TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

**To the inhabitants of the Town of Conway, County
of Carroll, qualified to vote in Town affairs:**

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House at
Center Conway, New Hampshire, March 8, 1949, at nine
o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

ART. 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers.

ART. 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote
to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

ART. 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.

ART. 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the Town the sum of sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) if needed.

ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a Town road a certain road located on the No. Conway west side road as surveyed by Roger Burnell – beginning at approximate corner of land owned by Wilfred Parent, thence over land of Clarence A. Porter and George F. Ramsey to residence of Alden Henderson, thence back to highway near residence of Walter Gleason. Agreeable to a petition signed by Harold L. Potter and others.

ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to revoke the Town Manager plan as provided in chapter 55, Revised Laws. Agreeable to a petition signed by William H. Smith and others.

ART. 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept the conveyance by deed of Leland W. Farrington to said Town of a certain parcel of land for the purpose of a road or highway, said parcel being a part of the land shown on a plan entitled "Plan of land in Conway, N. H. Property of Leland W. Farrington", surveyed May, 1948, by Roger S. Burnell, Conway, N. H., duly recorded in Carroll County Registry of Deeds, being a parcel located at the northerly end of River Street, so-called in Conway Village, and to be used as an extension of said River Street, and being particularly recorded in deed of said Leland W. Farrington to the said Town of Conway, dated Feb. 5, 1949. Agreeable to a petition signed by George T. Davidson, Jr., and others.

ART. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the activities of the Eastern Slope Region, Inc. for the year 1949, agreeable to a petition signed by Neil W. Carver and others.

ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$505.39 to the White Mountains Region Assoc. being 1/100th of 1% of the Town Valuation (10c on \$1000.) for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising and otherwise calling attention to the resources and advantages of the Town in co-operation with the other 45 towns in the White Mountains Region. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert N. Davis and others.

ART. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to assist in maintaining the Memorial Hospital, at North Conway, N. H. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert H. Kennett and others.

ART. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6000.00 for State Aid Construction to be expended on the Kearsarge and River roads and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$978.26 for Town Road Aid.

ART. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to complete the surfacing and tarring of the Greenhill road. Agreeable to a petition signed by Ernest J. Monroe and others.

ART. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to construct a drain and catch basin for the reception and drainage of excess water on the southerly side of Main Street in Conway Village at the proper point between the drugstore of Stone the Druggist and the residence of Ernest R. Blake, and to instruct the Selectmen to construct such drain and catch basin. Agreeable to a petition signed by Harold L. Potter and others.

ART. 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the tarring of Pollard St. Extension, so-called, in Conway Village or such portion thereof as shall be in proper condition for the application of Tarvia, to make a tarred road, funds for the same to be a charge against the General Highway fund. Agreeable to a petition signed by Philip A. Schoolcraft and others.

ART. 15. To see what action the Town will take on accepting a Street in North Conway, starting at Oak St. and running south 88 degrees by 33 minutes west between the houses of George Gardner and George Gaudette and extending for a distance of 547 feet passing the houses of Forest Brown and Lawrence Bryant, the above street being laid out forty feet wide and already established in the Masonian lot plan. And to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction of said street. Agreeable to a petition signed by Forrest J. Brown and others.

ART. 16. To see if the Town will vote to accept the conveyance by deed of William G. Duprey to said town of a certain parcel of land for the purpose of a road or highway, said road to begin at route 302 between the property of Mark Birch and Richard T. Kyte being 52 feet wide and extending easterly

to the Maine Central Railroad. Agreeable to a petition signed by Arthur O. Lucy and others.

ART. 17. To see if the Town will vote to maintain a safe and suitable bridge across the pond to the Island so-called and appropriate necessary money for the same. Agreeable to a petition signed by Yvonne M. White and others.

ART. 18. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

ART. 19. To see if the Town will vote to request the State Tax Commission to make a complete re-appraisal of the land and buildings within the town, to equalize valuations in accordance with the law, and to appropriate money for this purpose.

ART. 20. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to Sewage disposal in the town, to complete a survey for the same and to see what sum of money will be raised and appropriated for the same.

ART. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to cover the expense of the heating plant installed in the Town garage.

ART. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Case Tractor and its equipment.

ART. 23. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to the wooden bridge over the Saco River on the River road so-called at North Conway and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

ART. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to borrow and hire under the Municipal Bond Act.

ART. 25. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

In addition to the foregoing cases, 243 complaints were received and investigated. This does not include calls from out of town police departments. Also, police investigated or assisted in investigation of 148 accidents, three of which were fatal. Automobiles reported stolen, 3; recovered, 3.

Report of Forest Fire Warden

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing co-operation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

- (1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.
- (3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your co-operation in this way is earnestly solicited.

To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board, in the name of the District, to contract with trustees of Fryeburg Academy for instruction of the high school pupils from East Conway, and to see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the ensuing year.
9. To see what sum of money the District will vote to

raise and appropriate for the purchase of new equipment for the ensuing year.

10. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of a Survey of the building and educational needs of the District.

11. To see if the District will vote to continue, and to add two members to the Special Committee which was set up to study the building needs at North Conway and to instruct them to work with the School Board and Superintendent in a survey of the building and educational needs of the District.

12. To see if the District will vote to reappropriate the one thousands dollars raised and appropriated at the 1948 Annual Meeting of the District, in order that it may be used during the next fiscal year to defray the expenses of architectural studies, plans, and cost estimates in connection with the building problems of the District.

13. To see if the district will vote to elect its district officers by an official ballot, and to adopt the provisions of sections 112 to 120 of chapter 34 of the Revised Laws as inserted by Chapter 22, Laws of 1943, the non-partisan ballot system, agreeable to a petition signed by Irene M. Lucy and others.

14. To see if the District will vote to authorize the school Board to include the janitors and other employees of the District in the State Employees Retirement System.

15. To act upon any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

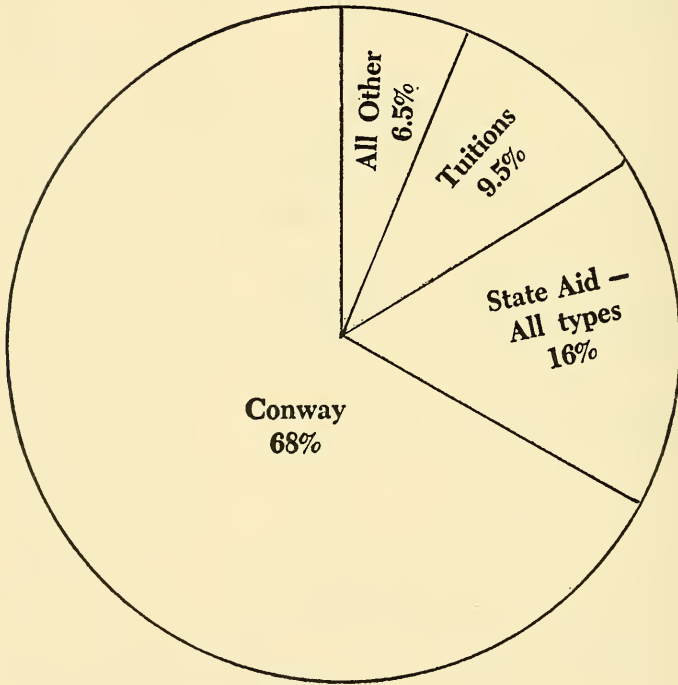

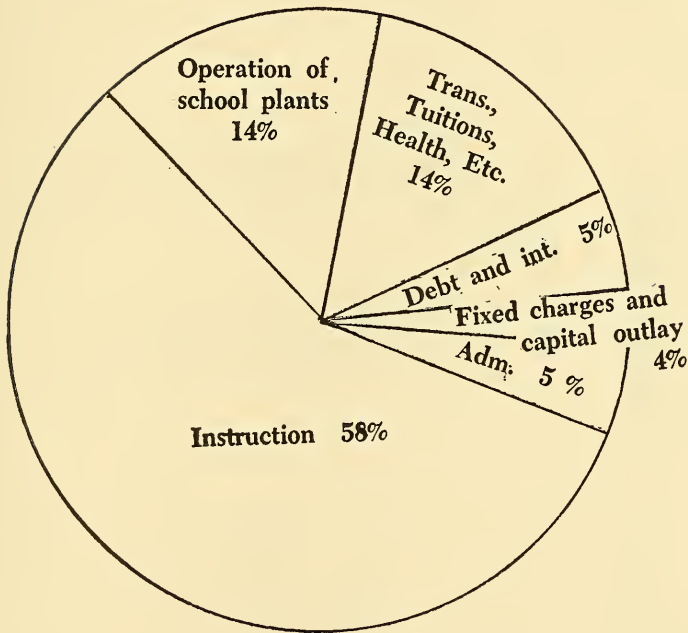

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board and Citizens of Conway:

The money to be received from the State to help support the schools has not yet been determined by the present Legislature. The plan proposed by Dr. Hilton C. Buley, Commissioner of Education, would provide Conway with \$23,373.19. I believe that most districts in New Hampshire must have revenue from sources other than the property tax if we are to have satisfactory schools. Of the 48 states, New Hampshire stands 43rd in the amount of State funds contributed toward the support of schools. If New Hampshire were supporting schools as much as the average State, Conway would receive more than \$80,000 from State funds.

There is a bill in the State Legislature, and one in the Federal Congress which proposes funds for school building construction. Those districts which need school buildings and have studied their building problems are likely to be the first to benefit from outside aid.

I urge you to support a complete survey of the educational and building needs of the district. This survey should guide the building program, and should assist in determining the over-all educational needs of the district. A part of the proposed survey should include a careful analysis of the educational offerings and a summary of what constitutes a reasonable program for Conway. It is an established fact that pupils who achieve reasonable school success in the first three grades seldom fail in school and usually are successful in life. This indicates that these grades should never exceed thirty pupils, and should be taught by the very best teachers the district can afford.

A study of the co-operative district organization might re-

veal some definite advantages to the school system and to the taxpayers. I recommend that such a study be authorized for the coming year.

In many communities, parents are studying school needs and methods. The present Lay-Professional organization might encourage every parent and interested person to belong to its organization, and could carefully study the schools and their needs.

In many districts pupils are benefiting from the services of a teacher who spends her full time assisting boys and girls who are retarded in one or more subjects. There are many causes for pupils' retardation. If these are analyzed and proper remedial work given, normal school progress may be expected from some who are now failing. A pupil who fails in his school work many times becomes a behavior problem in school and in the community. An investment to reduce pupil failure would result in better community citizenship.

The district is providing a physical education program for the high school boys, but only a limited one for the girls. Plans have been made to meet this deficiency for the coming school year. Conway has no trained persons on its staff to carry on an up-to-date physical education program for the elementary pupils.

Through the influence of the local Parent-Teacher Association, Conway is one of six New Hampshire towns to have the Federal dental team clean and apply the fluorine treatment to the teeth of every pupil, grades 1-8, whose parents desired this dental service. Over six hundred pupils were treated. The fluorine application reduces dental decay from 30 to 90%. Information is now being sent to each parent whose child was found by the dentist to have a cavity in order that the parent may know of fillings that may be needed. I appreciate the service and co-operation of everyone who made this clinic possible.

The North Conway and Conway Parent-Teacher Associations are continuing excellent lunch programs in their respective schools. A financial statement of the Kennett High School lunch program appears later in this report. A partial lunch program has been established at the Center Conway school. Additional facilities should be made available for next year in order that a complete lunch may be served.

The Center Conway building and grounds are adequate to house more pupils. An additional teacher in this building could temporarily reduce the crowded conditions in the Conway grammar school.

The cost of a sprinkler system at Conway grammar school would be about \$5,000 which would be saved in premiums based on present coverage in twelve years. A complete installation at Kennett High School would cost \$17,500.

I appreciate the help and co-operation given to me by the School Board, town officials, all members of the school staff and citizens, and thank each one for this assistance.

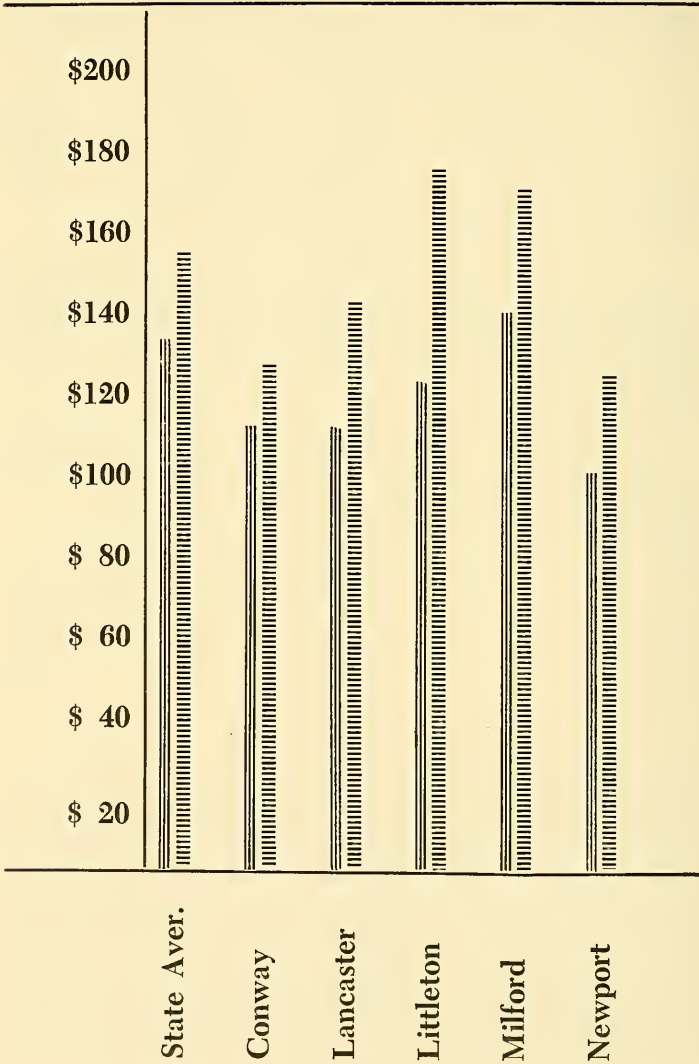

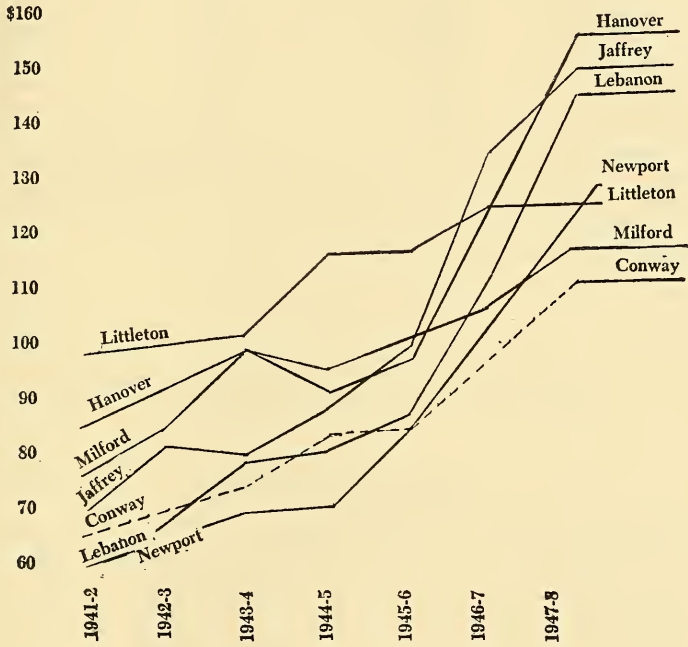
**PER PUPIL COST OF HIGH SCHOOL

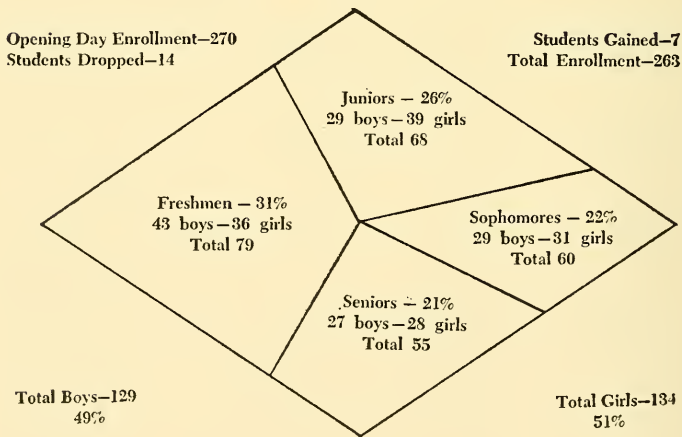
Headmaster's Report

The aim of the educational program at Kennett High School is to give every student every possible opportunity to develop himself as a total personality; conscious of a social responsibility. The following report of life and activities at Kennett will endeavor to picture the learning situations and experiences that have as their objective the full realization of this basic aim.

The academic school year opened on Wednesday, September 8th. The breakdown of school and class enrollment is depicted in the following chart.

SCHOOL AND CLASS ENROLLMENT

(As of January 1, 1949)



It is interesting to note what has become of the 14 students who have left school as of January 1, 1949. Two of the number have moved from town; two because of health reasons; while ten have left school because of lack of interest in high school work, indifferent school attitude, or to take up work.

For the majority of students, the attendance has been excellent, averaging 96% to date. In a few instances, however, the attendance of individuals has not been up to minimum standards and in practically each case the adjustment of the student to school work has not been satisfactory. Irregular school attendance is one of the prime factors in the cause of student failure.

Our academic program has been full and varied. The school, through its seven courses of study, attempts to set up a program of studies that will best serve the needs, interests, and aptitudes of the individual student.

The college and science curriculum aims at preparing these students for admission to the various colleges and schools of the individual's choice. Recent Kennett graduates have been admitted to Bates, Bowdoin, Dartmouth, University of New Hampshire, Keene Teachers' College, Plymouth Teachers' College, Brown, Harvard, Simmons and Columbia.

The course of study in the areas of home economics, shop, and agriculture has offered a varied program; and a large group of active and interested students have been participating in many different types of projects.

In home economics, for example, the home projects have included the making of dresses, blouses, skirts, embroidery, socks, baby sweaters, and mittens. They have also called for the cooking of meals for the entire family, experimentation with new recipes, assuming full care of girls' rooms, assisting with general housekeeping, scrapbooks for children, and child care, including meals. Other projects have included embroidery chair sets, dressing table covers, household budgeting and painting and papering the kitchen. The latter project has been accomplished with assistance of the parents concerned.

In agriculture, a number of interesting home projects are underway which include eight students in the field of poultry, six in dairying, six in vegetable gardening, three in beef, two in hogs, two in forestry and one in sheep.

In the shop, the agriculture students have been busy at work on such projects as poultry feed hoppers, knife racks, meat boards, ash trays, lamps, wheelbarrows, and corner cabinets, gun racks, book cases, and mechanical sanders.

In general shop, boys from each of the four classes have been busy on a number of interesting projects. One of the longest of these has been the construction of an electrical basketball sign to announce coming home basketball games.

Other projects have been the construction of book cases, cedar chests, record holder, gun racks, tool boxes, table lamps, tables, bread boards, corner shelves and similar projects.

A survey of the school's activities program would indicate that a busy and productive life is being experienced by a large percentage of the student body, according to individual interests and abilities.

The music program, under the able direction of Miss Golden May, has grown in stature and depth. In addition to a large girls' choir, there is a boys' glee club as well as a mixed glee club. Additional smaller vocal units are also active such as the K-dettes and the boys' and girls' octet.

With the assistance of Mr. Arthur Pottle, together with instructors from the community, a most worthwhile instrumental music program has been inaugurated at Kennett this year. Weekly lessons have been held and the nucleus of a school band has been started.

Kennett students have participated in the all-state music festival as well as the state auditions festival and have made a fine record for themselves in each instance.

An increasingly large number of students have profited from the panel discussion groups and have participated before public gatherings in and around the community. Additional public speaking experience has been gained by appearance in stated public gatherings in behalf of the American Red Cross.

Believing that one of the best ways to learn the ways of a democracy is to actually experience the democratic way in school life; the students, this year, created a new student council, based on the authority of a new constitution, drawn up by a constitutional assembly and ratified by the student body. This body has served as a most valuable organization and has done its job well. One of the interesting projects of this particular group was an inter-school discussion with members of the Rochester, New Hampshire, High School student council.

In the field of sports, Kennett has fared well. The football team won the championship of the White Mt. Football League, winning the title in competition with Berlin, Littleton and Plymouth. Over thirty boys were on the football squad, and they were tendered a victory banquet by the combined efforts of the Conway and North Conway Rotary Clubs, with Coach Glassford of the UNH as guest speaker.

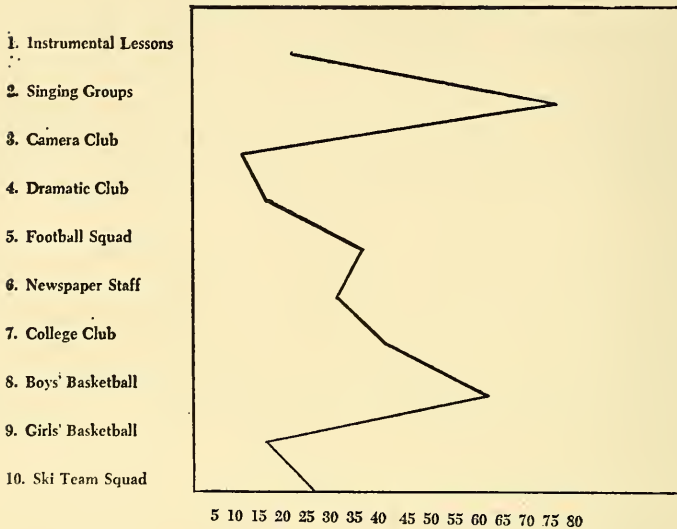
In basketball, the boys were invited to the Class "B" Interscholastic basketball tournament; while the girls after a slow start, improved rapidly and posted impressive wins over Berlin, and Bridgton Academy. The boys' Jayvees also have enjoyed a winning season as they compiled a record of nine wins and five defeats.

In skiing, the varsity squad competed in the Class "A" interscholastic meet at Sunapee, emerging with a fourth place rating among the nine top schools in the state. Kennett competitors were crowned the champions in the downhill and slalom events.

Other school activities that have come in for their share of active growth are the school newspaper, the college club, the school play, the cheerleaders, and the Camera Club. The latter group, under the expert and inspiring leadership of Mr. Les Buck, has made a valuable contribution to the school. His sudden passing has left a vacuum in the life of the school.

The following line graph will give some indication as to the number of participants in the school activities noted:

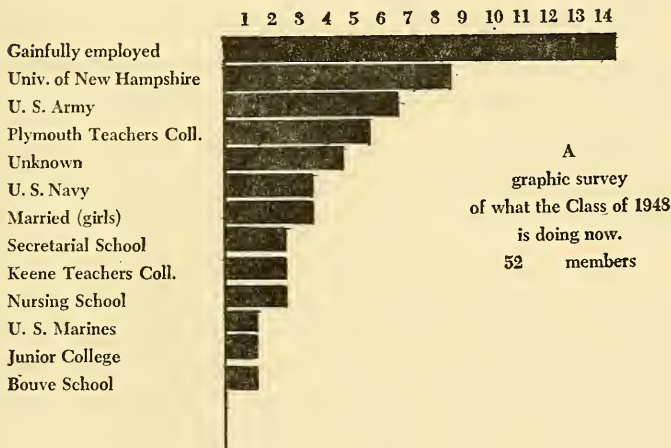

The responsibility of the secondary school with each student does not necessarily end with graduation. The school is vitally interested in what becomes of students, and is anxious to keep in touch with all personnel, graduates, as well as non-graduates. The school aims at successful student adjustment to the society in which we live, and it is through an intelligent follow-up that the success of a school program may well be judged. The following chart will show what the class of 1948 was doing as of January 1, 1949.

A glance at last year's report recalls that part which dealt with a look into the future. It is informative for us to compare notes and to see our progress and our limitations after the passing of a year.

We have added a course in contemporary civilization to our curriculum and we have offered American history in the Junior year. We have reached more personnel in the areas of agricul-

ture, Industrial arts and Home Economics, but there is still room for even wider participation by others.

We have made no progress in the area of safety education, but it is earnestly hoped that an adequate program, complete with a dual-control car, may be an actuality by 1950.

Our physical training program is not yet adequate. Our school nurse is carrying on a most worthwhile program in health education, but a constructive and meaningful physical training program for girls as well as boys is the aim of the immediate future.

We have attempted to report pupil progress in an informative and realistic way. Much in the way of continued improvement in this all important area is paramount.

Though our resource library has grown somewhat, one of the major weaknesses in our school plant is the lack of adequate library facilities and a competent person to handle them.

Much in the way of valuable information to aid in the all-important aspect of vocational guidance is offered each student. Personal interviews with the headmaster, vocational talks, movie, and literature are constantly emphasized as the student aims to make at least a tentative decision. For the college-bound student, visits to the institutions are encouraged as a means of preparing the pupil for more intelligent decision regarding his choice of college.

The demands of the society in which we live are ever-changing. We, at Kennett, are constantly striving to offer the best in educational opportunities to all who seek a general education.

We are striving to adjust the program of the school to meet the needs, interest and abilities of the individual pupil in a democratic society.

A hard-working and sincere faculty group is lending its

efforts to the full realization of this objective. To them, much credit is due.

In closing, I should like to express my sincere thanks to a most efficient and excellent faculty and to Mr. Hammond Young, who, as our superintendent of schools has given us the best in effective leadership and understanding in the solution of many and varied school problems that arise during the course of a school year.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE REPORTS

At the annual school meeting of Conway in 1948 the Special Committee studying the North Conway Grammar School problem was continued and \$1000 was raised and appropriated to defray the expenses of architectural studies, plans and estimates in connection with new construction or reconstruction of the present building.

In order to increase our knowledge of modern school requirements; types of school building construction; and also to acquaint ourselves with the types of work done by several architects; the committee made several trips visiting new and reconstructed schools in this state and in Maine. These investigations have fully convinced us that there is a degree of obsolescence in the present building and a lack of certain necessary facilities.

The committee is not in a position at this time to make its expected final report because during the year a situation has developed which requires a delay in this work until such time as other needs can be clarified. The School Board and the Superintendent have informed us that a problem has been developing in the Conway Grammar School area. The facilities there are already overcrowded and there are indications that they are facing a serious increase in pupil population during the next few years. In order that this subject may be adequately explored and the future needs of the school district as a whole be studied and long range plans laid, the School Board is asking for an appropriation for this purpose. Until such survey is made it has been deemed advisable to suspend work of this committee.

We believe that it is most important that the work of this committee be continued as soon as the School Board's survey is completed and that it be extended to include the entire School District. Undoubtedly new construction will be required to

meet modern needs and overcrowded conditions. Furthermore, it is anticipated that State and Federal funds may be made available in the very near future for new construction of school buildings and our School District should be in a position with completed studies and plans to take immediate advantage of any such developments and opportunities.

We recommend, therefore, that this committee be continued, with appointment of additional members to more fully represent all parts of the School District, and that the money appropriated (but not expended) last year be re-appropriated.
