## REMARKS BY THE SCHOOL BOARD

The complex relations of modern civilization have been forcibly impressed upon us by the workings of the World War in connection with our schools during the past year.

The scarcity of teachers compelled the filling of positions with those who might not have been engaged if conditions had been different. However that may be, the teachers in the High School proved a disappointment. The scourge of influenza not only broke into the continuity of the schools, but it lowered the vitality of the pupils to such an extent that it was hard to bring them up to the standard.

The new school laws, which we hope are to work out to the good of all the schools, are causing some changes in the present year. We find that all our school buildings are not up to the standard required. We are not asked to make all the changes in one year, but we will have to do some things this year and keep on doing until they are approved. We hope there will be a good attendance at the school meeting and that you will be prepared to take part in any discussion that may arise.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the members of the School Board:

Coming to the position of Superintendent of Schools at the close of the year which this Annual Report covers, there is nothing for the present Superintendent to report from his own observation, as the proper place for that will be in next year's report. However, it may be well to make this in the form of a survey of last year's statistical report.

Two teachers out of the twelve whose names appear in the last Annual Report, are now teaching in the same schools. Continuity of service is absolutely necessary for satisfactory results. Such results are more and more in evidence the longer the child remains in school. In other words, unsatisfactory conditions are more likely to bear fruit in the High School than in the lower grades, even though the causes may have existed some years before. The two teachers holding the positions they held the year before are Miss Hattie E. Merrill and Miss Charlotte Balch. Two other teachers were connected with the schools, but held different positions. Miss Rose Wilkinson, last year in the East School, is now the teacher of the first three grades, and Mrs. Jessie Black, who taught last year in the North Branch, has kindly consented to substitute this year for a time in the East School. We earnestly hope for a time when our teachers will be so well satisfied with their work, and we so well satisfied with it, also, that they may remain in the same position for a number of years.

Towns and villages of different sizes have problems peculiar to their size. To towns the size of Antrim it will always be difficult to hold good teachers who are not held by ties other than those of salary. We are most often used as the training places for teachers who will leave as soon as they have had sufficient experience to obtain a salary higher than it seems advisable for us to pay. The remedy, as I see it, is to get, whenever possible, teachers whose home ties are here, for in that case, for the opportunity of being near home they are willing to remain at the salary it is possible to pay.

It is a painful story for most of us that the cost of liv-

ing is so high. We all recognize that the teachers' salaries are comparatively low, and that the increases, when they have been made, have in no way kept pace with the increase in the cost of living. This means that in order to hold our best teachers we must increase salaries. Competent authorities say that even those with absolutely no experience, will be paid from \$800 to \$1,000 per year next fall, and will be hard to find even at that price. I hunted for an eighth grade teacher for another district from August until January, until I found one, and was successful then only because she was a native of that locality, and was pleased to be located there. Even then an increase of nearly \$200 over last year's salary for that grade was required.

Last year Antrim paid \$5,259 in regular teachers' salaries, this year we are to pay \$6,096, and it looks as if it might cost more next year. The State, by its new law, will gladly assist in the payment of these amounts, if the towns will raise an amount equal to \$5.00 per \$1,000 of the valuation, to be spent wholly for elementary schools, providing the teachers are approved by them and the school buildings also meet with their approval. This State aid in many cases amounts to a great deal.

The enrollment fell off last year from 210 to 191. Whatever may have been the cause such a condition is regrettable. The average attendance fell off more than the enrollment, from 175 to 153; due largely to sickness. Tardiness, however, increased alarmingly from 386 cases to 665. This is a very large number of cases, very much above the average for the State, and cannot, for two reasons, be blamed to sickness; first because most other towns were visited with influenza, and because such illness caused absences rather than tardiness. Parents, teachers, and children must pull together for best results, and in order to remedy tardiness, no one can do such effective work as the parents. We urge them to see to it that their children get to school on time. Punctuality is one of the most important lessons for the children to learn while they are young. All schools are subject to the approval of the State Board of Education. If a high school is not approved, it works a hardship on the graduates who may wish to continue their education, it is certain to add to the burden of the tax payer through the loss of State Aid, and is not

desirable as a reputation. So those who were interested deeply regret that, because of last year's poor attendance record, largely because of the many cases of tardiness, the approval of the Antrim High School was withheld for a time, then approved for a short period, ending January 26, 1920, before which time we were to show a decided improvement in this respect or the approval would be withheld. We were very glad to see that such a decided improvement was made that our High School has now been fully approved.

Another study of the statistics shows us that the number of visits to the schools last year dropped off one fifth from that of the previous year. We understand the visits of the parents and friends to indicate their interest in the schools. The children need to realize such an interest on the part of their parents, to assist in keeping them up to the standard; while the teachers needs and deserves such an indication of interest and is cheered and encouraged by it. May we not see an increased number of such visits during the present year?

You will understand that this report covers only the work of the schools from February 1, 1919, to September 1, 1919. Nothing has been said of the work since the latter date, as that will appear in next year's report.

In closing, I wish to say that I have witnessed with great pleasure the earnestness and ability with which the teachers are carrying on their work. In a recent meeting held in Boston to consider the very serious shortage of teachers, one of the speakers said that as much as higher salaries were needed if we expect to hold the teachers, yet their salaries were more nearly what they should be than was the amount of sympathy which they receive from the public. Let us show a sincere and kindly interest in their work. I wish also to thank the School Board and the public in general for their very helpful attitude toward the Superintendent and his work.

## REPORT OF JAMES A. TUTTLE LIBRARY FOR YEAR ENDING JANUARY 31, 1920

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The patronage of the James A. Tuttle Library has increased somewhat during the past year, there having been about 8,300 books besides numerous magazines in circulation. We have now 282 active borrowers, including fifty new ones. Many gifts of books have been given the Library by its many friends in Antrim, which shows that interest in the Library still continues. Among those that have contributed books are Mrs. C. C. Alford, Mrs. F. A. Arbuckle, Mrs. C. W. Thompson, Mrs. E. V. Goodwin, Miss Marion Wilkinson, Mr. Harold Swain, also a large number from Miss Edith Wilkinson of New York, which makes about one hundred and fifty books donated. On the reading tables we have 17 various magazines by subscription, and several others that are given by the editors. Each evening, especially Saturday evening, the reading rooms are well patronized by the young people of the town, and the High School students. The list of visitors that registered was 68, and these were from ten different states. Very much regrets have been expressed by the people in town, and our summer guests that the Historical rooms are not opened; it will be very pleasing to them and especially so to our young patrons of the Library, to know that now arrangements are being made by the trustees, whereby the rooms will be open a part of the time during the hours the Library is open.
