THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Westmoreland in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 3. To hear the report of agents and auditors and take any action thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote for snow removal and sanding on either Class V or VI roads or take any other action relating thereto, raise and appropriate money for the same.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote for Class V assistance for Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$570 02 (State contribution to be \$2,280 09).

Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to what is required by law for highways and bridges.

Article 7. To see what action the Town will take relative to building an underpass under the River road so called, near the residence of Seldon B. Lund and raise and appropriate money for same or take any other action thereto.

Article 8. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the income of the Jotham Lord fund.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for the support of the library.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$71 00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 00 for the white pine blister rust control in cooperation with the State Forestry and recreation Department.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 00 for the upkeep of cemeteries.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

*Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to install a shaded street light on third electric light pole, south of the present light on the Chesterfield Road, for the benefit of the residents of lower Main Street, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 15. To see what action the Town will take relative to purchasing or renting land for public dump or take any other action relating thereto and raise and appropriate money for same.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$765 16 for the Elliot Community Hospital in Keene and take any other action relating thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Municipal Budget Act.

*Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to ask the Selectmen to appoint a planning Board of five members, including one Selectman, who shall be chosen by the Selectmen to act as ex-officio member, according to the law regarding a town or village district Planning Board.

*Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to declare and accept the Deed, Quinton to Aldrich, Vol. 13, Page 143 as a deed to the present Town Common.

Article 20. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

TOWN MEETING

March 9, 1948

The annual town meeting was called to order by the moderator, Paul D. King, who read the warrant.

Article 1. Article 2a. Article 3. It was voted that these three articles remain open during the entire meeting.

Article 2. The following sums of money were voted to be raised and appropriated for general government.

Article 4. A motion was made to pass over the article in regard to having one road agent. Objection made. The article was voted on by ballot, 82 ballots being cast. 28 Yes. 54 No.

Article 5. This article caused much discussion. The Gilboa railroad crossing is especially dangerous. It was voted not to accept the town report in relation to highways.

Article 6. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for snow removal and sanding the highways.

Article 7. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$554.54 for Class V highways, the State's share being \$2,218.15.

Article 8. The town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,833 for highways and bridges, this sum including what is required by law.

Article 9. It was voted that the selectmen be instructed to rebuild and tar the road from Amos Hatt's to the tar surface on the Spofford road. The expense not to exceed \$300 of the town highway funds, plus the contribution of \$300 by Amos Hatt and \$100 by Col. Phelan.

Article 10. It was voted to take \$1,000 from the T. R. A. money for the purpose of widening and rebuilding the road from Route 63 to Route 12.

Article 11. The matter of tarring the road from Route 12 to the residence of Alonzo Hudson was left to the discretion of the selectmen.

Article 12. The income of the Jotham Lord fund was voted to be used for the town library.

Article 13. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250 for the support of the library.

Article 14. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$69 to be given to the Monadnock Region to assist in their work.

Article 15. It was voted to pass over the matter of white pine blister rust.

Article 16. It was voted to raise and appropriate and spend the sum of \$100 for the upkeep of the cemeteries.

Article 17. The vote was that the selectmen be authorized to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 18. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250 to purchase a power mower and additional parts for same.

Article 19. It was voted that Lucy I. Paine serve as Chairman of the committee to obtain and erect a memorial for the Westmoreland veterans of World War II. As chairman, she is to appoint the remainder of the committee, which is not to exceed a total of five in number.

It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the memorial. It was also voted that the committee hold one or more public hearings on the choosing of the memorial and the expenditure of the sum raised for same.

Article 20. The Historical committee was appointed to ascertain the location of such historical places and events as should be kept for posterity.

Article 21. The town voted that the property acquired by the town by taxes should be sold at public auction, the money thus received to be applied on the town debt.

Article 22. It was voted that the selectmen take \$178 from the general funds and pay off the note on the fire engine.

The town voted to accept the hot water tank and heater recently installed in the kitchen.

It was voted that the selectmen be responsible that the cemeteries be kept mowed.

Voted to give to Semira Perry the portraits of her grandfather and grandmother, now in the library.

It was voted that the town fix the grade crossing at Gilboa and pay for same out of the general fund.

There were 189 ballots cast under Article 1.

The results of the balloting were as follows:

Town Clerk. Ruth E. Burt had 179 votes. Elected.

Selectmen for three years. Robert Blood had 3 votes. Arthur Christian had 9 votes, Robert Minkler had 19 votes. Seven people had one vote each. Robert G. Sanborn had 136 votes and was elected.

Town treasurer. Two people had one vote each. Charles H. Aldrich had 169 votes and was elected.

Tax Collector. Ruth E. Burt had 179 votes and was elected, River road agent. Charles W. Messer, Kenneth Rounds each had one vote. Leon E. McClening had 172 votes and was elected.

South Village road agent. Charles W. Messer had 168 votes and was elected.

East Westmoreland road agent. Edward Bosworth had 47 votes. Walter A. Stone had 23 votes. Fletcher B. Fredette had 28 votes. Charles W. Messer had 86 votes and was elected.

Trustee of Town Library for three years. Maude Messer had one vote. Elizabeth Moore had 160 votes and was elected.

Auditors. Three stray votes cast. Oscar W. Billings had 166 votes and was elected. Walter E. Dunn had 154 votes and was elected.

Trustee of Trust Funds for three years. Ten persons had from one to seven votes. Maude E. Messer had 25 votes and was elected.

Constable. Richard Rhodes had one vote, Walter Dunn had 2 votes, Robert Blood had 3 votes, Donald Paine had 6 votes, Lester Minkler had 16 votes. Linwood Burt had 142 votes and was elected.

Surveyors of Wood and Lumber. William S. Starkey had 158 votes. Elected. Howard E. Smith had 158 votes. Elected. Perley O. Thompson had 163 votes. Elected.

Fence Viewers. Selden B. Lund had 154 votes. Elected. Lawrence A. Leach had 160 votes. Elected. Russell H. Wellington had 150 votes. Elected.

Briggs Fund Committee. Twenty-three people had from one to six votes. Mrs. John Terry had 42 votes. Elected. Alice Chickering had 39 votes. Elected.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Westmoreland:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools:

It is a pleasure to report that your schools are going very well this year. We have a fine corps of teachers and a very cooperative group of children and parents. All these items have a direct bearing upon the success or failure of a school system. There was only one change in the faculty this year. Mrs. Cole, who is teaching in the South Village primary room, comes to us after considerable experience in teaching, both in this state and in other states. We are able to start the music program at the beginning of the year with very noticeable results in the improvement in singing.

All the elementary teachers of this union were able to attend a workshop conducted jointly by the Hinsdale union and this union and held at Keene Teachers College during the first week of January, at which the teachers working under the direction of Dr. Gertrude Lewis, formerly supervisor of elementary school services for the State Department of Education, worked out some programs in the social studies that would be adaptable to conditions as we find them in our own schools. This was one of a series of workshops which have been held throughout the state for the past year and one-half. The primary purpose of these social studies workshops was to develop a new program of studies for this field as there has been no revision in this part of the elementary program since 1930. The group has recommended several changes in grade placement of various items so as to eliminate some of the duplication that has been made in the past and to provide for a better continuity of subject matter as the child progresses through the grades. It is hoped to eventually collect the material accumulated in the various workshops and correlate it into a single report that

will ultimately become adopted as the state program of studies for the social studies field in the elementary grades.

During the past summer a considerable sum of money was spent on improving the sanitary facilities in the South Village school. As we reported to you last year, and for several years past, there was considerable doubt as to the length of time we could depend upon the chemical toilets as they had outlived their usual span of usefulness. When these tanks were inspected at the close of school it was deemed wise to discard them immediately. Hence, as you know a special district meeting was called and it was voted to install running water in the school with flush toilets. Through the cooperation of the selectmen it was possible to make this installation much more cheaply than it would have been possible through our own efforts. This should prove to be a very desirable cooperative effort as the town hall is very seldom used during school hours and vice versa. Westmoreland now has a school at the South Village which is as well equipped and has as modern conveniences as any school its size and construction in the state. The only bad feature now existing is that it is not large enough to care for many more pupils than are now enrolled in it. The changes of the light fixtures and the installation of stronger bulbs improved the lighting a great deal. A realignment of the rows in Mrs. Dunn's room has also lessened some of the crowding that was quite evident previously.

Should the population of Westmoreland rise appreciably during the next few years it may become necessary to make some changes in the town schools. The alterations made this past summer can be considered as a long term capital investment. It is entirely feasible to add one or two more rooms to the present South Village school sometime in the future. The water supply is adequate for several times the number of pupils now enrolled.

Through the generosity of the South Village P. T. A. the playground is being equipped with some very desirable apparatus. All of the P. T. A.'s in Westmoreland are to be congratulated upon their forward-looking views in regard to education and their willingness to contribute many items of

equipment that the schools wouldn't otherwise have. Their support of the school lunch programs has made it possible for the majority of children to have a hot lunch during the winter months which they otherwise might not have had due to the difficulty of finding capable persons willing to take the time to prepare and serve the meals.

We were very fortunate last fall when the Corner school caught fire to have so many alert neighbors who responded to the alarm and saved the building. The amount of insurance we received was sufficient to repair the damage to the building. In these days of high prices for both materials and labor insurance policies based on pre-war values do not very adequately cover the risks involved. If the fire had gained more headway before being discovered we should not have had enough insurance to repair the damage.

This is a legislative year and many educational bills have already been introduced while others will be introduced from time to time as the session progresses. We are unable to estimate with any degree of accuracy how much state aid Westmoreland will be entitled to next December. If the legislature should appropriate the same amount that was appropriated for the last two years it is quite possible that the amount Westmoreland would receive would be appreciably less due to the fact that the average membership in the schools throughout the state has increased from 20 to 30 per cent since the state aid bill was written. In order for every school district to receive the same amount that it has received for the past two years it would be necessary for the total appropriation to be increased about one million dollars, providing the present method of apportioning the aid was continued. However, there has been some dissatisfaction voiced over the method of apportionment, some organizations thinking that the entire sum should be in the form of equalization aid rather than as it is now partly equalization and partly general aid. The new state bill will probably take this into consideration and will be more in line with the form that has been enacted in some of the other states.

There are bills before our national congress to provide federal aid for education. We understand that a bill of this type was

passed by one of the Houses of Congress at the last session but was not brought on to the floor of the other House and so was not acted upon. It is quite likely, considering the facts and figures given by Mr. Truman in his budget message and in his inaugural address, that the Federal bill will be favorably received by the present congress. Just how much it will mean to Westmoreland it is difficult to estimate at this time.

Our school costs in line with most other commodities continue to rise. Our teachers' salaries are comparable to those of teachers in other schools in towns the size and wealth of Westmoreland. Present indications are that some increases will be granted to teachers in every school district. In those states to the south of us those increases are higher amounting in some cases to as much as \$500-\$600 per teacher for the coming school year. We in New Hampshire cannot hope to match these figures but we should do everything possible to provide our boys and girls with the best educational opportunities that we can.

We are fortunate this year in being able to change our transportation routes on a base consistent with our budget figures. Due to the fact that some of the families moved away from the Corner district, we were able to discontinue, at least temporarily, the transportation route from that area thereby effecting a saving of several hundred dollars this year. It is entirely possible that new routes will have to be established some time in the future should people move onto some of the outlying farms away from our present routes.

You will notice in going over the report that there has been some realignment of items. This was to conform with the new financial system adopted by the State Board of Education last summer. Certain items have been eliminated from the school board's budget, and others have been combined in different areas in an effort to simplify the bookkeeping procedure. You will notice also that we have removed the dog tax item from our estimated income for next year. This is in line with a State Tax Commission recommendation that the law in regard to dog taxes be changed so that the money goes into the general fund of the town rather than being earmarked for the support of the schools.

We are always glad to have parents and interested friends visit our schools and see them in action. Only through your active participation in the daily life of the school can we give you a true picture of what we are trying to accomplish for and with your boys and girls. We want to thank the selectmen for allowing us the use of the dining room in the Town hall for assembly purposes one afternoon each week. This has been a great help, particularly when we want to combine the classes for special music or rehearsals.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

- (1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.
- (3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.
