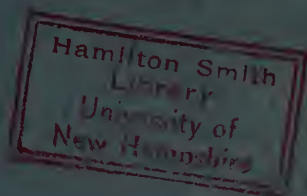

TOWN WARRANT

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to elect one road agent instead of four.
4. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of three per cent on property taxes paid on or before the first Saturday of July next.
5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for both fire companies.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$150.00 for band concerts.
7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see if the Town will vote to accept state aid construction or state aid on Class V maintenance and raise money for same.

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$200.00 from the estate of the late Herbert Glidden, the income of which is to care for the cemetery lot of the same in the Old Cemetery at Barnstead Parade.

10. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the John B. Clark assignment.

11. To see if the Town will vote to buy a plow for a truck.

12. To choose number and manner of appointing Budget Committee.

13. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for bridges.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise money for blister rust.

15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds..

16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with other towns in the lakes region.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

In accordance with a vote of the Town and a special Act of the Legislature, the Selectmen exchanged all short term notes at 5% interest for serial notes to the amount of twenty thousand dollars at 3 $\frac{3}{4}$ %.

We have a temporary loan of two one thousand dollar notes on account of uncollected taxes.

Of the total benefits, including direct relief and old age assistance paid by the Town to the amount of \$4,174.74, the Town was reimbursed by State Relief to the amount of \$1,269.30, being approximately 30% as compared to 75% of last year, with a total cost to the Town of \$2,905.44, as compared to \$1,437.01 of last year.

The total tractor expenditures of this year, \$4,994.82, \$1,600.00 of which was paid on 1934 indebtedness, the balance of \$3,394.82 being spent on repairs to tractor house, snow plow, tractor and snow removal, the above figures also including summer account.

In accordance with a vote of the Town of \$2,340.00 for a new road construction, the Town was able to obtain \$10,793.37 from the State, thereby furnishing work for practically all of the Town's unemployed for nearly four months.

At the end of the fiscal year 1936 the Town owed the schools approximately \$1,500.00 less than at the end of the fiscal year 1935.

State and county tax \$1,865.38 more in 1935 than in 1934.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Barnstead School Board and Citizens:

Respectfully submitted herewith is my thirteenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

TEACHERS

There were no changes in the teaching force during the school year.

INSTRUCTION

One of the great difficulties met by children in taking up a new subject in school has been more definitely isolated in the past few years than formerly. Educators are coming to realize that many children have trouble with a new subject solely because of their inability to read understandingly in that subject. Pupils have been called slow in arithmetic when their fundamental weakness was not in arithmetic but in reading. They have not had the opportunity to acquire the necessary arithmetical vocabulary nor have they been properly trained in the simple but fundamental arithmetical concepts. The same is true with other subjects. In order to help solve this problem a plan has been adopted to provide, in the primary grades, reading practice with the vocabulary so chosen that children will be led gradually into an understanding of the words and terms necessary for satisfactory progress in the various subjects. In addition to the usual literary

vocabulary of *hen, apple, jump* and *run* the child needs to have experience with such arithmetical concepts as *large, smaller, nearest, higher* and *tallest*; such social concepts as *town, work, family, money* and *helpers*; such science concepts as *warm, change, tracks, cloudy, roots* and *buds*; such health concepts as *soap, towel, rinse, tub, handkerchief* and *skin*, and such art concepts as *tan match, color, straight, space, print shape* and *beauty*. In order to better meet these various vocabulary and conceptual needs in the primary grades, extension readers in arithmetic have been adopted since the last report for use in the first three grades and in health in the first two grades. This extension of the reading program is in keeping with the recommendation made last year that "In the last few years this minimum core of reading content should be extensively expanded to meet the varied and broad needs of the children." During the next year further progress should be made in this direction, extending the reading experiences into other subjects and other grades.

In order to extend the program in science up through the grades, textbooks in science have been adopted for grades seven and eight. Now it is possible for those Barnstead pupils who go to Pittsfield High School to get a completely rounded course in science, the subject being taught progressively from the first grade through the senior year in high school without interest-killing repetition or duplication.

The twelve Barnstead pupils taking the standard test last June received three A's, three B's, four C's, one D, and one E, whereas we normally expect as many D's and E's as A's and B's. Their median score was seven months above the standard. In other words, on this test six of these pupils did as well as, or better than, the average freshman in high school would be expected to do. This certainly is a very creditable showing.

PROMOTIONS TO HIGH SCHOOL

The following twelve pupils received certificates of admission to high school in June: Elizabeth Clark, Ulysses Drolet, Louise Fowler, Mathias Fowler, Robert Golden, Beulah Gray,

Frank Gray, Velna Gray, Alfred Jenisch, Lloyd Kidder, Donald Otis, and Glen Smith.

Ten of these pupils entered high school last fall and one is receiving secondary instruction in a local school.

HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS

Thirty-five Barnstead tuition pupils, as compared with forty-one last year and forty-seven the year before, were enrolled in secondary schools last fall as follows:

Alton High School: Elizabeth Boyd, Robert Carr, Mathias Fowler, Fred Hillsgrove, and Richard Kardinal.

Colebrook Academy: Flora Young.

Pittsfield High School: Reta Canfield, Kathleen Chandler, Elizabeth Clark, Ella Dame, Margaret Davis, Oliver Dennett, Ruth Dennett, Samuel Firestien, Ellena Foss, Norman Foss, Mary Garland, Beulah Gray, Frank Gray, Velna Gray, Paul Golden, Lloyd Hanson, Alfred Jenisch, Felix Jenisch, Altha Kenison, Harold Kidder, Lloyd Kidder, Joseph Nutter, Donald Otis, Glenn Smith, Beverly Smart, Leonard Tasker, Vernol Thompson, Ruth Yeaton, and Frank Ziebarth.

Of these thirty-five pupils, one has already left and nine more are seniors. There are now eight pupils in the eighth grade. It is estimated from these figures that about thirty-one will be in high school next year for whom \$2,325.00 will be needed for tuition.

It will be of interest to Barnstead people to know that of the five pupils in Pittsfield High School who received all A's for the first semester of the present school year, two of them are from Barnstead: Kathleen Chandler and Ruth Yeaton.

ROLL OF HONOR FOR ATTENDANCE

These figures are so little different from those of last year, and compare so favorably with State averages that special comment would not be of particular interest except in one case: the number of non-promotions. Seven of the nine pupils not receiving promotion were in the first grade. These seven pupils, who are typical of a number of beginners each year, were not able to learn to read for one or both of two reasons: (1) irregular school attendance due to the transient

living habits of the parents or to poor physical health or (2) to mental immaturity. They themselves were losers because they got discouraged through loss of interest and formed shiftless habits of work. Other pupils were losers because teachers were no anxious to help these immature beginners that they got a disproportionate amount of the teachers' time while the great majority of the pupils, who could profit by special help, were neglected. For their own good and for the good of others such physically or mentally underdeveloped pupils who are only six years of age should wait another year or two before entering school.

This total is eleven less than that of last year and eighteen less than that of two years ago, and shows that the number of children 5 to 16 living in the town has dropped 18.3 per cent during the past three years.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

Since the last report considerable progress has been made with the plans to progressively improve the buildings. Last spring electric lights were installed at the Parade school and during the summer modern septic toilets were installed there. A small lean-to was attached to the east side of the building

to make space for the toilet rooms and for a small supply closet.

At the Center school the ceiling and walls of the primary room were painted.

At the South school both exterior and interior painting was done.

As it was advisable to continue the use of the Shackford's Corner schoolhouse, the interior was painted, the roof was repaired, and new slate blackboards were installed in the front of the room.

This summer the toilets at the Center should be replaced by modern, sanitary facilities and the budget has been drawn up with this provision.

FINANCES

Some criticism has been voiced recently because both rooms at the Parade have been maintained this year. As their operation has been approved by the State Board of Education, the cost to Barnstead taxpayers of operating both rooms is no more than it would have been for one room and the children are certainly getting much better educational advantages than they would have got with one teacher for all the pupils. Next year, however, approval cannot be obtained unless the enrollment goes up, which is not likely, so the budget has been made out with the idea of having only one teacher at this school.

Taxpayers will be pleased to know that the amount of money called for in the budget for next year is about \$900.00 less than was raised last spring. With the truly severe tax burden borne this past year by Barnstead taxpayers, the considerable cut should be a welcomed relief.

HEALTH SUPERVISION

The accompanying report the school nurse is commended to your attention. Since it was written notice has been received that Barnstead pupils may have four bottles of free Federal milk daily.

CLERICAL WORK

The following record showing the number of pieces of first and second class mail sent out from the superintendent's office for each month of the past school year, not including the summer, gives some idea of one phase of the superintendent's work. Considerable time is employed in taking care of the necessary correspondence and in preparing circular letters to teachers thereby aiming toward the improvement of their services. As the superintendent tries to be in the classroom as much as possible observing teachers' work and conferring with them on their problems, much of the clerical work has to be done evenings.

REPORT OF SCHOOL HEALTH WORK

*To the Townspeople, School Board, and
Superintendent of Schools:*

The school children of Barnstead seem to be in fairly good health in spite of the fact that very little can be done to correct the physical defects accumulating as a result of lack of funds to accomplish this work. There have been almost no cases of contagious disease reported and the general resistance seems to have been well kept up.

It has been very disappointing not to have been able to accomplish more clinic work. Teeth, tonsils, adenoids, and eyes need attention badly but very few cases are able to afford the necessary work. Thus far no public organization has been found able to help with this work. No Federal money may be had this year either for the correction of defects, or for milk or hot lunches to be served in the schools.

Following will be found a statistical record of the School Health Work accomplished in Barnstead last year:

Where it is possible the teachers are serving hot lunches to children in school to supplement the dinner boxes. These are planned and carried out with considerable ingenuity and with

very little support and are thoroughly worth while. Clothing was also procured and given out in several cases where it was needed.

It is hoped that more corrective work can be planned and carried out this year, but it is very difficult to do this with no money guaranteed. At the same time it is very easy to contract for work to be done and then find few able to pay for it.

I wish at this time to thank parents and teachers for their cooperation and interest in the School Health Work.
