ARTICLE VII: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$25,000 to be put into a Capital Reserve Fund already established at the 1984 Annual Town Meeting for the purpose of major repairs to the Meriden Covered Bridge, matching funds to be contributed from State Bridge Aid at the time of construction.

ARTICLE VIII: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$10,800 for the purchase of a new Police Cruiser and to authorize the Selectmen to sell or trade the 1982 cruiser now owned by the Town and apply the proceeds of such sale or trade to the purchase price of the new cruiser.

ARTICLE IX: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal or other Governmental unit or a private source, which becomes available during the year. The funds shall be used only for the legal purposes for which the Town may appropriate money. The Selectmen shall hold a public hearing prior to the application for Grants from Governmental Sources or prior to the acceptance of funds from any sources.

ARTICLE X: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$4,200 for the purchase of a tow-behind broom for use by the Town Highway Dept.

ARTICLE XI: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$5,000 for the purpose of constructing a Salt Shed for use by the Town Highway Department.

ARTICLE XII: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed.

ARTICLE XIII: To see if the Town will vote to increase the real estate exemption on dormitories, dining halls and kitchens of Kimball Union Academy above \$150,000 as allowed in RSA 72:23, and take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE XIV: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$55,000 for the purchase of a New Backhoe.

ARTICLE XV: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$8,500 for the purchase of a trailer for the transportation of the backhoe and loader.

ARTICLE XVI: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to continue the Kimball Union Academy/Plainfield Tax Formula Study for 1985.

ARTICLE XVII: To see if the Town will instruct the Moderator to appoint a Finance Committee of six persons to advise the Selectmen and other officers of the Town in the prudential affairs of the Town.

ARTICLE XVIII: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1985 appropriation, said funds to be placed in a Special Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36—A:5. (by request)

ARTICLE XIX: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 to support the Community Youth Advocates of Sullivan County. (by request)

ARTICLE XX: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to assure the services of the Cornish Rescue Squad for 1985. (by request)

ARTICLE XXI: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750 to help support Headrest, Inc., in return for services rendered in 1985. (by request)

ARTICLE XXII: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250 to support the Sullivan County Hospice, Inc. (by petition)

ARTICLE XXIII: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

1984 Review

We are pleased to recall that 1984 was a relatively uneventful year. The Town decided to follow the advice of the State to update the Town Master Plan. With the help of the Planning Board and many others, great progress was made and this work will continue throughout 1985. This will give direction for town officers and support the Zoning Ordinances.

The Selectmen signed a note for a few weeks until the bond was completed in the amount of \$90,000 for the highway garage.

The cost for the town to borrow money has decreased and Town Treasurer, Fred Sweet, was able to secure tax anticipation money for 5.95% for this year.

The Town voted to join the Claremont Waste District. The incinerator project continues to have financial and environmental problems.

There were many leash law violations in Plainfield this year. This has resulted in dogs doing damage to people and property. It is the hope of the Selectmen and enforcement officers that 1985 will be a better year in this respect.

Through the cooperation of the efforts by the Friends of the Plainfield School, the Highway Department, and many citizens, a successful playground was created.

The citizens of Plainfield should also be commended for their high percentage of registered voter participation (87.23%) in the last Presidential Election. It won the Town an award by the Manchester Union Leader of a flag and a plaque for the highest in the State for our size town.

Emily Quimby, Lee Lynd, Malcom Grobe and Tim Crotts accepted appointments to the Hazardous Waste Committee. Michael Thibideau and Larry Hawkins were hired as part-time police officers. Dianne Rogers was appointed as alternate representative to Claremont Solid Waste Committee. Peter Haubrich was reelected to the office of Selectman for a term of three years.

Substantial improvements were made to Methodist Hill Road and Slack Road in cooperation with the Town of Enfield to remedy snow removal and mud season problems. Camp Road Bridge was improved this year, bringing the bridges in town up to a satisfactory level of repair except for the Meriden Covered Bridge. There was \$25,000 placed in a Capital Reserve Fund with matching funds by the State for repairs to the abutment of the Meriden Covered Bridge. Another \$25,000 will be needed again this year. The repairs will begin as soon as the State can schedule them. Ms. Vera Moulton donated the cost of replacement of signs for East Plainfield. Ira Townsend continues his generous donation of signs for town roads.

John McNamara, Jr. and the highway crew have done a good job in caring for the highway equipment.

The Selectmen purchased a new mower, which has been working very well, for the Cemetery Department.

1985 Preview

The Selectmen plan to place a heavy emphasis in 1985 on the ditching of town roads and reduction of junk cars.

The Selectmen extend their sincere thanks to those town employees and citizens who have helped to administer the Town's business throughout the past year.

FINANCE COMMITTEE 1984 REPORT

The Committee met several times with the Selectmen to discuss expenditures and the Solid Waste Program.

Expenditures for the year amounted to 96% of the 1984 appropriations. The budget for 1985 shows a 5% decrease.

The Selectmen informed the Committee that the Town is spending \$8,000 to \$12,000 a year for backhoe rental and the equipment isn't always available when needed. A backhoe, fully equipped, will cost approximately \$55,000 and with proper maintenance has a life span of 20 years. The Committee recommends that rather than spending approximately \$10,000 a year for rental, a new backhoe be purchased.

ROAD AGENT REPORT

1984

In the past year our highway crew completely rebuilt the Camp Road Bridge; brought other bridges up in standard; gravelled many roads in Town with many more to go; and with the cooperation of the Enfield highway crew, together we did major repairs at the top of Methodist Hill Road.

1985

A good portion of the summer maintenance will be devoted to the Brook Road job. We will be widening some turns, doing tree and stump removal, and putting in new culverts where necessary.

We met with the Finance Committee to discuss the possibility of purchasing a backhoe. After much study, it was decided that purchasing this piece of equipment would be wiser than renting year after year. After 4 or 5 years of rental fees we could have owned a backhoe that has a life expectancy of 15 to 20 years.

Some advantages of owning: adds extended life of other equipment; saves time having equipment at either end of a job; takes a lot of road time off our loader; can be used winters loading sand; help in cleaning wet ditches where a grader cannot go; can be used to rebuild old stone headers, bridge headers and culvert extensons; and it would be equipped with a special bucket to do slope work and roadsides of which we will be doing a lot of in the future.

The disadvantages of owning: one more piece of equipment to maintain and the cost of insurance for the added equipment. The price wouldn't be a disadvantage because we must rent the backhoe each year.

The Salt Shed is needed so that the salt we purchase at \$34.00 per ton can be stored rather than dumped on the ground. We intend to increase the tonage and use a light amount on some of our heavier travelled roads. Thus, there will be less ice build-up on Bonner, Brook and Methodist Hill Roads.

The purchase of a new Broom is necessary since the old one is 20 years old, worn out, and outdated.

This year I felt strongly that you should know how much we need these items. This report was written for that purpose. If you have any further questions, please contact me and I will be glad to talk to you personally.

**REPORT OF REPRESENTATIVE
SARA M. TOWNSEND
REPRESENTATIVE TO THE
NEW HAMPSHIRE GENERAL COURT**

Since this was an "in-between" year as well as an election one, most of the action which went on in Concord pertained either to study of bills deemed too complicated to have passed in the regular session, or to election campaign workshops and the like.

The Executive Departments and Administration Committee, of which I am a member, spent many hours in coming up with reorganization legislation for the '85 session. I chaired the sub-committee on Education Dept. reorganization. We feel sure that there will be a great deal of local input before our proposed bill gets passed. There are some rather drastic proposals designed to bring a better functional and accountable alignment within the department as presently structured, plus, according to the new law on reorganization, bringing all actual control into the state government and Governor's office as in other departments, rather than under non-accountable state board consistives of appointed persons. We felt that there needed to be much more actual direction given to the local schools in many areas. Also, we recommend that the local school boards choose their own superintendents since they foot the total bill these days.

Another busy area of government concerned healthcare cost and containment and mental health reorganization. These issues will be aired in good time as they come forward in the legislative process. We are looking at creative ways to pay for state employees' health care and find that numerous states have gone to self-insurance with a third party as administrator, thus saving substantial monies.

County government is going to be a real problem, especially in Sullivan county with the union breathing down our necks. We have finally adopted a personnel pay scale program with steps and classification, but the union seems to want more. So, get your wallets out.

Elections saw 140 women elected to the New Hampshire General Court. Republicans have nearly 300 seats. I shall be serving as Majority Whip again, and with all those Republicans to communicate with, it will certainly not be dull!

Please call me (469-3313) whenever you have a problem I can help with. Thank you for your confidence in electing me once again.

WELFARE REPORT

In 1984 one family came to this office for assistance, we reimbursed the City of Merimack for a person who was our responsibility, and paid a bill in the Town of Windsor for a family.

Direct relief is provided by the town to needy persons and is administered by the overseer of welfare. You may call the town office or my home if you want further information. Generally, this assistance takes the form of payments for food, fuel and shelter of persons in time of need. Persons must make application in person to me and they can expect immediate response if need is indicated. Typically, the town assists persons who have undergone personal or family emergency such as severe illness, loss of employment without jobless benefits being available, death, loss of home through fire, etc. Also, the town is often called upon to provide direct relief to persons awaiting certification under categorical county and state welfare programs. Funds for direct relief are appropriated out of town tax revenues.

PHILIP READ MEMORIAL LIBRARY TRUSTEES REPORT

The year 1984 has brought many improvements and acquisitions to our library, made possible by the one-time distribution of accumulated trust-fund interest, memorial and other generous donations, and an unusually successful sale of books, most of them from one large collection.

Two paintings now hanging in the library are a gift of the estate of the late Lucia Read Bryant, a former trustee. A glass display case has been purchased in memory of Mrs. Bryant and Lori Schaffer. The cassette player in the Children's Room was replaced with a more serviceable model; and two cameras, furnished by the Polaroid Camera Loan Program, are available to borrowers.

Improved lighting was installed in the downstairs meeting room by Alex Cherington, and Bill Overman built new bookcases for the last remaining available space on the main floor. Road Agent John McNamara and his crew constructed a new asphalt walk to the front steps.

Our concern for the lack of space for expansion prompted us to have an evaluation made of our facility by our State Library Consultant. This report can be read at the library, and copies have been sent to the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council, Board of Selectmen, and Planning Board. In several meetings, the librarians and trustees of the Meriden and Philip Read Libraries prepared a joint Statement of Policy for the libraries of the Town of Plainfield. Copies of this document are on file at both libraries and with the Selectmen.

After two years of significant increases, circulation remained approximately the same as in 1983. Our book budget allowed for the purchase of 445 books, and 200 books were donated by library patrons. A children's encyclopedia was purchased and a subscription taken to a periodical index as a step toward meeting State Library Standards for an Associate Library. With the necessary funding, we expect to fulfill all requirements in this category in the next two years.

A well-attended book-discussion series of five programs, funded by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, was held in the late winter. Other adult programs included "Color Me Beautiful", "Holistic Approach to Diet", and "First Aid" given by members of the Cornish Rescue Squad.

The free movies for children continued on the second Friday afternoon of each month with a total of twenty-seven films shown in the twelve programs. The summer-reading program, "Read for the Gold", followed an Olympics theme as did the Fourth of July parade float. Alice Hendrick conducted three story hours for younger children, and the Upper Valley Humane Society presented a program on "Pet Care."

Librarian Nancy Norwalk attended five workshops and numerous State and Library Co-op meetings. With Trustees Alice Hendrick and Susan Woodward she took part in the two-day spring conference of the N.H. Library Association in New London; and she and Susan Woodward attended the N.H. Library Trustees Association meeting in Laconia.

The Friends of the Library, with the energetic leadership of Diane Rogers, produced the 1984 edition of the "Talent Night" show at the Plainfield Town Hall. The proceeds of this event and a food sale were used to reduce the loan outstanding on the Canon copier that the Friends purchased for the library.

We are grateful to Meriden Librarian Bettyann Dole and her trustees for the high degree of cooperation which exists between our two libraries and to the Reverend Hazel Roper for the special interest she took in our library. Our thanks go to the Selectmen for their consideration, to our patrons for their continuing support, and to all who gave so generously in many ways to our library in 1984.

Always deserving of special appreciation is our Librarian Nancy Norwalk, whose attention to library affairs extends far beyond her working hours.

1984 ANNUAL REPORT CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The commission met regularly on the second Thursday of each month except July and August and have had rather a quiet year.

We sponsored the annual clean-up day in April resulting in our roadsides being once again relatively free of the winters debris. Two students, Erich Riesch and Wade Hector, attended the Youth Conservation Camp under the auspices of the commission but we were unable to find an adult who was interested in the Conservation Training Camp. The tree planting at the Plainfield School involving the eighth grade and the master plan was carried out as usual.

A member of the commission attended a meeting on Farm Land Conservation. We also sent a delegate to the Annual Meeting of the N.H. Association of Conservation Commissions. At subsequent monthly meetings we heard reports of these meetings and discussed their relativity to Plainfield.

Since March, 1983, the recreation commission has sponsored several programs.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board meets regularly on the third Monday of each month in the Town Office starting at 7:00 pm. We welcome and encourage preliminary consultation with anyone concerning planning matters. 1984 has been a very busy, demanding and exciting year for all members of the Board. Throughout the year a total of ten lots were subdivided for the creation of thirty-one new lots. An additional four lots were reviewed for annexation. Five special meetings were conducted for such purposes as developing Master Plan Format and Surveys; acceptance of Zoning Change Petitions; and public hearings. The Board continues the policy of making recommendations on all Special Exceptions and Variances as requested by the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

Another activity and proven educational tool for the Board is attending the annual Municipal Law Lecture Series this past year. The Law Lecture Series dealt with topics such as recent developments in Municipal Law, Roads, and Development, Local Regulation of Condominium Development, and Municipal and Public Officials Liability. Lecturing attorneys relayed several recent court decisions demonstrating the need for major policy changes by local Planning Boards and updating of ordinances and regulations.

In lieu of these court decisions, the Board will be addressing such concerns as: disqualification of a member on the Planning Board when voting; final approval of subdivisions or plats needing compliance hearings to certify that conditions have been met or completed as requested by the Board; Planning Boards giving considerations to subdivisions and site approvals that access to and from a public highway (prior to this year it was believed that Planning Boards could not consider the safety aspects). Included in 1985's work schedule there will be changes and updates of Zoning Ordinances, Subdivision Regulations and Building Codes to comply with the 1983 Recodification of State Planning and Zoning Laws. 1986 is the deadline for implementation and adoptions by local Boards.

The largest portion of the Board's energy was expended on the updating and development of the Town's Master Plan. The project started with a consultation by the Planning Board and our regional Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council. The first step was completed by late summer which consisted of distributing a suitable questionnaire to all taxpayers of the town. From the 670 surveys mailed, 254 were returned with many interesting comments and results. After many hours of tabulation, the results were forwarded to Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council for analysis and review. Next came a public hearing to air and discuss the analysis for the survey and organize the working committees for the various chapters.

A total of eight committees will be meeting in early '85 to work on land use, population, housing, economic development, community facilities and services, transportation, open space and recreation, and historical resources. If anyone is interested in working on these committees and have been overlooked, please contact a board member. The Board would like to thank everyone who is contributing their time and effort in the development of our town's Master Plan.

Anyone can call the Headrest hotline, 448-4400, day or night, any day of the year. Our staff and volunteers are trained to respond to calls involving depression; suicide; child and spouse abuse; run aways; fuel emergencies, and questions, problems and crises involving the use of alcohol or other drugs. Our files contain listings for hundreds of individuals, groups, and agencies in the Upper Valley and we have pamphlets with information about consumer problems, tenants rights, health care issues and more. We provide phone numbers, information about services and can answer questions about many concerns. When appropriate we make referrals for counseling; financial or legal assistance, and for many other reasons. Headrest also can offer in-house substance abuse counseling; is an Alcohol Crisis Intervention site for the States of New Hampshire and Vermont; and provides emergency short-term lodging. Although our budget is increasing, this year Headrest again requests \$750.00, the same amount as last years allocation. **REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN
AND
STATE FOREST RANGER**

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for damage caused and subject to a \$1,000 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1,000 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.

PLAINFIELD VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT 1984

During the course of the last twelve months the Plainfield Volunteer Fire Department has answered a total of twenty-two alarms. This is a significant decrease from previous years. These alarms resulted in the following responses: 1 structure fire, 10 mutual aid calls (including Meriden), 5 chimney fires, and 6 other calls. The one structure fire at Bill Jenney's Northern New England Storage resulted in the injury of three Plainfield Firefighters, two for minor smoke inhalation and one for a laceration.

We want to take this opportunity to thank all of the other agencies and organizations who assisted at the fire involving Northern New England Storage's Building and evacuating those residents that were in danger of being exposed to the smoke from the fire. A special thanks to those who provided food and drink for those who worked so hard to control the emergency.

The department made several capital expenditures during the year from monies that have been raised from donations, bingo and other fund raisers. These purchases were:

1. O.S.H.A. and N.F.P.A. approved firefighting coats for all members at a cost of 3,554.95.
2. O.S.H.A. and N.F.P.A. approved boots to replace some non-approved boots at a cost of \$450.00
3. A used Mac CF series 1250 gallon a minute pumper with ladders, flood lights, other related equipment for a cost of \$35,000, delivery is to be taken in December.

The monies raised and appropriated by the Plainfield Fire Department were used to defray normal operating expenses such as fuel, insurances, utilities, and training. We also want to express our appreciation to the Ladies Auxiliary for their donations which purchased a high volume suction strainer and helped pay for insurances.

As always we are looking for persons over the age of eighteen years who are interested in a challenging past time and willing to commit to about ten hours a month to serve their community and perhaps save a home or a life some day.

I would like to extend my thanks to Emma Spalding, department members and the Ladies Auxiliary for their continued support on the Saturday night social.

Lastly, persons wishing to obtain burning permits can obtain them from either Deputy Warden G. Gardiner MacLeay or Warden Peter A. Berry.

SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES OF THE HAZARDOUS MATERIALS STUDY COMMITTEE

The hazardous materials study committee was formed after last year's town meeting in response to an Article submitted by Petition.

Publically announced meetings were held on July 23, September 10, and November 19. In addition several informal meetings and discussions were held. The tasks which emerged from the group's activities were to study: 1) what dangers if any does the town face from hazardous materials, 2) what resources are available in the event of an accident involving hazardous materials, 3) what legislation covers the production, use and transport of hazardous materials, and 4), what if anything should the committee recommend to the town to better protect our health and environment from damage by hazardous materials.

Contacts were made with several organizations including the NH Bureau of Hazardous Waste Management, NH Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission, Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Planning Council, Metropolitan Planning Council (Boxton MA), and a citizen's group from So. Strafford VT which developed and passed a resolution to stop the transportation of nuclear waste through their town.

Findings, Conclusions, and Recommendations

It is our evaluation that the most serious threat to public health posed by hazardous materials in our community are underground fuel storage tanks. New Hampshire is currently drafting legislation on this issue, and we are holding this important matter for further study pending the fate of this legislation.

There is legislation at the state level regulating the production, disposal, and transportation of hazardous materials. Hazardous waste storage facilities require a permit from the state. Producers of hazardous materials above certain levels must register with the state, must use only licensed transportation and disposal facilities, and must assume legal responsibility for the eventual safe disposal of all waste it produces. Presently Plainfield has no waste producers which have registered under these regulations, though there are at least 17 in the Upper Valley. Producers under the levels requiring registration must ensure delivery of their waste to a licensed hazardous waste facility. It is the impression of our group that funds to enforce regulations on waste production and transport are minimal. Similarly the availability of personnel trained to respond to an emergency involving hazardous materials seems barely adequate (2 officers state wide).

The town of Plainfield has no ordinances specifically governing hazardous wastes to our knowledge. We recommend that the town zoning board, in consultation with the town health officer, consider a zoning amendment which would put storage of hazardous waste at levels requiring a state permit, production of hazardous waste at levels requiring registration with the state, and production or storage of radioactive materials (exclusive of smoke-alarms and other non-regulated household items), on the special exception list. The requirement for a special exception, and the associated public hearing, would bring to the attention of the town citizens and officials the safety plans and disposal practices proposed by a potential producer of hazardous materials. In the event that a special exception were granted to an organization producing hazardous materials, the town health officer should play an active role in maintaining up to date verification of safe operating practices.

We call resident's attention to a household hazardous waste collection day organized by the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council to be held on May 4 (pickup location to be announced). Finally we alert residents that a more complete report of our activities is on file and available upon request at the town office. This report includes definitions and state and federal regulations which

would be helpful in formulating a zoning amendment, recommendations for alternatives to hazardous or toxic materials commonly used around the home, preferred disposal methods for hazardous materials, and sources of further information.

SULLIVAN COUNTY REGIONAL REFUSE DISPOSAL DISTRICT

1984 Annual Report Of Activities

After experiencing a number of setbacks early in the year which created delays and significant changes from previous plans, the District, together with the Southern Windsor/Windham Counties Solid Waste Management District and Clark-Kenith, is now approaching a bond sale and subsequent construction of a waste-to-energy facility.

During January Keene decided not to join the Sullivan County District and a Federal Urban Development Action Grant application was turned down. At a Joint Meeting with the Southern Windsor/Windham Counties District in February the District Committee decided to request a new proposal from Clark-Kenith and a competitive proposal from Vicon Recovery Systems for a smaller facility more closely matching the quantity of waste available from existing District towns.

The decision to request new proposals gave the Districts time to investigate other sites in Claremont that would be more acceptable to the residents of Claremont. The Claremont City Council agreed to support a site located in an area zoned for industry in southwest Claremont, east of the Joy Foundry. Revisions to the environmental impact assessment were subsequently made, with the City splitting the costs of the assessment and other site investigations with the Districts.

Clark-Kenith and Vicon Recovery Systems submitted bid construction costs and operating proposals to the Districts during May. Differences in projected disposal costs were less than two dollars per ton. Clark-Kenith remained the preferred vendor because of their technology and financial strength, and the uncertainties associated with beginning negotiations with Vicon.

On September 29, 1984 the District signed a long-term 20 year waste disposal agreement with Clark-Kenith for the financing, construction and operation of a 200 ton per day facility. An option to purchase 51 acres of land at the new location was also signed during September.

Lazard Freres and Company, investment bankers for Clark-Kenith, are now in the final stages of preparing a 28 million dollar industrial revenue bond sale through the New Hampshire Industrial Development Authority. Prior to closing on the bonds an equity commitment agreement must be signed which will provide for the sale of the facility to a private investor at the end of construction. The sale, together with the expected retirement of certain contingency funds and bond reserve funds will leave approximately 16 million dollars in outstanding bonds which must be retired during the 20 year operating period.

The present schedule calls for finalizing an agreement with Signal Resco, the expected equity owner, by March, 1985. Construction will begin immediately thereafter, with operation expected early in 1987.

UPPER VALLEY - LAKE SUNAPEE COUNCIL

The Council has been busy working on a variety of regional programs during the past year. The following is a brief summary of some of our regional activities:- provided administrative and planning services to the Upper Valley Solid Waste District, a bi-state district with 15 member communities; developed regional septage management plans which will become components of the solid waste plans for the Sullivan County, Upper Valley and Pemi-Baker Solid Waste Districts; prepared a regional transportation development plan and participated on regional transportation advisory committees (Lebanon Regional Airport, Advance Transit); continued the regional historic preservation program, including historic surveys, national register nominations and historic preservation plans; established the Sullivan County Economic Development Program to retain and expand employment opportunities in Sullivan County; completed phase one of the Lake Sunapee Management Plan, including survey of all properties around the lake; co-sponsored a successful Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day, groundwater protection seminar and Municipal Law Lecture Series; provided economic, population, housing and other data to communities, organizations, banks, real estate firms and consultants for use in fiscal studies, market analyses and grant applications.

Over the past year, the UVLSC has also provided a number of services directly to Plainfield. The Council is working with the Town to draft its first Master Plan. During the Summer, a Community Attitude Survey was developed with the Council's assistance, and was distributed to Plainfield residents and property owners. An analysis of the survey was written by the Council and presented at a public meeting in January. Individuals on our staff have begun to work with groups of citizens to draft sections of the Plan, and will present sections of the Plan at public meetings.

Our historic preservation specialist, Lisa Mausolf, prepared a successful nomination for the Plainfield Town Hall to the National Register and supervised a windshield survey of Plainfield's historic resources.

The Council's staff of professionals stands ready to assist your community in addressing the planning and growth management issues which you will face during the coming year. We also encourage you to become more familiar and involved with the Council, since we are essentially an arm of local government addressing your needs.

PLAINFIELD VILLAGE WATER DISTRICT 1985 ANNUAL REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS

TO THE LEGAL VOTERS OF THE PLAINFIELD VILLAGE WATER DISTRICT.

1984 was a better than average year for the District. All of our 97 subscribers are to be commended on their conservation efforts. Our small system pumped an average of 100,000 gallons per week. Only one minor leak was discovered, and it was promptly repaired. Several times throughout the year, low water pressure was experienced; this caused some turbidity, but no cause for alarm.

Our water is tested on a regular basis and has always been of the best quality.

We have done some testing at the existing well and are presently studying recommendations on how to improve on the quantity of water available.

We would like to thank all the subscribers for their responses to the financial survey that was conducted. Unfortunately, its result showed that we were not eligible for State or Federal funding. However, we still feel we will be able to accomplish some improvements to the system this coming year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

In January the current session of the New Hampshire Legislature began. This will be an important session for public education because of state-wide concerns about both the quality and funding of our schools.

In the past the issues of quality and funding have been obscured by the emotional issues of broad-based sales or income taxes. There are serious efforts by many legislators this session to eliminate the broad-base tax issue and concentrate, instead, on a more equitable distribution of funds currently available within the state. This has great significance for a relatively poor school district such as ours.

Lacking a large industrial or commercial tax base, you the property owners of Plainfield are shouldering a tremendous load in paying for a very basic educational program. Our Constitution acknowledges that education is a state responsibility and only through state aid to education will your tax burden be limited. I urge each of you to contact representatives to the legislature to ask for their support for legislation being proposed which will combine a variety of state aids and distribute them more equitably to the school districts of the state.

Instruction

The addition of the kindergarten program authorized by last year's Annual District Meeting has contributed significantly to the quality of early childhood education in Plainfield. Thanks to the hard work and generosity of both citizens and staff, the program began smoothly and now functions as if it were always a part of our school.

At the other end of the instructional program, the opportunity for our junior high age students to study algebra and foreign languages at KUA is a great contribution to our program. The cooperation between KUA and both the town and school district is unusual in smaller communities around the state. Credit must be given to all those both at KUA and in the community who have worked so hard to develop trust, respect and common goals.

Facilities

The new addition and entrance way have worked out well. The addition provides useful instructional space for our resource teachers. The new entrance way, in conjunction with energy conservation work done on the roof, is paying off in lower energy costs and greater comfort.

Personnel

As a community you can be justifiably proud of your school, its staff, and its students. Special recognition must go to Joan Garipay whose leadership as principal continues to draw the school and its programs together toward the goal of excellence. Special thanks must go to the Jane Cook Trust whose generosity provided bonuses shared by the staff in recognition of their service to the children of Plainfield. This recognition of the resourcefulness and dedication that characterizes the staff at the Plainfield School is one of many indicators of its success.

At a legal meeting of the voters of the School District of the Town of Plainfield, Moderator Stephen H. Taylor, called the meeting to order at two o'clock in the afternoon of March 10, 1984 at the Plainfield School, in the Village of Meriden, in said Plainfield.

ARTICLE I. The following resolution was presented, moved and seconded it be adopted. Resolved: That the reports of Officers, Agents and Auditors be accepted as printed in the Annual School Report. The vote by voice was in the affirmative and it was so declared by the Moderator.

ARTICLE II. The following resolution was presented, moved and seconded it be adopted. Resolved: That the District vote to raise, appropriate and expend the sum of \$14,900.00 for construction of an additional instructional space at the entry way of the Plainfield Elementary School. The motion and second were withdrawn. A new motion made and seconded to move to Article III and then return to Article II - Vote by voice was in the affirmative and it was so declared by the Moderator.

ARTICLE III. The following resolution was presented, moved and seconded it be adopted. Resolved: That the District vote to raise, appropriate and expend the sum of \$20,060.00 to staff, equip, and operate a kindergarten program at the Plainfield Elementary School. The vote on the resolution was taken by paper ballot resulting in 165 Yes and 85 No. The vote was in the affirmative and it was so declared by the Moderator.

ARTICLE II. The following resolution was presented, moved and seconded it be adopted. Resolved: That the District vote to raise, appropriate and expend the sum of \$14,900.00 for construction of an additional instructional space at the entry way of the Plainfield Elementary School. The vote was taken as a standing vote resulting in 144 Yes and 18 No. The vote was in the affirmative and it was so declared by the Moderator.

ARTICLE IV. The following resolution was presented, moved and seconded it be adopted. Resolved: That the District vote to raise, appropriate and expend the sum of \$995,052.00 for the support of the school, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the statutory obligations of said District and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from state and federal governments, together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance to be raised by taxation.

Note: This sum represents the proposed budget of \$920,092.00 plus \$14,900.00 for the construction of an additional instructional space at the entry way of the Plainfield School as authorized by District vote under Article II plus \$20,060.00 to staff, equip, and operate a kindergarten program at the Plainfield Elementary School as authorized by District vote under Article III.

The vote was taken as a standing vote with a tally of 122 Yes and 9 No. The vote was in the affirmative and it was so declared by the Moderator.

ARTICLE V. The following resolution was presented, moved and seconded it be adopted. Resolved: That the District vote to authorize the School Board to make application for, to accept on behalf of the District, and to expend for the purpose intended, any or all grants or other funds which may now or the State of New Hampshire, or from private foundations, trusts or individuals. The vote by voice was in the affirmative and it was so declared by the Moderator.

ARTICLE VI. Other business transacted:

A Resolution in Recognition of Service of Stephen A. Beaupre from the Plainfield School District and Administration was presented to Stephen A. Beaupre in appreciation for the time, dedication, and effort he expended as School Principal.

A motion was made and seconded to thank Kimball Union Academy and the anonymous donor for the \$7,000.00 in pledges the Plainfield School District received towards the building construction for the new Kindergarten.

A moment of silence was held in sympathy for The Richard Clark and Harold Clark families.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was made and seconded and a vote by voice was in the affirmative. The Moderator adjourned the meeting at 5:30 P.M.

1983-84 Principal's Report

Two major events highlighted the 1983-84 school year: The construction of a new playground and the approval of a kindergarten program to begin in the 84-85 school year. Each of these projects required the commitment of time, energy, and resources from the community.

The new playground was constructed on a rainy, muddy Saturday in May with over 130 volunteers from the school and community. The playground was named and christened by the students at a later ceremony. The new equipment, made from recycled tires, has proven to be popular with the students and is put to maximum use during non-school hours.

Building on the efforts of others from previous years, parents and staff were successful in articulating to the community the need for a district supported kindergarten program. By the end of the year, thirty students had been registered for the first class and a teacher had been selected by a committee of parents and school staff.

Kimball Union Academy was especially generous in its support of the Plainfield School. They donated food and grills for the noon meal on the day of the playground construction. They gave money in support of the Kindergarten program. They opened their algebra classes to three advanced eighth grade math students. They allowed the school weekly use of the KUA skating rink and swimming pool during the winter months. In further discussions with KUA officials, they have indicated their desire to continue and to expand their support of education for Plainfield students.

Last spring Anne Schelewa resigned her position as part-time custodian. She is to be thanked for her many years of dedicated service to the school. It is this dedication of staff and support of the community that characterize the Plainfield School.

School Nurse's Health Report

Recorded visits to the nurse's office during the 1983-84 school year totaled eight hundred and eighty. Six hundred and fifteen students received treatment for minor ailments, while thirty-eight were referred to their parents and their own physicians for further medical follow-up.

Dental, vision, hearing, weight, height and posture screenings were performed on all students. Parents were notified of any abnormal findings. With the excellent cooperation of the parents we made it through another year with only a few cases of pediculus capitis (head lice), and I want to thank all parents for reporting promptly any cases. The school population had thirty-four cases of chicken pox reported to the nurse during the year.

Pre-school registration with the screening of all kindergarten and incoming first graders was held at the Meriden Public Library. Immunization records were reviewed at this time and parents were expected to have required physical examinations and incomplete immunizations given before the opening of the 1984-85 school year.

Student health records were once more updated and all immunization records checked. Conferences related to health were held frequently with teachers, students and parents throughout the entire year. Health education in dental care, nutrition, personal hygiene, growth and development and human sexuality continues with the cooperation of classroom teachers and other professional volunteers.
