THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at 10 A.M. in the forenoon for the balloting of town officers, and at 7:30 P.M. of the same day to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a town clerk, one selectman for three years and all other town officers elected by ballot.
- Article 2. To see what action the town wishes to take upon the figures submitted and recommended by the budget committee.
- Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the following town expenditures for the ensuing year:
 - a. Town officers salaries.
 - b. Town officers expenses.
 - c. Election and registration.
 - d. Town Hall and other buildings.
 - e. Parks and playgrounds.
 - f. Legal fees and vital statistics.
 - g. Insurance.
 - h. Employees retirement and social security.
 - i. Interest on temporary loans.
 - j. Memorial Day.
 - k. Town dump.
 - l. Street lighting.

- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for snow removal, salting and sanding.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for highway oiling, and general maintenance.
- Article 6. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$338.79 to which the State will contribute \$2,258.61 if voted and accepted, for the construction and maintenance of Class 5 roads.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on property taxes, paid on or before dates designated at this meeting.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the support of the fire department.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to elect a fire chief and two deputy chiefs annually, said men to have at least five years service with the Troy Fire Department. If so voted, these fire officials will replace the present board of firewards effective with the town meeting of 1964.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to ratify, approve and confirm the action of our Fire Department in joining our Town to the Southwestern New Hampshire District Fire Mutual Aid System in 1958, and in agreeing that our Fire Department may give and receive outside aid as provided in RSA 154 as amended.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to engage the services of the State Tax Commission in assessing additional properties not covered in the total revaluation of the town, also to review property not completed on the last survey. Providing the town shall vote for the passage of this article, the Selectmen advocate that this be done each year.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the police department.

- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the maintenance and operation of the water department.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for payment of water bonds and interest on same.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$354.78 (six cents per \$1,000.00 of the Town's equalized valuation) to the Monadnock Region Association.
- Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the employment of a district nurse.
- Article 17. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,099.00 as its share of the operating cost of Elliot Community Hospital.
- Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the continuation of the War Memorial Program.
- Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the support of the Gay-Kimball Library.
- Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and improvement of cemeteries.
- Article 21. To see if the town will vote to rescind the vote taken at last year's town meeting relative to the Town owned Farrar Lot so-called on the Marlboro Road, and vote to transfer this land to the cemetery committee, to be held in escrow by the cemetery committee. Until the time that the cemetery committee feels that this land is needed for cemetery purposes, the use of the land shall be in their jurisdiction as to sport events, etc., but no use shall be made of the land that will change its present status, such as buildings, etc.
- Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for Public Welfare.

Atricle 23. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money to pay town charges.

Article 24. To hear the reports of agents, officers or committees heretofore chosen, and take any action relating thereto.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the following zoning ordinance:

ZONING ORDINANCE

To promote the health, safety convenience and general welfare of the community; to protect and conserve the value of property and the economic welfare of the citizens of the town of Troy and to promote the preservation of the rural aspect of the community, all so that the community may grow in an orderly manner, the following ordinance is hereby enacted by the voters of said town of Troy pursuant to the authority conferred by the Revised Laws of the State of New Hampshire.

SECTION 1. Establishment of Districts.

For the purpose of this ordinance, the town of Troy is divided into three districts as shown on the official zoning map dated March 12, 1963 and filed in the office of the Selectmen:

- A. Residence Districts
- B. Business Districts
- C. General Districts

SECTION II. Residence District Uses.

- A. In residence districts no buildings or premises shall be erected, altered or used and no land shall be used for any purpose except:
 - 1. single family detached houses
 - 2. boarding or lodging houses
 - 3. houses containing two apartments
 - 4. churches
 - 5. public schools or public buildings
 - 6. private schools
 - 7. farms and truck or home gardens or greenhouses, excluding any use injurious, noxious or offensive to the

- neighborhood, but including the sale of produce raised on the premises.
- 8. such accessory uses as are customary in connection with the foregoing uses and are incidental thereto, but not including any business. Accessory uses may include the practice of a profession within the premises in which the practitioner resides and also dress-making, millinery and similar home occupations not conducted as a regular business.
- 9. town and highway directional and regulatory signs, historic signs and signs used to advertise the profession of the owner or occupant of the property on which placed provided that no sign or group of signs shall exceed a total of twelve (12) square feet, outside dimension, and none shall be placed so as to obstruct the view on the highway.

B. Uses not permitted.

- 1. No house trailer or mobile home used or intended to be used for living or sleeping purposes shall be permitted in this district.
- 2. No land in this district shall be used for a dump or for storage of abandoned vehicles or parts thereof, junk, scrap paper, rags or discarded material of any kind, nor used in any manner that is disorderly, unsightly, noxious or detrimental to the public or prejudicial to the general welfare.
- 3. No land in this district shall be used for a so-called gravel bank nor shall any part of the top soil or sub-soil be removed from any part of the premises in this district except in connection with construction undertaken on such premises.

SECTION III. Business District Uses.

- A. In business districts, no building or premises shall be erected, altered or used and no land shall be used for any purpose except:
 - 1. any use permitted in a residence district, subject to the same restrictions as apply to such uses in a residence district.
 - 2. restaurants or other eating places.

- 3. wholesale or retail stores, sales stores for trade or shops for custom work or for the making of articles to be sold at retail on the premises.
- 4. business or professional offices, banks and the conduct of similar professional or business enterprises.
- 5. commercial amusement places including theatres, bowling alleys, skating rinks, billiard rooms, dance halls and places of similar indoor recreation.
- 6. such accessory uses as are customary in connection with the foregoing uses and are incidental thereto. Accessory uses shall not include the deposit or placing outside of any building any waste, refuse or ashes or the storage or parking of any motor vehicles except as such use is specifically approved by and subject to the restrictions required by the Board of Adjustment.
- B. Uses permitted by special exception.
 - 1. Garages for the storage or repair of motor vehicles; gasoline and oil filling stations, subject to such restrictions as the Board of Adjustment shall require for the orderly and safe conduct of such uses.
 - 2. Such industrial and manufacturing uses as are not injurious, noxious, offensive or otherwise objectionable or hazardous to the community and subject to such restrictions as the Board of Adjustment shall require for the orderly and safe conduct of such uses but in no event shall the structure to be so used exceed three stories in height nor forty (40) feet in height, and no structure shall be erected, altered or used for such use within ten (10) feet of the sides of the lot nor within thirty (30) feet of the property lines bordering a street.
- C. Uses not permitted.
 - 1. No land in this district shall be used for a dump or for storage of abandoned vehicles or parts thereof, junk, scrap paper, rags or discarded material of any kind, nor used in any manner that is disorderly, unsightly, noxious or detrimental to the public or prejudicial to the general welfare.

2. No land in this district shall be used for a so-called gravel bank nor shall any part of the top soil or subsoil be removed from any part of the premises in this district except in connection with construction undertaken on such premises.

SECTION IV. General District Uses.

A. In a general district there shall be no restriction on the use of any building erected, altered or used thereon nor on the use of land except that on such parts of the following highways as fall within a general district: (list)

- 1. No land shall be used for a dump or for the storage of abandoned vehicles, or parts thereof, junk, scrap paper, rags or discarded material of any kind, nor used in any manner that is disorderly, unsightly, noxious or detrimental to the public or general welfare.
- 2. no land shall be used to a depth of seven hundred fifty (750) feet from the center line of any such public highway for a so-called gravel bank, nor shall any part of the top soil or sub-soil be removed from any such premises except in connection with construction undertaken upon the premises.
- 3. no land shall be used for a housetrailer or mobile home used or intended to be used for living or sleeping purposes except as otherwise provided by other ordinances adopted by the Town.

SECTION V. General Restrictions Applicable to All Districts.

1. Minimum Building Area.

Every dwelling house erected in the town of Troy shall have a minimum ground floor area of six hundred (600) square feet, outside dimension, for each family unit.

2. Construction Permits.

Plans for such new dwelling houses or plans for such existing buildings as are proposed to be altered or utilized for dwelling houses shall be submitted to the Board of Adjustment before the beginning of the work or before utilization as a dwelling house and no

such buildings shall be erected or utilized except with the approval in writing of the Board of Adjustment.

3. Sanitation Standards.

Every dwelling house hereafter erected in the town of Troy shall be provided with the following sanitation and sewage facilities:

- A. at least one flush type toilet;
- B. at least one septic tank or other device performing a similar function having a minimum cacacity of three hundred (300) gallons;
- C. adequate provision for the drainage and distribution, underground or in another inoffensive manner, of septic tank overflow;
- D. installation of septic tank sewage and drainage systems must be so located so as not to contaminate any drinking water facilities or to be the cause or contributing cause for the pollution of any stream, brook, river or pond.

4. Chimney Standards.

All chimneys within the town of Troy shall be constructed of stone, brick or cement or cinder blocks to the ground; each shall be lined with tile and extend at least two feet above the roof to which it belongs and shall have a clean-out opening at the base. All entrances to chimneys shall be of fireproof construction. Prefabricated chimneys approved by U. S. testing laboratories may be used. Chimneys shall not be used to support beams or timbers in any manner. No smoke pipe shall be installed so as to be within twelve (12) inches of any combustible floor or ceiling unless amply protected by non-combustible material. No smoke pipe shall be installed which passes into or through partitions or walls of combustible materials except when guarded by a double collar of material with an air space of at least five inches or by at least five inches of brick or other non-combustible material between the pipe and any combustible material.

5. Foundation and Footing Standards.

Every dwelling house erected in the town of Troy shall be placed on a permanent type approved foundation, consisting of concrete footings constructed below the level of frost, and foundation walls constructed of concrete, cinder block or cement block, brick, stone or other approved permanent masonry material.

6. Area Frontage and Yard Requirements.

- A. The minimum lot area per dwelling unit shall be ten thousand (10,000) square feet or eight thousand (8,000) square feet per family unit, whichever is greater.
 - B. Every lot shall have a minimum frontage of seventy-five (75) feet.
 - C. There shall be a front yard on each lot at least twenty-five (25) feet in depth between the buildings and the front lot line, extending the full width of the lot, or in case of a corner lot extending along all street front lot lines.
 - D. There shall be a rear yard on each lot which shall be not less than forty (40) feet in depth between the buildings thereon and the rear lot line, extending the full width of the lot.
 - E. There shall be a side yard on each lot which shall be not less than twenty (20) feet in width between the buildings thereon and the side lot line, extending from the front yard to the rear yard. Any yard area not qualifying as a rear yard or a front yard shall be deemed a side yard.

7. Maximum Building Height.

No residential building shall be constructed in excess of thirty (30) feet in height.

8. Abandoned Buildings.

Whenever any building, the use of which has been abandoned or neglected for a period of three years, has been allowed to become in such condition as to cause it to become injurious, noxious or offensive to the neighborhood or which, by reason of such abandonment or neglect, shall, in the opinion of

the Board of Adjustment, constitute a hazard to the welfare of the community and its inhabitants, it may be razed at the expenses of the town by joint order of the Board of Adjustment and Selectmen.

9. New Development.

A. Permit.

Any owner of any plot of ground intended for development or sub-division into building lots shall file with the Planning Board a plan or map of the proposed sub-division and shall obtain the approval of the Planning Board thereon before proceeding with the development or sale of lots in said sub-division.

B. Street Width.

All new developments shall provide for rights of way fifty (50) feet in width.

C. Duties of Planning Board.

It shall be the duty of the Planning Board to inspect the site of such proposed sub-division and to require such roadways and other areas for common use as will eventually be acceptable by the town and to approve the same when satisfied that such proposed plans are in harmony with and conducive to the general welfare of the town and the neighborhood, but in no sense shall this approval be deemed acceptance by the town of the street or streets.

SECTION VI. Non-conforming Uses.

A. Continuance.

Any use of land or buildings, lawful at the time of the adoption of this ordinance, may be continued, although such use does not conform to the provisions of this ordinance.

B. Alteration.

Any building used as a non-conforming use may be structurally altered or the use therof may be changed provided that such structural alterations or changes in use are not more detrimental to the character of the district in which it is located than was the non-conforming use.

C. Restoration.

In the event any building occupied for a non-conforming use is destroyed or damaged by fire or other casualty, in whole or in part, it may be repaired or replaced by a building to be used for the same purpose as the one destroyed or damaged, provided that such reconstruction or repaired building shall not exceed the cubic content of the original building by more than 25%.

D. Extension.

No non-conforming use shall be extended or enlarged beyond the area occupied by such non-conforming use on the date of the adoption of this ordinance.

E. Discontinuance.

Whenever an existing non-conforming use is or becomes discontinued or abandoned for a continuous period of one year, any subsequent use shall conform with the terms of this ordinance.

SECTION VII. Board of Adjustment.

A. Appointment and Election.

The Selectmen shall make the initial appointment of the Board of Adjustment of five members, one for a term of five years, one for a term of four years, one for a term of three years, one for a term of two years and one for a term of one year. The term of each member shall terminate as of the date of annual town meeting. Each member shall serve without compensation and until his successor is elected. Thereafter upon expiration of the term of any member of said Board, his successor shall be elected at town meeting for a term of five years.

B. Duties.

The Board shall have authority to allow variances from the specific terms of this ordinance in cases in which the specific terms of this ordinance would result in unnecessary hardship, but when an objection to such variance is raised by a majority of the families residing or owning property within a radius of five hundred (500) feet of the property in question, the Board shall hold a public hearing to receive evidence on both sides and shall have authority to decide whether or not a permit shall be issued.

SECTION VIII. Penalties.

Whoever violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of Ten (\$10.00) Dollars for each day of such violation.

SECTION IX. Enforcement.

Upon any well-founded information that this ordinance is being violated, the Board of Adjustment shall on their own initiative, take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION X. Validity.

The invalidity of any section or provision of this ordinance shall not invalidate any other section or provision hereof. SECTION XI. Amendment.

The provisions of this ordinance may be amended or changed at any regular or special town meeting by a majority of the voters present as provided by law.

SECTION XII. Effective Date.

This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to adopt the following Mobile Home Park Ordinance:

Mobile Home Park Ordinance

SECTION I. Construction Permit.

- A. It shall be unlawful for any person to construct or establish a mobile home park within the limits of the town of Troy who does not possess a permit as set forth in this ordinance.
- B. Application for such permit shall be made in writing to the Zoning Board of Adjustment and shall state the location of the proposed mobile home park and its legal description, the approximate number of mobile homes, the probable duration of the use as such, the proposed water supply for such park, the

proposed method of sewage, waste and garbage disposal, the proposed lighting system, the names and addresses of all persons having a legal interest in said mobile home park, and shall include a copy or copies of a plan of the proposed park containing such information.

- C. No permit for the construction of such park shall be granted by the Zoning Board of Adjustment unless the plans for such proposed park provide:
 - 1. a completed area for at least twelve (12) mobile homes;
 - 2. a minimum area of 5,000 square feet for each mobile home so laid out that there shall be a minimum distance of forty (40) feet between each mobile home and any other mobile home in the proposed park;
 - 3. separate service for each mobile home in the proposed park for water, electricity and sewage disposal;
 - 4. a minimum distance of one hundred (100) feet between each mobile home in the proposed park and any public highway;
 - 5. the entire proposed park be situated in a general district;
 - 6. the sanitary laws and regulations of the State of New Hampshire Department of Health in force at the time the permit for construction is submitted be compiled with to the extent that such laws and regulations do not conflict with the provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION II. Operation Permit.

No mobile home shall be permitted in a mobile home park constructed as above required, nor shall a mobile home park be maintained or operated until a permit for the operation of such park has been obtained from the Selectmen. The Selectmen shall not grant such permit to operate unless a mobile home park has been constructed in complete compliance with the terms of the construction permit. A permit to operate a mobile home park shall be valid for

a period of one year from the date thereof subject to prior revocation by the Selectmen, if such mobile home park has not been operated in complete compliance with the terms of this ordinance and with the terms of the sanitary laws and regulations of the State of New Hampshire Department of Health.

SECTION III. Definitions.

- A. A mobile home is a home which is mobile and is equipped with running water, sanitary facilities, bath facilities and a toilet.
- B. A mobile home park is land upon which one or more mobile homes are parked or occupied for living purposes, regardless of whether or not a charge is made for such accommodations.

SECTION IV. Location Outside Parks.

It shall be unlawful for any person to park a mobile home or trailer on any street or highway or other public place or on any tract of land within the town of Troy except as provided in this ordinance.

SECTION V. Penalties.

Whoever violates any provision of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of Ten (\$10.00) Dollars for each day of such violation.

SECTION VI. Enforcement.

Upon any well founded information that this ordinance is being violated, the Board of Adjustment shall on their own initiative take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION VII. Validity.

The invalidity of any section or provision of this ordinance shall not invalidate any other section or provision hereof. SECTION VIII. Amendment.

The provisions of this ordinance may be amended or changed at any regular or special town meeting by a majority of the voters present as provided by law.

SECTION IX. Effective Date

This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to appoint a five member board of Adjustment in

accordance with the provisions of Chapter 31 RSA., the members appointed shall be for terms of five, four, three, two and one year respectively, with one member to be elected each year starting with the Annual Town Meeting of 1964, for terms of five years.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to adopt the following ordinance: Town Dump: It shall be unlawful to place or have placed in the town dump bulky, unburnable materials, such as, auto bodies, stoves, refrigerators and similar products. Tree trimmers or tree surgeons shall first obtain permission from the dump custodian before dumping quantities of brush etc. It shall also be unlawful to dump any animal or human excrement on the premises. The custodian shall have the power of enforcing any of the above provisions. Anyone found in violation of these provisions shall be fined a sum not to exceed \$25.00 for each violation,

REPORT OF THE FIREWARDS 1962

During the year 1962, we had twenty-eight calls as follows:

- 8 General Alarms
- 4 Chimney Fires
- 4 False Alarms
- 4 Town Dump Calls
- 5 Grass Fires
- 3 Car or Truck Fires

We are pleased with the results, so far, of the Fire Mutual Aid Alarm System. It simplifies the reporting of a fire

from that of the Red Network System, and the Mutual Aid Center is manned twenty-four hours a day.

The present call number we have with the Mutual Aid System is 5-2-1, and in a short time we anticipate having four or five additional calls to alert our Fire Department as to what type of fire it is.

This Mutual Aid System is less expensive than our former Red Network Call System.

Many of our firemen have taken classes in the art of mastering the Scott-Air-Pack which will be a credit to our department and all those concerned.

Again this year we want to extend sincere thanks and appreciation to the Troy Mills, Inc., for their interest and continued servicing of the fire alarm system. We also appreciate the fine help from the members of the Red Network.

We feel that out equipment is in very good condition, and serviceable without any major repairs or additional equipment needed.

Our sincere thanks to all members of the Fire Department for their continued efforts and support.

For the coming year, we are asking for an appropriation of \$2,500.00.

Preventing Forest Fires Is Our Responsibility

Cost of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such firest for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

- 1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
- 2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
- 3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
- 4. Have something to keep the fire under control pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
- 5. Besure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
- 6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never to early for parents to install in the child's mind a respect for fire.
