To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kensington, N. H., in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Kensington Town Hall in said Kensington, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$218.11 for T.R.A. so called the State to give \$872.44.
- 4. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for Memorial Day.
- 5. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Public Library.
- 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Welfare Aid.
- 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Old Age Assistance.
- 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for fire tools. The State to give \$25.00 also.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to tar that portion of the Lamprey and Prescott Road built last year.
- 10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to renew or make other provisions for Snow Removal.
- 11. To see if the Town will raise a sum of money to purchase chairs for the Town Hall. Said sum not to exceed \$50.00.
- 12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of property acquired by the Town through non-payment of taxes or administer it to the best of their ability.

- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to raise a bond issue or pay off outstanding notes.
- 15. To see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate for the Contingent Fund.
- 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 as a start toward oiling hills in Town.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board of Kensington, New Hampshire:

I take pleasure in submitting my annual report as Superintendent of Schools, the twenty-first in the series.

I have included the usual full number of statistical tables for they show in a concise way many important facts about the Kensington schools and the pupils in the various high school grades. In Table I is stated the distribution of all the pupils in the various grades and schools as of January 1, 1940. At this time last year, the local enrollment was fifty as against forty-two this year, while the out of town enrollment then was thirty-nine as against forty-two this year. It will be noted that the West School enrolls only five pupils. It may be that Tables IV and VI will be of the greatest interest, for they compare the Kensington situation with that of the other districts with which she is closely associated.

I am glad to report that the added experience which all our teachers have with the Kensington pupils has enabled them not only to continue the good work which was reported a year ago but to do better work. The results of the usual standardized tests at the end of the last school year are proof of this statement. The successful teacher is the one who develops each individual pupil to the limit of his capacity. It must be recognized, of course, that pupils vary in scholastic ability as they do in every other quality and that they cannot all reach the same mark, but our teachers are with praiseworthy success, endeavoring to guide and train each individual pupil.

While a teacher with only five pupils, as is the case at the West School, has a great deal of time for individual work, and in some matters can be more efficient for that reason, the pupils nevertheless miss most of the education which comes from mingling with a larger number of their fellows, from competition with them and from participation with them in common tasks. Miss Swasey has taken advantage of every opportunity for individual work, the pupils at the West School have done very well indeed, but I believe they would be better educated generally if the West School should be closed and the pupils taken to another school. There is no doubt that such a move would be for the distinct financial advantage of the district. Several neighboring districts in this and other Unions in which there were schools of many grades have found it to be of advantage to place the younger grades in one school and the older grades in another. At the present time this could easily be done in Kensington. Perhaps, however, the closing of the West School should be the first step in such a change.

Since my last report our school nurse, Mrs. Sheehy, has continued to make almost weekly visits to the schools, and with the same beneficial results which have previously been achieved. Through her examinations, inspections and conferences, our pupils are guarded from disease, our parents are instructed and the general level of pupil health is raised in Kensington, as in all of the districts in which she works.

The Kensington Parent-Teacher Association has for several years interested itself in aiding Mrs. Sheehy with her dental clinic and, at considerable expense, has seen to it that every Kensington pupil has received necessary treatment. For this and the general interest which the members of the Association take in the schools our thanks as administrators of the schools are due.

In last year's report I suggested a commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the building of the present North School. I should like now to repeat that "this will be a fitting time for old pupils and all interested citizens to plan a little celebration of the event, recall a little, at least, of the history of the Kensington schools and realize once more what the schools, even from the early days, have done for the town."

With sincere appreciation for your interest and that of parents and friends in the welfare of our children, and for the help you give to the daily administrators of the schools, this report is
