HOUSE OF CORRECTION.

To the County Commissioners,

Gentlemen:

In making my annual report it is gratifying to be able to say that those who have been committed to my charge in the House of correction, with few exceptions, have conformed to the rules of this department and performed their labor in a very satisfactory manner; yet it must be expected that among such a class of people some will, at times, become careless and indifferent and go contrary to the regulations—but in such cases, however unpleasant to both Sup't and prisoners, they must be punished until they will submit.

The number of persons committed, twenty-three, for the following offences: Drunk, 9; Common Drunkards, 12; Vagabond, 1; Idle and Disorderly, 1.

COUNTY JAIL.

The number of persons committed to jail the past year, 14; for the following offences: Stealing, 6; Selling Rum, 1; Non Payment of Fine, 1; False Oath, 1; False Representation, 1; Non-

Payment of Taxes, 1; Drunk, 1; Refusing to testify where he obtained his liquor, 1; Incendiary, 1.

It will be seen by the foregoing report that the expenses for the support of the external poor has been in excess of the previous year, which is owing to the very large increase in the number who have been compelled to call on the County for what we hope will prove to be but temporary assistance by reason of the great depression in business, and the fact that under the late law nearly all who call for assistance come upon the county instead of the towns as they formerly did under the old law.

It will also be observed that a larger number have been maintained at the County Farm at a less expense than the previous year, which is due in part to the lower price of provisions and the increased average number supported during the year, but chiefly to the very careful, prudent and economical management of W. S. Woodman and Wife, who have been in charge of the farm for the past year, and who by long experience and careful attention to their duties and to the interests of the County as well as the comfort of the inmates, merit the approbation of all the citizens of the County who wish their poor well cared for, and at an expense to them which can only be obtained by experience and good judgment. Their services have been secured for another year.

Also herein will be found the Report of the Superintendent of the County Farm, House of Correction and Deputy Jailor, Clerk of Court and County Treasurer.
