Inaugural Address.

Delivered by the Mayor, Hon. D. J. Daley, March 30th, 1914.

To the Honorable City Council:

It now becomes my duty for the fifth consecutive year to address you as Mayor of our City on the general condition of our Municipal affairs, and to make such recommendations for your consideration and action as it appears to me the necessities of the City and its inhabitants demand.

Many important changes and improvements have been made during the past year of a permanent nature, some of which are still in progress, but are fast approaching completion, and all of which, I believe, have added materially to our prestige, convenience and general welfare, and will tend to develop among our people a progressive spirit which is so essential in promoting the growth of Modern Communities.

For many years a feeling of unrest has been developing among us, for a more generous response by the people's servants to demands for better streets, sidewalks, sewers, additional public buildings, a suitable water supply for public and domestic uses, extension of street lighting, public parks and play grounds, free mail delivery, a system of garbage collection, improved sanitary conditions, and generally a more liberal and up-to-date policy by our City Officials respecting these matters.

Caution, prudence and a commendable spirit of economy seem to have guided these officials since the organization of our City Government to the end that our indebtedness might be kept within reasonable bounds, and the burden of taxation made as light as possible.

As a result of these business methods our net debt January 31st, 1913, was reduced to \$137,220.60. Our tax rate to 1.90 or 1900. per thousand, and our property valuation for taxation purposes increased to \$8,519,999.00.

On the same date our legal debt limit was 5 per cent. of this valuation, or \$425,999.95, showing a difference of \$288,779.35 between our exisiting debt and the debt limit allowed by the laws of our State.

In other words our debt was less than 1-3 of the indebtedness that we could safely and lawfully incur for ligitimate public purposes, which was an exceptionally favorable financial condition, and one that encouraged your retiring City Government to embark on a general scheme of civic development, the extent and nature of which was publicly announced by your Mayor in the columns of our local newspaper prior to the City Election of 1913, so that voters and citizens generally might fairly and intelligently exercise their judgment and record their wishes by an expression of the popular will at the ballot box.

The result of that election was a mandate from the people irrespective of party affiliations to the candidates of their choice, to proceed with the public business along the lines, and by the means indicated in that announcement.

When the people speak it is the duty of their representatives to act, and the discharge of this duty should be undertaken with honesty of purpose, and with a faithful desire to serve impartially all people and all sections affected.

I believe these motives guided all members of our last City Government, as well as the administrations which preceded it, which belief seems to have been confirmed by the results of our last City election.

A retrospect of what has been accomplished the past year, and the means employed to finance the same may be of value to you and the public generally.

This amount has been expended in the ordinary administration of these departments, and a small amount in addition thereto, making a total net overdraft of \$5041.82, which has been reduced since the close of the fiscal year to \$4178.97 by the payment of \$862.85 by the town of Gorham to cover one-half the cost of the new fire station and equipment at the Cascades.

This overdraft was occasioned by unforeseen demands not provided for by appropriations, the more important of which may be here noted as follows:—

These accounts had to be paid, but no appropriations had been made to satisfy them, except that the premium on our bond issue, which amounted to \$1618.50, was applied to the payment of the cost of the new Pest House.

Recurring to the subject of public improvements in addition to those provided for by the various department appropriations, your attention is directed to the passage of a Resolution by the City Council July 24th, 1913, authorizing an issue of bonds to the amount of \$150,000.00, dated July 1st, 1913, payable at the rate of \$7500.00 annually for a period of twenty years, and bearing interest at 4½ per cent., payable semi-annually, for the following purposes:

When these bonds were ready for sale bids were asked for by public advertisement and private solicitation.

When the time limit had expired three bids had been submitted from Boston brokers as follows:

Blodgett & Co.100.60 and accrued int.

N. W. Harris & Co.100.267 and acrued int.

E. H. Rollins & Sons101.079 and accrued int.

E. H. Rollins & Sons being the highest bidders, and the premium offered being considered liberal under the market conditions then prevailing, the total issue was awarded to them.

Our new City Building is fast nearing completion, and when finished will be a distinct artistic ornament to our City, a credit to her citizens, a monument to their civic pride, and one of the best and most commodious structures of its kind in New England. It will be ready for occupation, we are advised early in June, and I trust its dedication to the public use will be suitably, but not too expensively, celebrated.

For details relating to the expenditure of the item of \$23,000.00, for extension and improvements of streets and sidewalks, and the item of \$9,000.00 for extention and construction of sewers, you are respectfully directed to the Report of the Public Works Department appearing in our City Report, Pages 75 to 91 inclusive, where you will find every dollar of money expended by this Department accounted for in an orderly and systematic manner, the cost of each piece of work appearing in detail, a method never before adopted by the City, but one which should continue in use for the future, with such modifications as new conditions may require.

The item of \$5,000.00 was used to purchase the Stewart & Snodgrass land and a valid title thereto was conveyed to the City.

I believe this to be one of the best investments the City ever made.

In addition to a large lot of land on Mason Street adjoining the Cole School House lot, which can be used for play ground purposes, a large tract on York Street has been devoted to various uses, mainly for storage purposes.

New buildings erected thereon, combined with the old ones, furnish a convenient and very accessible place for all City apparatus, tools, supplies, and machinery, which for years have been without suitable shelter.

The item of \$18,000.00, it was expected, would be sufficient, together with the proceeds from the sale of the old Brown School House and lot, to purchase the land and provide a new school building and equipment for the Berlin Mills section.

It may be that the old school house property will not sell for as much as we expect, but it is believed the work can be nearly, if not quite, completed with the funds from these two sources.

The new school building is a model of its kind, fire proof, and provided with large play grounds.

I believe that time will justify the wisdom of raising this large amount of money for these purposes, and that a dollar's worth of good will be enjoyed by us for every dollar in money expended.

General Financial Condition.

This computation shows that even if there were no increase in our valuation for 1914, our debt limit would still be more than \$150,000.00 in excess of our present debt, which is a very healthy financial condition, and a much better showing than most New England cities can make.
When the new City Building and Brown School House are completed, (and the funds are on hand to do it), the value of our City property, conservatively estimated, will be as follows:

On December 1st, 1913, an outstanding issue of our bonds came

due amounting to \$70,000.00, which were promptly paid at maturity from our Sinking Fund deposit, leaving a balance to the credit of this fund January 31st, last of \$44,004.02.

We have another issue of bonds amounting to \$50,000.00 which matures May 1st, 1917.

To satisfy this obligation we will have the above balance, and three annual Sinking Fund appropriations of \$3,000.00 each, a total of \$53,004.02, and accrued interest on the whole fund, which amply provides for this debt, and any loss we may suffer on the Danbury Conn. bonds in which nearly the whole of the Sinking Fund balance is invested.

These bonds do not mature until 1932, and must be converted into cash before May 1st, 1917, and our City officials should have this necessity constantly in mind so that advantage may be taken of favorable conditions of the market in Municipal securities.

All of our other outstanding bonds are serials, payable in annual installments by yearly tax assessments.

I am of the opinion that our valuation this year will nearly, if not quite, reach the \$9,000.000,00 mark.

The Finance Committee has recommended appropriations for the several departments, in all amounting to \$173,882.82 and to this amount must be added approximately \$5,000.00 for overlay account, or a total assessment of \$178,882.82.

If my expectations respecting increase in valuation are realized the amount named would be assured and more without increasing our present tax rate of 1.90, by including the revenue of about \$11,000.00 from liquor licenses held in this City, as appears from the following computation.

I hope you will pardon me for trespassing further upon your patience to briefly refer to some of the City Departments.

Public Works

By resolution of the City Council, passed January 22, 1914, the former departments of Streets, Sidewalks, Sewers, Civil Engineering, Sprinkling Streets, Cleaning Streets, and the recently established department of Garbage Collection were consolidated under the title of the Department of Public Works, and placed under the Management of the Highway Commissioner, who shall be a Civil Engineer of recognized ability, shall devote his entire time to the work, and shall receive an annual salary therefor to be fixed by the City Council.

This method was tried and tested last year, and I am sure the results have met with popular favor and justified the change.

In addition to what has already been said herein, you attention is called to the several recommendations made by the Commissioner in his report before referred to, many, if not all, of which should receive your early consideration, in order that the work of this most important division of our public service may be planned as early as possible, and a systematic program be developed for the coming season.

A serious sewer condition exists on York Street, which arose after the Commissioner's report was made, resulting in substantial damage to property in that locality.

This situation should receive the earliest possible attention of this department, if a repetition of the trouble is to be avoided.

A liberal sum should be expended on the East Side in Ward 4 for sewer purposes.

The present sewer system there is wholly inadequate to accommodate that rapidly growing section of our City.

Streets at the Cascades are in a deplorable condition, and extensive improvements thereon must be made at the earliest practicable time

I think it is safe to say that this department will do its whole duty faithfully and well in all matters within its sphere of action if we will provide the necessary funds to pay the bills.

It is now splendidly aquipped for effective work, and much more can be accomplished this season for a given amount than last year by reason of our labor saving appliances.

Fire Department

This division of the service is in excellent condition, well equipped with apparatus for extinguishing fires, and splendidly organized for effective work.

Last year's record amply confirms this statement, only one serious conflagration having occurred; that was the disastrous fire which destroyed the sawmill of the Berlin Mills Company.

Much to our relief the Fire Chief does not ask for any additions to his equipment so that this item in our list of appropriations may be measured by the amount used last year.

Extension and enlargement of the water mains at the Cascades should be at once insisted upon.

We have a good fire station at that place well equipped, and a good fire company has already been organized there; therefore a good water supply should be provided for fire protection.

Police Department

This Department has been somewhat revolutionized recently by the enactment of a law at the last session of our state legislatureabolishing Police Courts throughout the State, and establishing District Courts in place thereof.

Whether this change in our State system of Jurisprudence will justify the making, remains to be seen; but the immediate effect of it in this City has been to deprive us of quite a substantial item

of revenue.

Under this new system, we enjoy the questionable privilege of furnishing extensive quarters for the District Court's accommodations, and a City Solicitor at an annual salary of \$600.00 to commence and prosecute criminal proceedings against violators of the law, with no receipts from this tribunal to help pay its expense to us.

On the contrary all the revenue from this court finds a quiet

resting place iu the County Treasury.

We have directed our City Solicitor to commence proceedings against the County in the form of a friendly suit, to secure the opinion of the Supreme Court as to the legal interpretation of this feature of the Act.

He advises us that this course may result in some relief, and he hopes to the extent of saving to the City a sufficient portion of the taxable costs of these proceedings to at least pay the City Solicitor's salary.

This department asks for a new patrol wagon, horse and harness for its use on completion of the City Building.

The cost will approximate \$800.00, and the necessity for this equipment seems evident in view of the changed location of our lock-up and place for trying offenders, and this purchase is recommended, together with a corresponding increase in this department's appropriation.

Public Schools

So far as I am informed this department is progressing satisfactorily.

Our City officials should make a supreme effort to visit our schools more frequently in the future than has been the custom heretofore.

I must reluctantly admit that I have been one of the worst offenders in this regard, my only excuse being a multiplicity of other duties which to me seemed more important; but no duty is more important than that owed to our educational institutions, and

I promise to co-operate with you in establishing a custom by which we may keep informed regarding the management and progress of our schools, which could probably be best effected by personal visits at opportune times.

The Board of Education calls our attention to the necessity of another new school house in Ward 1, and some additions to, or changes in the high school building.

As to the first request my belief is that the construction of a new school house in Ward 1, ought, if possible, to be postponed uutil another year.

If I am correctly informed certain changes in the Assembly Hall of the High School can be made at moderate expense, which will greatly relieve the congestion in that building.

These two suggestions of the Board, are, however, worthy of our careful and earliest attention.

This department also asks for an increase in its appropriation of about \$3000.00.

Whether in justice to the other departments of the City Government this can be safely done, will, it seems to me, depend upon how much our valuation will increase and this can not be known until the Board of Assessors completes its work.

If we can make the increase it ought to be done, and the proper solution of the question is safe in your hands.

Public Library

Our library and its management seems to have given entire satisfaction to this community, and no comment thereon is necessary other than words of commendation.

The Trustees request an appropriation this year of \$2500.00.

The Finance Committee has recommended \$2300.00 which is an increase of \$100.00 over the sum allowed in 1913.

When the time comes for final action by the City Council on the matter of appropriations, the request of the Trustees should receive proper consideration.

Some action must be taken early this spring to remove the obstruction in the sidewalk passing the library building caused by the front steps leading into it.

Access to the bridge leading to the Young Men's Christian Association Building makes this imperative.

Health Department

The management of this department, I believe, has given general satisfaction.

Members of the Board of Health and the Health Officer and Milk Inspector certainly have devoted a large amount of time and effort to make it serve the purposes for which it was created, and I believe these efforts have met with a very good measure of success.

Our people have been exceptionally fortunate the past year in escaping exposure to epidemics of contagious diseases, and this condition, it is fair to assume, is largely attributable to the activity of the Board's officers.

The same appropriation is requested this year as was made last year, which was \$2200.00.

Although the total of last year's appropriation was not expended, the Board suggests that some new apparatus will be necessary in the new quarters in City Hall, and the amount asked for is, therefore, recommended.

The new system of garbage collection has certainly justified its creation, and its continuance is heartly recommended.

This result shows that our collector attended strictly to his duties and his conduct of this department is commendable.

We caused to be abated last year on old uncollected taxes the following amounts.

We trust that this practice of abating a substantial amount of these uncollected taxes will continue until these doubtful assets disappear.

At the last session of our Legislature a Pool Tax Law was passed fixing a flat rat of \$2.00 per capita.

This will enable the Collector to collect Poll Taxes immediately after April 1st, and thus the cause of our trouble in the past will largely disappear, because uncollected taxes are made up largely of polls.

Department of the Poor

Our overseer handled this matter with his usual success and makes no suggestions other than to request the same appropriation as last year which was \$1200.00, and this amount should be appropriated.

Law Department

The City Solicitor has managed the affairs of this department in a careful, judicious and conservative manner.

The present status of unsettled matters can be seen by reference to his report on Page 54 of the City Report.

City Treasurer

Our Treasurer has had a very strenuous year, but he has handled the affairs devolving upon him with entire accuracy, as appears by his accounts, and the Auditor's Report, and I am sure to the satisfaction of the City Council and the people he has served.

Water Supply

No subject is of greater importance to a Municipality than its water supply for public and domestic uses.

For years this question has agitated the public mind in this City, and the feeling in favor of a movement for better service became so intensified and pronounced the past summer, by reason of the inferior quality of the domestic water supply, that our Board of Trade and the City Council deemed it wise to submit the general question of Municipal ownership to the voters for an expression of sentiment.

A very full vote on the subject resulted, 1370 votes being cast, 1224 for and 146 against the proposition, nearly 10 to 1 in favor of a water system owned and operated by the City.

The City Council should respond to this very pronounced expression of the popular will, and begin an investigation of the matter as early as possible.

The undertaking is by no means an easy task, because of the scarcity of water supply sources in this section, of pure quality, and of sufficient altitude to provide for a gravity system, which is most desirable.

The adoption of some plan to secure information along these lines at the earliest possible time is earnestly recommended.

The employment of a hydraulic engineer of recognized ability for a short time, to act with local assistants familiar with streams, ponds and other sources of water supply in this locality for the purpose of obtaining reliable data upon which intelligent action could be taken, including a careful examination of our existing water system, would seem to be the first necessary move.

While the City is not obliged to purchase our local water works system at such price as the present proprietors may fix, we must consider in the solution of this problem the uses which the City could make of that property in connection with a new system which would furnish an adequate supply of pure water for our use.

A practical method of acquiring the property of the Berlin Water Company is provided by an act of the N. H. Legislature passed at the session of 1907, in case negotiations between the Company and the City for its purchase should fail.

See Chapter 126 of the laws of 1907 and especially section 8 thereof.

After we have secured as full and complete details as the nature of the inquiry permits covering one or more methods of service, including cost, I believe we should submit the whole matter in some suitable form to a public meeting of our citizens and tax payers to the end that full and free discussion accompanied by an expression of sentiment will enable our City Government to finally determine the proper course of action more wisely than it could otherwise do.

A debt created for the purpose of providing a suitable water supply for our public and domestic uses would not increase our City debt proper.

In determining our net City Debt at any given time such water debt would be excluded from the computation, by virtue of Chapter 43, Section 9 of the Pamphlet Laws of N. H. Legislative Session of 1895, known as the Municipal Bonds Act.

I am satisfied that this whole subject can be wisely and advantageously disposed of by careful and conservative investigation and action, which we, and those who succeed us, as servants of the people, should feel it our sacred duty to perform.

Conclusion

I desire at this time to express my high appreciation of the faithful service rendered the City by all the members of the retiring Administration, and to assure them all that in my belief their good work is also fully appreciated by our people generally.

Many perplexing problems have arisen but you have met them with a spirit of harmony, and determined them according to your views of justice and right, without fear, favor or hope of reward, and thereby have reflected honor upon vourselves, your City and the people you represent.

I am grateful personally to all with whom I have been officially associated for the uniform courtesy extended to me which has made my work a pleasure instead of a burden.

To the City officials about to assume their duties, I pledge my cordial co-operation for the common good, and to my fellow citizens generally I extend by thanks for the magnificent endorsement accorded our work at the late election, and I assure them that my best efforts in behalf of good government will be exerted in re-

To His Honor, the Mayor and Council,

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit my report as City Overseer of Poor for the year ending January 31, 1915, and beg to call your attention the unusual conditions existing here as well as in other places, generally, regarding the employment of labor. I do not desire to make particular comment upon the situation further than to state the present winter is bringing more hardships in every way to the poor people in our City than at any time during the twenty-three years that I have acted as Overseer. Assistance has been given by all the City Officials in securing employment but with the present curtailment in business generally, it has been difficult to find positions in all cases. The management of our mills have in every way tried to adjust matters to the advantage of all classes. Iu many ways we seem fortunate.

I do not know of any actual suffering and have investigated all cases coming to my attention and rendered aid where it seemed needed. I have at all times consulted with his Honor, Mayor Daley, when in doubt regarding our pauper laws, and his advice and good judgement have been of much help. I desire to express my thanks at this time to all members of the City Government for their courtesy.

The unexpended balance of \$394.90 would have been freely used were it necessary, but as the larger part of our paupers are by law County charges, they have been turned over to the County Commissioner located here, who has cared for them directly.

Report of the City Solicitor.

Berlin, N. H., February 1, 1915.

The work in the police court has been performed this year, as last, mainly by Mr. James, my partner. This work requires the attention of one of us daily to prosecute the various cases which arise in connection with the police department. In each case a complaint and warrant is made by the City Solicitor or his assistant and in case of a trial, the evidence is presented to the Court by him. The number of cases is the same as that reported by the Police Department; and reference is made to that report.

In addition to the police court work there has been an unusual amount of work in the Superior Court. The following cases have been tried:

Zoel v City of Berlin. For damages claimed on account of change of grade on Pleasant Street. Verdict for the defendant.

The City Bowling Allies v City of Berlin. Verdict for the plaintiff for \$500. Transferred to the Supreme Court on questions of law.

James J. Hickey v City of Berlin. Verdict for the plaintiff for \$500. Transferred to Supreme Court on questions of law.

In the first two cases mentioned above, I was assisted in the trial by Hon. Edmund Sullivan and in the last by Hon. George F. Rich.

There are now on the docket untried the following:-

Matthew J. Ryan v City of Berlin. Claim of damages for alleged change of grade on Church Street.

Henry A. St. Laurent v City of Berlin. Claim of damages for water from Dead River.

Michael J. Cryans v City of Berlin. Claim for damage for injury on highway.

Jos. J. Daley v City of Berlin. Claim for damages for injury on highway. There are also pending now against the County of Coos in favor of the City suit of

Herbert I Goss (City of Berlin, party in interest) vs County of Coos.

George B. Day (City of Berlin, party in interest) vs County of Coos.

These cases are for fees growing out of prosecutions by the Police Department, claimed in behalf of the City, and involve the construction of the District Court Act of 1913. Both cases are in the Supreme Court on an agreed statement of facts. Briefs for the City have been filed and they will be in order for argument in the Supreme Court in the near future, probably in March.

Report of the Police Commission.

To His Excellency, the Governor of the State of New Hampshire, and to His Honor, the Mayor, and to the Honorable Council of the City of Berlin:

In accordance with Chapter 160 of the Session Laws of 1905, we herewith submit the annual report of the Police Department for the year ending December 31, 1914.

The new boxes recently installed at various points are working well but the board thinks it to the advantage of the City to call attention at this time to the advisability of installing the Gamewelle system of signals for the Police Department, similar to the one now in use in the Fire Department. The chief advantage would be in the greater efficiency of this apparatus but a very considerable one would also be the lower cost per annum to the city. The present system carrying a high rental charge is less expensive to install and maintain but the annual charges are high—so much so that a materially reduced cost of operation, (even including necessary interest charges) would result from the use of the Gamewell or a similar system.

Annual Report of the Public Works Department.

To His Honor the Mayor and City Council:

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to submit herewith the annual report of the Department of Public Works for the year ending January 31st, 1915, and am also taking the liberty to make a few recommendations for the future public work in the City.

Several of the policies adopted last year have been followed and a few new ideas introduced from time to time by members of the Public Works Committee and others in the department, which I feel were beneficial to the conduct of the department, and were appreciated by the citizens of our City. I shall not attempt to classify the different expenditures in this department under the heads formerly used, such as Sewers, Sidewalks, Streets, etc., but will give a little fuller description of the work done under each job number. The reason for this is that there are a great many people to whom a tabular report means little and it is the object of this report to lay before the people as a whole the year's record of the work done by this department and the cost to them.

Following is a list of the work done during the past year with the cost of the same.

Job No. 1, Street Maintenance

Under this head is included street repairs; general upkeep of catch basins; street drains, culverts, etc., within the City limits; repairing and painting bridges and guard rails, etc., street cleaning and cleaning out catch basins; street oiling; snow removal; removal of a ledge on Success St.; concrete culvert on Norwegian St., near the new Brown School; concrete culvert on Second Ave., at the corner of Shepard St.; sanding sidewalks; and the collection of ashes in the Spring. The cost of this work for the year was \$10,708.21.

Job No. 2, Storehouse

The storehouse account under job number two, is kept for the

purpose of distributing charges for materials bought in quantities and stored until used on the various works. These materials are charged out to jobs at actual cost, although quite a saving is effected by buying in quantities during the Winter months when prices on this class of material are usually lower than in the Summer. Although this account shows a debit it has been a saving to the City as this debit occurs by reason of transferring left over materials from the storehouse account to the inventory. This debit is \$130.70.

Job No. 3, 1913 Account

During the year small bills were received on account of 1913 expenditures to the amount of \$7.06.

Job No. 4, Sewer Maintenance

This work includes the repairing, maintenance, cleaning, necessary reconstruction and general upkeep of the Sewer system, including Mains, Laterals, Manholes and other appurtenances, also land rent for such parts of the system as are on private property. The cost for the year was \$1,510.55.

Job No. 5, Office

This job includes office supplies and materials, office rent, clerk hire, assistants, and the Superintendent's salary. It also includes furniture for the engineering department bought for the new City Hall. Total cost \$2,777.61.

Job No. 6, Garbage Collection

This job includes the purchase of a dump sled, specially designed by this department, and the year's collection of Garbage. Total cost \$1,783.45.

Job No. 7, Third Avenue

This job consists of blasting and partially grading Third Avenue, from Madigan to Jolbert Streets, the work done amounting to \$606.12.

Job No. 8, Tools and Equipment

This account includes the repair and maintenance of the boilers, steam roller, and other equipment of the department and also the purchase of considerable new equipment, some of the larger items being, three bottom dump wagons, fire hose for use of the sewer department, a motor for the stone crusher, a new road plow, road drag, a pump, and material for the air drilling outfit. The total cost being \$2,235.15.

Job No. 9, Claims

But one claim was paid directly by this department, being that of Mrs. G. Anderson, for alleged damage to property caused by the negligence of employees of this department. Amount \$50.00.

Job No. 10, Road Maintenance

The work included under this head is the maintenance of our out-lying roads, including the reconstruction of several culverts and small bridges, breaking roads, etc. Total cost \$817.55.

Job No. 11, Sprinkling Streets

This account includes the purchase of new hydrant valves tobe used in place of the old inefficient stand pipes, and also the payment of \$300.00 water rental. Three sprinklers were run thegreater part of the season in every section of the City where thestreet grades were not too steep to allow the passage of the sprinkler. The cost of this work was \$1,442.39.

Job No. 12, Crusher

Under this head two different jobs were carried on, one while the crusher was at the base of Mt. Forist and another while located at the Grand Trunk Station. When the move was made, electricity took the place of steam power, enabling a much larger quantity of crushed stone to be produced at a considerable saving in the cost of power. The work at the latter location consisted of blasting the ledges in the vicinity of the station in preparation for the Park, which I trust the department will be able to finish next season. The entire output of the crusher was sold to the various jobs at actual cost \$1.55 per cubic yard, so this job does not show a balance on either side of the book.

Job No. 13, Gorham Road

Gorham Road and Glen Avenue were given a surface coat of einders from Post-office Square to the Gorham Town line. Heavy grading being done in some places. New culverts were also put in, the work costing \$855.27.

Job No. 14, Blacksmith Shop

From the first of May to the first of November, the department operated a Blacksmith shop for the repair of tools and equipment and sharpening tools used in the department, charges being made to the different jobs at regular blacksmith prices. This job cost \$684.76, and turned out work to the amount of \$914.07, showing a credit of \$229.31.

Job No. 15

This job included the removal of a large ledge knoll on Burgess St., near the corner of Grafton St., the construction of two six ft. arch culverts, each 50 ft. long, one on Burgess St. and the other on Sullivan St. The total cost of this work was \$1,036.57.

Job No. 16, East Side Milan Road

This work consisted of grading and surfacing the Milan road on the East side of the river, the construction of several culverts in a permanent manner and I feel that we have permanently remedied the deplorable condition which existed near the City Cemetery where in former years it was almost impossible to drive through the deep sand. The cost of the improvement of this highway was \$1,335.08.

Job No. 17, Success Road

Considerable improvement was made on grading and draining the road leading from the East Side Milan road to the settlement in Success, known as Hickeyville. This improvement cost \$218.64.

Job No. 18

Under this job Tarvia was applied to the different streets in quantities as stated below:

Job No. 19, West Milan Road

The amount of \$489.88 was spent in resurfacing parts of the West Milan Road. As the drainage on this road is quite bad it is an annual expense, and although in very fair condition some surfacing will be necessary every year to keep it passable.

Job No. 20, Emery Street

Emery St. was paved throughout its length at a cost of \$973.23. In addition to this work a projecting ledge was removed near the corner of Hemlock St., costing \$139.30. Total cost of the job was \$1,122.53.

Job No. 21, East Side Sewer System

The small pipe serving as a main on Burgess St. was replaced during the season by a large pipe, and several other pipes laid on the East Side as follows:

The large pipe on Burgess St. makes it now possible to complete the sewer system on the East Side of the river, using Burgess St. as the main. The cost of this work was \$4,032.28, considerable ledge work being necessary.

Job No. 22, State Highway Maintenance

This work included building new permanent culverts, repairing, dragging, and oiling the State Highway from Berlin to Milan Town Line. The total cost of the work done was \$598.44, and we have received from the State \$272.98, making the cost to the City, \$325.46.

Job No. 23, Miscellaneous

Under this head we have charged such items as moving hydrants, Miscellaneous surveys, insurance, etc. The total being \$235.04.

Job No. 24, Second Avenue

This job includes building 269.6 ft. new curb, about 100 yds. new sidewalk, 174.2 ft. retaining wall. The total cost being \$243.98.

Job No. 25, Hillside Avenue

Hillside Ave. was graded and macadamized from High St. to Willard St., at a unit cost of 68.8 cents per sq. yd. Total cost \$1,429.48.

Job No. 26, Green Street

1200 sq. vds. of Macadam was laid on Green St. from the Underpass to First Ave. This was rather an expensive job owing to the heavy amount of grading necessary, the total cost being \$1,683.62.

Job No. 27, Jolbert Street

In accordance with an order received in 1913, 321.3 ft. of side-walk was built on Jolbert St. from Second Ave. to Third Ave., considerable grading being done, part of which was ledge work. Cost was \$237.30.

Job No. 28, Sidewalk Maintenance

This job consisted of resurfacing and grading many of the sidewalks in town with tar concrete, and practically all of our dirt walks with screenings from the Stone Crusher. It also includes resetting several hundred feet of concrete curb. Total cost \$2452.66.

Job No. 30, Mechanic Street

Mechanic St. was regraded at the foot of the hill near Cole St. at a cost of \$135.30.

Job No. 31, Willard Street

This work includes the construction of 185 ft. of new curb, 61 ft. of retaing wall, 180 lin. ft. new sidewalk, one catch basin, 120 ft. of 6 inch drain pipe and 732 sq. yds. macadam, the work being done from Oak St. to School St., costing \$1,391.41.

Job No. 32, Pleasant Street

730 sq. yds. of Macadam was constructed on Pleasant St. just westerly of the railroad crossing, the grade being changed and some ledge being removed. The cost was \$556.53.

Job No. 33, Fifth Street

459.5 ft. of new sidewalk, consisting of a curb and cinder fill with a surface of crushed stone screenings was constructed on Fifth St., from Main to Sweden Sts., costing \$231.98.

Job No. 34, Prospect Street

The sidewalk on Prospect St. from School St. to Perkins Court was entirely rebuilt at a cost of \$180.42.

Job No. 35, Wight Street

Wight St. was regraded and surfaced with gravel from Third Ave. to the residence of Caleb Wight, about 7000 sq. yds. of surfacing being done at a cost of \$964.72.

Job No. 36, Hemlock Street

In accordance with an order received in 1913, a sidewalk was built on Hemlock St. from Hillside Ave. 707.5 ft. westerly. The

street was graded near Portland St., a heavy fill being necessary. 451 ft. of curb was reset from Emery St. to Hillside Ave. in order to remove the sidewalk from the private property along the street. The total cost of the work was \$558.43.

Job No. 37, Seventh Street

The ledge knoll at the corner of Seventh and Norwegian Sts. was removed and deposited in a heavy fill at Ninth St. This was quite heavy work and a great improvement to both Seventh and Ninth Sts. The total cost was \$2,492.99.

Job No. 38, School Street

On School St. 339 ft. of new sidewalk was built from Church St. to Success St. 635.5 ft. of curb reset and the gutter paved, Prospect St. to Spring St. Total cost \$556.17.

Job No. 39, City Hall

This job includes 231 sq. yds. of cement sidewalk, Paving, grading, curbing and landscape work around City Hall. Total cost \$1,063,65.

Job No. 40, Post-office Square

57 ft. of curb was reset and 56 sq. yds. of cement walk was built on Post-office Square at a total cost of \$80.32.

From a careful study of the needs of our citizens I have made up the following suggestions for work to be done and would recommend that as much as possible of it be done during the coming season:

The extension of the sewer system in Ward Four, grading on Burgess, Champlain and Merrimae Sts., and a sidewalk on Burgess St.

A sewer on Main St. from Ninth to Eleventh Sts.

A sidewalk on Success St.

Macadam surfacing on School St., from Willard to Church St.

Grading and gravel surfacing on Hillside Ave., from Willard St. to Dead River bridge.

Grading Second Ave. from Hamlin St. to Jolbert St.

Macadam pavement on Green St., from First Ave to Second Ave.

Gravel surfacing on Madigan St., from Second to Third Ave., and on Third Ave., from Madigan St. to Wight St.

Sidewalk on Green St., from Gilbert St. to First Ave., continuing up First Ave. to Hamlin St.

Sidewalk on Third Ave. from Madigan St. to Jolbert St.

Would recommend that the Berlin Street Railway be required to lay Creosoted Wood blocks, pitch filled, around all their rail joints from Post-office Sq. to St. Anne's Church.

I believe that an expenditure from six to seven hundred dollars is warranted at the section of our City known as the Cascade.

This Department has already taken up with the State Highway Department the matter of the reconstruction of the Milan Road from Berlin to Milan Town line at a cost of approximately \$10,000 and the installation of a patrol system of maintenance. This would cost the City one-half and the State one-half, and would make a boulevard of which we would justly be proud.

I would also recommend that our Macadam pavements be treated again this season with Tarvia and that our gravel and dirt roads be oiled as was done last season. This would make the third and last surface treatment on some of our Macadam streets and I believe that they would be left in good condition for some time to come.

Repainting the Mason St bridges during the coming season.

I trust that the coming season will see a considerable improvement in pole lines in the City.

It is the intention of this department to place several new street signs in the very early Spring.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation of the assistance rendered me by the Mayor, City Council, and heads of departments in the performance of my duties.

Report of Library Trustees.

To His Honor the Mayor and City Council of the City of Berlin:

Gentlemen:—Again the Trustees have the honor to submit their annual report, containing a statement of the Treasurer and the report of the Librarian.

Miss Adria Hutchinson, continues to fill with satisfaction the important position of Librarian with Miss Gertrude Weymouth as assistant. Both these young ladies merit the highest praise of all who patronize our Public Library.

We are pleased to state by the increased appropriation from the City we have been able to better several conditions according to plans proposed last year, and are now giving much better service to our patrons. The adult department being now open from three p. m., to 9 p. m., all classes of readers are better accommodated.

The necessity of opening the children's room one-half earlier in the evening is one of the needed changes.

The increase in circulation this year has been over 5000 which we consider good but with the present efficiency should reach a much higher mark, in the year to come.

We much regret that on account of being absent from town Miss Hamlin feels obliged to tender her resignation. She has made a most faithful and important Trustee.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

January 31, 1915.

To the Board of Trustees of the Free Public Library:

The annual report of the Free Public Library is herewith submitted.

By means of the increased appropriation from the City, the library has been able to earry out to a slight extent some of the proposed plans of last year; also, to give better service by way of hours to the patrons. Now that the adult department is open continuously from three until nine o'clock, all classes of readers seem to be accommodated. However, a plan must be formulated soon whereby the children's room can be opened at least one-half hour earlier in the evening. The necessity for doing this is fast becoming imperative.

Four hundred and twenty-seven books have been bought during the year, and thirty-three received as gifts, making the total number of volumes now in the library 8,670. The number of books purchased this year has nearly doubled the amount of any previous year. In order that the library might have the best possible results from this money expended, and since so many writers apparently seem to think.

" 'Tis pleasant sure to see one's name in print;

A book's a book although there's nothing in it," much time has been given to reading criticisms, studying book reviews, and putting careful thought upon book orders. In addition to the current publications of all classes which the library has tried to supply to its readers, the completing volumes of the Catholic encyclopedia, and Harper's encyclopedia of United States history have been purchased for the reference room, also the Book of knowledge for the children's department.

One hundred and two books have been added to replace the number worn out and destroyed. Several of the standard authors have been replaced by new, clear-typed editions. Among these were Dumas, Kingsley, the Andrew Lang edition of Sir Walter Scott, and Jane Austen with the Brock illustrations.

Your attention is respectfully called to the circulation record

of 29,732, an approximate increase of 5,000 in the number of volumes given out for home and school use. This increase has come about not by any novel advertising, but because the facilities offered by the library have been of benefit, and a faithful attempt has been made to answer all demands.

The juvenile department has surely played an important part in advancing the circulation of books. An effort has been made to place only good books in the hands of the children, for the taste for good reading must be cultivated early in the mind of a child in order to reap good results in the adult. An analysis of the circulation indeed shows that seed has been sown and has begun to reap results. The whole total of books given out in history, travel, and biography has been 1,039,925, and 522 respectively. Of this number 848 histories, 747 books of travel, and 363 biographies are credited to the juvenile department. If this good work is to continue, more books must be added, as there are approximately only 900 juvenile books with which to supply the eager wants of the children.

The call for popular fiction is always greater than the book fund will ever allow for supply. To give partial satisfaction to our patrons, a few novels were purchased in May to form the nucleus of a "rental library." To date the rentals have nearly paid for themselves, as \$34.92 has been received from the 34 books circulating in this branch.

It is gratifying to note the growing co-operation between our public schools and the library. The purposes of the two are to some extent identical; both aim to supply needed information and instruction, both have in view the training and developing of the intellect, and each should be a complement of the other. As hereto fore, packages of books and mounted pictures have been sent to the grades. The High School pupils have continued to find the library especially the reference department, of practical service in the writing of their essays and debates. Many bibliographies have been compiled for them, and to lighten this work several of the High School teachers have given assistance to the librarian. The attendance in the reference room for the year has been 1,649.

To increase the pleasure and usefulness of the reading room, several new magazines have been added. Among these were the American City, Annals of the American Academy of Political And Social Science, Craftsman, and System. A list of all the magazines to be found on file at the library is given in the statistics appended to this report.

Carlyle says "Of the things which man can do or make here below, by far the most momentous, wonderful and worthy are the things which we call books." Realizing that books make up a public library, and that a public library is for the citizens, our aim throughout the year has been to bring these two factors together and thus make this library a working force in the life of the City.

Thanks and appreciation are here given to the Trustees for their co-operation, and to the friends and patrons who have shown in many ways their kindly interest in the library.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH

Berlin, N. H., January 31, 1915.

To His Honor, the Mayor and the City Council of Berlin, N. H.

Gentlemen:—In submitting for your consideration the 5th Annual Report of the health officer, we desire to emphasize one or two recommendations made. The report is full and complete and covers the activities of the Sanitary Department in a very comprehensive way.

We trust that the members of the Council will find time to read this over carefully, for it has been prepared to give this information to those in charge of the City's affairs.

The desirability of procuring a place for the burial of dead animals has been brought out very clearly and we hope that some action will be taken during the coming year on this matter.

With reference to the Inspection of Schools, which has been touched upon; Although this is not in any sense in our Department, we feel that the work done by the medical inspection will greatly aid our work, especially with relation to the number of cases of contagious diseases. In times past, it has been necessary occasionally for the physician of the Board to make inspections of the school children and each time this was done the conditions found proved beyond any question of doubt that a regular inspection would tremendously aid the health conditions of the whole community.

We hope to make the splendid laboratory you provided for us of use to the community in many ways and believe that the results of plans upon which we are at present working will be very far reaching.

While we were well within our appropriation for last year and will do our utmost to keep inside of it during the coming year, we re-

spectfully request that the appropriation for the Sanitary Department be kept at the same figure, namely Twenty-two Hundred (2200) Dollars and that the appropriation for contagious diseases be One Thousand (1000) Dollars.

As I commented in last year's report, this continuous decrease in the number of complaints indicates that our general sanitary conditions are ever improving. The total for this year would have been considerably smaller but for the 35 complaints, more than one-third of the whole, for failure to supply satisfactory garbage cans as required by our new garbage collection ordinance.

Garbage Collection

It is my belief that this garbage collection system is one of the chief factors in our improved sanitary condition. It not only actually removes rubbish, cans, swill, and other filth in enormous quantities, but is a system of education in itself, continually keeping in the public mind the idea of regular cleaning up the year round. It discourages the old time method of heaving refuse over the back fence or into the street, and teaches that it must be stored in proper receptacles and carefully disposed of.

We are fortunate in having several handy dumping places about the city, thereby decreasing the length of haul. It is doubtful if one team could cover the city without these places, as we have greatly increased the work by making three collections weekly in the business district. This extra service is much appreciated by the business men as it saves them the expense of trucking their rubbish away themselves which they would be compelled to do with only one collection weekly by the city.

The following figures are of great interest as they give the actual number of loads and tons which our one team has hauled during the year. The dead animals disposed of has also been carefully recorded.

The table shows a total collection of 1030 tons. Total cost of operation has been \$1,764.45 or an average of \$1.71 per ton. For further details of the cost, you are referred to the report of the Public Works Department which handles this end of the system.

It will be noted that in the last inspection there are no scores of 100 given. This is the result of the decision of the State Board that it is inadvisable to give any man a perfect score, thus implying that there is no room for further improvement. It seems to me that this point is well taken. It is gratifying to note that the average score of all our stores has risen from the "not creditable" class well into the "creditable" class within the last two years.

City Cleaning Day

As proposed in my last report, City Cleaning Day was carried out in conjunction with the regular collection work this year. A certain week (May 11-16) was selected and the public notified by a cartoon poster that each family's cleaning day would be their regular collection day in that week. An extra team was put on for the week to help out the regular team, and the two handled the work at very little extra expense. I would recommend that this samemethod be used this spring.

Disposal of Dead Animals

We are very much in need of a suitable place for burying or otherwise disposing of dead horses and other animals. There are from fifteen to twenty horse's that have to be disposed of yearly. At present, the only method of disposal is to haul them into the woods and bury them. This might be satisfactory if the owner could be depended upon to do the work properly, but the temptation is often too great to simply cover the body with a few bushes or leaves. As a result, it soon becomes a nuisance to berry pickers, many of whom are children, and campers or picuic parties. If left near a brook, it constitutes a serious danger to people unconsciously drinking therefrom. Furthermore, it is practically impossible to discover the owner after decomposition has set in, hence he cannot be punished as a warning to others.

I would recommend an investigation of the methods used in other cities, and the adoption of that method which seems best suited for our needs.

Medical Inspection of Schools

Although this is primarily a Board of Education subject in this State, it ought to be of great interest to any Board of Health as a means of detecting contagious diseases before they have had an opportunity of spreading about the room or school. I have devoted considerable of my time to keeping the records of what has been done in Berlin, and I caunot speak too strongly of the benefit to bederived. I have noted marked improvement since the preliminary.

inspection last April, especially in the condition of the teeth, the removal or treatment of hypertrophied tonsils, and the decrease in pediculosis, which if not dangerous to health, is certainly repulsive and unnecessary. It is to be regretted that the Board of Education did not feel financially able to expend enough money to warrant the most careful and detailed inspection of each child this year. However, a great deal of good has been accomplished even by the superficial examinations which have been made. We will hope that a more liberal policy next fall will result in a well developed system of inspection, frequent visits by the school physician, and the following up of certain cases in the home by a suitable nurse. It is only in this way that the full benefit of the money expended will be obtained, and the nipping of epidemics in the bud be made possible. The economical and sensible way of preventing sickness and disease is to forestall it by the care and education of coming generations.

Public Water Supply

The general condition of the supply has been greatly improved over previous years. Whenever it has been necessary to use the Androscoggin water, the Water Company has received notice of the opening of Aziscohos Dam in time to discontinue pumping. This has prevented filling the system with the rank tasting and smelling water resulting from stagnation and decay above the dam. Investitions during the latter part of last summer seem to indicate that the water has been, and will be, changed often enough to remove this decayed odor and taste in the future. At any rate, it will bother less and less each year, provided it has to be used. The river water has been further protected from germ contamination by using the chlorine disinfection treatment recommended by the State Board of Health.

The erection of a reservoir on Ramsey Hill has met a long felt need for running water at all times of the day in this region. It has also resulted in greatly improved sanitary conditions.

New Office and Laboratory

With the opening of the new City Hall, we have for our use an exceptionally well situated and equipped office and laboratory. It has been the idea of your Board to throw these rooms open to the public and show them what is being done by the Department. Following out this idea, I have prepared charts and tables covering the various phases of our work such as contagious disease records, milk and dairy inspection work, birth and death records, store in-

spections, public water supply analysis, garbage collection records, and other kindred subjects. These are neatly framed and hung on the walls where they may be studied by visitors.

Within a short time, I hope to have the laboratory work so developed as to allow us to make bacteriological examinations here, thus enabling us to get much quicker results than is possible at present.

Vital Statistics

The matter of burial permits has recently been taken over by this department, so that it is now necessary for undertakers to have all death certificates approved by us before a burial permit will be issued by the City Clerk. This method gives us control and also makes it possible for us to discover deaths from contagious disease which may not have been reported to us. It also keeps us posted on the general health of the city which, under the old method, could be learned only by digging through the records in the City Clerk's office. I anticipate our greatest value from the change will be derived during the summer when the infant mortality is high. It will give us a chance to immediately investigate every death from cholera infantum, ileo colitis, gastro enteritis with the idea of determining the source of the milk supply, and the manner in which it is handled in the home. By so doing, we ought to develop some interesting data which may materially aid us in intelligently controlling our milk situation. For instance, it may show that a certain dairy is having more than its quota of deaths. Inspection would then determine what was being done that was wrong. Or. it might bring out the fact that the milk from a certain class of producers was causing the most trouble. We could then require such changes in their present methods of handling as would correct the fault. Or again, if the cause seemed to lie in the lack of care which the milk received in the home it would mean that our efforts should be turned to the education of mothers by literature or instructions through the district nursing system.

The record of the past year shows practically a normal condition has existed in diphtheria and other contagious diseases. At no time has diphtheria been a menace. We can hardly expect a city of this size to ever be entirely free from it for any period of time. The mortality has been higher than last year, 18 per cent. as compared with 9.5 per cent. I am of the opinion that this is due to the very fact of there being so few eases. With the disease raging, parents are more watchful of their children. They call a doctor more quickly, and thereby get the benefit of the early use of antitoxin which is the essential point in treating the disease. With possible one exception, the deaths were undoubtedly due to this failure on the part of the parents to call the doctor until the case was too far advanced for antitoxin to save it. If we could only

impress upon the public the fact that every case of apparently innocent sore throat may be the beginning of a case of diphtheria and should receive early medical care, we would accomplish much toward lowering this high death rate.

Vaccination

The city has vaccinated 389 children this year as compared with 294 last year, and 414 in 1912. These figures represent about the usual number of children starting school each year, both public and parochial. The total expense connected therewith amounted to \$248.03.

Although this last table shows an increase in infant mortality during the past summer, I feel satisfied that our milk situation has been better than ever. The milk has been clean and well iced. If we had had the follow-up system mentioned above, we might be better able to explain this increase.

Milk

There have been 128 samples of milk examined for total solids, fat, preservative, temperature, and sediment. Only one of these samples showed the presence of a large amount of sediment. The remainder were in very good shape. There were several instances of high temperature during the summer, but confined entirely to milk arriving here by train. Two large shipments, 300 to 400 quarts each, were condemned and destroyed. This seemed to have a very wholesome effect.

Our two dairies producing "Inspected Milk" have qualified foranother year. On the annual tuberculin test of their herds, no reacting animals were found. Their product is strictly high-class and ranks with the best in the State. It certainly seems to be appreciated by those who desire to have the best the market affords.

Two more of our local producers have applied the tuberculin test to their herds, and filed a report of the test with this office. No reacting animals were found in either case. As we have no compulsory law in this State requiring the test, it is gratifying to see this growing desire of the farmers to have it applied for their own protection, for it also protects the consumer at the same time. Although the test is not infallible, it is of unquestioned value when carefully applied and every up-to-date farmer realizes this. It should not be necessary to employ compulsory methods.

Our regular system of dairy inspection has been continued during the year. The following table gives the original score of the dairy and its last score, showing the increase or decrease as the case may be:

Report of Board of Education.

Berlin, N. H., Feb. 1, 1915.

To His Honor the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

We beg to submit to you the 30th Annual Report of the Department of Education for the year 1914-1915.

The New Brown School Building was occupied at the beginning of the fall term and is one of the best school buildings that the city owns. The large level playgrounds provided by this property are especially commended to your notice. The grading of this lot was all done with cinders. We hope, during the ensuing year, to be able to put a top coating of earth over these cinders so that the grounds may be more attractive and less dusty and dirty to playing children.

An examination of the tables in this report will show that the school system has had a large and healthy growth. On February 1st, 1914, we had registered in our schools 1136 pupils. We have now 1238, showing a gain of 102 pupils. This gain is very evenly distributed throughout the system. There is a gain of 18 in the High School and 84 in the grade schools. The grade schools are especially crowded and it has been necessary to open two new schools, a 2nd and 3rd grade in the Cole School building. There is at present only one unoccupied school room in the City: in the Brown School, and this cannot be used this year to good advantage.

If the present high grade of work is to continue in the Berliu schools, it is imperative that immediate steps be taken to relieve the present congestion in the grade school rooms. There are at present 106 pupils in the first four grades in the Cole and Marston buildings that come from Ward 1. There are 61 pupils registered from Ward 4. A new four-room building should be erected at once in Ward 1 to accommodate pupils in the first four grades. Such a school would probably open with a membership of at least 120 and materially relieve the congestion in the other buildings. If this matter is not given immediate attention we anticipate that the Board will have to hire quarters to accommodate the children entering our schools in September, 1915.

We called to your attention in last year's report the fact that the work of the High School suffers from the crowded condition of the building. Extra room will soon become a necessity, though the condition here is not as acute as in the grades.

A system of medical inspection has been inaugurated in the schools during the past year. The immediate results resulting from this system should come from continuous operation. We anticipate that these results will be well worth the expense.

The sum of \$30,000, was appropriated by the City Council for the schools for the year 1914-1915. This sum was \$3,500, in excess of the amount appropriated the previous year. About \$2,000, of this amount was used in increasing the salaries of our experienced and successful teachers, for it is the policy of the Board to keep, if possible, its best teachers. About \$700 was expended in much needed repairs to buildings. The new equipment; desks, chairs, curtains, etc. required by the New Brown School cost \$315. The remainder, about \$200, was used in operating the two new schools, extra equipment, etc. Owing to the unexpected and sudden growth of the attendance to the schools, we have been obliged to overdraw our appropriation. The cost per pupil, however, for the year 1914-1915 has been unduly low, a condition which is most unwelcome to the Board. for it means that our schools are in such a crowded condition that teachers cannot give the pupils the attention parents have the right to expect.

At least \$600, should be spent on the school buildings and grounds in the summer vacation of the ensuing year. A thin coatsing of earth should be spread over the cinders on the Brown School yard, and the grounds need some feucing. The driveways to the High and Burgess Schools should be attended to. Some grading should be around the Marston School. In the basement of the Burgess schools boy's side, the sanitary equipment should be removed and new equipment installed. This is very important.

We wish to call to your attention the great need of playgrounds at the Marston School. There are two vacant lots adjoining the Marston School playground which the city ought to buy before they are used for building purposes.

In view of the above the Board recommends that the sum of \$34,000. be appropriated by the City Council for the Berlin Public Schools for the ensuing year. Following is the financial statement for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1915:

Report of Superintendent.

To the Board of Education:

I herewith submit to you my second annual report as superintendent of your public schools, the eleventh report to be issued from this office.

Superintendent's Office

The room at the high school building formerly used as a print shop has been fitted for the superintendent's office and, while small and offering little opportunity for privacy, serves the purpose very well. I have attempted to keep regular office hours during the entire year, vacations included. Through the term these hours have been from 8-9 in the morning and 3-5 in the afternoon on school days. Saturday evenings from 7-8 I have been at the Board of Education room in the new City Building.

Until quite recently all the clerical work of the office not done by myself has been handled by the seniors from the commercial department. But the accumulation of records and correspondence pertaining to medical inspection, evening school, and the annual report of the school department made such a plan seem impracticable for the present and a clerk has been employed since the first of the winter term. The work of the office is now assuming such proportions that I venture to suggest that a permanent clerk either for half or whole time would add very materially to the administration of the schools. This would in no way deprive the commercial department of the opportunity for practical office work. The principal's office, the school bank and the city bookkeeping furnish all the office practice that the students can properly handle.

Membership

The number of children in the City between the ages of 5 and 16 on September 30 was 3,249; the number registered in the public schools 1,232. The average membership for the fall term exceeded that of last year by 136 pupils, due to a decided increase of beginners in Grades I and to the unusual number entering from the parochial schools. Two new rooms were opened at the Cole build-

ing to accommodate this increase, but even now many of the rooms are exceedingly overcrowded. The only remedy I can see is the erection of at least one new building.

Following is the total registration to date. For further data I refer you to the tables in the appendix.

Expenditures

Acting under the recommendation of the National Bureau of Education we have adopted the uniform plan of accounts now in general use. All ordinary current expenditures are grouped under five heads as indicated below. Our expenditures for the year ending January 31 exceed those of the year preceding by \$4,606.75 as follows:

I believe this increase has been well expended. Unfortunately school results cannot all be measured in dollars and cents, yet any additional expenditure above a certain minimum is bound to show far in excess of its proportionate value. This increase is showing this year in cleaner buildings and better school rooms, in a more

Our school membership and our expenditures have thus far increased at approximately the same rate. The problem before Berlin now is at least to provide an increase in appropriation in proportion to the increase in school attendance. This is the minimum that should be expected. Any improvements in organization, in operation or in maintenance must require additional revenue.

School Plant

Not the least improtant in the operation of a system of schools is the school plant. The buildings should be kept in the best of repair and clean, the sanitary equipment should be adequate and grounds attractive. A school building should be as clean and sanitary as a well ordered home, and a cummunity that does not provide for this is neglecting the health of its children and establishing a low moral and civic standard.

Two essentials are necessary: first an ample expenditure each year for ordinary repairs and improvements, and second an adequate janitor service. Some renovations and repairs have been effected this year at the high and Cole buildings; rooms have been cleaned and painted, toilets improved and floors oiled, but much still remains. It will doubtless take several years to effect the necessary changes. The janitor service, while highly efficient as far as it goes, is not adequate properly to care for the five buildings of the city. The constant care required in cleaning, in operating boilers and regulating temperatures, in responding to the repeated calls from teachers, and in looking after the multitude of minor repairs and adjustments about the building takes a janitor's time. The ready response given to new requirements by the three men now in service cannot be too highly commended, but they cannot do all that ought to be done. To keep the buildings and grounds in the condition the public has a right to expect requires the services of one more man.

Promotion, Retardation and Loss

The efficiency of a school system can be measured in part by the degree with which it retains its pupils. The seeming high-

retardation in the table below is explained by the fact that those not promoted were mainly pupils entering from other schools during the year. The loss is due to over-age pupils reaching 16 years of age and leaving either from necessity or lack of ability to do the required work of the grades.

Measured on the basis of the porportion of enrollment in the high school to that in the whole school system Berlin stands second in the list of high schools of the State, with a percentage of 28 against a possible 33 1-3. Of the 106 pupils completing grade VII, 98 or 92.45 per cent entered the high school in September.

Fire Drills

Fire drills have been conducted at each of the grade buildings. Tests now occur at irregular intervals but at least once a month. The best time of exit thus far has been:

Teachers' Meetings

In order to bring about a more united effect and a stronger professional spirit among the teachers a teachers' association has been formed and the usual officers elected. Regular meetings occur on the second Wednesday evening of each month. I am looking forward to good results arising from general discussion and the common interchange of ideas. In this connection the teachers have generously contributed towards a magazine club, and twenty of the best professional magazines of the country are now available for reading and study.

Salaries

The action of the Board in raising the salaries of experienced teachers in order to retain their services cannot be too strongly commended. The strength of any school system is governed in a large measure by the permanence of its teaching force. Berlin is in a position financially and educationally to demand the best. Under the "salary plan" the maximum salary for grade teachers has been raised from \$600 to \$625. The minimum salary for beginners is \$380. In view of the increased difficulty in securing the best teachers I would recommend that this minimum be raised this year to \$400.

School Savings Bank

The small room formerly used as the high school library has been transformed by the mechanic arts department into a banking room. This change has furnished more room for the operation of the bank besides adding considerably to the interest the children take in their weekly deposits. On July 1st, 3 per cent. interest was added to all balances of one dollar or over, and on January 1st 2 per cent.

High School

The high school departments are much the same in form as heretofore. Space forbids any detailed outline of the year's work. An occasional visit by parents or citizens would show far more than any report what is actually being done in the class room. I would especially commend the school's strength of organization and control. As reported last year the building in some quarters is extremely crowded and the heating of the shops and ventilation of the forge room decidedly unsatisfactory. These conditions should be improved at once. The assembly room transformed into a library and study room is proving a distinct advantage.

Your attention is especially called to the report of the principal which follows:

Report of the Principal of the High School.

To Supt. Harry L. Moore,

I have the honor to submit to you my second annual report as principal of the Berlin High School.

The total registration for the school year ending June 12, 1914 was 378 pupils, 172 boys and 206 girls. You will note in my report of last year there were 71 pupils in the senior class at the beginning of the school year. Four left school to go to work, two lost their class standing due to poor work, the others received their diplomas, thus making a class of 65 members, the largest graduating class in the history of the school. In this connection it may not be out of place to call attention to the fact that this graduating class entered school with 127 members. Approximately 51 per cent of this number graduated, which according to general statistics is commendable. Table I is a tabulated report of the different activities entered upon after graduation.

The total enrollment to date is 394 pupils, 182 boys and 212 girls. Table II is the registration in full.

The freshman class started with 154 pupils as follows: from the public schools 97, repeating their freshman year 13, left and returned 2, from St. Patrick School 31, from St. Regis Academy 1, and from out of town 10.

In studying Table III it will be seen that there was a considerably greater loss last year than can be expected this year as indicated by the data thus far obtained.

For the United States as a whole, the first year high school class is 40.9 per cent. of the total enrollment while the fourth year class is only 13.5 per cent. For Berlin High School, it represents 39.13 per cent. for the former and for the latter 13.04 per cent for 1913-14, and 16.51 per cent for 1914-15.

You will also note from the above tables that 23 pupils have left school thus far for the following reasons: sickness 5, work 11, moved away 4, no reasons 1, married 1, and expelled 1.

It will be observed from the registration table that 17.39 per cent of the girls are now taking the Domestic Arts Course. This number, which is less than one would expect in such a school where so much time and money are spent to make this course serviceable and educational, (a matter that I have already touched upon in my last report), is however gratifying when compared with the 7.84 per cent of last year. I think that this increase in number is due in part to the effort to create interest in this work, by having the seventh grades come in contact with high school pupils of this course in the serving of luncheons and other social activities. I am much pleased with the result obtained by having the curricula of the high school thoroughly explained to the pupils of the seventh grades at the close of the school year in order that the children may carefully consider and talk over with their parents the merits of the different courses offered. This eliminates many difficulties and misunderstandings that generally arise at the opening of the fall term in September.

I believe that the work in most cases is successful and of a high order. I wish to say that the teachers are to be congratulated not only for high type of work and discipline represented but for the keen interest, pride and good spirit shown on their parts to all other activities of the school; a necessary accompaniment to the success of any school system.

The French Club "Entre Nous" and the debating society, "The Forum" that were organized last year have proven successful. It has been of interest to watch these organizations grow not only in number but also in pride and interest both on parts of the students and faculty advisers. This year a school Science Club has been organized under the direction of the science teacher, Mr. Nathanson. The object of this club is to increase all added interest in this subject, also to give the brighter and more active pupils an opportunity for further development along more advanced lines in this field. The members have taken as a project the construction of a wireless station, anticipating that other high schools in this vicinity will become interested in forming a series of similar

stations. The Junior Recital, the program of which will be found in the appendix, was successfully carried out last year. The speakers are now chosen in au open contest by judges, thus giving equal opportunity to all members of the class whose class standing is satisfactory.

The purpose of education today is in a great measure directed to the making of good citizens. To do this there must be a three sided development of the student, that is, the mental, the moral and the physical. Athletics, where pursued with moderation and under the control and direction of the school officials to a great degree solves the problem of physical development. It also becomes the laboratory where many of the good and bad traits of character are acquired, and the athletic game of whatever nature is where both boys and girls prove their merit or worthlessness. In the excitement of physical contest, boys will be boys, and act and appear as they really are and not as they assume to be. Now under the proper stimulus and guidance there is opportunity for not only physical but moral development.

With this aim in mind an athletic association has been organized under the direction of Mr. Frellick assisted by Miss Buckley and Mr. Travis as a controlling board. This organization intends to give an equal opportunity to all the pupils, both boys and girls. This is accomplished by holding interclass contests where a large number of pupils take part, rather than interscholastic, where only a few can make the team and thus partake and receive the benefits and privileges connected with such an organization.

I have personally noticed that there is as much interest and enthusiasm in the latter games as in the first, which in itself goes to show that the association is receiving the direct support of the greater part of the student body and teachers. The success is due in part to the splendid spirit and attitude the teachers have shown in giving their extra time in the coaching and cheering. It is now the duty of the student body to maintain this high standard, which, if continued, will warrant the advisability of other branches of athletics. The finances of the Association are in the hands of the controlling board. Following is their report to date:

There have been no accidents.

The Hall has been swept and cleaned by the boys.

Repairs have been made and all equipment installed by the Mechanic Arts Department.

During the past year, the school has improved in scholarship, discipline, attitude toward work and habits of study, and most noticeably, perhaps, in the development of a good clean school spirit. This I firmly believe, is fundamental and without it little or no progress can be made. Its favorable reaction on the scholarship and discipline is shown in many ways. However, we cannot say that we have reached our ideal, for there is yet much to be done and many things to be improved. The number of cases of tardiness must be reduced. Pupils who live the greater distance from

the school are the most regular in attendance and the least often tardy. In most cases it is confined to a select few who take upon themselves the added privilege of coming to school late. It is unnecessary to go into detail why a pupil should not be late to school. The reasons are self-evident. I wish to appeal to the parents in this matter and I hope to receive their hearty co-operation.

In closing allow me in behalf of the teachers of the Berlin High School and myself to thank you for your courtesy and constant support. I would also express my thanks to the members of the Board of Education for their many manifestations of confidence in me and the many ways that they have helped in the administration of the school.

Medical Inspection

During the spring term 1914 an examination of all school children in the city was pretty thoroughly carried out except at the Burgess school. Our purpose was to ascertain actual health conditions among the pupils and thereby determine the extent to which Berlin really needed to undertake a system of permanent medical inspection. Seven physicians gave their time and services and Mr. Heald of the Health Department generously acted as clerk in the public and St. Patrick's schools. This preliminary and somewhat superficial examination clearly demonstrated the need of some systematic effort, first in detecting physical defects among the children and second in encouraging their proper care and treatment. By the close of the term in June a considerable number of cases especially of defective teeth and unhealthy tonsils had been treated either through the recommendation of the examining physician or the general moral influence of the movement.

With the opening of the new year in September plans were made to place the matter upon a permanent basis as an important factor in the school system of the City. After some delay owing to the unexpected increase in the ordinary expenditures of the Department, the inspection was begun. The compensation to the physicians was unfortunately less than was anticipated and the gratitude of the School Department and of the City is especially due them for their part in putting into operation what I believe to be one of the most important projects the schools of Berlin have undertaken.

Cases of pediculosis also were reported with directions to parents for immediate treatment.

It is yet too early to report definitely upon results. In fact only after several years of thorough operation can such inspections prove its actual worth. After the inspection by the examining physicians comes the follow-up work, probably the most effective part of the whole movement; also the individual records kept from year to year giving a summary of the pupil's physical condition and growth.

I believe medical inspection has come to Berlin to stay. Some changes can be made another year that will result in a more uniform examination, a simpler form of record, and an effective plan to follow up those cases usually neglected but which should receive immediate and intelligent treatment. I would urge that a sum be set apart from our general fund sufficient to enlist the services of either two or more physicians as permanent school inspectors, or one school nurse who shall devote her entire time to the work.

Evening School

The Burgess Memorial Evening School opened Monday, October 5, and continued ten weeks to December 10. The winter term opened January 11. The school meets Monday and Thursday evenings from 7:30 to 9:00 o'clock. The attendance during the fall term was highly gratifying with a total registration of 265 and an average attendance of 117 each evening. Pupils attending day school were not admitted. At the close of the term 89 certificates were issued to those who had maintained a 75 per cent. attendance. The oldest pupil registered was 40 years of age, the youngest 15. In Conclusion

The first year of a new superintendent's service must necessarily be occupied in routine work and in becoming familiar with the new educational field. Several years must elapse before material results can be observed arising from constructive effort. Advancement can be best made by evolutionary rather than revolutionary means. Buildings and equipment have been in a measure improved; class room work while not supervised as closely as will be possible later has been in most instances of a high order; and most important of all, a strong working spirit prevails among the teachers. To these ends attention has been especially directed the past year.

In conclusion I would express to School Board and to Public myhearty appreciation for encouragement and support.

We herewith submit our report for the year 1914.

We inspected all properties and equalized values as far as possible with the information received. In most cases we were furnished the necessary information with which to base our figures on. When we were not we had to make values according to the best of our judgment, and in so doing may get the values too high, in which case it is simply the owner's fault.

We started in with the understanding that we must discover ways and means of providing for an increase in appropriation of about twenty-five thousand dollars, without raising the rate if possible. With the new property and an increase on the old property we were able to increase the inventory \$1,612,087, most of which came from mills and machinery.

In 1908 it was recommended that the assessors have a map to assist them in their work. They were provided with one until they moved to the new City Building, at which time their map was appropriated by the public works department, and we would recommend that the assessors be provided with a map the same as they had in the old building.

We desire to express our thanks to the citizens for the information and help given us in discharging our duty.

REPORT OF CITY SOLICITOR ON

Question of Municipal Water Supply.

Berlin, N. H., February 15th, 1915

To His Honor the Mayor and the Honorable Council for the City of Berlin:

Gentlemen:—In conformity with your inquiry as to the present legal standing of the City with respect to the water supply for municipal purposes I beg leave to submit the following report.

In June 1892 the Town of Berlin contracted with the Berlin Acqueduct Company for water for fire protection and municipal uses for the period of twenty years, to begin when the water system then under contemplation should be built and completed, and should be approved by the New Hampshire Board of Underwriters. In accordance with that contract, a system of water works now owned by the Berlin Water Company was built during the summer and fall of 1892, was examined and approved by the New Hampshire Board of underwriters the same year and a copy of such approval was served upon the Town of Berlin by giving copies to the Town Clerk and selectmen on January 2nd, 1893. The period for which this contract had to run expired, therefore, January 2nd, 1913. Before and since its expiration there had been manifested some considerable sentiment among the inhabitants of the city in favor of municipal ownership. I was instructed by the City Council to prepare a question upon the subject for submission to the voters, to be voted on at the city election held in March 1914. This I did the question being as follows; vis:

"Do you favor ownership by the city of a water system to supply water to the inhabitants of said city for municipal purposes?"

The result of the vote upon that question was as follows:-

Shortly after the election in 1914, your body passed a resolution requesting the opinion of the City Solicitor upon several questions connected with the water system, one of which was whether or not the city has authority to construct a water system, without first acquiring the property, rights and franchises of the Berlin Water Company?

This right was given to the Town of Berlin by the act of the legislature of 1891, which, in my opinion, is still a valid enactment and I replied to your honorable body that I thought that the city had such a right. I was also inquired of whether the city could take over the property rights and franchises of the Berlin Water Company by the exercise of the right of eminent domain, that is, by having the valuation of the property assessed by some disinterested tribunal. My opinion on that question was, that the city did not possess that right; but that such power could be conferred upon it by a special act of the legislature. Accordingly the matter was allowed to rest without action by your body until shortly beforethe assembling of the present legislature, when I was instructed to prepare a bill for presentation to that body, giving to the city the right to take the property of the Water Company. I accordingly drafted such a bill providing for the appraisal of the water company to be made by three arbitrators to be appointed by the Superior Court. The bill as drawn by me is as follows:-

"An Act to Authorize the City of Berlin to Construct, Manage, Purchase, Maintain and Own a Water System.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened.

Sec. 1. All of the powers, rights and privileges granted to the Town of Berlin by Chapter 142 of the Session Laws of 1891 entitled "An act to authorize the Town of Berlin to procure or put in a supply of water" is granted and confirmed unto the City of Berlin in all respects as fully and completely as they were granted to the said Town of Berlin.

Sec. 2. The said City of Berlin is authorized and empowered to acquire by purchase or otherwise or by the exercise of the right of eminent domain any water system established in said City of Berlin which it shall deem to be for the public good; and if said City shall not agree with the owners of said water system upon the value of said property or of the price which shall be paid therefor or if such owners shall be unknown said City or such owners may apply by petition to the Superior Court next to be holden within.

and for the County of Coos asking that arbitrators be appointed to ascertain the value of the property so to be taken. Service of such petition shall be made as in case of Bills in Equity.

Sec. 3. Such petition having been filed and notice having been given, the Court shall appoint three arbitrators who shall appoint a time and place of hearing at which said City of Berlin and such owners may appear and at which said arbitrators shall ascertain and award the value of said water system, including the value of its property, water rights, right and franchises. Upon the payment of the sum so awarded, said City of Berlin shall become vested with all the property, water rights, and rights, privileges and franchises belonging to said owners, the value of which has been assessed as aforesaid and said City of Berlin shall thereupon become entitled to the possession of said property, rights and franchises and to all of the rents, profits and rates which shall thereafter become due on account of such water system.

In addition to the value of such property so assessed by such arbitrators as aforesaid, said city shall pay such reasonable charges and fees as compensation for the services of such arbitrators in making the said award as shall be ordered by said Superior Court.

- Sec. 4. The award of such arbitrators shall be returned to the Superior Court and when duly confirmed by said court shall be final and binding between the parties.
- Sec. 5. Each party shall produce before such arbitrators such evidence and witnesses as shall be deemed competent and relevant by such arbitrators. Such arbitrators are empowered to compel the attendance of witnesses and parties and the production of evidence in the same manner and to the same extent as they may be compelled by the Superior Court.
- Sec. 6. In case either party demands a trial by jury before reference to such arbitrators is made, a trial by jury shall be had, otherwise the award of such arbitrators shall be final and binding upon all parties.
- Sec. 7. Said city of Berlin is authorized by vote of its city council to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may from time to time be deemed advisable for defraying the expense of purchasing real estate, rights in real estate and water rights, streams, springs, ponds, water systems and any and all other rights or property which may be used in connection with or as a part of, or for constructing, maintaining or operating, its water ways or water system; and for the purposes aforesaid may borrow or hire on the credit of the city such sums of money, as may from time to

time be deemed advisable for such purposes and may issue notes and bonds of the said city, at such times and at such rates of interest, as may be fixed and determined by the city council.

- Sec. 8. The management and control of any system of water works belonging to said city whether the same be secured by purchase, condemnation proceedings, construction or otherwise shall be vested in the board of mayor and city council of said city of Berlin.
- Sec. 9. The mayor with the advice and consent of the city council is hereby authorized and empowered to appoint a board of three water commissioners who shall hold their respective offices for three years except that when said board is first appointed said appointment shall be for one, two and three years respectively and thereafter one commissioner shall be appointed each year for a term of three years.
- Sec. 10. Such water commissioners may be removed and others appointed to their unexpired terms at any time by the mayor and city council.
- Sec. 11. Such water commissioners shall appoint and remove all necessary agents and servants and under the direction of the city council, shall have the general management and control of such water system.
 - Sec. 12. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

This bill was presented to your Honorable Body by me and by you ordered to be printed three weeks successively in the Berlin Reporter. This was done and the bill was given to the Berlin delegation for introduction in the House of Representatives, representative McCarroll being chosen by his associates to introduce the bill. The bill having been introduced it was referred to the Berlin Delegation and a public hearing before the Delegation was had Friday, Jan. 29, at the auditorium in the City Hall. At this hearing a desire on the part of some critics of the measure seemed to develop that the question of municipal ownership should be again referred to the voters. Accordingly I was instructed by your Honorable Body to prepare an amendment to the bill providing for a referendum to the voters of the city, before the City Council could be authorized to take over the property of the Berlin Water Company. I accordingly prepared such an amendment which was the following:-

Amendment to House Bill No. 104

Amend said bill by inserting after Sec. 6 a new section as follows to be known as Section 7. Renumber the succeeding sections in their order.

Sec. 7. Before acquiring the property of the Berlin Water Company the City Council for the City of Berlin shall submit the question of its acquisition to the legal voters of said City Such submission shall be made at some regular election held for the election of officers for said City or at some special election called for that purpose; and, if at a special election the vote shall not be binding upon the City unless a majority of all the legal voters of said city shall vote upon said question. Said question may be in the form following:—

Do you approve of the acquisition by the City of Berliu of the property, rights and franchises of the Berlin Water Company?

Such submission may be placed upon the official ballot for the election of city officers or it may be upon a seperate ballot as the city council may direct.

If the majority of the voters at any reguar election for the election of officers who shall vote upon the question shall vote in the affirmative; or if the majority of those voting shall vote in the affirmative at a special election in which a majority of all of the legal voters of the city shall vote; the City Council shall proceed to acquire the property of the Berlin Water Company in accordance with said vote. If they are unable to agree with the owners of the Berlin Water Coompany as to the value or purchase price of the property rights and franchises so to be acquired, a petition shall be filed with the Superior Court and arbitrators shall be appointed or a trial by jury had and such property shall be acquired by the exercise of the right of eminent domain as herein provided.''

This amendment was presented to the Berlin delegation at a public hearing held in the auditorium at the City Hall Friday February 5th. No criticism of the wording of the referendum was offered; but some opposition developed at that time to any referendum. Since then no progress seems to have been made in the matter of obtaining legislation and at the present time, February 15th, 1915, the matter appears to remain very much as it was when the bill was given to the delegation for presentation to the legislature.



Report of Finance Committee.

To the Honorable City Council:

The Committee on Finance herewith submits its financial report for the fiscal year ended January 31, 1915.

We have caused to be carefully examined by the City Auditor, Arthur T. Byrnes, all the financial matters relating to the conduct of the affairs of the City during that year, and he reports that all receipts and disbursements have been properly accounted for, and that vouchers in due form have been taken and preserved for all money expended. We have also examined the securities and valuable papers of the city and find the files complete.

This sum has been since applied to the completion and equipment of this structure.

The auditor finds a net overdraft of \$ 16,660.22
and a reduction in the city debt

The overdraft in the Public Works Department was occasioned by the European War, which commenced about August 1, 1914, and the general business depression.

This condition developed while a large number of men were.

employed on streets, sewers, and sidewalks, and at a time when the manufacturing corporations were discharging their employees because, for business reasons they deemed it wise to reduce expenses.

During the critical period since August 1, it seemed a great hardship to curtail our work, and throw these men out of employment, a great many of whom had large families to support.

Therefore after the war began work was authorized and performed calling for an expenditure of \$26,918.43, a very large proportion of which was paid for labor, and we continued the work as long as the weather permitted it to be done to advantage for the reasons stated.

It must be remembered also that this sub-division of the City Government includes streets, sidewalks, sewers, civil engineering, and garbage collections, with all expenses incident to maintenance.

The reason why so much more was expended in the construction and equipment of the new Brown School Building, than was provided is that we were unable to dispose of the old Brown School property at an advantageous price because of business conditions, and it was deemed wise to hold the property until it could be sold for what it is worth.

What ever the value of this property may be it should be credited to the new Brown School account, together with \$350.00 not yet received for the old buildings on the new school lot sold last summer.

The miscellaneous department was charged with \$1833.50, an unexpected expenditure which could not be anticipated when the appropriation was made.

The appropriation for election expenses was only \$800.00. This should have been more than twice the amount named because we had the equivalent of three elections during the year;

City Election, Primary Election, and State Election.

These expenses were very greatly in excess of what was anticipated, but there was no escape from liability for their payment.

The Board of Education asserts that the School Department has been conducted as economically as was consistent with good service and that the overdraft in that department was unavoidable.

It includes, however, an outlay of \$396.52 permanent improvements on school property that were necessary but that could not have been foreseen in time to provide an appropriation therefor, and also an increase in teachers' salaries of about \$2,000.00.

Your attention is directed to the Report of the Board of Education relating to the necessity of a new school house in Ward 1 and other needed improvements in that department.

It will be noticed by reference to the auditor's report that \$2,265.50 was charged to New City Building Account, but strictly speaking no part of this was applied to purchase of land or to construction and equipment.

This amount includes insurance for three years, coal for the entire season, sidewalks about the building, janitor service, lights and water, none of which items were provided for when the appropriations were made.

The total cost of this property was therefore \$266.56 less than the appropriations.

There was also a small overdraft in the interest account which was caused by the high rates we had to pay on money borrowed in anticipation of taxes due to the war situation.

An action is now pending in the Supreme Court in favor of the City against the County of Coos to recover certain fees which we claim to be due the Police Department. Under the new law establishing Police District Courts the County claims to be entitled to all costs and fines in criminal cases, while at the same time it claims that the City should furnish, at its own expense, prosecuting officers, and quarters for detaining prisoners and holding Court.

It seems to us this is an unreasonable contention, and a result of erroneous interpretation of the law.

If we had received what we claim belongs to the city from District Court receipts, we would have shown quite an unexpended balance instead of a small overdraft in this department.

We still hold the old City Building property which is a valuable asset either to sell or retain for city purposes.

A large portion of it might be let at a good rental if retained.

Our valuation last year for taxation purposes was \$9,749,086.00.

This is an increase over the valuation for the previous year of \$1,229,087.00.

The valuation of the real and personal property owned by the city as returned by the various departments is \$513,911.96.

This shows an increase in the value of the city property over the previous year of \$44,752.92.

We believe it very important that the item of \$16,660.22 in the foregoing list, being the net overdraft for the past year should be raised by taxation the coming year even if the tax rate is slightly increased in order to produce the necessary funds for the purpose.

In making the foregoing recommendation we have been guided by the probable needs of the different departments based upon the expenditures for 1914.

The amount recommended for the Department of Public Works is made with the understanding that all fees from liquor licenses held in this city shall be credited to this account.

Our tax rate in 1913 was 1.90, and was reduced in 1914 to 1.85. In view of past events the rate in 1914 should have been increased instead of being diminished.

It may be necessary to increase the rate the coming year, in order to provide the necessary funds to meet the requirements of the various departments, but we recommend the strictest economy during the continuance of the war.

An effort is to be made to induce the State to make an appropriation to the extent of about \$5,000 with the understanding that the city appropriate a like sum the whole to be used for the purpose of improving the highway between Berlin Mills and the Milan line.

In the event that this assistance is procured from the State we would recommend that the city appropriate a further sum, equal to the amount the State may be induced to appropriate to put this part of the State highway in proper condition.
