

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD,

Again we are called to give our annual report of the condition of our schools during the past year. The liberality of the district in appropriating money has been a step in the right direction. We think the schools compare favorably with those of adjoining towns. In some instances we have been disappointed in our expectations of a successful term of school, but we think it would always be well for parents to visit the schools and judge for themselves instead of listening to reports. Good schools require the hearty co-operation of both parents and teachers. Regular attendance, supplemented by careful home training, cannot fail to exert an influence in our schools.

At our last annual meeting Congressman Henry M. Baker offered two maps of the United States as prizes, one to be given to the school making the most improvement, the other to the school showing the most perfect attendance. This created a great deal of enthusiasm. It was decided by the school board that the River Road school won the map for the most improvement; the attendance was also perfect, every scholar being present every half day during the term, thus proving what the board has so often asserted, that the best results can only be The second map was obtained by regular attendance. given to the North Bow school. The register showed but two half days absence for the term. The attendance at the Wood Hill school being nearly perfect, Mr. Baker very generously gave them a map.

BOW MILLS.

Spring term was taught by Miss Lizzie A. Hammond of this town. Miss Hammond ranks as one of our best resident teachers and her reputation was well sustained. The school was in every respect a success.

The fall term was opened by Miss Hattie S. Tarr of Gloucester, Mass. This was Miss Tarr's first attempt at teaching in an ungraded school; her discipline was excellent and methods good, and had she received the cooperation of the parents a good school would have been the result, failing in this, after an unpleasant experience of ten weeks she resigned. After a vacation of two weeks the school was re-opened by Mr. John C. Hammond. Mr. Hammond has taught nearly one hundred terms of school and may well be called an experienced teacher. He gave general satisfaction.

WHITE.

Taught by Mrs. Ada A. French, of this town. Mrs. French is a pleasant and faithful teacher. Much interest was manifested at the close of the term, the house being filled with parents and other visitors.

Fall term taught by Edwin A. Colby, of this town. Mr. Colby at once awoke much enthusiasm among the larger scholars and good, thorough work was done. At the end of nine weeks he closed his labors to accept a more lucrative position, much to the regret of the school. Miss Hattie Saltmarsh, of this town, was engaged to finish the school, which she did to the entire satisfaction of all.

RIVER ROAD.

Spring term by Miss Winnie E. Davis, of Hooksett. As this school won the prize map given by Congressman Henry M. Baker for the most improvement, also perfect attendance, comment is unnecessary.

Fall and winter terms taught by Mrs. Nellie J. Bloomfield, of this town. The examination showed faithful work, and we believe the school was a success.

NORTH BOW.

Spring term taught by Mrs. Nellie J. Bloomfield, of this town. This teacher gained the good-will of both parents and scholars, and a successful school was the result. The register showed but two half days absence. This school won one of the maps.

Fall and winter school in charge of Miss Myra L. Page, of this town. Miss Page has taught here several terms with good success, and this was no exception.

BROWN HILL.

Spring term taught by Miss Mabel C. Taylor, of Townsend, Mass. This was Miss Taylor's first attempt at teaching. There was some dissatisfaction at first, and some of the scholars withdrew. We think those that remained made improvement.

Fall and winter terms taught by Miss Agnes R. Ronan, of Revere, Mass. This was Miss Ronan's first school. She seemed to take great interest in her work, and had a very successful term.

WOOD HILL.

Spring term taught by Miss Maude L. Marshall. This was Miss Marshall's first attempt at teaching. The school appeared well at the examination.

Fall school commenced by Miss M. F. Hitchborn, of Revere, Mass. For some reason Miss Hitchborn failed to gain the good-will of the neighborhood, and after teaching ten weeks, resigned, and the school was finished by Miss Grace H. Huff, to the satisfaction of all.

SOUTH BOW.

Both terms taught by Miss Susie T. Hoyt, of Chichester. This was Miss Hoyt's first attempt. She worked hard to make this school a success, and the result was all that could be desired.

BOG.

Spring term taught by Mr. Edwin A. Colby, of this town. Mr. Colby has taught a number of terms in town, and his success as a teacher needs no comment. Fall and winter terms taught by Miss Susie B. Whittemore, of Litchfield. Miss Whittemore is a hard-working, faithful teacher, and had a very successful term of school.
