WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Rollinsford in the County of Strafford, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said town on Tuesday the twelfth day of March, 1929, at ten (10) o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To bring in your ballots for Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman, for a term of three years, one Road Agent, and Chief of Fire Department.

ART. 2. To choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for ensuing year.

ART. 4. To see what percentage, if any, the town will vote to discount all taxes paid on or before the first of August next.

ART. 5. To see if the town will vote to establish a Public Library and accept the provisions of Chapter 8, Sections 21-26 of the Public Statutes, and appropriate a sum of money for the same. ART. 6. To see if the town will vote to give a prescription permit to any druggist, who is a registered pharmacist doing business in town, to sell liquor for medicinal use, under Section 14, Chapter 147 of the Laws of the January session, 1917; approved April 17, 1917.

ART. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to eradicate White Pine Blister Rust.

ART. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to purchase a Ford $1\frac{1}{2}$ ton dump truck to be used by road commissioner of public highways and that the Selectmen will be authorized to borrow money for same.

ART. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) to resurface Dover street, from Railroad Crossing to the bridge, with tarvia. (By petition.)

ART. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) to build a sidewalk on Washington street, beginning at the Morton Estate and extending to St. Joseph's Convent. (By petition.)

ART. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350) to purchase hose for Chemical Hose Engine Co. No. 3 of said town. ART. 12. To see if the town will vote to maintain a District Nurse and to raise money for the same.

ART. 13. To transact any further business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER

To the people of the town of Rollinsford, N. H.:

I hereby respectfully submit the following report with suggestions and recommendations for 1928-1929.

Not until your house or my house—your loved ones or mine—are threatened do we fully value the quick response and ready protection of the fire department.

How many of us have ever bestowed ten, or even five consecutive minutes' thought on the life and calling of a fireman in the fire department of any city or town?

How many have looked on him in a light other than that which reveals him as the holder of a position for the pay that is in it, like other salaried men? Or, how many of us have thought of the volunteers who, when emergency calls, perform their duty so loyally without thought of the recompense?

Precious human lives and less precious property are ever the objects for which he risks limb and life. Day and night, in tempest or sunshine, in arctic cold or torrid heat, he is called upon to battle against the elemental force that is ever threatening to place death and destruction in our very midst. His courage, how often has it bridged the depths between life and death! And just to think of it! "He saved others; himself he cannot save." Protect, provide for, and assist your fire department.

In accordance with the vote taken at our last town meeting our fire truck was taken to the White Company's shop at Boston, Mass., and mechanically overhauled last April at an expense of \$271.55.

New $38 \ge 7$ tires and tubes on rear and new $36 \ge 6$ tires and tubes on front were mounted at an expense of \$268.72 in place of six year old tires and tubes badly deteriorated. Front wheels on truck had to be cut down from 27 to 24 inches at an expense of \$61.50, enabling us to mount standard tires $36 \ge 6$ on standard wheels of 24 inches, in place of former mongrel 27-inch wheels and defunct $37 \ge 5$ tires. The $37 \ge 5$ size tires and tubes for trucks, are no longer being moulded by tire manufacturers and could not be purchased on the market.

Tire and wheel manufacturers are standardizing tires and wheels thereby doing away with the mongrel sizes. The four wheels now on the truck are standard size and take standard size tires and tubes.

Our fire truck, mechanically, is in first-class condition. Our equipment, "such as suction hose, chemical hose, hand extinguishers, ladders, axes, etc., etc.," is in good serviceable condition. Our $2\frac{1}{2}$ -inch hydrant hose consisting of approximately 2,100 feet is gradually deteriorating and, some of this hose, I consider unreliable for service. Our hose is from six to twenty years of age and many feet of this hose would not stand up if put under our truck pump pressure. Our oldest hose, now in service on truck, was bought in 1909 and our newest hose in 1923.

There is not much to say about the fire season of 1928 excepting a brief reference to its comparatively favorable character. April and May are the bad months when most of our grass and brush fires occur and when most of the damage is caused.

As time goes on we must have in mind these two months in increasing measure. During the last four years 70 per cent. of the grass and brush fires in this state occurred at this time of the year, with April a bit worse than May.

During 1929, in particular, we are likely to encounter trouble from last year's unusually heavy vegetation and the many fields of uncut grass spread all over the state, careless smoking tourists, fishermen, berry and flower pickers will constitute a grave hazard and this particular menace may be difficult to manage. Let us all be sure to take extra precautions against this looming fire peril.

Persons kindling fires, without the required permit from Fire Warden, "on own or other property" do so in defiance of the law and can be held responsible for any damage resulting therefrom.

Acting on suggestion from the New Hampshire Board of Fire Underwriters, all of our $2\frac{1}{2}$ -inch hydrant hose couplings were rethreaded to conform to the National Standard thread, which calls for $7\frac{1}{2}$ threads to the inch. The hose of the Salmon Falls Mfg. Co., Somersworth Foundry Co., town of South Berwick, Maine, and all of the towns and cities throughout this state have had their fire hose rethreaded to standardize all coupling threads. This work was completed at a very small expense to the town and the benefit derived therefrom is everlasting in that it now makes it a sure thing "so far as hose coupling threads are concerned" for fire departments to assist one another in times of peril by fire.

I suggest and recommend:

Purchasing 500 feet of new $2\frac{1}{2}$ -inch hydrant hose "double jacket" this year. "See article in town warrant."

Buying six new hand chemical fire extinguishers to be distributed among our school buildings for use in emergency cases, same to be cared for by the fire department. Our school buildings, at present, have no emergency fire protection whatever. Fire drills in schools are a very good thing and should be encouraged, but all school buildings should have some means of instant protection in case of fire.

Procuring fire permit from Fire Warden "as required by law" before kindling a fire.

Property owners should, for their own protection, be sure that all chimneys are thoroughly cleaned at least once a year. Chimney fires, and many overheated funnels and chimneys are caused by dirty and sooty chimney flues. Help protect other property by protecting your own.

Adequate fire exits should be provided at once for the two upper classrooms in the Franklin school building. The second story of the Franklin school I consider a fire trap for children in case of fire. Fill the corridor "the only entrance and exit to the second story of this building" with smoke during school hours, and the teachers and children in the two upper classrooms are trapped for means of exit other than the second story windows. Loss of life by fire or distress from smoke could very easily result should fire start in the corridor or stairways. The steep, wooden, winding inflammable stairways are the worst kind of fire hazard. If no other suitable means of exit could be added to this building then I would recommend outside fire escapes leading from some suitable window to the ground, thereby giving the teachers and children a chance for their lives should the occasion demand.

Trusting that the above suggestions and recommendations will achieve favorable results for the benefit of our fire department and the town in general, and extending my sincere thanks, in behalf of this department, to all who, by their cooperation and cheerful assistance helped make 1928 a banner year for the town from loss by fire, I am

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

The School Board wishes to acquaint the taxpayers with the condition of school property in the village, together with that in the rural district.

During vacation, an examination was made of all school buildings. It was found that the timbers of the roof of the Franklin School were rotted and that the roof on the easterly side had settled about five inches.

Architect Richardson, after his inspection, reported the girts and struts badly rotted, and with the weight of the slate roof, together with the wind pressure, the building was unsafe. He advised the removal of the roof before jacking.

In making repairs, conditions were found worse than at first disclosed. The only supports remaining in the center of the building were two stringers, that were held by the partition. By careful work, these supports have been renewed without the removal of the roof, and will, no doubt, last a number of years.

We have corrected the sanitary condition at the Pear Yard School, by the erection of a new toilet, and also made many badly needed repairs. It should not be necessary to raise but a nominal amount to keep this building in fair shape from now on.

The condition of desks in the Franklin School are

such, that many pupils must of necessity, use a heavy paper cover in order to write over the rough surface. The carvings, left by students from the time of their installation to the present day, make repairs in most instances, out of the question. The construction of the desks is such that they cannot be planed. It will be necessary to renew the tops.

In regard to the Sullivan School, it is a question whether or not, it would be more economical to dispose of this building and to replace it by one not being used, rather than to attempt repair.

It is only too apparent that the present state of the buildings and equipment is due to a continued postponement from year to year of necessary funds to meet contingences.

As soon as the finances of the Town will warrant, it would be well to provide money to correct these faults, rather than allow this property to remain in its present state of decay.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS, ROLLINSFORD, N. H.

To the School Board and Citizens of the School District of Rollinsford:

I have the honor to present my first report as superintendent of your schools.

The statistics given will be for the school year ending June 30, 1928, and it should be remembered that my report covers only half a year.

When I began my service in September I found plans nearly completed for the present year and everything ready for the opening of schools. During the summer the School Board had the Pear Yard building remodeled, making of it a pleasant room with improved sanitary arrangements. The eighth grade pupils were transferred to the Franklin School or to Dover and this left a fine little school of the first six grades to be taught by a normal school graduate, Miss Madeline Gouin.

Even with the new heater and a continuous coal fire we find the Sullivan School hard to heat in severe cold weather. Next summer this building should be remodeled, given one-side lighting and new seats and desks. Both here and at Pear Yard approximately one-third of the pupils cannot touch their feet to the floor when seated properly. Here again we have a fine little school of the first four grades, taught by a normal school graduate, Miss Catherine Redden.

After schools opened an examination of the Franklin School showed that in spite of the work done on the roof a few years ago it was still in an unsafe condition. The architect employed advised something be done immediately and his advice was acted upon by the School Board with the result that the roof is now as safe as the remainder of the building.

The rooms at the Franklin School are full but not over crowded. However, if the Salmon Falls Manufacturing Company should reopen, a very few more pupils would cause an overflow.

Miss Angelina Raino was regretfully released but Miss Lucille Gormley, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School, with experience, is very successfully teaching grades five and six.

Very few changes have been made in the methods of teaching, in the organization of the work or in text books. Your former superintendent had the schools well equipped and organized. Without exception your teachers are normal school trained and trained for such positions as they occupy.

Largely through the efforts of Mrs. Nutter a music supervisor has been employed, and her services paid for by entertainments and contributions. This work ought to be financed by the school district and the School Board have asked you to so vote. I have asked your school nurse to make her own report, but I know that such a report will not tell all the story. To my mind the school nurse is as valuable to the school system as a teacher. Parents should, and do, welcome her to their homes. I wish that we could establish a "milk fund" from which we could furnish free milk to the undernourished. If the district will finance the music perhaps we can support a "milk fund" as we now do the music. It is almost trite to say that we must have sound bodies if we are to expect sound minds. We need social activities and they mean more when the proceeds go for a worthy object.

Unfortunately, Mr. Swain left the field for one with larger opportunities and the Y. M. C. A. of the County has not been able to replace him for lack of financial support. Because of this the work which Mr. Swain started in physical education has had to be carried on as best we could. The boys are playing basketball and I hope for outdoor games and sports in the spring.

Mr. Crockette, Principal of the Franklin School, is endeavoring to increase the pupils' love of literature by securing books from the State Traveling Library. We should like the pupils to get the library habit.

Largely because the school district generously pays for the transportation of its pupils to high school, eleven of the sixteen graduating from the grammar school last June are enrolled in secondary schools this year and all are making good. I find the schools well supported by the people of the district, and deservedly so. I wish to express my appreciation for the many courtesies received and for the loyal support of the School Board and Teachers. We are working together for good schools and ask your continued support.

I herewith submit my annual report of the health work in the public schools:

During the fall term all of the children were inspected by the nurse. The following defects were noted:

Notices of these conditions were sent to parents, referring them to their family physician, oculist, or dentist.

At the beginning of terms, after vacations, and especially when much sickness is known to exist in the town, classroom inspections are conducted to detect

and exclude children with signs of illness or infectious conditions. We have had no epidemics of communicable disease.

The above statistical report does not, however, give a complete picture. Each case presents its individual problems; and home visiting is giving the mother and the nurse an opportunity to learn the child's habits and work out the best plan for his welfare.

The problem of nutrition is greater than the figures make it appear. Fifty school children are ten per cent. or more underweight for their age, sex, and height, but the real criterion does not concern pounds —rather the kind of tissue the child is building. Many children who tire easily, act "pepless," and have poor teeth, are really undernourished although their weights compare not unfavorably with some set standard. A child should have one quart of milk each day.

Our greatest gain in school health work will come when the children desire and practice good health rules. As this objective is realized through the efforts of the teachers I wish to thank them for their cooperation and help.
