Warrant for the 1946 Town Meeting

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Milton in the County of Strafford, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Town on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, with polls not closing before six of the clock in the afternoon, to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To bring in your ballots for Town Officers.
- 2. To determine the salaries of officers serving the Town and accept the recommendation of the Budget Committee that the Selectmen determine the compensation for highway work.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for the repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed seven thousand dollars (\$7,000.00) to pay for breaking roads and purchasing snow fence and pass any vote relative thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for the continuance of the black road on Nute's Ridge.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for the maintenance of the Town Beach and to pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
 - 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and ap-

propriate a sum not to exceed seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500.00) to pay Town charges and expenses and pass any vote or votes relative thereto.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to close the old state road from the present state road to the Town House Pond.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to exchange their piece of property between the new and old state roads for the piece next to the Town Beach owned by H. R. Johnson.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the trustees of Trust Funds to re-invest trust funds in U. S. Government bonds yielding a larger interest.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for sidewalk maintenance.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept state aid for construction of the Class II road known as Union to Farmington road and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of two thousand two hundred five dollars (\$2,205.00).
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) to oil hard surface streets for the ensuing year.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00) to be expended on private roads leading from the "New Bridge" road so-called to cottages.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the maintenance of the hydrants in Milton Fire Precinct.
 - 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and ap-

propriate the sum of one hundred forty-five dollars (\$145.00) which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

- 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay for or towards correction of sewage disposal as recommended by the State Board of Health.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed seven hundred dollars (\$750.00) for the Fire Department and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to pay the first and second Engineers and Firemen in the addition to the amount allowed by law; to see how much per hour the Town will vote to pay engineers and firemen while fighting fires and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the purpose of maintenance of the fire engine in Milton Mills Fire District.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed three hundred fifty dollars (\$350.00) to defray one-half the estimated cost of installation of a siren in Milton Mills Fire District.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed twenty-four hundred dollars (\$2,400.00) for the maintenance of street lights for the ensuing year.
 - 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and ap-

propriate a sum of money not to exceed one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00) for Memorial Day.

- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the Free Public Library at Milton Mills in addition to the amount allowed by law.
- 25. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire on notes of the Town a sum of money necessary to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes of 1946 and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the remaining Town Farm land on the westerly side of the road.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a gift the estate of Dr. and Alta Durgin under the terms of their will.
- 29. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a portable fire pump for the camps at Milton Three Ponds.
- 30. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

Milton, 1944-45

To the School Board and Citizens of Milton:

This is the twelfth annual report to be made by me and the thirty-sixth in the series. As usual, the statistics cover the school year 1944-45 while my remarks may appertain to the present year.

There has been little change in the conduct of your schools. Miss Leonard resigned to be married, and Mrs. Doris Lowd succeeded her at Milton Mills Primary School.

The total enrollment in 1943-44 was 241 and in 1944-45 it was 244. As of September, 1945, the enrollment twas 219. However, new families have moved in, and the enrollment for the year will probably equal that of last year.

Usually we print a long list of pupils perfect in attendance, but owing to the severity of the winter of last year, the list is short. Please note that the Nute Ridge School had a perfect tardiness record. The total number of tardy marks for our District fell from 373 to 341, and when we note that this number includes those made by the transported pupils, who must be marked for the record, it shows that our buses are usually on time in spite of bad traveling.

No time has been lost unnecessarily, and the schools were in session 346 half days. No meetings of teachers have been held by the State or County Associations. The teachers of the Supervisory Union have held two meetings at Somersworth. Your teachers were granted a visiting day, and from their reports, I know that the visits were worthwhile. It has been "quite the thing" this year for teachers of many communities to take a visiting day.

Your superintendent has attended the meeting of the October Conference of Educational Leaders of New England and the meeting of the New England Superintendents held in Boston in November. The so-called Defense Program has ended, and your superintendent hopes to have more time to devote to the most important work of supervising instruction.

Federal aid is still available for lunches, and we are fortunately able to secure milk. Any pupil may purchase this for two cents per half pint bottle, and the distributor is paid four cents, the other two cents being paid from Federal funds. The hot lunches are sold to those pupils who live so far away from the school that they do not have time to go home to lunch. A reimbursement of four cents is allowed on these lunches, if certain "abundant" foods approved by the Food and Production Administration are used. Several donations of vegetables and canned foods have been received, and we want the donors to know that these were appreciated.

Mrs. Tuttle, Principal of the Milton Grammar School, submits the following:

"In 1944-1945 the U. S. Treasury Department awarded Milton Grammar School a citation for Service to the War Savings Program through the successful completion of a 'Schools at War' Campaign to pay for a machine gun, a flying suit, and a flag for a battleship through the purchase of War Bonds and Stamps.

"Now our school hopes to buy enough Stamps and Bonds to have the name of our school on a hospital bed. Since January 1, 1945, we have purchased \$271.10 worth of War Savings Stamps.

"Our school is a member of the Junior Red Cross. We contributed \$7.81 this year."

During American Education Week the teachers volunteered to hold open house one evening and many

parents took advantage of the opportunity to see the schools at work.

Study the report of the Headmaster of Nute High School. If it had not been for the volunteering of Mrs. Burbank to fill the gap, it would have been necessary to discontinue the Department of Home Economics. As it is, the department has never been better managed, and the school is meeting the needs of the community. Your schools have been fortunate to secure good teachers. The teacher situation remains serious, and will remain so for a few years. If I lost a teacher now, I would not know where to find a replacement.

The last session of the General Court provided a Teacher's Retirement System, which gives the teachers some security in old age or when incapacitated. Each teacher who joins the System pays into it a certain per cent of the salary, not to exceed one hundred dollars per year. The School District where she is employed also must contribute a sum, fixed at present at four per cent of the salary. The System should be welcomed by all School Districts, since very few of them can afford a retirement system of their own. Teachers are not covered by the Social Security Act passed by the Congress. The Annual School Budget should include enough to cover the requirement.

We are "cramped" for quarters at Milton Village. The rooms may not be overcrowded, but our lunch facilities are inadequate, and there is no place for assemblies, and no place to use a projector, which we should like to purchase. Milton should double the size of the present school building, providing rooms so that only one grade would be in each room, and furnishing an assembly room large enough to accommodate the entire school. Consolidation is coming, and those School Districts that have their plans well laid are going to be the first to get Federal aid for building, if any is made available.

Your School Board members have given generously of their time to see that the schools are properly provided for, and I wish them to know that their friendly cooperation is appreciated.

Report of the Headmaster of Nute High School

To the Superintendent of Schools and the Board of Trustees of Nute High School:

I hereby submit the annual report of Nute High School which opened its fifty-fifth year on September 5th with an enrollment of seventy-six pupils divided as follows: Seniors, 11; Juniors, 18; Sophomores, 15; Freshmen, 32. Twenty members of the school's population are commuters; eleven are from Sanbornville, one from Union, three from Acton, Maine, and five from Lebanon, Maine.

The teaching staff is the same as in 1944-1945 with the exception of the teacher of Home Economics. A candidate could not be found in this field, and instead of closing the department, it was decided to procure a substitute teacher until a regular teacher could be found. Much inquiry has brought no success and the future of the work in Home Economics depends upon finding a competent candidate this spring.

The scarcity of labor and materials has made it very difficult to get needed work done on the building and its equipment. The girls' cloak and wash rooms were redecorated during the summer. Since the opening of school in September a new and larger hot water supply tank has been installed and minor repairs have been made to the heating plant. An auxiliary steam heating unit equipped with a fan has been placed in the shop and adds much to the comfort of the shop classes in the severe winter weather. The building is again being heated with coal this year. The janitor, Mr. Duquette, has been very successful in keeping the building comfortable even in zero weather. The appearance of the grounds in the warmer months is the result

of the efforts of our janitor who is to be commended for his faithful work.

The shortages of materials and supplies due to wartime restrictions and demands have again been felt this year. Some supplies have been added to the school shop, but not all the desired items have been received. Some types of lumber are unobtainable, even in the early part of 1946. An additional electric motor has been purchased for the shaper. An electric welder has been presented to the shop by the State Department of Education and it is expected that the additional wiring will be finished so this equipment may be in service in the spring.

The shop boys have helped several in the community with work such as repairing piazzas and shingling, when help has been unobtainable. Some roofing material has been replaced on part of the garage at the headmaster's house. Storm windows have been repaired and placed on the northerly and westerly windows of the first floor and are of great assistance in keeping the building warm. Some additional storm windows would no doubt aid in saving fuel.

More supplies and equipment, including a barometer, have been added to the laboratory. New textbooks have been provided for the freshman and sophomore English classes. Other classes supplied with new books are those in Consumer Economics, Human Behavior, Mathematics, Physics and Latin. First year Latin was offered this year for the first time in several years, and eighteen in all from the four classes elected this course. A thirty-volume set of the 1945 edition of the Encyclopedia Americanna was added to the reference books for general school use and several dictionaries were placed in the class rooms about the building. All of these books were very much needed. The use which the encyclopedia gets proves its popularity and value as a source of information.

Noon lunches are again being supplied this year with food prepared by the Home Economics Foods class under the supervision of the instructor in charge, thus giving opportunity for practical experience in cooking. Milk is available at two cents per half pint bottle due to a Federal subsidy.

In order that Our Country's Flag might be displayed as required by law, a small flag pole has been added to the front of the building. This is not necessarily a substitute or complete replacement of the large flag pole which was blown down in the 1944 hurricane, but merely to take its place until suitable materials may be procured for its proper and safe erection. When the old flag pole takes its former place on the lawn in front of the building it might well be dedicated to the alumni of Nute High School who served in World War II.

The Southeastern League competition continued last spring with softball for girls and baseball for boys. In the fall, with the removal of restrictions on gasoline after V-J day, Nute High School supported, perhaps for the first time, a cross country team, which was coached by Mr. Perkins. Two members only of the team entered the state meet held at Durham in November, and one of the entrants, Robert Lilljedahl, took third place and was awarded a medal. The winter season brought the resumption of league games in basketball for both girls and boys. These athletic contests tend to promote good will and good sportsmanship between the schools of the league.

The Junior Red Cross came to Nute High in 1944-1945 and has continued this year. The shop boys were called upon by this organization to assemble and paint several special kit boxes. These boxes were designed to hold a collection of games and equipment suitable for the entertainment of smaller groups of our armed forces who were stationed in isolated spots on the earth's surface.

I wish to thank the Superintendent, Board of Trustees, teaching staff and pupils for their continued cooperation and support.

Report of the Milton Public Beach

At the outset I'd like to show my appreciation for the fine cooperation given me by the Board of Selectmen and the people of the Town of Milton. It has been a pleasure to work with your children and the children of the cottagers around the lake. I'd like to particularly thank Mr. and Mrs. Charles Whitehouse for their cooperation, suggestions, and the free use of their time, property, equipment and materials. Without their help the work would have been much harder and the season less successful.

Much time was spent in repairing and painting equipment and keeping it in working order. Two rafts were thoroughly repaired and painted, one of which will be obsolete another year. Four heavy cement anchors were made; blocks for the crib were cut out and painted; two fences were put up to control the parking of cars, and three fireplaces were built in the pine grove.

Swimming classes were conducted from 10:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon. Classes consisted of instruction in life saving beginners, intermediate swimmers and advanced swimmers. The number successfully passed in each group were as follows: twenty-six beginners. twenty-two intermediates, twenty-one swimmers, five junior life savers, and three advanced swimmers. these children taking instruction and passing the Standard Red Cross tests, a very small percentage were from out of town. In other words, the children of Milton and the children of campers around the lake were the ones that received the full benefit of the class instruction. An adult class was formed the last few weeks of the season and quite a few people took advantage of this opportunity to learn to swim and brush up on their strokes.

Twice a week Dick Ayers drove a bus load of chil-

dren from Milton Mills. Although these children came in the afternoon, instruction was given to those that desired it. It is hoped that next year this group will be able to come more often, and groups in other parts of the town may find regular transportation to the beach.

The grounds and bath houses were thoroughly cleaned every day and the beach raked. Wood was supplied to each of the three fireplaces daily. Particular care was spent in picking up the glass on the grounds and in the water. No serious cuts or injuries were encountered although the usual amount of first aid was given.

The usual rules of a safe bathing beach were enforced. Cars were parked at a safe distance from the bathing beach. Children and adults alike were helpful in keeping the grounds in a neat condition and helped to make the swimming safe and enjoyable.

I hesitate to make many recommendations because many that I might make probably would have been done if it had not been for the war. The first thing of importance is a new raft with a small tower and a good board (diving). Second would be the construction of a combination boys' and girls' bath house with room, possibly, for a concession. Third, the filling in of the swampland in the rear of the grove and to the left of the grove. Fourth, a new surface on the road leading into the area. Fifth, the tables made by the high school have proven very satisfactory and it would be nice to have four more made if possible.

The Milton Public Beach is a good place now and with a little expenditure and work each year can be made into as good a recreation center as any in this part of the country.
