TOWN MEETING WEARE, N. H. - MARCH 8, 1960

Meeting called to order at 10:00 A.M. by the Moderator, Scott F. Eastman. Voted to close polls at 10:00 P.M. Voted to dispense with the feading of the warrant at this time.

Article 1: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Before action was taken on this article, Franklin Flanders paid fitting tribute to Charles F. Eastman and Samuel D. Chase, both having served the town in various capacities and a moment of silence was observed in their memory.

Upon motion of Albert Farmer, it was voted to raise and appropriate \$16,500 to defray town charges, A-Q.

Article 3: To make provision for the collection of taxes.

Upon a motion by Peter Hooper, it was moved and supported that the collection of taxes be left with the selectmen.

Article 4: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes; said loans to be payable from taxes for the year 1960, and to issue notes therefor, in the name of the Town, at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.

It was moved by Howard Ineson and supported that this article be accepted as read. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 5: To see if the town will allow a discount on taxes.

Upon a motion by Harold Flanders it was moved and supported to dismiss the article by a standing vote:

YES: 88 NO: 43

Article 6: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges, and take any other vote in relation thereto.

The recommendation of the Finance Committee was \$14,000.

A motion by Harold Flanders to raise and appropriate \$18,000 was supported and after some discussion was carried with the vote in the affirmative.

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,674.20 to be used with the sum of \$11,161.36 to be furnished by the State, for Class IV and Class V construction, Reconstruction, and Betterment Aid.

The Finance Committee recommended adoption of this article.

Howard Ineson moved adoption of this article as read. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 8: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Police Department.

After a recommendation by the Finance Committee for \$700, Gordon Russell so moved and the vote was in the affirmative.

Article 9: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Volunteer Fire Department.

The recommendation by the Finance Committee was \$3500.

Wilder D. Tenney, Jr., moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4000.

After discussion on this article, the vote was in the affirmative.

Article 10: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of water holes.

The Finance Committee recommended \$100.

A motion by George Nichols to raise and appropriate \$100 was amended to \$300 as discussion brought requests to clean out several water holes with a clam shell digger. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 11: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of neglected cemeteries.

After a recommendation of \$500 by the Finance Committee, upon a motion by Gordon Traver, it was voted to raise and appropriate \$500 for the care of neglected cemeteries.

Article 12: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for band concerts.

Upon a motion by Howard Ineson, it was voted to raise and appropriate \$300 for band concerts.

Article 13: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Library.

The Finance Committee recommended \$250. A motion by Bernard Phelps, Jr., was made to raise and appropriate \$250. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 14: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

The Finance Committee recommended \$200. Gordon Russell so moved and the vote was in the affirmative.

Article 15: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense.

The Finance Committee recommended \$200. A motion by George Welch to raise and appropriate \$200 was voted in the affirmative after some discussion revealed much needed material could be obtained through Civil Defense at reduced prices.

Article 16: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$231 for the Concord Hospital.

Finance Committee recommended adoption of this article. H. Talbot Pearson so moved, and the vote was in the affirmative.

Article 17: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to purchase advertising space in the 1961 Guide of the Merrimack Valley Region, or take any other vote in relation thereto.

The Finance Committee recommended \$100. David Whitaker moved to dismiss the article. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 18: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for the Water Safety Program.

After a recommendation of \$200 by the Finance Committee, Howard Ineson made a motion to raise and appropriate \$200 for the Water Safety Program, was supported, and after some discussion, the vote was in the affirmative.

Article 19: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the continuation of improving the grounds in front of the Town Hall and parking lot.

The Finance Committee Recommended \$1000. After a motion to dismiss the article was voted down, Howard Ineson moved to raise and appropriate \$1000, which was voted in the affirmative.

Article 20: To see if the Town will vote to add to the so-called 15-year plan for improving town roads, by hard-topping, using T.R.A. funds, the unfinished portion of the so-called Old Road, about seven-tenths of a mile, running from Wilfred Lahey's to the Old South Friends cemetery, north of Clinton Grove.

Gordon Russell moved to adopt the article as read. Vote in the affirmative. Wendell Colburn moved that this be the next project started. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 21: To see if the Town will vote to continue Route 109 to Route 77. Route 109 is on the T.R.A. 15-year plan (by petition).

Bernard L. Phelps Jr. moved this article be accepted. After some discussion an amendment to delay action for one year was offered by H. Talbot Pearson. The amendment was accepted and the vote on the article as amended was in the affirmative.

Article 22: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for the purpose of making a ballfield in back of the new school.

The Finance Committee recommended adoption of this article. A motion by Gordon Russell to raise and appropriate \$300 for the purpose of making a ballfield in back of the new school brought out some discussion in regard to the size of the field, which was explained by Lyhl Perrigo, that it would be for a pony-size diamond. Vote was in the affirmative.

Article 23: To see if the Town will approve the proposed agreement (s) between the United States of America and the Town of Weare for the relocation of the East Weare and Johnson (Mt. Pleasant) Cemeteries located in the reservoir area of the Hopkinton-Everett Dam and Reservoir Project, and authorize the Selectmen to enter into any instruments and agreements with the United States or its contractors in reference thereto, and further authorize the Selectmen to acquire the replacement sites when the work has been completed.

George C. Sawyer moved that this article be accepted and approved as read. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 24: To see if the Town will vote to purchase an Addressograph Machine for use in the Town Office, and to raise and appropriate a sum of money for same.

The Finance Committee recommended dismissal of this article. Vernon Wood moved that this article be dismissed. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 25: To see what action the Town will take, in regards to the Town Truck, or take any other vote in relation thereto. The Finance Committee's recommendation was to sell to the highest bidder, the vote was in the affirmative. Howard Ineson then moved it be left to the Selectmen to set the time, place and accept sealed bids. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 26: To see if the Town will vote to accept the zoning ordinance recommended by the Planning Board. After much discussion on a motion by Harold Flanders to accept this article, the motion was withdrawn, and a new motion to postpone action on this article for one year was carried in the affirmative.

Article 27: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to be put in a reserve fund, for the purpose of installing a heating plant in the Town Hall in the future.

Vernon Wood moved that this article be dismissed. After some discussion the vote was in the negative. Robert Black then moved \$2000 be raised and appropriated and the vote was in the affirmative.

Article 28: To transact any other business that may come before this meeting.

As there was no more business, the officials proceeded to count the ballots. This was done and the newly dlected officers were sworn into office and the meeting adjourned at 4:00 a.m. March 9, 1960.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE POLICE DEPARTMENT

The first year in the new office of the Weare Police Department has proved to be very successful, especially for the interrogation and finger printing of subjects by this department and the State Police.

Two subjects were apprehended and sentenced to long terms in N. H. State Prison for breaking, entering, and larceny of personal property in East Weare.

The completion of the new roads by-passing East Weare will divert traffic from the work area of the flood control project. This will eliminate the problems of heavy trucks and equipment which have caused traffic hazards during the past summer.

There was one accidental death at the Everett Dam site which marred the safety record held by the Perini Corporation. This was covered by this department and the State Police.

Only thirteen cases appeared before municipal court as compared with fifteen last year.

One U. S. Savings Bond was found on the South Weare dump which was returned to the owner in New Boston.

First - by setting a good example YOURSELF - being sensible and complying with the necessary laws and regulations governing the use of fire in and near woodlands.

Second - by using YOUR individual influence in your community and valued council with others in insisting and encouraging them to do likewise.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE

WEARE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

During 1960 the department answered 37 calls for fire. Three calls were out of town to assist at a barn fire in Henniker, a house fire and a brush fire in Dunbarton. Several serious building fires occurred in Weare in 1960; burning most of one house, a barn and a large brooder house.

The department answered calls in Weare to 8 building fires, 10 chimney fires, 3 car or truck fires, 5 brush or grass fires, 2 power line fires, 3 Halloween prank fires, 1 electric motor fire, 1 fire threatening to burn a disabled tractor, and 1 investigation of possible fire in unoccupied homes in a remote section of town.

Causes of some of these fires were: overheated furnace, hot ashes, gas brooders, burning rubbish, a defective chimney, and a burning car.

Have your heating system serviced and all defects eliminated, burn rubbish only with a permit and do not leave any fire unattended. Fire prevention would keep most of these fires from ever starting. You cannot afford to have a fire on your property. Fire losses affect everyone and endangers life. Nearly every day we read of people burned or killed in fires that could

The Red Net Work phone operators answered 114 calls durthe year: Fires 37, Police 15, rescue squad 5, civil defense 6, power failures 8, false alarms or miss dialing 5, reports of burning or forest fires 6, for town officials 4, and for information 27. The operators of the system do a very efficient job and it was decided to pay them for some of the inconvenience involved in their operation of this service.

The rescue squad answered several calls for serious accidents and illnesses. Their training and experience gained in actual cases has made this unit a valuable addition to the department.

The situation at East Weare has been very difficult. The village being abandoned and the fire station with the truck still located there has made it almost impossible to have the alarm system either operated or responded to. This was over-

come by changes in our mobilization plan. Moving to our new station which is nearly completed at Sugar Hill will be done soon and an alarm system developed in that village. This will bring quite a few houses within the two mile insurance district surrounding this new fire station.

The Ladies Auxiliary has been of great assistance this past year. Several lunches were served the firemen at fires and the Annual Strawberry Festival and Christmas Party were enjoyed by many.

The outside of the Central Station was painted by the firemen at two painting bees, and the inside of the station painted which adds greatly to the appearance and makes the room much lighter. The assembly room continues to be used by many organizations for meetings and social purposes. A refrigerator was obtained for the kitchen also an electric range, to replace the old one. These were purchased by the Auxiliary.

Although many of the members work nights the meetings of the department were well attended. Several drills were held and training of old as well as new members was a part of our program.

The Number One truck purchased in 1933 should be replaced. It has only mechanical brakes and is dangerous to drive on the road in the traffic of today. Parts can no longer be obtained for it and the tires on it are between fifteen and twenty years old. A new truck is needed which would do all the old truck can besides carrying a much bigger tank of water and having a pump which would comply with the insurance underwriters requirements. A 400 or 500 gallon tank would be of great value and additional space provided to carry equipment which we have acquired.

This truck would be a general purpose type to answer all calls which the old truck does at present.

With the widespread use of electrical equipment, oil heating, gas installations, transportation of flammable liquids etc. in the rural towns: fire prevention and protection by the departments well trained with good serviceable equipment is more necessary than ever before.

We wish to thank all who have assisted in the activities of the department during the past year.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

SCHOOL WARRANT FOR 1960

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Weare qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 4th day of March, 1960, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 4. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 5. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 6. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 7. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 8. To see if the District will appoint a study committee to work in conjunction with the school board for the purpose of purchasing the former telephone office adjacent to the high school building and the possibility of adding a new room or or rooms to the elementary school, to provide additional classroom space.
- 9. To see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 for the purpose of painting the exterior of the high school.

- 10. To see if the District will vote to appropriate any funds received from tuition for so-called state wards toward payment of general expenses of the school year 1959-60.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.
- 12. To see what sum the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of carrying out the recommendations of the State Fire Marshall for the elimination of fire hazards in the Schools of the District. (Inserted by petition.)
- 13. To see if the district will vote to decrease the membership of the School Board from nine (9) to three (3) members, and to elect one member to the Board each year, to hold office for three (3) years until a successor is chosen and qualified.
- 14. If article 13 is adopted, to choose a member to the School Board for a term of three years.
- 15. If article 13 is not adopted to see if the District will ratify, approve and confirm the action taken by the District at the special meeting held on May 18, 1959, in voting to increase the size of the School Board from three (3) to nine (9) members. (Inserted by petition.)
- 16. If article 15 is adopted to choose three (3) members to the School Board for a term of three (3) years, two (2) members for a term of two (2) years, and two (2) members for a term of one (1) year. (Inserted by petition.)
- 17. To see if the District will request the School Board to hold all meetings of the School Board at some public place within the District, to make their meetings open to the public, and to maintain accurate minutes of their meetings setting forth the action taken at each meeting. (Inserted by petition.)
- 18. Article 12. It was moved by Paula Sawyer and duly seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the purpose of carrying out the recommendation of the State Fire Marshal. This money to be used to install fire alarm systems in both schools and also to investigate the possibility of installing a fire door at the high school. Motion carried.

Article 17. It was moved by Joseph Brown and duly seconded to accept this article as read. It was requested that the time, place, and date of each School Board Meeting be Published in the newspapers. Motion carried.

Article 18. It was moved by Joseph Millimet and duly seconded to dismiss this article. Much discussion followed. Motion carried.

Article 19. It was requested by Gordon Traver, spokesman for the Finance Committee that the School Board present the School Budget to the Finance Committee two weeks before the Finance Committee Meeting and that the budget be in more detail than it has in the past.

It was moved by Elsie Purington and duly seconded that the meeting be adjourned. The motion carried and the meeting adjourned at 12:17 A.M.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF WEARE

Public education is considered by many as the most important single function of government.

All considerations have always been with the welfare of our children first in mind. The School Board has and does subscribe to equal opportunities for all of our children.

ENROLLMENT

Weare, like many other communities, is faced with the challenge of providing adequate accommodations for its school age children. This challenge is one of quality not quantity.

The greatest factor influencing schools and their costs, is the number of children in the public schools of the town.

Statistical reports made at the time of the proposed formation of the Cooperative High School, and the Engelhardt report in particular, indicated that the total enrollment will increase. The following chart will show these changes more clearly:

A study of this chart makes it seem apparent that while there will be a slight increase in the elementary school for the given period of time, there will be fewer pupils in grades seven through twelve and the total number, than were enrolled in our school last year.

This study should not be considered as final, as many factors can influence its accuracy, such as recent changes in the economy of the region, the new state law enabling certain high school students to have their tuition paid to comprehensive high schools, migration in and out of Weare, etc.

It is apparent then, that a long range approach toward any school construction or alteration, must be carefully studied before any step is undertaken.

FACULTY

Teachers comprise one of the two most essential ingredients of any school system. A school's strength or weakness is dependent upon the caliber of teachers it employs. Most communities strive to keep their good teachers by providing a better educational environment for their pupils, a community appreciation and desire for good education, higher teacher salaries, etc.

The School Board's policy is to recruit the best teachers and to retain the best within the limits of the salary schedule, which is not to be violated. The Board believes that all members of its staff must be paid according to the same standards, hence the single salary schedule by which its teachers are paid.

It is hoped that our salary schedule for the coming year will meet the competition of other communities, as it is too late to correct this situation when some of our best teachers have left. The strongest asset of our school system is its staff of teachers. We must always keep it strong.

RECENT ACHIEVEMENTS

This is the report of the third year of the school under the present superintendent. Due to your appropriations for the past three years we have been able to achieve some success in the following:

The deficiency appropriation, of some years duration, was finally cleared up during the past fiscal school year.

Improvement of teacher salaries.

Systemized purchases of reference and supplemental books.

Establishment of a standardized, objective type testing program; consisting of an intelligence test given in grades one, three, five, seven, nine, and eleven every year, and an achievement test given annually in grades three through eight.

The acquisition of a Helping Teacher upon a Supervisory Union basis.

A gradual development of our supply of maps and globes.

Participation in the National Defense Education Act enabling us to have more instructional aids in the teaching of Mathematics and Science.

Extensive blacktopping around both schools.

A television set was purchased enabling our pupils to partake of some excellent educational programs in mathematics and science.

A tape recorder and eight head-sets was purchased to aid in the teaching of French and particularly to develop skill in speaking this language. The same equipment is also used in the Commercial classes.

The utilization of well-informed citizens as aids to our instructional program discussing their particular professional or speciality areas, their travels or special hobbies with our students.

Some of our college bound high school students interested in science, have participated in the special Saturday classes of advanced study offered at New England College. We are extremely pleased with the important part that Mr. Curtis Hall played in the inauguration of this project.

The formation of a Young Adult Farmer program.

The increased use of field trips in home economics, commercial, and agriculture, in an effort to provide a more meaningful curriculum.

Teacher committees have been formed and utilized in order to study and evaluate books and to make specific recommendations to the Superintendent for their purchases. The present school curriculum has been studied and some very definite re-

commendations and evaluations have been made. This year the teachers of arithmetic have met several times a month and are preparing study guides, upon a Supervisory School Union basis, grade by grade.

The curriculum has been strengthened through the emphasis of work adapted to the individual child, in light of his strengths and weaknesses.

OUR NEEDS

There is a definite need of serious, constructive thinking on a long range basis to determine the best future of our school system. The most important factor confronting us is housing facilities.

The elementary school has a space problem due to the distribution of children within certain grades, rather than an overall crowding. The efficient educational capacity of a building is quite different from the total number of pupils that may be housed in a school. Again our problem is one of quality not quantity. In regards to the future growth, the Engelhardt report predicts that by 1970 the school will have seven students more than we have enrolled at this date. However, it should be stated that there is not the high degree of similarity between this study and our local enrollment projections, that exist in both Goffstown and New Boston. Therefore, before any definite study is made relative to an elementary school addition an accurate, scientific pupil accounting and prediction should be made.

The high school problem has been with Weare for some time and probably will continue until a most difficult soul-searching decision has been made as to its future.

Both the Conant and Engelhardt reports have made definite and objective observations and conclusions regarding the educational merits of small high schools, and the majority of local voters have not agreed. Four alternate plans of solution have been previously advanced by your superintendent and in view of the size of this school, and its high per pupil cost (located in the section - For your information) they are submitted again for serious consideration. They are the formation of a cooperative high school with your neighbors, closing the high school and sending students out on tuition, or keeping the present school.

At present, the high school is an approved high school. As mentioned previously, a state statute provides that a district maintaining an approved high school... 'shall also, in order to qualify for such state financial aid, appropriate sufficient funds to meet the cost of tuition for such high school pupils as reside in its' school district as desire to attend an approved comprehensive high school due to the fact such approved comprehensive high school offers courses better suited to the needs and capabilities of said pupils.'

If the voters desire to keep the local school for any length of time, then it might be advisable to have the classification changed from that of an approved high school to an approved comprehensive high school. This could be done by adjusting certain phases of the curriculum, the number of teacher preparations and classes per day, etc., to conform to state regulations, which would be made after trained representatives of the state department made a thorough study and evaluation of the local school.

While this technique could result in changing the designation of the local high school, in all fairness it must also be stated that some additional expense must be undergone to receive this comprehensive designation. While this change in status would prevent the district from having to pay tuition for some of its students to a comprehensive school, the curriculum, teacher stability, etc., would still be that of a small, expensive high school. Small schools may be excellent, but the course offerings, teacher backgrounds and training, etc., can not compete economically with larger high schools.

The instruction in and appreciation of music and art should be encouraged to the fullest.

Our elementary music supervisor works with each class once a week and the majority of time is spent in vocal music. We offer no formal or established art program, but expect each individual teacher to do the best she or he can in this subject.

To correct these situations, we would have to budget both time and money, probably upon the Supervisory Union basis. The School Union has seriously considered these proposals for the past year and it is to be hoped that both situations may be corrected by the addition of full time music and art supervisors, in the near future.

One of the characteristics of an outstanding school is the attention given to adapting the level and caliber of teaching to the individual child, in order to make that teaching more meaningful and effective for each pupil. We have made a start in this direction and it is hoped we might add more curriculum enrichment for the majority and definite acceleration for the gifted. Our school union is now considering the feasibility of establishing a special class for the mentally retarded. This addition will provide for these children and satisfy their educational needs and will also provide us with the opportunity of allowing us to better realize our teaching and curriculum objectives in their former classrooms.

FOR YOUR INFORMATION

1. In 1958-59, the average expenditure per pupil for current expense purposes in the public high schools having an enrollment of less than 100 was \$115 higher than the corresponding average for high schools which had an enrollment of more than 300 pupils.

WEARE SALARY SCHEDULE ADOPTED November 28, 1960

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. Those above schedule will be granted $\frac{1}{2}$ increment annually until they are on step.
- 2. Those below schedule to be increased to schedule in 3 years with no less than 1/3 of base differential each year unless the increase would be more than \$500. In that event, placement on schedule would come in 4 years.
- 3. Increments are not automatic; that is the School Board reserves the right to hold a teacher at a step for just cause upon recommendation of the Superintendent, Helping Teacher, and the Principal. A statement of just cause will be forwarded to the teacher no later than February 15.
- 4. A teacher must acquire 6 credits every five years to remain on schedule. These credits shall be from an accredited institution of learning and program of individual teacher shall be previously approved by the Superintendent providing he or she is not working for a degree.
- 5. The schedule will be reviewed annually by a Committee consisting of a minimum of three teachers, the Superintendent, and School Board members.
- 6. It is the recommendation of this committee that a continuing study be made of a Merit Rating Plan.
- 7. Teacher carrying full load of 5 preparations or more will receive the following \$250.00 (\$150.00 for basketball and \$100.00 for baseball.) \$150.00 for girls basketball and \$50.00 for girls softball. If one teacher has two sports such as baseball and basketball \$250.00 would be paid that teacher.
- 8. A teacher entering the system will be given credit for previous experience at the discretion of the board with recommendation by the Superintendent.

9. Those teachers asking for an adjustment in their salary will have to submit full proof of advancement on or before September 1st to the Superintendent.

SICK LEAVE

- 1. Each teacher will be granted 10 school days sick leave per school year.
- 2. Sick leave shall be cumulative to 45 school days.
- 3. A teacher ill for a period greater than total accumulated days to be paid the difference between the pay for the regular teacher and the pay of the substitute for a period of 20 school days beyond total accumulated days. No pay to be granted a teacher absent for a period in excess of 20 school days beyond accumulated total. If no substitute is obtained for absence after the total accumulated days, deductions at the regular rate will be made just as though a substitute had been secured. Above does not prevent School Board from modifying loss of pay for extended periods if in opinion of Board, past service to the district warrants such consideration.
- 4. That substitutes be paid a minimum of \$15.00 per day.
- 5. Each teacher will be granted 1 day emergency leave per school year, subject to approval of Superintendent. This day shall not be cumulative. This day shall not be deducted from sick leave.
- 6. Each teacher will be granted 3 days leave for a death in the immediate family (mother, father, son, daughter, husband, wife, sister, brother, grandparents.) These 3 days shall not be cumulative.
- 7. School administrators to be included in minimum sick leave and leave of absence benefits.

This schedule shall apply to all full-time teachers engaged in daily instruction on the regular school program. Salaries for other school personnel such as nurses, reading specialists, speech instructors, etc., shall be determined by the School Board.

Due to the nature of their duties all principals will be paid base salary plus 10% and the Vocational Agriculture Instructor will be paid base pay plus 15%. Any other specialized or emergency positions created by the District will be determined by the School Board.
