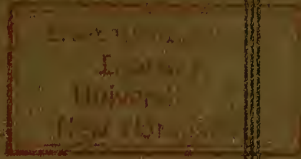

## School Report

---

Our schools, the past year have been : In Wildwood, a spring term of 13 weeks and a fall term of 10 weeks, both taught by Mrs. Josephine M. Bruce of St. Johnsbury, Vt. In No. 1, a spring term of 12 2-5 weeks, taught by Miss Lulu M. Reed of Plymouth, N. H., a fall term of 8 weeks taught by Miss Amy S. Young of Sugar Hill, N. H., and a winter term of 12 weeks taught by Miss Ethel M. Knight of Franconia, N. H. In No. 2, a spring term of 13 weeks, and a fall term of 10 weeks, both taught by Miss Knight, and a winter term of 12 weeks taught by Miss Blanche L. Aldrich of Sugar Hill, N. H.

Illness of the teachers has cut short some of our terms of school, but we expect to make it up in the coming year. The attendance has been very good until the epidemic of grip colds in February. We have expended about five hundred dollars in repairs, and our school houses are pleasant and comfortable.

If we could plant a few trees and shrubs now, it would add to the pleasantness outside.
