Commissioners' Report.

To the Citizens of Grafton County:-

We herewith submit our report of the affairs of the Coun-

ty for the year ending December 31, 1904.

Owing to the license money received during the year quite a substantial increase has been made in the surplus over that of last year so that the Treasurer's report shows a surplus above liabilities of \$14,851.09, a gain of \$6,517.34.

The liabilities are one note of \$18,000 and outstanding orders amounting to \$259.83, while the assets consisting of cash on hand, bills due the County Farm, and the personal property at the Farm amount to \$33,110.92. There is no bonded indebtedness, the last bond having been paid the last year.

The real estate owned by the County, and not considered in the above, consists of the Court House at Plymouth, Court House, Alms House, House of Correction, Jail, and Farm at Woodsville, the total valuation of which is not less than

\$75,000.

During the year we have put new steel work into the Probate vault in the Court House at Woodsville at an expense of \$1633.75 and paid \$842.72 for the completion of the reindexing of records in the office of the Register of Deeds. This work was commenced in 1897, and the whole expense has been \$8979.01. At the County Farm a new barn has been built, a part of the insane house built over into a house of correction, and other permanent improvements have been carried out at an expense of not less than \$5000.

The Court expenses have been about the same as in 1903, while the cost of supporting paupers and dependent soldiers

off the farm and the net cost at the farm has been somewhat less.

The County Farm, which is still under the management of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Phillips, is in a prosperous condition. The buildings are in good repair, and the land in a high state of cultivation.

The live stock on the farm consists of 9 horses, 110 cows, 29 heifers, 16 calves, 3 bulls, and 71 hogs and pigs. The produce raised on the farm as inventoried December 31st, 1904, was 165 tons hay, 250 tons ensillage, 1400 bushels oats, and a large quantity of vegetables.

In accordance with Chapter 30, Section 1, Public Statutes, the Superintendent of the County Farm shall make up his report to January 1 annually, and also Section 2 of said Chapter requires that the Superintendent's report shall contain in addition, a list of paupers actually supported at the Farm, and the number of weeks each was so supported, also a statement of the average cost per week for each pauper, with an explanation of the basis upon which said calculations were made.

The whole number of persons supported and partially supported for the year ending December 31, 1904, was one hundred and forty two (142).

The number of weeks board is ascertained by taking the number of days between the day of admittance and day of departure of each individual and dividing that number by seven, which gives the number of weeks each individual has been so supported.

The whole cost of supporting paupers at the Farm for the year ending December 31, 1904, is \$8934.47 and this sum divided by the whole number of weeks board furnished, viz., 4940 gives \$1.81 as the price per week.

There are no civil suits pending for or against the County, or have been brought within the past year. The Solicitor has brought two suits to recover penalty on forfeited license bonds; one against Charles H. Hare, is still pending.

Much annoyance and some damage was reported by tramps during the early part of the year, but the policy pursued by the officials has materially lessened the number of violations of this law in the

County.

The present provisions of the law for the punishment of light offenses are unsatisfactory, and the growing need of a State House of Correction or a State Reformatory is apparent. Legislative investigation and action is recommended.
