## TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville, in the County of Hills-borough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, then and there to bring in your ballots for the following town officers:

Town clerk for one year; one selectman for three years; town treasurer for one year; tax collector for one year; highway agent for one year; one water commissioner for one year; one water commissioner for three years; cemetery trustee for three years; library trustee for three years; two auditors for one year; three firewards for one year; also to bring in your ballots for the election of Delegates-at-large, Alternate Delegates-at-large, Delegates and Alternate Delegates to the National Convention of the various political parties to be held to nominate party candidates for President and Vice President of the United States.

And at eight of the clock in the afternoon of the same day at the same place to act upon the following subjects:

- Art. 1. To choose all necessary officers not chosen by the Australian ballot.
- Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- Art. 3. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any action thereon.

- Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$171.20, the State to contribute \$684.81, these amounts to be used jointly for town road aid, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the Town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.
- Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to rebuild the road from a point near the residence of T. Lizotte to lower Mill Street, to include the piece of road south of property of Nora Welch, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 8. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to sell the piece of property deeded to said Town by the Columbian Real Estate Company, situated near Ashton Street and property to Philip Rodier, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 to repair the fence by the river on River Street, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to extend the fire main and install a hydrant near the Rowse plant, raise and appropriate a sum of money for same, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to make necessary repairs, on No. 6 Bridge, so-called, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept a certain sum of money left to the Town under the will of the late Myrtle M. Marsh "To be used for recreational purposes and for beautifying the Town," a part of this money to be kept as a separate fund, the income from which to be used for upkeep of the above mentioned purposes, said bequest to be administered by three Trustees, or take any action thereon.

- Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept a bequest of \$5,000 from the late Myrtle M. Marsh, for the purpose of improving the new part of the Pleasant Street Cemetery, said fund to be administered by three Trustees, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 14. To see if the Town will accept a bequest of \$1,000 for "Special Care of the Marsh-Curley Lot" in the Pleasant Street Cemetery, said bequest to be kept as a separate fund, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to repair the Taft Memorial Playground, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to Authorize the Selectmen to sign Federal Works Agency BCF Form 3, "Application for Advance for Plan Preparation for Non-Federal Public Works" requesting Government appropriation to cover engineering services for planning a sanitary sewer system for the Town of Greenville; and raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars for the preliminary expense of preparing the application form with the necessary brief preliminary engineering investigation, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$3,000 to complete the work on the Pumping Station, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to repaint the exterior of the town house, or take any other action thereon.

#### REPORT OF FIREWARDS

There were no serious fires in the town for the year 1947. During two weeks of the extreme fire hazard in October all highways were patrolled and a few fires taken care of. Assistance was given to the Fitchburg Fire Department when their fire menace was at its worst.

<sup>†</sup> The Gamewell system in town has been installed with new wire which we believe will be more efficient. We expect to put the steam fire whistle in operation when warm weather comes.

Excerpts from State Forest Fire Dept. Regulations

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drouth and forest fire occurrences in Eastern United States history. Most of the fires were well controlled and kept within bounds but the few that got out of hand about Oct. 23rd burned some 15,000 acres of woodland and 63 buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

The fires were costly as all growth on the land was killed by the depth of the burning.

The State Department has directed the wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such from getting out of control.

Nine of every ten fires can be prevented, 98% of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland.

I hereby submit the Annual Report of the Library for the Year ending December 31, 1947.

During the past year the library has been open every Monday evening and Friday afternoon.

No. of visitors during the year	3,219
No. of books loaned	2,732
No. of magazines loaned	827

We are very grateful to all who have given books to the library, fifteen of which were for the children's department.

The library has shown an increase in visitors and in the number of books loaned. There were 352 more visitors this year than last, and books loaned show an increase of 660.

It is interesting to note that the total number of adult visitors was 600, the remaining 2,619 being young people of school age. Each year the schools require more reading and reference work from the pupils and we are trying to serve them in every way possible.

This year the library has purchased an excellent set of much needed reference books, the Jr. Britannica of 15 volumes and the Standard Encyclopaedia Britannica of 24 volumes having been added. They are being used extensively and are filling a grave need for up-to-date reference material. This purchase was made possible by our being allowed to pay for the set over a period of years. A substantial down payment was made and the balance is due in three yearly payments, payable in 1948, 1949 and 1950.

During National Book Week your librarian gave a talk at the School on Books. There was a noticeable increase in the use of the library by the younger pupils afterwards. We hope this coming year to have an exhibit by the Schools for Book Week.

Any suggestions for the betterment of the library, and ways of making the library more useful to the community, would be appreciated.

#### REPORT OF SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenville:

I respectfully submit my first annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

#### ADVANCES IN EDUCATION IN NEW HAMPSHIRE

No single event in the history of education in the State of New Hampshire has had such influence on the educational picture of our state as the State Aid Law passed by our Legislature in the late spring of 1947. This legislation, prompted by the investigation of the Interim Commission established in 1945 to study the educational needs of New Hampshire, and the untiring efforts of our Commissioner of Education, and the many loyal supporters of public education, increased state financial aid to local school districts approximately 400%.

The purpose of the bill was to equalize educational opportunities and to improve public elementary and high schools in New Hampshire by making funds available to those school districts in the state that were operating on meager budgets and were unable to offer the education they desired. It was interesting to note, that during the special school district meetings held in July 1947, over 90% of state aid funds was voted by the towns to be used for educational purposes. No portion of state aid funds for the school year 1947-48 could be used for payment of interest, debt or other capital expenditures.

To review the manner in which the state aid law functions, the following is presented.

State aid is based on the exact average daily membership of each public school in New Hampshire, or each approved school, in New Hampshire, or in an adjoining state, with all pupils credited to their district of residence for the payment of state aid. Under the law, aid can be given to districts only for pupils for whose education the district is legally responsible.

The state aid law apportions the aid in two categories, equalization and general aid. In applying the equalization formula, a required program is set up allowing \$1,800 for each approved one-room school with at least six grades, \$75 for all other elementary pupils, and \$100 for each high school student. Under the provisions of the act, the local school district's share in the program is six-tenths of one per cent of its equalized valuation, which is

subtracted from the total formula program share, with the remainder paid by the state as equalization aid. After the requirements of the equalization have been met, and one per cent set aside for emergencies, the remainder of the fund is prorated on the basis of average daily membership, on a ratio of three to four for elementary and high school respectively. For the purposes of general aid, the average daily membership of the one-room schools is added to the average daily membership of the other elementary pupils. A summary of the computation for the school district of Greenville is as follows:

The amount of state aid available to the school districts will vary from year to year as the state enrollment of public school children increases or decreases.

The Cooperative School District Act passed by the State Legislature in the spring of 1947 makes it possible for local school districts, through local initiative, to join together to establish more effective school units. While this act does not have the immediate impact on New Hampshire education that the State Aid Law had, nevertheless, it will perhaps be instrumental in changing the whole supervisory district organization in the years to come.

There are many advantages to the Cooperative School idea. A few of them are as follows. Larger districts make available greater funds with which to provide better buildings, instruction, materials of instruction and more varied programs. A cooperative school does not necessarily mean that education will be cheaper but that more services can be obtained for the dollar spent, consequently a cooperative school is more economical.

A cooperative school district poses many problems, the greatest being that of transportation. This problem, in most cases, can be solved by district owned and operated buses. North Carolina has been exceedingly successful in this respect. The town of Newport, N. H. has embarked upon a program of locally owned and operated buses and it is estimated that their total cost of operation will be approximately 25 cents per mile. In Supervisory Union No. 63 it is approximately 40 cents per mile.

Studies are being made in both the Wilton-Milford area and the Antrim-Bennington, Francestown area on the Cooperative School District idea. However, these studies are not far enough advanced to report upon at this time.

By an act of the State Board of Education on June 30, 1947 a program of minimum standards for teachers' salaries was approved. This action set the minimum of teachers' salaries in the State of New Hampshire at \$1,700, this minimum increasing to \$2,000, dependent upon the preparation and experience of the teacher.

The salary situation in New Hampshire has long needed improvement. In 1946-47 four towns were paying elementary teachers less than \$1,200. \$1,400—\$1,500 was the minimum salary in thirty-two towns. Nine towns were paying from \$1,600 to \$1,800. The five towns in this group in our Union were paying from \$1,200 to \$1,650. A similar salary survey made in 1947-48 shows that no teacher in the state is getting less than \$1,700 with the median about \$1,850. This is true of the five towns mentioned in our Union.

However, even with this revision of salaries upward, our better teachers are being drained off to neighboring states or going into other employment.

#### SHORTAGE OF TEACHERS

The teacher shortage is still serious, particularly at the elementary level. However, there is a slight improvement over 1946-47.

For the nation as a whole it is probable that enrollments in "teacher-education" programs now approximate pre-war enrollments. However, many of these undergraduates will not be available for employment for two to three years. Unfortunately, also, the enrollments by states are not geared to the shortages. Relatively wealthy states, where salaries are high and the teacher shortage small, have higher teacher-education enrollments. It appears too, that enrollments are piling up in courses leading to regular second-

ary school certification when the greatest immediate demand is in elementary schools.

The State of New Hampshire needs approximately 150 new elementary teachers every year. This year there will be graduated from Keene Teachers College and Plymouth Teachers College approximately 30. In the fall of 1947 at Keene Teachers College 45 elected the elementary program and at Plymouth there were 20. Consequently, four years from now we will have 65 teachers available to take 150 or more teaching positions. To alleviate this situation, we have approximately 350 elementary teachers still working on war emergency permits.

The situation is not too encouraging.

#### School Costs

There does not appear to be any immediate relief in the cost of living today. Such increased costs are reflected in the school budgets of 1948-49. All school costs have risen but the most noticeable increase has been in the area of textbooks, scholars' supplies, teachers' salaries and tuition costs.

A survey recently completed by two supply houses indicates that since the fall of 1946 scholars' supplies have increased from 10% to 40%, textbooks from 20% to 30%, teachers' salaries approximately 6%.

These increased costs have necessitated school boards to raise their tuition price. The state average for secondary school instruction for the year 1946-47 was \$138.89 per pupil. Most school districts are raising their tuition to \$135.06. This will not inflict a hardship on school districts with whom they have contracts and will more equally distribute the costs of instruction.
