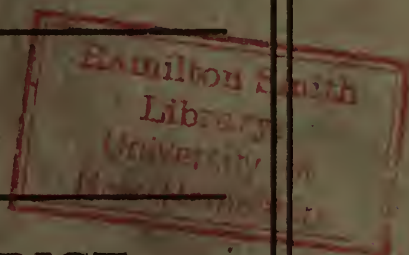

TOWN MEETING WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building, on the 12th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violation of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable and two Road Agents.

Article 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for town officers' salaries, for town officers' expenses, for election and registration expenses, for Municipal Court expenses, for town building maintenance, for the police department, for the health department, for vital statistics, for the Community Center, for miscellaneous expenses, for street lighting, for the Littleton Hospital, for the public library, for town poor, for Memorial Day, for band concerts, for water troughs, for cemeteries, for damages and legal expenses, for payment of the town debt and interest, for the Community Nurse, for the community

garden, for the skating rink, and for all other town charges.

Article 3. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for construction of highways in this town under the provisions of an act to provide State aid and for the expenditure of other public moneys in the construction of highways throughout the State in accordance with Chapter 84 of the Laws of New Hampshire, or any amendments thereto, or an allotment for expenditure of funds upon its town highways, in accordance with pending legislation, or such as may be enacted by the Legislature of 1935.

Article 4. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

Article 5. To see what action the Town will take relative to the choosing of an overseer of the poor and a collector of taxes, for the ensuing year, and for following year or years.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money, and how much, for construction and repairs upon the Mann's Hill Road, and roads intersecting therewith, in said Town.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to borrow money, and how much, on the credit of the Town, by its notes or bonds, to pay any indebtedness it may have, because of the cost of completing P. W. A. Project No. 2860, for grading and paving, and Project No. 2908, for sidewalks in Apthorp; over and above the monies

provided by the Federal Government for said Projects.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen of the Town, to apply for, accept and use, monies provided by the Federal Government, or State of New Hampshire, for public works, relief, unemployment, or otherwise, and do all things required by the Federal Government, or State of New Hampshire, to obtain the same.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to rescind its vote in Town Meeting, March 13, 1928, instructing the Selectmen to appoint an expert highway agent to perform the duties of highway agent, under the laws of the State, and vote to elect its highway agents.

Article 10. To see if the Town of Littleton will officially discontinue and abandon that portion of the river road, so-called, leading from Littleton to Monroe lying between its intersection with the new road leading from the new bridge across the Connecticut River below the village of Upper Waterford and its intersection with the state highway leading from Littleton to Lyman approximately 1,700 feet easterly of Williams' mill and approximately 2,500 feet westerly of the Waterford bridge, and authorize the Selectmen to sign all deeds of conveyance and other papers necessary in connection therewith.

Article 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money from time to time during the current year, on the credit of the Town, to pay current indebtedness, in anticipation of taxes.

Article 12. To see what action the Town will take with reference to the matter of authorizing the selectmen to give any druggist doing business in this town, a prescription permit to sell pure spirituous and malt liquor for medicinal, sacramental, mechanical and scientific purposes, as provided in Chapter 147 of the Laws of the State of New Hampshire.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the municipal budget act.

Article 14. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 15. To choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing, and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

Article 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The payroll for this department from January 1st, 1934 to December 31st, 1934 averaged \$689.35 per week. Probably 90% of this money was spent in the stores of Littleton. In addition to the above payroll we have turned back to the taxpayers \$15,000.00.

You would make considerable effort to get and keep an industry in Town that would have a payroll like this and at the same time pay a tax of \$15,000.00.

The amount of work done during the past year was abnormally large and likewise the payments were more than is usual, but year in and year out our payroll will run better than \$350.00 weekly.

Quoting from a report on 55 representative operating utility companies in the United States as published in the Boston Herald of January 13th, 1934, the average domestic electric current rate for the year ending September 30th was 5 34-100 cents per KWH. Our average rate was 4 1-10 cents per KWH.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board:

I am pleased to submit the following report relative to the schools in Littleton.

The total enrollment to date this year is 719 and the present membership is 659. The enrollment is divided as follows:

299 of these pupils are in the high school building, 242 in Kilburn, and 178 at Apthorp. The enrollment in the primary grades at Kilburn is large this year, the first grade having had 47 and the second grade 53. The closing of the rural schools has increased the size of the grades in the Kilburn building to about the maximum number for efficient work. However, as long as the total enrollment in that building is not materially increased the pupils can be cared for without additional rooms and with no increased number of teachers, other than possibly an assistant or part time teacher in case of an extreme number of pupils in some one grade. During the last seven years the average membership or the average number of pupils throughout the year has been about 75 less than the total enrollment. This fact shows quite a large transient population—a number of pupils staying in our schools for a short time only. These pupils add to the expense of operation and to the difficulties of instruction.

The columns below show the total enrollment in all grades and the high school enrollment (grades IX-XII) during the past eight years.

These figures show a larger percentage gain in high school enrollment than in total enrollment. The costs in the high school departments have been necessarily somewhat increased with the increased membership. Judging from the number of pupils in the high school and junior high grades, the high school enrollment next year will be larger than it ever has been. The high school is being operated with only one more teacher than it had six years ago. The above figures do not include about 60 pupils from the St. Rose of Lima School who are receiving instruction in Home Economics and Woodworking four high school periods per week. For two years an additional part-time teacher was provided to instruct these pupils but that teacher was dropped last year to save expense and has not been re-employed. The present staff in the high school building has about a maximum load for efficiency. If the number of pupils is increased much an additional teacher or part time teacher should be employed.

Health instruction is a part of the school program in all of the elementary grades. Milk has been furnished to many pupils throughout the year with Federal funds. The school physician and district nurse have reported as follows relative to their work:

The yearly health examinations of the 660 students of the public schools showed the following defects: vision 62, diseased or enlarged tonsils 29, teeth 128, orthopedic 3, asthmatic 1, skin 1, not vaccinated 9, glandular conditions 9, heart 5, diabetic 1, tuberculosis contact cases 7, underweights 10 percent 91, overweight 34. The corrective work which was carried on through the year consisted of dental treatments for 76 cases, visions refracted or re-examined 7, tonsil operation 13, and 51 showed improvement in weight. Six children were vaccinated and three excused for health reasons.

In last year's report I listed the courses of study in the high school and the number of pupils in each. This year Biology is being given for the first time. The Science offering now includes Biology, Chemistry, and Physics. No other changes in unit courses have occurred in the high school, and none in the elementary grades. Our high school program includes courses necessary for college preparation, four years of Commerce, four years of Home Economics, and three years of Mechanic Arts. A fourth year in Mechanic Arts with some revision in the subject matter now offered in the three years approved is a desirable extension in that department. A year's course in auto mechanics, or one in shop mechanics, or a part year of each would broaden the scope of the work in that department without the necessity of machinery for iron or other metal work. A building, shop, barn or garage would be necessary to provide adequate room for the auto mechanics course. It would be one of the most practical for pupils in mechanic arts work.

Two new teachers in high school and two in the elementary grades were needed for this year. Miss Marion Lehan of Littleton, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School, with five years of successful experience in Franklin, was selected for the first grade in the Kilburn building. Miss Stearns moved from the first grade to the third grade to take the position left vacant by Miss Silsby's resignation. Miss Ruth Stafford of

Berlin, a graduate of the three year course at Plymouth last June, was selected to succeed Miss Barrows in the Apthorp building. Miss White and Miss McCoy resigned from the high school staff during the summer. Mrs. Rachel C. Hogan came to the position in Home Economics with excellent training and ten years of successful experience. Miss Jeanette S. Johnson was selected for the English department but was forced to resign in October because of ill health. Mrs. Palmer did effective work as a substitute teacher until the first of December when Miss Muriel S. Kendrick came to the position. Miss Kendrick has degrees from the Connecticut College for Women and from Boston University, and has had four years of successful experience in the Mt. Ida School in Newton, Massachusetts. All of these teachers are doing excellent work in their positions.

During the past year the interior of the high school building, with the exception of the auditorium, gymnasium and mechanic arts room, has been painted, the exterior of the building has been painted, repair work has been done around the windows and doors, on the gymnasium floor and the auditorium curtains, and minor repairs have been made at the Kilburn and Apthorp buildings. Part of the interior work at the high school was done as a CWA project at a material saving to the district. The Federal Government contributed about \$400.00 to this expense, all for labor. An unexpected expense was incurred by the necessity of placing new tubes in the high school boiler. The total expenditure for building repairs to date since July 1 has been about \$1,700.00. The average expenditure for building repairs during the last four years has been about \$2,000.00. At a conservative valuation of your buildings this is approximately one per cent. While the actual expenditure in the future may be less during some years, this is a necessary percentage to allot for maintenance, according to educational experience.

The largest single item of expense for new equipment was the purchase of desks for one room in the Kilburn building. A piano was bought for the Apthorp building, and a projection machine for the high school building. The other expenditures were for equipment in the science courses.

The pupil desks in three rooms in the Kilburn building and in two rooms in the Apthorp building are of the old non-adjustable type. Some of them are in bad condition. These should be replaced with modern, adjustable desks. To distribute the expense over a period of years a conservative plan would be to replace the old desks with new in one room each year.

One of the real needs to assist high school work is better opportunity for visual instruction. The high school auditorium has a picture booth that has never been equipped. The plan for new equipment next year includes equipping this booth, pupil desks in one class room, and the necessary materials in the science laboratories.

The auditorium is poorly heated and poorly ventilated. The installation of unit heaters is probably the best suggestion to assure adequate heat. The necessary improvement in the ventilating system will be a minor item of expense. The auditorium should also be painted. Weather strips should be placed on the windows of two rooms in the Kilburn building, two rooms at Apthorp, and on at least four rooms in the high school building. These would probably reduce the fuel expense enough to pay for their installation in a few years and would add to the comfort of these rooms. The corridors and at least two of the rooms at Apthorp should be painted. Four of the rooms at Kilburn should be painted. While some of the items of repair mentioned do not have to be done during next summer, delay will increase the expense of the work. Proper maintenance cost is probably a wise expenditure with good school buildings.

The treasurer's book on June thirtieth showed a net cash balance of \$124.09, with all bills paid. The total liabilities of the school district were the high school building bonds amounting to \$96,000.00. These are paid at the rate of \$8,000.00 a year. During last year the \$25,000.00 bond issue for which the sinking fund had been accumulating was paid and the deficit that had been shown in the financial reports for several years was changed into a small balance.

The budget for the next year is \$66,272.00 including an allowance of \$500.00 for adult education. The probable receipts from sources other than taxation are about \$1,500.00. If the budget is accepted an appropriation of \$65,000.00 is advisable. This amount is \$500.00 more than was voted last year, and \$1,000.00 more than two years ago. It is \$5,000.00 less than was raised in 1932 and \$9,000.00 less than in 1931. It represents a tax of slightly over \$10.00 per thousand of your equalized valuation—for all school payments, current expenditures plus debt and interest charges. The total current expenditure (not including debt and interest) last year was \$8.04 per thousand of equalized valuation. Eighty three school districts in the state paid a smaller tax, and one hundred fifty eight paid a higher one.

On the basis of per pupil costs your district is likewise low. In all of the public high schools of the state last year the median per pupil cost was \$94.68 while in Littleton it was \$88.81. In the elementary grades the median per pupil cost for the state was \$72.46 and in Littleton it was \$76.89. The range here is \$36.26 to \$242.11. Your buildings have been improved extensively, your pupils are well supplied with educational helps. Your teachers are working with a salary schedule comparable with that of other towns of the same size or larger. Your low per pupil costs are due in part to the consolidation of your pupils in three buildings and to the large pupil load per teacher with the present number of teachers.

However viewed, the requested appropriation of \$65,000.00 does not seem excessive.

The district last March raised the sum of \$500.00 for Adult Education. Several agencies have contributed to the success of the program adopted. The instruction in most courses has been provided by the Federal Government from its Adult Education fund under the direction of the State Board of Education. The Littleton Courier has advertised the program extensively. The teachers in the public schools and in the St. Rose of Lima School have distributed letters of information relative to the courses offered and to the possible courses that might be offered. Father Hennon has made personal appeals to interest persons in the courses in Literacy and Citizenship. I have personally interviewed many.

Under the Federal regulations each instructor must give fifteen hours of classroom service per week and must have an average attendance of six pupils in each group. Four teachers have been employed, offering courses in Americanization, French, Commerce, and Home Economics. Federal aid has been withdrawn from support of the Americanization classes because of the low attendance average. This work is being temporarily continued by contributions from the members of the classes and from the school district. The membership, large at first, has dropped in all of the classes except in Home Economics. The instruction has been good and the persons now in attendance are much interested. The attendance records follow:

The school district has paid the expense of heat, lights and instructional materials.

In addition to the classes partially supported by Federal funds, Mr. Welch has directed a class one night a week in rifle practice. The gymnasium is open two nights a week to a large group of business and professional men who have a well organized program of drills and games.

Viewed as a whole, this new project has been successful to date. Many persons have doubtless improved their learning in some field. Whether the continued interest during the remainder of the winter is sufficient to justify the expenditure of school money for this purpose next year is a question. The same amount raised this year is in our budget for next year. Another month may give you the information you will need in deciding whether to retain that item in your budget or to reduce your appropriation requested by that amount.

I wish to thank you for another pleasant year of school work. Your efforts for a sympathetic understanding of all school problems which have confronted us have been very encouraging. Your suggestions have been wise and your advice sound.

The Headmaster's Report

Dear Superintendent Jordan:

My fourth annual report will contain a simple, direct record of the school life in Littleton High School since last spring. Some pupils attend high school for preparation for college entrance. Many of these place studies above all other interests, using any free time to engage in activities. Some attend because their parents wish them to stay in school until a good position opens in which their talents can be used. These pupils take an active interest in school functions, keeping a happy balance between studies and activities. Some attend high school because there is nothing else for them to do. They take some interest in studies, but have much more interest in sports, plays, assemblies, and productions.

There is nothing spectacular about studying Latin or French or mathematics or science in preparation for college entrance. There is little to demonstrate to the general public by way of applauding achievements. The scholastic standing of the teachers has been raised every year, with the result that in every department a high grade of work is required of pupils. All of the staff members have been graduated from college or normal school. Several have advanced study to their credit in summer school. Some have obtained master's degrees. The high standing of teachers of the right personality and experience leads to proficiency in training pupils for college. This report, then, must necessarily contain many references to the school activities, in which a great majority of our pupils have the interest to engage.

SCHOLARSHIP DAY

Each year, the State Board of Education conducts contests in various school subjects as spelling, grammar, chemis-

try, Latin, French, history, home economics, arithmetic, mathematics, and mechanic arts, in Plymouth and Keene. Schools may enter not more than three teams of Seniors with three members to a team. Littleton has been sending contestants and has won places in Spelling, Physics, and Bookkeeping.

SENIORS AND GRADUATES

The State Board of Education sends an official to interview Seniors who plan to enter the teaching profession. The officer considers the high school record of each prospect, scholastic ratings, standard test ratings, extracurricular activities, health, personality, leadership, and character, and submits an estimate of the candidate. This prognosticates the success of our graduates at Plymouth or Keene.

Within the last three years, our school has sent graduates to Plymouth Normal School, Keene Normal School, Dartmouth College, Northeastern University, University of New Hampshire, Harvard College, University of Vermont, and Simmons, and to several hospitals and specialized schools. These individuals have successfully carried on the studies in these institutions.

INSTRUCTION IN THE USE OF THE PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Littleton Public Library is a mine of information for those who know how to use it. Miss Shane, the librarian, has cooperated with the school to instruct boys and girls in the junior high school grades to take advantage of library facilities. She has conducted classes during the morning hours in the reading rooms so pupils could learn to find information listed in guides, files, and catalogs. The school is grateful for this service.

DRAMATICS

Under Miss Davis' direction the Seniors gave "The Arrival of Kitty" for the annual class play. To raise funds for athletics, an all-school play "Be An Optimist" was given.

STUNT NIGHT

Since the receipts from admission charges at games is not sufficient to pay the expenses for boys' and girls' athletics, programs are given to raise funds. One of these is Stunt Night. This year, the event was coupled with the Draper-Maynard Sports Carnival. In all, about one hundred twenty five pupils took part in the performance and another twenty acted as assistants in conducting the Carnival.

CITIZENSHIP AND TOWN MEETING

One way for pupils to acquire the desire for good government is to observe citizens carrying on a town meeting. The pupils in the Senior class saw voters conduct business last March. Later, they gave an assembly before the rest of the pupils, using the exact words of some of the prominent citizens in debating articles in the warrant. The adults in town are setting the example for the youth, showing the type of management they sanction or practice in the conduct of present-day town business.

TRIP TO NEW YORK

The parents of Seniors were able to send the members to New York for a four-day trip by railroad, boat, and bus. The all-expense tour cost approximately twenty-seven dollars. This price included the use of a private car for the party on the railroad, tour of Boston and Cambridge by bus, an overnight boat trip to New York, visits to the Empire State building, RCA building, Radio City, the Battery and Aquarium, Upper and Lower New York, public buildings, the Palisades of the Hudson, Chinatown, the Ghetto, the Holland Tunnel, an evening at Radio City, rooms with bath at a central hotel, full course meals served in a private dining room, and return trip. Any individual could not travel from Littleton to New York for overnight without spending more than this trip cost any member for the four days.

NORTH COUNTRY ORCHESTRA CONCERTS

When twenty or more pupils become proficient enough to play some musical instrument in a concert, the problem of transportation of the group to several towns each spring becomes difficult by private cars. Since no school buses were provided at the district's expense, the headmasters in this section agreed to a rotating two-year schedule so no school would be obliged to provide transportation to more than three towns per year. Under this plan, concerts in 1934 were held in Lancaster, North Stratford, and Whitefield. In 1935, they are to be held in Groveton, Lancaster and Littleton.

SPEAKERS IN ASSEMBLIES

While there is much talent among the pupils, they like to have someone not connected with this organization speak occasionally. An "assembly fund" was raised by five cent contributions from each pupil, and from which money is taken when needed to pay the necessary expenses of speakers. The following have given talks in assemblies this year.

FAREWELL ASSEMBLY AND GRADUATION

Our Farewell Assembly and the Graduation Exercises were well attended by the public. In the Assembly, fifteen Seniors contributed some portion of the program, while many others assisted. In the Graduation Exercises, the topic of the use of leisure was discussed by several pupils, indicating ways in which people can use free time, with shortened working hours. Mrs. Edith Burnham, a member of the school board, delivered a fine talk to the graduates and presented the diplomas.

With the auditorium and the gymnasium filled with people, the need for a sound projecting apparatus was evident so all might hear well.

THE "RECORD"

The "Record" makes a *record*. For twenty-three consecutive years, issues of this school publication have been printed. Mr. Arthur Morris initiated the "Record" and some staff member with pupils has continued to conduct the project. This is self-supporting financially and furnishes a literary outlet for pupils' writing. Miss Davis and Mr. Glazier serve efficiently as literary adviser and staff business manager, respectively.

SCHOOL PARTIES

School social functions should contribute to the social graces and abilities of the ones who participate. At each party this year, committees of pupils for decorations, music, refreshments, programs and clean-up have worked effectively under the direction of Miss Groux and Mrs. Hogan. By careful preparation for these parties, starting at least two weeks in advance, pupils learn to proceed in organizing their own social functions at school, at home, and later, in their own homes.

FALL AND WINTER ATHLETICS, AND FINANCES

Conscientious training of boys and girls for athletics has been given by Miss Bedell and Mr. Palmer. Whether the teams win or lose, they are shown how to play the games well and to act as good team workers.

It is increasingly difficult to finance athletics. Since a large number take part in sports, consideration should be given by the district about the furnishing of transportation, or equipment, or officiating services for players. All the funds from the sale of Carnival programs, of the Stunt Night, and of the A. A. play, are used to bolster the financial receipts from games. Still, it is very hard to stay out of debt. If it were not for the patience of the Littleton Hardware Company and of its generosity in scaling down our bills occasionally, we should not be able to finance our program of football, basketball, and baseball for boys and girls.

DEBATING

A small group of pupils interested in debating is being given instruction in this art by Miss Kellogg. In time, many more pupils should undertake this excellent chance to engage in public speaking.

WINTER SPORTS

The impetus to skiing which has been given by the Franconia Ski Club and the Littleton Outing Club is felt directly in the school. A squad of over fifty boys and girls practice skiing, snowshoeing, or skating after school each day, under the direction of Mr. Welch. Try-outs are held before each carnival and boys and girls are selected to compete in the interscholastic events. Competition will take place in Lancaster, Whitefield, Franconia, Littleton, Lisbon, and Bath this year. Our goal is to secure a large number in these contests by encouraging limited entries in events.

CONCLUSION

The school is grateful to several firms for conducting groups of pupils through the stores or plants and explaining processes. It appreciates the support citizens have given by attending games, programs, and plays, and for the kindly criticisms which have been offered. It acknowledges the gifts which it has received during the year. It thanks parents for their cooperation in dealing with the questions which arise in the training of youth.

The pupils understand some of the benefits they receive from education. The teachers show an active interest in using the best methods of instruction, and a readiness to do good work. The Headmaster is grateful for the fine spirit of cooperation which exists between pupils and teachers, between teachers and school officials, between headmaster and superintendent, and between school board members and staff members. Together this great duty of educating youth can be consummated; it's "the everlastin' teamwork of every bloomin' soul" which counts.

The library year began with an experiment new in this field, a six weeks exchange of positions between the librarian and a colleague from Moorestown, N. J., Miss Hannah Severns. While an arrangement of this kind is of greatest value to the two most concerned, it benefits indirectly the two libraries in making possible an exchange of systems and devices tried in one and applicable to the other. The small library must wage a constant battle against the tyranny of red tape. Anything that tends to simplify the necessary routine of record keeping, the actual business end of lending public property and seeing that it is safely returned, frees the librarian for more important phases of her work. The exchange also gave the librarian an opportunity to observe at first hand the county library system so effective in New Jersey, some substitute for which leaders in library work in New Hampshire hope to see in operation in this state before long.

Although it was hoped that the return of the usual town appropriation of \$3,000 which had been cut for two years, would add three hundred dollars to the book fund, this was not possible because of a slight depreciation in the income from endowment funds, and because of the greatly increased cost of fuel and of some expensive repairs due to frozen water pipes. Except for these items, the library kept within the budget for running expenses. Every effort is made to economize on non-essentials. No saving is attempted on such items as light, which affect the health and comfort of those for whom the library is run.

In spite of a slight increase in the amount spent on books, records show a loss in the number of books and magazines borrowed during the year. With a registration of 368 new borrowers, this hardly indicates a static condition in the library. It is a situation

shared with libraries throughout the country. Comparison of this year's statistics with those of the peak year in circulation records, 1932, shows the loss to be greatest in the summer months. While the library continued to extend borrowing privileges to non-residents, very little publicity was given to this arrangement, and summer residents, fewer in number than in 1932, used the library less than in that year. During the other nine months of the year the decrease is greatest in adult fiction. This bears out a theory that the library is being used more and more for the kind of material that only a public library can supply, and a little less for the purely recreational reading which is so easily available from many other sources. The recreational reading, however, still leads all other classes. Adult fiction constitutes over 55 per cent of all books borrowed. Purchase of this type of book has absorbed about the same proportion of the book fund as in other years, although a slight increase in funds allotted to the children's room was necessary to begin to bring that collection up to the standard of the adult book supply. If a library is to furnish school children and teachers with up to date reference and supplementary material for school work and in addition help build up good reading taste in boys and girls, it cannot allow the children's room only what is left of the book fund after more demanding adults have been satisfied, but must have a definite policy and budget for those needs.

Examination of the budget will show a sum of \$5.35 spent on Inter-Library-Loan. If we add to this the \$5.00 postal insurance, not all of which is used on Inter-Library-Loan, we find that the 141 books borrowed from other libraries to be used by Littleton readers cost the library about seven cents a piece. If these books had been purchased they would have cost be-

tween four and five hundred dollars, since most of them were expensive books in special or technical fields. This is definite proof of the enormous value of such borrowing privileges to the small library. It is toward the setting up of smaller and more widely scattered units to provide this service to all libraries in the state that the Citizens' Library Committee is now working. The State Library and others now giving the service are untiring in their efforts, and exceedingly generous, but many small libraries are unable to avail themselves of this possible addition to their resources because of the limited time at the disposal of the librarians, comparatively few of whom hold full time positions.

In the internal workings of the library no startling changes have taken place this year. We were again fortunate in securing through the Public Library Commission in cooperation with the State E. R. A. authorities the services of a trained librarian for three months, and of an additional assistant for seven weeks. Miss Doe, on duty from October to January, devoted her time almost entirely to recataloging several classes of non-fiction. This involves careful examination of the books, the discarding of many, work which moves along very slowly when it is part of the daily routine of the librarian. In addition to Miss Doe's work, \$43.50 of a special catalog fund was spent on further assistance along this line. This is a type of work which affects the average reader very little at the time it is undertaken, but which in the long run greatly increases the efficiency and usefulness of the library to all types of readers and students.

Lessons in the use of the library were given in the spring to all eighth grades and about half the seventh grades. Because of the difficulty of working this in-

to a crowded school schedule, time allotted to each division was not sufficient to do very thorough work, but it is to be hoped that the slight knowledge of the classification and arrangement of the books, and a bowing acquaintance with the card catalog will enable these pupils to use this and other libraries in the future with greater ease and pleasure.

Children's Book Week in November was celebrated with an exhibit of new books for the Children's Room and book talks in the elementary grades by the librarian.

A valuable addition to the library's resources is the collection of some eighty books on gardening and allied subjects, gathered together by the White Mountain Garden Club. For the privilege of housing the books in a room of the library for the use of club members during the summer, the Garden Club puts their collection at the disposal of all library users from October to May.

The librarian represented Littleton at the American Library Association meeting at Montreal in June, on the faculty of the summer school held by the Public Library Commission at Claremont in July, and at the State Library meeting at Exeter in September. The annual meeting of librarians and library trustees from this part of the state was again held in Littleton because of our central location and pleasant accommodations. At the afternoon session, an audience of about sixty, including guests interested in library welfare though not active in the work, heard Professor Stearns Morse of Dartmouth College outline the plans of the Citizens' Library Committee. This meeting, with its emphasis on state needs, was indicative of a general tendency today to get away from our self-

sufficient attitude toward our own particular collection of books, and to think of library progress, as educators have long thought of the schools, as something that concerns the welfare of the state as a whole, and that should be organized to serve that end as efficiently and economically as possible.
