The fire company consists of 23 men; 3 fire wards and 1 advisor.

The Firewards would suggest that the town purchase a small portable pump which would pump approximately 50 gallons of water per minute.

If all persons having hand chemicals belonging to the town, will bring them to the fire station we will refill or exchange them. These chemicals should be refilled once a year.

In September, 1942, the enrollment in each room was as follows: Miss Cashion, 32; Miss Cilley, 33; Miss Cate, 26; Mr. Naramore, 11. Since the beginning of school there have been the usual slight changes in enrollment due to movements of families in and out of town.

#### GENERAL REPORT

In a world torn apart by war there can be but one primary objective of all people and institutions, and that is to win the war. Parents, citizens and pupils must throw themselves wholeheartedly into this effort and not let themselves be diverted by minor and petty problems. After we have done all we can for the war effort our next consideration must be the education of our children. For we will have fought in vain, if, after winning the war, we find that our present young people have not been trained to take up their duties as citizens.

The schools have been taking an active part in trying to do their share toward winning the war. Last fall the Bennington pupils collected a large amount of scrap which will be used to make fighting equipment for our soldiers. Each week the boys and girls put their savings into war stamps. Besides this they make posters, drill and do many other things to help their country win the war.

In the field of training there is a renewed emphasis being placed on the "three R's". This may seem a bit old fashioned, but the war shook us into a realization that present day school children were sadly lacking in the fundamentals. To this has been added a fourth "R", that of responsibility. Too often in recent years we have heard adults as well as pupils talk about their "rights", with no realization that every right has a corresponding responsibility or duty. We hope to train the citizens of tomorrow to accept their duties as well as demand their rights.

There has been some little discussion in town about the possibility of closing the Bennington High School and sending the high school pupils to nearby schools. This is a problem which has good and bad points on both sides. It should be thoroughly discussed at the school meeting with the voters arriving at their own independent decision.

I hope all parents will try to cooperate with the school

officials in having their children at school every day, on time, unless these children are sick. Pupils absent from school miss the continuity of the work which can in no way be made up.

In conclusion I want to thank the School Board and teachers for their untiring efforts to maintain good schools in Bennington.
