## PAMPHLET LAWS OF 1885.

---

### CHAPTER 21.

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the county commissioners of each county to publish attested copies of the proceedings of the county convention with the printed reports of the county officers, for the year in which such proceedings shall have occurred.

STATE HOUSE, CONCORD, N. H., January 14, 1893.

Agreeably to the requirements of the State of New Hampshire, the Merrimack County representatives met in convention in Room 2, after the adjournment of the morning session, for organization.

Convention called to order by James O. Lyford. Upon motion of E. H. Carroll of Warner, a committee of three, consisting of Carroll of Warner, Wentworth of Concord, Courser of Webster, were appointed to nominate chairman and clerk.

The committee reported,—James O. Lyford of Concord, for chairman, E. H. Carroll of Warner, as clerk for the ensuing two years, and adjourned, subject to the call of the chairman.

CONCORD, N. H., January 18, 1893.

Merrimack County representatives met in Room 2, after the afternoon session, upon call of the chairman.

Upon motion of Frank F. Morrill of Hopkinton, James O. Lyford of Concord, E. H. Carroll of Warner, Frank F. Morrill of Hopkinton, Winthrop Fowler of Pembroke, and Francis M. Abbott of Concord, were elected a committee to confer with the commissioners, and make recommendations for appropriations for the ensuing two years.

On motion of Carroll of Warner, the chair appointed Thomas

J. Courser of Webster, and George F. Underhill of Concord, as auditors to audit accounts of commissioners and treasurer.

Adjourned, subject to call of chairman.

At a meeting of the Merrimack County delegation in the Judiciary Committee Room, March 31, 1893, meeting called to order by Mr. Mitchell. Mr. Flint was chosen secretary *pro tempore*. Mr. Lyford read a list of appropriation estimates.

INDIGENT SOLDIERS' ACCOUNT.

As the law of 1885 has been repealed by the legislature, we would call the attention of selectmen and overseers to the law passed relating to this account :

AN ACT in relation to aid furnished indigent soldiers, and providing for entrance to the soldiers' home, in certain cases.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened :*

SECTION 1. Chapter 41 of the session laws of 1885, entitled "An act for the relief of poor persons who have served in the army or navy of the United States, and their dependent families, and chapter 45 of the session laws of 1887, in amendment of said act, are hereby repealed.

SEC. 2. Whenever any person resident in this state, who enlisted in the quota of this state, and was reckoned and served as a soldier or sailor from New Hampshire in the army or navy of the United States in the war of the rebellion and who received an honorable discharge, not being under guardianship or legal restraint, shall become poor and unable to provide maintenance for himself and dependent family, such person, his wife, widow, or minor children, or such of said children as are unable to maintain themselves, shall be supported at the public expense in the town or city of their abode, at their own home or such place other than a town or county almshouse, as the overseers of the poor or the county commissioners shall deem right and proper,—*provided*, that no person shall receive aid under the provisions of this act unless he has resided in this state three years or more before making application for such aid; and *provided*, that any person applying for such aid, shall, when requested, furnish to the county commissioners or the

overseers of the poor the certificate of a reputable physician, resident in the county in which he lives, that he is incapacitated to perform manual labor; and *provided*, that no person shall, while receiving aid under the provisions of this act, use intoxicating liquors to an extent which will render him incapable of working at his usual occupation; and *provided*, that any person receiving aid under the provisions of this act, who receives a pension from the United States government, shall, while receiving such aid, apply such pension to the support of himself and dependent family, and shall, when requested, furnish to the overseers of the poor or the county commissioners satisfactory proof that such pension has been so applied; and *provided*, that no person receiving aid under the provisions of this act shall sell any article furnished him, nor exchange them for intoxicating liquors, nor share any such aid with any persons other than those above named as being entitled to the benefit of this act. Neglect by any person applying for or receiving aid under the provisions of this act to comply with the foregoing provisions and conditions, shall relieve the town or county liable for such person's support from the provisions of this act so far as such person is concerned, and such person may be supported at the town or county almshouse.

SEC. 3. The county commissioners or the overseers of the poor of any town may require any person applying for aid under the provisions of this act, who is eligible for admission, to make application for admission to the New Hampshire Soldiers' Home, in case he has no family or settled place of abode, whenever, in their discretion, they deem it best; and if such person refuses to make such application, or, if admitted, refuses to go to said Soldiers' home, the county or the town shall be relieved from the provisions of this act so far as such person is concerned, and he may be supported at the county or town almshouse.

SEC. 4. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed, and this act shall take effect upon its passage.

Approved April 7, 1891.



The general health of the inmates at the farm has been very good, which shows great care on the part of Mr. and Mrs. Tasker and their assistants.

We have always found that the best of attention has been given the sick, and everything done for their comfort that was needed.

The expense of running the farm has been decreased the last year at the rate of twenty-one cents per week for each individual. The county indebtedness has been decreased ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) after making all necessary improvements.

The male prisoners have been placed in the woods to chop wood for the comfort of the house.

The assistants at the farm have all proven themselves very faithful. The young have been given special instructions by Mrs. Tasker in regard to the advancement of their morals, and every Sunday she devotes considerable time to her Sunday-school class, which is composed of the children at the farm.

The demands upon Mr. Tasker's kindness are never failing and he is always on the lookout to increase the comfort of those in his charge. Hardly a moment in the day passes but what some one comes to him with a request, and he always gives them a pleasant answer, never allowing a cross word to pass his lips. The inmates and assistants all speak of him in the highest terms. These characteristics are very essential in one having the keeping of the class of people placed in his charge.

We herewith extend our thanks to all employed at the farm for the kindness shown us and for the pains they have taken in the many duties incumbent upon them.

## PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

---

*To the Honorable Commissioners of Merrimack County:*

GENTLEMEN: As visiting physician to the jail, I herewith submit my report for the past year:

Although the average number of prisoners has been much larger than in the preceding year, yet the total amount of sickness has not been noticeably increased. Rheumatism, colds, and the results of indigestion, are the most common complaints, and all of these would naturally occur to persons confined to close quarters.

This excellent showing is due in no small measure to the improved sanitary arrangements which make our jail a model institution. No death has occurred among the inmates for a number of years. Every year we have one or more cases of serious illness, generally contracted before admission, and, with our present facilities, find it difficult to handle them. The jailor and wife, under the kind direction of the sheriff, are most attentive to the wants of their charges; especially in time of sickness is their kindness shown.

## CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

---

*To the Board of County Commissioners:*

GENTLEMEN: I have but little to report in regard to my work as chaplain of the county farm. I have held a service every alternate Sunday during the year, except through the month of August, and have attended the funerals and visited those of the sick and infirm to whom I could render any service.

There are those among the inmates to whom a friendly visit means very much. I have been profoundly impressed by the value and helpfulness of a religious trust, hope and faith in the lives of the unfortunate. There are persons in the home, constant sufferers, who have seen better days; who, because of their religious trust and faith, accept all things for the best and are hopeful in their misfortunes. But this cheerful reconciliation to the hard fortunes of life, this hopeful disposition, this trust in Him who doeth all things well, cannot be created in old age, nor can they be imparted to those who most need them. To be effective they must be the lifelong habits of heart and mind. The consolations of religion must be the consolations of one's own religion.

In our Sunday services I have remembered that a portion of the audience were prisoners, young and middle-aged men, some of them intelligent and capable of something better. I have not lectured or upbraided them for being here, but have endeavored to awaken in them a desire and a determination to be the men they might be. I fear my efforts have availed but little, if anything, in behalf of their amendment.

If among those sent to the farm for drunkenness there are any who feel themselves to be in the grasp of an appetite they cannot control, any really desiring to be set free from their appetite and live a life of sobriety and virtue, I believe it

would be well for the county, and it would be its duty, to send them to the Keely Cure—that is, wherever there is a probability that the treatment would effect a cure. Of course it is only they who earnestly desire to be cured of the appetite and habit on whom the experiment should be tried. The probability is that most habitual drunkards are such from choice. Yet this much is certain, that men who were powerless in the grasp of an appetite, men enslaved to a habit but earnestly desirous to be free from it, have been cured. If this can be done for any one sent to the county farm, both the dictates of economy and the sentiment of humanity demand that it shall be done.

I am glad to bear my testimony to the admirable management of the institution so far as it comes under my observation. The county may well take pride in its home for the defective and unfortunate. They are judiciously and tenderly cared for. It should be understood that the care of one hundred and seventy-five men, women, and children, including the infirm, the insane, the mentally deficient, the vicious, the intelligent and worthy poor and friendless, the proper care of all these, is no easy task. In Mr. and Mrs. Tasker every inmate has a personal friend.

In closing, I can only wish that my ministry to the inmates of the home accomplished more in their behalf than it does.

## PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

---

*To the Commissioners of Merrimack County:*

GENTLEMEN: During the past year there has been no unusual amount of sickness at the almshouse. No epidemic of contagious or other disease has occurred, and the general health of the inmates of the institution has been good during the year. There has been but one birth during the year, and that still-born, while seventeen deaths have occurred, four more than in the preceding year. However, quite a large proportion have been of people of advanced age.

Although at the present time "la grippe" prevails quite extensively in this locality, there have been but three cases among the inmates of the almshouse, and all of those of a mild type. This condition of things among people predisposed to suffer severely from such diseases augurs well for the sanitary condition of the premises. If this were not the case and if filth was allowed to accumulate in or about the buildings, or there was any very serious defect in the system of drainage, the class of people whom we find congregated here would surely suffer far beyond the extent of an equal number of the neighboring population. But we find the reverse to be the fact, and much praise is due to the officers in charge of the institution for maintaining this condition of things.

Since my last report a much-needed improvement has been made in the medicine-closet in the office, rendering it not only much more attractive in appearance but infinitely more convenient to those whose duty it is to dispense the drugs. The facilities for caring for the sick are much above the average of similar institutions in other counties of our state. There is needed, however, a place for the isolation of those sick with contagious diseases. If a small building apart from the other structures could be erected and devoted exclusively to this pur-

pose it would add very materially to the equipment of the institution, while the expense of its construction would be very moderate.
