TOWN WARRANT

Cheshire, ss:

To the inhabitants of Alstead qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on the thirteenth (13th) day of March, A. D. 1945 at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles.

Art. 1. To choose the following town officers, town clerk, town treasurer, one selectman for three years, tax collector, overseer of poor, one or more road agents, auditors, constables, library trustees, trustees of trust funds, fence viewers, sextons, cemetery committee, park commissioner, measurers of wood and surveyors of lumber, and other town officers required by law or as the voters may direct.

Art. 2. To see what sums of money the town will raise for ordinary town charges, old age assistance and for the support of the poor.

Art. 3. To see what sums of money the town will raise for highways, and bridges.

Art. 4. To see what action the town will take regarding the purchase of road equipment, including snow removal equipment, and raise money for the same.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will raise to oil the village streets.

Art. 6. To see if the town will raise \$548.27 for class V roads and call for state assistance, the state to contribute \$2,193.08.

Art. 7. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to draw from the general fund the unexpended balance of \$547.37 raised in 1943 and 1944; the state to contribute \$1,094.96 for 1944, to be expended on class V roads.

Art. 8. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to sell real estate acquired by tax sale.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the care of cemeteries.

Art. 10. To see if the town will raise \$25.00 for water rent for the town hall and watering trough.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of the library.

Art. 12. To see if the town will raise \$40.00 for Memorial Day.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will raise for care of parks and playgrounds.

Art. 14. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 15. To see if the town will raise \$1,158.34 to reduce state aid construction notes.

Art. 16. To see if the town will raise \$862.00 for street lights.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$77.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

Art. 18. To see how much money the town will raise to dig and maintain water holes throughout the town for fire protection and for the support of the fire company and for the purchase of fire fighting equipment.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$25.00 for the care of the town clock, so-called, owned by the Universalist church.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to accept a trust fund of \$100.00 to be known as the Milton C. Dodge Trust Fund and a fund of \$100.00 to be known as the Heywood Trust Fund and a fund of \$200.00 to be known as the William G. Baer Trust Fund; to be held by the town as Cemetery Trust Funds.

Art. 21. To see what action the town will take to purchase or rent and maintain land for a public dump.

Art. 22. To hear and allow accounts.

Art. 23. To transact any other business that may come before the meeting.

**REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN OF THE
SHEDD-PORTER MEMORIAL LIBRARY
For the Year Ending Dec. 31, 1944**

As your librarian I hereby submit my second annual report.

The library circulation this year has increased greatly and the total is the highest in three years. Many new readers, both children and adults have signed cards this year and the increased reading is very encouraging. The schools also seem more and more to be using library facilities in the line of book reports, reference work and use of the Informative Class Room Picture Series.

Book Week was observed the week of Nov. 13-18 and the special emphasis this year was on Children of Other Lands. On Nov. 13th I told the children of the primary grades stories of Hungarian, Peruvian and Pennsylvania Dutch children. On Nov. 15th, Miss Reeder reviewed "The Good Master," a story of Austrian children for the 5th-8th grades. The grammar school attendance totalled about 100 children. Nov. 17th, Miss Nye who was home from Bolivia at that time spoke to the high school group, showing pictures of interesting places to which she had been and answering questions about life in Bolivia. On the evening of the 15th, Miss Langdon Bellows from the Walpole library gave a review of the new book, "Earth and High Heaven," by Gwethalyn Graham for the adults which was very interesting.

Story Hour this year was in charge of Miss Cleo Duncan, Director of Religious Education. It began January 8th and continued every Saturday afternoon through March. An average of 20 children attended and enjoyed stores, plays and a Valentine Party.

The Adventures in Reading contest sponsored by the Congregational-Christian Conference this year was very successful in that we placed third in our class in the state with 33 qualified readers.

The trustees gave me the opportunity of attending the librarian's school at the State Library for two weeks in June. There were courses in classification and cataloguing, book selection, library administration and work with children, all of which were very beneficial.

There is soon to be a pamphlet file put in use which will make easy access to state extension bulletins, reports and other material sometimes desired by local organizations.

Two new magazines have been added to the subscription list, "The Inter-American" and "Survey Graphic."

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Alstead:

I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

Alstead has been very fortunate in retaining the services of some excellent experienced teachers.

The following changes were made on the teaching staff:

Virginia Spaulding of Keene Teachers College, was elected to teach grades 3-4 in the village elementary school.

Lois Nelson is the new teacher of home economics. She is a graduate of Keene Teachers College.

Madeline Merrill is a graduate of the teacher training course in the New England Conservatory of Music. She was employed to teach and supervise the instruction in music in the village and high schools.

Gretchen Ray, a graduate of Bates College, was appointed to teach English and French at Vilas High School. Jean Kelliher was employed to teach the commercial subjects. She is a graduate of Regis College.

The schools of the supervisory union have continued to participate in the various war emergency programs. The pupils in all schools are investing substantial amounts in war stamps and bonds; salvage drives have been conducted at most of the schools; and about 250 bags of milkweed pods were collected in the drive organized for this purpose.

Our schools continue to be affected by war conditions. The shortage of teachers grows more acute in rural districts. What teachers are available seek positions first in larger communities or in consolidated schools where pay is better, where work is in single grades or subjects, and

where transportation facilities are available. Many schools in the state opened this year with substitute teachers. Many others have lost teachers during the school year, replacing them only with great difficulty. The situation facing us for another year will be even more serious.

The various programs of studies recommended for the elementary schools of the state are in the process of revision. The first of this series, Arithmetic, has been completed and is now in use in our schools. The development of this program has been a cooperative undertaking combining the suggestions of the elementary teachers with the results of research and the recommendations of specialists

in this field of education. The result of this effort is the development of an outline of work better suited to the maturity of children at the various grade levels.

The distribution of operations in the fundamental processes is indicated on a grade placement chart. Recommendations are made for time allotment and the application of the fundamental processes to number experiences and problem solving.

Suggestions are made for constructing diagnostic tests in all grades and for the development of remedial work in the four fundamental operations with integers and fractions.

The teaching of some of the more difficult abstract processes is delayed and the instruction during the initial period progresses from the concrete to the abstract form.

The program provides for individual differences in abilities of children and for the enrichment of work for gifted children.

One section of the new program is devoted to suggestions for using the common activities of the home, school and community in developing number concept and arithmetic experience.

After a brief period of adjustment, this program will develop as standard, thus unifying the work in arithmetic in all of our schools according to the new state standards.

MUSIC

All of the pupils in the village elementary and most of the high school pupils are receiving the benefits of special instruction in music. The music teacher visits each of these schools during the week to teach and to outline a music program for the school. The aim of the special instruction in music is to improve vocal quality, song repertoire, rhythmic recognition and activity, feeling for mood, appreciation of vocal and instrumental music, interest in the history of music as well as the lives and works of famous composers, reading ability, and theoretical knowledge—all of which may be attained through the medium

of ear training, written work, rhythmic activity, and singing.

The high school orchestra, band, and glee club have made public appearances during the year.

HEALTH

- 194 pupils were inspected.
- 22 pupils were underweight.
- 13 pupils showed defective vision—uncorrected.
- 2 pupils showed defective hearing.
- 11 pupils showed poor posture.
- 137 pupils were in need of dental care.
- 13 pupils were advised to have throat and nose examination.
- 3 pupils had enlarged neck glands.
- 3 pupils had speech defects.
- 4 pupils were unvaccinated—without proper excuse.

The number of tardinesses listed above does not indicate instances of tardiness due to late school busses. However, state regulations require that cases of tardiness due to delayed school busses must be marked in the school register, and included in all attendance reports to the state department. It should also be noted that, under this regulation, all tardinesses due to delayed busses or otherwise, are recorded against the permanent attendance record of the pupils affected.

VILAS HIGH SCHOOL

All assembly programs are under the supervision of the members of the senior class.

Every Tuesday is set aside for the purchasing of war stamps. Each class has its own cashier.

Many students showed good patriotism by bringing in several bags of milkweed pods.

The English classes appreciate the opportunity to visit the Shedd-Porter Memorial Library and to be able to read some of the latest books and magazines.

A new set of Encyclopedias have been added to the school library.

To help make the tenth anniversary of Vilas High School long remembered, the Vilas High School basketball team was one of the four Class C teams chosen to enter the Annual Tournament at the University of New Hampshire. The Vilas boys won the Class C Championship and also had two members of the squad chosen on the "All State" team. A beautiful plaque and gold basketballs were presented to the members of the squad. The boys were also given a banquet by the Alstead business men.

As in the previous year, the Girls' Council was organized in the fall, with members elected by the girls of the student body to act as leaders in planning the year's sports program. Intramural competition in soccer and basketball—to be followed by volley ball, tennis, and softball—provides an opportunity for the attainment by each girl of good health habits, skills which may later be used in adult recreational activities and a valuable sense of sportsmanship and team spirit, as well as leadership abilities.

The play days in which the students participated last spring were particularly important in developing these attitudes of cooperation and leadership. The first, held at Vilas, was planned by the Council with every girl in the senior high participating, and with students from other schools as guests and fellow players. In addition the upper class girls attended play days at Keene Teachers College and Springfield, Vt. Such meets give the girls valuable opportunities to enjoy the benefits of playing team sports under the direction of women officials, and if transportation facilities permit, it is hoped that similar plans may be carried out this year.

The senior group in trigonometry was able to observe practical applications of their studies when a field trip with Mr. Heman Chase of East Alstead gave them an opportunity to become familiar with the use of surveying instruments and the solution of practical problems involving mathematical relationships discovered in class. Such experiences add much to the scholastic program and the cooperation of parents and friends in making these trips possible is appreciated by the students and faculty.

The school paper acts as a connecting link between the student body, the teachers, and the citizens of the community. Its purposes are to give training in journalism; to establish standards of conduct, scholarship, and good sportsmanship; and to create a greater interest in school activities. Through the medium of the school paper the commercial students learn how to cut stencils properly and efficiently; and become proficient in the operation of the mimeograph. In the Vilas Vernacular, published semi-annually

by the students of the Vilas High School, an attempt is made to reflect every phase of student activity. This publication tells the school news to the student, entertains and guides them, and also acts as a representative of the school in the community.

A new class entitled "Auditorium Practice" has recently been developed at Vilas to give the seventh and eighth grade boys an opportunity to study the rudiments of oral interpretation and radio technique. Poise, courtesy, and self-assurance are the expected outcomes of this course.

Three one-act plays were presented by the Junior and Senior High School students on the evening of December 1, 1944. In order to include a greater participation three one-act plays were chosen rather than one three-act play.

This enabled not only the performers but those who worked on various committees to develop a sense of interpretation and stage production through actual experience on make-up, lighting, prompting, and advertising. Stage direction, itself, brought about an awareness of responsibility and a stronger bond between faculty and student. Poise and self-assurance were readily acquired during the production.

The theme of the 1944 graduation program was "The Four Freedoms"—Freedom of Religion, Freedom of Speech, Freedom From Fear, and Freedom From Want. The four honor pupils wrote and delivered essays on those subjects, and all the members of the class took part in tableaux representing these four freedoms: The first showing the worshippers in a church, the second portraying a town meeting, the third depicting a Father and Mother peacefully saying goodnight to their child, the fourth displaying a table bountifully loaded with food.

The standard of scholarship in general is good. Many of our boys have been assigned, through army and navy tests, to various schools for special instruction.

Warnings are sent to the parents periodically in order that they may know the type of work being done by their children and to prevent failures if possible.

A period is set aside daily for special help in making up their work.

The social events have received a cordial welcome by all the students and have been well attended. Each class is responsible for one social during the year.

For the first few months of the school year the Home Economics girls centered their attention on the Annual School Fair in conjunction with the Agricultural boys. Upon successfully completing that project in October, the seventh and eighth grades have been concentrating on serving one hot dish to approximately seventy students daily as a part of the noon lunch program. Two afternoon teas were prepared and served by these young pupils on two occasions for the teachers of the district.

In December the girls prepared various kinds of candy in classes and sold it at the "Three One-Act Play" performances. The girls of the clothing class have carried on projects in grooming and have also completed the construction of one garment for themselves.

The opening of school this fall found the Department of Agriculture with an enrollment of twenty. The towns of Acworth, Marlow and Langdon were represented as well as the local community. Of this number, only three were upper classmen. However, a strong Freshmen class more than offset this deficit and is an encouraging aspect of the future of such a course.

The Agricultural boys were immediately in demand to help with the fall harvesting and farm work. In spite of this outside work, extra school activities were promoted and carried out. After a lapse of two years the Home Economics and Agricultural Departments, with the whole-hearted support of the rest of the school body sponsored the local school fair. We were particularly fortunate in having fair weather enabling us to handle the livestock on the athletic field. All departments exhibiting were well represented and

the sales booths of the classes and organizations were well patronized. Unique displays such as the home made drag saw attracted much interest and comment.

The state Interscholastic Judging Contest was held at the University of New Hampshire. Much interest was evidenced in this event and with the cooperation of Mr. John Allen and Headmaster Metcalf, fourteen boys were able to make the trip and participate in the judging contests. When the final results were tallied, the Vilas teams had won the poultry and dairy contests and individuals had scored first in dairy, second in poultry, and third place tie in apple judging.

Since the beginning of the winter months much of the time has been spent in shop work. As in the past it is the wish to tie this work up to the students' farm experience. Examples of this practice being carried out, are the building of a colony brooder house and an ox scoot, forging of metal parts for various uses, cleaning and painting of farm machinery, and overhauling an automobile motor. Throughout all of this work proper use of the tools and facilities is our chief aim. It is our good fortune to have the use of an AC Arc Welder. Much use is continually made of this machine and the boys know its importance in farm operation. The agricultural department is anxious to be of service where possible in repairing machinery for farmers. This serves the dual purpose of aiding the farmers in their work and providing experience for the pupils.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

At East Alstead the walls of the activity room were covered with celotex. The foundation wall at the northwest corner of the school building was repaired. The class room walls were painted and the ceiling was whitened. The rope was replaced on two swings. New curtains were purchased for the windows.

The flag pole at the Vilas school was painted and a new rope was supplied. All wood and linoleum floors were resurfaced. The concrete floors in the locker rooms and at the stage entrance were painted with two coats of con-

crete surface finish. Repairs were made on the electric motor in the well house. Both flues from the boilers were cleaned out. The electric master clock was cleaned and surfaced.

Other minor repairs were made as needed at all schools.

I wish to express appreciation for the excellent support and cooperation received from the members of the School Board, teachers, parents, and pupils.

ANOTHER ENEMY TO CONQUER

Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.
2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.
3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.
4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.
5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.
