

# Warrant for the Annual Town Meeting, March 11, 1941

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of [L. S.] Brookfield in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Brookfield on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid on Class V. roads and appropriate money for the same.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money to defray Town expenses in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell property bought by Town through tax sales.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of sixty dollars to install indoor toilets in Town Hall.

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$25.00 for Lakes Region Association and appropriate money for same.
- 8. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### Superintendent's Report

To the School Board of Brookfield:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools.

Democracy is challenged as never before. School, church and home form the triangle on which our safety rests. The triangle is a rigid figure and used much in the construction of foundations of heavy structures. If any side is imperfect the foundation gives way and the structure falls.

Homes and churches should be active in building characters for worthy citizenship. Our immediate task lies in the schools, in which teachers work so many days each year. We have comfortable buildings and good materials in a land at peace. We should do much. People in European countries are dying and the children are growing up in ignorance. The children of America must save the world for Freedom and Democracy.

We must train for sound bodies, so we teach health lessons, we provide healthful conditions and outdoor playgrounds, and we have nurses and doctors to check up and correct defects.

We must train for mechanical skills for trades and industries. Our immediate defense program is calling loudly for workers with intelligent manual ability.

We must train for governmental tasks, so we have classes in History and Government and much discussion of Current Events which are very much alive in these days. We have club activities and parliamentary procedure. We argue and discuss as people should in a Democracy. We try to train for future citizenship and worthy office-holding.

America marches on! What will be her fate? The answer lies in the progress we make in character and the finer arts. Education without character is shown in the world gone mad today. We have music and art, poetry and literature. We seek to find the virtures which endure-the finer senses of beauty, harmony, justice and honesty. We try to understand that our home country is free and prosperous because others worked, struggled and suffered for us.

We must teach scientific knowledge of plant and animal life and the laws of nature about us, so we have nature lessons and science lessons and try to understand the new ways of living and working.

We are fortunate in having the same teacher in Churchill School where the work goes so well.

The health work is in care of Mrs. Irene Jones, the Red Cross nurse. Her report is included elsewhere.

The school is larger than for several years, including a tuition pupil from another town. Interesting and helpful activities supplement the regular class work. We have a victrola and a radio and opportunities for musical appreciation. We much appreciate the generosity of citizens who help toward the dental clinic fund and other extra-curricula activities. Noon lunches still aid in keeping the boys and girls in abounding health. The motion picture still helps to visualize educational facts.

School property has been greatly improved by paint and the sanitation made almost perfect by the installa-

tion of a septic toilet system. This system is well worth the money and was very correctly installed by members of the school board.

There is needed a new sill on the back side of the building. A most desirable addition would be a spacious playground, leaving room for more shrubbery near the school building.

For the year ending June 30, 1940, the average attendance was 11.08, the average membership was 11.21 and the percent of attendance was 98.84.
