The Friends of the Nesmith Library was formed this year. We are indeed fortunate to have so many interested people sign up as Charter members. For a new organization much has been accomplished. A very successful reception was held during book week with our teachers as honored guests. We hope to have this an annual event and all residents are most welcome. Also story hour was started that week, at 10 A.M. Saturday mornings for the youngsters 5-9 years of age. The Friends have stimulated much interest for our people to use their library. Circulation has more than doubled over 1965. The library was decorated for the Christmas holidays by the Friends. The following Friends have donated time working at the library: Mrs. Robert E. Devlin, Mrs. Walsh, Mrs. Carter, Mrs. Semple, and Miss Beverly Despres. Also many new plans are being formed for summer programs.

Our road agent, Mr. Chester Jarosky supplied our library with fireplace wood. Three of our Senior Girl Scouts donated many hours to work as library aids at the Nesmith Library during 1966. Many thanks go to Misses Ruth Herbert, Beverly Despres and Mary Devlin.

Your librarian has attended many library meetings, workshop and U. N. H. Extension courses. Much has been accomplished in the Statewide Library Development Program, with public libraries representing 92% of the state's population agreeing to participate. Centralized book ordering and cataloging has been met with widespread acceptance among affiliated libraries. The 1966 grants-in-aid has awarded \$100 worth of reference books to the Nesmith Library. These were chosen by your librarian.

This year we have purchased an adult encyclopedia, a telephone has been installed and a start on modern lighting. We are requesting that modern lights be installed in the stack room and if possible the reading room also. Adequate lighting is badly needed. I am sure everyone has noticed the major works as the new roof and painting inside and out.

The state bookmobile from the extension library in Exeter has made several visits during the year and has lent our library the total of 3317 books.

In the reading room we have had exhibits covering articles from many parts of the world, as well as local arts and crafts.

Following is a list of magazines received by the library: Mc-Calls, Holiday, American Home, American Heritage, Popular Mechanics, American Girl, Redbook, Jack and Jill, Profiles, L. H., Journal,

National Geographic, Harpers, Consumers Research, Newsweek, U. S. News and World Report, Good Housekeeping, Yankee, Saturday Review, Atlantic, and N. H. Clubwomen. The current magazines are available only at the reading tables and all others may be borrowed the same as books. The library has the guide to periodical literature and is available on the reference shelf.

Currently the library is open Tuesday and Thursday from 3 P.M. until 8 P.M. and Saturday, the hours are from 12 Noon until 5 P.M. Beginning in April we expect to be open another day. The new hours will be announced.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The year 1966 for the Town was one of much activity. The rate of residential growth, however, slowed down due to the unavailability of mortgage money. New construction for the year about equaled 1965. This is above the average for surrounding towns, pointing out the desirability and popularity of our Town.

Much of the activity was centered around the complete reappraisal of all properties. In general, we were well satisfied with the work done by R. P. Daigle Associates, and it was accomplished with a minimum of problems. Most problems were caused by the fact that our Tax Mapping program was not complete. The reappraisal along with the tax mapping has established a more up-to-date and efficient system of assessing for the Town.

Another area of activity has been with the Planning Board, and in turn developing the Master Plan. Thomas Associates, a consulting planning firm, has been working with the Board. The results of this work will be presented to the townspeople in the near future.

Tied closely to the growth of the Town is the work being done by the Commercial Development Committee. This group has become more active this year, and is vitally concerned with attracting the right kind of commercial properties to Windham.

We have been represented on, and interested in, two other committees that have been active during the year. The School Needs Committee is concerned with the future growth of the school program, and has presented a separate report. The Recreation Committee has worked on definite proposals that will be presented at Town Meeting.

We have worked closely with both the Police and Fire Departments in organizing for present needs, and planning for future growth. During 1966, we joined the Derry Visiting Nurses Association and now offer this service to all Town residents. This is especially important to people eligible for Medicare benefits.

The highway construction and maintenance program has gone well for the year, and we have planned for improvements in 1967. Many roads need new construction and we should be working towards a town controlled maintenance depot with more town owned equipment.

Additional improvements were made on both the Library and Town Hall. Physical improvements were made on the Library, but more important, we feel that our Library services have been greatly

improved. Many improvements were made to the Town Hall and others are planned.

These are but highlights of activities for 1966, and a few of the plans for the future. It takes a lot of organization and planning to keep the Town on a progressive basis. It also takes a lot of civic minded people with constructive ideas. We welcome ideas and help and we encourage intelligent participation in Town affairs.

FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

Fire records are made by people---those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966.)

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

- 1. A closely coordinated and integrated state-town organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.
- 2. Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us; (1) the careless disposal of cigaretts; (2) the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owners and contractors to completely extinguish their brush burning fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres - - a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest fire control organization.

- 1. If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is covered with snow. To minimize risk the best way to dispose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping area.
- 2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.
- 3. Don't leave a live camp or cooking fire.
- 4. Most important Instruct your children that matches are not play things.

PLANNING & ZONING

REPORT FOR 1966

Regular meetings of the Planning & Zoning Board were held on the third Monday of each month throughout the year. In addition meetings were held on the first Thursday of each month with Thomas Associates on the Master Plan. The first phase of the Master Plan was outlined by Mrs. Thomas at a public meeting held on April 7th.

In preparation of new zoning regulations, numerous other meetings were held by the Board during the fall of the year. An early draft of the proposed new regulations was presented by Thomas Associates at a public meeting on January 5, 1967. It is planned to present these new regulations to the voters at a special town meeting to be held as early as possible in 1967.

The following sub-divisions were approved:

9 lots - Daniel DelPapa, Hawley Road

6 lots - William Gillis, Gillis Road

4 lots - Edward Sullivan, Range Road

31 lots - Russell Lamson, Rock Pond Road

One preliminary plan for a proposed large sub-division was disapproved in its entirety because the board believed it would be an undue hardship for the town to provide necessary services.

Three members of the Board, Kenneth Lovell, Fred Terrio and Robert Yennaco completed a ten week seminar on Community Planning sponsored by the University of New Hampshire and the New Hampshire Department of Resources and Economic Development.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Windham for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1966, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets - December 31, 1965-December 31, 1966: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1965 and December 31, 1966 are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Surplus decreased by \$9,247.73, from \$25,408.89 to \$16,161.16 in 1966. Inasmuch as there were no outstanding long term notes or bonds as of December 31, 1966, the Balance Sheet Surplus of \$16,161.16 represents the Current Surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) on that date.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1966, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$3,655.63, less a revenue surplus of \$984.90, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$2,670.73.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1966, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1966, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any change which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Tax Collector's Records:

We offer our commendation to the Tax Collector for the excellent tax records which she maintains.

Surety Bond:

The surety bond of the Town Clerk should be increased from \$4,000,00 to \$7,000.00

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Windham for their assistance during the course of the audit.

HEALTH OFFICER

At the request of the Board of Health, due to the drought and the increased use of the facilities at Cobbett's Pond, the New Hampshire Water Pollution Commission took 56 bacteriological samples of the pond with the following results:

45 or 86, 5% met Class A bacterial standards 51 or 98% met Class B-1 bacterial standards

Minor pollution sources will produce local areas where the B-1 classification is in violation, and these sources will be corrected as soon as discovered.

In the coming year, it is planned to sample all the ponds and brooks in the town.

We wish to thank you for your interest and cooperation in preventing and controlling pollution in the town.

- 3. To see if the Townwill authorize the Selectmen and treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's Deed.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay for Interest owed by the Town.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Town Officers' Salaries.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Windham, New Hampshire qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Windham Center School in said district on the 8th day of March 1967, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

By vote of the School Board the polls for this meeting will remain open from 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon to 8:00 in the afternoon and as much longer as the voters of the district may direct at the opening of the meeting.

Articles of the warrant not covered by ballot to be acted upon at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon.

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 6. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.
- 7. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept on behalf of the district any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to accept in the name of and in behalf of the school district, gifts for the use of the schools.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of Public Law 89-10, designed to improve educational opportunities with particular reference to children of low-income families, and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

- 10. To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate and place with the trustee of Trust Funds the sum of \$2,000. This is to be added to the existing Searles School Heating Replacement Fund.
- 11. By request of Fred S. and Lydia W. Tinkham to see if the Windham School District will vote to give a Quitclaim Deed to Fred S. and Lydia W. Tinkham to the following described parcel of land:

A certain tract or parcel of land with the buildings thereon situated in Windham on the Westerly side of Kendall Pond Road, being the former District #4 School House Lot and being more particularly bounded and described as follows:

Commencing at the Southeasterly corner of the premises at the highway; thence South 85° West eight (8) rods to a corner stone post; thence North 3 1/2° West ten (10) rods by a line of posts to a stone post; thence North 89° East by posts eight and one-half (8 1/2) rods to a wall at the highway; thence Southerly by the West boundary of the highway ten (10) rods to a point of beginning, containing one-half (1/2) Acre, more or less.

- 12. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the installation of in-wall cafeteria tables in the multi-purpose room.
- 13. To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,100.00 for the purpose of purchasing and installing an incinerator at the Center School.
- 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting, including the appointment of legal committees.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the school board and citizens of Windham I hereby submit my 4th annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

New Assistant Superintendent of Schools

Mr. Bernard Ellis was elected to the position of Assistant Superintendent of Schools as of July 1, 1966 to fill the vacancy created when Mr. Ira Stickney resigned in February 1966 to assume the position of Consultant in the Division of Administration with the New Hampshire State Department of Education in Concord, N. H. Mr. Stickney will deal in problems of school construction, reorganization and school administration problems. His service to Supervisory Union #10 was much appreciated, and we wish him success in his new position.

Mr. Ellis originated from the Keene, N. H. area where he attended the local schools and graduated from Keene State College. He taught and held administrative and supervisory positions in Connecticut for more than ten years. Mr. Ellis holds advanced degrees from University of Connecticut and University of Hartford.

Growth

The fact that we live in a growing community is now quite well established but the amount of the growth yet to come is still subject for speculation and will no doubt overshadow anything we can imagine at the moment.

Some factors that researchers have brought to light for our consideration are:

- 1. The population of the United States will more than double during the period 1960 to 2000.
- 2. The population of the world will more than double during the same period.
- 3. Medical Science will continue to increase life expectancy of a person living in the United States.
- 4. Technology will continue to affect the work week and job opportunities.
- 5. Mobility will continue to be a way of life.
- 6. Interdependence among various regions of the country and various parts of the world will continue to grow.
- 7. The population of New Hampshire is expected to nearly triple over the next 60 years. Reduction of the birth rate on a

national scale has led to revision of the total population increase for New England. However, New Hampshire has witnessed a larger total population increase than predicted by the 1960 census. Immigration is expected to more than overcome the decline in natural increases and continue New Hampshire's trend.

The problem of providing quality education will increase in dif-

ficulty as the population continues to grow.

The impact of expanding costs of education is keenly felt by the home owner. I feel strongly that other sources of taxes must be explored in order that the property owner will be able to share the heavy burden of education costs and also provide for the many other civic improvement demands that a growing town needs.

The Windham School Board, with the support of the citizens of the school district, has moved toward a solution of the educational needs brought about by a fast-growing population. The board and citizens have decided on a move toward quality education which is most important in a fast-growing community. The planning for new additions is one phase of attention that has been continually under study and even at this time a school-needs survey committee has been at work for months investigating the next construction step.

Windham has led the area in salaries, fringe benefits and also a most important area, that of lowering the class sizes and doing away with multiple grades in a single classroom.

I believe that the most critical area needing attention is:

1. New Construction--The Center School will be over capacity September 1967. The School Board and School Survey Committee have been exploring the "middle school" area. This type of school would house grades 5-6-7-8 or 6-7-8 depending upon the availability of rooms at the Center School.

This new school could be planned as a long-range program leading eventually to a Junior-Senior High School as the population grows. The overall planning for a complete school should be done and then constructed in steps or phases so as to provide space for pupils as needed and be able to end with a full-size school when the number of pupils is sufficient towarrant a high school, and also when the contract with Pinkerton Academy expires.

This critical problem has many facets.

A. Need to provide broader curriculum in the Junior High area such as Industrial Arts, Home Economics, Art and Physical Education as well as a Language Lab and Science Lab. B. Secondary Education--Crowded conditions at Pinkerton A-cademy--Projected growth potential shows a most serious space problem.

C. Need for additional classrooms in Windham.

A unified approach could aid all problems.

I wish to express sincere appreciation to the School Board, School Survey Committee and the Center School Staff, all working for a common purpose "Good education for the youth of Windham."

The gifts of time, books, equipment, etc. by individuals and organizations are appreciated and welcome.

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REPORT OF ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

It is my pleasure to hereby submit my first Annual Report to the people of Windham.

Having assumed my duties as of July 1, 1966, it is only possible to make general comments concerning your school.

Of particular interest to the town should be the forthcoming new school facility in Windham. The study committee has spent a great number of hours gathering the necessary information to make sound decisions concerning this new facility.

The curriculum project has selected consultants who will work with each committee, from time to time, during the study. Mr. Howard Beatty, from Newton, Mass., will work with the Social Studies group and Dr. Richard Chambers, from Boston University, will work with the Language Arts committee. It is the aim of these committees to develop a curriculum guide that is designed for the students and teachers of Windham.

A pilot-testing program from Science Research Associates was conducted at the seventh grade level this fall. The information derived from these tests proved to be most useful to the teachers and administration. This testing program will be broadened to include a greater number of students starting in October 1967.

As a rapidly growing community, we are confronted with the usual problems of additional space, and expanding educational programs. However, with our interested townspeople and the dedicated School Board, progress is being made towards an excellent educational program for our students.

I would like to thank the citizens of Windham, the School Board, Mr. Dolph and the members of the staff, for making the return to New Hampshire a pleasant experience for my family and myself.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL

It is my pleasure to present to the people of Windham my annual report for the year ending June 30, 1966.

The assistance and cooperation of the citizens, staff, and pupils have helped to make this year at Center School a most satisfying one for me.

Many significant improvements have taken place which have permitted us to provide a more complete educational program than would have been otherwise possible.

Although the enrollment in September had significantly increased over the June closeout figure, we were fortunately able to secure three additional and well-qualified teachers to serve to maintain favorable class sizes.

The addition of a class in special education was an extremely valuable project with many rewards and served to clarify what our position must be with respect to the special child.

Federal assistance funds provided under Title III added greatly to our reference and audio-visual departments and to our supply of supplementary reading material.

Title I funds provided us with regular weekly classes in speech therapy and two special-help teachers. One of these teachers worked in the area of reading by supplementing our remedial program with classes for the slow learners who are considered the neglected "gray area" in public education. The other teacher worked on a full-time basis on a program in remedial mathematics. This entire Title I endeavor was extended through the summer months so that the skills developed could be maintained.

The incorporation of a more complete health program was realized by the acquisition of a nurse whose responsibilities were limited to Windham only as opposed to a supervisory union coverage as has been the case in the past.

Expansion of playground areas and the completion of the base-ball field have made possible a much broader physical education program for the school and the town, despite the lack of a qualified person assigned to this area. Hopefully, this area of our curriculum can be enlarged upon in the near future.

I wish to express at this time my genuine appreciation to the many parents who have graciously come forward with assistance when the need arose and who have greatly enriched our experiences this year. Also, my gratitude goes to the pupils who have provided the pleasure and satisfaction which we realized from associating and working with them.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

As School Nurse Teacher in Windham I want to take this opportunity to thank all parents for their cooperation in helping make our Health Program as successful as it has been.

It has been most gratifying to be a part of a school system comprised of a majority of well-cared-for students who are products of conscientious parents.

This year a physical examination was provided for all first grade students and all boys participating in Basketball.

Dr. Wilder, the school physician, examined 61 first grade pupils and 13 eighth grade pupils who participated in basketball and other sports. Parents were notified of any defects and the children were referred to their family physicians.

Tuberculosis Heaf tests were given to students in grades 1, 3, 5 and 8 and all teachers on a voluntary basis. One hundred and seventy seven students and teachers participated in this program sponsored by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association. This program is administered by the Association Nurse and the School Nurses. There were 17 children, whose tests were reactive. They and members of their immediate families were X-rayed at the Grinnell School Clinic. A reactive test is one which shows a person has been exposed to the tubercle bacillus but has not necessarily contracted the disease. Inasmuch as the lungs are the usual initial site of infection it is recommended that a Chest X-ray be taken.

All children in the school were screened for sight and hearing defects. Twenty eye and 7 ear defects were found and all pupils were seen by their own physician.

All Students were weighed and measured.

The following communicable disease cases were reported:

- 7 Chicken-pox
- 16 Scarlet Fever
- 1 Impetigo
- 1 Ring-worm infection (skin)

Two children were referred to the Child Guidance Clinic, 1 child to the Convulsive Disorder Clinic and 5 children were referred to our school psychologist for evaluation. There were 19 home visits made.

All children were screened for speech defects. Twenty received therapy from our school therapist and 1 child was referred to a private speech clinic.

Pre-school clinic was held for the registration of new first grade pupils on May 13th and 40 children were registered. These children were screened for hearing and vision defects and were given readiness tests. Twelve of these children attended the Headstart Kindergarten Program this summer.

REPORT OF SPEECH THERAPIST

To the Windham School Board and the Superintendent of Schools:

A speech Therapy Program has been organized and instituted with Title I Federal Government Funds provided for Supervisory Union #10 in elementary schools of Auburn, Derry, Londonderry, and Windham.

This program has been in existence since February, 1966 and until June of last year five graduate students of Speech Pathology were employed on a part-time basis for this School Union. During this time approximately 100 children were seen for one-half hour weekly in a small group or individual session.

A seven week summer program followed providing more extensive service for the children and allowing considerable parent participation. Approximately 40 children attended, usually twice to three times weekly.

The program has continued for the 1966-67 school year but because funds have not been available, a full day of this program has been eliminated. More extensive services are now needed in these areas as the population is so rapidly expanding.

SCHOOL BOARD

The year 1966 is significant in that the educational system of Windham has proceeded steadily toward utmost efficiency. Many faculty members have availed themselves of the assistance offered them in the area of professional preparations. It is only by this continuous study "that is necessary in education," that our teachers are able to enhance their professional skills and abilities.

Several workshops were held along with in-service instructional programs. These were in the area of "Languages, Arts and Social Studies." Presently, a committee is working on the evaluation of certain facets of the curriculum with the intent of revising them in terms of new techniques and procedures. The Social Studies Department is now in the midst of this program and it is hoped that other committees will be started this year. This type of program should not be transitory but should become a continuing practice so that the children will benefit by receiving the best elementary education that can be provided.

This year there are a sufficient number of rooms in the school so that we have been able to schedule small classes. This is most desirable from an educational point of view, but, due to the growth of our town, these classes are gradually being increased. This increase will present a problem. The school plant is being managed by an efficient custodial staff and is at present in excellent condition. This past summer the auditorium was refurbished: The cracks in the walls were re-cemented, and the walls painted. The former art room in the old school building was partitioned off and a small classroom was constructed. This is now being used for remedial classes. We are fortunate to have obtained the services of a certified physical education instructor on a part time basis. She is presently working with the 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th grade girls and on alternate weeks with the 4th grade boys and girls. We would like to have a comprehensive physical education program initiated for all students as soon as possible. There are excellent facilities available; let us use them. The area in the rear of the school between the ball field and the school was graded, filled and grassed over. The play area was extended out from the school by adding additional hot top. This grassed area will be divided into several game areas for the older children, and for the smaller children, we have swings, a slide that was moved from the Searles School, and a set of monkey bars that will be erected in the Spring.

The past year has been an extremely busy, time consuming, period. We, the members of your school board, are justifiably proud of the progress we have observed, the excellence of the school plant, the efforts and dedication of the administration and faculty, and finally the end products of our collective efforts-the sons and daughters of Windham families. We hope, that you, the citizens of Windham share this pride.

SCHOOL BUILDING NEEDS COMMITTEE

Since its first meeting on April 28, 1966, the School Building Needs Committee has held twelve meetings in order to thoroughly study Windham's present school situation and to seek the answer to school needs for the future.

During this period, we have had the help of a number of people qualified to answer questions and render assistance as needed. The Committee is indebted to Mr. Charles Marston, of the State School Housing Department; Mr. Francis Keefe, Windham Building Inspector; Mr. Robert Dolph, Superintendent of Schools; Mr. Bernard Ellis, Asst. Supt. of Schools; Mr. Larry Hatfield, Principal of Windham Center School; Mr. Thomas of Thomas Associates; Mrs. Pearl Devlin, Librarian; Planning Board and Windham School Board.

Visits were made to a number of schools that are of new construction and have incorporated the trends in today's curriculum in their design. The school departments of Derry, Hookset, Nashua and Pelham opened their facilities to us and we found the personnel most helpful in showing us their school plants.

After many consultations the members of the Committee each chose a field of interest to him and wrote a resume concerning this. Our official report to the people of Windham is made up of excerpts from these individual reports. We hope you will read it with an awareness that a great deal of time and effort was put into its preparation.

The members of this Committee have been outstandingly conscientious, cooperative, reliable and enthusiastic and it has been a real pleasure and satisfaction to work with them.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BUILDING NEEDS COMMITTEE

We do not claim this report to be a panacea for the growing pains of Windham; instead we consider it a necessary step toward alleviating one of the major problems of growth in our town--adequate school housing. The results of our committee's study are presented under four main headings as follows:

PRESENT SCHOOL PLANTS

At the present time, the majority of students in grades 9-12 are attending Pinkerton Academy to which bus transportation is provided. Windham has a contract with Pinkerton until 1976, however, future plans for Pinkerton by its Board of Trustees are uncertain at this time.

The chief concern of this committee at this time relates to Elementary School housing. In this vein, we find the following facilities:

<u>Center School</u> is adequate for present enrollment and classes under our present system. It has 17 classrooms, 1 All Purpose room, 1 Teachers' room; 1 Remedial Reading room, 1 Nurse's room; 1 Library—(may be used for classroom another year); 2 Offices.

Searles School with 2 classrooms is available although not ideal. Because of its isolation from main plant, students and teachers are deprived of activities that are a part of school program. Use of Searles will necessitate extra bussing and repairs to physical plant will be needed before its use. However, it is insurance for a transition period.

The essential facilities for physical education are a playroom area cleared 40 x 40 and a field area--clear and flat. Center School has these essentials, Searles School has no indoor play area, but has an adequate outdoor field area.

BUILDING NEEDS

The above figures indicate that in a matter of less than ten years, the growth of the student population will be such that Windham's Elementary School will do well to handle adequately up to the fifth grade inclusive. It seems clear that the logical solution is a Middle School, designed to accommodate Sixth, Seventh, and Eighth Grades, (or Seventh, Eighth and Ninth) as the need arises.

On this premise Windham's new school should be projected as a Middle School initially, with the site and planning consistent with the possible eventual expansion to a Windham High School. Varied, expanded curriculum (shop and home economics) which give impetus to academic learning should be made available.

The town librarian was asked to present her views on the need for library facilities in our school system. The following is taken from her answer to our request:

With the rapidly increasing development of elementary school libraries, the need frequently arises to explain their purpose and importance in education.

Two of the most important things that elementary schools are about are, in this order, children and books.

The library establishes an intimate relationship between the two, at the very outset of the pupil's school life. It represents a trend away from the narrow view that all a youngster needs in any subject is a textbook and a teacher. The library makes available to him a whole world of books, and the unique world within each book, to serve his highly complex needs and interests.

If today's child is to do well beyond the elementary grades, the library must be an integral part of his daily life in school. In secondary schools and colleges, the library-centered curricular has long since been accepted as the fundamental way of life.

The better school systems across the nation have already seen where responsibility lies and have introduced libraries in their elementary grades.

After reading Mrs. Devlin's report there can be no doubt that a library must be planned into any future school building.

Art expression and education have, to date, had little or no recognition in Windham schools. Such education should be considered and space made available for its inclusion. One member of the Building Needs Committee has expressed the need most eloquently as follows:

The nationwide trend today of interest in the arts and crafts, which is so prevalent not just in children but in colleges and particularly adult groups, is indicative of a neglected need and has proven to be an extremely stabilizing and gratifying source of activity, satisfying that need for self-expression.

Probably through the art class more than any other, if you have an extremely vital teacher, the child is acquainted with forms, colors, textures, growth habits, tastes, relative proportions as to how these things are related to his everyday living. Through this phase of art education, children are made aware that society is constantly changing, is not static, and they have the opportunity to investigate the interdependence of all things in man and nature. An awareness of all these things has a direct relationship to his studies in science, math, geography and history. Through this area of sensitized awareness, he has the opportunity to exercise and satisfy all senses and with that knowledge can certainly lead a fuller life.

Creativity, in my opinion, is a personal outgrowth of all the a-forementioned plus environment. It is something which cannot be taught, but is there to be encouraged and allowed to develop not only for the child's enjoyment, but for the enrichment of those that surround him now and in years to come.

Some thoughts gleaned from the teachers through their representative were:

- 1. An area other than classroom should be made available for lunch periods, this would greatly reduce the maintenance cost necessary to keep the classroom clean. This space may also be used for other purposes.
 - 2. Closet and storage space in classrooms should be increased.
- 3. New school plant should be near enough to Center School to provide a sharing of some of the facilities.

A projected view for occupancy by 1970/71 is herewith submitted. With 18 rooms available in current facilities (16 in Center School and 2 in Searles) an average of 25 pupils per room will be reached in 1967. Thirty students per room average will be reached in 1970/71. Since the latter ratio is higher than recommended and since the grades will likely not break this uniformly, there absolutely should be a new school plant for the 1970/71 school year.

It is obvious, therefore, that the one immediate need is the acquirement by the Town, at the earliest possible date, of the most appropriate site for the Middle School. This is urgent for a variety of reasons, but especially because the new Middle School should be located just as close as possible to Center School, for reasons of economy and the best overall educational results, including:

- 1. Administration: One principal and administrative office should suffice for both schools—including one chief building custodian.
- 2. Various educational and group inter-grade facilities can be shared by both schools.
- 3. In at least some cases, the same teachers for certain subjects--such as art, music, vocational training, language lab, can be shared by all grades studying these subjects.
- 4. Some recreational and athletic activities can no doubt be shared by various grades.

Since it has been established that new classrooms will be needed for the 1970/71 school year, it would be well to plan these to be adequate for grades 6-8 or 6-9 until 1976/77--at that time the Pinkerton contract expires and Center and Searles Schools will have become filled with grades 1-5. By 1976/77 grades 6-8 will require a minimum of 10 classrooms and 6-9 will require a minimum of 12.

Without using Searles, a new building would be required by 1968/69. Note: The new complex need not be completely built at one time.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. To build a Middle School to be ready for occupancy in Sept. of 1970.
 - 2. To purchase a suitable site for the proposed Middle School.
- To plan the Middle School for possible expansion to a high school.
 - 4. To appoint a School Building Committee.

The School Board Windham School District Windham, New Hampshire Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Windham School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1965 and June 30, 1966, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$42,612.98 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966. Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures-Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$9,274.59, plus a revenue surplus of \$5,643.83, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$14,918.42.

Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1966, is indicated in Exhibit F.

Building Fund Account: (Exhibit G)

A statement showing the activity in the Building Fund account during the fiscal year is included in Exhibit G_{\bullet}

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit H)

A statement of the School Tax account with the Town of Windham is presented in Exhibit H. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1966, the School District had received from the Town the total amount of the 1965-66 School Tax.

Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit I)

A statement of outstanding bonded indebtedness as of June 30, 1966, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit L
