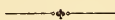

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[ L. S. ]

To the inhabitants of the town of Hill, in the county of Merrimack in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

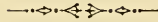
You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Hill on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for year ensuing.
- 2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for ensuing year and to see if the town will vote to make appropriation of the same as per estimate made in the town budget and such additional appropriation if any as voted in town meeting.
- 3 To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4 To see what action the town will take in regard to a budget committee to serve with the selectmen.
- 5 To see if the town will vote to accept state aid construction.
- 6 To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.
- 7 To see what action the town will take in regard to that part of the Hill Water Works situate on Pleasant Hill.
- 8 To see if the town will vote to rescind the vote taken March 14, 1933, article eight to discontinue that part of the highway and bridge in Hill as lies from a point fifty feet northerly of the Axtell place, so called, and running to the Bristol town line; this portion of the said highway and bridge being a part of the highway leading from that section of the town known as the Borough, by the said Axtell place to said Bristol town line.
- 9 To see if the town will vote to allow the playing of Sunday base ball.
- 10 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

State Board of Health division of child hygiene and the local child health committee which is made up of representatives of the health, school and civic organizations of the community.

Number of childred treated were 17.

Defects found: Enlarged tonsils, 3; enlarged glands, 6; infected tonsils, 2; poor posture, 2; adenoids, 2; inflamed eyes, 2; lung congestion, 1; decayed teeth, 4; flat feet, 2; adhesions, 5; phimosis, 5; bow legs, 1; rickets, 1; strabismus, 1; under height, 2.

# School District Report.

## Superintendent's Report.

To the School Board of Hill:

As an emergency economy measure, the pupils of the 8th grade were kept in the Village school this year. This has necessitated four grades in the Grammar room, which means dividing the recitation periods for each class into not more than 20 minutes each. It must be obvious that those pupils intending to enter high school are handicapped in comparison with others who have had throughout the year 45 minute recitation periods.

At the present time I feel that while all is being done for these pupils that can be done they will not be as well prepared for ninth grade work next September as they should be.

I strongly recommend for your consideration that, as soon as possible, Hill return to its former plan of sending its pupils to Franklin for their eighth grade work.
