recommendations to state and local agencies.

This year we have reviewed 42 applications and made several on-site inspections. These inspections are in line with the policy of the Department of Environmental Services, Wetlands Division. We are also available to assist the Paul School in any projects that involve conservation.

Any gifts of money may be put into the separate Conservation account and allowed to accumulate from year to year for the purchase of land and development rights or any project to do with conserving land. We are helping to protect the lakes, rivers, and wetlands and would welcome anyone who might be interested in joining us in this community project.

## THE WAKEFIELD HERITAGE COMMISSION

1996 has been a full and productive year for the Wakefield Heritage Commission.

On a cool April morning we had the long-awaited for placement of the 1996 Cornerstone/Time Capsule in the front wall of the Town Hall. It was a day to remember! So many of the attendees were descendants of the early Wakefield families. Some people came from a distance. Many visited with old friends they hadn't seen in years. It was truly a Wakefield Day. The material placed in the two containers which were put in the wall behind the "1996" marker included:

1995 Wakefield School District Report; 1995 Museum of Childhood Newspaper; 100th Birthday of Town Hall, Fosters Daily Democrat, 9/25/95; 2 fund raising brochures for the J.W. Garvin Building; 2 different Wakefield Inn brochures; "Wakefield Villages" brochures, Chamber of Commerce; map of Town of Wakefield, Chamber of Commerce; Booklet of Bicycle Route Maps; Centennial Celebration Program, 9/23/95; 1994 Wakefield Brochure, Wakefield Economic the Year--Johnnie & Winnie Nason; Union Leader 8/8/95; Lakes Region Courier 8/24/95; Granite State News 9/27/95; Longmeadow Farm & Home Supply circular; Irving Oil circular; U. S. Mint Proof Set of Coins dated 1995-- 1 cent, 5 cents, 10 cents, 25 cents, 50 cents and \$1.00 bill, American Eagle silver dollar; H.E. Rogers Book, Treasurer of New (1895) Town Hall Building Committee [This book was found in Sue & William Denley's house attic after their barn burned in the late fall of 1995. This had been J.W. Sanborn's home. Included names of people who worked on the building, also accounts for payroll, freight, lumber, hardware, etc.]; 1995 Town telephone directory published by Hazel MacBrien Nursery School; 1994 town of Wakefield property valuations, Christopher Bancroft, Earl Dodier, John Blackwood--Selectmen; 1995 Annual Report of Town of Wakefield; lists of school children and their teachers in the Paul and Union Schools; agenda for 3/13/96 Selectmen's meeting; First Annual Wakefield School District Statistical Report 1995-1996; Shop 'n Save Circular for 9/24-9/30/95; Home Improvement Circular, 1995, supplement to The Granite State News and Carroll County Independent; and circular for Skehan Home Center - Golden Rule Lumber through 9/14/95.

The 1996 marker had been given earlier by William and Frances Twombly as a part of the 100th Birthday Celebration of the Town Hall. It was truly a very nostalgic morning for all who came and, everyone will know where this Cornerstone/Time Capsule is in 2095!

In carrying out our responsibilities to look after all historic sites and places in Town as well as the Wakefield Corner Historic District, we have held two public hearings to consider and act upon changes in two of the buildings in the District. We have also met with others to discuss possible future changes. The two hearings were very worthwhile, and the changes have been made or are currently being made.

We are very proud of the new roof which was put on the J.W. Garvin Building this past summer. The new roof was very much needed and a welcome sight to all. The cost, \$52,285, came from the mortgage which the Heritage Commission was allowed to secure by vote at the 1996 Town Meeting. At the time of writing this

report, the sills in the building are being inspected and renewed where necessary.

Our time frame for the Interpretive Center on the Scenic Byway in the Garvin Building includes much work between now and the middle of the coming summer. Bid papers will be going out soon for the initial work on the floors, walls, wiring, bathrooms, etc., for this room. We are currently busy locating and collecting artifacts for the Wakefield Heritage Museum in the Interpretive Center. The exhibits will depict the "Wakefield Story" covering the early settlement years, the pre-railroad growth, the arrival of the railroad, ice harvesting, blacksmithing, farming, home life, logging, family, retail and manufacturing endeavors, education, tourism, etc. We are planning to have visitor activated audio presentations explaining the various displays and exhibits. Some wonderful artifacts have already been given to the Commission for the Museum, and we hope that additional ones will be forthcoming as well. The Federal Grant of \$42,750, along with the Commission's match of \$10,688, will go a long way toward making this a reality.

Further, we want to mention especially the Governor's Summer Youth Work Program, which Wakefield qualified for. This program's work form included nine young people and their supervisor, Tess Garrett. The group gave a yeoman's service to the Garvin Building project. They were such a great team and moved the Interpretive Center project many steps forward in a matter of five or six weeks. They removed walls, removed unwanted material, fixed and replaced windows, scraped and painted window sills, rebuilt frames and on and on. A fine group of young people.

The Hay Scales have had a complete redoing this past year with the expertise of Kent Lewis and the Heritage Commission. It was necessary to rebuild the entire structure beginning with the base and on upward. Apparently for some time the carpenter ants had found the structure to be a suitable home. The Commission is most grateful to Mr. Lewis. It now looks like the treasured landmark that it really is.

This past year we chose the Old Town Hall--1837 and Wakefield Corner as our commemorative plaque for 1996, having used and sold the 1895 Town the preceding year. For 1997 we will present "Sarah's Spa" as number 3 in the Wakefield series. So many people have such happy memories of "Sarah's" and have requested that we do this.

As in the past many people have contributed financially and otherwise to protect and enhance our Town's valued historical sites as well as its ambiance and to each supporter who has helped in any way, a special thank you. Please stay with us in 1997 for we will continue to need you then as well. With you standing by us, next year can be as successful as this one has been.

## **TOWN OF WAKEFIELD PARKS AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT**

As 1996 has come and gone, many new programs have flourished within the parks and recreation department. Along with new programs, the old programs are a year older and more experienced. The following is a month-by-month update of happenings in the department.

During January, approximately 125 children participated in basketball. Basketball was offered to children ages kindergarten to high school. The younger children were enlightened of the basics, while older children participated in intramural league play sponsored by eight local businesses. At the junior high level, three teams traveled throughout the seacoast and southern New Hampshire during regular and post-season play.

During February, many children and adults participated in the 4th Annual Valentines Day Basketball Tournament. The tournament raised enough money to go towards the payment of installation, labor, and protective cover for the new scoreboard, donated by Coca-Cola®. March brought more basketball tournaments for the children, while the beginnings of softball and baseball season began to take shape.

As the season approached April-June, the baseball major league consisted of four teams while the minor league consisted of three teams. Culminating the season was the selection of two all-star teams that traveled for tournament play. Softball saw the playing of four intramural teams, while three travel teams were playing all throughout the seacoast. The 16-and-under team went to Canada to participate in a regional tournament. For the youngest ones there was T-ball. This program taught about 45 kindergarten and first graders the basics of baseball.

Also in the month of April, the department held its 4th Annual Fishing Derby on Twombly Farm. Approximately 45 children, and their parents, of all ages, participated in the early morning fishing derby.

During the summer of '96, the first summer program was implemented with great success. The program took place two days a week for six weeks. Approximately 30 children participated in organized games, craft activities, travel to area attractions, and learned from guest speakers. Overall, the program was a great success.

The summer was also filled with swim lessons and an adult trip. Approximately 50 children participated in the swim lessons, while 25 adults traveled to Foxborough for a preseason Patriots game. Way to go, Pats!

With the closing of the summer season, we stepped into fall with soccer, football, and cheerleading. With approximately 60 boys and girls, 40 boys and girls, and 15 girls participating in each sport, respectively, it was a busy learning season had by all. Moving into the winter sports season again, the same basketball program was offered. New to the winter season was the indoor soccer program. Wakefield ventured into this program with many surrounding communities and has met with great success.

Much effort gain was put into the quality of the ice skating rink but was met uncooperatively by the weather. Again, we hope for better skating conditions next year.

Adult programs that were offered throughout the year were volleyball, basketball, aerobics, and men's softball.

To keep you updated on the progress of the town parks: a new fence at the High Street playground location, new sign at the Town Beach, posting times of operation, and the ball field complex has recently been timbered and cleared.

Once again I would like to reiterate what was written in 95's Town Report: "One of the most vital factors in ensuring the success of the department's programs is the dedication and service given by volunteers within the community." None of the programs offered by the department would take place without this vital factor. During 1996 many changes took place within the parks and recreation department, but due to the continued support of the former Parks and Recreation Commission many of the programs are still the great success that they always were. As co-director, I would like to take this opportunity to express a special thanks to Ken Burkner, Peg Richards, Nancy Kosinski, Nicki Mercer, and Marjorie Moreau for their continued dedication to the department. Their numerous hours of dedicated support and service were, and still are, greatly appreciated.

I, with many regrets, have left my position as co-director but will remain on as a volunteer because working with your children is so rewarding. See everyone on the ballfield, basketball court, the beach, or wherever else I may be needed. "Thank you, all!" to a truly terrific and supportive community to work for!

## 1996 LANDFILL DEPARTMENT

The existing landfill is expected to be filled to capacity in 1998, necessitating the transition to a transfer station.

The Solid Waste Advisory Committee is studying plans submitted by King Engineering of Wakefield who has been hired to do the design work.

The volume of trash deposited at the landfill in 1996 has exceeded past years. It is appropriate at this time to remind and encourage Wakefield residents to be aware of the importance of being ecologically mindful.

**REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE.** A reduction in trash translates directly to a reduction in tax dollars

Currently the following items are being recycled: aluminum cans, cardboard, newspaper, scrap aluminum, iron, oil and antifreeze, glass, and white goods, i.e., appliances.

A head wall was constructed from 2'x4' concrete blocks so that trash can be deposited into the truck on three sides. A light aluminum bin and an iron bin were also constructed from 2'x4' concrete blocks. Each of these three depositories has been surrounded by metal guard rails to ensure safety.

# REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing any open burning. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law, and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are ten Forest Rangers who work for the N. H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. State Forest Rangers are available to assist communities with forest fire suppression, prevention, and training programs as well as the enforcement of forest fire and timber harvest laws. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols, and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments.

## WAKEFIELD FIRE DEPARTMENT 1996 REPORT

The membership of the Wakefield Fire Department for 1996 consisted of 29 volunteers. Under the direction of Fire Chief Todd Nason were eight officers and twenty firefighters. In addition to the Fire Chief, the officers consisted of one Deputy Fire Chief, one Captain, and one Lieutenant for each of the three fire stations, and one Second Lieutenant who served as the department's Training Officer.

The Wakefield Fire Department has twelve members who are state certified Career Level Firefighters, seven members who are state certified Firefighter Level I, seven members who are registered Emergency Medical Technicians, and six members who are certified First Responders (First Responders are career level personnel with additional emergency medical training). Most fire department members have a level of hazardous material emergency training, and many have been trained in the nationally recognized Incident Command System. Additional training, both inside and outside of our own department, is continually encouraged.

The apparatus fleet and equipment of the Wakefield Fire Department is housed in its three fire stations located in Union, Sanbornville, and East Wakefield. Wakefield Engines #4 and #5 and Utility #2 are housed in the Union Station. Engine #3 and Forestry 2 are housed in the East Wakefield Station. The Central Station in Sanbornville houses Wakefield Engines #1 and #2, Tank Trucks #1 and #2, Utility 1, Forestry 1, and the department's Fire and Rescue Boat.

During 1996 the Wakefield Fire Department responded to 147 emergency calls. This number is down by 19 calls from the total calls in 1995. Generally, the 1996 calls were handled faster than the 1995 calls, resulting in fewer apparatus-hours and fewer man-hours expended during 1996.

The greatest number of emergency calls each year continues to be for motor vehicle accidents. In 1996 the fire department responded to 36, the same number as in 1995. The highest incidence of emergency calls in 1996 occurred during the months of January and July, with 20 calls each.
