WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

- To the inhabitants of the town of Farmington, qualified to vote in town affairs:
- You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Farmington on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:
- Article 1. To choose one selectman for three years, a town clerk, town treasurer, road agent, two police officers, two auditors, and a trustee of the trust fund for three years and all other necessary officers and agents for the ensuing year.

YOU ARE ALSO NOTIFIED TO MEET AT THE SAID TOWN HALL AT SEVEN O'CLOCK IN THE AFTERNOON OF THE SAME DATE, TO ACT ON THE FOLLOWING SUBJECTS:

- Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vore to raise and appropriate to defray expenses of general government as defined in the budget. Items Nos. 1 to 5.
- Article 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the police department. Budget Item No. 6.
- Article 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for forest fire protection. Budget Item No. 7.

- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for white pine blister rust control, the same to be expended in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department. Item No. 8.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the health department. Item No. 11.
- Article 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the summer and winter . maintenance of highways and bridges, and for the general expenses of the highway department. Budget Item, Nos. 12, 13 and 14.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$732.84 in order to secure state aid in the amount of \$2,931.35 for the improvement of Class V highways. Item No. 15.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the Farmington Public Library Association. Item 16.
- Article 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for old age assistance and welfare relief. Item Nos. 17, 18 and 19.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate to Clarence L. Perkins Post, No. 60, the sum of \$200.00 to be used for Memorial Day observance. Item No. 20.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 for the care of parks and playgrounds, to be alloted as follows: \$125.90 for Edgerly park, \$75.00 for Fernald park, \$50.00 for the skating pond and \$25.00 for care of the grounds at the Henry Wilson boulder.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.

- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell or administer real estate taken over by the town for nonpayment of taxes, such authority to remain in effect unless revoked by a subsequent meeting.
- Article 15. To see what action the town will take in regard to procuring new road and snow removal equipment and to make appropriation for the same.
- Article 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the completion of the projected improvements at the corner of South Main and Central streets and how the same shall be raised.
- Article 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to make certain improvements at the Spring street tool shed for the better care and storage of equipment.
- Article 18. By petition: "To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 (one thousand dollars) toward the expenses of a visiting nurse, to reside in Farmington".
- Article 19. By petition: "To see if the town will vote to allow the schools the use of the town hall without charge".
- Article 20. To see if the town will take any action relative to establishing a schedule of rentals for the town hall.
- Article 21. By petition: To see if the town will vote, "That the selectmen of Farmington be authorized to appoint a committee to confer with the City Council of Rochester. relative to making a survey, with the objective of setting aside such portions of the Merrill's Corner and Ten Rod road districts, to become a part of Rochester, as shall be mutually acceptable, and to the best interests of all concerned. Such committee to consist of five members; one

from the board of selectmen, one from the school board, one citizen at large and two from the districts concerned".

Article 22. To see what action the town will take regarding an upward revision of the sewer rates, and authorize the selectmen to make a study of the established methods of assessment in other towns, and make such revision of said rates as shall seem just and equitable.

STATEMENT BY THE SELECTMEN

TO THE CITIZENS AND TAXPAYERS OF FARMINGTON:

We submit herewith our report for the year ending December 31, 1945.

Reference to the financial statement shows a cash balance of \$43,096.15, a decrease of \$5,017.46 from the previous year and a decrease of \$817.86 in surplus. (The cash surplus above current liabilities is \$12,296.96.)

While it is disquieting to have a two years successive decrease in the surplus, the result is not as unfavorable as we had anticipated.

We had tried during previous years to so manage our appropriations and expenditures as to accumulate a modest surplus to help take care of the deficiencies in equipment, and maintenance work in all departments which have been inevitably accumulated as a result of the restrictions during the war years. We believe we find ourselves no worse off is the latter respect than many other towns.

We are fully aware of the unfavorable reaction to the unusually high tax rate which we had in 1945. In making up our budget for the year we were confronted with a difficult situation. As explained in our 1944 report, we had been taking, during the previous two years, unusually large credits from revenues other than taxes in order to make our assessment and tax rate as low as possible. This resulted in restricting our available funds almost exactly to our estimated requirements and left little or nothing to meet unexpected contingencies.

We had hoped to be able to publish a tabulation of the 1944 and 1945 appropriations and credit deductions side by side, thereby presenting a "deadly parallel" showing clearly the reason for the increase in the 1945 tax rate over the 1944 rate. Lack of time has prevented doing this.

However, it will suffice to point out that the total amount of property taxes assessed in 1945 for town and county purposes was \$87,202.27 against \$68,061.69 in

1944, while the precinct assessment was \$13,175.44 against \$9,435.50 in the respective years.

Knowing that some unusual town appropriations were contemplated, and the school and precinct budgets would be increased, we pared all of our budget estimates to the lowest possible figure in order to avoid a still higher tax rate.

Everyone is familiar with the unfortunate conditions which we encountered with respect to snow removal a year ago. When we made up the 1945 budget, the \$8,000.00 recommended for winter maintenance was barely enough to cover the known expenditures up to the latter part of February, leaving the remainder of that winter season and December (and possibly part of November) unprovided for. This was sure to result in a deficit which as shown by the report amounted to \$2,065.00.

It should be remembered that under normal conditions the highway appropriations for all purposes over a period of years prior to 1943 averaged about \$13,000.00, while the cost of highway labor has increased from 38 cents to 60 cents per hour and the cost of rented trucks proportionately. Obviously, more money will have to be appropriated in the future or maintenance will suffer, as indeed it already has.

In our budget estimates for 1946 we have suggested \$6,000.00 for summer maintenance, \$4,000.00 for winter maintenance and \$3,000.00 for highway general expense. It is hoped to have more of the work on Class V roads done this year under the T. R. A. program, thus releasing town funds for village improvements. Referring to summer maintenance, it will be noticed that there was an overdraft in this account of \$1,973.00. This was largely accounted for by the cost of labor and lumber for the repair or reconstruction of five bridges, large and small. The cost of repairing the Watson bridge, which was broken down by an overloaded truck, was approximately \$1,000.00, including the partial reconstruction of one of the abutments.

We also purchased 4,000 gallons of cold patch tarvia against 1,000 gallons the previous year. Even that was not all that was needed.

The maintenance of road equipment account will run into a large expenditure this year. We have already paid \$597.00 for repairs on the tractor done in February, 1945, the bill for which was not presented until after the first of January. We have since had it thoroughly overhauled at a cost of \$735.00. It has thus far proven to be in perfect operating condition and has saved us several thousand dollars in this year's plowing costs. Without it our situation would have been as desperate as it was a year ago. (Our winter mainten ance from January 1 to March 2 has cost just under \$3,000.00.)

This may properly bring up the subject of new road equipment. There is an article in the warrant covering this matter which commands your serious and intelligent consideration. Our two old trucks have seen six or more years of hard service. Both of them have been broken down this winter while plowing snow, necessitating expensive repairs. Also, if we ever get our country roads up to the condition which modern traffic demands, we have got to have more effective and economical road building and maintenance equipment.

Reverting to the budget and comparative expenditures, it will be seen that the town hall account shows an overdraft of \$529.00. This is accounted for by the increased cost of heating and partly by a slow leakage in the traps of some of the toilets which remained undetected for some time, resulting in a six months' water bill of \$88.00, against a normal charge of about \$12.00 to \$15.00 for the corresponding period. With respect to the police department account, it may be said that without authorization but from force of necessity, we increased the salary of the chief of police to \$1,800.00 per year to procure the services of one who was willing to accept the office.

For the greater convenience of the officers and the better accommodation of the public we have rented the annex to the J. A. Boyd block and had a one-way police radio installed, the latter without cost to the town, the police having raised the funds to pay for it.

It was pointed out in our 1944 report that the \$5,500.00 appropriation for old age assistance was likely to be inadequate. This proved to be the case, the expenditures having amounted to \$6,634.00, an overdraft of \$1,134.00. This overdraft is partly offset by recoveries of \$796.00. These recoveries can not always be depended on. The State Department of Public Welfare reports that the case load and expenditures for old age assistance are increasing throughout the state and our costs are not likely to decrease. The suggested appropriation of \$6,500.00 is conservative.

Article 16 of the warrant concerns the projected improvements at the corner of South Main and Central streets. This project, having been undertaken, ought to be carried to an early conclusion. We have received a tentative estimate of the cost of this work, a part of which the abutting landowner will assume, leaving the probable cost to the town approximately \$3,100.00.

Article 17 suggests an appropriation for certain improvements at the Spring street tool shed. If new equipment is purchased this will be necessary.

It is recognized that if all or part of these capital expenditures are made, they will have to be financed by borrowing. Regrettable as this may seem it is the only feasible method.

This will temporarily increase the burden of debt service. However, the last payment on the present school debt will be made in 1947, and the last payments on the town debt will be provided for in 1949. This will reduce our assessment for debt service \$7,000.00 (plus the rapidly decreasing interest charges).

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Prevent Forest Fires—It Pays

An average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year destroying many thousand dollars worth of property of all descriptions. It costs many additional thousands of dollars and requires valuable man hours, taken from other essential work, to extinguish them. These losses affect the personal fortunes of the owners and town and state economies. Everyone loses because of them.

Analysis of fire causes reveals the fact that more than 98 per cent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human 'carelessness and are preventable!

We have been extremely fortunate during the past few years. Favorable fire weather and war time restrictions on travel which kept people off the highways and out of the woods have aided materially in reducing fire risks, keeping fires fewer and fire losses low.

We now face changed conditions. People can travel freely. Their love for travel and the freedom of the woods will bring them out in ever increasing numbers. This will step up fire risks materially. The accelerated cutting of the war years has resulted in additional thousands of slash acres. These factors, combined with a possible dry season and human carelessness could easily produce a catastrophe. Everyone must, consequently, be on their guard. They should

- Be careful with fire or when smoking in or near woodlands.
- 2. Cooperate with the local forest fire warden and his deputies by
 - Abiding cheerfully with whatever restrictions it may be necessary to impose. They are intended only to be helpful.

- b. Securing permits to burn debris when the ground is not covered with snow.
- c. Seeing that others comply with requirements.
- d. Promptly coming to the warden's assistance when needed.

If these few fundamental practices are followed it will be possible to prevent a large proportion of forest fires from starting. That pays!
