TOWN MEETING — WEARE, N. H. MARCH 10, 1959**

Article I:

To choose all necessary Town Officers for ensuing year.

Total number of votes cast: 505 Results as follows:

Article II:

To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of same.

Recommendation of the Finance Committee was the total sum of \$12,800., to cover the items A-P.

Mr. Lahey made the motion that this amount be increased by \$400., because of Town Officers' salaries. Motion seconded, and it was a vote in the affirmative that this amount of \$13,200 be raised for this article.

The Finance Committee reported that they thought the Tax Collector was being paid out of proportion to other towns and they recommended that his salary be cut by \$500.

Article III:

To choose by separate ballot, one Trustee of the Trust Fund for 3 years.

The term of Scott F. Eastman was expiring. It was moved and supported that the Clerk cast one ballot for Scott F. Eastman. This was done and he was elected Trustee.

Article IV:

To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Library for 3 years.

The term of Dorris D. Eaton was expiring, and she was again nominated. It was moved and supported that the Clerk cast one ballot and Dorris D. Eaton was elected Trustee.

It was also necessary to choose a new Library Trustee to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Helen E. Dearborn. Mr. Farmer moved that the Clerk cast one ballot for Irene Flanders for the term of one year. His motion was supported and the vote was unanimous. The ballot was cast by the Clerk, and Mrs. Flanders was elected.

Article V:

To make provisions for the collection of taxes.

It was moved and supported that the collection of taxes be left with the Selectmen.

Article VI:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes: said loans to be payable from taxes for the year 1959, and to issue notes therefor, in the name of the town, at such rates of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.

It was moved and supported that this article be accepted as read. No discussion. Vote was unanimous.

Article VII:

To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.

It was the recommendation of the Finance Committee that this article be dismissed. It was moved and supported that the Town allow no discount on taxes. No discussion. Vote in the affirmative.

Article VIII:

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of highways and bridges, and take any other vote relative thereto.

Mr. Millimet moved that whatever sum of money is appropriated under this article, its expenditure should be under the supervision of the Selectmen. Motion seconded and it was a vote in the affirmative.

The Finance Committee recommended the sum of \$15,000. There was much discussion on this article with several motions of various figures being given, but the motions were lost.

Vernon Wood reported \$10,279. had already been spent since January. Mr. Phelps said this had been a particularly bad winter due to the frequent ice storms which required sanding which meant additional money. Finally, the motion was made and seconded that the sum of \$18,000. be raised for this article. Vote in the affirmative.

Article IX:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,685.68 to be used with the sum of \$11,237.84 to be furnished by the State, for Class IV and Class V Construction, Reconstruction and Betterment Aid.

Finance Committee recommended that we raise the amount as stated in the article. It was moved and supported that the sum of \$1,685.68 be raised. No discussion. Vote unanimous.

Article X:

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Weare Police Department.

Finance Committee recommended the sum of \$700. It was moved and supported that this sum be raised. No discussion. Vote in the affirmative.

Article XI:

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Weare Volunteer Fire Department.

It was the recommendation of the Finance Committee that the sum of \$3500. be raised for the Fire Department.

It was moved and supported that this sum be appropriated. No discussion. Vote in the affirmative.

Article XII:

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of water holes.

The recommendation of the Finance Committee was \$100.

Mr. Rogers questioned as to whether or not the money raised under this article was ever used for the care of water holes. Mr. French reported that the sum of \$24.50 was spent last year for this purpose and a larger amount would have been spent but it was impossible to find labor.

Motion was made to dismiss Article 12. George Sawyer said the Town could not afford to do this — that these water holes were very essential to all communities. Motion was lost.

It was moved and supported that the sum of \$100.00 be raised and appropriated for care of water holes. Vote in affirmative.

Article XIII:

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of neglected cemeteries.

The sum of \$500. was recommended by the Finance Committee. It was moved and supported that the sum of \$500. responsible in seeing that this money was spent for cemeteries. No discussion. Vote in affirmative.

Article XIV:

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for band concerts.

It was the recommendation of the Finance Committee that the sum of \$300. be raised. Motion made and supported that the recommendation of the Finance Committee be accepted. Vote in the affirmative.

Article XV:

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Weare Library.

Finance Committee recommended the sum of \$250. Moved and supported that \$250. be appropriated for the Town Library. Vote in the affirmative. No discussion.

Article XVI

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

The Finance Committee recommended the sum of \$200.

It was moved and supported that the Finance Committee's recommendation be accepted. No discussion. Vote in the affirmative.

Article XVII:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$185. for the support of the Concord Hospital (By petition).

Recommendation of the Finance Committee that this sum be raised. Florence Flanders made the motion, and it was seconded, that the sum of \$185. be raised for the Concord Hospital. Vote in the affirmative. Mrs. Flanders also reported that 26 patients from Weare received treatment amounting to \$597.95 free service.

Article XVIII:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100. to purchase advertising space in the 1960 Guide of the Merrimack Valley Region or take any vote in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommended the sum of \$100.

It was moved and supported that this article be dismissed. Motion lost.

Vernon Wood explained that this booklet advertising our Town is read all over the country, including foreign countries.

Gordon Russell said one thing that Weare does have is good recreational facilities — better than most small towns. He thought we should keep the town on the map, if possible.

Charles Chagrasulis made the motion, and it was supported, that the sum of \$100. be raised. Vote in the negative. Mr. Millimet moved, and it was supported, that

the sum of \$99. be raised. Vote in the affirmative. Mr. Whitney said that while he was not too flushed with money at the present moment, he would try to contribute the other \$1.00 at the appropriate time.

Article XIX:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000. as the Town's share in replacing the two narrow bridges No. 111-043 and No. 110-048 at the Tavern in South Weare.

Finance Committee recommended the sum of \$2,000. It was moved and supported that the sum of \$2,000. be raised for this article. Vote in the affirmative.

Article XX:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200. for swimming instructions, and Water Safety Program at Lake Horace.

The Finance Committee's recommendation was the sum of \$200. The motion was made and seconded that Article 20 be accepted as read. Vote in the affirmative.

Article XXI:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to install toilet facilities and heating plant in the Town Office (Stone Memorial Building).

The Finance Committee recommended that this article be dismissed. There was much discussion concerning this article.

Daniel Sawyer said this building was a disgrace to the Town without toilet facilities. Gordon Russell said the Finance Committee voted to dismiss the article because it was trying to save money wherever possible, and that it wasn't because they did not recognize the needs of the building.

It was moved and supported that the sum of \$2,000. be raised for this article. The vote was uncertain, so a standing vote was requested. Results were:

IN FAVOR	135
OPPOSED	46

Mr. Russell made the motion, and it was supported, that

this be put out for bids. It was moved and supported that this be kept in town. Vote in the affirmative.

Meeting adjourned at 9:35 to re-open polls. Resumed at 9:50.

Article XXII:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used to make the grounds in front of the Town Hall presentable, and to start the parking lot project.

Finance Committee recommended \$500.

It was moved and supported that the sum of \$500. be raised to start the parking lot since people would not stop parking in front of the Town Hall until other space was made available. Vote in the affirmative.

Article XXIII:

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA Chapter 59, 71, 73, 79 through 86 inclusive, providing for the election of Town Officers by non-partisan ballot. If the Town votes favorably upon the preceding article to see if the Town will vote to require ten petitions for filing for office under RSA 59:81.

The Moderator explained this article. If adopted, it would do away with the caucus. Instead, a candidate would file with the Town Clerk for the sum of \$1.00 or ten names on petition (any number of names – 10, 25, 50 – whatever number the Town votes for), this filing must take place 8 days before Town Meeting takes place to allow for the printing of ballots. This method does not be raised for this article, but that the Selectmen would be change the ballot system, but it gives everyone an opportunity to file and it does away with the petitions of 50 signers if the second part of the article is voted.

It was moved and supported that ten petitions for filing for office be required, provided the Candidate does not want to pay the \$1.00 filing fee. Vote in the affirmative. No discussion.

It was also moved and supported that the candidate can file on or after February 1st, up until eight days before Town Meeting. Vote in the Affirmative.

Article XXIV:

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

There was no further business under this article.

It was moved and supported that this meeting be adjourned at 10:15 p.m. Vote in the affirmative.

sing space in the 1961 Guide of the Merrimack Valley Region, or take any other vote in relation there to.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Water Safety Program.
19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the continuation of improving the grounds in front of the Town Hall and parking lot.
20. To see if the Town will vote to add to the so-called 15-year plan for improving town roads, by hard-topping, using T.R.A. funds, the unfinished portion of the so-called Old Road, about seven tenths of a mile, running from Wilfred Lahey's to the old South Friend's cemetery, north of Clinton Grove.
21. To see if the Town will vote to continue Route 109 to Route 77.109 is on the T.R.A. 15 year plan (by petition)
22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the purpose of making a ball field in back of the New School.
23. To see if the Town will approve the proposed agreement(s) between the United States of America and the Town of Weare for the relocation of the East Weare and Johnson (Mt. Pleasant) Cemeteries located in the reservoir area of the Hopkinton-Everett Dam and Reservoir Project, and authorize the Selectmen to enter into and execute any instruments and agreements with the United States or its contractors in reference thereto, and further authorize the Selectmen to acquire the replacement sites when the work has been completed.
24. To see if the Town will vote to purchase an Addressograph machine for use in the Town Office, and to raise and appropriate a sum of money for same.

25. To see what action the Town will take, in regards to the Town Truck, or take any other vote in relation thereto.
26. To see if the Town will vote to accept the zoning ordinance recommended by the Planning Board.
27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be put in a reserve fund, for the purpose of installing a heating plant in the Town Hall in the future.
28. To transact any other business, that may come before this meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE POLICE DEPARTMENT

The police department now has an official office due largely to the co-operation of the Board of Selectmen in making available the room adjacent to their office. Thanks to the public-spirited co-operation of the U.S. Navy, the department was given desks, chairs, tables, file cabinets, lights, etc., from a de-commissioned aircraft carrier at the South Boston Ship Yard. Such furnishings were needed to complete the police office. The department feels that through a centralized office where records and files may be kept and interrogation and finger printing may be conducted, it will be better able to cope more efficiently with details pertaining to police work and thus be of a greater benefit to taxpayers, employees, and merchants. An invitation is extended to all interested citizens to come in and see the police station.

There are still problems to be worked out regarding the Everett-Hopkinton dam area in East Weare. Numerous homes have been broken into, particularly houses in which occupants have left their belongings to be removed at a later date. Some of the cases have been solved; others we anticipate a solution in the near future with the co-operation of the State Police and the U. S. Government Security Police.

The spring of 1960 will bring forth traffic problems due to the movement of heavy trucks and equipment through East Weare as work progresses on the flood control project. However, after the completion of new roads and bridges much of the traffic within the work area will be alleviated.

Eight pupils of the elementary school were sworn in as junior traffic officers and were presented badges and traffic belts. Their work assignment at the Route 114 crossing by the Weare Center Store appears to have proved its merit, as no violations have been listed. We still hope that an overhead traffic warning light will be installed at this location.

It might be well to note that members of the Weare Police Department contributed many hours to events in Weare. The department facilities were extended on emergency cases to the New Boston area for a plane crash, for two escapees from the N. H. State Prison, and for escapees from the State Hospital in Concord and the County Farm in Grasmere.

It was reported that a few people had dumped refuse on private property instead of taking it to the town dump. Pictures of the condition were taken as evidence in case of court action, should the parties involved fail to abate the nuisance within a specified time limit.

Fifteen cases appeared before municipal court as compared with the same total cases cleared during the previous year.

Of the ten traffic accidents in the Weare area, there were seven injuries and no fatalities.

There was a decrease in the number of non-observances of traffic signs and yellow line violations.

Two arrests made for driving while intoxicated as compared to three in 1958.

The police and fire department forces were alerted when a bomb threat occurred at the Saturday night dance, Weare Town Hall.

Prevention Is Everybody's Business

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note—58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple —

1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden — the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles — use your ash tray.
5. Don't burn at home — Use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

It was moved by Charles Todd and duly seconded, that the sum of \$1,875.00 be raised and appropriated, Weare's share, to employ the services of an educational consultant to study the school problem, in cooperation with New Boston and Goffstown. There was much discussion and a ballot vote was requested. 149 ballots were cast. Yes-89 No-59 Blank-1. The motion carried.

Article 12. Mr. Frank Sawyer asked that copies of the budget be available to the voters at the next School District Meeting.

It was moved that the meeting be adjourned. The motion carried and the meeting adjourned at 10:00 P. M.

Barbara Knox was nominated. Cynthia Parkerson was nominated; to serve until the Annual School District meeting in March 1961. There being no further nominations it was moved that the nominations cease. Number of votes cast: 145. Cynthia Parkerson - 43.

Barbara Knox - 101. Les Knox - 1. The said Barbara Knox was declared elected.

William Bushby was nominated. Joseph Millimet was nominated to serve until the Annual School District Meeting in March 1962. There being no further nominations it was moved that the nominations cease. Number of votes cast: 132. Joseph Millimet - 49. William Bushby - 82. Elizabeth Millimet - 1. The said William Bushby was declared elected.

Janet Purington was nominated. Lillian Faustini was nominated to serve until the Annual School District Meeting in March 1962. There being no further nominations it was moved that nominations cease. Number of votes cast: 123. Lillian Faustini - 32. Janet Purington - 90. Sylvia Brown - 1. The said Janet Purington was declared elected.

The said Walter Joseph Brennan, Percy Carter, Lyhl Perrigo, Barbara Knox, William Bushby, and Janet Purington in open meeting took the oath of office prescribed by law.

Article 3. The following resolution presented by Frank N. Sawyer was adopted by the meeting:

"Whereas, in our opinion, certain of the teachers in our school system have been professionally mistreated by the superintendent and the three members of the school board who have collaborated with him, therefore be it

Resolved that we, the voters in the Weare School District do by this resolution deplore the mistreatment the teachers have suffered and do express to them our confidence in their ability as good teachers, worthy of their chosen profession, and to wish for them success in their further endeavors."

Lyhl Perrigo expressed the thanks of the Citizen's Committee to the voters of the District for their interest and support.

Leslie Knox expressed the hope that taxpayer's money would not be used to contest the legality of the meeting.

It was moved by Iola Tenney and duly seconded that Mr. Rysnik be asked to present the diplomas at the Graduation Exercises.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Weare qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 4th day of March, 1960, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
4. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
5. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
6. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
7. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
8. To see if the District will appoint a study committee to work in conjunction with the school board for the purpose of purchasing the former telephone office adjacent to the High School building and the possibility of adding a new room or rooms to the elementary school, to provide additional classroom space.

9. To see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$600. for the purpose of painting the exterior of the high school.

10. To see if the District will vote to appropriate any funds received from tuition for so-called state wards toward payment of general expenses of the school year 1959-60.

11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.

12. To see what sum the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of carrying out the recommendations of the State Fire Marshall for the elimination of fire hazards in the Schools of the District. (inserted by petition) .

13. To see if the district will vote to decrease the membership of the School Board from nine (9) to three (3) members, and to elect one member to the Board each year, to hold office for three (3) years and until a successor is chosen and qualified.

14. If article 13 is adopted, to choose a member to the School Board for a term of three years.

15. If article 13 is not adopted to see if the District will ratify, approve and confirm the action taken by the District at the special meeting held on May 18, 1959 in voting to increase the size of the School Board from three (3) to nine (9) members. (Inserted by petition) .

16. If article 15 is adopted to choose three (3) members to the School Board for a term of three (3) years, two (2) members for a term of two (2) years, and two (2) members for a term of one (1) year.) Inserted by petition) .

17. To see if the District will request the School Board to hold all meetings of the School Board at some public place within the District, to make their meetings open to the public, and to maintain accurate minutes of their meetings setting forth the action taken at each meeting. (Inserted by petition) .

18. To see if the District will require the School Board and the officers and employees of the District to keep and maintain all financial and other public records of the District, in the Town Office Building or some other suitable public place within the District, and to make such records open for inspection by any inhabitant of the District during established business hours. (Inserted by petition).

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of Weare School District which was made by this Division in accordance with your request. This audit covered the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959, and the period from July 1st to September 30th, 1959. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1958 and June 30, 1959, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$8,399.39 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959 are presented in Exhibits C and D.

As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a revenue surplus of \$1,181.78, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$144.36, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$1,326.14.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures (Exhibits E-1) .

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1959 and September 30, 1959, is indicated in Exhibits E-2 and E-3.

School District Appropriation Account (Exhibit F) .

A statement of the School District appropriation account for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959, is contained in Exhibit F. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1959, the School District had received from the Town of Weare an advance on the 1959-1960 appropriation in the amount of \$1,352.16. This is shown as a liability account in the balance sheet of June 30, 1959.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Deficit:

The current deficit (excess of current liabilities over total assets) decreased from \$4,639.01 to \$3,239.62, during the fiscal year as shown by the following statement:

Adjustment a/c Unrecorded Receipts:

It is noted that it was necessary to make an adjusting entry on account of unrecorded receipts of prior years amounting to \$223.25, in order to reconcile the cash book balance with the bank balance. (Exhibit E-2) .

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Weare:

Public education is considered by many to be the most important single function of government. We have schools because we have children who need education. The physical and mental health and development of our children is our basic need — for their sake and safety as well as the welfare of the country.

The success of a school is measured by the academic progress of the pupils and to the extent that it fulfills an underlying philosophy of the American public school system which emphasizes the development of the individual to the limit of his potential as an individual and as a future citizen in a democracy.

The advent of a new scientific age impressed upon our society and forced upon us by Russia, has increased the demands made upon education.

The greatest bulwark against communism is a well educated populace; the greatest investment for our children is a good, sound education.

Recent Achievements

This is the report of the second year of the schools with the present superintendent. Due to your appropriations and support we have been able to make progress in these areas this year:

The results of the work of the Helping Teacher are recognizable, not only in the correlation and improvement of teaching methods, but through standardized test scores demonstrating that our children compare favorably with the national grade norms in both grades and subjects. Curriculum evaluation is continuing and in certain subject areas, study guides to aid the teacher in making his presentation more effective and interesting, are currently being prepared. Teacher visitation within the Union has been introduced in order that some of the excellent teaching techniques of some of our master teachers may be

disseminated on both the elementary and secondary levels. Seminars have been held, in which teachers instructing in the same subjects have exchanged ideas and methods of better subject presentation.

The basic testing program started last year is gradually being enriched. We are fortunate to have available to us within the Union, the services of two trained experienced guidance counselors teaching at the Goffstown High School to assist our teachers in both this area and in Guidance.

The purchase of library and reference books have been increased this year and this developmental program is in its second year phase. Books purchased in this program are supplemental to the Town Library and the State Circulating Library. Care is exercised by the district not to purchase duplicate copies of books which are owned locally. It is interesting to note that during the past year, school children have circulated more volumes from the town libraries than formerly.

Our buildings were inspected by a representative from the State Fire Marshall's office and many of the suggestions were completed during the past school year. Some larger and more extensive ones are incorporated in the new budget.

It may be of interest for citizens to know that your school district belongs to a Supervisory Union, comprising about 1850 pupils, 83 teachers and 50 other personnel; that the combined operating budget of all five districts for the current year is slightly less than \$800,000. Many supplies are now purchased upon a Union basis in order to achieve a substantial saving and others are advertised for competitive bidding. This past year in which this practice was carried on for the first time, resulted in a financial saving to the Union of a four figure number.

Volume purchasing is not the only benefit to be derived from a close knit Supervisory Union. This medium makes it possible for a local district to be able to supplement some of its educational tools of learning, with loans of purchases from other districts. For instance, this year all districts within the Union plan on purchasing a number of film strips in either science or mathematics. By con-

trolled ordering of titles, each district will be able to benefit from this purchase, not only from the few titles it purchased but the ability to utilize other film strips from the other four towns upon a loan basis. Thus from one investment, a five fold benefit may accrue.

During this past year we were able to supply your schools with an adequate supply of books, general supplies and tools of learning, which allows a good teacher to be more effective. Any artist needs tools.

Title III of the National Defense Act stipulates that local districts may be reimbursed 50% for approved expenditures of certain items to implement the teaching of science and mathematics in grades 1 - 12. The intent of the Act is to have the local district reinvest this money in more educational tools rather than to be used as tax relief. Some of these items are included in your proposed budget.

It is a pleasure to report that the local claim for Title III Reimbursement for the current year has been approved for \$266.95

Next to pupils ,the most important item in a school is a faculty composed of happy, contented and capable teachers. It takes time and effort to assemble such a staff. Many factors enter into this development; such as salary, moral, spirit, security, size of classes, etc. Salary can never be minimized, but neither may a price be set upon personal happiness and contentment.

If our schools are to be what we want them then we must see to it that they are staffed with the people who fit into the above delineated criteria. It is a distinct pleasure to report that the local staff is to be complimented.

Needs

Any good system never can become complacent; some improvement can always be made. Evaluation programs must be continuous.

To supplement what we are already doing and to make curriculum enrichment and acceleration, both for the it more effective we would like to see more individual gifted and the retarded pupil.

In this connection, the acquisition of an art teacher on a Union basis would strengthen this area of the curriculum. We should investigate fully the possibility of forming a special Union class in the very near future for the mentally retarded pupils.

The need for experienced and qualified teachers is always with us and can best be coped with by adequate salaries and good working conditions.

Our most pressing needs are for space and classrooms — both immediately and upon a long term basis.

In seeking an answer to this space problem, the services of a study group were utilized and their recommendations, along with that from a nationally known and recognized school consultant, were rejected by the voters.

Additional space is needed for grades seven and eight and a decision should be reached in regard to the physical aspects of the high school building.
