WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL MEETING March 14, 1944

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Lebanon qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next at 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects; said meeting to be held open until six o'clock in the afternoon:

First—To see if the Town will vote to accept the report of the Budget Committee and vote to adopt their recommendations as printed.

Second—To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Third—To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Municipal Accounting Division.

Fourth—To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 53 of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire, 1942, and authorize the Selectmen, or the Moderator with the advice of the Selectmen, to appoint a Town Planning Board consisting of seven members.

Fifth—To choose a Selectman for the ensuing three years.

Sixth—To choose a Town Clerk, a Tax Collector, Overseer of the Poor, Treasurer, a Highway Agent, and a Chief of Police for the ensuing year.

Seventh—To choose two Library Trustees for the ensuing three years.

Eighth—To choose a Trustee to administer the Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.

Ninth—To choose four members to act on the Budget Committee for the ensuing three years.

Tenth—To choose one Representative to the General Court.

Eleventh—To bring in your ballots for delegatesat-large and their alternates, and district delegates and their alternates for the Democrat and Republican Presidential Conventions.

Twelfth—To transact any other business that may properly come before the meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Lebanon for the fiscal year ended January 31, 1944, which has been made by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission in accordance with the vote of the town meeting. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Library Trustees and Library Treasurer, Lebanon and West Lebanon Cemetery Committees and the Municipal Court.

Balance Sheets

Comparative Balance Sheets in detailed form for the years ended January 31, 1943 and January 31, 1944, are presented in Exhibit A. Comparative Balance Sheets in condensed form for the ten years ended January 31, 1944, are included in Exhibit B.

As indicated by Exhibit A, the Net Surplus increased during the last fiscal year from \$782.76 to \$20,971.22. The factors affecting this substantial gain in Surplus are noted in Exhibit A--1, entitled "Reconciliation of Change in Surplus."

During the ten year period ended January 31, 1944, the financial condition of the town improved to the extent of approximately \$118,000.00, changing from a Net Debt of \$97,027.00, as of January 31, 1935, to a Net Surplus of \$20,971.22, on January 31, 1944. It may be noted that the only liability of the town on the latter date was \$150.48, which represented the amount of income tax

withheld for the federal government in the month of January.

It may also be of interest to note that the average tax rate in Lebanon decreased from \$3.18 in 1935 to \$2.85 in 1943. The average tax rate for the whole state during the same years was \$3.17 and \$3.03, respectively.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody of and who receive or disburse public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from the depository banks.

Bonds, bond coupons and temporary loan notes paid during the fiscal year were examined and found to have been cancelled. A statement of the Bond and Coupon Account will be found in Exhibit C.

Tax Accounts

The tax warrant for the levy of 1943, of Collector Milo L. Knight, was audited and balanced as indicated by Exhibit H. Activity in the warrant accounts for the levies of previous years, was also checked as noted in Exhibit I.

Tax sale accounts were examined and the activity therein for the fiscal year is indicated in Exhibit J.

Town Clerk

Motor vehicle permits and dog licenses issued by the town clerk during the year were examined. All funds received from these sources were properly accounted for through remittances to the treasurer or cash on hand.

Trust Funds

The records of the Trustees of Trust Funds were examined. Principal and income, as indicated therein, was found to be on deposit in various savings banks as indicated by pass books and in the form of securities which were likewise examined. The disbursement of trust fund income was found to have been properly made.

It was noted that several of the library trust funds were held by the treasurer of the library. These funds should be turned over to the town trustees of trust funds as the law requires that "The trustees of trust funds shall have the custody of all trust funds held by their town."

It is further required by law (Chapter 51—Section 29—Revised Laws of New Hampshire) that the trustees shall give a bond in such amount and in such form as the state tax commission shall prescribe. The town is required to pay the premium. We recommend, therefore, that a surety bond in the amount of \$10,000 be procured by the trustees of trust funds.

Exhibit L-2 indicates that income from trust funds last year averaged only 1.88%. It is suggested that the investment of funds in Series G, U. S. Government War Savings Bonds would increase the return to $2.50\,\%$.

General Comments

Attention is again called to the fact that the amount of poll taxes actually committed to the collector was considerably in excess of the amount of poll taxes deducted in the calculation of the tax rate. It is urged that in arriving at the amount necessary to be raised by property taxes, on which the tax rate is figured, that the amount of poll taxes deducted be on the basis of poll taxes actually assessed rather than estimated as the practice has been. This would help to reduce the amount necessary to be raised by property taxes and the property tax rate.

The financial accounts and records of all town officials which were examined were found in good condition and in accordance with prescribed methods.

In accordance with the provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, this report or a summary of its essential features should be published in the next annual town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the town for the assistance rendered and information furnished while engaged in making this audit.

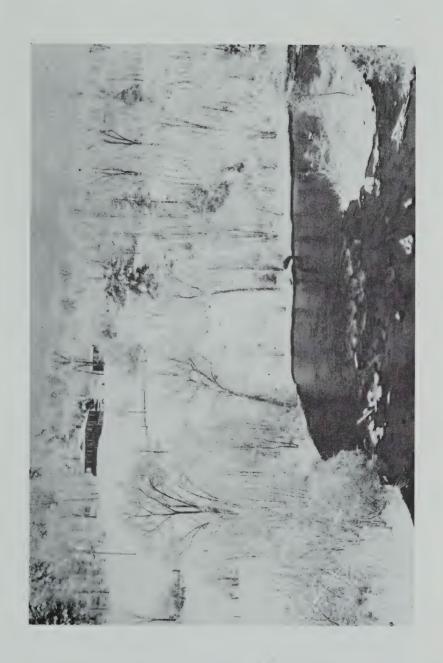

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

The past year has been a little unusual in some respects for we have had several seasons of children's diseases but no deaths have been reported from any of them.

The doctors and nurses have reported the following cases: 271 cases of Measles, 113 cases of Chicken Pox, 45 Whooping Cough, 45 Scarlet Fever, 37 Mumps, 75 German Measles, 2 Pneumonia, 2 Chrome Poisoning, 1 Undulent Fever, 1 Typhoid Fever, 1 Lobar Pneumonia, 1 Septic Sore Throat and several Venereal Diseases.

The state nurse has had the usual number of Child Clinics assisted by our local doctors and nurses and ladies from the different fraternal and social societies.

The question of the disposal of waste matter and garbage is still troublesome. Many dumps, large and small, have been reported, and investigated, and notices posted, but this seems to have no effect, for the notices in some cases have been torn down, and in others the dumping still continues. Keeping watch of these dumps and seeing that they were removed has made a lot of extra mileage and travel. The Water Commissioner, Mr. Manson, has been with me on several of these trips, where the dumps were located on the banks of the river and brook, that is, the town's water supply. I only hope that in the near future we may be able to have some means of disposal of waste and garbage provided, that will lessen this nuisance.

Again I wish to thank the School Nurse and doctors and all who have in any way tried to assist me in the discharge of my duties as your Health Officer.

REPORT OF MILK INSPECTOR OF THE TOWN OF LEBANON

The inspection of milk this year has required more attention than in normal times due to the fact that some of our distributors have been obliged to obtain milk from out of State sources.

Some distributors purchase milk from as many as ten different places, and this requires more samples taken and more sources of supply inspected.

On samples sent to the Laboratory of Hygiene in Feb., 1944 the report returned by the State Board of Health on Total Solids, Butter Fat, Sediment, Bacteria, Colon organisms and Phosphatase tests were all very satisfactory and no criticisms offered.

The milk at the present time MUST be very satisfactory in all ways for the reason that deliveries are not made as often as before, therefore the milk must stay sweet longer and can not do this if the Bacteria is high and not produced and handled under the most sanitary conditions, especially during the summer months.

The methods used in collecting milk from the trucks on the street and methods of inspecting herds and milk rooms are the same as in past years.

WHITE PINE BLISTER RUST

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE Forestry and Recreation Department Concord February 12, 1944.

Board of Selectmen, Lebanon, N. H. Gentlemen:

Since 1938, 11/3 billion feet of white pine has been cut from New Hampshire forests. This tremendous cut of merchantable growth leaves principally the younger stands of pine as the basis of the future forest crop. It is this young pine which is most susceptible to the blister rust disease. Upon the protection of this crop and natural reproduction depends our ability to continue to cut and market white pine as we have in the past.

In the State blister rust control program, effective since 1918, each town is a separate operating and accounting unit. Records and maps are kept to indicate the progress of the work in each. Two main objects are (1) to complete initial control on those pine areas not yet covered, and (2) to re-examine those areas worked more than five years before in order that control may be maintained. Over 90 per cent of the white pine lands have been covered in the initial work.

Although the problem of local labor is serious, a blister rust crew is not large, and between the younger and older age groups we ought to be able to get some good crews. The Selectmen could undoubtedly assist

in this matter.

The town appropriation will, as usual, be increased 25 per cent from State funds, and probably further increased from Federal funds. During all the years since 1918 federal and state funds have been available to assist towns in initial control and re-examination of areas. Even in the war-time we should not under-rate the importance of carrying this program forward.

It is therefore recommended that an article be inserted in the town warrant and the amount of \$300 be included in the town budget for continuing the control of the white pine blister rust.

During the twelve month period, from January 1 to December 31, 1943, Direct Relief has been granted by the Town of Lebanon to thirty-eight persons; this includes such relief as food, shelter, fuel, clothing, and other forms of Direct Relief to families, individuals, and Town Boarding Adults.

REPORT OF INCINERATOR COMMITTEE

This assignment has been both educational and interesting. Your committee obtained engineering advice from:

Nichols Research & Engineering Corpn, New York, N. Y.

Jarvis Engineering Company, Boston, Mass. Metcalf & Eddy, Engineers, Boston, Mass. University of New Hampshire, Durham, N. H. Dept. of Sanitation, New York City, N. Y.

Operational Statistics were furnished us by the City of Portsmouth, N. H., Dover, N. H., and the University of New Hampshire; due to the gasoline shortage we made one trip and visited the incinerators at Dover and

Durham, N. H.

We estimate that at present about one-half of the garbage and refuse is being handled in a reasonably sanitary way; that the cost of this "hit and miss" system would be no more than the operational cost of a complete system for the whole Town. This is due to the fact that many people do not use the present facilities because of expense and this expense is unavoidable due to the "long haul" by private carriers.

An incinerator established between Lebanon and West Lebanon would benefit the Town; the long haul would be largely eliminated; the disposal would be sanitary and there would be no objectionable fumes from a 60 foot stack. Operation of the system should be by the Town and paid for by taxation for only in this way

would 100% clean-up weekly be guaranteed.

Engineering sources inform us that an incinerator of the proper size and type for Lebanon would cost from \$20,000.00 to \$25,000.00 to construct—this price would, of course, be modified by existing cost of labor and ma-

terial and does not include the cost of the land.

Your committee believes that a forced draft type of incinerator is essential to proper operation. Many towns, by Town Ordinance, insist on the separation of garbage from refuse. This greatly assists incineration but there are more modern types which do not require such a separation because of forced draft and power drive. We believe these types should be carefully

looked into by any Building Committee the Town selects.

A very important consideration should be the site for the incinerator; it should be on a hillside so that garbage and refuse may be directly dumped in on the upper level without any re-shovelling; ashes, etc., are removed at the lower level. From information received the total amount of garbage and refuse would be about 1900 tons per year—two-thirds of this from Lebanon and one-third from West Lebanon. Accordingly the position for least ton-mile expense would be about one-third from Lebanon to West Lebanon. The proportion of garbage to refuse will vary with the season; in February this ratio would be 60-40 and in September 72-28.

Your Committee unanimously recommends the construction and operation of an incinerator by the Town of Lebanon. Such a facility would be a sound long-term investment as it would clean up conditions now existing, benefit the health of the people and make Lebanon a more attractive town to live in. We are advised that as this is a health project, priorities for construction would be available.

THE DARTMOUTH-LAKE SUNAPEE REGION

The Legislature of 1937 authorized the establishment of six Regions, each composing a group of towns suggested by the State Planning and Development Commission. The Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region comprises this town and 37 others in this section of the state. The Region is incorporated as a non-profit corporation and its affairs are supervised by a group of officers chosen annually. The Region employs a full time secretary who is paid by the state (not by the towns). Thus your Region is a set-up established by law and the matter of whether or not it has sufficient financial support to render real service to your community rests with the voters of the towns. During its existance the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region can point to the following accomplishments. Through the publicity it has issued it has brought visitors to every town, some have established summer homes and others have become permanent residents. It has been instrumental in bringing industries to several towns. It has inaugurated plans that have saved historic landmarks. It has sponsored paying summer attractions. It has been active in bringing about a survey of our mineral resources that has resulted in revenue to many towns and has conducted studies of new agricultural products.

By an appropriation not exceeding 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation the Region now asks the suport of your town in continuing the program that has brought about the aforementioned results and to institute the following three projects which if carried through must result in added income to each of the 38 towns of the Region. (1) A research of the possibilities of establishing industries that will use as raw materials, minerals within our area and make a study of the feasibility of the production, processing and sale of several agricultural products that in the past have received but little attention. (2) To cooperate with each of the towns in preparing descriptive pamphlets showing the attractions, natural advantages and resources of the community with the idea of eventually incorporating such material into a book descriptive of the whole Region. (3) To establish a system of Recreation Trails following back highways and little used roads leading to scenic areas and desirable locations in each of the 38 towns in the Region. As it is not deemed proper to devote more space in your Town Report to this subject, details have been omitted, however, letters of inquiry regarding any matter here mentioned will be welcome and given careful reply.
