#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Harrisville in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Well's Memorial School in said Harrisville on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To determine and appoint the salaries of Town Officers and fix the compensation of any other agent of the Town.
- 4. To hear reports of agents, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$459.81 if the state will contribute \$3,065.40 for T.R.A. work.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to be used in co-operation with State and Federal funds, for the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the Town.
- 8. To see if the Town of Harrisville will vote to buy from Velma Fraser for the sum of One Dollar the following described tract of land:

A certain tract of land situated easterly of the highway from Marlboro to Chesham in the district of Pottersville, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the northeast corner thereof at a corner of stone walls; thence southerly along a stone wall which separates land now or formerly of Annala and land of Velma M. Fraser fifty (50) feet to an iron pin in said stone wall; thence westerly eleven hundred ninety (1190) feet, more or less, along other land of Velma M. Fraser to a stone wall at land

sold by Velma M. Fraser to Clifford Mayou by deed dated July 3, 1951, recorded in Vol. 571, Page 453 of the Cheshire County Registry of Deeds; thence northerly along said stone wall fifty (50) feet to a corner of stone walls; thence south 73° east eleven hundred ninety (1190) feet to the stone wall at place of beginning.

9. To see if the Town of Harrisville will vote to sell to Clifford Mayou for the sum of One Dollar the following tract of land:

A certain tract or parcel of land situated easterly of the highway from Marlboro to Chesham in Pottersville, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a corner of walls on the northerly side of an old road and at a corner of land now or formerly of the heirs of Gertrude Russell; thence northerly on the said wall and said Russell land about 75 feet to a corner of walls; thence easterly on said Russell land bounding partly on a stone wall to a corner of walls; thence southerly on another wall bounding on land of this grantor and the remains of a stone wall about 250 feet to the said old road; thence westerly bounding on a wall on said old road to the place of beginning.

- 10. To see if the Town of Harrisville will vote to purchase a new truck and to pay for the same by:
  - a. Raising the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) by taxation.
  - b. Withdrawing Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) from the capital reserve fund, and
  - c. Turning in the old truck as part payment.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for repairs on bridge southwest of the vestry.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at auction the M30 Tractor and old Sander. The proceeds to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for road equipment.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for improvement of the Harrisville Beach.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for improvement of the beach at Russell Reservoir just north of the dam.
- 15. To see of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to prepare and maintain a skating rink on Harrisville Pond.

- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for a cab for the fire truck stationed in Chesham.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for (5) five street lights on Bemis Hill in Chesham.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20.00 for a street light on a pole in front of the Allen Vincent residence.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to purchase from Philip E. Scott for the sum of one dollar the former Boston and Maine Railroad right of way extending east ten hundred fifty (1,050) feet from the present terminus of the town road on the south shore of Lake Skatutakee.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to expend the sum of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) to improve the former Railroad right of way purchased by the town in Article 19.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to approve the appointment by the Selectmen of a Zoning Commission of five (5) members, which Commission shall make recommendations regarding zoning districts and appropriate regulations and shall hold a public hearing thereon prior to a final report of said Commission as provided by Chapter 51, Section 55 of the Revised Laws of the State of New Hampshire.
- 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

#### TOWN MEETING, MARCH 10, 1953

Moderator called the meeting to order by reading the Town Warrant. Moderator opened the polls at 9:30 A. M. for Town Voting. Recessed the Town Meeting and opened the School Meeting for school voting. At 10:30 A. M. the moderator called the Town Meeting to order.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

Ballot Clerks: John Priest and George Winn Election Officers: Bernard Bemis and George G. Mason.

(1) Police officers: Clifton Richardson, Edward Gregoire, Clarence Seaver, Justin Chamberlain.

(2) Trustee of Trust Fund, John N. Clark.

- (3) Old Home Day Committee: Casper C. Bemis, Jr., Alfred Dietze, Edward N. Winn.
- (4) Firewards: Leonder St. Peter, Ralph Bemis, Frederick Davis, Charles M. Bergeron, Justin Chamberlain.
- (5) Surveyors of wood and lumber: Harold W. Pope, William P. House.
- (6) Fence Viewers: Harold W. Pope, Ralph B. Bemis.
- (7) Christmas tree committees for Harrisville: Charles M. Bergeron, Alfred E. Dietze, Guy W. Thayer. For Chesham: J. Edward Mattila, Casper C. Bemis, Jr., Raymond Goodyear.
- (8) Overseer of the poor, Harold W. Pope.

(9) Library Trustee, Guy W. Thayer.

- (10) Harrisville Beach Committee: John Marnell, Alfred Deitze, Guy W. Thayer.
- Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

  Voted to adopt the town budget as prepared by the Selectmen and add \$50.00 to the amount raised for Town Officers salaries and \$200.00 more to the Fire department.
- Article 3. To determine and appoint the salaries of town officers and fix compensation of any other agent of the town. Voted to leave the salaries as they are.

- Article 4. To hear reports of agents, committees, or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
  - (1) Report by Selectman William P. House that Congregational Church building was not for sale.
  - (2) Reports of Selectmen, Town Clerk, Tax Collector, Town Treasurer, Road Agent, Trustees of Trust Funds, Auditors, and Fire Department all accepted.
  - (3) Voted to authorize firewards to take money from Fire Department appropriation to make a water hole near the Richard Upton residence in Chesham.
  - (4) Voted that the firewards instruct the selectmen to take up to \$100.00 from the fire department appropriation to maintain, or improve, the present water holes.
  - (5) Reports of Library Treasurer, Librarian and Old Home Day Committee accepted.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes. Selectmen and Town Treasurer voted authority to borrow said money.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$452.70, if the state will contribute \$3,018.02 for T.R.A. work. Voted for T.R.A. \$452.70.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to turn over to the Capital Reserve Fund for the bridge at the Chesham Post Office the sum of \$1,480.80, voted in 1951 for the east side Silver Lake Road which sum has not been expended. Voted to accept Article 7 as written.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,269.20 to construct the Chesham Post Office Bridge and use the sum of \$3,480.80 in the Capital Reserve Fund for the Chesham Post Office Bridge. Voted to accept Article 8 as written.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote the three thousand dollars (\$3,000) received from the state of New Hampshire for reimbursement of flood damages, occasioned in 1950 toward the purchase of a combination bull-dozer, loader and snowplow, the cost of which will not exceed thirteen thousand five hundred dollars (\$13,500). Voted the \$3,000 as above mentioned.

- Article 10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to purchase a combination bulldozer, loader and snowplow at a price not to exceed thirteen thousand, five hundred dollars (\$13,500) and to permit the selectmen to use the \$3,000 received from the state of New Hampshire for reimbursement of flood damage occasioned in 1950 and to borrow the sum of \$10,500 to be repaid in five yearly installments, the first installment being paid in 1953. Voted to accept Article 10 as written above.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 to be used in cooperation with State and Federal Funds for the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the town. Voted to raise the \$400 for same.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to replace culverts and otherwise improve the Venable Road. Voted to raise the \$500 for culverts and improvement of the Venable road.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 to build a road to the cottages along the southwest side of Harrisville Pond, as laid out by the Selectmen in August 1952. Voted this article be laid on the table.
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750 to be placed in a sinking fund for the replacement of the road equipment under provisions of the Capital Reserve Fund Act of 1943, Chap. 160, as amended. Voted to raise the \$750 for the sinking fund as above stated.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for repairs on the bridge southwest of the Vestry. Voted to raise the \$500 for bridge mentioned.
- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for improving the Grimes Hill Road. Motion passed in affirmative to raise this \$500.00.
- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a lease with Cheshire Mills for the coal sheds for the purpose of storing road machinery, at an annual rent of one dollar (\$1.00). Voted to adopt Article 17 as written.

- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for painting the Harrisville Station, the sum of money to be announced by the Selectmen at the meeting. Voted to raise two hundred and seventy-six dollars (\$276.00) for painting the Harrisville Station.
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for five (5) street lights on Bemis Hill in Chesham. Voted that Article 19 be laid on the table.
- Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20 for a street light on a pole across from the Fire Station in Harrisville. Voted that Article 20 be laid upon the table.
- Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20 for a street light on a pole in front of the Allen Vincent residence. Voted to put Article 21 on the table.
- Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept the \$100 received from Margaret & Albert Upton for the care of their cemetery lot. Voted to accept the above \$100 for care of lot.
- Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to accept the \$100 received from Chessie B. Foster for the care of the Carl H. Bemis cemetery lot. Voted to accept the above \$100 for care of lot.
- Article 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
  - (1) Voted to authorize the Selectmen to purchase land in East View from Floyd Keough to give the town an approach for gravel in the town gravel bank and to pay the sum of \$100 from the Highway appropriation.
  - (2) Motion to enter float in the Keene Bi-Centennial Parade laid upon the table.
  - (3) Voted that Selectmen post the notice for town meeting in 1954 in the Wells Memorial School in Chesham. Discussion as to a night or day meeting followed and a night meeting met with favorable response, but no vote was taken on that motion.
  - (4) Voted to put a resume of the 1953 Town Meeting in the next Town Report.

- (5) Voted to add \$50 to the budget on officers' salaries for the purpose of collecting head taxes.
- (6) Voted that selectmen get an estimate on the cost of printing the valuations of real estate in town for the town report and report at the next meeting.
- 2 p. m. Recessed Town Meeting for School Meeting. 3 p. m. Continued Town Meeting.

The following were elected to Town Offices: William P. House, Selectman for 3 years; Helen B. Thayer, Town Clerk for 1 year; Dorothy Luoma, Treasurer for 1 year; Arthur Wikman, Road Agent for 1 year; Ernest Chamberlain, Cemetery Agent for 1 year; Clarence Seaver, Constable for 1 year. All officers qualified at time or later and all officers notified and they signed the form under the Subversive Activities of 1951.

#### REPORT OF ROAD AGENT

Even though we had an extremely wet spring, there was very little water damage. Minor wash-outs occurred on the Long Pond road where the culvert is not adequate.

Most of our back roads are too narrow and improperly graded which makes for difficult maintenance. Then too, many of our roads are down to rock bottom due to the fact that the gravel we were able to get on them was used up faster than we were able to replace it by the increasingly heavy traffic they have had to bear.

With the purchase of the Hough payloader last year, we have been able to slow this process down quite a bit, but there are still many roads that will be bad come spring time with frost heaves.

Our town truck is too light and small for the heavy work it has been called on to do and, with all the repairs, has proved to be a very expensive piece of equipment.

There is another problem that we have to think about and that is the possibility of running out of a good grade of gravel in the foreseeable future. In view of this, it is suggested that each year we widen a part of our road system, installing proper drainage and finishing the following year.

This idea has been followed on the Grimes Hill road and the Venable road extension, as far as the money appropriated would allow. However, both these roads need gravel and should have it this year so they won't back-slide again.

A section of T.R.A. should be tarred each year so that gradually we will gain permanent improvements in our roads, thereby cutting down the need for so much gravel each year.

With the very dry summer we had, our obsolete grader was of little use and we had to hire a heavier grader. Calcium chloride was very helpful and was used generously.

The progress we have made in the past year would not have been possible without the cooperation of the people, the Selectmen and the men working with me.

#### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Library Treasurer and Trustees of Trust Funds.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: Dec. 31, 1952-Dec. 31, 1953: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1952 and December 31, 1953, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the financial condition of the Town changed from a Surplus of \$1,560.45 to a Net Debt of \$7,802.01 during the year 1953.

### Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

## Comparative Statement of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1953, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$3,096.01, less a net revenue surplus of \$710.10, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$2,385.91.

#### Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1953, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance, as of December 31, 1953, is indicated in Exhibit F.

#### AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

#### **GENERAL COMMENTS**

### Surety Bond of Town Treasurer:

The surety bond of the Town Treasurer was written for \$4,000.00 in 1953. Inasmuch as the funds handled by the Treasurer in 1953 totalled \$125,000.00, it is recommended that the surety bond be increased to \$8,000.00, in 1954, in order that the amount of the bond be more proportionate to the amount of funds which the Treasurer handles.

#### Conclusion:

The accounts and records of all town officials which we examined were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to the uniform system prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Harrisville for their assistance during the course of the audit.

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Harrisville qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Wells Memorial School in said district on the 9th day of March, 1954 at 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated income and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see whether the district would desire to hold the annual school district meeting on an evening date prior to the annual town meeting.
- 10. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450) as an additional appropriation to be made available prior to June 30, 1954; to meet

costs of grading and fill for the playground and additional costs of teachers retirement as set by revised state law.

- 11. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of nine hundred dollars (\$900) for the purchase and installation of a 5,500 gallon oil storage tank at the school.
- 12. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) for payment of additional costs of light, heat and janitor service, so that public groups may use the building at no charge; or to make any recommendations relative to after school use of the building.

Article 7. Nothing was done.

Next: Motion was made to pass on to Article 9 then return to Article 8. Motion carried.

Article 9. Motion was made and seconded to print a summary of the minutes of this meeting and succeeding meetings in the school report, until rescinded. The vote was in the affirmative.

Mr. Parker made the proposal for consideration that the school budget be presented similar to that proposed for town expenditures. Thus: Item-Appropriation previous year.

Actual expenditures previous year.

Estimated expenditures ensuing year.

Those present were in favor of this proposal.

Mr. Doore explained there would undoubtedly be a \$500.00 balance this year beyond the estimated budget. If we buy a 5000 gal, oil tank there will be a 5¢ saving per gal, of oil. The tank may cost a little more than \$500.

Motion was made to buy the larger oil tank (5000 gal.) from available funds not yet appropriated. Vote was in the affirmative.

Mr. Doore made a resolution that the School District express its gratitude and appreciation to Mrs. Bertha Bemis for the long years of service she gave as Treasurer of the School District. The Clerk was to send a letter expressing this gratitude and appreciation. The vote was unanimous and in the affirmative. A rising vote of thanks was given for Mrs. Bemis.

Article 8. Mr. Doore moved that the school district raise and appropriate \$28,525.20 and to authorize and direct the school board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the school board exclusive of state aid, and upon the determination of the amount of state aid to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the school board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from state aid and with the school district clerk certify to the selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes.

The vote was in the affirmative.

At 3:10 p. m. all had voted who wished. The motion was then made to close the school polls. Vote was in the affirmative.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

The Harrisville School District has been fortunate in solving the many problems it has met in the past school year. Some of these follow.

The retirement of Mrs. Effie Hunt presented a difficult problem in these days of severe teacher shortage. After an intensive effort to obtain a capable teacher of high caliber, Mrs. Marian Sabin was elected and has proved to be a valuable member of the staff.

Transportation again became an acute problem. All efforts to obtain a reasonable bid from established bus operators failed. Finally, Mr. Fred Davis decided to purchase a bus and accepted a three year contract at a very acceptable figure.

The problem of filling and grading additional playground space for the ball-field was nicely solved when the state constructed a new section of roadway, and through the efforts of Mr. William Bemis, agreed to supply fill at no cost other than necessary bulldozing. Our playground area has almost doubled in size this year.

The problem of improving and broadening the educational program at the Wells Memorial School has been met to a degree seldom achieved in a small elementary school. Through sharing of special teacher services with nearby school districts, Harrisville is now able to offer its children, in addition to the traditional elementary subjects, excellent art training under a certified art instructor. In addition, those pupils who find difficulty in reading, now receive help from a specially trained reading teacher. The singing ability of the pupils was amply demonstrated during the Christmas Operetta and is a credit to the staff and the music supervisor.

All in all, difficult problems have been successfully met and solved this year and much credit is due the school board as well as all members of the school staff.

#### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

TO THE CITIZENS OF HARRISVILLE, NEW HAMPSHIRE:

As Principal of Wells Memorial School, I have the pleasure to present the following report.

Again this year we have the student body participating in the Wells Memorial Association, the student government organization introduced by my predecessor. Through this organization student problems are kept at a minimum, and those problems that do arise are handled in a democratic manner, benefiting the majority. Serving in the association brings to each pupil a better understanding of parliamentary procedure and correct methods used in participating in meetings. Business handled correctly with ease by the pupils makes this experience constantly worthwhile.

Following last year's custom, we are again conducting monthly school dances. Each year I marvel at the speed with which the first graders learn dance steps and calls. These dances provide wholesome recreation in a supervised atmosphere. The development of social grace and constant improvement of the social behavior of the children is greatly evidenced by those that attend dances. Parents will enjoy attending a dance, and derive much pleasure from watching youth at play.

This year we have been fortunate in having two cadet teachers from Keene Teachers College in Keene, New Hampshire; one each semester. Miss Elizabeth Sweet has worked some time in all grades during the first semester, and Miss Hazel Taylor will devote her time next semester to working in the lower grades. Having these cadet teachers has made for more individual attention for more pupils possible. Cadet teachers working at the Wells Memorial School have a fine opportunity to work in an outstanding, well-equipped, small elementary school.

With the addition of Mrs. Stella Eaton as art supervisor and Mrs. Elva Rawding as remedial reading instructor this year, your educational facilities in town are showing progress. You should be proud as taxpayers who are constantly increasing areas of education for the children of Harrisville.

As principal I welcome Mrs. Marian Sabin as teacher in Grades 3, 4, and 5. Mrs. Sabin comes to us a well-informed teacher with varied experiences, and has already proven a valuable addition to your staff at the school.

At Christmas time the school children presented an operetta, "Santa's Vacation," which proved a splendid example of school-community cooperation. Through this wonderful spirit of cooperation, a program worthwhile to all in the community was presented.

## WELLS MEMORIAL SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM REPORT, 1953

The Lunch Program I feel should be considered a laboratory

for learning to eat.

Health is not just luck. Health must begin in childhood and an important phase of improved health of children is the serving

of a nutritious lunch.

Habits are formed early in life, thus the development of sound food practices should be started early at home and in the primary grades. Children are interested in food and eating. They want to be healthy and grow. If they learn to eat the proper foods, they will develop the habit of liking the right foods.

Several programs have been carried on this year to promote better eating habits. Through the undying interest of the teachers and the fine cooperation of the pupils, I feel we have been most successful in stimulating more interest in foods and thus, forming better eating habits. We have plans for a more

extensive health program which will include all grades.

The program has received from the United States Department of Agriculture since September the following foods: Frozen Hamburg, American cheese, canned beef in gravy, butter, salad oil, vegetable shortening, dry navy beans, canned peaches, canned tomatoes, canned peas, concentrated orange juice, honey, dried apricots, dry milk powder. These commodities have enabled us to serve better meals at the usual low cost.

It has indeed been a pleasure to work in such a well equipped and pleasant kitchen. I wish to express my deep appreciation for the kind cooperation of teachers, pupils and parents and to all who have helped make this a successful year for the Lunch

Program.
