LLOYD G. INGALLS

The citizens of Newton paused on Dec. 3, 1960 to pay their last respects to Lloyd G. Ingalls who passed away Nov. 30, 1960.

Mr. Ingalls was a native of Newton, the son of Gertrude E. Ingalls and the late Leon G. Ingalls. He was educated in the schools of Newton and attended Sanborn Seminary.

During World War II Mr. Ingalls served in Co. A, 363rd Engineers in

Iran. He was awarded the Good Conduct Medal, the American Theater Medal, the European, African, Middle Eastern Medal, and the World War II Victory Medal.

Mr. Ingalls took a very great interest in civic and general affairs in Newton; as all of those who knew him can attest. He was a member of the Board of Selectmen from 1947 until 1960. He served as Chairman of the Board for several years. He was Chief of Police in 1953 and Deputy Chief of Police in 1952 and 1954. He was Deputy Chief of the Fire Dept. from 1956 until 1959. He served as Fire Ward of Newton from 1947 until 1960. He was State Forest Fire Warden from 1956 until 1960. He was Assistant Civil Defense Director from 1954 until 1960.

Mr. Ingalls was a member of the First Christian Church, the Eclipse Grange, the Newton Volunteer Fire Dept. Association, the Newton Junction Volunteer Fire Dept. Association, and the Rockingham County Law Enforcement Association.

Mr. Ingalls was known and held in high esteem, not only in Newton, but in the surrounding communities. He was a good friend and neighbor, always ready to respond to any appeal for assistance from his townspeople. He did many things and donated most generously to the religious, civic and social welfare of Newton; whereas these deeds were unknown to the general public. One of his many deeds while selectman, was the repair of the inside of the town hall. This was accomplished with the help of the other members of the Board in Mr. Ingalls' last term as selectman. It is a memorial to him.

The sympathy of the entire community is expressed to his wife, his mother and his two sons. They may be assured that his good deeds will never be forgotten and his name will always be remembered. May he rest in peace.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L.S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newton in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Newton on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear reports of Town Officers and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed or through Old Age Assistance; or any other property of the Town not used for public purposes.
6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$262.91 to receive \$1,752.70 for Class V Roads.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an additional Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for the Police Department.

8. To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light on Peaslee Crossing Road near the residence of Charles J. Chrigstrom.

9. To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light on Route 108 near the residence of Paul Morse.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,450.00 for the following: (1) 2500-watt portable generator and lights (2) six coats (3) 6 helmets (4) one 40 ft. 3 section wooden extension ladder (5) 14 ft. roof ladder (6) two 50 amp. generator and voltage regulator (7) Scott Air Pac.

REPORT OF TOWN MEETING

NEWTON, N. H.

MARCH 9, 1960

The meeting was called to order at 8 p.m. by the moderator, Clifford R. Bryer, who called on Howard Bowen to open the meeting with prayer.

Article 1. Results of the balloting on Tuesday, March 8th, for town officers was read by the moderator. On motion of Everett Coombs, for the Finance Committee, it was voted that all officers not elected by ballot be appointed by the Selectmen.

Article 2. Everett Coombs, for the Finance Committee, moved the acceptance of the list of estimated expenditures for the ensuing year 1960, appearing on pages 11 and 12 of the 1959 Town Report, excluding the item of school taxes, as the Town Budget for the year 1960, and moved the raising and appropriating of an amount necessary to cover the same. After discussion on several items, and explanations by Robert Fryer and Raymond Estabrook, the motion was passed.

Article 3. Howard Bowen read a report not printed in the Town Report for the Newton Planning and Development Commission. On motion of E. Coombs for the Finance Committee, it was voted that we accept the reports of Town Officers as they appear in the Town Report, and the report read by Howard Bowen.

Article 4. On motion of E. Coombs for the Finance Committee, it was voted that the Selectmen be authorized to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. It was voted that the Selectmen be authorized to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed or

through Old Age Assistance; or any other property of the Town not used for public purposes.

Article 6. E. Coombs for the Finance Committee, moved that the Town discontinue the present discount rates on property taxes and substitute a 2% 15 days-from-date-of-bill discount. After discussion, it was a vote.

Article 7. It was voted that the registration of bicycles be discontinued.

Article 8. On motion of E. Coombs for the Finance Committee, it was voted to authorize the Selectmen to fix the rental fee and rules in regard to use of the Town Hall; or take whatever action they deem necessary.

Article 9. On motion of Roland Estabrook, it was voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to help defray the expense of remodeling Engine No. 4 of the Newton Fire Dept.

Article 10. On motion of E. Coombs for the Finance Committee, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to purchase a new snow plow blade for the Highway Department.

Article 11. This article asked for a street light and maintenance of same near the residence of Eben Stronach and John Marden. On motion of Wallace Nyberg, it was voted that this article not be accepted. However, after votes on Articles 12, 13 and 14, on motion of W. Nyberg, it was voted that we go back to Article 11. Then on motion of W. Nyberg, it was voted that Article 11 be accepted.

Article 12. It was voted that this article be accepted as printed, to install a street light at the Newton Junction Trailer Park.

Article 13. Frank Wentworth moved that this article to install two street lights on Pond Street and maintain same; one near the residence of Frank E. Wentworth and one near the residence of Leslie Walters, be accepted. An amendment was made that this motion be changed to one street light, and that it be placed on a pole somewhere be-

tween these two houses. The vote on the amendment was passed, and then it was voted to accept the motion as amended.

Article 14. It was voted that the Town install one street lamp at the first entrance of Marcoux's Grove and Pond Street.

Article 15. Asking that the Town vote to raise the sum of, or not more than, \$300.00 to be used at the discretion of the Newton, New Hampshire, Industrial Committee, Howard Bowen made a motion that the article be accepted as printed in the Town Report. Carl Shaw for the Finance Committee, recommended not accepting this article. There was discussion as to the legality of this committee, and the right to appropriate money for it. An amendment was made by Stanley Cheney, and later withdrawn. An amendment to the amendment was made by E. Coombs, which was defeated. A final motion was made and carried — that the Town raise and appropriate \$300.00 to the Selectmen for the planning and development of the Town of Newton; and further that the Selectmen appoint a committee of five to serve as an advisory commission.

Article 16. No further business was brought up.

It was voted to adjourn at 10:40 p.m.

REPORT OF THE GALE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

This last year, in addition to performing the usual duties required to operate and maintain the Gale Library, we had installed new wiring and a modern lighting system. This provides excellent light for those studying as well as for those selecting books at the shelves. Payment for this improvement was met principally by the accumulated interest from the Gale and Lovering Funds.

The Gale Library observed National Library Week — April 3-9, 1960 and entered the New Hampshire State Contest. Your town library won an Honorable Mention and book prize for its activities in competition with over thirty other libraries. Our theme emphasized the importance of our heritage from the past. Much of the historical material prepared for the exhibition came from Newton homes, arranged by your neighbors, and presented to audiences that totaled several hundred by the end of the week. There were exhibits of books, antiques, dolls, toys, tools, and other articles. Many of the items were from the fine collection of the late Mr. Sidney Kimball. Saturday afternoon we held Open House with a showing of "Williamsburg Restored." Our official hostess, Mrs. A. Ralph Estabrook, who was wearing an old fashioned gown and bonnet, served refreshments. For a more complete picture of the events and exhibits, we invite you to look over our scrapbook at the library.

October 1960 marked the beginning of the Explorers Club. Our purpose and main hope is to stimulate in our young people the desire to read and to read worthwhile books. With the cooperation of the teachers, we prepared reading lists to cover many interests from the pleasure books, through the social studies, the sciences, and the biographies — all supplementing the school work. The rank of Explorer is achieved by reading and making book reports

on eight books from the lists in a period of four months. The eager response and continued interest surprised and pleased us all.

In conclusion, we wish to show our appreciation to our friends of the Kingston-Newton Garden Club for the lovely arrangements placed weekly in the library. To those who have donated their magazines and books for the use of our readers, we extend our thanks.

The highlighting feature of the Newton Police Department, for the year, is the addition of a Police cruiser, donated by Richard Howard, owner of the Newton Auto Sales. Members of the Department made it available for immedi-

ate use in any emergency. It is fully equipped with a two-way Police radio, siren, roof beacon, first aid kits, emergency lights, etc. This is one more step ahead of other towns our size and larger, in this area.

The Police Department has escorted every funeral through town. This is in added voluntary service to show prestige and consideration. Another added duty, for the year, is checking unoccupied camps and cottages, at regular intervals. Cards are left at each establishment, stating the date that the police have checked.

The Hallowe'en party, sponsored annually by the Department, was a huge success. Policewoman, Mrs. Mildred Hussey, assisted by the BB's, planned the activities and entertainment, which included games, dances, prizes and refreshments. The Department expresses thanks to townspeople and merchants for their financial help, at this time.

The year 1960 has been a very busy year, with much activity for the Police Department. Expenses have been greatly increased, due, primarily, to the incredible amount of court actions. Each case taken to court costs the Department \$1.50. The Department acknowledges gratefully, the immense number of complaints and disturbances received and investigated, by the Police, this year. Each call was answered and investigated, and the necessary action was taken immediately and efficiently by your police. The Police Department is on call at all times to help in any emergency and you are reminded that **TIME** is essential. Call immediately. It is a proven fact that a seemingly slight complaint, when investigated, demonstrates a significant occasion. Your experienced Police Department is ready 24 hours a day, to assist you accurately. When you call to register a complaint you are assisting the department in their police duties. They urge you to make your calls immediately.

One of the most important factors of the Department is the safety and welfare of the children of the town. Speed laws and road signs must not be ignored in this town. Continued support of all youth organizations should be en-

couraged. The Police Department will work hand in hand with parents, teachers, ministers and youth leaders, to help our children grow into responsible and respected citizens. The department appreciates the understanding and cooperation of the townspeople in this matter.

Floods follow; stream flow is affected; timber, buildings, grazing and wildlife are destroyed — all because MANY are CARELESS with fire in and near woodland. This can be remedied. YOU can put an end to this shameful waste! PREVENTION is YOUR business!

YOU, whether YOU be a farmer, homemaker, business or professional man or woman, municipal, state or federal official, clerk or woodsman can play an important part in the continuing and vital prevention program.

First — by setting a good example YOURSELF — being sensible and complying with the necessary laws and regulations governing the use of fire in and near woodlands.

Second — by using YOUR individual influence in your community and valued council with others in insisting and encouraging them to do likewise.

The following simple rules may be used as a guide both for YOU and for them.

1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden — the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning — don't leave it.
3. Make certain your fire, camp or debris, is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

4. Don't throw down lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes or from moving vehicles — make sure they are out — use your ash tray.
5. Don't burn at home — use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Newton qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 16th day of March, 1961, at six o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary School District Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
3. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
4. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies.
5. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriations of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

6. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate five thousand six hundred and sixty dollars (\$5,660.00) to provide an additional classroom for the school year 1961-1962.

7. To see what sum the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of assisting the Parent-Teacher Association in carrying on the School Lunch Program.

8. To see if the district will vote to add the services of a teacher of Special Education to the Union staff. This would not be effective on a Union basis until September 1962, and would not raise any money in the 1961-1962 school year.

9. To see if the district will approve the formation of a School Building Committee of fifteen members, to be composed of three selectmen, three school board members and nine members at large, to be appointed by the Moderator — and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00) to be used for plans for future school building needs.

10. To transact any further business that may legally come before the meeting.

Records of Annual School Meeting of the School District of the Town of Newton, March 3, 1960

The meeting was opened for balloting at 6:15 P.M. by the clerk, Barbara R. Morse. The polls were closed at 8:05 P.M. and the business meeting opened at 9:05 P.M. with the invocation offered by Wendell J. Irvine, Pastor of the Christian Church.

Article 1: The following officers were elected by Australian Ballot: Moderator, Clifford R. Bryer; Clerk, Barbara R. Morse; Treasurer, Otis R. Rowell; School Board Member for three years, Ellen F. Bean; School Board Member for one year, William J. Moisan, Jr.; Auditors, Everett O. Kelly and Everett E. Coombs. There were 55 Ballots cast.

Article 2: "To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto." On motion by Mrs. Bean the reports were accepted as printed in the Town Report.

Article 3: "To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant." On motion by Mrs. Bean it was voted to accept this article as printed in the warrant.

Article 4: On motion by Mr. Coombs, "The School Board was authorized to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies."

Article 5: On motion by Mrs. Bean, it was voted to pass over this article until action has been taken on Articles 6, 7, 8, and 9.

Article 6: Horace R. Williams moved that this article "To construct and equip a one-room addition to the Memorial School . . ." be accepted as printed in the Warrant. After discussion, James A. Marden called for a vote. The Moderator declared it would be a ballot vote, and called on William F. Halliday and William A. Baker to help count the votes. The result was: No 61 and Yes 40.

Article 7: No action was taken on this article because of the action taken on Article 6.

Article 8: No action was taken on this article because of the action taken on Article 6.

Article 9: Mrs. Bean moved that this article "to raise and appropriate \$1,340.00 to provide an additional classroom for the School year 1960-61" be accepted. The Moderator declared that there would be a ballot vote and Mr. Baker and Mr. Halliday would again assist in counting the votes. The result was: No 52 and Yes 44.

Article 10: On motion by Wallace B. Nyberg it was voted "to raise and appropriate \$945.00 to paint the exterior of the Village School." The Finance Committee proposed an amendment, "that this article be laid on the table for one year, while the school board investigated the advisability of using siding similar to that now on the Town Hall." Ralph M. Bean moved that a committee of other than school board members be appointed by the Moderator, to investigate and obtain cost estimates." After remarks by Mr. Marden that the siding company did not recommend its use on schools, because of susceptibility to damage from stone throwing, these amendments were not carried.

Article 11: On motion by Mr. Coombs for the Finance Committee, it was voted to raise and appropriate \$1,130.00 for the purpose of assisting the Parent-Teacher Association in carrying on the School Lunch Program.

Article 5: On motion by Mr. Coombs, for the Finance Committee, it was voted that there shall be deleted from the budget as otherwise finally approved at this meeting, all appropriations related to the activation and/or operation of

an additional class or classroom. On motion by the Finance Committee it was voted to accept the budget as printed except for Items 6, 14b, and 16 which are to be brought up separately for discussion.

Item 6: On motion by Mr. Bean it was voted to raise and appropriate \$32,775.10 for salaries of teachers and Principal.

Item 14b: On motion it was voted to adjust this item to read \$00.00, and be therewith deleted from the budget.

Item 16: On motion by Mr. Nyberg it was voted to raise and appropriate \$6,850.00 for Transportation.

It was voted to adjourn at 11:15 P.M.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Newton:

I am presenting herewith my Fifth Annual Report as Superintendent of Schools in Newton. A report from the Principal will discuss more in detail the activities of the schools. Statistical reports are listed separately.

PERSONNEL

Two new teachers joined the school staff this year. Loren Livengood, Jr., of Derry, New Hampshire, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, teaches in grades 7 and 8 at the Memorial School. Mrs. Priscilla Viens of Haverhill, Massachusetts, a graduate of Salem Teachers College, with experience in the Haverhill School System, teaches grade 2 at the Rowe's Corner School.

All teachers have continued membership in local, state and national professional organizations and I am extremely proud of the fact that Union No. 55 has one hundred per cent membership in these organizations.

At this time I would like to comment on the need for adequate salaries and the need for some incentive so that teachers may continue to want to teach in Newton and that the older teachers will be able to look forward to a satisfactory retirement stipend. You as citizens of Newton may feel that you can not pay salaries comparable to other communities. You may not wish to make sacrifices to give your children a top education. This is understandable. You should, however, make some compromises. You have accepted a minimum salary of \$4,000.00 for beginning teachers. You should decide how many steps in a so-called salary schedule or guide, and at what rate of increase you can offer teachers as an incentive to return. This you must do.

Otherwise, you will be changing teachers each year and a constant turnover makes it impossible to maintain satisfactory standards. It takes two to three years for a teacher to reach his or her potential. I am not advocating that you have to compete with richer communities but if you remove incentive completely there is no guarantee that you can hire even average teachers.

A teacher usually retires at 65 years of age. Her retirement depends upon 1-X times the number of years she teaches, multiplied by the average salary of her last five years of teaching. You can readily understand why it is important to the older teacher to have an adequate salary during these later years of teaching.

FUTURE HOUSING

I have advocated each year since I have been your Superintendent of Schools to either add an additional room to the Memorial School or to rent a room so that you can have single grades in Newton in all schools. I do this for just one reason and that is to improve the academic achievement of each pupil.

This year the teachers at the Village School accepted double grades with 38 and 40 in a classroom in September so that we might have five single grades. They know, and our records show that when we have been able to have single grades the year by year progress is normal or better.

The achievements of the pupils were shown to the School Board and they were pleased and I believe "sold" on the idea of single grades. Single grades with adequate class size, plus a good teacher should be the main concern of all of us. If we can accomplish this I assure you that your pupils will do as well as any others. They need only to have an even chance.

I believe you should have appointed a school building committee that will study the housing needs and be able to make recommendations at the school district meeting in March 1962. In the meantime, I would like to recommend

that you hire a room such as you have at the Junction Fire House, and use that as a temporary measure.

Perhaps the Parent-Teacher Association with children in school might work hard for such an arrangement and if the district approves, help to make the room more attractive. It is close to the Memorial School so that playground facilities and hot lunches will not be too difficult to arrange.

Another reason that I prefer single grades is the difficulty of hiring teachers to teach double grades. Fortunately, the last few teachers hired were all hired for single grades.

Your School Board has continued to maintain and improve the physical condition of the buildings. A regular painting program each year improves the appearance. I would like to publicly congratulate the custodians for the fine work they are doing.

Work should be done on the foundation of the Rowe's Corner School, but it is questionable as to how much money should be spent on such an old building. It was decided at this time to go along with the condition of the foundations as they now are.

CURRICULUM

Last year in my report I recommended that a Class in Special Education be provided. The Newton budget included funds to do this on a part-time basis and by pooling our resources with three other towns in Union No. 55, we were able to establish such a course. A special report on this class follows my comments. It is interesting to note that Dr. Charles F. Ritch, Jr., Commissioner of Education for New Hampshire, in his talk last April to the New Hampshire Education Association delegates, emphasized that they have the responsibility to exert leadership in presenting basic education needs to the people. One of the basic needs was support for the mentally handicapped, and he said, and I quote, "We must understand that 'special' young people who are in our schools today should be a part of the public

schools, but should be put into specialized classes in order to meet their particular needs and, at the same time, to preserve the needs of the remainder of the children." New Hampshire's Report on the White House Conference on Children and Youth has just been published and strongly advocates classes in special education. It is complimentary to you that you have seen this need and have taken steps to create this class, being one of the few smaller districts to do so.

The National Defense Education Act makes it possible to improve the curriculum in several areas, notably science, math and modern languages. The Federal Government will pay one-half of the cost of any equipment for use in the classroom. We should again avail ourselves of this opportunity to provide better class instruction.

Television has come of age in the classrooms. It is a modern educational tool that is becoming more popular. The Parent-Teacher Associations in the other towns of the Union have purchased sets for their own schools and the NDEA will pay one-half of the cost. Channel 11 at the University of New Hampshire is broadcasting fine programs especially in science. It is worth thinking about.

This year more is being done with departmentalized teaching at the Memorial School and I believe with better results. When teachers can concentrate more on teaching two or three subjects I believe we will receive better achievements. It is worth noting that we are not able to departmentalize with double grades.

I would like to mention at this time the 1960 New Hampshire White House Conference Summary Report on Youth Priorities 1960-1970 as it affects Education, which I believe is quite pertinent and our hope for the future lies in the acceptance of this philosophy. I quote:

"Education is the main basis for the broad political participation and individual mobility essential for a free society. To fulfill these needs, we must provide varied education opportunities to challenge each individual to realize

his full abilities. It should be recognized that all institutions and programs designed to meet individual needs can, and should maintain high standards. To do this, local, state and Federal governments, as well as individuals, businesses and non-profit bodies must greatly increase their support for education on all levels. Further, the teacher must be more adequately honored as an individual and recompensed as a skilled professional."

COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS

Appreciation is expressed for the continued support and cooperation of the Parent-Teacher Association, the Garden Club, the Lions Club and other civic groups at this time. I also wish to thank everyone who has helped me this past year in making the work of the school department successful, and to extend my appreciation.

REPORT OF SPECIAL EDUCATION CLASS

The School Districts of Hampstead, Atkinson, Plaistow and Newton raised funds in their respective budgets this year to provide a part-time class in Special Education. By combining these resources it was possible to establish a full-time class for a group of children who would have either been excluded from school attendance or placed in a regular classroom where they would have been at a great disadvantage themselves, or created disadvantages for the regular students.

The Hampstead School District provided a classroom in the High School, and the other three districts have contributed rent and a share of the operational costs. The classroom was equipped with student furniture, tables, filing cabinets, and various teacher tools, and each town contributed to the supplies and testing materials.

At present there are eleven pupils in the class ranging in age from nine to sixteen. There are 3 pupils from Atkinson, 3 from Hampstead, 2 from Newton and 3 from Plaistow — with previous school attendance varying from less than a year to seven years. There are several other students eligible for attendance in the various towns, but transportation of these students to Hampstead presents a problem. At present the students ride on the regular school bus in their respective communities, and then are transported by station wagon to Hampstead. As more transportation facilities are available additional children will be admitted to the class. Pupils of varying degrees of ability are being taught at their own level, regardless of chronological age.

Mrs. Ruth Webster, the teacher, reports on class activities as follows: "In **Reading** pupils are divided into three groups working at first and second grade level. Reading is one of the most serious problems because of speech defects and various reading problems. We work on reading skills,

sight vocabulary, word analysis, phonetic analysis and word drill, reading for meaning and smoothness in oral reading.

Arithmetic, so important in our daily living, is taught in three groups as well. All groups have worked together on oral problems, telling time and the concept of size, measurement and numbers. Group I has had carrying in addition and borrowing in subtraction, multiplication up to 8's and counting in 1's, 5's and 10's. They are working in a 3rd grade workbook and occasionally in a 4th grade book. Group II had simple addition and subtraction, with multiplication up to 4's. They have had board work, but are now using a 3rd grade book and workbook. Group III is learning numbers, how to write numbers and their meaning, and are adding and subtracting one and two place numbers. They have studied the calendar and time.

In **Language** most of the work is oral. We are emphasizing the use of complete sentences, correct verbs, correct speaking and manners in listening. Pupils enjoy 'Show and Tell' periods when they speak in front of the class. Our **Spelling** has consisted of words from the Dolch Basic sight vocabulary and has been studied in conjunction with our **Handwriting**, when we write one letter a day in capitals and small letters and the basic sight words beginning with that letter. **Social Studies** has been about the Family and its Members, duties and habits. We also study the community and a field trip to the firehouse during Fire Prevention Week provided first-hand information about the equipment used by firemen. In **Science** the students have learned about trees of New England, the five senses, etc., and personal hygiene and cleanliness have been emphasized.

Music is enjoyed under the direction of the Music Supervisor. **Handwork** helps in job and community preparation and develops coordination and motor skills, so time is spent almost every day in handwork. Our work is correlated to the reading of stories with seasonal pictures and bulletin board displays. For Christmas the pupils made felt bookmarks, bell lapel pins, change purses, foam tree decorations, wall plaques and tree decorations from can covers

with old Christmas cards and glitter. Girls are learning to knit and boys to make models of plastic and wood. A fire-house model was made by two boys, as well as weathervanes.

Pupils have come to realize that the Special Class is not a 'play' school, but a serious undertaking to help prepare them for a place in the world. Teaching a Special Education Class is a challenge, but it is certainly a very rewarding experience when one sees eyes light up with understanding and when progress slowly but surely is being made."

The present budget includes funds for the continuation of this class. The cost in the 1961-62 year will be considerably less as all necessary equipment has already been purchased. Hampstead will continue to house the class. The School District Warrant for each of these towns will contain an article giving the voters the opportunity to make this a regular Union service as of September 1962. There has been legislation introduced to the present legislative session to provide State Aid to programs of this nature and the class now in operation should be eligible for this support. By combining resources with other towns having similar needs, we are able to provide a class of this nature that would otherwise be financially prohibitive.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the School Board and to Mr. Wendell V. Davis, Superintendent of Schools:

I am pleased to present the annual principal's report on the activities of the past school year in Newton. Children go to school to acquire skills and knowledge and are happy when they have made some progress toward that goal. Consequently we feel that the intellectual growth of the individual child, according to his ability, becomes the primary concern of educators. We are continuing in our efforts to develop in each child the basic skills of learning and also to instill in him those characteristics that will lead to good citizenship.

In an effort to determine present levels of pupil ability and achievement the Stanford Achievement Tests were administered in October. An analysis of the results followed by a comparative study indicated considerable improvement in most subject areas.

The aim of the music program which is capably supervised by Mr. Evan R. Williams is to bring musical enjoyment and understanding to each individual. Although the main emphasis is on singing other activities used in accomplishing the musical aim are listening, creating-performing, music reading and rhythmic work. Early in December a combined Christmas program was presented before a large and appreciative audience.

Cursory examinations, color perception tests for grade 5, health talks, pre-school registrations, clinics, home visits, conferences and a yearly medical examination of grades 1-4-8 pupils by Dr. Francis Harris, M.D., are a few of the services available to our children under the School Health Program. This program functions under the direction of Mrs. Gwendolyn A. Banks, R.N., school nurse.

Class A lunches, which are carefully planned according to state requirements, are available to every pupil at a cost of \$1.25 a week. This also includes a half pint bottle of milk. Transportation problems have been eased considerably since the purchase of the compact food carriers. The staff consists of Mrs. Harry Paige, cook; Mrs. Martha Jackman, helper; and Mr. Clarence Green, transporter.

"Stamp Day" once a week gives our boys and girls the opportunity to put thrift training into practice. By buying United States Savings Stamps we feel they are developing thrift habits early in life.

Films for our Audio-Visual Program are annually scheduled through the Audio-Visual Center at the University of New Hampshire to supplement classroom teaching. Our own library of filmstrips on health and science is constantly growing. We hope that sometime in the near future "television" will also become a medium of education in our schools.

Last year's success on the baseball diamond is indicative of the popularity of baseball at the Memorial School. Our team won the Grammar School League Championship, upsetting Sandown at Hampstead 4 to 3. For this honor we received a plaque which will be passed to next year's winning team plus a trophy which will remain on display in the school. A girl's softball team was also organized and coached by Mrs. Dorothy Morse. Their season also ended with many wins to their credit. These contacts with children from other communities have proven to be worthwhile experiences.

Diane Melville, school champion for the second consecutive year, was our entrant in the 1960 State Championship Spelling Bee held at Exeter for Rockingham County. I am happy to announce that she won fifth honor even though she competed in a group of over thirty school champions. We are now looking forward to our participation in the 1961 contest.

Our 1960 Graduation Exercises were held on the six-

teenth of June. With appropriate songs and essays the theme "Immigration" was developed. The Good Citizenship Medal, annually awarded by the Sons of the American Revolution, was won by Jacqueline Nicol. Nineteen of our graduates are enrolled at Sanborn Seminary, three at Haverhill High, one at Haverhill Trade School, two at Pentucket Regional and one at Sherburne, Mass. High School. Class Day, sponsored in part by the Parent-Teacher Association, was again enjoyed at Canobie Lake and climaxed by a dinner in Merrimac.

The state bookmobile, a service of the State Library, makes its periodic visits to our schools. Children have an opportunity to select books which are of special interest to them. Teachers are also encouraged to choose books which are related to their subject areas.

"Open House" was observed on Thursday during American Education Week. Many parents visited the schools and observed classes, became acquainted with teachers, and familiarized themselves with our buildings. Fire Prevention and Book Weeks as well as special days are also remembered with appropriate programs.

Benson's Animal Farm, University of New Hampshire, Coast Guard Station in Salem, Science Museum, a TV Station, Harvard Museum, Coca Cola Plant and the General Motors Plant of Framingham indicate the varied scope of educational field trips taken. These trips are taken only to places related to our areas of study.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the School Board, Superintendent Wendell V. Davis, school personnel, friends and the local organizations for their help in making our work successful.
