## WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

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THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

L. S.)

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton in the County of Belknap, qualified to vote in town affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 13th day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk and Town Treasurer for a term of one year, one Selectman for a term of three years, one Road Agent for the ensuing year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of two years, two Auditors for the year ensuing, one member of the Park Commission for one year, and one member of the Park Commission for a term of two years.
2. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Memorial Day expense.
3. To see how much money the Town will raise to help The Marine Memorial to be constructed at Hampton Beach.
4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.
5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Hospitals for the ensuing year.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$89.85 to obtain Town Road Aid from the State, the State to contribute the sum of \$598.98.

7. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of Municipal Accounting and make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$373.18 which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for Civilian Defense purposes.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, in conjunction with Northfield, a sum of money necessary to purchase a new car for the District Nurse. The District Nurse Association has part of the amount set aside for this.

11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 to the Winnisquam Fire Department for the purpose of maintenance and operation of the Department.

12. To see what action the Town will take in regard to spraying trees, and raise money for the same.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to go toward the support of the Laconia Airport. Request by Mayor of Laconia.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for new equipment.

15. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on early paid taxes.

16. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Select-

men as agents of the Town to administer or dispose of any property acquired by Tax Deed.

17. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for all purposes for the year ensuing.

18. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the reports of its officers and agents.

19. To choose any other officers or agents for the ensuing year.

20. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

THE POLLS SHALL BE CLOSED NOT EARLIER THAN 6 O'CLOCK IN THE EVENING. THE BUSINESS MEETING WILL BE HELD AT 8 O'CLOCK IN THE EVENING.

## BE A GOOD CITIZEN — COOPERATE

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Smoking and debris burning caused more than 50 percent of the forest fires occurring in the state of New Hampshire in 1955 — 235 fires out of a total of 463 originated from these two sources. Lighted smoking material and matches thrown from moving vehicles along the highway or dropped by fishermen, hunters, hikers, berry and flower pickers accounted for 26 percent; debris burning in the wrong place or at the wrong time by those who failed to heed all pleas for safety or refused to recognize the logical, sensible rules and regulations set up under legislative authority governing the use of fire in or near woodlands accounted for more than 24 percent. This is inexcusable.

Everything possible is being done officially to remedy the situation. Since 1909 there has been a statute on our law books which requires everyone to secure written permission from the local forest fire warden before starting a fire in or near woodlands or where fire can be communicated to woodlands, unless the ground is covered with snow. A never ending program of educational work is being carried on by your local warden and state officials to inform the general public both of the value and necessity of securing the required permit for such burning. Much progress has been made, but there are still many who fail or refuse to cooperate. The value of our permit system was definitely proven in this district during the 1955 calendar year. Local wardens issued 3,864 permits for debris burning fires. That's a lot of permits. The records show only 2 permit fires got out of control. This proves several things — while wardens were liberal in the issuance of fire permits, accommodating every applicant so far as possible, they were cautious, following closely directives outlining overall policy governing the issuance of burning permits and thoroughly instructing permit users. The

latter, too, fully appreciating their responsibility in using their permits, governed themselves accordingly. Result? Much burning done legally and safe.

But what of the smokers? Despite all the efforts of those officially charged with the responsibility of preventing fires, too many were careless or thoughtless in disposing of smoking material and matches. Why? It is difficult to say. Autos are now equipped with ash trays. Why not use them. The crushing out of a cigar, cigarette and the complete extinguishment of matches before being discarded is an easy chore.

If the costly habits of the careless and indifferent smoker and debris burner could be overcome, more than half of our annual forest fires would be eliminated. Will YOU do YOUR share to bring this about?

### REMEMBER

1. Get a written permit from your local warden before starting your debris burning or camp fire. The law requires it.
2. Make certain they are dead out before leaving them.
3. Become a safe smoker by extinguishing smoking material and matches before discarding them.

There were 117 new and 220 repeat cases that were admitted to the nursing service and 59 new and 113 repeat cases under health service.

Twenty-five trips were made transporting patients to clinics, hospitals, and specialists.

Toxoid Clinics in cooperation with the State Board of Health were held in March, April, May, and June. Dr. Archie Grevior and Dr. Frank Robinson alternated as attending physicians at these clinics with Joanna Carter, R. N., State Preschool Nurse assisting. A total of 101 received the triple Toxoid for Diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus, which is given in graduated doses at least 4 weeks between treatments. There were 20 who completed the series. Twenty-six others received Booster hypos. The booster hypo is given as an added protection two years after the first toxoid treatments.

There were no clinics as were previously in the fall. Due to the number of polio cases in the state, it was considered inadvisable.

Mrs. Lurline McCook, R.N., substituted for the District Nurse while she had her vacation.

The school nurse, Miss Harriet Stone, and the District Nurse bought, wrapped, and distributed toys in the two towns at Christmas. These were given through the kindness of the Rotary Club, Business and Professional Womans Club, Teachers of both schools and individuals. The Catholic Daughters again this year gave generous baskets of fruit, cookies, and candy to children.

Many dinners again this year were given by the American Legion, the Elks, Odd Fellows, and Salvation Army.

Once again I wish to acknowledge my sincere thanks and appreciation to the doctors, selectmen, District Nursing Board and townspeople for their friendly attitude, support and cooperation.

*To the Inhabitants of Tilton and Northfield:*

We welcome this opportunity to report to you on the operation of the Tilton-Northfield Fire District for the past year. This report gives you a detailed statement of the Expenditures in all departments as shown by the records.

The past year has been one of outstanding significance with respect to the very small number of fires within the Precinct. This excellent record we attribute to the fine co-operation of you citizens in abiding by the instructions given you by the members of the Fire Department during their yearly inspection. This goes to prove that if we all work diligently, and with good will toward the elimination of fire hazards, it all helps to make a safer community in which to live, and also in due time, will greatly assist in reducing insurance rates.

Outside the Precinct we had two hazardous fire losses. One at the home of Guy Huckins in Northfield. It was through the outstanding work by the members of the Fire Department that the main house was saved. Once again it was proved that we have a Department capable of meeting any emergency, even with a water shortage. The second was at the home of Arthur Brown, also located in Northfield, and known as the Rand farm. When the Department arrived on the scene, the buildings were beyond any chance to save. The Brown family were not at home at the time, and lost all their worldly possessions, also some farm animals, and in addition a set of farm buildings. Once again, another old land mark has been erased from the list of old Homesteads, never to be rebuilt.

The members of the Fire Department are to be congratulated on a most efficient job completed in their annual inspection throughout the Precinct. The num-



ber of criticisms reported were few compared to the number of properties inspected, and in most casts were corrected at the time of inspection.

They also deserve a great deal of credit for their fine co-operation during the summer months in being present at the weekly fire drills. This meant giving of their time each Monday evening in order to be present. Their efforts, in this respect, has greatly assisted in bringing the members of each department up to date on the various duties necessary to promote the effectiveness of a well organized unit — “Out hats off to all you members.”

Our thanks go to the Tilton-Northfield Aqueduct Co. for the fine job done in painting the Hydrants. The color scheme is good and makes the Hydrants stand out noticeably throughout the Precinct.

The Public Service Co. removed 3 - 1000 lumen and 2 - 2500 lumen lights on West Main St. These were replaced with 5 - 11,000 lumen lights. The change has received very favorable comments, not only from the residents in the immediate area, but from outsiders coming into Town.

It is the desire of your Firewards to increase the lighting in other sections of the Precinct, that greatly require immediate attention, for the protection of the general public. The benefit derived from good street lighting is most beneficial in comparison to the small additional cost involved.

As we close the records of the past year, and begin the operations of a new year, we are greatly indebted to the members of the fire department for their loyalty and co-operation during 1955.

And to you citizens we appreciate your response and prompt approval in providing the necessary financial assistance to maintain an efficient Fire Department.

We firewards pledge ourselves to give careful attention to the function of your fire department, always conscious of the duties entrusted to us, for the best protection of your properties.

## REPORT OF THE TILTON-NORTHFIELD SCHOOL BOARD

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The 1956-1957 proposed budget has been in process of preparation for considerable time because we wished to provide all the necessities for maintaining our high standards in both elementary and high schools without too much of a financial burden to the taxpayers in one year.

Our proposed budget shows an approximate increase of \$13,000. The greatest increase is in teachers' salaries with \$11,000.00 in excess of last year. This represents an additional teacher for the elementary grades so that classrooms will not be overcrowded, salary increases for all teachers, and Tilton's share of the supervisory union for a helping teacher, and an additional nurse.

The budget also includes a new roof for the Union Grammar School. The roof has been repaired again and again for several years. One classroom has leaks in several places in the ceiling with every rain. Three classrooms, the auditorium and the upper corridor need ceiling replacements because of the leaks over the years. Several rooms have special ceiling supports to keep the plaster from falling.

We are also proposing a special article in the warrant to renovate the Union Grammar School to gain three classrooms and eliminate the old open toilet rooms in the basement and place modern rest rooms on the first and second floors. This is the most economical arrangement to gain space which will be needed in the next few years. The Union School alterations and the Tilton-Northfield High School will be completely paid for in 1958.

There has been a great deal of newspaper publicity to the recent statements of Lewis L. Strauss, Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission that "the nation's high schools are not giving enough emphasis to physics, chemistry, geometry, or the physical sciences and less than half the nation's high schools now teach physics or chemistry."

We are pleased to report that Tilton-Northfield High school has a program that covers four years of science, — general science, biology, physics, and chemistry; four years of mathematics, — elementary algebra, plane geometry, algebra 2, and advanced mathematics; three years of history, — civics, world history, and American history; two years of Latin and two years of French with a third year of each if pupils enroll; in addition to four year courses in agriculture, shop, home economics, and commerce.

We wish to thank the Parent-Teacher Association for its cooperation with the School Board, teachers and staff. The Scholarship Fund and the work of the Room Mothers are of great assistance to the school.

We thank the Golden Rule Farm for its contribution of equalization tuition for out of state pupils. The balance of the available fund was used towards the purchase of bleachers.

We wish to thank the Rotary Club, the American Legion, the Chamber of Commerce, the Golden Rule Farm, the Peabody Chapter, Order of Eastern Star and the large number of individuals who have made contributions that have resulted in a completion of the surface and seeding of the athletic field in back of the High School.

We wish to thank the Journal-Transcript, and all other organizations and individuals who have contribu-



ted in many ways during the past school year for scholarship funds, donations, gifts, and prizes for children of the Tilton-Northfield schools.

We appreciate the many suggestions we have received from parents and citizens for the improvement of our schools. We are the ones chosen to represent you in our mutual purpose of the best schools for our children. We appreciate the support we have received from the voters and taxpayers.

We suggest that you read the report of the Superintendent of Schools for the information presented for your schools.

May we thank everyone who has contributed in any way to better schools by suggestions, assistance and encouragement.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the Members of the School Board:

### Classroom Space

The Tilton-Northfield Schools will face the need of additional classroom space during the next five years. The addition of the new elementary school actually gained only two rooms for additional pupils, since six of the new rooms were taken by two grades housed on the top floor auditorium, two grades from the corridors, and two sixth grades housed in the white barn and the high school.

The private schools in Franklin and Laconia have reduced the number of pupils from Tilton because of overcrowding of their own schools.

The school census clearly shows that there will be 68 more pupils in school in September, 1956 than in September, 1955.

The school census also shows that there will be approximately 209 more pupils in our schools in September, 1960 than in September, 1955.

The Union Grammar School could be renovated to take the open toilets from the basements and move them to the first and second floors, and gain three classrooms in the present basement. This is the most economical proposition for the taxpayers, as it is less expensive than an addition to the new building and will have the double value of additional classrooms and better health facilities. It will also save the educational time lost of pupils having to leave the first and second floors for the basements on the basement floor.

The elementary schools will have to maintain one grade in September, 1956 in the top floor auditorium and one grade in September 1957 in the corridor or the white barn, — if additional space is not provided in regular classrooms.

### Teaching Staff

The 1956-57 budget calls for one additional teacher for the Union School so that grades may be maintained at a reasonable level for the best work of the teachers.

### School Supplies

Tilton-Northfield continued to gain the advantage of low costs by bidding its general school supplies with the other four towns of Supervisory Union No. 59. Bids were also secured for school shop supplies, oil, painting, and all items where it was possible to secure bids.

### Finances

The school district ended the 1954-1955 school year with all bills paid and some fuel supplies on hand.

## Testing Program

The Union School held its annual testing program with the grades above the national average and very notable improvement in reading results. The high school has continued its program of mid-year and final examinations to give the pupils experience for college, civil service and armed forces examinations.

## Special Achievements by the Tilton-Northfield School Board

The following represent special actions by the Tilton-Northfield School Board that show real achievements in education:

1. The securing of excellent experienced and outstanding beginners for all teaching vacancies.
2. An extension course entitled Audio-Visual Aids, from the University of New Hampshire, for teachers.
3. A new salary schedule for teachers.
4. Social security benefits for custodians.
5. Supported foster-homes bill for tuition for children from other communities being educated in Tilton-Northfield.
6. Accepted new school officially from contractor on March 4, 1955.
7. Provided Saturday recreation program for grade and high school pupils from 8:30 to 12:30 noon.
8. Maintained regular seven-weeks summer recreation program for pupils and summer visistors.
9. Voted balance of \$110 of Building Fund for furniture for teachers' room in new building.
10. Sponsored pre-school registration for first-graders.
11. A landscape plan for new school.
12. Painting of ceiling of high school gymnasium and ceilings of all high school corridors.

13. Sponsored Auto-Driving Course that resulted in 25 pupils passing state road-driving tests.
14. Hot-top application over gravel at new school front.
15. Sponsored band program with paid instructor.
16. Competitive bids on school supplies and equipment.
17. Purchased two gas stoves for home economics course.
18. Installed oil burner at Union Grammar School.

lic Relations. She will have charge of the teaching program in all schools. She will work on special teaching aids for teachers, visual aid programs, and professional teachers meetings. The State of New Hampshire pays \$2500 annually towards the salary of the Helping Teacher.

### **New Foster Homes Bill**

The 1955 Legislature passed a new law which means that Tilton-Northfield will collect the state average costs for pupils living in foster homes and attending the local schools. The towns from which these pupils came will be responsible for tuition if they are New Hampshire residents. Out-of-state residents will have their tuition paid by the foster homes of their guardians.

### **Building Aid Law**

A new law of the 1955 Legislature provides that Tilton-Northfield will receive approximately 30 per cent for all principal payments on bonds outstanding for renovations or additions that increase classroom space.

The School Board has held regular monthly meetings and many special meetings throughout the year on problems of finance, budgets, transportation, school bids, repairs and renovations, and school policies.

I wish to express my appreciation to the school board, principals, teachers, office workers, custodians, bus operators, cafeteria workers, and Parent-Teachers Association for their excellent cooperation during the past year. The citizens, parents and taxpayers have supported education with the finances to maintain and retain good schools for the children of the two communities.
