## TOWN WARRANT

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### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenland in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the School Building in said Greenland on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges.
4. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid for the construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate \$110.29 for said purpose.
5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to erect a memorial for World War veterans and for the observation of Memorial Day.
6. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on short-term notes in anticipation of taxes.

7. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any property acquired by tax sale.

8. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

During December the Library was open rather irregularly, because of the difficulty of finding a regular janitor and a blizzard occurring on one Tuesday made it impossible to open. Also Christmas came this year on Tuesday and that is the one holiday when there is no question of opening.

The work has been carried on as usual with fairly satisfactory results. Collections of books have been sent to the school and have been used by the third and fourth grades and also by the seventh and eighth. In this way the teachers who select the books make sure that some worthwhile outside reading is done by the pupils. By taking books from the State Library we have been able to satisfy requests for information which we can not give from our own collection.

This month we have been trying the experiment of opening from two to five on Tuesdays and not in the evening, but the usual hours are kept on Saturday.

The same people who gave us magazines last year have continued to do so and they have been circulated widely. We are grateful for such contributions.

# SCHOOL REPORT

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## SCHOOL WARRANT

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To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Greenland qualified to vote in district affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Central School in said district on the twelfth day of March 1946, immediately following town meeting to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.
9. To see if the district will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Municipal Accounting Division, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

10. To see if the district will elect to approve of the inclusion of its officers and employes (other than those eligible under the Teachers' Retirement System) in the Employees Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, which system is provided for by chapter 27-A of the Revised Laws, as inserted by chapter 183 of the Laws of 1945, and as provided by chapter 201 of the Laws of 1945 and any subsequent amendments thereto.

11. If the district votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred sixteen dollars (\$116.) for the purpose of providing funds for the district's contribution to said retirement system for the coming year.

12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding two thousand dollars (\$2,000.) to defray the cost of transporting such school children of the town as are entitled to and as desire to attend the Portsmouth High School, Portsmouth, N. H. (Inserted by petition.)

13. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the School Board of Greenland, New Hampshire:

I take pleasure in submitting my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

During the brief time that it has been my privilege to serve the Greenland School District as Superintendent, I have been greatly impressed with the interest and cooperation which has been evident at all times. Greenland is fortunate in having a modern consolidated school building adequate for the needs of elementary education. The available facilities allow opportunity for numerous activities denied the pupils in the average one room school. It is, therefore, possible for the teachers to develop a program of training for citizenship and leisure time activities which will be of tremendous value in adult life.

The school year 1945-46 opened with two changes in the faculty. Mrs. Blakeney replaced Miss Gilmour in grades three and four, and Mrs. Stone replaced Mrs. Russell as teacher of the first two grades. Both have had considerable previous experience and have already proved themselves well qualified to carry on the work. The veteran teachers, Mrs. Howe and Mrs. Mudgett, are valuable assets to the school system. The high educational standards of the school justifies the liberal salary schedule which Greenland has established.

The health program is an important part of any modern educational system. The report of Mrs. Sheehy, the school nurse, shows that the health and general welfare of the pupils is being constantly observed and essential corrective measures are being taken. The diphtheria immunization

clinic for pre-school and lower grade children is one outstanding example of the important service being performed.

The spacious play-ground at the rear of the school building should be utilized to the fullest possible extent. Organized play during vacation periods and after school hours might be considered as a community project. In this post war era leisure time activity will be an ever increasing problem of public concern.

The statistical tables which accompany this report compare the enrollment, cost of elementary education, and attendance in Greenland with the other towns in the School Union. These should be of interest to all citizens.

I conclude this report with the following paragraph which is pertinent to the future education of every community.

Now that the war is over and the nation is confronted with the problem of reconversion, the public schools must likewise make many readjustments in the days ahead. Today there is a mounting tide of sentiment in behalf of better education. We have entered upon a new age in the history of man. With weapons now in his hands which can obliterate nations from the face of the earth, man is literally forced to get along with his fellow men. A high level of universal education is indispensable to the solution by this country, or any other, of such basic problems as good citizenship, full employment, and group relationship. The American people have had a great faith in education. Today they must have an even broader vision. The kind of education we provide today will, more than anything else, determine our future. Teachers will do their part but they seek, and they need, the active cooperation of every individual. It is essential that increased interest in and understanding

of the objectives and activities of the school program be accepted as a personal responsibility by every citizen of this community.

## THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

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To the School Board of Greenland, N. H.

Following are the health activities carried on in the Greenland Schools from January 1, 1945 to January 1, 1946.

Most of the corrective work for the 1944 physical examinations was done during the winter and spring terms of 1945.

- 72 Children had complete dental care.
- 9 Children had part dental care.
- 6 Children had tonsillectomies performed.
- 5 Children had eye examinations and received glasses.
- 2 Children had eye examinations and had glasses changed.
- 1 Child has been taken to the orthopedic clinic in Manchester several times for treatment and check-up.
- All children are vaccinated.
- 44 Visits were made to the school.
- 81 Visits were made to the homes.
- No. of children examined in the fall term of 1945      98
- No. of children found to have defective vision      10
- No. of children found to have defective teeth      51
- No. of children found to have defective tonsils      11
- No. of children found to have enlarged glands      3
- No. of children found to have orthopedic defect      1

All children are weighed and measured during the fall, winter and spring terms.

There has been one case of measles; other than this, there have been no other contagious diseases this school year.

The children are enjoying their hot lunches in school which are prepared by Mrs. Mary Syphers. These greatly



help the children who come to school so early on the bus and those who otherwise would have to eat a cold lunch. Last year there was a marked gain in weight and their health has been improved.

A Diphtheria Toxoid clinic was held in the school for all pre-school children over nine months of age and all school children in the first four grades. There were twenty school children and twelve pre-school children inoculated against diphtheria.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank our Superintendent, Mr. Coleman, the School Board, the teachers, the parents and friends for their cooperation and help with my work.
