### SUMMARY OF ACTION TAKEN ON ARTICLES IN

### 1980 TOWN WARRANT

Moderator Robert A. Johnson opened the meeting at 9:00 A.M. Mr. Johnson suggested that with unanimous consent he would omit reading Articles 1 through 49 at the beginning of the meeting. It was unanimously approved, so the Moderator read only the other parts of the warrant.

Jean Lane moved that we adjourn the meeting at 5:00 P.M. to meet again at 9:00 A.M. on March 29, if we have substantial business left to conduct at 5:00 P.M. Seconded by several. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 1 Deferred until after Article 2.

ARTICLE 2 To see if the Town will vote to fix the annual remuneration of the individual members of the Board of Selectmen, from all sources, to be not more than the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00). (By Petition)

dollars (\$1,000.00). (By Petition)

Douglas Briggs moved that the Town fix the annual remuneration of the individual members of the Board of Selectmen, from all sources, to be not more than \$1,000.00, plus normal expenses and plus funds required for updating the Northwood town tax maps. Jean Lane seconds. Mr. Briggs explained the purpose of the motion was not primarily to save money but to open up the Office of Selectmen to be available to any person in Town who wants to serve and who can be elected, whether or not he is fully employed elsewhere. He suggests using an executive secretary more and appointing committees to help the Selectmen. Mr. Richard Peterson thinks we don't need Washington, D. C. politics. Mr. Briggs says they have looked at other towns and found a simple system of selectmen and executive secretary works.

Keith Lidback spoke as past Selectman. He found it hard to put in the hours needed with his full-time job. He reminded us that by law the Selectmen assess and reassess the property. He feels this job is done much better by Selectmen than by the State. By State law the ultimate authority is the Selectmen. He feels Mr. Low should be commended as our Town is always correct at the Dept. of Revenue Administration. If we put more work on the executive secretary, it will only mean hiring additional secretaries to help her.

Mrs. Herron asks for the course of appeal if one disagrees with Selectmen. Mr. Low says a petition for a special Town Meeting or appeal to Superior Court.

Mr. Vincent Krzesicki asks if we have to get experts from Concord? Answer: State is ultimate authority and also has a list of licensed assessors.

Randy DeTrude asks whether time spent by Selectmen in assessing committee work is equal to amount of leg work done by the committee? Mr. Low replies that he is not belittling work of committees but they are volunteers and often find it hard to find time to meet. Then followed a discussion of committee work and what ones were now operative and whether they met at a regular time with the Selectmen.

Alan Thomson says Mr. D'Amour of Concord says there is no law that says we have to reassess and reminds us that there is a vast difference between reassessing and updating the property figures. Mrs. Helen Sherman says that the Dept. of Revenue Administration can hold back funds if we evalued at only 75% of true value. Mr. Ahlgren asked how much this would be? Mrs. Sherman had no exact figure. Mr. Behm thinks we should be grateful that we have Selectmen that can work so much. If we limit them too low, we will be back in three years asking for a town manager. Mr. Behm asks Selectmen how they feel about this article. Mr. Robert Low responds that he has put in 175 to 200 days a year since 1965. He will abide by whatever is voted and then have to donate the rest of his time. Mr. Chesley agrees with him and points out the inequality of about 50% of property in Town now. Mr. Crandall says this is his first day of on-the-job training so cannot comment.

Mrs. Polly Pinkham says she knows of the amount of work they are now doing and told of a study committee of a few years ago that visited surrounding towns and found how well our town was doing.

Mr. Donald Post says we can change by voting if we are dissatisfied with the Selectmen, but if we limit our Selectmen like this, we will have to hire an administrative assistant. Since they have already received \$1,000.00 so far this year they wouldn't be able to earn any more if this is passed, so he amends the motion to not take effect until 1981. This was seconded by many and the amendment passed by a show of hands 72 yes, 16 no.

Then the main motion was voted upon by a yes and no ballot.

95 no, 77 yes so motion was defeated.

ARTICLE 1 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Mr. Herbert Sherman moves the sum of \$138,738.88 be raised to defray Town charges for the ensuing year. Suzanne Smart seconds. Mr. Lidback amends the article to read \$139,238.88, an increase of \$500.00 for assistance to the elderly as suggested in Article 42. Mr. Vincent Krzesicki seconds the amendment. Mr. Fiander explains the use of funds would be for trips taken by the elderly. Vote on amendment which passed, 77 yes, 26 no.

Mrs. Herron wonders whether it is legal to use the money for those who could afford the trips. Mr. Low replies that the money will be used for those who can't afford the trip. Vote of main

motion, adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 3 To see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen of Northwood in contracting for or purchasing materials or services for any Town project or program, any detail of which exceeds the sum of \$500., to advertise for and secure two or more bids for all such projects or programs or any parts thereof, or to take any other action thereto. (By Petition)

Mrs. Marion Knox moved that we indefinitely postpone any action on this article. Keith Lidback seconds. Motion passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 4 To see if the Town will vote to change the compensation of the Tax Collector from the present \$3,000. to 1/2 of 1% of the taxes collected.

Mr. Vincent Bane moved that this article be indefinitely post-poned. Mr. N. James Morse seconds. Mrs. Knox spoke of the need to pay more with all of the extra work done because of our double billing now. Motion passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 5 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$76,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing a new fire truck.

Mrs. Theresa Herron moved to raise and appropriate \$76,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing a new fire truck. Donald Bassett seconds. Mr. Bane noted that the request passed the Budget Committee by only one vote. Mr. Frary wishes that after each article in the warrant in the Town Report, the Budget Committee votes could be printed. Chief Bassett spoke of the need for a new truck. Mr. Allan Clark says no federal funds are available to help on this purchase. Mr. Fred Holmes wonders about buying second hand truck to replace the old tanker. Some were critical of numbers of houses lost to fire and others thanked the Department for saving their homes. Mr. Bassett said they answered 159 calls last year and lost five or six totals. Mr. Barnes wonders whether we can afford it. Mrs. Cammett says we have to have fire protection. Vote on motion adopted by ballot - 130 yes, 47 no.

ARTICLE 6 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for interest on same.

Charles Johnson moved to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for interest on same. Vincent Bane seconded. Article adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 7 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,540.40 for the Northwood Public Libraries.

It was moved to discuss Article 32 before Article 7.

ARTICLE 32 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$6,410.81 for the purpose of installing a new artesian well and new septic system at Chesley Memorial Library and authorize the withdrawal of \$6,410.81 for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Keith Lidback moved that the Town appropriate \$6,410.81 for the purpose of installing a new artesian well and septic system at Chesley Library and authorize the withdrawal of \$6,410.81 for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. Vincent Bane seconds. Mr. Post changes the phrase artesian well to water supply. Agreed upon. Elmer Tasker volunteered to give, at no expense to the Town, a well and casing. Says he'll enjoy working where there will be no complaints from those around him. (Cemetery next to Library!) Article 32 adopted by voice vote.

Article 7 now taken up. Keith Lidback moved the sum of \$8,540.40 for the Northwood Public Libraries. Mrs. Herron seconds. Mrs. Lane asks what money in Article 32 will be used for? Mrs. Herron explained topography of land making it difficult for well and sewerage. Any money left will be returned to Town or Revenue Sharing. Adopted by unanimous vote.

ARTICLE 8 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,500.00 for Parks and Playgrounds.

Elmer Tasker moved the sum of \$11,500.00 for Parks and Playgrounds. Herbert Sherman seconds. Mr. Peterson asks whether any of this money will be spent at Harvey Lake beach? Mrs. Post asks how it will be spent? Answer: \$8,075.00 for attendants at four

beaches, \$200.00 for swimming lessons, \$725.00 for rubbish collection, \$1,000.00 for sand, \$150.00 for electricity, \$100.00 for plumbing, \$400.00 for new tables, and \$250.00 for rafts (none at Harvey Lake). Article adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 9 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$950.00 for the care of Cemeteries.

Vincent Bane moved the sum of \$950.00 for the care of cemeteries. Charles Johnson seconds. Mr. Post says most of this money will be used at Pine Grove. Adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 10 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise

and appropriate for Town Highways.

Vincent Bane moved the sum of \$59,600.00 to be raised for Town Highways. Mr. Lidback seconds. (\$27,240.00 for summer use, \$28,800.00 for winter and \$3,560.00 for general expenses.) Mr. Low explained why we can't reduce this figure and still get State Aid. Mr. Briggs asked if unexpended funds could be used for new construction. Mr. Low replied that they will not use any leftover funds from this item on new construction. Adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 11 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,300.00 for the purpose of Street Lighting.

Vincent Bane moved the sum of \$4,300.00 for purpose of street lighting. Mr. Lidback seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 12 To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,126.67 for the purpose of Town Road Aid, the State's share to be \$4,458.67 and the Town's share to be \$668.00.

Charles Johnson moved the sum of \$5,126.67 for the purpose of Town Road Aid, the State's share to be \$4,458.67 and the Town's share to be \$668.00. Mr. Vincent Krzesicki seconds. Mr. St. Cyr asks the intent. Mr. Low says it is to be used on Class V roads. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 13 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,132.00 for the Northwood Ambulance Service.

Robert Herron moved the sum of \$4,132.00 for the Northwood Rescue Squad. Veronica Post seconds. Mr. Barnes asked about Article 33. Mr. MacCord says this is for operation costs. Article 33 will be equipment. More is needed this year because this year we are operating an ambulance service and also spending more on training classes. Mr. Peterson thanks them for saving his life. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 14 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,925.00 for the Town's per capita share of the Rural District Health Council, Inc.

Mrs. Veronica Post moved the sum of \$6,925.00 for the Town's share of per capita funds for the Rural District Health Council, Inc. Frances Newman seconds. Discussion of increased costs and list of towns in this council. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 15 To see if the Town will vote to transfer \$1,500.00 from the revenue of the Municipal Court to the Highway Safety Equipment Capital Reserve Fund.

Vincent Bane moved to transfer \$1,500.00 from the revenue of the Municipal Court to the Highway Safety Equipment Capital Reserve

Fund. Mr. Herron seconds. Adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 16 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38,183.02 for new construction on Town roads. The \$38,183.02 is comprised of \$17,975.14 of Town money, \$11,024.86 Highway Subsidy and \$9,183.02 Special Highway Subsidy Funds.

Ridge Road - tarring Hill's Corner Project \$8,000.00 Harmony Road - from Route 4 5,000.00 Harmony Road - from Blake's Hill 2,000.00 4,000.00 Gulf Road - new construction and tar Harvey Lake - entrance Mountain Road - resurfacing 400.00 4,039.00 Lower Deerfield Road 346.02 Ridge Road - tarring 2,244.00 Gulf Road - tarring 3,815.00 7,854.00 Blake's Hill Road - tarring Jeffrey Drive - tarring 485.00

Jean Lane moved to indefinitely postpone this article. James Bennett seconds this but later withdraws his second. Mr. Smart asks whether this article was the result of the Road Study Committee of last year? Mr. Low says it was result of Road Committee and Selectmen and Budget Committee. Mr. Lidback remarks that no item creates more emotion than our roads but we do need to take care of them. Motion not carried. Herbert Sherman then moved the article as in the warrant - \$38,183.02 for new construction on Town Roads. (\$17,795.14 of Town money, \$11,024.86 Highway Subsidy and \$9,183.02 Special Highway Subsidy Funds.) Donald Bassett seconds. John Newman amends the allocations to read \$3,346.02 for Lower Deerfield Road, \$2,000.00 for Harmony Road from Rt. 4, then rest the same -Ridge \$8,000.00, Harmony from Blake's Hill \$2,000.00, Gulf Road \$4,000.00, Harvey Lake entrance \$400.00, Mountain Road resurfacing \$4,039.00, Ridge Road tarring \$2,244.00, Gulf Road tarring \$3,815.00, Blake's Hill tarring \$7,854.00 and Jeffrey Drive tarring \$485.00. Amendment passed by voice vote. Back to main motion. Mr. Robert Bailey reports for the Town Road Committee. Mr. Bailey says he's sure cost of asphalt will be higher this coming year. Mr. Briggs asks if they could please have a public hearing before any new construction. Mr. Low says they'll try to have such a policy this year. Mr. Post says he believes you cannot hold the Selectmen to never moving any funds from one line item to another. Much discussion of the Road Committee and work of the Highway Agent under the Selectmen, and need of public hearings. Motion adopted unanimously.

ARTICLE 17 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,676.00 for the maintenance of the Town Dump.

Vincent Kresicki moved the sum of \$17,676.00 for the maintenance of the Town Dump. Ross Allen seconds. James Barnes asks for explanation. \$8,500.00 of this will be used for transporting from here to Durham and more attendants needed after June to sort dump and operate compactor. Mr. Ahlgren wishes we could sell some from the dump. Adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 18 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,463.00 as its 1980 share of the capital cost with interest for the construction of an incinerator and energy recovery facilities as set forth under the Agreement for Formation of the Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative, and to allow the Selectmen to accept Federal or State, and other grants that may be available to the Town in providing its share in the project.

Keith Lidback moved the sum of \$16,463.00 as its 1980 share of the capital cost with interest for the construction of the incinerator and energy recovery facilities as set forth under the Agreement for Formation of the Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative and to allow the Selectmen to accept Federal or State and other grants that may be available to the Town in providing its share in the project. Jean Johnson seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 19 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to pay the salary and expense of the Supervisor of the Summer Program for Economically Disadvantaged Youths (SPEDY).

Robert Bailey moved the sum of \$1,000.00 to pay the salary and expense of the Supervisor of the Summer Program for Economically Disadvantaged Youths (SPEDY). Veronica Post seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 20 To see if the Town will vote to receive and spend up to \$3,500.00 from Southern New Hampshire Services Employment and Training Program for the SPEDY Program.

Deborah Clark moved to receive and spend \$3,500.00 from the Southern N. H. Services Dept. Employment and Training Program for the SPEDY Program. James Bennett seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 21 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,775.00 for the Planning Board and Board of Adjustment expenses.

Robert Bailey moved the sum of \$6,775.00 for the Planning Board and Board of Adjustment. Randy DeTrude seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 22 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$345.00 for the Conservation Commission expenses.

Herbert Sherman moved the sum of \$345.00 for the Conservation Commission expenses. Robert Bailey seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 23 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 in support of the Newmarket Health Center.

Mrs. T. Herron moved the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the Newmarket Health Center. Mr. Herron seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 24 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$84.00 in support of the Rockingham Child and Family Services.

Mrs. T. Herron moved the sum of \$84.00 for the support of the Rockingham Child and Family Services. Mr. Herbert Sherman seconded. Mr. Post explained that this group offers different services from Newmarket Health Center. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 25 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 in support of the Child and Family Services of New Hampshire.

Robert Bailey moved the sum of \$300.00 for support of Child and Family Services of N. H. Keith Lidback seconded. Motion adopted by show of hands: 58 yes, 17 no.

ARTICLE 26 To see if the Town will vote to receive and spend up to \$14,836.00 from Southern New Hampshire Services Employment and Training Program for the CETA Program, Title VI.

James Small moved the sum of \$14,836.00 be received and spent (up to this amount) from Southern N. H. Services Employment and Training Program for the CETA Program, Title VI. Ronald St. Cyr seconded. Money would be used for Town Planner if we could find one. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 27 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,774.00 for the purpose of purchasing a new police cruiser.

Vincent Krzesicki moved the sum of \$1,774.00 for the purpose of purchasing a police cruiser. Helen Fogg seconded. Mr. Smart asks whether this is a new one or a replacement. Answer: Replacement. Someone explained that this year's Capital Reserve Safety money would not be here in time to use for this article. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 28 To see if the Town will vote to remove from the Highway Safety Equipment Capital Reserve Fund the sum of \$4,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing a new police cruiser.

Vincent Bane moved to remove from the Highway Safety Equipment Capital Reserve Fund the sum of \$4,000.00 for the purchase of a new police cruiser. Clarence Ahlgren seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 29 To see if the Town will vote to reclassify from Class VI to Class V, that portion of Old Deerfield Road approximately 500' between the present end of its Class V and the driveway to the permanent residence of Leo W. and Doris M. Dagenais. (By Petition)

Jules Blier moved to indefinitely postpone this article. Mr. Smart or Mr. St. Cyr seconded. Motion failed by show of hands: 17 yes, 35 no. Mr. Dagenais wants it reclassified as he built there on word of former Selectmen that it would be plowed. Mrs. Herron moved the article as printed in the warrant. Althea Behm seconds. Vincent Bane wonders if we need money to do this. Mr. Low says the State required both the vote and the money to reclassify a road from Class VI to Class V. After much discussion motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 30 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to improve that section of Old Deerfield Road approximately 500' between the present end of its Class V and the driveway leading to the permanent residence of Leo W. and Doris M. Dagenais. (By Petition) (Not recommended by Budget Committee)

Mr. Vincent Krzesicki moved the sum of \$5,000.00 to improve Old Deerfield Road from its present end of Class V about 500' to the driveway to residence of Leo and Doris Dagenais. R. Herron seconded. Mr. St. Cyr amends this so that any deviation from any amount expended on this be only after a public hearing by Roads Committee. Later withdrew his amendment. Perry Richardson says

the \$5,000.00 would not get the road done to the driveway. Mr. Lidback says the Selectmen are trying to take care of our roads and we are trying to outguess them by voting \$5,000.00 to help one family. Mrs. Herron thinks we are responsible for judgments made by former Selectmen. Mr. Small asks whether if this vote is not carried, would this nullify Article 29. Answer: Yes. A show of hands vote was so close 36 yes, 39 no, that a yes and no ballot was taken. Motion failed 49 yes, 64 no.

ARTICLE 31 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$9,350.00 for the purpose of purchasing additional equipment and dry hydrants for the Fire Department and authorize the withdrawal of \$9,350.00 for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 33 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$2,825.00 for the purpose of purchasing equipment for the Rescue Squad and authorize the withdrawal of \$2,825.00 for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

R. Herron moved the sum of \$2,825.00 for the purpose of purchasing equipment for the Rescue Squad and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund. Howard Dewey seconded. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

Moderator entertained a motion to reconvene on the 29th day of March at 9:00 A.M. to finish the rest of the warrant. Charles Johnson so moved. Seconded. Passed by voice vote. Paul W. Colby then requested a show of hands. Motion adopted 61 yes, 23 no. Stand adjourned at 5:12 P.M.

Mrs. Herron moved to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with procedures set forth in R.S.A. 31:95-6. V. Post seconded. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

Mr. James Small moved to allow 60% of the annual revenue of the ambulance service to be placed in a capital reserve account for the purpose of ambulance replacement, and the 40% of the annual revenue to be used for ambulance supplies. R. Herron seconds. Mr. MacCord amends to prohibit the Selectmen from billing Town residents. James Morse seconds this. Ambulance squad cited examples where more was collected from donations than from billing. Mr. Post believes that insurance companies need a bill and we'd lose money if we did not collect, also believes all money should go through the Selectmen's office. Mr. Low reported 31 bills sent out but only \$62.00 collected so far. After much lengthy discussion of the bookkeeping systems and billings and wording on the bills, the Moderator called a five minute recess for a conference of Selectmen and members of the Rescue Squad. As a result, Mr. MacCord says there will be a period of one year of no billing so he withdraws his motion. Small withdraws his motion and then moved to indefinitely postpone the article. Charles Johnson seconded. Motion adopted to indefinitely postpone.

ARTICLE 39 To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$500.00 as matching funds from the State of New Hampshire for the purpose of Civil Defense.

Mr. Post moved to accept the sum of \$500.00 as matching funds from the State of N. H. for the purpose of Civil Defense. C. Frary seconded. Robert LaRoche, Director of Civil Defense, answered a question as to whether we have plans to use this by saying we could get emergency electric power. Motion adopted by a voice vote.

ARTICLE 40 To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of Lot #9 in the Faucher Development and the cottage thereon to Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Klocek, the present occupants, for the sum of \$961.19.

Mr. Low explained the purpose of this article is to allow the Town to sell these lots back to the occupants. Mr. R. Herron then moved to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of Lot #9 in the Faucher Development and the cottage thereon to Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Klocek, the present occupants for \$961.19. J. Small seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

R. Thomas, Jr. asked about the value of these and the answer was that there is only 7,000 square feet in one and 9,500 in the other with buildings in very poor condition. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 42 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for recreational purpose for the Elderly, and to authorize the withdrawal of the amount requested from the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, and as amended in 1976. (By Petition) See Article 1.

ARTICLE 43 To see if the Town will vote to discontinue and revert land back to Lynwood & Clara Fife and Lawrence & Marsha Tasker, Jr. said land being the Northern end of the old Canterbury Road to Main Street and making of the Southern section of the old Canterbury Road the legal right of way for the back lot property owners to use off of Route 4. (By Petition)

Mr. Herbert Sherman moved to indefinitely postpone the article which would have discontinued the road and reverted the land back to Lynwood & Clara Fife and Lawrence & Marsha Tasker, the land being the Northern end of the old Canterbury Road to Main Street and making the Southern section of the old Canterbury Road the legal right of way for the back lot property owners to use off of Route 4. Mr. Herron seconded. Mrs. Post asked for explanation of article. Road is already closed subject to gates and bars and would force people to drive in from Rt. 4 to get to their lots. Motion to indefinitely postpone was adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 44 To see if the Town will vote to require the Selectmen in annual clearance of highways under the terms of R.S.A. 253:2 and R.S.A. 253:10 put out to public bid all such roadside tree clearing projects that will produce more than one cord of hardwood, or its equivalent, over and above that claimed by the abutter, and then to sell the processed hardwood from such projects to the highest bidder from the Town of Northwood, or to take any other action thereto. (By Petition)

Eleanor Pinkham moved to indefinitely postpone this article concerning cutting of wood along roadside clearance projects. Charles Frary supports the article saying he wants the beauty of roads preserved and cutting should be limited to trees that are causing damage or are objectionable from material or artistic

standpoint R.S.A. 253:10. Cites that 40 cords of wood were cut on Barnstead Road. Motion to indefinitely postpone was defeated. Gordon Smart moved the original motion as in the warrant. R. Thomas, Jr. seconded. After much discussion about where the wood went and how wide the roads are to cut and whether abutters were consulted and road committee consulted, and Mr. Bane inserting a bit of humor by saying if we all used oil there would be no problem, the motion was adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 45 To see if the Town will vote to require the Selectmen and the Public Works Department of the Town in any and all road construction and reconstruction work undertaken after the date of acceptance of this Article, to preserve, reconstruct and replace or relocate existing stone walls, and to consider said walls as historic boundary markers and as permanent marks on the land of the property owners, including lands in public ownership, or take any other action relative thereto. (By Petition)

Mrs. Jean Lane moved to require the Selectmen and the Public Works Department in any and all road construction undertaken after the date of acceptance of this Article, to preserve, reconstruct and replace or relocate existing stone walls, and to consider said walls as historic boundary markers and as permanent marks on the land of the property owners, including lands in public ownership, or take any other action relative thereto. W. Fiander seconded. Several spoke about the high cost of replacing stone walls. Motion was defeated first by voice vote and then by a show of hands, 19 yes and 53 no. Then a motion to indefinitely postpone was adopted.

Moderator reminded the people that any action taken here today that is not illegal should certainly be done but some areas may be illegal. Moderator also promised to get the Selectmen and Rescue Squad together soon.

Moderator reconvened after lunch at 1:45 P.M. He announced that the well under Article 32 and donated by Elmer Tasker is already done and the Clerk should give notice to Elmer Tasker of the unanimous vote of thanks given to him by the Town by a rising vote.

ARTICLE 46 To see if the Town will vote to continue the permanent Town Roads Committee established under Article 44 of the 1979 Town Warrant, including an annual report to be published in the Town Report, and direct that the Board of Selectmen with this Committee, shall hold annually at least one public meeting timed to occur conveniently before Town Budget Committee public meetings, for public input and informational purposes and to outline highway maintenance and replacement recommendations for three (3) years in advance, said recommendations to include plans and procedures to be adopted to protect and to enhance the natural beauty of the highways to be thus worked upon, or take any other action relative thereto. (By Petition)

Mr. C. Frary moved to continue the permanent Town Roads Committee established under Article 44 of the 1979 meeting, including an annual report to be published in the Town Report, and direct that the Board of Selectmen with this Committee, shall hold annually at least one public meeting timed to occur conveniently before Town Budget Committee meetings, for public input and informational purposes and to outline highway maintenance and replacement recommendations for three years in advance, said recommendations to include plans and procedures to be adopted to protect and to enhance

the natural beauty of the highways to be thus worked upon, or take any other action relative thereto. Joseph Grano seconded. Mr. Frary says this reinforces last year's action and makes it necessary for Selectmen to call this hearing before the Budget Committee's meetings. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 47 To see if the voters in the Town of Northwood will vote to limit the annual increase in the total sum of the Town and School Budgets to five (5) percent and to direct the Budget Committee to submit to the Annual Town Meeting for a vote an Annual Combined Budget that shall be limited to that increase; provided, that if the Budget Committee, by a two thirds (2/3) majority of its eligible members, votes that there is an emergency need, for one year at a time only, the Budget Committee may recommend an annual increase of up to ten (10) percent; further provided, that the Budget Committee, by a three-quarter (3/4) majority vote of eligible members may recommend, for one year at a time only, an annual emergency increase of up to fifteen (15) percent; or take any other action thereto. (By Petition)

Jean Lane moved to indefinitely postpone this article. Mr. Madson seconded. Mr. Madson read a letter from an attorney saying that such a vote as this article would not be legal and would not have any binding effect on subsequent school or town meetings. Letter on file. Mr. James Bennett and Mr. Ahlgren would like to see article adopted as a show of our realizing that these are troubled economic times and we should "tighten our belts". Mrs. Herron reminds us, "Why applaud this holding down when we have just voted big increases." W. Fiander read a Plus 55 Club resolution in favor of it. Mr. Post reminds us to come to Budget hearings and there make your wishes known. Motion to indefinitely postpone was adopted by show of hands - 53 yes, 36 no.

ARTICLE 48 To see if the Town will vote to close the following Class VI roads, subject to gates and bars, per recommendation of the Highway Advisory Committee:

- a. Upper Deerfield Road from Dagenais' driveway northerly to Marston's driveway.
- b. Bow Street from Charles Varney's driveway westerly to Reckard's driveway.
- c. Upper Deerfield Road from Weinhold's driveway southerly to the Deerfield line.
- d. Mountain Road from David Behm's driveway to the Winding Hill Road.
- e. Winding Hill Road from Tanja Winter's driveway to the Deerfield line.
- f. Bennett Road from Gaviat Green Development's easterly driveway in a westerly direction to Gaviat Green Development's westerly driveway.
- g. Canterbury Road from Helen Moak's corner to the Epsom line.
- h. Old Pittsfield Road from Silvana Cenci's driveway to the Epsom line.  $$_{22}$$

James Small moved the article as in warrant. H. Sherman seconded. Polly Pinkham amends article to read: a. Upper Deerfield Road from Dagenais' driveway northerly to Pinkham's gate (instead of Marston's driveway). Bruce Farr seconds. Amendment passed by voice vote. Mr. Low explained that this action doesn't close the roads, only takes responsibility off the Town so it can't be sued. Ernest Baker feels it would devalue the lands bordering these roads. Dot Graves moves to delete parts b., e., and d. to read as follows: Mountain Road from David Behm's driveway west to the easterly corner of the Graves property. R. Herron seconded. Mr. Frary asks whether it is legal to do work on Class VI roads, the trouble being that you can't get matching funds. Correct. The amendment passed by show of hands - 36 yes, 17 no. This amendment was for deletion of b. and e., so Mrs. Behm then amended d. as written above and that passed by show of hands - 41 yes, 3 no. The main motion adopted by show of hands - 55 yes, 12 no.

ARTICLE 49 To transact any other business that legally may come before said meeting.

James Small moved to reconsider Article 34. This he cannot do as he was on opposing side before. Mrs. Post moved to reconsider the article. Joseph Grano seconded. Motion to reconsider failed by vote of show of hands - 5 yes, 60 no.

Mr. Charles Frary offered the following resolution which was seconded by Mr. St. Cyr:

WHEREAS: The Northwood Town Plan has recommended that roadside trees and stone walls, etc., be retained wherever possible, and

WHEREAS: N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated 253:10 specifically limits the Selectmen, in annual roadside clearance, to "..trees and bushes that cause damage to highways or to the traveling public, or that are objectionable from the material or aesthetic standpoint", and

WHEREAS: the same NHRSA 253:10 specifically states that "..young trees standing at a proper distance from the highway and from each other shall be preserved, as well as banks and hedges of bushes that serve as a protection of the highway, or that add to the beauty of the roadside", and

WHEREAS: in 1978 and 1979 these guiding principles have been completely ignored by the Northwood Board of Selectmen, resulting in wall-to-wall clearance of highways, now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, AND IT HEREBY IS RESOLVED:

- 1. THAT: the Northwood Board of Selectmen, with or through its Road Agent, and the Northwood Conservation Commission, and prior to any decision by the Selectmen to proceed with any roadside clearance, shall mark any and all trees 15 inches or more in circumference (4 3/4 inches in diameter) that they recommend be removed in each operation, and estimate the cordwood yield, and,
- 2. THAT: the Northwood Board of Selectmen shall notify all abutters involved, including landowners on both sides of the street, as well as the Public, of such marking, so that seven days opportunity may be given said abutters to view and to agree to or to protest the removal of any such marked trees of interest to them, and
- 3. THAT: in making their original selections on each such project the Selectmen and their indicated advisors shall be guided by the above-quoted State instructions for roadside protection and

beautification, and by the mandate of the Northwood Town Plan.

Moderator Johnson asked whether this restricted an abutter in any way? Answer: No. Resolution adopted by voice vote.

Mr. Lounsbury told of the extensive damage done to sheep this year by dogs and reminded us that we passed a leash law at Town Meeting. He wishes there might be stiffer penalties. Chief Tasker is sympathetic but we have no good pound and law says you cannot shoot.

The winner of the raffle for a copy of the Northwood History Book was announced and Moderator Robert Johnson was the surprised winner.

Allan Clark moved to adjourn the meeting. Mr. Bane seconded and we adjourned by voice vote at 3:10 P.M.

### PETITION FOR SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

Now comes the Town of Northwood, by its Selectmen, Robert A. Low and Walter M. Crandall, Jr., and says:

- l. That the Town of Northwood, through its Selectmen, entered into an Agreement dated July 31, 1980 to purchase a certain tract of land and buildings, containing eleven (11) acres, more or less, situated on the Northerly side of Route 4 in Northwood, New Hampshire. This parcel includes a center chimney colonial farmhouse and barn and the Agreement provides for a purchase price of Fifty-Nine Thousand Nine Hundred (\$59,900.00) Dollars.
- 2. That the property which the Plaintiff seeks to acquire is situated on the Easterly and Northerly bounds of other property presently occupied by the Northwood Town Hall, together with the Town Offices.
- 3. That it is the belief of the Selectmen of the Town of Northwood that an emergency situation exists because the land and buildings in question are presently available to be purchased by the Town for an advantageous purchase price, the present owners thereof having previously advertised the property for sale for the sum of Seventy-Seven Thousand (\$77,000.00) Dollars. That the acquisition of the land in question would allow the Town of Northwood to have additional land available as required in the future when the Town's population is greater than it is today. With such increase in population will come the necessity for additional town facilities. There is no other land adjacent to the existing Town Hall and Town Offices for such expansion. The Selectmen of the Town of Northwood believe it would be advantageous to the Town to have additional land available for such expansion within one central area of the Town, rather than to have the Town facilities occupying separate parcels spread throughout the Town.
- 4. That the Selectmen of the Town of Northwood are desirous of holding a Special Town Meeting on September 9, 1980 as provided for in the Sales Agreement between the parties. The Selectmen are fearful that unless the Special Town Meeting is allowed to take place that the present owners of the property in question will convey the property to another purchaser.
- 5. That the Sales Agreement between the parties provides that the Town of Northwood bear the expense of a title examination and all closing costs and that additional funds be appropriated for that purpose.

6. That the Warrant Article would be presented to the voters of the Town of Northwood as follows:

"That the Town of Northwood raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty Thousand Five Hundred (\$60,500.00) Dollars to purchase eleven (11) acres, more or less, of land and buildings situated on the Northerly side of Route 4, bordering the Easterly side of the Town Hall property from Roy M. Flister and Jean F. Godfrey, and that the Selectmen be authorized to execute any and all documents necessary to effectuate such purchase."

WHEREFORE, it is respectfully requested that this Honorable Court:

- 1. Decree that the Town of Northwood is authorized to hold a Special Town Meeting as requested by the within Petition.
  - 2. And order such other and further relief as may be just.

#### LETTER OF APPRECIATION

As most Northwood residents know, the former "Town Dump" has undergone a major face-lift, and has become a decent Recycling - Reclamation Area.

The Recycling Area has now made arrangements to sell sorted glass, metal and tires, and in the near future cans will also be sold. Funds received have not turned the Recycling Area into a profit-making business, but they have helped towards paying the cost of the operation.

The change in the Area has been accomplished through the individual efforts of Northwood residents, who take the time and energy to sort their refuse and deliver it to the appropriate bins and compactor in the Recycling Area. The Lamprey Regional Co-operative has indicated that Northwood's solid waste refuse tonnage is below estimates, and could possibly be doubled if all residents cooperated by delivering their refuse to the Area.

Realizing that the success of any Town project depends on the support of the Townspeople, the Selectmen wish to extend their sincere appreciation to all who have cooperated with the refuse sorting program.

#### REPORT OF THE NORTHWOOD ROADS COMMITTEE

The following is a summary of the work that was accomplished on Town roads in 1980:

- 1. Graded and raked all graveled roads.
- 2. Graveled approximately 1 1/2 miles of Town roads.
- 3. Shimmed and surface treated about 5 miles of Town roads.
- 4. Brush was cut on about 9 miles of road.
- 5. Completed new construction at Hill's Corner Ridge Road.
- 6. Harvey Lake entrance partially completed.
- 7. Rebuilt 1/2 of Lower Deerfield Road.
- 8. Ridge Road surfaced.
- 9. Shimmed Blake's Hill Road.
- 10. Jeffery Road surfaced.

The Committee recommends that the following road improvements be scheduled for 1981, 1982 and 1983:

### 1981

- 1. Reconstruct gravel section of Gulf Road.
- 2. Resurface Gulf Road.
- 3. Surface Mountain Road.
- 4. Surface Blake's Hill Road.
- 5. Surface Jenness Pond Road.
- 6. Reconstruct Old Pittsfield Road from entrance to Brown's driveway.

#### 1982

- 1. Reconstruct the other 1/2 of Lower Deerfield Road.
- 2. Reconstruct Tasker Hill Road from where surface stops to the Strafford line.
- 3. Reconstruct Old Canterbury Road from Main Street entrance to cemetery.

#### 1983

- 1. Reconstruct the remainder of Old Pittsfield Road.
- 2. Reconstruct Harmony Road from Route 4.

## NORTHWOOD BOARD OF LIBRARY TRUSTEFS 1980 ANNUAL REPORT

The present and past members of the Northwood Board of Library Trustees are very grateful for the years of faithful service from Dr. Alfred Mihachik from 1945 until his death in August 1980. Through his advice, interest and active support, the libraries of Northwood contributed greatly to the Town. It is the intent of the Board to continue to work for his ideals of having libraries an important part of the life of the Town of Northwood.

At the 1980 Town Meeting, the Trustees requested a portion of Revenue Sharing Funds and an appropriation to construct a new water and sewerage system at the Chesley Memorial Library. When the warrant article was introduced, Elmer Tasker offered to drill an artesian well and to furnish the necessary casing without cost to the Town. The well was driven on March 25 to the depth of 205 feet with a 10 gallon per minute flow of water. The Board and the Townspeople are most appreciative of the generosity of Tasker's Well Co., for without this assistance, the expenditures for the system would have been over the requested funds. Watson Construction Co. of Pittsfield was the successful bidder for the remainder of the project which was completed in September.

Additional maintenance at the libraries included replacing plastic covering on the basement windows of both libraries and insulating the hot air ducts at the Bryant Library as energy conservation measures. The trees in front of the Bryant Library had to be removed and the Board plans to have them replaced with a more suitable specie.

Circulation of materials from the James F. Bryant Library at Northwood Narrows and the Chesley Memorial Library at East Northwood was 22,552, an increase of more than a thousand items from the previous year. A total of 835 items were added to the collections through purchase or donation. This number is less than the 1979 addition because of the tremendous increase in the cost of books. The Northwood libraries were one of the recipients of the Dr. Harold E. Conrad, Jr. Memorial Fund which enabled the Librarian to add materials in the fields of theater and music. Books, puppets, cassettes with children's books and adult radio shows on cassettes were purchased.

Miss Gladys Gardner, Librarian, planned 24 children's film programs. Average attendance at the Bryant Library was 18, and the Saturday morning programs at the Chesley averaged 12 children. Additionally there were 48 craft sessions held at the Bryant Library on Friday afternoons with approximately 15 children attending each week. Certain items from the craft sessions were dis-

played at the Northwood Craftsmen's Fair in August.

The Little Red Wagon, a children's live theater program from the University of New Hampshire, was presented to more than 100 children and adults. A last minute downpour required that the program be held in the VFW building at Northwood Narrows. The Trustees and the Librarian are appreciative of the cooperation from the VFW. Children's Book Week in November was observed by visits of 3 kindergarten groups at which time the Librarian held a story hour with slides.

Exhibits throughout the year at both libraries emphasized events, holidays, special book collections and the like. Tom and Jeff Lalish loaned ash from Mt. St. Helens to enhance the volcanic exhibit. The maple syrup exhibit had items from the collection of Joann Bailey and Sandy Woodcock exhibited her pastel pictures as well as demonstrating her technique at several sessions. Other members of the community also loaned items to exhibit at the libraries so others could enjoy them.

The Librarian attended meetings of the Central District Advisory Council, book displays, conferences of the N. H. Library Association and a special meeting for librarians held by the Rockingham County Extension Service. Various members of the Board of Trustees attended the N. H. Library Association Conference, and workshops on trustee responsibilities and grant writing.

Also, the Librarian has been working several months with a consultant from the N. H. State Library. They are evaluating the materials in the libraries, withdrawing those materials that are obsolete or not essential to a small public library, and replacing the withdrawn materials with current information.

The Board of Library Trustees and the Librarian wish to thank those individuals and groups who have donated books, money, labor or crafts material to the Northwood libraries: Muriel Allen, Michelle and Renee Small, Peter Thurber, Eleanor Byrne, Charles B. Johnson, the Harvey Lake Woman's Club, Eleanor Elliott, Avis Small, Velna Carll, Debbie Fadden, Percy Leather, Muriel Moore, Susan Moore, John Anderson, the Everett J. Bourdon American Legion Auxiliary, Corrine Viens, Ronald Gosselin, Eric Swanfeldt, Richard Linnell, H. L. ## NORTHWOOD CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1980 PEPORT

- 1. The Commission authored and sponsored a Wetland Ordinance which was adopted by the voters. The ordinance restricts the destruction of wetland areas that are essential for maintaining natural habitats for bird and animal life and for critical ground water levels. It also protects them from pollution, and in this respect is an important companion to the Hazardous Waste Ordinance.
- 2. The Commission sponsored the Annual Arbor Day in April. Nathalie Wall and Eleanor Byrne arranged for Mr. Paul Davis from Coe-Brown to obtain and direct the planting of a lovely rhododendron in front of the new section at the Town Hall. The shrub was donated by the Harvey Lake Woman's Club.
- 3. Also sponsored was the first Annual Mountain Day on October 11th. David Behm, Charles Frary, Nathalie Wall, Bunny Behm and Nancy Villamil were on the committee and with the help of the Northwood Boy Scouts, the Society for the Protection of N. H. Forests and Laura Whitaker, Geologist, developed an interesting program that attracted 80 people to the top of the mountain on the Parsonage Lot. The theme was "Know Your Mountain" and the purpose of the day was to interest the people of Northwood in the land and forest that they own as citizens of this Town, and to make them aware of their need to explore the riches around them. It was decided to establish Mountain Day as an annual event. A committee has already been chosen to start plans for October 1981.
- 4. The Commission was instrumental in having the N. H. Water Supply and Pollution Control allot some of a general Federal grant to a year-long study of Northwood Lake to determine its relative support for algae growth and any specific sources of nutrients. A report should be available in the fall of 1931. The Commission also went on record to curtail power boat use on lakes and ponds because the churning up of such waters brings out settled sediments and nutrients from the bottom into the water strata supporting algae growths.
- 5. A start was made on developing plans for upgrading the planting on the Town Parade and a report should be ready in 1981. The Commission requested the Selectmen to consider the purchase of the adjacent property. However, it was turned down by the voters.
- 6. The Commission voted to underwrite a Northwood Coe-Brown student (FFA) to the summer YOUTH CONSERVATION CAMP, run by the Society for the Protection of N. H. Forests, on the basis that while the older generation may ignore conservation with some impunity, the young cannot afford to their lives are strongly bonded to it.

7. Monthly meetings were held; dredge and fill permits were processed as required by law; the Commission requested the Selectmen to prohibit the permanent blocking of roads subject to gatesand-bars on the basis that fire road access is essential; members attended the Planning Board bi-monthly meetings and went on record as supporting RSA 253:10 and the Northwood Master Plan; attended the Annual Meeting of the N. H. Association of Conservation Commissions when the serious threat of ACID RAIN was presented; continued discussions on the endangered LOON and BOB WHITE; and favored the preservation of the stonewalls in Northwood as an essential part of the esthetic and rural character of the Town.

The Commission acknowledges the valuable contribution by Charles Frary as Consultant.

#### NORTHWOOD RESCUE SQUAD

During the year 1980 the Northwood Rescue Squad responded to a total of 212 calls. These calls consisted of medical aid, vehicular accidents and fire support. A total of 191 patients were treated with 173 being transported to area hospitals.

The 22 volunteer member squad also participated in numerous training sessions, to keep up with new and existing techniques. Several members also became certified in Advanced Life Support techniques.

The squad has also added several pieces of new equipment to the ambulance. Those being the E O A, MAST Device, and Cardiac Monitor.

#### LAMPREY REGIONAL SOLID WASTE COOPERATIVE

Your Directors of the Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative are pleased to report that the incinerator recovery plant is in operation and producing steam for the University of New Hampshire on a regular 24-hour, 7-day a week schedule.

In preparation for completion of the major elements of the plant in late summer of 1980; your Directors and staff have developed a program for waste delivery by each town, the establishment of an organization for managing and operating the plant, the sale of steam, and the disposal of the residue ash. In the waste delivery system developed, a supplemental program was implemented through the acquisition of a 50,000 pound roll-on, roll-off truck capable of handling our ash removal containers for transfer to the two planned initial disposal areas at the Newmarket and Northwood dumps, and, in addition, would efficiently and economically pick up the roll-on, roll-off compactors from Lee, Northwood, Barrington and Greenland, those towns having installed a formal compactor station unit.

To administer and manage the plant, your Directors have made arrangements with the Town of Durham to have its Public Works Director administer the plant's operation to include supervision of the operating personnel, the preparation of budgets, and detailed overall management under the general supervision of the Operations Committee of the joint Board of Directors.

The waste delivery program for all other towns in the Cooperative, including both community owned packers and commercial haulers, has been organized for efficient and continuous delivery of waste with all units being weighed on the Cooperative's scales, with tonnage recorded for billing of the tipping fee to each community. We have made arrangements with a commercial landfill operator to handle our waste in the event of a major shut-down of all units at the plant.

We had planned, at the time of our last report to you, to begin operation of the plant in August or September, however, due to economic conditions and delay in deliveries of critical items, we were not able to begin the production of steam until November, although the furnaces' refractory linings were cured by charging and burning refuse in September. With the shake-down period still going on, we averaged over 200,000 pounds of steam per day for the month of December, this despite the unanticipated underrun in waste being generated and delivered by the twelve towns.

As required by federal and state regulations, we are preparing with the assistance of the State Office of Air Control and the Division of Solid Waste to make the required stack test for emissions control and ash content standards.

The Directors, on December 30th, held a public hearing on a proposed budget, which has now been adopted and is being submitted to each member town showing its share of the total net operating budget. Because of the late start in producing steam, the tipping fee or net cost per ton is higher than anticipated. However, we are presently exploring two additional sources of revenue in

addition to the increased quantities of waste. One of these avenues is a federal entitlement program which pays eligible operations such as ours a varying value of from three to six dollars per ton of waste burned, where it replaces oil as a source of energy. Further, our Administrator is working on a program to handle oil spill waste for the state on a fee basis. Both of these programs, if they come to fruition, will assist us in reducing the estimated cost per ton for operating the plant.

We are still working with all of the communities and the University in eliminating glass from the waste stream because of the net savings that will result by eliminating hauling it to the plant and processing it through the system.

The Directors of the Cooperative wish to express their deep appreciation for the assistance given their efforts by the University's staff as well as the officers and personnel of the cooperating towns. Every effort will be continued to keep the residents of the region informed of the progress in the collection, processing, and disposal of the waste which is being handled at the plant.

#### REPORT OF THE NORTHWOOD PLANNING BOARD

At the 1980 Town Meeting, the Town of Northwood voted to authorize the Northwood Building Inspector to grant building permits; thereby relieving the Planning Board of that responsibility. Subsequently, the Board became more involved in the process of Town Planning and in the implementation of the goals and desires of the Northwood Town Plan.

On May 8, 1980, the Planning Board ceased issuing building permits. To that point, the Planning Board issued over 52 building permit applications.

The Planning Board held 9 subdivision hearings, involving 32 possible building lots. This was an increase over the past year, which saw 5 subdivision hearings held, with 8 possible building lots. In the past ten years, the largest number of subdivision hearings held was 6 in 1973, with the largest number of possible building lots being 22 in 1978. This year's average lot size was 3.98 acres, which is comparable to the past three years.

The thrust of the planning work completed by the Planning Board centered around planning for the future. The Board began considering amendments to the present Town Ordinances in the spring of 1980. Subsequently, the Board designated a Town Plan Committee to study future growth patterns in Northwood and estimate their impact on the Town's natural resources, its municipal services and its educational services. In so doing, the committee spent three months developing a set of standards that encompassed growth related problems and the desires of the Town Plan. The following proposals were recommended:

- 1. Amendment; Article III, Section A, #2: increase in the widths of the right-of-ways, dependent on future use and requiring hot-topping or pavement of all new subdivision roads;
- 2. Amendment; Article III, Section A, #5: enactment of various performance standards concerning multiple family dwellings, including land to building ratios, landscaping and increased frontage requirements;
- 3. Repeal; Article III, Section A, #7: repeal of required open space set aside for subdivision over 20 acres, because of the questioned legality of the ordinance and the removal of land from the tax roles;
- 4. Addendum; Article III, Section A, #11: the establishment of Site Plan Review with relevant performance standards, with an aim at giving the Planning Board control over the development of all non-residential concerns;
- 5. Addendum; Article III, Section A, #12: adoption of Northwood Sign Regulations.

The Planning Board will have held all relevant public hearings by the Town Meeting, for the purpose of placing these proposals, individually, on the 1981 ballot. The Town Plan Committee also made two other recommendations. They suggested that there was a need to continue to study the possibility of establishing a Northwood Historical District and a cluster housing ordinance. The Planning Board agreed with these recommendations and will establish study committees to examine these two matters sometime in the early part of 1981.

Two Subdivision Amendment Hearings were held for the purpose of improving the legal standing of the Northwood Subdivision Regulations. Among the changes were the Certificate of Failure to Take Action; clarification of approval stamps, and two other legal clarifications. Further review of the regulations has continued, with the Board presently considering driveway entrance regulations.

In the summer of 1980, the Planning Board had begun the process of putting together the final portions of the Town Plan for the purpose of printing it for the citizenry. However, after the Town Plan Committee had done a large amount of statistical work, it was decided to postpone the printing for at least one more year. The Planning Board agreed to continue that work as soon as the 1980 census figures are available, so that the final figures printed are more up-to-date than those connected with the original Town Plan.

The Planning Board, after much discussion (including a meeting with Tom Cooney, Director, SRPC) recommended that funding should continue for the Strafford Regional Planning Commission. Reasons cited were the need for their technical assistance (especially since there is no probability that CETA personnel will be available to the Planning Board in the future), the Town's contribution to regional planning, fallout from possible grant aid that the commission might receive, and the need for a regional clearinghouse if the town applied for federal funding (for example, putting in sewers).

## YEAR-END REPORT OF THE STRAFFORD REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION 1980

The Town of Northwood first joined the Strafford Regional Planning Commission (SRPC) in 1977 and has participated as a member of the Planning Commission every year since. In 1980, Northwood's dues contribution to the SRPC was \$1,980.13. For 1981, Northwood's dues assessment will decrease 26 percent.

Through its membership, Northwood has supported and participated in various regional planning projects which the SRPC has undertaken over the past year. Some highlights of the Commission's regional planning efforts include:

- 1. A study of the revitalization potential of three abandoned/ underutilized former textile mill complexes in Strafford County. This study will hopefully serve as a model for similar reuse investigations to help revitalize other aging mill complexes in the Strafford Region.
- 2. Completed the Overall Economic Development Program Progress Report for Strafford County, which extended the County's designation as a Redevelopment Area by the Federal Economic Development Administration until June 30, 1981. This continued designation maintains the county's eligibility to participate in EDA funding programs. Over the past two years, Strafford County communities have received some \$125,000 in EDA grants as a result of this eligibility.
- 3. Initiated with the University of New Hampshire a River Basin Management Plan for the Salmon Falls River Basin, aimed at maximizing the hydroelectric power potential of some ll existing and abandoned hydroelectric dams on the river.

In addition to the above projects, the Strafford Regional Planning Commission has provided specific technical assistance to the Town of Northwood in support of several ongoing projects at the request of various town officials. These local projects have included:

- at the request of the Conservation Commission, attended a public hearing concerning a proposed wetlands ordinance, and spoke on behalf of same;
- 2. provided continuing research, staff support and secretarial services to the Northwood Town Plan Committee;
- 3. assisted in the preparation of zoning proposals for presentation at Town Meeting;
- 4. provided data to the Northwood Planning Assistant concerning performance controls;

- 5. reviewed and commented upon the proposed Northwood Lake diagnostic study, participated in initial meeting of Northwood Lake Citizens Advisory Committee that is overseeing study;
- 6. attended joint Planning Board/Conservation Commission meetings concerning proposed zoning ordinances.

# ANNUAL REPORT 1980

The Rural District Health Council continues as a Certified Home Health Agency covering nine towns - six in Strafford County and three in Rockingham County.

Many long hours of research and organization was done by selectmen and concerned citizens of the towns from 1966 until the first visit was made on May 5, 1969.

The priority service is the care of the sick program which includes visiting nurses, physical therapist, occupational therapist, speech therapist and home health aides, providing visits in the patient's home. The agency also has contracts for home health aide with the Strafford County Home Health Aide program and Portsmouth Area Home Health Aide program.

A Maternal & Child Health program is offered to all children from any of the member towns, and includes physicals, immunizations, teaching and counseling for ages 0-6 years. It also provides home visits to the newborns on request and any follow-up care as requested by physicians.

A Dental program is also provided by the MCH Program and the Pre-School Dental Services and is held for children 3-6 years, which includes cleaning, and flouride treatments twice a year with referrals to local dentists for follow-up care when needed. The program also works closely with the Women & Infant Children Nutrition Program and the Strafford County Prenatal & Family Planning Program.

The agency also holds monthly adult health maintenance programs which provide blood pressure checks, diabetic and anemia screenings, nutrition counseling and special diets and weight control.

The first and third Wednesdays screenings are held at the Town Hall in Farmington for the towns of Farmington, Middleton and New Durham. The second Wednesday they are held at the Town Hall in Northwood for the towns of Northwood, Nottingham, Deerfield, Barrington and Strafford; the fourth Wednesday they are held in Milton at the Milton Health Center. They all start at 1:00 P.M. and continue until all patients are seen - the program is open to any one in the area. Within the next grant year, the agency looks to providing an ongoing program in the Barrington area.

The Rural District Health Council cooperates with other agencies in the area to provide a continuation of good health and social services to its member towns.

The agency with the cooperation of Frisbie Hospital provides a discharge referral coordinator who assists the social services department at the hospital and the patient's physicians to continue care as needed from the hospital to the patient's home. The hospital funds this program in part with the council.

The strength of the Council lies with the dedicated staff who many times devote themselves above and beyond the call of duty reflecting the nurse who cares for people. Staff nurses providing service within the care of the sick program are Barbara Drew, RN; Myrtle Walsh, RN; Elizabeth Coons, RN; Dorothy Demmons, RN; and Mary Timmons, RN, also acting as part-time supervisor. Arlene Thorne, RN, is coordinator of the Maternal Child Health program and Paula Davis, RN, as clinic nurse and Elderly Screening Coordinator. Jean Germer, RN, is the Discharge Coordinator. Joan Menez, LPN, is part-time where needed and Alice Ziegra, RN, part-time. Home Health Aide services are provided by Gail LaPosa and Renee' Wormell. Junellen Chase handles the office duties as Administrative Assistant.

The Board of Directors has voted to decrease the per capita cost by .20¢ with a result of \$3.00 per capita for the fiscal year 1981. Many factors contributed to the decision. This year the agency has experienced in depth evaluation of our financial status, having reviewed both expenditures and income sources. The Ad Hoc Committee was appointed and met frequently throughout the year; "after careful study the Committee recommends that no charge be made to participants of the Child Health Program". However, the Board voted to attempt a pilot study of asking for a \$2.00 donation at clinic sites, a \$1.00 donation will be asked for office visits and a donation for the Elderly Screening Clinics, all effective January 1, 1981.

The Board voted to become a United Way Agency; the grant was increased for the Maternal & Child Health Program through the efforts of the Community Health Care Association. The Agency also has an increase in the State Council on Aging grant and the Referral Coordinator. The total population has increased 751 residents. With this added income the Finance Committee feels the Council can continue to provide the many needed services to its member towns.

Home Health Agencies are delivering relatively inexpensive care to rural residents who might otherwise have no access to such care.

During the past year the Council has made for your town 250 skilled nursing visits, 38 home health aide visits, and 19 therapy visits; there have been 76 child health home visits and 156 children have attended the Child Health Program.

No work took place in the cemetery this year as the contractor who was granted the work failed to perform it, even though he was requested to do so several times. The monies allocated have been held over and the work will be awarded to another contractor this year.

#### COMMENT

The committee feels the need to comment on the care and the maintenance of lots.

Lots which are not in perpetual care are <u>not</u> the responsibility of the Town or the caretaker to maintain. Because a caretaker is in the cemetery and takes care of perpetual care lots is absolutely no reason why he should mow a lot not in perpetual care. We say this because we have had complaints from owners of lots that their lot is not maintained, when in fact they have made no provision for the same.

The caretaker has been instructed to care for all lots in order to preserve the beauty of our cemeteries. However, he has also been instructed to bill those owners of lots not in perpetual care. These bills are valid and should be paid promptly.

Any owner of a lot who wishes to maintain his or her own lot needs only to advise this committee of this fact. However, it will be expected that such owner will in fact maintain the lot to the same standards as the whole cemetery is kept.

To eliminate this problem it is suggested that all lot owners place their lots in perpetual care. It will be the policy of this committee that those persons who are in arrears for care will not have their lots mowed for the coming year.

# NORTHWOOD FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The year 1980 was again a busy year for the Fire Department with the number of calls increasing. However, the number of major structural decreased. In 1980, the Department responded to a total of 165 fire calls as compared to 157 in 1979, 107 in 1978 and 73 in 1977.

The Fire Department donated over 6,795 man hours of actual firefighting during 1980, which does not include hours spent on administration, training, maintaining equipment or upkeep of the stations.

Although the number of structural fires decreased, numerous lives were lost in area towns with many of the fires being wood stove related. The proper installation and use of solid fuel heating appliances cannot be overemphasized.

The number of serious motor vehicle accidents has caused the Fire Department great concern as the number of fatals in 1980 was five. Several other accident victims had their lives saved only by the efforts of the Fire Department and the Rescue Squad.

The benefits of the Capital Area Mutual Aid Fire Compact system of dispatching and mutual aid were again proven in 1980. The use of radio alerted pagers allow the firefighters to be on call 24 hours a day. Northwood received mutual aid 48 times and provided mutual aid 43 times.

1980 was a year of training with many firefighters attending special State Fire Schools, as well as regular monthly training sessions. The Fire Department is in the process of having fifteen firefighters State Certified which requires over 100 hours of training in 12 subject areas.

The Fire Department has been aggressive in the area of Fire Prevention by performing chimney and stove inspections and a public awareness program of the hazards of solid fuel heating. The program has been a success based on the low number of chimney fires

in relation to area towns.

The Fire Department has continued a program of improving fire protection for the community. An additional 1,000 feet of 4" hose and an additional porta-tank has been placed into service. A new fire engine has been ordered which is expected to upgrade the level of protection.

The Department has installed two additional dry hydrants, one at the Church Pond on Bow Lake Road and the other on Green Street. The providing of a dependable water supply has been a high priority of the Department during the past three years. When the new fire engine is delivered the system for water supply will be basically complete.

In reviewing the Fire Department budget it is observed that 50% of the budget are items that cannot be controlled, such as heat and telephone. Over 25% of the budget is for energy costs. As a result, the Department is especially hard hit by inflation. The Department has insulated and installed storm windows in recent years to reduce energy cost and is constantly looking at ways to cut our energy consumption.

The Fire Department consists of 25 of your neighbors who donate their time and the expenses associated with serving on the Department out of their dedication to help their neighbors. The Town received a total of 6,795 man hours at actual fires at no cost to the Town. With the increased cost of living the Department is investigating a program of reimbursing firefighters for expenses associated with serving the Town.

I would like to thank the officers and firefighters of the Fire Department who have given so unselfishly of their time. I thank the wives and families for their support and understanding. I also thank the people of Northwood who have continually supported the Fire Department, both financially and morally.

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business.

Forest fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

In 1980 the town of Northwood had seven small brush and grass fires with no cost of suppression to the town. This was possible due to everyone's positive approach to Forest Fire Prevention. As your warden, I wish to thank all of you and request your continued help in 1981.

# 1980 SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING REPORT March 8, 1980

The annual School District meeting was called to order at 1:10 in the afternoon, at the Northwood Elementary School, by Moderator Robert Johnson. The warrant was read by Mr. Johnson.

ARTICLE 1 To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto. Mrs. Lois DeTrude moved that this article be accepted as read. Mr. Donald Post seconded. Article passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 2 To choose agents and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. Mrs. DeTrude moved that we accept this article as read. Seconded by Mr. Post. Passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 3 To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-six thousand sixty dollars (\$26,060.00) for the purpose of establishing a public kindergarten program, effective September 1, 1980, to be located in the building known as the Brookside School, owned by the Advent Christian Church of Northwood. (by petition) Mrs. DeTrude made a motion that we accept this article as read. Seconded by John Lane. Judy Pellettieri described the present condition of the Brookside School, equipment, kitchen equipment, toilet facilities, and explained the need for a public kindergarten. The \$26,060.00 budget was broken down by Mrs. DeTrude, who, also stated that this amount includes bus transportation. Mrs. Joann Bailey asked, "What's going to become of the Center School, and what's the overall picture?" Sammy Johnson explained that "there will be no nursery school in the Narrows, if this goes through." Judy Lounsbury stated that "the Center School will continue to function." Mr. Clarence Ahlgren asked how many students could be enrolled? Mr. Madson said the school is presently licensed for 50 students, and this figure would have to be accepted, if this goes through. Mrs. Doris Bennett asked about the lease of the Brookside School. Mrs. DeTrude stated that a lease would be drawn up for 5 years with the Church, and then "we'll see". Moderator Johnson called for a YES NO ballot vote. 128 votes were cast, 103 voted YES 24 voted NO and 1 vote was wasted. Motion prevails.

ARTICLE 4 To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district. Mr. Post moved that this Article be deferred until Articles 5 through 9 have been taken up and acted upon. This was seconded by Mr. Sherman. Mr. Post's motion was passed.

ARTICLE 5 To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five hundred dollars (\$7,500.00) for such energy conservation measures at the Northwood Elementary School, as insulating ceilings and interior walls, replacing existing electrical fixtures and installing new thermostatic controls. Mrs. DeTrude made a motion that we accept this Article as read. Mr. Madson seconded this.

Mr. Ahlgren asked where are improvements to be done? Mr. Madson stated that we'll need to repair the thermostat heating system, and we'll have some work on the north wall and other items will be on the list; however, the planning report is not in yet. Mr. Ahlgren asked if this amount would cover the needs? Mr. Madson stated that this amount would cover the needs and no more. Mrs. Behm asked, "Is there a mortgage on this building?" Mrs. DeTrude replied, "No". Moderator Johnson called for a verbal vote. A YES vote was unanimous.

ARTICLE 6 To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the original appropriation for the 1979-80 fiscal year, a sum of eleven thousand five hundred and twenty-six dollars (\$11,526.00) to be made available to the school district prior to June 30, 1980, in order to meet unbudgeted tuition obligations to Coe-Brown Academy. Mrs. DeTrude made a motion that we accept this Article as written. Seconded by Mr. Madson. Mr. Post called for a show of hands. Mrs. Post asked for an explanation. Mrs. DeTrude stated that they have met with the Coe-Brown Trustees and their budget has been presented to the School Board and the public, and they have already started a music program and drama, and the art program is to be added. It is felt by this School Board that Coe-Brown Academy is working in good faith and that this money be put back into their budget for 1979-80 fiscal year. Mr. Clough stated that this is an accepted procedure of the State. Mr. Richardson stated that any money raised today is for 1980-81 budget and not 1979-80 budget. Mr. Madson said, "The law is firm on this and we must pay this by June 30, 1980." The Moderator called for a show of hands. YES 75 NO 10 Motion prevails.

ARTICLE 7 To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the original appropriation for the 1979-80 fiscal year, a sum of four thousand nine hundred thirty-seven dollars (\$4,937.00) to be made available to the School District prior to June 30, 1980, in order to meet unanticipated obligations caused by Special Education tuition and transportation expenditures mandated by Federal (Public Law 94-142) and State Law (RSA 186-A:7 and RSA 186-A:9). Mrs. DeTrude made a motion that we accept this Article as read. Mrs. Post seconded. John Lane asked for an explanation. Mr. Clough stated that the number of children this district is responsible for Special Education is higher than estimated for the budget last year, also, State Revenue has fallen from the estimated amount. Mr. Robert Johnson asked Mr. Clough if there are any provisions in Article 10, if that was adopted, whereby, something at a later date were made available from State or Federal Sources that we could accept? Mr. Clough stated because there are funds already budgeted in the budget it is possible later on, if there are funds available, we could accept it. Moderator Johnson called for a verbal vote. Passed.

ARTICLE 8 To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) for a contingency fund as provided by the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 198:46. Mrs. DeTrude made a motion that we accept this as read. Seconded by Mrs. Post. Tom Madson stated, "The law says we can do it." Moderator Johnson called for a vote. This Article passed by a verbal vote.

ARTICLE 9 To see if the district will vote to appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) from the unencumbered balance at the end of the 1979-80 fiscal year. Said sum of money to be deposited in a capital reserve fund in accordance with the provisions of RSA 35 for the purpose of financing all or part of the cost of new construction of the School District. Mrs. DeTrude made a motion that we accept this Article as read. Seconded by Mr. Madson. John Lane asked how much is in the fund at the moment? Mrs. DeTrude stated there is \$10,000.00 now, and this would be \$15,000.00. Mrs. Knox stated this information is on page 79 in the Town Report. Mrs. Phyllis Thomson asked, "What is new construction of the School District?" Mr. Madson said there is nothing planned at this time, this money would be salted away for new construction. Moderator Johnson said there will be no new construction without the vote of the District. Mr. Alan Thomson asked, "What is the sum?" and Mr. Madson replied, "If there is a surplus at the end of this fiscal year, it would be put into the fund." Bonnie Hibbard asked if this money could be used for the Brookside School, if necessary? Moderator Johnson replied, "That's up to the vote of the Town." This Article was passed by a verbal vote.

ARTICLE 4 Moderator Johnson stated that we will now take up the deferred Article 4. Mr. Post moved that we raise the sum of \$783,002.00 for the school budget for the fiscal year 1980-81. Seconded by Mr. Madson. Mrs. DeTrude stated that the School Board has two amendments to this Article. Line #1100 (Coe-Brown) tuition change. The State average per pupil was not in at the time the school budget was taken up with the Budget Committee; therefore, there has been an increase, per pupil, from \$1,640 times 131 pupils = \$214,840.00 to \$1,854 per pupil times 131 pupils = \$242,874.00. An increase of \$28,034.00. Mike Bane asked, "Is this State average or Coe-Brown?" Mr. Madson replied, "Yes, each school sets their own rate." Mrs. Hibbard asked if they will implement a Special Education program for children we send there? Mr. Madson said, "We can't tell Coe-Brown what programs to be implemented." Moderator Johnson called for a show of hands on this amendment. YES 42 NO 15 (first amendment passed). Mrs. DeTrude asked for \$3,900.00 for Line #2500 (Maintenance of Plant). This was seconded by Mr. Madson. Mrs. Doris Bennett asked if this is for janitorial service? Mrs. DeTrude replied, "Yes." Moderator Johnson called for a show of hands for the second amendment. YES 43 NO 16 Both amendments passed increasing the Total Budget to read: \$814,936.00. Moderator Johnson called for a show of hands for the Article as amended. YES 45 NO 7 passed.

ARTICLE 10 To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive and expend, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or State agencies; private agencies and/or other sources. Mrs. DeTrude made a motion that we accept this Article as read. Seconded by Mr. Post. Mr. Caron asked if we could accept matching funds without an obligation? Mr. Clough explained that we can. Moderator Johnson called for a verbal vote. Article was passed.

ARTICLE 11 To see if the district will vote to create the office of Assistant Treasurer to perform the duties of the office whenever the person holding office of Treasurer shall by reason of illness, accident, absence from the state, or other cause, become temporarily incapacitated and unable to perform the duties of his office, said Assistant Treasurer to be appointed by the Moderator and to hold office until the next district meeting and thereafter to be elected annually with other district officers. Mrs. DeTrude made a motion that we accept this Article as read. Seconded by Mr. Madson. No discussion on this Article. Article passed by verbal vote.

ARTICLE 12 To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting. Mr. Robert Bailey asked if we are on an average per pupil as other towns? Now, we are about \$1,800 per pupil. Mr. Clough said that Northwood rates 103 out of 154 Districts. This is about a 23.3% increase over last year's budget.

Mrs. DeTrude stated that the Senior School Board member, Mrs. Nat Wall, was ill today. We wish to thank her for her service to the School Board.

Mrs. Behm made a motion that the School Board meet with Coe-Brown Academy for Special Education program for the Academy to keep children in said district. Seconded by Mrs. Post. This motion was passed by a verbal vote.

This meeting adjourned at 3:45 P.M.

In August 1980, I requested the State Department of Education to conduct an evaluation of all Elementary Schools in School Administrative Unit #44 in order to determine our present state of compliance with the State Department of Education's document entitled, Approved New Hampshire Elementary Schools, K-8. The purpose of this request was to utilize State Department services to obtain information which we could use as a point of reference at the local level in determining educational goals for the system. The State Department among other recommendations suggested a thorough examination of present library services with particular attention being given to space and staff. Additional recommendations include: establishing a physical education program and the creation of positions for a physical education teacher and a guidance counselor. The evaluation placed the Northwood Elementary School in category II which means that the School has complied with 90% of the State Minimum Standards for Elementary Schools.

Special Education continues to emerge as a particularly significant challenge to local school districts across the Nation as a result of such Federal laws as Public Law 94-142, Section 504 of the Civil Rights Act and in New Hampshire, State law RSA 186:A. During the course of the past several years, the Northwood School District has attempted to meet its obligations in this particular area. However, the financial responsibility which the District has been forced to assume for these programs is rapidly growing into an awesome burden for the local property taxpayer. The problem is not new to American society and will not be dealt with effectively until the Federal and State Governments cease to mandate programs and then leave the funding for said programs to local communities. In the case of Special Education programming, Federal law requires the Federal Government to pay 40% of the costs while actual appropriations total only 10%. As this report is being written, the State Legislature is attempting to deal with a 5.4 to 6 million dollar deficit in the State's excess cost funds for such programs. In the event that the Legislature is unable to fulfill its financial commitments to local communities it will reflect a continuing trend and force school districts to reconsider their commitment concerning continued support for such programs. It should be noted that in Northwood, through administrative and School Board leadership, creative restructuring of local special needs programs has been recommended for the ensuing school year. The School Board and administration are to be commended for attempting to service the needs of handicapped children as close to the home environment as possible. This cooperative, local school orientation to providing services for children with special needs should, and must be continued.

As the reader will note, there is an article in the warrant to see if the District wishes to establish a study committee for the purpose of conducting a comprehensive study of school district needs with particular emphasis on space requirements, per pupil operating costs and tuition rates of receiving high schools to which Northwood pupils are assigned and the entire curriculum from grade K-12. I sincerely believe that this type of long range planning and gathering of pertinent information can only strengthen the decision making process in the District. In the event that this committee is established, the Central Office will be more than willing to provide whatever research assistance necessary for the completion of the committee's task as charged.

As I view this coming school year I see the following as needs of the system: continued study concerning the feasibility for some form of regional high school arrangement; additional space for such support programs as reading, special education and guidance; the addition of a physical education program and cooperative planning with adjacent school districts to increase the cost effectiveness of Special Education programming.

Curriculum development and refinement has been an ongoing process as Mr. Conway and the faculty strive to meet the everchanging individual needs of the students. Emphasis has been placed this year on beginning a program for gifted children and evaluating the present science program. Mr. Leon Worthley, our new Assistant Superintendent of Schools, has a strong background in these areas and will be continuing to provide support and assistance for future curriculum activities. Mr. Worthley has also been assisting with the School Administrative Unit's accountability plan, a process in which Barbara Fraser and Eleanor Loewer have been deeply involved.

In summary, we wish to express our appreciation to the members of the School Board, the teachers, pupils and citizens for the cooperation exhibited during the past year. We look forward to a
long and productive relationship in which our mutual goals will continue to be the best possible education for our young people.

The increase of students in certain areas of the school is creating a great deal of concern. At present we have 12 1/2 class-rooms in the main school, and we are going to be in need of an additional classroom for the 1981-82 school year. We are exploring possible solutions to this problem, and hopefully we will be able to come up with an answer that will not hurt the educational program at the school.

One of our priorities this year will be to develop a program to help the gifted children at the school. Our teachers are involved in an inservice training program to help us identify them and establish a program for them.

Our Learning Center has been an extremely active area, treating the needs of students who have been diagnosed as having learning problems. The staff at the Center, headed by Anne Grabowski, have been doing an excellent job in servicing these special youngsters.

Extra curricular programs are in full swing. Mr. Loper has developed many youngsters in the instrumental band program, and now that Coe-Brown has instituted a music program, these youngsters will be able to carry their music education beyond the eighth grade. We are again offering a typing course and an introduction to the French language to our 7th and 8th grade students. The athletic teams are off to another successful year, having dominated our district last year. The girls' soccer team was crowned champions of their league again this year. Our fall program had close to 100 students involved in after school sports.

The State Department of Education has just completed an evaluation of our school, and we are very proud of the outcome. Approximately every five years, schools are evaluated by the State as to programs, class size and number of staff. We were last evaluated in 1974, and at that time, the school was rated a Class IV school. With the addition of stronger programs, plus the improvement of teacher-pupil ratios, we have now been placed in Class II. It is unusual for any school to go up two classifications in any evaluation period. The final statement in our report highly commended the community and the School Board for their efforts in improving the educational programing at the school.

In closing I would like to express my appreciation to the Supervisory Union office staff for their assistance this year: Mr. Barry Clough, Superintendent of Schools; Mr. Bernard Davis and Mr. Leon Worthley, Assistant Superintendents of Schools; and Mr. Leonard Newman, Director of Special Education. My special thanks go to the Northwood School Board who have put in long hours striving to maintain quality education in the community; and to the citizens of Northwood for their continued support of our school programs.

This year, I will be completing 12 years as Principal of the Northwood School. They have been enjoyable years, and this June, for the first time, I will be able to see my first group of students complete their total educational program as they graduate from Coe-Brown Academy.

### SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES

### DENTAL PROGRAMS

Ten students received dental care through Northwood Dental Matching Funds. The money was made available through the generosity of many local organizations and the P.T.A. Dr. David Gruette, Northwood, was the participating dentist. Through a program sponsored by the N. H. Bureau of Dental Health, students in grades 1 - 5 were given the opportunity to participate in a daily dry brushing program and weekly fluoride rinse program. One hundred and sixteen students participated in the dental cleaning and fluoride clinic in September.

## AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE ADVENT CHRISTIAN CHURCH AND THE NORTHWOOD SCHOOL DISTRICT

At a meeting April 8, 1980, representatives of the Advent Christian Church and the Northwood School Board agreed to the following:

- 1. The Brookside School and yard, property of the Advent Christian Church, will be used by the Northwood School District, for the purpose of operating a kindergarten, for consideration of the rights and responsibilities hereinafter stated. This occupancy is guaranteed for five (5) years, and is renewable, unless both parties agree otherwise. Should the Church decide to sell the school, first option will be given to the Northwood School District.
- 2. The Northwood School District will be responsible for the maintenance and utility costs of the school, beginning July 1, 1980.
- 3. The Northwood School District will undertake all necessary repairs and renovations as necessary. This includes painting, shades, screens and storm windows, locks, hot water heater, water hook-up, kitchen and sewerage systems.
- 4. Insurance will be taken by the Northwood School District to cover buildings, contents, liability and injury.
- 5. No major change will be made on the property without the consent of both parties.
- 6. The furniture, including the pianos, may be used by the Northwood District.
- 7. The Church will continue to hold Sunday School classes, and meetings at the Brookside School. Designated cupboards and bulletin boards will be kept free for use by the Sunday School. Tables and chairs will also be available for Sunday School use.
- 8. The yard may be fenced if necessary, but the driveway should be kept open for parking.
- 9. Fund raising events may be held at the school providing the grounds are kept in good order.
- 10. Smoking will not be permitted in the building nor will the consumption of alcoholic beverages be allowed on the property.
