THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Westmoreland in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday, the ninth (9) day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

To bring in your votes for the election of delegates-at-large, alternate delegates-at-large, district delegates, alternate district delegates to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for president and vice-president of the United States.

To elect a delegate to the State Constitutional Convention.

*Article 3. To see if the Town will vote for one road agent to take affect April 1st, 1949 or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 4. To hear the report of agents and auditors and take any action thereto.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote for snow removal and sanding on either class V or VI roads or take any other action relating thereto, raise and appropriate money for the same.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote for class V assistance for Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$554.54 (State contribution to be \$2,218.15).

Article 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to what is required by law for highways and bridges.

*Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to rebuild and tar the road from Residence of Amos Hatt to the tar on the Spofford Road, so-called, providing the abutting owners contribute, or take any action relating thereto.

*Article 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to widen and rebuild the road leading from Route 12 to Route 63 near the residence of Alice Goodrum, or take any action relating thereto.

*Article 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to tar the road and resurface from Route 12 to the residence of Alonzo Hudson, if, and providing \$200.00 is donated by Mr. Hudson and Mr. Cousens, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 11. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the income of the Jotham Lord fund.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the library.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$69.00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Scenic New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the white pine blister rust control in cooperation with the State Forestry and recreation Department.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the upkeep of cemeteries.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

*Article 17. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a Power Mower to be used in the cemeteries, common, around the churches, etc., or take any action relating thereto.

*Article 18. To see what action the Town will take relative to appointing a committee for the purpose of obtaining and erecting a memorial for the Westmoreland Veterans of World War II, and raise and appropriate money for the same or take any other action pertaining thereto.

*Article 19. To see what action the Town will take to appoint a committee to work with the Historical Committee for the purpose of marking the historical points in Westmoreland or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 20. To see what action the town will make relative to the property acquired by the town through taxes.

Article 21. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

* Handed in by individuals.

Town meeting poll will close at (6:15) six fifteen of the clock in the afternoon.

TOWN MEETING

March 11, 1947

Article 1. The meeting was called to order by the moderator, Paul D. King. The warrant was read. This article was read and it was voted this article remain open during the entire meeting.

Article II. The following sums of money were voted to be raised and appropriated for general government.

Article III. It was voted to accept the town reports as printed.

Article IV. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for snow removal and sanding.

Article V. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$552.34 for class V assistance for class V roads.

Article VI and VII. Article VI and VII were taken up together. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,367.00 for calcium chloride, highways and bridges.

Article VIII. It was voted that the selectmen be authorized to borrow on notes of the town for a period of six years a sum not to exceed \$14,000.00 for rebuilding and tarring the River Road, so-called, from the Chesterfield town line to the Corner Schoolhouse, so-called. This was a ballot vote. 88 votes cast. No—22. Yes—66.

Article IX. The town voted that the income from the Jotham Lord fund be used for the support of the library.

Article X. The sum of \$130.00 was voted to be raised and appropriated for the support of the library.

Article XI. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$67.00 to be given the Monadnock Region Association of Scenic New Hampshire to assist in their work.

Article XII. It was voted to pass over this article about white pine blister rust.

Article XIII. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for the upkeep of cemeteries.

Article XIV. The town voted to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article XV. This article in regard to a State Audit was voted to be passed over.

Article XVI. It was voted that the selectmen be authorized to accept the legacy left the town by the late Mrs. Clinton Hall. The town clerk was instructed to communicate with the executor of the will requesting the release of provisions concerning the investment and interest.

Article XVII. This article was passed over by vote.

Article XVIII. It was voted that the selectmen be authorized to contact the state, railroad officials and federal government to see what can be done about an underpass at the Gilboa railroad crossing.

Article XIX and XX. It was voted to pass over these articles.

Article VII. This article was reopened. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to be spent on the road leading to residence of Dmytro Mereschuck, Mr. Mereschuck to contribute \$150.00.

Article II. This article was reopened to provide for the interest on the \$14,000.00 for the River Road. It was voted to borrow a sum not exceeding \$200.00 for the interest.

Article XX. This article was reopened and discussed. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for the East Westmoreland Cemetery Association to use in completing the driveway into the East Westmoreland cemetery.

Article XXI. An article from the State Tax Commission in regard to state appraisers was read and discussed. It was voted to pass over this matter.

Upon request Article II was reopened. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to purchase additional hose for the fire department.

There were 137 ballots cast under Article I.

The results of the balloting are as follows:

Town Clerk. Ruth E. Burt had 128 votes and was declared elected.

Selectman for three years. Elmer Roentsch had 34 votes. Lawrence A. Leach had 97 votes and was declared elected.

Treasurer. Annie Shelley, Mrs. A. F. Hudson, Walter Dunn each had one vote. Oscar Billings had two votes. Charles H. Aldrich had 122 votes and was declared elected.

Tax collector. Ruth E. Burt had 129 votes and was declared elected.

River road agent. There were seven persons who had 1 or 2 votes. Kenneth Rounds had 5 votes. Leon McClenning had 75 votes and was declared elected.

South Village road agent. Robert Blood had one vote. Charles W. Messer had 126 votes and was declared elected.

East road agent. Robert Blood and Perley Thompson each had 1 vote. Peter Action had 122 votes and was declared elected.

Trustee of Town Library for three years. Robert E. Perry had 125 votes and was declared elected.

Auditors. There were eleven persons who had 1, 2 or 3 votes for auditor. Roscoe Perry had 8 votes. Oscar Billings had 27 votes and was declared elected. Walter Dunn had 118 votes and was declared elected.

Trustee of Trust Funds for three years. There were four votes cast for four different persons. Nellie F. C. Aldrich had 114 votes and was declared elected.

Constable. Six people received 1 vote each, two people had 3 votes each. Donald Paine had 14 votes. Walter Taylor had 52 votes and was declared elected.

Surveyors of wood and lumber. William S. Starkey had 114 votes and was declared elected. Howard E. Smith had 117 votes and was declared elected. Perley O. Thompson had 119 votes and was declared elected.

Fence Viewers—Russell H. Wellington had 114 votes and was declared elected. Lawrence A. Leach had 115 votes and was declared elected. Seldon B. Lund had 113 votes and was declared elected.

Briggs fund committee. Alice Chickering had 122 votes and was declared elected. Helen Terry had 117 votes and was declared elected.

The moderator read the results of the balloting. The oath of office was given to those present who were elected. The meeting was adjourned.

The major item of increase on the budget this year is in the matter of teachers' salaries. The superintendent has explained this somewhat in his report found further on in this section.

Scholar supplies have increased in cost an average of 30 per cent over last year. The increase in janitor service proposed is not an actual increase but is only to bring the budget up to actual expenditures this year. We expect to have to replace one or more of the chemical toilets this year if replacements become available. We have had to make some major changes in the plumbing at the South Village school after finding that the initial installation was not made in the proper manner. The increase in transportation reflects more fully the actual costs this year which have risen due to our having to establish one or two individual routes to transport children of families who have moved on to roads not covered by the regular routes.

We anticipate about the same amount of state aid that we received this year. As the superintendent explained in his report, state aid is based now on the actual number of pupils enrolled who are residents of the town. The amount that any town gets is based on a basic program and the town's ability to pay toward that basic program.

High school tuition costs have risen greatly. Tuition in Keene High School next year will be \$120 per pupil and in Walpole High School \$100 per pupil.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Westmoreland :

I herewith submit my third annual report as superintendent of schools :

A number of very important changes have taken place during the past year which should do much to improve the educational opportunities of our New Hampshire children. The legislature passed several major acts which are destined to change the course of education in the state. The cooperative school district act makes it possible for local school districts, through local initiative, to join together to establish more effective school units. At the present time there are ten or twelve areas throughout the state studying the advantages of forming as many cooperative school districts. Most of the community areas are in urgent need of new buildings. Communities within easy commuting distances may construct one building that will take care of the needs of all the districts. The result will be a school large enough to offer more for boys and girls who attend it. It will be large enough to assure adequate training in all the fundamentals and at the same time provide opportunity for specialized work in art, music, practical arts, and recreation. It will be large enough to attract and hold well-trained teachers and personnel.

Another act granted school districts temporary emergency exemptions from certain provisions of the Municipal Bond Statute. The previous law limited school districts to bonded indebtedness not exceeding two per cent of assessed valuation of taxable property of the district. The new act allows five per cent in any instance and up to eight per cent if a strong case can be made to a board of investigation and the governor and council. The original bonding act was passed many years ago when construction costs were relatively low and when \$5,000 would buy considerable school housing. Two per cent of an

assessed valuation of a quarter of a million dollars would amount to only \$5,000, which would not go far toward building a school house today. Under the old law there were only a few larger cities that would have been able to build any kind of a schoolhouse at present prices, due to the two per cent limitation. The new act with its special provision will make it possible for practically any community in the state to raise enough money to build a schoolhouse even under today's high prices.

The act which means the most to us directly is the so-called equalization act which is an act to equalize educational opportunities and to improve the public elementary and high schools of New Hampshire. This act, which increases state financial aid to local school districts approximately 400 per cent, is really an amendment to the old state aid act which was based entirely on the needs of the various school districts.

The new plan is based on the town's ability to pay and sets up a required minimum program which all towns must equal before being eligible for state aid. Another feature of this revised act is that of general aid to all districts based on a set amount for every elementary and secondary pupil in average daily membership during the preceding year. This new state aid bill has enabled us to offer more to your children without asking for a greatly increased amount of taxation.

Last June the State Board of Education set up a minimum salary schedule. The increased amount of state aid enabled us to bring our salary into line with the regulation without asking for more money.

School costs, in line with everything else, continue to rise. We have tried to keep our demands to a reasonable limit but certain items will have to be increased in spite of careful planning.

Your teachers are receiving about the same salary that teachers in other towns of this size throughout the state are receiving. If we are to continue having the same high grade of teachers that we have had, we must expect to make increases in the salaries comparable to those being planned in other communities.

During the summer we were able to paint the exterior of the three schoolhouses, and also to do considerable interior painting, as was voted at the special meeting last July. The schoolhouses are now in very good condition with only a few minor repairs being required. The roof of the East Village school may need some more attention and the chemical toilets in all the buildings will have to be checked rather carefully this year. These are now reaching the limit of their usefulness having been purchased quite a number of years ago. The average life of a chemical toilet is from twelve to fifteen years.

A much needed set of New World maps has been provided for Mrs. Dunn's room. The PTA of the South Village school provided window drapes for the classroom and is again sponsoring the hot lunch program which is unusually successful this year. Parents of pupils very generously donated dishes so we have an ample supply for serving food this year. The East Westmoreland 4-H club donated some preserves which they canned last summer. The increased cooperation between the children of the various sections of town now attending the South Village school is very gratifying. The South Village PTA also donated candy and nuts for the children's Christmas.

The desks in all the rooms have been re-finished this year and are much easier to write on than they have been the last few years. The children seem to respect property more when it is kept in good condition than when it is allowed to deteriorate.

FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drouth and forest fire occurrence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops lowered water levels and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned deeply in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most serious conflagration we had.

Governor Dale closed the woods effective at midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent fires for the rest of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occurred during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control agency based on local town wardens and town crews wherever adequately equipped rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient to properly equip the available man power in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both damage and fire costs at a minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 percent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the traveling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland.
