- 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To chose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To choose Agents, Auditors, Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

- 6. To see if the District will vote to make any alterations in the report of the School Board recommending the amount of money required for the support of schools and the payment of statutory obligations.
- 7. To transact any further business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

### To the School Board and Citizens of Dalton:

It is with pleasure that I submit my first annual report relative to your schools.

Operations of Dalton High School ceased this past year when Plymouth Teachers College felt it necessary to discontinue the school. Lack of a house-keeper, scarcity of cadet teachers, and inability to secure a headmaster who could also qualify as cadet training instructor contributed to this decision. As a result, Dalton pupils of high school age have enrolled in high schools nearby. This is an inconvenience and occasions some extra expense on the part of their parents. The pupils, however, have the advantage of more varied courses, better equipment, and contact with more experienced teachers.

All elementary grades were transferred to the high school building, giving them the advantage of steam heat and other more modern housing facilities. Mrs. Silsby assumed the work of principal. Under her leadership many fine things have been accomplished. The spirit of the school is good, with pupils taught to respect school property and also the rights of each other as individuals. Scholastic instruction in the classrooms has been effective as well.

Able assistance has been rendered by two new teachers, Miss Dorothea Bergeron and Miss Hilda Boyle. Miss Bergeron is a Plymouth graduate and came to Dalton after a year's teaching experience in Grantham. Miss Boyle also trained at Plymouth Teachers College and is beginning her experience as teacher this year.

Dalton pupils have an enviable record in their purchase of war stamps and bonds. By Christmas vacation they had reached a total of \$285.00, the equivalent of a machine gun.

The enrollment last year, as will be seen in the table at the end of this report, was 130. This year 94 have registered as compared with 99 in the first eight grades last year. The number of elementary pupils attending outside schools is not expected to change particularly next year. Only three high school pupils are graduating next June, while as many as nine may be entering high school so that high school tuition costs will increase.

The school nurse reports as follows regarding her work last year:

Schools continue to be affected in many ways by war conditions. The most serious effect is the acute Even though the majority shortage of teachers. have stuck to their important work of teaching, keen competition among school districts to secure good teachers has made it ever more difficult for smaller schools to fill vacancies. Salaries have increased and will continue to rise as long as present conditions exist. Looking beyond the immediate danger to our children's educational welfare, we must realize that effective education is the bulwark of democracy in the future. When our young people leave our schools to take their places in society we want them to be well equipped to face the competition of modern living. Under these circumstances we must be financially able to secure and keep the best teachers available.

We have been very fortunate in being able to keep our school operating with reasonable standards of efficiency. Cooperation on the part of school children, parents, teachers and citizens has helped to make the most of what we have and to do the best job possible in the face of many difficulties. All such efforts of those various individuals have been very much appreciated.

# **Another Enemy To Conquer!**



Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

- 1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.
- 2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.
- 3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.
- 4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.
- 5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.
