To the Inhabitants of Dalton, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Dalton on Tuesday, the 12th of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To see if the Town will accept the Budget for 1946 as prepared by the Selectmen and make appropriations of the amounts therein or make any changes.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$46.00 to the White Mountains Region Association, being 1|100 of one percent of the Town Valuation.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$200.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust, and make appropriation for the same.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen the right to issue temporary loans on the anticipation of taxes.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$100.00 for Libraries and make appropriation for the same.
- 8. To transact such other business as may lawfully come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Dalton:

I hereby submit my annual report relative to your schools.

The increasing shortage of elementary teachers has particularly affected Dalton schools this year. To date the junior high room has had three different teachers.

In September, Mrs. Mattie Hibbard of Littleton, assumed the position left vacant by the resignation of Mrs. Silsby. After teaching a few days Mrs. Hibbard felt unable to complete her contract for reasons of ill health.

In this emergency, which nearly caused the closing of the school room, I appealed to Mrs. Edith Burbank for assistance. Though not seeking the work and even reluctant to assume it, Mrs. Burbank showed real public spirit by serving very efficiently as teacher for several weeks.

The latter part of November, Miss Mabel Harris of Whitefield, a graduate of Plymouth and Boston University, with good teaching experience, took over the work on a temporary basis.

Mrs. Hazel Tillotson is the teacher in the middle grades, replacing Miss Bergeron after the latter resigned to enlist in the WAVES.

The enrollment last year as will be seen in the table at the end of this report was 95. This year 82 have registered as compared with 94 at the corresponding time a year ago. The number of elementary pupils attending outside schools is expected to increase by no more than one or two pupils next year. Only one high school tuition pupil in the graduating class this year, with as many as eight who may enternext year will increase the expense of tuition. Fortunately, the cost this year is less than was budgeted so that the same estimate next year should be sufficient.

Budget increases for next year are mainly for salaries and transportation. Both of these items are now costing more than estimated a year ago.

The school nurse reports as follows regarding her work last year:

Number of diseased tonsils	10
Number tonsil operations	6

The audiometer was used to test the hearing of the pupils in Grades III-VIII.

The war has ended but the shortage of teachers continues. Some men are returning to high school

positions, so that the high school situation has eased slightly except in certain fields such as home economics and commerce. Elementary teachers, however, are leaving their positions for marriage, or other causes much faster than new elementary teachers have been trained as replacements. The shortage of elementary teachers "started even before the war, when four years of training were required to secure a position paying less than high school teachers received. At the present time it is difficult to secure enough elementary teachers in our state to keep all schools running another year.

The remedy for this situation is undoubtedly higher salaries so that girls will feel more inducement to train as elementary teachers. The present shortage will continue for the next few years until replacements have been trained.

This situation, together with equipment needs and increasing prices of all materials in this inflationary period, is increasing the financial cost of schools.

The cooperation of the public has been generously offered the past year. This has been thoroughly appreciated by the entire school personnel.

REPORT OF THE WHITE MOUNTAINS REGION ASSOCIATION

To the Voters of the Town of Dalton:

We hereby submit our annual report for the year 1945-46 showing what is being accomplished through the prestige gained by 46 towns working together in the interest of regional agriculture, industry and recreation:

AGRICULTURE: Sponsoring competition among 50 regional 4-H clubs to aid future agriculture by offering prizes to clubs and individual members for outstanding accomplishments; publishing expert advice from the Colebrook Agricultural Experiment Station on produce raising for profit; assisting cooperative efforts for raising, grading and marketing farm products.

INDUSTRY: Finding and following up new business possibilities and listing available sites, in cooperation with the State Industrial Division; broadcasting information of available research aid and results of experiments in wood waste use; offering facilities of State Industrial Division and University Research Division to towns and individuals.

RECREATION: Assisting towns, the state and U.S. Forest Service in plans to develop suitable recreation areas in the region; surveying and making known possibilities for improving facilities to increase regional income from commercial recreation.

AVIATION: Actively presenting region needs for airports and air service to state and federal agencies, to insure favorable action when federal funds are available.
