We had another productive year in the Town Clerk's office. In addition to the various duties required of the clerk's office, we also processed an estimated 5,500 automobile registrations, licensed 975 dogs and gave out 25 marriage certificates.

As of January 1st we have been dealing with a new law that is for vehicles 1988 and older. This law states that you need a bill of sale plus the seller's previous registration or out of state title. If you do not have the registration or title you need to obtain a 19A (aka blue form). This law change has been quite an adjustment to the residents and the Town Clerk's office. We thank you for your patience and understanding while everyone adjusts to the change.

The conservation moose plate has been a great success this year. The State has sold over 24,000, contributing almost \$800,000 to help preserve our state's natural and cultural heritage. If you go to the NH Fish & Game site at www.wildlife.state.nh.us you will see exactly what projects the funds are supporting.

The State finally came out with the Veteran's plate in November. You can obtain this plate during your month of renewal. You will need to come to the town hall first and pay town fees then you need to go to the DMV office with your honorable discharge papers and registration. The fee is a one-time fee of \$25.00 plus \$5.00 plate fee. Please feel free to call the office with any questions regarding this new plate.

The new transfer station permits are in as of January and will expire January 31, 2004. The fee is still \$2.00 per vehicle and everyone will need to bring in the registration for each vehicle. If you rent or lease you will need proof of residency. If you are a property owner we have your listing, so you do not need any proof of ownership.

Keep in mind that dogs are due to be licensed by April 30th. A rabies clinic will be held again this year in April - check the Granite State News for dates and times.

This year was very exciting for me and I hope the Town as well. Every year the New Hampshire City and Town Clerks' Association holds a convention. At the convention we have speakers and classes from all the State agencies that the clerks office deals with on a day to day basis. We also nominate and elect officers to the executive board for the up coming year. This year I was honored to be nominated and elected into the office of 2nd Vice President of the Association. This position is great recognition for the Town and will help the office be informed earlier of any changes or updates from all departments at the state level.

We hope that everyone has a healthy and happy year. We look forward to serving you during this year.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT FOR 2001

We moved into 2001 having completed two of Wakefield's largest building projects: the Public Safety Building and the Town Hall & Gafney Library connector. The public safety building is now in full operation. The first floor is comprised of the Police, Fire, and Ambulance Departments. The second floor remains unfinished. To meet the increased demand for services, future expansion plans are being drafted and a capital reserve fund has been established to fund future construction.

The connector is functioning well and provides access to all floors of the Town Hall and Gafney Library. Construction of the connector has renewed interest in the Town Hall Opera House. The Town held the last two deliberative sessions in the Opera House, along with many other local functions and activities. Recently, an advisory committee was created in order to provide the town with suggestions for Opera House improvements and restoration ideas.

The Board of Selectmen hopes to begin closure of the landfill in 2002. The closure plans were submitted to the state for approval, and the Board continues to work with engineers to develop final closure plans. When the closure is complete, the Town is entitled to a 20% reimbursement from the State of New Hampshire. The landfill will continue to require maintenance and monitoring for at least the next 30 years.

The transfer station has now been in operation for a full year and the Board continues to look for ways to improve the operation and hold down costs. The Town will enter into a three-year agreement with Atlantic North to continue the hauling of municipal solid waste. Consideration is being given to installation of another compactor to help handle volume during peek periods, and more importantly, to provide a back-up system. If the current compactor breaks down, or requires servicing, there is currently no way to manage waste. The Town sponsored a household hazardous collection waste day organized by Transfer Station Manager, John Palaima, with assistance from his staff and state personnel. The collection day was a tremendous success, and the state is using it as a model for other local collection sites. When the landfill closure is complete, the Board can move forward with additional improvements to the transfer station.

Wakefield is in its fourth year of a town wide property revaluation process. The update will occur in 2003. The State of New Hampshire is now requiring all towns to complete an assessing certification, primarily due to the statewide property tax used to fund adequate education grants. The Board of Selectmen is considering its options with regard to meeting state standards, controlling the quality of assessing, and controlling future costs. Currently, the Town contracts its assessing services. At the recommendation of the Board of Assessors, the Board is considering exploring the advantages and cost of hiring a town assessor.

There are many challenges facing the citizens of Wakefield. These challenges could potentially affect the quality of life we presently enjoy. Please be aware that there are many committees, commissions and groups of dedicated volunteers working to protect and enhance the quality of life for all of Wakefield's citizens and visitors. Some of these organizations include conservation, youth, historic preservation, arts, economic development, lake associations, volunteer fire and ambulance, Chamber of Commerce, planning and zoning, and school organizations.

There are many more, but are too numerous to mention. Please give them your support and, if you have time, pitch in and help the community by serving in one of these groups. Citizen involvement will be the key to facing the challenges ahead.

Please join the Board of Selectmen in thanking these people for the valuable services they provide to us all. The Selectmen thank all of the town employees for their dedication and a job well done. THANK YOU!

he goal for 2001 licensed dogs was 1000. We met the challenge with 975 licensed dogs for Wakefield in the year. Remember, having your dog license on your pet has increased getting your lost dog home safely. Also, the licensed dog is a dog that is up to date with vaccinations, especially for rabies.

We still have an on-going problem with unkind people that drop their animals off on the roadside. We would like to thank the townspeople for their help in trying to save these neglected pets. Many times, with the animal's history unknown, it is hard for the animal to make an adjustment no matter how hard we try. The practice of dropping animals off is illegal. If noticed, please try to obtain the car's license plate and **report** immediately.

The yearly rabies clinic was successful with Dr. Flood and the help of the Wakefield Poilce Department. Everyone did a fine job again. Look for announced dates in local papers, on posters around town, and on the Community Cable Channel for the 2002 clinic.

Many calls were received this year about dead birds, due to the 'West Nile Virus'. No case of the virus was found in this area.

ASSESSORS ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2001

ANDER

The Board of Assessors worked on several key issues this past year. Among them was a continuation of town-wide revaluation of property. Other routine duties included approval of sand/gravel removal permits, logging intent to cut permits, veteran tax exemptions, elderly tax exemptions, tax abatements, and cooperating with State of New Hampshire officials monitoring our revaluation processes.

The Board attended a State of New Hampshire Review of New Legislation pertaining to the process of property appraisal and revaluation. The Department of Revenue Administration per RSA 21-J is currently working through committee to set guidelines, provide supervision, and monitor Town Assessors and appraisers for revaluation of all properties at 'ad valorem' values (100%) throughout the State. Their overall goal is to provide equalization and standard appraisal procedures across all cities and towns throughout New Hampshire. Our goal is to be prepared to pass State of New Hampshire Certification sometime in year 2003. It appears that due to Wakefield's prior commitments to improve and update our tax maps on a continuing basis and annual revaluation of one fourth of the Town each year that Wakefield will be quite ready for certification. We the Board of Assessors believe that we ought to continue our current process of revaluating a quarter of the Town each year. RSA 75:8-A (effective September 8, 2001) reads: At least as often as every fifth year, beginning with the first year the Commissioner of the Department of Revenue Administration certifies a municipality's assessments pursuant to RSA 21-J:3,XXVII...the assessors or selectmen shall value all real estate within the municipality so that all assessments are valued in accordance with RSA 75:1. Your Board of Assessors believes that we ought to cooperate fully with the Department of Revenue in carrying out their mandate.

Town-wide assessment of property revaluation continues. During year 2001, Maps 42 and 44 through 70 were inspected. If the landowner was not home a call back card will be mailed in the spring of 2002 in order to schedule an appointment to meet with our appraiser for viewing of the interior of the home or business. Maps 71 through 91 will be revalued during 2002. No changes in assessed valuation will take place until year 2003 (except for physical changes: new additions, etc.) when all property card adjustments will be updated proportionally to reflect changes, if any. The multi-year valuation process saves tax dollars. Costs are significantly less if spread over several years rather than trying to do all the work in single year. Results will be the same. This year, 2002, is the last year for data collection. During 2003 all property valuations will be adjusted proportionally and equalized.

If you have questions about revaluations please call the assessor's office at the Town Hall. The Board of Assessors generally meets every other Thursday at 9:15 a.m. at the Town Hall meeting room. Please call for an appointment. All citizens are welcome to attend.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

As the accounts of the Town of Wakefield for the year 2001 have not yet been examined by the Town's auditors, no report is available.

The Auditor's Report will be available for public inspection at the Selectmen's office upon completion, which is expected to be no later than May 1, 2002.

CABLE ADVISORY BOARD

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The Cable Advisory Board held one meeting during the year on June 12, 2001 at the Town Hall. We invited Area Manager Keith Froleiks and Rodney King, Area Technical Manager of Adelphia Cable. They gave us an update of the progress being made on the new fiber cable system. Their target date is for October for cable TV and January for their Power Link.

If customers wish to up-grade to pay-per-view at this time, there will be no charge.

The cost for Power Link is estimated at \$41.95. However, customers will need to check with Adelphia. Adelphia will install Power Link into the Paul School and the Gafney Library at no charge. The Town Hall will be able to have one installed for a residential rate.

The Transmission House located at the intersection of Routes 153 and 109 is complete.

CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER'S REPORT

ANDER

The year 2001 was one of transition for the Code Enforcement Office. Maurice (Bud) O'Donnell retired in the fall after 10 years of service to the Town. The Town appreciates Bud's service to the community, his dedication and commitment. We wish him well in his retirement.

The Board of Selectmen appointed the deputy-building inspector as the new Code Enforcement Officer. The appointment brought several new changes to the office. Office hours increased from 1 to 3 days per week, with inspections done 5 days per week. The town is now enforcing provisions of its town's building code, which requires foundation, chimney, plumbing, and mechanical inspections.

In the spring, in cooperation with the Planning Board, the Town updated the building code to the 2000 International Building Code. Adoption of the revised code was important for ISO Certification. Certification is important as it helps homeowners maintain reasonable insurance rates.

The Town now has a GIS system up and running in the Code Enforcement Office, allowing all Town departments and members of the public to access maps and other data.

The Town showed a 30% increase in new homes permitted over those permitted in 2000. A total of 583 site and 129 field inspections were conducted during the year. In order to maintain certifications through BOCA, I earned 187 hours of continuing education hours in the fields of building standards, legal issues, and the GIS system.

It is recommended that you contact this office in the early planning stage of your project to determine what kind of permits may be required. Please note that some permits may take several months to obtain.

WAKEFIELD CONSERVATION COMMISSION

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Pursuant to RSA 36-A:2, the Wakefield Conservation Commission has spent much of its time this year working on a Natural Resource Inventory (NRI), anticipating completion in 2002. As part of its NRI work, the five critical maps delineating water resources, protected lands, conservation land, unfragmented lands and co-occurrence (two or more of the above) were framed and hung in the meeting room of our Town Hall. Additionally, the Commission has been working with a wetlands specialist, funded by grant funds awarded to Moose Mountains Regional Greenways (MMRG), in the delineation and mapping of wetlands in Wakefield. As part of the support available to the Commission from Strafford Regional Planning, we have obtained updated GIS maps that will be utilized in the NRI. The several town surveys (Route 16 corridor study, Master Plan Survey and MMRG's Natural Resource Opinion Survey) that have been generated over the past four years have been studied, and the results there from will be incorporated in the NRI.

The Commission, in response to the Master Plan Survey results, has supported the Scenic Road petitions that will protect stonewalls and trees from unwarranted destruction. The Commission urged the Selectmen to present the warrant article requesting funds to go into a Capital Reserve Fund to protect aquifers through outright land purchase or conservation easements. These funds could be utilized as a match to any state, federal or private funding for such aquifer protection.

Due to the danger of invasive species infesting our streams and lakes, the Commission, with the assistance of Amy Smagula from the DES, has undertaken a comprehensive study of this problem. As a result of this study and an economic analysis of net revenue derived from water front properties the Commission will be making recommendations to the Selectmen regarding appropriate measures to be taken to control the introduction and spread of invasive species.

As in past years, the Commission sponsored four students from the Paul School attending a summer week-long conservation camp. Last year the Commission promoted composting by offering compost bins at a modest cost. This program will be offered again this year.

Commission members have attended a variety of workshops and have worked closely with the various Lake Association groups. In keeping with its ongoing effort to facilitate appropriate and legal shoreline activities, the Commission has instituted onsite reviews of all applications.

Our meetings are held on the first and third Wednesday of each month at 9 a.m. in the Conference Room of the Town Hall. Our agenda is posted prior to the meetings and interested public are most welcome to attend.

WAKEFIELD FIRE/AMBULANCE DEPARTMENT

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In the year 2001, the Department has gained two much needed pieces of apparatus.

The first truck is a 4-wheel drive Pumper/Tanker combination that replaces the 1952 Army 6-wheel drive Tanker. It has state of the art pump and roll capabilities which enable us to access brush fires easier and to put foam and water on the fire faster than with the old truck. It also has a nozzle on the front bumper that can be operated from inside the cab.

The second new truck is a Rescue/Utility combination which more than doubles the room that was available to us in the old utility truck. The new truck is also equipped with a filling station for the Self Contained Air Breathing Packs we need to wear to go into any hazardous environment, which includes all types of fires. New rescue tools were ordered with the truck to update our cutting capability at motor vehicle accidents.

At the end of our first year in the new station, we again want to thank the people of Wakefield for your continuing support. It has been very gratifying to have such a nice building to work in. The added space for our apparatus and equipment has made for safer and more comfortable working conditions for our Fire and Ambulance crews.

During 2001, the Fire Department and Fire Department Ambulance have again seen increases in the demand for our services. The Ambulance has responded to a total of 398 calls, more than 1 a day, and has logged 11,276.5 miles—that is almost 3,000 miles more than last year.

Neighboring communities requested Mutual Aid from Wakefield Ambulance on 22 calls. Wakefield requested Mutual Aid from our neighboring communities on 54 calls. Some of the requests for assistance to Wakefield were when the ambulance was already out on another call, some were for multiple patient motor vehicle accidents, some for Paramedic level assistance and some for a transport ambulance when there were not enough EMS volunteers available to make up a full crew. Fire Emergencies totaled 236 in 2001 an increase of 17%. The month with the greatest number of calls was July with 32; the month with the fewest number of calls was November with 12. The average number of emergency calls each month was just below 20. Wakefield Fire requested Mutual Aid assistance on 34 calls, mainly for structure fires or motor vehicle accidents. Mutual Aid assistance was requested from Wakefield on 38 calls. Again this year, we have seen an increase in motor vehicle accidents for the Fire Department, from 65 in 2000 to 78 in 2001.

The Fire roster for 2001 consisted of 33 members. 10 are Career Level Certified, 6 are Firefighter Level 1 Certified, 1 is Firefighter Level 2 Certified, and 23 are Certified in Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus use. Almost all of both Firefighter and EMS personnel are Certified in Motor Vehicle Extrication/Rescue and the majority of both have Hazardous Materials and Incident Command System training. The EMS roster consisted of 6 Emergency Medical Technician-Intermediates, 2 EMT Basics and 4 medically trained First Responders.

The Department was fortunate in being able to take part in a promotional program with the Kawasaki Company this year. This entitled us to have the loan of a Jet Ski Water Craft and trailer for water rescue capability through the summer and fall at no cost to the Town. This will be an ongoing program between The Wakefield Fire Department, Kawasaki and Rochester Motor Sports each year and will be a valuable asset to our community.

The Wakefield Fire and Ambulance Department is continually upgrading our capabilities and are asking for your help again this year with the replacement of the Forestry Truck in East Wakefield. This truck is a 1954 vehicle and can no longer pass inspection, it is not roadworthy. We will be replacing it with a 2002 F-550 Ford with a utility body and a 250 gallon skid unit.

Unfortunately, this year was another tragic year on our section of the Highway. I would like to thank the Townspeople, the Selectmen and the Town Administrator for their support throughout these very difficult times.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Gordon Hollis and the Sanbornville Firemen's Association for their continued support and fund raising efforts on behalf of the Fire Department. They are currently sponsoring a drive to raise funds for the purchase of a Thermal Imaging Camera. This camera would be used for search and rescue in a smoke filled building and to assist in the determination of possible extension of fire into the ceiling or wall partitions.

We are always looking for energetic, hardworking individuals who are interested in serving our community by helping out on the Fire Department and/or the Ambulance. We will provide the training. If you are interested or have any questions, please contact any Fire/ Ambulance member.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

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Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands cooperate and coordinate to reduce the risk of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing <u>ALL</u> outside burning. Fire permits are mandatory for any open burning unless the ground where the burning is to be done (and surrounding areas) is completely covered with snow. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs. Open burning is a privilege, **NOT** a right. Help us to protect you and our forest resource! Build small brush piles that can be quickly burned and extinguished.

New Hampshire experienced over 940 wildland fires in 2001. Most of the fires were human caused. Due to dry conditions fires spread quickly impacting more than 20 structures. Homeowners can help protect their homes by maintaining adequate green space around the house and make sure that the house number is correct and visible. **Only You Can Prevent Wildland Fires.** Contact your local Fire Department or the New Hampshire Division of forests and Lands website at <u>www.nhdfl.com</u> or call 271-2217 for wildland fire safety information.

WAKEFIELD HERITAGE COMMISSION

On June 1, 2001, at the Annual Meeting of the New Hampshire Preservation Alliance held in Peterborough, the Wakefield Heritage Commission was honored for its efforts in the rehabilitation and restoration of the J. W. Garvin Building. This was a statewide celebration and the first all state recognition that our Commission had received for saving and restoring this treasure of our Town. It was indeed a very special time for us and Wakefield generally and much appreciated.

Currently the entire first floor has been completely done over and is occupied. The "Choo Choo" Restaurant, "The Strafford Learning Center" and "The White Mountain Gifts" are all active there serving the needs of the public. The Heritage Centre of course remains in its previous location and is open to all. In September Lino Aveliani and Cheryl Johnson became the owners of the "Choo Choo" taking over from Ann Glidden and Barbara Menogue. In December Frances Rhines opened "White Mountain Gifts" in Unit #5 where the Youth Center had previously been before moving to the Methodist Church.

As a part of our state mandated responsibilities, the Commission has held numerous discussions with property owners in the Historic District offering input and suggestions as requested.

We have held one public hearing on a proposed structural change in the Historic District.

The Commission worked with the Selectmen as new lights were selected for the Opera House and are now cooperating with the Wakefield Arts Council as they develop plans to restore and enhance this historic area on the top floor of the Town Hall.

Through the efforts of the Summer Youth Program the Town Pound was cleaned out and bushes, leaves and brush removed. The same group of young people also gave the ramp into the Heritage Centre a much needed coat of paint during the summer. We are indeed grateful for their help.

We also want to mention Mr. Gerald Levesque of Forest Pump who each year in the fall removes the Historic Town Pump in the Historic Area, repairs it if necessary and places it back in the spring to its proper place. We are most grateful to Mr. Levesque for this annual care. It works all summer, too. Our visitors enjoy this reminder of former days in Wakefield.

The Spinney Meting House received some more of our attention too this past year as we had the property surveyed and the surrounding bushes and trees cut. We previously had the inner roof structure supports renewed thus stabilizing the entire building. Our plan is to do much more work on this town treasure in the year ahead. Cold weather and winter generally halted our plans for a new roof this past year.

The old Train Flag Station was located and offered to the Commission with the suggestion of moving it and restoring it in Turntable Park as an additional reminder of Wakefield's past; but upon further investigation we found to our disappointment it was just too far gone. Had we decided to take on the project, it would have meant practically rebuilding the entire structure.

We continue to seek money in assorted ways and our fundraisers are always on going. For Pride Day this year we had handmade silk-screened pillows of the "Little Man" warming his toes on the potbelly stove as he rocks away and reads his newspaper on the J. W. Garvin Building. Theses paintings originally done by Frank Plummer in 1950 have served as a famil-iar landmark for so many all these years. As one gentleman expressed it a while ago, "When I saw that little man as I looked out of the back seat of our family car, I knew we'd be at camp in another few minutes back in the 50's. It was a long ride every Friday night for an 8 year old!"

We also offered another wooden plaque on Pride Day. For this year we chose the restored Garvin Building showing the "Little Man". Once again our Craft Fair in the Historic Area was enjoyed by all on a lovely summer day. This year we supplied "Table Talkers" of our planned events to the sev-

eral restaurants in town. This was a new source of advertising and seemed to reach more people.

We worked with one of the Departments at the University of Vermont on several occasions as they sought help on developing Scenic Byways in certain parts of Vermont. In addition a group from Acton, Maine sought information on naming the Newichiwannock Canal to the National Register. It's interesting that our neighbor states are seeking help from us here in Wakefield.

Once again it has been a full year and we're now planning for 2002. An Antique Car Show, a stone wall inventory, a Craft Fair, a Victorian Tea, a pancake breakfast, another wooden plaque, "Dan the Railroad Man", Spinney Meeting House banks, a Cemetery Tour to name a few.

Wakefield N.H. is a special place and we're trying to keep it special. To all of our people who have helped us in as many ways in 2001 we say a special thank you. We always need everyone's help.

GAFNEY LIBRARY INC. 2001

On February 3rd we reopened the Youth Library in the basement, which had been closed for three years because entry to that part of our library was not handicapped accessible. Building the connector, which housed the elevator, solved the accessibility problem. We used the non-use period to fix – at considerable cost – the problem of flooding after heavy rains by digging around the perimeter of the building and installing a drainage system. The carpet was removed, the floor was leveled and tiled, the paneling on the wall was replaced with sheetrock and painted, and the suspended ceiling was replaced with a new one. The Friends of Wakefield Libraries donated construction materials and Fred Hall and Lyman Francis donated time and talent to build several beautiful bookcases. "Friends " members, members of the summer teen "YES" program and other volunteers stained and finished the bookcases. We are grateful for all the help we received. With a springwater bubbler donated by Dennis and Janet Miller, we look like a new library, though we have more work to do to maintain the upstairs area.

The Gafney was a busy place. 13,200 people used the library and 12,000 items – a combination of adult and juvenile fiction and non-fiction books, books on tape, large print books, magazines, interlibrary loans and videos – were circulated. The library is increasingly used as a community resource for GED preparation, resume production, Internet job searches, homeschooling research, and as a neighbor-meets-neighbor area. This was especially evident after the 9/11 tragedy.

The computer in the upstairs part of the library is available to the public during open hours and is Internet accessible. It is used every day we are open and our summer residents find it useful for accessing e-mail while away from home. We will soon be connected to free cable thanks to Adelphia. We are indebted to Mike Morrill and Jim Voyles who have been readily available to help when computers needed to be installed, repaired or virus-controlled. In February, we received an anonymous gift of a new Internet ready iMac and printer, which was placed in the Youth Library. The "Friends" donated another new printer for an older computer in the Youth Library as well. The two older computers are used by children to process school reports, play games, and do research projects utilizing encyclopedia on compact disk.

Of our seventeen volunteers, six are teens, one fulfilling an honor society requirement. We continue to work with those who are required to perform community service and value their involvement at the Gafney. Volunteers are the backbone of the library and provide time and talent beyond expectation. They work at the circulation desk, shelve returned books, cover and process new ones, sit on committees, and tutor GED students.

The summer reading program's theme was "Octopi your mind...read." 116 children and 39 adults attended four programs, and 1,247 books were circulated. Eight junior volunteers assisted with the program. The library continues to provide three copies of each book on the Paul School summer reading list. In November we received a grant from the NH Children's Literacy Fund (CLiF) in the form of \$1,200 worth of books which were distributed at a lively presentation by the foundation's executive director, Duncan McDougall, at the Paul School.

Barbara Loiselle was the children's program coordinator until we eliminated the position in October due to financial constraints. However, we did not have to close the just-opened Youth Library thanks to coverage provided by existing staff consisting of head librarian Beryl Donovan, library assistants Jennifer Rich and Karen Jewkes, and volunteers. Open hours remain Tuesday and Thursday 1-7:30; Wednesday and Friday 10-12; and Saturday 9-2, with the Youth Library closed on Wednesday and Friday. Weekly hours in the Youth Library were shortened by four.

We look back on a successful year and thank the community for their very real support as evidenced by an excellent response to our annual appeal. We intend to live up to the confidence you have placed in us.

Parks and Recreation has completed another successful year with many changes and improvements. First of all, we must thank all the volunteer coaches for their time and commitment to the children of Wakefield. Secondly, we would like to thank the area businesses who supported us and all other volunteers who gave their time to help run our programs.

We are also grateful to Dave McKechnie for the fine job he did running the department from June 2000 to August 2001. Dave resigned to take a teaching position at Brewster Academy. The 10th Annual Valentine Basketball Tournament will be held in February and we are expecting it to be a huge success. Other sports programs including Soccer, Baseball, Little League, T-Ball, Babe Ruth and Softball continue to prosper. The summer bus trips continue to be popular. The Town Beach, the skating rink and the playground are also popular local attractions.

We are continually investigating the feasibility of establishing new recreational opportunities for the citizens of Wakefield.

We are pleased to be members of the Parks and Recreation Commission and are looking forward to continuing established programs, adding new ones, and serving the community for another productive year in 2002.

WAKEFIELD PLANNING BOARD REPORT 2001

AND COL

The Planning Board has had another great year, with all of the members diligently attending meetings and working on preparation and revision of our various regulations. The Town has been well served by every one of the members and alternates and the Chairmen wish to commend them all for their dedication to duty.

The Planning Board consists of five members, four of whom are elected at large for staggered three-year terms and one Selectman Representative. There are also up to five alternate members who are appointed by the Board.

The Planning Board's duties are to oversee community growth and development, and to act as a quasi-judicial agency, which implements the town's Sub-Division and Site-Plan regulations. The Board is responsible for preparing, revising, and following public hearings, approving the Town's Master Plan as well as its Sub-Division and Site-Plan regulations. The Board also prepares associated documents such as the Capital Improvement Plan, and recommends revisions to the Zoning Ordinance.

During 2001, the Wakefield Planning Board considered applications for 10 Boundary Line Adjustments, 2 Home Occupations, 4 Minor Subdivisions and 3 Major Subdivisions, as well as 4 Major Site Plan Reviews and 2 Insignificant Changes of Use. This represents 44% more applications than the year 2000, and probably reflects the 25% growth our Town has experienced in the past 5 years.

The Planning Board has also created a new Master Plan "Philosophy" chapter which describes the spirit and character of our town, as well as its many attributes. The Philosophy chapter is available from the Town Hall. It is a nice overview of the town and we encourage all to get a copy. The Board has also worked with the Strafford Regional Planning Commission to revise the remainder of the Master Plan, which should be completely revised by the end of 2002. Finally, under the direction of Co-Chairman Paul McNally, the Board has worked diligently to revise the town's Capital Improvement Plan, which should also be completed in 2002.

The Board wishes to extend special thanks to Mrs. Desiree Tumas, the Planning Board Secretary, for her tireless dedication and competence.

Finally, the Board meets the 1st and 3rd Thursday of every month and the public is always invited. We are always looking for volunteers to work on projects and we are currently seeking two alternate members.

WAKEFIELD - TRUSTEES OF THE TRUST FUNDS 2001 ANNUAL REPORT

AND COL

The Trustees of the Trust Funds are charged with the obligation to safely invest the capital reserves and the trust funds of the Town of Wakefield.

The actions of the Trustees and the investment vehicles used are regulated by the State of New Hampshire. Investment goals include security of principal and earning interest safely.

The funds of Wakefield are held through the NH Public Deposit Investment Pool and the Charter Trust Investment Company.

The totals indicated below are current as of the end of December 2001. All additional contributions as voted at the 2001 Town Meeting have been deposited into the appropriate funds and the balances indicated below include these contributions.

The Trustees are responsible for the safe investment of the Trust Funds of the Town of Wakefield. This is a large fund comprised of many individual funds for the care of individual cemetery plots. The Cemetery Trustees are responsible for the actual care and maintenance of these plots using the interest earned on the Trust Funds. As of December 2001 there was a balance of \$196,509 in this fund.

In 1997 the Carl Siemon Scholarship Fund was established. Because of the generosity of Wakefield resident Carl Siemon, several high school seniors from Wakefield were awarded \$7,000 in 2001. As of December 2001 there was a balance of \$163,725 in this fund.

The Trustees are responsible for the safe investment of the Capital Reserve Funds that the voters of Wakefield establish at each Town Meeting. The following Capital Reserve Funds are currently in place, and their balances as of December 2001 are indicated below:



2002 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT AS AMENDED AT THE FIRST SESSION

AND COL

To the inhabitants of the Town of Wakefield in the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified of the First and Second Session of the 2002 Annual Town Meeting, as follows:

FIRST SESSION

You are notified to meet for the First Session of the Annual Town Meeting, to be held in the Opera House of the Town Hall, Sanbornville, New Hampshire, on Saturday, February 2, 2002, at 7:00 p.m. The First Session will consist of explanation, discussion, and debate of each of the following warrant articles, and will afford those voters who are present the opportunity to propose, debate, and adopt amendments to each warrant article, except those articles whose wording is prescribed by state law.

SECOND SESSION

You are also notified to meet for the Second Session of the Annual Town Meeting to elect town officers by official ballot and to vote by official ballot on the warrant articles as they may have been amended at the First Session, to be held at Paul School, Wakefield, New Hampshire on Tuesday, March 12, 2002. Polls for voting by official ballot will open at 8:00 a.m. and will close at 7:00 p.m. unless the town votes to keep the polls open to a later hour.

ARTICLE 1) To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2) Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows?: Amendment clarifies zoning ordinance by specifically stating that all uses that are not specifically permitted are prohibited. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 3) Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows?: Amendment simplifies and renders consistent definitions and references related to single and multi-family dwellings. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 4) Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows?: Amendment removes from the list of permitted uses "recreational campground or camping park" in the Residential II zoning district thereby prohibiting such uses in that zone. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 5) Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows?: Amendment allows in the Aquifer Conservation District automotive repair shops and any other use that may potentially adversely affect water quality provided certain environmental safeguards are instituted to ensure that no hazardous waste or toxic material is allowed to penetrate into the soil. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 6) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to be added to the Public Safety Building Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is recommended by the Budget Committee. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 7) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty-two thousand one hundred dollars (\$62,100) to be added to the Transfer Station Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is recommended by the Budget Committee. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 8) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty-three thousand dollars (\$63,000) to be added to the Highway Truck Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is recommended by the Budget Committee. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 9) To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provision of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of purchasing Heavy Equipment for the Wakefield Highway Department and to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to be placed in this fund and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend.

This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is recommended by the Budget Committee. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 10) To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provision of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of purchasing land and easements for aquifer protection and to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to be placed in this fund and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend.

This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is recommended by the Budget Committee. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 11) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) to be added to the Landfill Closure Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The money is to be appropriated from undesignated fund balance and <u>no money is to be raised through taxation</u>.

This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is recommended by the Budget Committee. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty-five thousand dollars (\$55,000) to be added to the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The money is to be appropriated from undesignated fund balance and <u>no money is to be raised through taxation</u>.

This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is recommended by the Budget Committee. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 13) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) to be added to the Ambulance Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is recommended by the Budget Committee. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 14) To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provision of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of Town Hall Improvements and to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be placed in the fund and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend.

This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is recommended by the Budget Committee. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 15) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-two thousand dollars (\$32,000) for the purchase and equipping of a new police cruiser.

This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is recommended by the Budget Committee. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 16) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-six thousand six hundred dollars (\$26,600) for the revaluation of town properties. This appropriation will pay for the fourth revaluation year.

This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is recommended by the Budget Committee. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 17) To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to transfer by deed to the owner of Wakefield Tax Map 48, Lot 11C, whatever interest the Town may have in the roughly .06 acre parcel shown as Tax Map 48, Lot 11D.

This article is recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 18) To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a lease agreement with the Wakefield School District under which the Town will lease all or a portion of Tax Map 27, Lot 53 (1488 Wakefield Road, otherwise known as the Town Ball Fields Property) to the Wakefield School District, on such terms and conditions as the Board of Selectmen shall determine are in the best interests of the Town of Wakefield and the Wakefield School District, and further to direct the Selectmen not to lease the area comprising the ball fields and town barn, unless and until the School District or the Town has constructed or made available other replacement ball fields or town barn to take the place of those rendered unusable.

This article is recommended by the Board of Selectmen (by a vote of 2-1). (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 19) Are you in favor of adopting the provisions of RSA 41:14-a which allows, until specific rescission of that authority, the selectmen to acquire or sell, in the name of the Town, land, buildings, or both, after recommendation of the planning board and conservations commission and after 2 public hearings thereon?

This article is recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 20) Are you in favor of authorizing the Board of Selectmen to sell to a qualified party the Garvin Building for a price and upon such terms as the selectmen deem reasonable and prudent, providing that the price and terms of the proposed sale are approved by the Wakefield Heritage Commission?

This article is recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 21) To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint an Animal Control Officer on such terms and conditions as the Board of Selectmen may determine, and to discontinue the practice of election of an Animal Control Officer by ballot instituted by petition in 1979.

This article is recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 22) **By Petition:** To ask the Town of Wakefield, NH voters to approve funds for a full-time, Professional Planning Director and Planning Department Secretary to plan and oversee growth in an orderly fashion, as Wakefield is one of the only New Hampshire towns or cities, with our present population growth rate, not to employ a professional planning department.

This article is not recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 23) **By Petition:** To see if the Town will vote to designate Canal Road as a Scenic Road under the provisions of RSA 231:157.

This article is not recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 24) **By Petition:** To see if the Town will vote to designate Pick Pocket Road as a Scenic Road under the provisions of RSA 231:157.

This article is not recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 25) **By Petition:** To see if the Town will vote to designate Stoneham Road as a Scenic Road under the provisions of RSA 231:157.

This article is not recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 26) **By Petition:** To see if the Town will vote to designate Gage Hill as a Scenic Road under the provisions of RSA 231:157.

This article is not recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 27) **By Petition:** To see if the Town will vote to designate Oak Hill Road as a Scenic Road under the provisions of RSA 231:157.

This article is not recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 28) **By Petition:** To see if the Town will vote to adopt Crab Apple Drive as a town owned and maintained road.

This article is not recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 29) Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant article and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling **\$2,690,562**? Should this article be defeated, the operating budget shall be **\$2,499,308**, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town or by law or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

NOTE: This warrant article (operating budget) <u>does not include</u> appropriations in ANY other warrant article.

This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is recommended by the Budget Committee. (Majority vote required).
