TOWN WARRANT

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to elect one road agent instead of four.

4. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of three per cent on property taxes paid on or before the first Saturday of July next.

5. To see how much, if any money, the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for both fire companies.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue serial notes or bonds to an amount not exceeding \$20,000.00 for the purpose of refunding indebtedness of a like amount.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to buy liability insurance on town labor and appropriate money for same.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept state construction or state aid on Class 5 maintenance and raise money for same.

10. To see if the Town will vote to adopt provisions of the "Municipal Budget Act."

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through "Tax Collector's Deeds."

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$400 for pine blister rust.

13. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

LIBRARY REPORT

We respectfully submit the following report of the Barnstead Free Public Library for the year 1934.

Forty-two books have been purchased and placed in the library. Mrs. Smart gave 2 books, Roland Bunker gave 12 numbers of the American Legion magazine. The Legion boys gave a Photographic History of the First World War edited by Lawrence Stallings. We also received a life size picture of George Washington from George Colbath of Pittsfield, which has been hung on the wall.

Since the banks have reduced the rate of interest paid annually on deposits it has made a difference of fifty dollars on the income from the Foss Fund now leaving only \$150.00, which always has been \$200.00. After paying for fuel, lights and other necessary expenses it does not leave much to buy books.

No extensive repairs have been made on the building the past year, only a few minor things have been attended to. More important things like painting the outside of the building will be necessary this year. We are pleased to report that there are a great many who come regularly to the library for books to read. Public libraries are educational institutions offering not only wholesome recreation but opportunities for study and personal advancement. The library therefore is filling a practical every day need in our town.

The library will be open Tuesday and Saturday afternoons from 2 until 5 o'clock except holidays.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Barnstead School Board and Citizens:

Herewith is respectfully submitted my twelfth annual report as Superintendent of Schools. The statistics presented and the accompanying comments are designed to give the most pertinent facts regarding the schools.

TEACHERS

There is only one change in the teaching force from last year: Olive Ames of Pittsfield filling the vacancy left by Flora Ide at South Barnstead. Miss Ames is a graduate of the three year Junior High School Course at Keene Normal School and has taught with marked success the Smith Meeting House School in Gilmanton for two years. The following is a list of the names of the teachers for the present school year together with their positions, salaries, etc.:

INSTRUCTION

In order to broaden the lives of the boys and girls in the Barnstead schools by increasing the offering of the schools, textbooks in nature study, or science, have been put into use in the first six grades. The pupils are intensely interested in what they are learning about the common things about them and I am sure the interest thus stimulated will mean much to them in fuller living as they go on in life.

The installation of the new reading plan has been continued by the purchase of new readers for the fourth grade. This completes the set of basal readers for teaching the mechanics of reading. In the next few years this minimum core of reading content should be extensively expanded to meet the varied and broad needs of the children.

Last spring, two inexpensive but good quality phonographs were purchased and this fall two cases of records were bought, so that now each school is equipped with a phonograph for the music instruction.

As last year, where possible, the old books displaced by new ones have been sent in to the publishers for the fifteen per cent credit allowed by them. So far this year in the whole supervisory union \$247.24 has been received in credits in this way and many more books are yet to be sent in. It is quite a task to collect these old books, sort, pack and ship them but it seems that the saving effected makes the effort worth while.

Again standard tests given to all eighth grade pupils at the close of school last June showed that Barnstead pupils are meeting accepted standards in all subjects. The eight pupils taking the tests received one B, four C's and three D's.

ROLL OF HONOR FOR ATTENDANCE

The following twenty-one pupils, nine more than last year, were neither absent nor tardy during the school year ending June 30, 1934: Robert Bunker, Ella Dame, (2) Ernest Davis, George Davis, (2) Marguerite Davis, Beulah Gray, Dorothy Gray, (5) Grace Gray, Laura Gray, Margaret Gray, Mary Gray, Robert Gray, Porter Higgins, Lloyd Kidder, Virginia Kidder, Wilbur Kidder, (3) Vilma Knirsch, Wallace Locke, Paul Tasker, Merle Wheet and Phyllis Wheet.

A figure before a pupil's name indicates the number of consecutive years he has had perfect attendance.

PROMOTIONS TO HIGH SCHOOL

The following eight pupils received certificates of admission to high school in June: Ella Dame, Margaret Davis,

All but one of these pupils entered high school last fall.

Of these forty-one pupils two have already left and nine more are seniors. There are now twelve Barnstead pupils in the eighth grade. It would appear that about forty will be in high school next year for whom about three thousand dollars will be needed for tuition.

Again this year, as last year, one of the three pupils in Pittsfield High School, who received all A's for the first semester this year was a Barnstead pupil. This year that honor pupil is Kathleen Chandler.

It may be of interest to compare some of the above figures with those from last year's report. Particularly significant is (1) the drop in number of pupils of average membership by about twelve, (2) the improvement in tardiness—a decrease of nearly 60 tardy marks, and (3) the low rate of non-promotion which is evidence that the teachers of your children are paying careful attention to their individual needs.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENTS

During the past year some important repairs have been made. With Federal Aid to pay for the labor, the Beauty Hill schoolhouse has been painted outside and in and some painting has been done at the Parade. Federal Aid was expected to help with the installation of the septic toilet at the South Barnstead school but such projects were discontinued before the ground was thawed out last spring so that work had to be done this summer at the expense of the school district. Perhaps Barnstead people would be interested to know that probably the first septic toilet to be installed in a New Hampshire school is now in operation at the South Barnstead school. Some new slate blackboard has been installed in the Beauty Hill school and five new desks and chairs have been added there. A storm protection has been built over the rear door of the primary room at the Center and the front steps at the Parade have received repairs.

As soon as funds can be made available, the toilets at the Center and Parade schools should be replaced, for they are exceedingly unsanitary.

Another item of repairs that should receive attention is the painting of the interior of the Shackford's Corner school-house if it is to be continued in use, or, if the Pitman school is to be used instead, extensive repairs will be necessary there.

FINANCES

The estimated budget for next year is little different from last year's, and the appropriation necessary, without any refund from the teachers, is \$111.62 less than the amount raised last year.

REORGANIZATION OF THE SUPERVISORY UNION

By an act of the 1933 New Hampshire Legislature the State Board of Education was required to reduce the number of supervisory unions in the state by five in 1933 and by five more in 1934. In the re-organization in the summer of 1934 of the Pittsfield union, Chichester and Loudon were removed from it and put into the Penacook union, and Allenstown and Pembroke were removed and put into the New Raymond-Pembroke union. Added onto the Pittsfield union were Farmington from the Milton union, and Alton and New Durham from the Wolfeboro union. Thus, this union now consists of the school districts of Pittsfield, Alton, Barnstead, Farmington, and New Durham and is one of the largest in the state. At present fifty-one regular teachers are employed in the union besides one full-time music teacher, one part-time music teacher, two teachers of instrumental music, two school nurses, eight adult janitors, and thirty hired transporters. The total pupil enrollment is 1376, with 301 in the three high schools and 1075 in the elementary schools. The large size of the union now makes close supervision impossible, but with the clerical assistance allowed the superintendent and with the fine co-operation of the school boards, teachers, pupils, and parents, your superintendent is enjoying much can be accomplished in the way of progressive educational development.

In closing I wish to commend to your attention the accompanying report of the school nurse.

REPORT OF SCHOOL HEALTH WORK

To the Townspeople, School Board, and Superintendent of Schools:

With but a half year's acquaintance with the Barnstead schools, I almost hesitate to attempt a report on the health work. I wish, first, to study further the actual needs of the school children, to get acquainted with all the parents, and familiar with the facilities of the community. Only then can practical plans be worked out leading to steady progress in health work.

A brief survey of the well kept records left by Miss Ruth Whitcomb, former school nurse, shows that the school health work has been faithfully carried on with good results. The children would seem to be in unusually good condition physically, even though adverse conditions brought on by the depression have made the task of keeping them well very difficult.

According to her records, a survey of the physical condition of the pupils shows the following:

After studying these figures, it would seem that one of the greatest needs in Barnstead would be available clinics to enable parents to get rates low enough to afford the correction of these defects. We can get a good dentist who would come to Barnstead for a week or two and do the school dental work for rates something like this:

Cleaning—50c.

Extractions—25c and 50c.

Fillings—25c and 50c.

White front fillings—\$1.00.

However, even at these low rates, there would probably be some needed work beyond the means of some child so that it would be necessary to raise money locally to enable all the necessary work to be done for every child. Whether this is practical at the present time is a question only to be answered after careful study of community facilities.

Tonsil clinics can be established at any time with very low rates available if this, too, is financially possible. Already an eye clinic has been started and three children have been fitted to long needed glasses. It is hoped that more of this necessary work can be done this year.

While the correction of physical defects is extremely necessary to build up the bodily health of the child, it is also important to teach and establish good health habits in daily living. Correct health habits are very necessary if the child of today is to face the demands of our age in competition and endurance. Under supervision of the teachers, the children of Barnstead are not only learning the laws of healthful living, but are trying to form habits that apply them. They should have a working knowledge of proper diet; they should know the value of fresh air and clean teeth; they should understand something about hygiene and the conquest of disease; and they should have some knowledge of first aid. Slowly they are learning and are forming better habits.

I wish at this time to thank the parents, teachers, and school officials for their kindness and co-operation in helping me get acquainted with the health program in the schools of Barnstead. I have been cordially received into such homes as I have been privileged to visit and I only wish that I could become faster acquainted with every parent in town.
