

## Inaugural Address

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### HON, CHARLES P. BERRY, MAYOR.

### GENTLEMEN OF THE CITY COUNCILS:

One week ago we were elected as members of the city government for the coming year, some of us to fill the same positions as held by us last year, and others to occupy the seats of predecessors.

In accordance with the custom of the past and in compliance with the provisions of the city charter, we have met today to take the oath of office, and to organize for the transaction of municipal business. We have been elected and have taken upon ourselves an obligation to perform faithfully and to the best of our ability, the various duties which fall upon us as the representatives of those who have chosen us to fill these responsible positions.

The duties of the city government are many and varied, and require much attention and the devotion of considerable time by us, that the best interests of all citizens may be promoted. I trust that we shall at all times manifest such an interest in public affairs that a practical and business like solution of all questions may be arrived at, and that we shall exercise as much care in the conduct of city business, as we should be prompted to do in managing our own private enterprises. For it is only in this manner that we shall merit and have the approval of the tax payers of the community.

During the past year we have passed through a serious business depression, which has affected in no small degree the people of our country, our city as well as other localities.

While the effect of this financial trouble has been apparent in our city. I am happy to be able to say that it has not been so severe as in other sections, even in our own state. However, the lesson taught is one of economy in business affairs of both public and private nature. The experience of the past twelve months has prompted the curtailment of expenses in all directions, and it gives me great pleasure to note that such has been the case in the conduct of the financial affairs of the city, as is indicated by the deceased tax rate of the present year.

The indications of a return to steady and profitable business throughout the country are reassuring, and the fact that there is little lack of employment in the city is indicated by contentment on the part of our citizens. The public works of the city, and private industries, afford employment for a large number of our citizens, and I hope and believe that the same prosperous condition of our people will continue through this and

other years.

As is customary on these occasions, I shall in addressing you today call your attention to such matters as are likely to require your consideration during the coming year, and to solicit your co-operation in the conduct of all the city's business. I trust that all fully understand the nature of the obgations just taken and the responsibilities of municipal administration; and that we shall manifest sufficient interest in the discharge of public duty, that by practical devotion to the general welfare of the city we may bring about those commendable results most desirable.

#### FINANCES.

The financial standing of our city still holds its high place among the cities of New England. Our bonds are always in demand and whenever placed in the market are eagerly sought for and find a ready sale at a good premium. For full and concise report of our city finances for the fiscal year to Jan. 1, 1894, I would respectfully refer you to the printed reports to the date above mentioned.

Since the last report was issued to the present time, \$2,000 of the city debt, which became due on April 1, has been paid, and the floating debt of \$25,000 mentioned has also been paid, and also all temporary loans which have been negotiated for the usual purpose of meeting the current expenses of the city for the past seven months. And at the present time there are

no outstanding notes remaining unpaid.

For the purpose of the extra expenses needed, for the forwarding of our improved sewerage system, so long needed in our city, as also for the extra school house improvements, is was deemed advisable by the city councils to issue bonds for that purpose, and on May 1 bonds to the amount of \$40,000 were placed upon the market and were taken up readily at a premium of \$1,520.

Another matter that is encouraging to our tax payers is the steady decrease of the rate of taxation, which for the past four years has been as follows: In 1891 the rate was \$2 00, in 1892 \$1.92, in 1893 \$1.88, and this year \$1 71.

### STREET DEPARTMENT.

In my remarks a year ago in regard to this department, I called attention to the fact that the expenditure of considerable money would be necessary to put our streets in proper repair, after all of them had been opened for the purpose of laving water and gas mains. Work in this direction has been going on since early last spring, and by the use of modern road making machinery some of our thoroughfares are now in most excellent condition, and it is certainly desirable that others shall be improved in like manner. The work done on Middle and Islington streets by the road machine is of a substantial and permanent character, and I would recommend that such construction be continued as rapidly and in as many streets as possible, for roadways so built will need no other repairs for a long time to come, and for a practical illustration of the fact, I would call your attention to Market street, which was made in a similar manner some ten years since, and has had no repairs of consequence up to the present time.

Under the head of this department I desire to call your attention to suburban roads, for it seems to me that the management of expense here is decidedly wrong. In the past, work on these roads has been left entirely with the surveyors in the several outlying districts, who have devoted their energies and spent money here and there according to the direction of their

own will.

The appropriations have been wholly spent and more generally largely overdrawn with but little regard for the present or future needs of other localities in their districts. Complaints regarding this state of affairs have been made from time to time, and I feel it my duty to say that I believe that many of them have been just ones, but as the surveyors are not controllable by any committee of the city government matters have been going from bad to worse. The whole system is at variance with the spirit of fairness and economy, and can, I believe, be much improved upon. In this matter we are a long distance behind many country towns, where the surveyor system has been abandoned in favor of the town plan, to the great benefit of their roads.

The city now owns a road machine similar to those used by towns, and, in my opinion, it could be used on the roads in question to great advantage and a considerable saving in expense. As I have before said, the surveyors in these outlying

districts are not responsible to us in any manner for their acts, and, unless something is done, will continue to spend money extravagantly, as in the past. I know of no reason why they should not come under the direction of a committee of the city government, as does the superintendhnt of streets, to whom they shall make returns of their doings, and I would recommend that some ordinance be adopted by you with this end in view.

In connection with my remarks under this head I desire also to speak of one more important matter, that of collecting rub-

bish twice each week throughout the city.

This practice has been established some time, and from a small beginning has become a work of very large proportions. The expense of this work is now charged to the street department. I do not know that there is an opportunity to make any change in this matter, for it is a great convenience to all citizens, and to discontinue even a part of it would be generally regarded as a long step backward. Still it is well that it should be understood that this expense is paid from the appropriations for streets, which being added, makes the expense of the latter seem large, when the results obtained are considered. In some cities the expense of collecting rubbish is charged to the board of health, where it very properly belongs.

#### SCHOOLS.

The large amount of money spent annually for the support of schools is a creditable outlay, and by its use, under the able direction of the school board, our schools are in favorable comparison with those of other cities of New England. During the summer, the Whipple school building, deemed unsafe for occupancy, has been extensively repaired, to the satisfaction of the committee having the matter in charge. The work is now completed, and upon the reopening of schools in the fall will be ready for teachers and scholars.

The remodelling of the Haven school building is now being pushed rapidly, and on the completion of the work now being done, the scholars in that section of the city will find much better accommodations than they ever have had before. Nothing has yet been done toward affording more school room at the west end, which was thought to be necessary a year ago. The condition of the Cabot street building was then discussed

and it was thought that it could be made suitable.

The building has since been occupied for school purposes and I can see no reason why its use cannot be continued, if the need of more room still exists. I believe it can be made comfortable for some years to come by the expenditure of a small sum of money.

#### SEWERS AND DRAINAGE.

If there is any one improvement more than another, in which we are to congratulate ourselves, it is the step onward toward a modern system of drainage. It is one of the most important agencies for the comfort, convenience and good health of our citizens.

In accordance with my recommendations last year plans have been made for sewers which will accommodate the modern sanitary arrangements now in use. The entire city has been provided for in these plans, utilizing the available main lines now in existence, and by the construction of new lines where needed.

Work on the Water and Hanover street lines is completed, and that on the South pond trunk line is already well advanced and progressing as rapidly as possible, under the direction of Messrs. Farrington and Scruton, the engineers in charge. It is with a great deal of satisfaction that I say that the expense of the work on the two former lines came within the estimate made.

I believe that when the plans now being carried out are completed, the city will be provided with a system of drainage that will be ample for many years.

#### WATER WORKS.

The city water works, operated under the direction of the hoard of commissioners, is now in complete running order, and as far as I am able to learn is conducted to the satisfaction of all. There is an abundant supply of water at all times available, and citizens already appreciate the increased volume and the modern faci ities for obtaining it.

As may be noticed by reference to their annual report the water commission have during the past year made, at a considerable expense, such addition to the plant as will insure a good

supply of water at all times.

Besides furnishing water to the homes of our citizens and the various places of business and manufactures, there are now maintained some 150 hydrants for fire purposes. In this connection it may be well to say that as yet we have made no terms with the water department as to the use of these hydrants, or payment for the same, as is the case in other cities, where similar appliances are in operation.

The water commissioners have suggested a committee of conference to discuss this matter, and settle, if possible, how the fire department shall assist the water board in supporting this valuable auxiliary to the other fire apparatus now owned by

the city.

#### CITY FARM.

There is no change in situation at the city farm, as far as the recommendations of last year are concerned. I am still of the opinion that the farm is much larger than is required, and a portion of it may well be disposed of. I have do doubt that house lots in that vicinity would find a ready sale at good prices.

During the year Mr. Seymour, superintendent, resigned, and Mr. Philbrick was elected to fill the vacancy thus occasioned. He has, with the approval of the overseers, made a general overhauling of the farm buildings, and by a liberal use of lime and paint made much improvement in the appearance of the

premises.

### FIRE DEPARTMENT.

There has been little occasion for the services of fire apparatus or firemen in our city during the past year, but there is a commendable show of promptness and efficiency when occasion requires. There has been no discussion as to changes in the number of men employed or pieces of apparatus. The chief engineer has made some slight change in the manner in which

companies shall respond to alarms rung in.

There are now located at various points about the city, 150 water hydrants, provided by the water commission, for the sole benefit of this department. The question has already been suggested, and will sooner or later come up for consideration by you, as to how and what this department shall pay for the use of this water service. I have already referred to this matter under the head of water works. There should be some

equitable settlement of this question at an early date.

It is not just that the expenses of the water works be increased by the burden of putting in these hydrants and their maintenance, and the burden of maintaining them for fire purposes and the protection of all the property of our citizens be borne by water takers alone. It certainly is right that this department be called upon to pay something for the use of these reliable sources, from which a plentiful supply of water may be conveniently obtained. The extra expense thus occasioned will no doubt suggest curtailment in other directions, and it is a question for you to determine, how this may be done.

We now have the same number of men and as much apparatus in the department as before the hydrants were placed in position, and as suggested by the chief engineer in a recent report, some reduction might be made without injury to the general efficiency of the department and protection to the property

of citizens.

#### POLICE.

The police force has, during the past year, as previously, discharged the duties incumbent upon it faithfully, and afforded ample protection. There has been no serious trouble in the city to demand the attention of its members, and I can see no reason for any change in this department.

#### STREET LIGHTS.

There is nothing to be said regarding the matter in which the city streets are lighted. The system of last year is still continued and gives the same general satisfaction.

#### BOARD OF HEALTH.

During the past year this branch of the city government has been entirely reorganized, for reasons fully explained and understood at the time of the change. Beyond the usual routine work and the case of small pox on the Lafayette road, nothing particularly worthy of note has taken place to occupy its attention. The "small pox scare," as it was called, was well taken care of, and did not spread beyond one family, and further infection was fortunately averted.

Incident to this case was the somewhat lengthy discussion as to a new small pox hospital, that on Pest island being deemed unfit for use. The board of health and an aldermanic committee spent no little time in looking at various proposed sites, but with the disappearance of the disease the discussion died out, and no action was taken.

### POOR DEPARTMENT.

The expense of attending the care of the city's poor is large and still increasing. It seems to me that this department is not conducted strictly on business principles, or in the same manner that the work of poor departments in the larger cities is carried on.

While I do not wish to be understood as desirous of depriving the needy poor of the city of any one of the benefits or privileges granted them by the overseers, I believe there should be a large degree of retrenchment and reform here. I believe that some one, either the overseers or the city itself, is being imposed upon; I also believe that there should be some way in which applications for assistance might be investigated and a careful study of the situation made, not for the purpose of debarring any needy one of assistance, but to see that all who do need help are served, and that the city's interest may be guarded as well.

#### CONCLUSION.

In conclusion I have only this to say, that I have called attention in a general way to the various departments of city business at this time, and shall doubtless, as the year progresses, take occasion to speak more specifically in regard to them. I trust feelings of harmony will prevail among us. May we keep in mind the fact, that to us has been committed the welfare of the city. Let us give to every question that may come to us such consideration as is due it, that we may act upon it in an honest and conscientious manner. The people of the city may rightly expect a constant endeavor, on our part, for the common good; and it is as much impossible as it is undesirable that we enter upon the discharge of our duties here without a keen sense of the responsibility attending the official relation by which we are connected with city interests. Let us so act that the good name of our fair city may be maintained, and its various interests protected.

# Chief Engineer's Report.

To the Hon. Board of Mayor and Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN:—In compliance with the requirements of the City Ordinances, I herewith have the honor to submit to you the annual report of the condition of the Fire Department.

#### MEMBERSHIP.

The present membership of the department is 115, and I feel proud to say, that for efficiency and promptness to the call and execution of their duties they could hardly be exceiled.

#### APPARATUS.

The apparatus consists of four steam fire engines (one on reserve,) one hook and ladder truck, one double tank (sixty gallons each.) Chemical engine, three hose wagons, two hose sleighs, one supply wagon, all in good condition, two second hand hook carriages, one second hand hook and ladder truck.

#### HOSE.

We have in service 10,600 feet of 2 1-2 inch Cotton hose, rubber lined, in good condition; one thousand feet should be purchased the coming year.

#### ENGINE HOUSES.

The engine houses are in fair condition; the Hauover street house needs some repairs and requires to be painted; the engine house on Court street occupied by Steamer No. 3 and Hook and Ladder No. 1 being so much out of repair, in my opinion it would be economy to build a modern engine house, which is very much needed. The west end of the city being without any fire apparatus (except water supply) should receive the immediate attention of the City Councils in regard to a new and modern engine house; although the department has not been called to that locality to any extent for several years, is no guarantee for the future.

#### WATER SUPPLY.

The reservoirs are in good condition and fully supplied with water: the Madison street reservoir will soon need some re-

pairs to its cover; the hydrants, to the number of 138, are in good condition; although not having occasion the past year to test them at their full capacity it is my belief they will be adequate for almost any emergency.

#### EXPENDITURES.

The expenditures made by the department during the past year amounted to \$12,228.55.

## FIRE ALARM TELEGRAPH.

This branch of the service has been maintained in excellent condition by the superintendent, W. I. Trafton, and has given perfect satisfaction. This important branch has been greatly improved by the addition of a four circuit repeater with three circuits at a cost of about \$1,000.

#### ANNUAL PARADE.

The eighth annual parade of the department took place September 29, which proved to be a success as in previous years.

During the year there have been nine box alarms, two of which were a call for assistance ont of town, one for a call at Newmarket and responded to, one for a call at Newburyport and responded to, six still alarms responded to by the Chemical, one of which was a call for assistance at Newcastle. The total loss by fire, as near as could be estimated, amounted to \$2,475.75, covered by insurance, excepting \$1,000 on the Warburton fire on which there was no insurance.

In conclusion I desire to extend my sincere thanks to his Honor the Mayor, to the committee on Fire department, and members of the City Councils for the assistance they have rendered to make the department efficient. To the assistant engineers and officers and members of the department I tender thanks and shall ever feel grateful for the assistance they have rendered.

In case assistance is needed from the Navy Yard, six whistles will be blown from Electric Light station, and repeated twice.

When assistance is needed on the Navy Yard, the signal by day will be two guns from the battery; by night two guns from the battery and two rockets. One gun being a signal for Kittery.

For assistance out of town, eight blows repeated twice.

# DIRECTIONS.

Alarms are to be given from the box nearest the fire.

Open the box and pull the hook all the way down, once, and let go.

After giving the alarm, remain by the box, if possible, so as

to direct the firemen to the exact locality of the fire.

Second alarm for same fire will be given only by one of the engineers.

Never open the box or touch the apparatus except in case of fire.

Never sound the alarm for a fire seen at a distance; be reasonably sure there is a fire before sounding the alarm.

Never let the key go out of your possession, except to some responsible person, to give an alarm of fire; and be sure the key is returned.

The key cannot be taken from the box except by an engineer. If you remove from your house or place of business, return the key to any member of the board of engineers.

All citizens are requested to inform themselves where the

keys to the boxes are kept.

The companies will respond to alarms of fire given from

boxes according to orders given by the chief engineer.

When an alarm of fire is given, all the companies not responding will remain at their respective houses thirty minutes, unless dismissed by telegraph signal, which is as follows: Three blows signify that the fire is under control, and companies not in attendance will be dismissed.

Cambridge time will be struck each day at 12.30, from W. I. Trafton's jewelry store, except on Saturdays when one round on one box will be rung in. One stroke at any other time means nothing.

# City Solicitor's Report.

To the City Councils:

In making my annual report to you it is not necessary for me to enter into any extended explanation of eases in which the city is interested, as it has been my purpose to advise with you,

from time to time, regarding the same.

The case of Storer Post, G. A. R., has been settled, also the case of Abbie Mulligan, as I advised in my last report. The case of Henry F. Clark is still in court and will be tried at the next term. In the matter of the petition for the discontinuance of the South Mill Pond highway the result was a defeat

for the city, which I anticipated and so advised you.

The laying out of the South Mill Pond sewer has resulted in some law suits, which in such cases is always expected, but I do not consider that there is occasion for any alarm on the part of the city. Mark H. Wentworth and Susan J. Wentworth have appealed from the award of damages by the city for said sewer passing over and through their land, as might be expected of them. Their cases will be tried at the next term of the supreme court.

Susan J. Wentworth has appealed from the award of damages, assessed by the County Commissioners, by reason of the South Mill Pond highway passing over her land. This case has been referred to Hon. E. G. Eastman of Exeter, and will be

tried very soon.

Dennis Shea sues the city for trespass to his wharf, by reason of the laying out of the sewer before mentioned. This case will be tried in the spring, as soon as the snow is off, so that a

view of the premises can be taken.

There is another case against the city, in which Fannie A. Gross is plaintiff. This is an action to recover damages for an alleged injury to plaintiff, on Market street at Noble's Island. It is my opinion that the case has no standing in law, as it was an injury for which the city is not responsible. The suit will, undoubtedly, be transferred to the law term, and will involve the question of the late highway law.

Prosecutions in police court have not required much attention from me, and the city has not been subjected to much expense from that source, by reason of the efficient manner in which the police force have kept order in our city, without the cost of trials and commitments.

The thanks of the city councils and every citizen are due the police department for the economy that has been exercised in that department. My relations have been most pleasant with all the departments of the city. With these few remarks I leave this roport to you.

# REPORT

OF THE

# Board of Water Commissioners.

To the City Councils of the City of Portsmouth:

The water commissioners in making their fourth annual report to you, respectfully call your attention again to the fact that you have made no arrangement with this board regarding the use of the fire hydrants and the payment to the water department of an annual rental for each hydrant, as is done in other cities.

Persons not stopping to consider the matter may say that so long as the city owns the water works it should not pay a hydrant rental to the water department, as this amounts to a simple transfer of funds from one pocket to the other. But the fact is that it is most unjust to that portion of our citizens who pay water bills, that they alone should pay the whole expense of the protection against fire, which the fire hydrants afford to all our citizens and all their property as well as the property of non-residents. Valuable stocks of goods and real estate, owned by persons who pay no water bills whatever, enjoy fire protection from the fire hydrants, and on this account obtain a reduced rate for fire insurance without being taxed therefor in The cost of this protection is paid by the poor man who happens to be a water taker, and pays his little water bill. If the water department received from the taxes raised annually a fair amount for hydrant rental, the water rates could be reduced and the water taker would only pay for the water used by him, and the property protected from fire would pay for such protection, a fair amount, as in justice it should.

We have, as you know, furnished the city with one hundred and fifty fire hydrants. They have already shown their value as a protection against fire. The average hydrant rental paid by cities in this country which do not own their own water works, is \$32.50, per annum, for each hydrant. The water takers ought to receive from the city at least \$3,500 per annum for these hydrants, and the total amount of water bills being reduced by that sum, each water taker would obtain a proportionate reduction.

We also desire to call your attention to the fact that for two years past the city building has been supplied with water, as well as the engine houses, fountains and stone crusher, and the

bills therefor have not been paid.

We have, during the year, added to the system by putting in the water upon Noble's Island and extending the mains in other directions; also by putting in a new pump at Haven Spring and extending the gallery at Fountain Head.

The total indebtedness for the water works is \$325,000, all

bearing interest at the rate of four per cent.

# Report of the Superintendent of Schools.

To the Board of Instruction, Portsmouth, N. H.

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to present my third annual report as Superintendent of the schools of Portsmouth. This report is the ninth in the series of annual reports from this office.

It is my purpose to present you a brief account of the events of the year, together with such criticisms and suggestions as may seem of use. The usual tables of statistics have been prepared, and with the reports of the various special teachers and the outline of work for the coming year are given in the appendices.

No radical change in organization or management has taken place in the past year. The periods for comparison must as a rule differ in time more widely than by one year for marked differences to show themselves. A glance at twenty or even ten years back would reveal striking differences, and it is to be hoped improvements.

At the risk of repetition I present again the record of tardinesses and dismissions for some years past. While we have gained somewhat in the past year much is still left to be desired. It seems to me that the fault now lies mainly with parents, and I wish through you, to call their attention to the matter. Much as we may do in school for the training of the child, the one thing impossible is to overcome the influence of home. If home and school heartily join hands the tendency of the training is sure to be right.

I subjoin for purposes of comparison the records of corporal punishment for the last year. The number, fifteen, is lower than ever before. Only eight teachers found it necessary to resort to the rod, and they, strange as it may seem, were teachers whose experience, age, dignity and apparent success would induce a contrary expectation. Eight instances are from the Haven school, four from the Whipple and three from the Farragut. One teacher has four cases, another three, two have two and three one.

From my standpoint two cases seem warranted, the others were out of place.

The advantages of a firm enforcement of rules found necessary for the conduct of the schools was never more vividly illustrated than when the cases of small pox in the city found fully half the children unvaccinated. With the advice and assistance of the Board of Health prompt measures were taken, and at the expense of much disturbance of the schools the law on the matter of vaccination was put into active operation. Free vaccination was established and many availed themselves of the privilege. At present there are no children in the

schools unvaccinated. I would recommend that some arrangement be made with the Overseers of the Poor or elsewhere that free vaccination may be furnished in cases where the means of the parent do not warrant the expense of a physician. Any compulsory provision of law involving expense should always be accompanied by an opportunity for relief at the public charge.

### Truancy.

In the matter of truancy our regulations are lamentably weak, and our enforcement still weaker. This side of our school system needs a radical overhauling. Our state school law proceeds on the idea that education in the public schools is compulsory and that every parent is not gifted with the privilege, but burdened with the duty of either sending his child for a certain time to the public schools, or providing to the satisfaction of the school authorities for his instruction in some other way. In accordance with this theory permission has been granted by public statute to cities and towns to enact in their by-laws such ordinances on truancy as may seem best. With us this matter is lodged with the city marshal and assistant marshals, who alone have power to investigate alleged cases of truancy and make complaints and prosecutions. As this power is merely incident to other police duties it happens that only the most flagrant cases receive any attention, and these often when they are of long standing, consequently a truant stands a good chance of escaping undetected, or at least unpunished. My personal observation convinces me that there are in our city many scholars of legal school age not enrolled in any school, public or private. In Dover, Concord, Manchester and Nashua regular truant officers are employed who investigate daily every suspicious case of absence, and compel in both parents and children a better observance of the law. It is a subject that needs your eareful consideration and I recommend it to Positive action will doubtless meet with opposition and inertia, but none the less should be entered upon.

Following are extracts from our City Ordinances and the

Public Statutes on this subject:

# Chapter 21, Compiled Ordinances.

Section 1. Every habitual truant or minor of this city not attending school, without any regular and lawful occupation, between the ages of six and sixteen years, shall, on complaint (as hereinafter described) to the justice of the police court of this city, be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars, and may, instead of such fine, be sentenced to the Industrial school for a term not exceeding one year.

Chapter 93, Public Statutes.

Section 14. Every person having the custody and control of a child between the ages of eight and sixteen years, residing in a school district in which a public school is annually taught, shall cause such child to attend the public school for twelve weeks at least in every year, six weeks at least of which shall be consecutive, unless the child shall be excused by the school board of the district because his physical or mental condition is such as to prevent his attendance at school for the period required, or because he was instructed in a private school for at least twelve weeks during the year in the common English branches or, having acquired those branches, in other more advanced studies.

Sect. 15. Any person who does not comply with the requirements of the preceding section shall forfeit ten dollars for the first offense and twenty dollars for every subsequent offense, for the use of the district.

#### Teachers.

Our force of teachers has changed in the past year rather more than has been usual, but not more than to be expected. Three desirable teachers, whose work had been most satisfactory and who had given themselves 'eagerly to it, received appointments in Massachusetts cities at salaries larger than we We ought. I am convinced, to stand could afford to pay. ready to overstep our maximum salary limit at any time when by so doing we can retain the services of a teacher who has proved to be of sterling worth. The difference between the good teacher, who to the rare inborn aptitude adds enthusiastic devotion and unfaltering energy, and the teacher who is in school simply to avoid a worse fate, is so marked in other respects that it may well be in point of recompense. Selecting teachers for a city with smaller salaries than its neighbors is much like a lottery with the dismal prospect of losing the successes and keeping the failures. I am suspicious of any system of selecting teachers that does not find it necessary occasionally to pluck up courage and part with some of its failures. It shows a lack of vitality somewhere. The selection of teachers on the grounds of polities, personal favoritism, or any other ground than that of intrinsic merit, should be regarded a crime against the community. Again we often have it urged that home applications should be favored in the selection of teachers. While generally just, this consideration, unqualified, must lead to strange lengths. The only place for the circumstance of local residence to have weight, is, as I conceive it, in determining between two candidates apparently equal in other respects. But on the other hand the continual selection of

teachers taught and trained under our own system inevitably leads to narrowness. We need to be on the lookout for importations of fresh blood to quicken new ideas and lend vigor and strength to the whole. Like every other question there are two sides to the employment of local teachers wholly. Following are lists of the resignations and appointments for the year past:

### Training School.

This institution still continues to be a valuable adjunct of our school system. Four young ladies have received diplomas during the year, two of whom are employed in our own schools and two in neighboring towns.

Nine have been admitted to the various classes and the school is working up to its full capacity.

### Training School Regulations.

Section 1. Persons desiring to enter the Training School as pupil teachers shall make written application to the Board of Instruction for admission thereto, stating where they were educated and what experience, if any, they have had in teaching. The applications shall be referred to the committee on the Training School, who shall have the power to admit the applicants to the school.

SEC. 2. Candidates for admission must have completed the course in the Portsmouth High School, or an equivalent course and may be required to furnish references as to character and scholarship. Pupil teachers may be admitted on the first of February or at the beginning of the fall term in each year.

Sec. 3. The number of pupil teachers constituting the training class shall be determined from time to time by the committee on the school.

SEC. 4. The course of instruction in the training department shall continue for three periods of five school months each. The first of these periods shall be regarded as probationary, and at its expiration leave to withdraw will be granted to those candidates whose success is not probable. A certificate shall be granted to those who complete the course.

SEC. 5. Any member of the training class who shall be elected teacher in any school of the city before completing the course of study shall, upon recommendation of the principal of the school and the superintendent, be entitled to a certificate.

Sec. 6. Pupils in the training class may be assigned by the superintendent, at his discretion, to serve as substitutes for other teachers.

Sec. 7. The course of study in the training class shall be prescribed by the superintendent and the principal of the school.

Sec. 8. Pupil teachers shall serve without compensation during the first term. They shall be paid at the rate of \$10 per month during the second term and at the rate of \$15 per month during the third term.

#### School Houses.

In meeting of the Board of Instruction March 6, 1894.

Attention having been called to the condition of the Whipple school, voted: That the chair appoint a committee to visit the school at once and take such measures as shall insure the safety of the scholars.

In committee meeting March 7, 1894, voted: To instruct the secretary to inform the abdermanic committee on school houses that the southeast gable of the building must be at once temporarily supported or the Board of Instruction will close the school.

Voted: That the chairman of the committee and the secretary present to the mayor and aldermen the need of permanent repairs.

In meeting of the Board of Instruction March 14, 1894.

The chairman of District Two committee for that committee, recommended that in view of the unsafe condition of the build-

ing the Whipple school be closed.

Moved, that the Superintendent be instructed to close the building till such time as permanent repairs are made. Moved to amend by closing till March 19, to await the action of the city councils. On the amendment, yeas 4, nays 4, amendment lost. The question then being on the original motion, yeas 5, nays 3.

Voted: That the District committee of the Whipple school

provide for the scholars all possible accommodations.

The above action of the Board of Instruction in closing the largest building in the city made it extremely difficult to provide accommodations for all the scholars of that school during the

spring term.

The eighth and ninth grades were crowded into the High School building, the old court house received the seventh, and the abandoned Peabody and Cabot were again opened to receive all the children under the seventh. Of course the change and the unfavorable conditions of many of the schools made the best work impossible, but in view of the task of providing at two weeks' notice school rooms for four hundred children it would seem that little more could have been done.

Whether the Whipple building was actually unsafe will always probably remain an unsettled question, but the majority of the board, in view of the fact that no agreement or warrant could be obtained from expert builders, resolved to take no chances. During the spring and summer the building was put in undoubted condition throughout, and the question of its safety and endurance is not likely to again trouble the present generation.

The long promised repairs have been made on the Haven building and it is now in accord with modern ideas as regards light, ventilation, furniture and all the necessities of a school house. The structure was practically rebuilt and refurnished, and the result seems fully commensurate with the expense.

It proved, contrary to expectation, that the repairs took more time than the summer vacation, although work was begun

even before the schools closed. Consequently the scholars lost seven weeks of the fall term. An attempt would have been made to find place for them elsewhere, but each week of delay

seemed naturally the last.

At present there are enrolled as belonging to the Whipple School three hundred and ninety-three pupils, nine more than the building was planned to contain in its eight rooms of fortyeight seats, with no allowance for the exigencies of grading. Last year we tided over the same difficulty by double-seating the master's room so as to seat sixty. This, of course, made ventilation a doubtful question. This year, however, seventy pupils in the upper two grades made another room imperative, and the second floor of the Peabody was again put into commission and the seventh grade placed there. This grade was chosen with reference alone to the best interests of the school. The many complaints of parents in regard to the unfitness of the Peabody is striking evidence of the progress made in Portsmouth during the last ten years in the matter of school houses. The upper floor of the Peabody would then have ranked with the best school rooms in town. Now, although improved by a ventilator, it is considered hardly fit to use. It is now plain that in the near future the city must either repair the Cabot street house or build a new structure, to relieve both the Whipple and the Farragut Schools. In the Principal's room at the latter school are seated sixty-four scholars, and there seems no promise of diminution another year. The High School building needs new floors and a retinting of the walls to carry out the improvements already planned.

### Charles E. Batchelder.

A loss keenly felt by the city in every respect, the death of Charles E. Batchelder, came home with especial vividness to the schools and all connected with them. Appointed to the Board of Instruction in 1882 he had finished twelve years of continuous service, and had just been elected to serve for another term of three years. During his service he had been a member of the High School committee. Into his connection with the School Board Judge Batchelder brought the same qualities of a sterling, upright manhood that commanded the respect and confidence of his associates in every pursuit of his life.

His associates found always in him a rare combination of firm moral purpose and keen intellectual vigor. A man like him is a tower of strength to any organization as counsellor and example. At the meeting of the Board of Instruction after his death the following resolutions were presented:

RESOLVED, That in the death of Charles E. Batchelder this Board has lost one of its most faithful and valuable members,—a man of absolute integrity, of wise and accurate judgment, entirely sincere, honorable and straight-forward, who had at heart and sought to promote the best interests of the schools of this city.

RESOLVED, That this expression of respect for Judge Batchelder be entered upon the records of this Board and be commu-

nicated to his family.

#### Alice H. Conner.

Miss Conner was a graduate of our public schools and our Training School. She had been for five months principal's assistant and for five months teacher of the fifth grade in the Farragut School. Growing ill health compelled her resignation at the beginning of the winter and early in the spring news of her death saddened teachers and pupils with whom she had been associated. With her a lovable character and enthusiasm for her work were added to great natural talent. Her untimely death cut short a course that promised much usefulness and honor.

### Annie P. Davidson.

Nine years of honorable service, faithful to the last—a record that leaves no more to be desired. Mrs. Davidson taught in the Peabody, Haven and Spalding schools, continuing her work in the latter till a few weeks before her death. She had gained firm hold upon the affections of her scholars and won the esteem and respect of parents and citizens in that neighborhood. Conscientious and hard-working, her labors always satisfied those in authority, and her death made a loss in that school that it will take with good success many years to repair.

# High School Report.

To the High School Committee, Portsmouth, N. H.

At the close of the term in June we received the resignation of Calvin E. Woodside, sub-master, and in August that of Mrs. Fannie D. Boylston, teacher of French and mathematics. Robert M. Brown, a graduate of Brown University, was chosen to fill the sub-mastership, and Bertha B. Smith to succeed Mrs. Boylston. The need of the sixth teacher having become imperative Olive A. Akerman was transferred from the position

of master's assistant at the Whipple School.

The result of these changes has been on the whole to give us a progressive, hard-working corps of teachers who, as a rule, are in harmony with the school and with each other. We need, however, in selecting teachers to bear in mind a few considerations. We need to remember that the old psychology that made separate entities of mind, sonl and body, and that delegated the care of the first to the school, of the second to the church, and the third to the home, no longer prevails. Heart and mind alike must be nourished, from the same sources and at the same times. We have no place for the teacher whose only concern is the intellectual progress of the pupil, still more emphatically none for the teacher who considers the measure of duty rounded in the proper presentation of the subject-matter of instruction without regard to its coherence and effect in the scholar's mind.

We may make whatever machine we please for our secondary education, choose what courses of study we may, and perfect the organization to the last detail, it is all to small purpose unless we can have teachers able to infuse a strong personal element into the problem. In proportion to salaries paid our High Schools are furnishing us a poorer quality of scientific instruction, than our primary schools, second only in inferiority to our colleges. The idea of instructing the individual according to his needs, that starting from the kindergarten, has revolutionized the primary and reached the grammar school, needs to be welcomed with open arms in the sphere of secondary education. In proportion to the size of the city our high school is the largest in the state. If its present rate of increase continues a demand for a seventh teacher need occasion no surprise. I call your attention to a report of the Principal herewith presented:

## Mr. J. C. Simpson, Supt. of Schools:

MY DEAR SIR; -I beg leave to offer the following as the

High School report for the year 1894.

As to the place in our educational system which the High School is filling and to what extent its advantages are being appreciated, the following statistics will give evidence. The figures represent the size of the school in September of the year mentioned. In 1889, 121; 1890, 134; 1891, 152; 1892, 169; 1893, 162; 1894, 192. There has been also a steady improvement in the average attendance during these years and a gradually decreasing number of pupils who leave school during the year.

As we view with some satisfaction the gradual increase of our school we should keep in mind the fact that all education to be true must meet the needs of the individual. His special weaknesses must be studied and met; but recitation and administrative work so engrosses the attention of all teachers that this is sometimes lost sight of. This evil could be remedied by adding another teacher to the force, which indeed must be done, if the recent rate of increase be continued. It is agreed by educational authorities that good high school work cannot be prosecuted if the average number exceed 25 to a teacher; our present average is 31.

We commenced the present school year with three new teachers to fill vacancies caused by resignations. I am happy to state that the smooth working of the school has been much less interrupted by such vital changes than is usual in such

circumstances.

As to the lasting effects of the work of the school it is more difficult to determine. The educational content does not lend itself to arithmetical computation, while the impetus toward development, both mental and moral, which pupils receive

entirely eludes calculation.

I may say of the work of the school as a whole, that a more general studiousness has manifested itself during the past year than hitherto; while it is apparent that during the winter season an excess of social pleasures interferes very seriously with the systematic and profitable work of the school. It is an open question if the beneficial effects of school athletics to a marked degree be not offset by the evils arising from carrying athletics too far.

Of the last graduating class one member entered Harvard with honors, and one entered Amberst; while others are study-

ing in special directions.

The school has received as gifts during the past year two fine solar prints of the Colisseum at Rome, the gift of the class of '94; also some interesting historical documents, the gift of Mr. Frank L. Pryor.

# Report of Teacher of Penmanship.

To Mr. J. C. Simpson. Supt. of Schools:-

In our department the children at beginning are taught to write with lead pencils, slates having been dispensed with. They first learn the thirteen short letters. The last half of the year we form a class with pen and ink, selecting the best as an incentive to the rest, and if this class succeds fairly well, before the year is through it is allowed to have a No. 1 short course copy book, the shorter course being used from grade one to four inclusive. The front position at the desk is adopted through all the grades. The revision of our copy books has been made within a very few years, which we think is a decided improvement. No. 8, which is used in the highest grammar grade, consists of large number of social and business forms, letter writing, &c. A large amount of practice paper is used to establish movement with varied exercises from the blackboard. The lateral forearm and finger movement combined, when mastered, gives a perfect command of the small letters; the direct and reversed ovals give a perfect rolling movement, especially adapted to the capitals. Nearly every lesson is opened with this practice, as a means of loosening up and limbering up the muscles. We claim that this method, when carried out, is perfectly adapted to any system. In the vertical method the forearm is slanted a little to the left of the vertical position, the forms of the letters remaining substantially the same in all systems. I remain

# Report of the Director of Music.

To Mr. J. C. Simpson, Supt. of Schools:-

In compliance with your request regarding the condition of our schools in vocal music. I cheerfully submit this brief report:

The past year has been marked by a steady advance in music

in our schools, both in quality and work accomplished.

Grade I has been steadily gaining in thought, and has now completed what we formerly did in the full year, singing from Modulator in all keys, by the effect of sounds.

Grade 2 are singing in the different keys from the chart, and have written all kinds of notes and rests and recognize the

same in the work.

Grade 3 are singing from 1st Reader, studying chromatic

scale and reviewing 1st Chart.

Grade 4 are taking first half of 2d Reader for the study of time in the various kinds of measure, also two-part singing in second half of 2d Reader.

Grade 5 are using 2d Chart with more advanced study of 2d Reader, writing music in all keys, and a thorough drill of brounting reals.

ehromatic scale.

Grade 6 are taking up the study of Bass clef from No. 2 Chart, have completed two-part singing and are singing in three-parts from No. 2 Reader.

Grade 7 are studying Bass clef in all keys, and singing at

sight from No. 2 Chart and last part of 2d Reader.

Grade 8 have completed 2d Reader and reviewed the same, taken No. 2 Chart in all keys, and are singing Book 3 in four-parts with the addition of the tenor part.

Grade 9 are using advanced work in sight reading from Book 3, Cecilian Series and Coda music used in some high

schools in four-parts.

I am well pleased with the manner in which the music has been taught by the regular teachers, for with them rests the success of our system. I find them very willing to carry out directions, and they even invent ways very helpful to the different classes, especially in the lower grades. My lessons have been to a large extent tests in sight reading. As the closest

application is called for in that way the best results must be

gained by that method.

The Whipple, Farragut and Haven upper grammar classes have each a piano that is used after the class have learned a song and is much enjoyed by them.

I have been obliged to omit the High School this year, ow-

ing to the change of time, much to my regret.

I trust more visits will be made this year than last by parents and others. It helps in many ways to better endeavor, and shows an interest that is truly gratifying to all. Come into the classes with good suggestions; you are very welcome to examine our work in all grades and we hope to see you often.

# Report of the Teacher of Sewing.

# To Mr J. C. Simpson, Supt. of Schools:-

There are, at present, about one hundred and seventy girls in the three grades in which sewing is taught. The following is the order of sewing for each year:

#### FOURTH GRADE.

Making of sewing bag, practice on samples, viz: Oversewing, hemming, whipping seams, back stitching, gathering.

#### FIFTH GRADE.

Making aprons, pillow-slips, sheets, hemming napkins and tablecloths, making underclothing and parts of dresses.

## SIXTH GRADE.

All of the foregoing and making buttonholes and darning.

This is as near as the work can be classified, because as each pupil receives, in turn, the personal care of the teacher, during the hour devoted to this branch in each grade, it is easy for the teacher to determine when to promote the pupil to more difficult work, irrespective of age and grade; natural receptivity and industry are important factors in the work, and it is a well established fact that children will work with more ambition and more zest when sewing together in a class, than when merely sewing at home by the mother's side. Since the sewing has been established as a regular branch in the school work, there have been two exhibitions, in both of which the work won great credit for the little hands that had so patiently wrought it; and it only seems a pity that the instruction stops short at a grade where the general intelligence of the pupil increases, and at just the age where it would seem that a step farther, in the direction of planning and cutting out, at least, simple garments, added to the previous knowledge of sewing, would be of so much use to the majority, and would not come amiss to any.

# Report of Supervisor of Drawing.

To Mr. J. C. Simpson, Supt. of Schools:-

DEAR SIR: -At your request I beg leave to submit the fol-

lowing report:

The study of Form, Drawing and Color is carried through all the schools from the Kindergarten into the High School. The drawing books of the Prang Educational Company are used and the work follows the Prang methods in outline, although there is a great deal of free outside work in decoration, object drawing, and drawing in connection with other studies.

The pupils from the lowest grades upward are taught to observe carefully objects placed before them, to think for themselves and to draw what they see, not to copy what someone else has seen. The same is true of clay modeling. The child models directly from the fruit, nut, or household utensil chosen

for the lesson.

The study of Form and Drawing is an important branch of the school work, as it trains the mind, eyes and hand. It strengthens the power of observation, creates thought, enables the mind to express thought in other ways than by words, gives accuracy to the eye, dexterity to the hand and refinement and cultivation to the mind. There is no study in the public school course that cannot be benefited by the aid of Drawing. It is "maid of all work" to the other studies. In the primary grade the close observation necessary in Form study is applied to the other lessons, and the deftness of the little fingers gained in modeling and drawing is quickly made use of in geography moulding, number work, etc. In all the studies—history, geography, reading and especially in nature study, drawing is made very helpful.

As taught in our schools the study of Form and Drawing is

classified into three divisions:

Construction, under which come all the facts of form: Representation, which treats of the appearance of form; and Decoration, which comprises all ornamentation of form. It is taught by means of type forms. The work is led from the type solids

to familiar objects that are like the types. All natural and created forms may be traced to these types.

The work extends from the clay modeling and stick laying of the first grades, and Kindergarten, through work in grouping objects, the geometric problems and simple working drawing, to work in light and shade, in pencil and charcoal from casts and still life, and original design from floral forms.

This year a systematic and sequential course of Color study has been added to the course in Form and Drawing. Color as well as form has its types. The children gain their first knowledge of color from the six colors of the spectrum. six primaries and their tints and shades, come the secondaries and tertiaries. The relationships and scales of hue and tone are taught as well as a feeling for these colors and the observation of their likenesses in nature; for color is as much a part of our world as form is, and it is just as necessary to train the eye to observe, appreciate and understand the world of color that environs us as the world of form. Both color and form sense, if rightly trained, give pleasure and refinement to the possessor and are of much practical use. In all trades those having skill and taste command the best wages; and in every day life, the home shows at once the influence of good taste in the selection of the most common articles of furniture. color is associated the decorative drawing. This work extends from the simple border of squares in one of the primary colors, to the carefully colored example of Historic Ornament or original design.

We are doing some work along the lines of manual training in "making" in paper, cloth, cardboard and light wood. Most of this must be done outside of school hours, as at present there is not time nor place for it. We hope for something better in

the future.

There has been a delightful spirit of enthusiasm on the part of both teachers and scholars. All have been interested and ready for work, and it has been a great pleasure to me to meet so much helpfulness everywhere. There is marked improvement since the beginning of the year in every school and I trust we shall move on in the work. As carried on, the great endeavor in this branch of the school system is to make it as practical as possible as a helper in school and every day life, yet not to lose sight of the ennobling qualities and the great influence that the beautiful in nature and art has over children. The teaching of drawing is not to make artists of the pupils; it is only a factor in general education. Along the line of aesthetic culture, just mentioned, references to beauty in nature are constantly made and as far as possible the children are shown good examples of art. This has led to a very slight

beginning in school room decoration in the shape of one or two prints which are loaned from room to room. We should be very glad of outside help in the shape of money or donations of photographs, casts, etc., so that every school room may be made lovely. At the present time photographic reproductions and plaster casts of the best that art has given us can be ob-

tained very cheaply.

I wish to thank the Superinterdent and Board of Education for their co-operation and for their generosity in the matter of supplies. Since September the city has been supplied with large sets of type models and also small individual sets, materials for color instruction, copies, colors, plaster casts and manuals for teachers. These have been things greatly needed, and both teachers and scholars have been delighted to use them. We can do well only by having things to do with, and the best economy is the economy of the teachers' time in the best use of good materials.

Review work of Grade 5. Respiration. Anatomy, physiology and hygiene. Respiration in aquatic animals. Dress. Ventilation. Disinfection. Nervous system. Stimulants and narcotics.

#### SEVENTH YEAR.

Review. Special study of the eye and the senses of hearing, smelling and tasting.

#### EIGHTH YEAR.

Review. The Skin. Bathing. Clothing. Bones and muscles. Exercise.

#### NINTH YEAR.

Review of the whole subject with text books. Emergencies.

# MUSIC.

[Prepared by George D Whittier.]

#### FIRST YEAR.

Study of scale as a whole, parts in relation to the whole, parts in relation to each other. Sounds from dictation, easy skips on modulator. Rote songs from First Reader.

# SECOND YEAR.

A daily drill on modulator in all keys. Singing exercises using vowels. Learn pictures of keys. Chart No. 1. Learn pitch names on staff. Rote songs reviewed often.

# THIRD YEAR.

Begin First Reader. Two part singing from scale ladder. All exercises to be vocalized with different vowels. Chromatic scale.

#### FOURTH YEAR.

Writing exercises in different keys from dictation. A thorough study of time. Two part singing from Second Reader.

#### FIFTH YEAR.

Second Reader, part first reviewed, used in connection with part second. Chart No. 2. Different forms of Minor scale to be sung from dictation. A thorough drill on Chromatic scale, using vowels. Study bass clef, last part of Second Reader and on Chart No. 2.

# SIXTH AND SEVENTH YEARS.

Second Chart with Second Reader, using bass clef. Singing from sight in three parts.

# EIGHTH AND NINTH YEARS.

Third Reader, part first. Review Chart No. 2. Sight reading. Third Reader, part second. Four part songs. A careful review is often given in this grade to establish the object of the Third Reader, viz: transition. The voices are selected for the tenor at this time. Complete Third Reader. Cecilian Series, III.

# Outline of Course in Form, Drawing and Color.

#### KINDERGARTEN.

Drawing from the Kindergarten "gifts," sewing, stick laying and drawing related to the plays and stories.

# FIRST YEAR.

Solids—Sphere, cube, cylinder, hemisphere, square and right angled triangular prisms. Studied by touch and sight as wholes, as to surfaces, faces, edges, corners. Expression by modeling, paper folding and cutting, tablet and stick laying and drawing. Color—six primary colors, recognition, matching, relationship. Expression by tablets, sticks and paper.

#### SECOND YEAR.

Solids—Ellipsoid, ovoid, equi-triangular prism, cone, square, pyramid and vase. Studied by touch and sight as wholes, as

to surfaces, faces, edges and corners. Expression: modeling, paper folding and cutting, tablet and stick laying, and drawing. Color as in first year; additional work in tints.

#### THIRD YEAR.

Book 1, Prang Course. Sphere, cube and hemisphere. Additional work in modeling, paper folding, cutting, making and drawing in connection with other work; also object drawing from fruit, leaves, boxes and simple objects. Color as in first year; additional work in tints, colored borders and rosettes.

#### FOURTH YEAR.

Book 3, Prang Course. Cylinder, square prism, and vase form. Additional work on paper from Book 2, work in connection with other studies, and object drawing from roots, fruits, leaves and common objects. Color—Six primary colors and two tints, scaling to hue and tone. Decorative work in four-lobed figures, simple Historic Ornament, simple horders and rosettes.

#### FIFTH YEAR.

Book 4. Ellipsoid, ovoid, equi-triangular prism. Additional work in connection with language, object drawing from fruits, twigs, leaves and seed vessels, also boxes, books and common objects in simple parallel perspective. Color, as in fourth year.

## SIXTH YEAR.

Book 6. Cube, cylinder, square and equi-triangular prisms, square pyramid and square plinth. Additional work on paper from Book 5, on cone; work in connection with language and nature; object drawing from natural flowers and common objects in perspective. Color—Six primaries, six intermediates, their tints, scaling to bue and tone, Historic Ornament, borders, rosettes and surface coverings.

# SEVENTH YEAR.

Book 7. Cube, cylinder, cone, square, pyramid, hexagonal prism, hollow cylinder and vase, in perspective and in light and shade. Additional work in connection with history, geography and nature; object drawing from fruits, flowers, sprays of leaves and grouped objects. Color as in sixth year with Egyptian Historic Ornament.

# EIGHTH AND NINTH YEARS.

Book 8. Frames, hollow cylinder, cubical steps, cube, in perspective and light and shade. Additional work in connection with language, history and nature; object drawing from sprays, flowers, jars, vases, baskets, books, etc. Color—Primaries and intermediates, their tints and shades, scaling to tone and hue. Greek Historic Ornament, designs for borders, rosettes and surface coverings.

#### HIGH SCHOOL.

Construction—Geometric problems, working drawing of simple objects. Decoration—Geometric surface designs, original designs for bent iron work, tiles and textiles, Greek and Egyptian Historic Ornament. Representation—Drawing from casts and still life, home and memory drawings.
