

We have examined the accounts of the selectmen, treasurer, and school board and find them correctly east and property vouched.

GEORGE LITTLE, THOMAS J. COURSER, Auditors. Webster, March 2nd, 1891.

Report of School Board.

Your School Board respectfully submit the following report,-

We have maintained seven schools during the past year of two terms each. Summer term, nine weeks; fall term twelve weeks. The whole number of pupils attending school was 88. Average attendance, 73.97. It is the opinion of the Board that the schools in general have been successful and that they have been reasonably satisfactory to all parties interested.

The entire amount received for the support of schools was \$821 86. Of this amount your Board felt constrained to use about \$30 for the construction of a shed at Putney Hill.

CORSER HILL.

Mary R. Webster, teacher for the year. Wages of teacher per month, including board, summer, \$20; fall \$22. Whole number of scholars, 17; average attendance, 14. This school was a success.

PUTNEY HILL.

Edna M. Flanders, teacher for the year. Wages of teacher per month, including board, \$20. Whole number of of scholars, 16; average attendance, 14. This was Miss Flanders' first school. The order was admirable and good progress was made in all branches taught.

WHITE PLAIN.

Emma J. Courser, teacher for summer term. Wages of teacher per month, including board, \$18. Number of scholars, 8; average attendance, 7. This was Miss Courser's first school and she did well. Fall term. Alice M. Foster, teacher. Wages same as summer term. Whole number of scholars, 7; average attendance, 5. This was Miss Foster's first school and many of the scholars made good progress. Excellent improvement was made in writing.

PLEASANT STREET.

Spring term. Ida L. Frost, teacher. Wages per month, including board, for the year, \$18. Whole number of scholars, 8; average attendance, 6. Mrs. Frost is a worker in the school room. Under her instruction much more was accomplished than we had reason to expect. We should have gladly continued her valuable services through the fall term but she declined the situation.

Fall term. Ada F. Holmes, teacher. Whole number of scholars, 8; average attendance, 6. The closing examination showed this school had been well managed and good instruction had been given. The pupils were orderly and in the studies pursued good advancement was made. H.

BASHAN.

Helen M. White, teacher for the year. Wages per month, including board, \$24. Whole number of scholars, 16, average attendance, 14. System and dicipline with thorough and practical instruction combined to make this one of the best schools in town. Pupils were prompt, orderly and confident in the discharge of their scholarly duties which was very creditable to them and gave positive assurance of the superior qualification of the teacher.

LILTLE HILL.

Emma P. Fitz, teacher for the year. Wages per month, including board, \$18. Whole number of scholars, 8; average attendance, 7.47. This school at the close showed marked im-

SWEATT'S MILLS.

Cora E. Putney, teacher for the year. Wages per month, including board, \$22. Whole number of scholars, 13; average attendance, 11.50. The large average attendance showed that a good interest had been maintained. The school was a success. c.

The school houses at Bashan and White Plain also the wood shed at Corser Hill are leaking badly and should be shingled as soon as possible. We also recommed the building of a shed for the school house at White Plains and new plastering and paper for the school room at Putney Hill; also minor repairs for most of the school houses in town except the house at Sweatt's Mills.

A small additional appropriation to the amount required by law would enable the School Board to maintain three terms of school of eight or nine weeks each instead of two terms as heretofore. Such a measure could not fail to prove of great benefit to the schools.


