TRUSTEES' REPORT

In accordance with a vote of the town, the property known as the Baptist Parsonage was sold at auction. The amount received and balance of fund on hand was deposited in the New Hampshire Savings Bank. According to the provision of the deed to the Baptist Society the income of this fund will be used for the schools in Hebron and Groton.

The trustees considered that the present work needed on the cemetery lots for which perpetual care is provided could be done more advantageously if the income for two years was available. With that in mind the 1930 income is being held to use with that for 1931.

The trust fund accounts are closed as of Dec. 31, 1930, thus the dividends received in January, 1931, are not listed in the accompanying financial report.

STATISTICAL FACTS CONCERNING THE HEBRON SCHOOLS

East Hebron

Number of pupils—15; number of half days the school was in session—346; per cent of attendance—96; number of tardinesses—37; number of visits of citizens—85; number of visits by school board members—2; number of visits by superintendent—20.

Hebron Village

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS To the School Board:

This is a brief account of the activities of your schools covering a period extending from the spring term of 1930 to January 1, 1931.

Owing to the fact that we had four teachers in each school last year, it was very difficult to secure oneness of purpose. We did the best we could under the circumstances.

This year we have had graduate teachers in the two schools and most of last year's difficulties have thereby been eliminated.

I shall say a word regarding the opinions generally formed concerning the working of the schools and the teachers in particular. Before forming or expressing an opinion, parents should make sure that they have visited the schools often enough and long enough to really be able to form a first hand opinion. It is not fair to any school system to be judged by a jury composed of children. I am neither accusing nor defending. This is just a word of caution.

It should have been a disappointment to the school district as a whole, it was to the school board and the superintendent, not to have had a single graduate from the two schools last spring. There has been too much pupil mortality all along the line.

I suggest that we revive the old custom of having graduation exercises at the end of the year, and awarding diplomas to show graduation from the public schools of the town. This year we can, and we ought to do this, considering that we have several boys and girls in the eighth grade in the two schools. We should look forward to graduation next June as the biggest school event of the year. The custom should be continued every year thereafter.

I will make it my business to stimulate teachers to exert themselves to their utmost to encourage children to remain in school until ready to graduate.

It is inconceivable how any one can get along as an intelligent American citizen now-a-days without at least an elementary school education.

Thanks to the efforts of well known interested citizens, Hebron has a public library superior to that of many villages its size. The management of the library is very anxious to have the young people as well as the older ones take advantage of the excellent reading material available for every one. I hope that the parents having their children in school will encourage the youngsters to cultivate the library habit. The teachers, too, can help in this. By supplementing the text books used in school with further outside reading, the education of the children may be enriched.

Some few years ago you started to modernize your schools by adopting jacketed stoves. That splendid beginning should be continued. I recommend that you furnish at least one school this year with adjustable seats and desks, so that they may be fitted to the size of the pupils. Imagine a first grade child having to occupy a seat five or six hours a day with his feet hanging inches above the floor level, or a rapidly growing youngster cramped in a seat which he outgrew one or two years ago. Other improvements for the school district to consider are chemical toilets. The old type toilets still in use present dangers too well understood for further discussion. A beautiful summer resort such as Hebron can ill afford to allow an unpainted and shabby looking schoolhouse to stand on the public highway to be seen by the thousands of tourists who go by every day. It does not advertise the town favorably. I refer to the schoolhouse at East Hebron.

Providing the two schools with electric lights should also be considered. There are many dark days during the winter months when it is impossible for children as well as teachers to read or write with any degree of comfort.

It seems that the best and easiest way to carry out the suggestions made is to adopt a progressive plan of schoolhouse improvement to extend over a period of three or four years.

Your schools are well provided with modern text books and supplies. One of the teachers is a college graduate, and the other a normal school graduate, both well prepared to do their work. The schools are supervised by a trained and experienced superintendent. The school board is interested in the welfare of the schools.
