TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Child's Opera House in said town on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk and Chief of Police for one year, Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for two years, Trustees of Trust Funds for three years and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the town officers to the auditors, the reports of the auditors, agents, committees or other town officers heretofore chosen or appointed and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, Community Building, appropriations for street lights and all current expenses of the town and such amounts as may be necessary to apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt.

Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the building and repairing of highways, bridges and culverts.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for Memorial Day purposes.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to be applied upon the salary of the District Nurse.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to instruct and empower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of

money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the town and in anticipation of taxes.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum equal to not more than one onehundredth of one per cent (1-100 of 1 per cent) of the assessed valuation based upon assessment of 1945 for the purpose of publicizing the natural advantages of the town, in connection with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60.00 for the care and maintenance of the Town Clock, so-called, on Smith Memorial Church.

Article 10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of cooperating with the State and Federal governments in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust or act in relation thereto.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international cooperation, such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Yet, despite the time, thought and effort we are all putting into the war effort in general, we are, true to our peculiar American characteristics, heedless and careless about many important things and one of these is fire as it relates to our forests.

Much harm can be done the war effort because of our carelessness with fire. Lumber has gone to war in a BIG WAY! Our New Hampshire forests are contributing their full share insofar as manpower permits. Fire, the greatest enemy of the forests, destroys, during each of these critical years, hundreds of acres of valuable trees that could contribute to the war effort. Forest fires disrupt the war's business by taking men from their important work in industry and on the farm and reduces production of necessary war materials and food. Forest fires require the spending of much money and material that might otherwise be diverted into vital war channels. Forest fires are, for the most part, unnecessary and avoidable for ninetyeight per cent of such fires are, annually, the result of human carelessness—yours and mine. This can and should be remedied—NOW! YOU can HELP THE WAR EFFORT by PREVENTING FOREST FIRES! The rules of the game are simple.

- 1. Always be careful with fire in or near woodlands.
- 2. Comply with regulations governing the use or starting of fires there. Remember
 - a. You need written permission from your local forest fire warden for debris burning fires when the ground is not covered with snow.
 - b. Be sure your match, cigar, cigarette and pipe ashes are *out* before dropping them.
- 3. Be fire-minded NOW as never before; be careful; caution others to be careful; be cooperative and thus help your warden, your town, your nation and yourself!

The present enrollment in the schools is: Center, 14; Flat, 14; Lower Village, 22; Upper Village, 21. There are 23 pupils from the Town District registered at Hillsboro High School. In addition there are 4 pupils attending the Special District Elementary Schools whose parents pay their tuition.

Again this year it is possible for parents and citizens in the Hillsboro Town School District to take justifiable pride in the fact that their schools are continuing in a very satisfactory manner regardless of the drawbacks which are seriously handicapping many rural, one-room schools. Your experienced reliable staff of teachers is the same as last year, many of them having already given many years of faithful service to this same district.

Our transportation problems are a little easier this year. Miss Crane, the teacher, transports the children living on the main road to her own school. Mr. Edwards transports his own children to the same school. Mrs. Gile, the Lower Village teacher, transports the pupils from Bear Hill and Merrill District to the Flat School. James Rollins transports his brother to the Flat School and then attends Hillsboro High School. There are no school pupils requiring transportation at either the Lower Village or Upper Village.

A year ago new arithmetic books were placed in the schools. This year all the history books were replaced. The new reading system was extended to the second grade and will be placed in the third grade next year. Marked success has been shown with this system. Nothing is really more important in school work than the ability to read, which is either acquired or not acquired in the first three grades. Many of the later difficulties of pupils in high school have been attributed to poor instruction in reading in the first few grades. We hope to be able to avoid these difficulties with our present group.

Although all school materials have not arrived exactly when we wanted them, by careful and early buying we have been able to give the pupils and teachers practically everything they needed to conduct the schools properly. Minor repairs have been carried out on the buildings but major repairs and changes are being allowed to wait until after the war. Perhaps by that time the district may have agreed upon some one of the several plans suggested by interested citizens in regard to radically changing the present school arrangement. I am pleased to note that in most of the schools there is a decided improvement in attendance. Many of the schools run weeks at a time without a single tardiness and only unavoidable absences.

It is with a great deal of pleasure that I hereby record the fact which Mr. Bell, Headmaster of Hillsboro High School, has just presented me. Marion Murdough, a pupil from the Town School District, has been elected as the D. A. R. Good Citizen candidate to go to Concord and compete with girls elected from other high schools for the state award.

In conclusion I again want to thank the School Board and Teachers for assisting me in maintaining good schools in Hillsboro Town.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

We try to make every music lesson one in appreciation. One may enjoy music through singing because it is a means of expressing emotion. The school year brings before a child the seasons and nature, he enjoys telling about his experiences with nature and there are many songs which relate them. Every country has given us a picture of its social conditions through song and the study of these folk songs may be correlated with geography. Many of the celebrated authors have written poems which have been set to music.

The pupils dramatize their songs and have the opportunity for free expression through physical response to rhythm. The rhythm orchestra practice gives the children help in creating their own scores and it shows them how to follow the music in a group of players. The instruments used are bells, drums, cymbals, triangles, tambourines and blocks. Dancing gives the children more poise and they learn the waltz, polka, minuet, gavotte, military schottische, barn and square dances. Singing games as the Mulberry Bush and Sally Go Round the Moon are played.

Among the classical recordings listened to are the Jungle Book and Peter and the Wolf. The characters of these tales are represented by orchestral instruments.

The importance of music lies in its social value and group participation encourages good citizenship.

General Report

We are now in the fourth year of the war. In the past we have been led to believe that the worst of it would be over by now. The present picture seems to indicate that it would continue for some time to come. Each day the war continues the problems of the school become greater. Good teachers are harder and harder to find; supplies arrive too late or not at all; replacement of equipment is many times impossible; the pupils as well as others become affected by the worries and nervous tensions which are increased as the war progresses.

Regardless of these difficulties the Hillsboro schools have been definitely improving. This is rather surprising when one realizes that other schools in New Hampshire are deteriorating. The reasons for the bright picture here are manifold for no organization as large as this could succeed without the cooperation of all concerned. Nevertheless much of the success is due to the able leadership of our Headmaster and Principal and their capable corps of teachers. Both of these leaders came to us after many years of successful experience in other places, have a better education and training than most teachers, and have personalities that are capable of drawing the best efforts out of both pupils and teachers.

Last spring the board authorized me to poll both parents and pupils in regard to the type of vacation schelude they would prefer for the present school year. By overwhelming majorities both groups desired the following plan:

School starts Tuesday, September 4, 1944.

Holiday, Thursday, October 12, 1944.

Thanksgiving Holiday, Thursday and Friday, November 23-24, 1944.

Christmas Vacation, from Friday afternoon, December 22, 1944 to Tuesday morning, January 2, 1945.

Vacation, Thursday and Friday, February 22-23, 1945.

Holidays, Friday, March 30 and Monday, April 2, 1945.

Holiday, Wednesday, May 30, 1945.

School closes, Friday, June 1, 1945.

All the rooms have now been painted at the grammar school and a definite program of repairs has been started at the high school where about half the rooms have remained unfinished since the building was built. Two rooms and a hallway were redecorated by the janitor last summer and plans are in prograss for more to be done in the future.

One of the great needs of the coming year will be a program to train and rehabilitate the returning veterans. One field in which they are sure to want training is that of cabinet work and machine shop. With this in mind, and the large enrollments in our present classes, I would like to recommend that, as soon as material and labor is available, the present machine shop be enlarged by extending the room 25 feet to the north. If plans are ever adopted for building a stage on the south end, these two extensions would balance each other. In the long view we must look ahead to the day when an entirely new grammar school must be built.

Please note and read the reports of the Headmaster, Principal, and Music Supervisor which follow.

In conclusion I want to thank the School Board, Teachers, Janitors, Pupils and Citizens for their excellent cooperation in helping us build up a good school system in Hillsboro.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

On the opening day of school September 5, 1944 the enrollment was, Senior High, 128; Junior High, 52, a total of 180. This is somewhat less than last year and is due to the lower enrollment of the entering 7th grade. The Senior High showed an increase of seven, which in these days is quite remarkable. On the whole, the holding power of the school has proven very good.

This year marks the beginning of the second year of the Junior High. It is worthy of note that there has been a marked development in the way the pupils of the Junior High have learned to adjust themselves to their new environment and to contribute, very considerably, to the intellectual, athletic and social life of the school.

Through the Hi-Y, Gra-Y, Girl Reserves, and Junior Tri-Hi-Y the social and character building phases of school life have been met successfully. In addition, sponsored by the Hi-Y Boys and Girl Reserves, an informal dancing class has met several times, so that any who wished might learn to dance. The annual Christmas Party, sponsored by the Girl Reserves, for the elementary children was held, as were the Christmas parties for the Senior and Junior High schools. They were complete with trees, gifts, and Santa Claus.

In common with all schools, Hillsboro High did her part in the Agricultural Emergency program. Fortyseven students put in eleven hundred forty-seven hours picking apples.

The school was 100 per cent in the Red Cross drive, and made a very creditable, showing in the paper collection.

As a member of "Schools at War," the pupils bought over \$525.00 worth of bonds and stamps between September 5, and December 7, 1944.

This year marks the beginning of the third year of organized physical education for boys and girls. The results may be seen in increased physical and mental responses to the demands made upon them in these fields. Improved coordination is also to be noted.

Medical examinations by the school doctor have been given to all pupils; these include an eye test. Also the hearing test has been given to all by the school nurse. When necessary, reports have been made direct to the parents.

The music program includes class work for sophomores, freshmen, and the junior high, an orchestra and a voluntary chorus. It is hoped that a band may be organized later.

This year the State Department of Education will renew senior tests which had been given up for a time. These tests will supplement those given in the high school.

The Guidance program will be continued as before with the objective of helping the individual "to get from where he is, to where he wishes to go."

The School Board, the class of 1944, and the Girl Reserve, through their contributions have made possible curtains for the gymnasium. Now organized Visual Education programs are given covering all fields of educational interest. Also a projector for filmslides has been secured which makes possible increased opportunities for teaching in the fields of Science, English, and History.

Again this year the fundamentals in English, Mathamatics and Science will be stressed. Increased emphasis will be placed on preparation for the tests given by the Army and Navy.

Once more I wish to express my sincere thanks to the faculty and pupils who, by their willing cooperation, have heped so much in the progress which has, been made.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

School opened in September with 120 pupils in the building. Since that time we have made a gain of 4 pupils.

This has been a year of drives. In September, we had a drive to collect milkweed pods for the government. The grammar school children filled 64 bags. In October, we had a scrap drive for scrap paper. We collected 8000 pounds. In November, there was a drive for old clothes. We filled all the bags alloted to us and several boxes, besides.

During Education Week in November, we held open house one evening to which all the parents were invited. Each afternoon during the week, one teacher was hostess to the parents of the children in her room. The next week, Book Week, the sixth grade gave a very enjoyable play in the Community House.

On the closing day in December, Christmas carols were sung in the hall and Christmas parties given in each room. All parents and friènds were invited to attend. The night before school closed, the sixth grade with their teacher went about town singing carols to the sick and shut-ins. The first three grades went out the next morning and sang carols.

We are striving to perfect a system of supervised play on the playground and hope to have it well established by the end of the year.

I am much pleased with the cooperation of the teachers and with that of the parents. I hope the parents will visit school often and keep in touch with what we are doing. Together, we will be much better able to understand and help the child.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

In Hillsboro we have all grades from the primary through the high school, so practically all phases of music instruction is covered. The first grade pupils learn songs by imitation and listening. In order to make the work interesting each one has a work book and colors the picture which portrays the song studied. The second grade pupils make their own note books and draw the pictures which illustrate the classical records they listen to, among these "To A Wild Rose" by MacDowell. They enjoy rhythm band practice and learn action and safety songs.

Grades III to VI learn how to read songs from books by studying various scales and keys. When the scales are mastered they are able to write on a staff the exact notes they hear played at the piano. This musical dictation gives them ear training which along with eye training in reading means musicianship. The study of elementary theory is made more interesting by the use of a game similar to Beano called Note-O. Grade VI receives a magazine, Music Today, which contains news of other musicians young and old, tells of the many musical activities of service men and women in every corner of the globe and the important place music is taking in a world at war.

The seventh and eighth grades study elementary theory which includes scales and keys, transposition, music terminology and sight singing. They listen to classical records and read brief biographies of composers. The class receives a pamphlet called Symphony Notes which gives complete details of the General Motors Symphony of the Air programs, the dates they are scheduled, histories of the composers, stories of their works and a word about the soloist of the day.

The high school pupils are given an opportunity to join a Glee Club of selected members or general chorus. They may also take part in small vocal or instrumental groups.

Once a year the grammar school presents for the public a musical operetta, usually one of educational value, having a good musical score and text.
