#### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampstead in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Hampstead on Tuesday, the doth cay of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defrag town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to keep the unimproved roads and bridges in repair.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to meet the expenses of the Public Library, the ensuing year.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day, and what method they will adopt to expend the same.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the cemeteries for the ensuing year.

- 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the town in anticipation of taxes.
- 8. To hear reports of auditors and committees, and to act thereon.
- 9. To see if the town will accept State Aid for construction of State Road, West Hampstead, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$1290.00 or will accept State Aid for the construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$150.35.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 to pay note for the Fire Engine.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 to pay note for the Fire House.
- 12. To see if town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 to build Driveway to Fire House, money to be spent under supervision of Selectmen.
- 13. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$100.00 for Health Department, to be used to care for Public Dumps, and Expense of Health Officer. Money to be expended on approval of the Selectmen.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to the Trustees of the Trust Funds for reimbursement on part of the principal.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for Driveway to West Hampstead Cemetery, providing town of Sandown raises same.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$15.00 for resetting and repairing Stones in West Hampstead Cemetery.

- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 to repair Driveway in Lakeview Cemetery.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to use on Local Defense due to War emergency. To be spent under supervision of the Selectmen.
- 19. To see if the town will vote to purchase of Clarence Walker, his heirs or assigns, the Palmer property, so called located on both sides of Main Street in Hampstead consisting of the dam site or sites, all flowage rights and all land connected therewith on both sides of said Street, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) to purchase the same.
- 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

## THE REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hampstead:

I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of your schools.

The Statistical Report is for the school year ending June 30, 1941. This report is followed by the reports of the Headmaster of the High School and the Music Supervisor.

There have been no changes in the teaching staff of the elementary schools in Hampstead since the last report. Miss C. Adelaide Merriman resigned her position at the end of the year, as Headmaster of the High School, and the vacancy was filled by the appointment of Miss Clara Thurber. The vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Laurence Cornwell, during the summer, was filled by the appointment of Mr. John Norton. Miss Irma Hollingshead and Miss Jeanette Saigh furthered their education by professional study at Keene Summer School last summer.

The enrollment for the year covered by this report was one hundred and seventy-five, showing a decrease of seventeen from that of the previous year. The school attendance averaged 94.64 percent of the membership, as compared with the state average of 94.70 percent.

There were fifteen boys and girls who completed the work of the eighth grade last June, and all of them have entered a high school this year. Each year the pupil in the graduating class of the elementary schools, who has best exemplified the principles of good citizenship is awarded a medal by the Sons of the American Revolution. This year the award was presented to Marilyn Whiteneck.

The report presented by Miss Thurber contains detailed information about the Hampstead High School. Last summer the Kaustine tank in the boys' toilet was replaced. The other tank was replaced a year before this. We now have two new tanks. The Home Economics room was widened by moving the partition back and taking about four feet from the width of the Junior High room. The latter room is still larger than a standard class room, while the laboratory is greatly improved.

Miss Helen Thomas, our school nurse, has been absent, due to illness, since November. Mrs. Elizabeth Hay, of Hampton, is taking her place, and is doing excellent work directing the health program in the Hampstead schools.

In December the recommendations and suggestions of the National Council for Civilian Defense, for the care of children at schools during air raids, were adopted and put into practice in our schools. The air raid shelters have been selected and the children, through frequent drills, have become accustomed to using them. Schools have been equipped with pails and shovels for the handling of incendiary bombs. The older children have been given minor responsibilities in this work, and the drills have been so conducted as to allay fear among the children.

Emphasis on the academic program, and particularly on Reading, Arithmetic, and Health has been main-

tained. The primary reading program has continued to be based on the "Alice and Jerry" series of textbooks and instructional material in grade one through Grade three, which have proved effective. We nava also tried to diagnose reading disabilities and their causes, and to plan work to fit individual needs. The Metropolitan Achievement Tests, and the Otis Tests of Mental Ability have been given and prove most helpful in this work. -The Arithmetic program is based on the recommendations made in 1936 by a national committee of specialists in the teaching of arithmetic in the elementary schools. This program with diagnostic tests and remedial work has made the instruction more effective. All arithmetic books now printed follow the new recommendations. As older text books have become worn out, we have replaced them with the new Curriculum books.

This year the Central School reports special efforts in the development of reading skills. This has been the aim of the first and second grades. Audience reading, and phonetic drills furnish needed experience along with the daily lesson and seatwork. This group have also been putting special emphasis on Courtesy and Safety as they use them at home and at school. Nature as they see it every day has been another interesting study. The Indians, Pilgrims, and Eskimos have furnished many interesting topics for conversation and study. The study of Spelling has received special attention in all the grades. In grade two individual record charts are used. In grades three and four each child's objective is to sail his boat to Good Spelling Land. A monthly average of ninety or more enables the pupil to sail his boat farther along until Good Spelling Land is reached. In grades five and six it is the goal of each pupil to be entered on the Spelling Roll. New names are added as perfect papers are attained.

The studies of health, safety and courtesy receive the attention of the children in this school. Uncle Sam's Army of Health and Safety in the third and fourth grade room, offers each child the opportunity to advance in rank, if each health inspection and safety checkup shows a perfect record. Class Hygiene Records are kept for each child in grades five and six. Different children are chosen each week to assist the teacher in daily inspection. This school shows a fine enrollment in the Junior Red Cross. At Christmas time this group made tray covers to be sent to the Old Ladies Home in Haverhill, and filled boxes with toys and games for needy children.

Creative handwork is enjoyed by all groups, especially at Christmas time. Memo books, bureau scarfs, wall pictures, and standing calendars were some of the gifts made by the pupils.

Our Girl Scouts, Troop I, Hampstead, meet each week in the first and second grade room at the Central School under the direction of Miss Ruth Caddell, Capt.. and Mrs. Alberta Carpenter, Acting Lieut. It is divided into two patrols, Junier and Senior. Both groups are working toward their second class badge. The Senior Patrol presented a puppet show at the January Parent-Teacher's meeting and at the Central School. Library work has been chosen for Community Service.

Radio programs, intended for use as aids in teaching history, geography and literature have been utilized each week. These programs have been most helpful both to teachers and pupils. Motion picture films have been used to a limited extent in teaching history and geography. We hope to make it possible to use them more often in the near future.

Our Parent Teacher Association continues to work for the welfare of the schools and education. We appreciate their help and assistance. The Educational Policies Commission of the National Education Association performed a splendid service to education by preparing a bulletin in January entitled, "A War Policy for American Schools". In this report this commission suggests that education can make its best contribution to the war if school boards and educational workers consider carefully the following activities as both necessary and appropriate war duties of the schools:

Training workers for war industries and services.

Safeguarding health and physical efficiency.

Producing goods and services needed for the war.

Conserving materials by wise consumption and salvage.

Helping to raise funds to finance the war.

Increasing effective man power by correcting educational deficiencies.

Protecting school children and property against attack.

Protecting the ideals of democracy against war hazards.

Teaching the issues, aims, and progress of the war. Sustaining the morale of children and adults.

Maintaining intelligent loyalty to American Democracy.

The Commission reminds us that there was never a time when educators carried such a heavy responsibility, nor ever a time when their work was of greater significance. The schools have an important part to play in the battle for democracy. The times ahead will call for more generous financial support of the schools. The cost of supplies is rising rapidly. Fortunately schools are assured of reasonable supplies through a priority rating.

A shortage of teachers already exists not only in the elementary schools, but is even being felt in the high schools. We must do all that is possible to maintain the quality of our schools. We must strengthen them rather than allow the standard to be lowered as happened during World War No. 1.

In conclusion, I wish to express my thanks to the members of the School Board for their interest and activity in the planning and carrying out of the school program of the past year. I would also commend the teachers, who meet the children from day to day, for their loyal cooperation in handling the numerous problems of instruction and leadership. We have had fine public support for the school program. The training of our youth is a joint task, all community and home agencies must cooperate if it is to be well done.

The administrative staff at the Hampstead High School having so recently taken office, it is impossible to give a complete report for the entire year.

No forth the greatest improvement in the school plant was the enlargement of the laboratory. Both ' cree and home economics classes are greatly benefit by this additional space. The installation of an interpretation provides a much broader field of entering for the home economics classes and the pure a fire blanket is an excellent safety measure.

For a small weeks all the water used in the school had to a transported in pails. The lack of an adequate water couply and facilities for personal cleanliness are conditions most deplored by those who wish to see the school serve the best interests of the pupils.

I note that bulletin boards were recently installed. These are now being used very effectively—to display the work, to treat graphically some particular theme or problem, and to post announcements of general interest.

President Roosevelt urges the promotion of discussion groups which he believes are "one of the most democratic means of developing popular understanding of pressing public issues." Many efforts are made to develop such groups and, under the careful guidance of the teachers, much class work follows such a procedure

Recognizing the importance of training high school students to understand present situations as much as possible and to fit themselves to participate in establishing a better world order, we employ various means of stimulating interest in such matters. Many pupils have subscribed for school papers—Every Week, Our Times,

and Scholastic. Much use is also made of the excellent group of prograzines for which yearly subscriptions were given by the Parent-Teacher Association. In addition to these we have the valuable contribution of the Christian Scholae Monitor by Mrs. John Sanborn. Pupils are also able to obtain the Reader's Digest at reduced rates through the school and increasing numbers are availing themselves of this privilege. A discussion of current topics forms an important part of the work in each of the fields of instruction.

Further stimulation of world affairs comes through the use of the radio and a discussion of radio programs. This field offers many opportunities which have not yet been employed. Plans are under way for class forums incorporating the program of the Town Meeting of the Air. Five pupils are participating in the contest sponsored by the League of Nations involving a competitive examination in the subject, "The Struggle for World Order".

Pupils have demonstrated their desire to serve others as much as possible. The entire student body has membership in the Junior Red Cross. Acting in this capacity, groups are carrying on projects in sewing and knitting. At Christmas time, greeting boxes were contributed from our school to be sent as gestures of friendship to children in some foreign country; a braille instrument was purchased and brailled greeting cards were sent to blind people of our acquaintance; and a Christmas box was sent to a needy family. Many students are preparing themselves to serve the local community through training themselves in First Aid and Air Raid Warden Instruction.

The Student Council is serving the interests of the school in a very efficient manner. Through leadership in many types of activities tending to promote better school citizenship, it is furnishing an excellent oppor-

tunity for students to experience democracy as well as study about it.

The new curriculum entitled Science Survey is proving a valuable addition to the program this year.

Guidance is the intregating force in the whole school program. Through a testing program and detailed observation, the needs of individual pupils are carefully studied and efforts are made by the various teachers responsible to meet these needs. Frequent conferences with individual pupils are held by the submaster and headmaster; through contacts made at Parent-Teacher meetings and a definite program of home visits. efforts are made for closer cooperation between home and school for the welfare for the pupils; vocational units are being arranged in each of the major fields of instruction to enable pupils to appreciate more fully the problems of workers in many fields and to plan intelligently for their own future.

A good spirit has been demonstrated in the social program of the school. Many successful parties have been held, outstanding among them being the Christmas party and the winter carnival. The year's athletic program includes activities designed to meet the needs and interests of all students. Basketball teams have played good games and shown a fine spirit of sportsmanship. We appreciate the cooperation of the alumni in playing two sets of games which were much enjoyed by all.

Interesting assemblies and a worth-while club program have provided further opportunity for experience in democratic procedure.

Gilbert and Sullivan's operetta, "Pinafore" was presented in a very creditable manner before an audience which seemed very appreciative even though considerably depleted because of inclement weather.

Our school library needs much attention. The supply of books has been supplemented through special arrangements with the State Library and the Public Library Commission and the Haverhill Public Library. A better cataloguing system has been undertaken by a committee appointed by the Student Council and assisted by the teachers. Plans are also under way for building a much needed rack for current magazines.

The safety program this year involves air raid drills as well as fire drills both of which have been executed successfully many times.

Various minor illnesses occurring at school have demonstrated the need for a cot so that sick pupils might rest for a time and possibly return to work or at least be able to lie down while waiting for transportation home. A folding cot of the stretcher type seems most desirable.

The hot lunch program has been somewhat enlarged this year. Through the efforts of volunteer student committees under the direction of the home economics teacher, an attempt is being made to make available at cost one nourishing hot dish each day. If this plan receives good cooperation from parents and pupils, prices can be reduced, a greater variety provided, and a definite contribution made to the health and general welfare of the students.

I wish to take this opportunity to express appreciation for the cordial spirit of cooperation which we as teachers and administrators have felt in Hampstead. We hope that as time goes on, the welfare of the school and community may steadily be promoted in this manner.
