TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wentworth in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Wentworth on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise money sufficient to secure State Aid on maintenance of Trunk Line roads.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise money sufficient to secure State Aid on maintenance of State Aid Roads.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise money sufficient to secure State Aid on State Aid Construction.
- 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400. for White Pine Blister Rust, to be spent in cooperation with the State Forestry Department.
- 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$25. for the observance of an Old Home Sunday to be held the third Sunday in July or July 19.
- 8. To see what action the Town will take in regard to raising and appropriating a sum of money for finishing repairs of Town Hall.
- 9. To see how much money more than required by law the Town will vote to raise for highways and bridges.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money if necessary.
- 11. To see what action the Town will take regarding raising money for Street Lights.
- 12. To see what action the Town will take in regard to disposing of the covered bridge.
- 13. To see what action the Town will take in regard to buying a piece of land above Town Hall for parking ground.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to use the Library fund, \$336. as a general fund.
- 15. To see what action the Town will take in regard to paying the Doctor.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading from Buffalo Road to the Campbell place, so called, subject to gates and bars.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue a piece of road in South Wentworth leading from the Bedell place to the main road, subject to gates and bars.
- 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Wentworth School District:

This is my first report as Superintendent of Schools. The statistics for the year 1929-1930 appear after this report. The supervisory comment and recommendations are for the current year in as much as the Superintendent taking over the supervision on May 1 there was time only to familiarize himself with the problems of the district and close up the work of the year.

Survey

A survey of the district is being made with the Stanford achievement test, a battery of 762 responses covering a wide range of fundamental subjects. We

have thus definite standards to compare our grades with similar grades throughout the country. tests enable us to determine the status of our grades. of the individual within the grades, to prescribe remedial work for pupils behind their grades, and on what subjects emphasis should be stressed. The survey has been completed and the policy of the present supervision will be to stress reading, both oral and silent. A basic reading system has been installed. A sustained effort is being made throughout the district to increase the working vocabularies of pupils and enable them to comprehend fully and accurately the thought of the printed page. A recent authoratative investigation draws the conclusion that not less than 80% of the failures in grades seven to twelve are due to deficiencies in reading ability. It is a fair question to raise as to how much retardation costs throughout the state when 4,443 pupils were reported as not promoted last June.

Instruction

Two changes have been made in the teaching staff this year. Irene Bilodeau after two years of very successful work at Atwell Hill resigned much to the regret of the management. Martha Nichols, a Plymouth graduate of 1930 was appointed teacher there and the work is progressing well.

The Board has discontinued the policy of placing cadet teachers at the Buffalo School and appointed Marjorie Brown, a teacher of considerable experience. The spirit of the school is excellent, the attendance high, tardiness almost negligible, instruction good, and work motivating well. There is a marked increase in spirit and interest, on the part of the pupils. Appreciation is here recorded of the splendid instruction of Minnie S. Bennett, Alice B. Bewley and Lena B. Walker. The policy of the Board in paying substantial salaries and thus receiving and maintaining a stable staff of teachers is highly commendable.

The system of marking has been established with an effort to meet the objectives of public school education. Public schools are maintained to develop good citizenship. Scholarship is highly desirable, but does not of itself constitute good citizenship. Consequently dependability, conscientious effort, initiative, ability to work with group, attendance, etc., are considered in determining ranks. After all, children do not come to school to receive marks — they come to learn and to be stimulated to learn. Where this system has been installed outside this union good students have been stimulated to do real superior work and others have been encouraged to do passable work, thus reducing non-promotion.

Parents are advised now 2 weeks before report cards come out whether their children are probably going to fail in one or more subjects. Thus parents know the educational status of their children and an opportunity is provided to stop failure before it is too late. The opinion of the writer is that hundreds of children are drifting up aimlessly through the grades for lack of cooperation between parent and school. Parents should not be contented to let their children "just get by", when school reports indicate clearly that children are making only indifferent effort.

Attendance

The attendance last year was slightly under that of the state. Three schools of the district exceeded the percent for the state. The Buffalo school which was lowest will be near the top this year assuming it keeps up its present attendance throughout the year. An examination of the registers makes it fair to predict that there will be a marked decrease in tardiness which has been excessive for the past few years.

The records show that for the past 5 full school years Dorothy Dow has had perfect attendance. Althea and Bessie Dow for the past 4 years and Bernice absent.

only one day. There are other instances of perfect attendance in this family. Surely this is an unusual and highly enviable record for attendance and determination to receive the full benefit of public school education. The records show also that Franklin Snelgrove has had perfect attendance the last 4 years. All the above children have been neither absent nor tardy this year at the present writing.

Health

During the early fall there was an epidemic of whooping cough in the village which affected the primary room for the most part. Consequently, this room did not motivate fully until well into the fall, but every effort possible has been made to make good the losses sustained and in all probability approximately the usual amount of work will be covered.

The school nurse reports 105 cases of underweight, defective vision, hearing and teeth, diseased tonsils, defective breathing, etc. Of these only 25% show any correction. While undoubtedly more have had medical attention and advice nevertheless, one cannot altogether escape the conviction that many parents pay little or no attention to the recommendations of the nurse. Children cannot do good work suffering physical discomfiture and losing more or less time from "poor days." It is neither fair to child nor teacher to expect good results under these conditions. Furthermore, neglect of these all important affairs often leads to physical handicap throughout adult life.

Property

During the summer a Kaustine chemical toilet was installed at the Foster school. A year ago the Superintendent recommended installation of electricity at the Village School and the Woman's Club has kindly offered to do so. Light is urgently needed. For a considerable part of the school year light is now poor by 3

o'clock and sometimes earlier. Children undoubtedly are straining their eyes in regular school work and there is but little opportunity for teachers to work and have personal conferences with children after school. In my opinion electricity should eventually be furnished in every school where available even if it is not possible to furnish it to all schools.




