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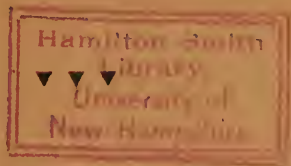

Town Warrant

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Acworth in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Acworth on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Art. 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for highways and bridges.

Art. 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for breaking roads.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of town poor and old age assistance.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to accept State aid for Class V roads and raise money for the same.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lights.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for debt and interest.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow on notes on credit of the town, such sums as may be necessary to meet current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for observance of Old Home Day.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Silsby Free Public Library.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of thirty-five dollars for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee region.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of seven hundred and thirty-three dollars for maintenance and calcium treatment for the Charlestown and Derry Hill roads.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fifty dollars for their part of expense of the three town fair.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fifty dollars for fire protection.

Art. 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Given under our hands and seal, this eighth day of February, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and forty-one.

That we raise the sum of \$700.00 toward summer maintenance of roads.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Acworth School Board:

I herewith submit my eleventh annual report as your superintendent of schools.

You are very fortunate in retaining Miss Eleanor Rock and Miss Phyllis Adams at the South School. On my visits there I find the rooms neat, the pupils in good order, the lessons well prepared by teachers, and a happy interest on the part of everyone. I have been surprised to find that a room in an old building could be made by teacher and pupils into such an attractive classroom as has been done by Miss Rock and the children of the fifth and sixth grades. I wish that every parent would visit those schools to see the grade of work that is being done.

Miss Margaret Tole has been hired to teach the Center School. Miss Hazel Lewis resigned to accept a single grade position in Keene.

The Center School is not doing as good work as should be done with everything to work with in a rural school of only five grades. From my observation the fault is mostly with a few of the parents who do not seem to care if their children are educated or not.

Some of the children come to school when they feel like it and stay at home on rather small pretexts. It is difficult to handle cases when parents are willing to state that their children are sick. I would advise that a good truant officer be legally appointed and paid a sufficient salary to investigate such cases, force the pupils to be in school when they are well enough, and if necessary to punish the parents. One or two years would bring this school back into its proper place. No teacher can arouse a great interest, or become enthusiastic herself if there are a few pupils who either come late, or not at all two or three times a week.

“Every child between eight and sixteen years of age shall attend the public school to which he is assigned or an approved private school during the time the public schools are in session, unless he is more than fourteen years old and has completed the studies prescribed for the elementary schools, or has been excused from attending on the ground that his physical or mental condition is such as to prevent his attendance or to make it undesirable.”

“Every person having the custody of a child shall cause that child to attend such a school during all the time the public schools are in session.”

The school debt has been paid. There are projects that we would like to see developed that would again place a debt on the district. However with the present high prices for materials, and the high wages brought about by defense work, it does not seem wise to do more than is absolutely necessary to keep the present buildings in good condition. This will give the taxpayers the benefit during the times of extra costs, and when again prices are down, and men need work we may again consider what can be done. I feel, however, that the committee appointed by the selectmen should be kept alive to study the problem of a new school building at some future date.

I wish to thank the teachers and school officials for their kindness and loyalty.
